Music key part of Arts series

A two-day focus on music will launch the Institute for the Humanities' fall series on the Arts Sept. 28-29. That series entitled, *The Arts: Windows to the Soul*, will look at the relationship between the arts and humanities through the eyes of a classical musician/musicologist, an author/poet/songwriter, and a photographer. The series will examine how music and the visual arts affect us, our minds, our memories, ourselves.

Dr. Robert Freeman, the former Dean of the UT College of Fine Arts will open the lecture series with a presentation about the past and future of music. That lecture, "Where did music come from? And where is it going?" will be 4-6 p.m. Sept. 29 at the Salado Silver Spur Theatre.

Freeman is an accomplished pianist, musicologist, teacher and administrator who has spent his career looking for ways to connect music to other disciplines. Prior to his seven year tenure at UT, Freeman spent 27 years as head of The Eastman School of Music and the New England Conservatory. Before that he taught at MIT, Princeton and Harvard and is currently the Regan Regents professor of Fine Arts at UT.

He retired from the deanship at UT to devote himself full time to other musical pursuits. Currently he serves as executive director for the Arts Entrepreneurship Incubator at UT, is board chair of the Brain Music Institute at Harvard-MIT-Mass General, and is on the board of the Texas Medical Center at Houston where he's part of a team looking into ways to apply musician skills to other disciplines.

Freeman received his undergraduate degree from Harvard College and his master's degree and Ph.D from Princeton.

The music weekend begins with a public "Rising Star" concert on Sept. 28, co-sponsored with Music in Salado and featuring two gifted young singers with central Texas ties. David Pershall, baritone and his wife Katie Horn, soprano, will perform at the Salado Silver Spur Theater at 7 p.m.

David and Katie are recently married and have been hired by the Virginia Opera where David will be a Virginia Spectrum Artist and Katie will be a member of the company. David is a Bell County native and 2007 graduate of Baylor University. He has performed multiple times in Salado and is popular with local audiences. One of eight Americans invited to participate in the Seoul International Vocal Competition in Seoul, Korea in November, David has also been recognized by the Metropolitan Opera as an outstanding young talent.

Rep. Delisi announces that she won't seek 10th House term

Dianne White Delisi (R-55th) announced last week that she would not seek a tenth term in the Texas House of Representatives. She was first elected to the Texas House in 1990.

"With honor and respect for our legislative process, its history and traditions, and for the privilege of being part of that history," Rep. Delisi said when she announced that she would not seek a tenth term, "I am forever grateful for the unfailing love of my family and the support of friends, and neighbors."

"For the good will, keen insight, guidance and commitment of my fellow legislative colleagues and the dedication and care of staff over the years, I am

appreciative, but more importantly, I am thankful for their enduring friendships," she added.

"Texas has been blessed with exceptional growth and prosperity," Rep. Delisi said. "My home county has developed a fine reputation in the halls of the Capitol, largely because of the consistent civic engagement by elected officials and local leaders. In Austin as in Washington, I am always proud to call Bell County 'home.'"

"As I stand down, others will capably stand up to honorably and successfully lead," she added. "I plan to stay fully engaged in public policy issues important to Texas and Bell County, both for the remaining 15 months of my

term and into the future."

Representative Delisi currently serves as the Chairman of the Committee on Public Health and as a member of the Committee on Public Education. She also served ten years on the House Appropriations Committee, four of which she was appointed Vice-Chairman and a member of the budget writing conference committee.

Representative Delisi has authored noteworthy legislation in the areas of education, healthcare, military and economic development and has been honored for her efforts on these issues. In June 2005, she was recognized for a second time by Texas Monthly magazine as one of the "Top 10 Legisla-

tors."

A fifth generation Central Texan, Delisi graduated from Temple High School, received her B.A. at Southern Methodist University, M.A. at the University of Colorado, and a Certificate of Studies at the Episcopal Theological Seminary of the Southwest. She has two children and two grandchildren.



Why Fred?

The conventional wisdom about Fred Thompson is that he might have waited too long to get into the presidential race, even though by the standard of past election cycles he's right on schedule. The best question for the Thompson campaign doesn't have to do with timing, but with rationale; it isn't about "When?" but "Why?"

His delay in announcing his presidential bid needn't seriously hurt him if he is a candidate on par with or better than his top rivals. In the national glare, both Mitt Romney and Rudy Giuliani have proven themselves good fundraisers, adept debaters and indefatigable campaigners with appealing outsider reformist messages. It's not clear yet that Thompson is any of these things.

Thompson isn't "lazy" -- the rap against him -- by any reasonable measure. He didn't become a Watergate investigator, prosecutor, actor and senator by sleeping late and watching daytime TV. But his Senate career tells against him. Not because he didn't have the energy to make much of it, but because he apparently didn't have the desire.

Thompson has two main draws. One is stylistic, even though he has a kind of anti-style -- a low-key, no-nonsense bearing that gives him a sense of quiet authority. The downside is that this can seem to be a lack of passion. His appearance on "The Tonight Show With Jay Leno" announcing his candidacy was so somnolent that you could be forgiven for wondering if he wasn't already bored with running for president.

His other appeal is ideological. Thompson has a more consistent conservative record than Romney or Giuliani. But, a product of the moderate-conservative Tennessee GOP, he was never a firebrand either. In the gotcha environment of the primary race, Thompson will have to defend past heterodoxies on abortion, immigration, campaign-finance reform and tort

reform. The deeper problem, though, is that what ails the Republican Party isn't a lack of down-the-line conservatism.

Republicans need more fresh thinking, and Thompson's devotion to federalism emphatically doesn't count. In terms of domestic policy, the best news in the Republican race so far is that Romney and Giuliani have offered forward-looking health-care proposals. Thompson will have to excel in the ideas race rather than rest on a conservative voting record.

The one advantage Republicans might have in a tough election year in 2008 is that they likely will be running against a Democratic senator or former senator with no executive experience. That creates an opening for Romney or Giuliani -- both successful executives who made their political reputations outside the beltway -- to argue they are better suited to fix Washington. Thompson, in contrast, has a similar profile as the Democrats -- a former senator with no experience running things, whose kitchen table is in the haute Washington, D.C., suburb of McLean, Va.

All that said, it's the most wide-open Republican primary race in 50 years. Before even announcing, Thompson was in second place in national polls. It is understandable that when considering a run he looked at those polls and concluded, "Why not?" Now, he has to answer the tougher question: "Why?"

Delisi not seeking 10th term; All out GOP-Demo fray expected to replace 17 year House veteran

In a surprise political move last week, Representative Dianne White Delisi announced her intention to retire from public office on December 31, 2008. According to sources in Austin, the 17 year Republican House veteran spent Wednesday morning (September 19) in Speaker Craddick's office and later that day issued a personal announcement indicating she would not seek a 10th term.

Insiders close to the District 55 Representative told this column that Delisi's decision centered on the fact that she has three "brand new" grandchildren and naturally wants to spend time with them. Delisi's timing is excellent since her long list of legislative goals either have been accomplished or on the road to fruition - all with results that deservedly carry the stamp of appreciation and good will from both Republican and Democratic friends and supporters.

WHO WILL SEEK DELISI'S POST?

Big political question now: "Who will seek the District 55 House seat?" It includes Bell County - minus a small slice chopped off the west end of the county.

Bell County Republican Chair Nancy Boston told reporters last week that she hasn't spoken to anyone (at that point) concerning Delisi's retirement. We suspect Bell-GOPers will gear-up for an "all-out" campaign assault to retain the District 55 post.

Local Democratic Party faithful noted that the Delisi opening had happened so quickly that Demos were just now sorting out "possibles" for the March primary. They'll also be keeping in mind that this could be "their" year, thanks to the rise in Democratic Party fortunes nationwide, all due in large measure to the political "fumblytits" that has seriously infected the Bush administration.

DEMOS LAST HURRAH IN 1985

Many Democrats quickly voiced their support for Mary Beth Harrell who ran a scrappy battle against Salado's Congressman John Carter back in 2006. **Readers will recall Carter refused to face Harrell by saying "She hadn't earned the right to debate him!"** That general attitude of pomposity helped Democrats regain Congress that year, but unfortunately didn't take Carter down as well.

We talked to Mrs. Harrell and discovered she doesn't live in Delisi's district. She resides just west of the dividing line in Killeen.

Had she been residentially qualified - Harrell would have been hard to beat and Bell County might have had its first Democratic Representative since 1985 when Hugh Shine defeated John Messer.

ENDANGERED TOMB OF UNKNOWN SOLDIER

Bureaucratic bunglers at the Arlington National Cemetery have picked a fight they shouldn't be allowed to win. What's brewing is a battle between "petty" cemetery functionaries and the National Trust for Historical Preservation, over the future of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

That monument is very close to the hearts of all Americans and what the Feds want to do is "replace" the original Tomb because of a "few repairable cosmetic imperfections" according to the preservationists.

The National Trust alerted the

media via a Texas Historical Commission E-mail news release last week that reported: **"This is an ill considered plan by federal bureaucrats!"** A final decision is slated for September 30.

The Tomb is a 48-ton marble block erected in 1932. Trust officials complained that the ANC had not cared for the monument properly. Specifically - the use of high pressure power washing equipment and failure to re-grout normal cracking along the marble's grain.

A more careful treatment of monuments is used to maintain the Lincoln Memorial and other historical remembrances in Washington - and none of those "memorials" have had to be replaced.

For Saladoans wishing to halt ANCs planned rebuilding of the Tomb, the best political pressure point would be through Senators Cornyn and Hutchison, who claim to have influence with the Senate Committee on Armed Services.

The ticking clock on pay discrimination

Look around your office. Do you know what your co-workers are really being paid? Probably not. A recent survey found that only 10 percent of companies have pay openness policies. And if you were paid less by your employer simply because you are female how long do you think it would take to find out? Probably not until you've been working there a long time, maybe years.

That is exactly what happened to Lilly Ledbetter. Her employer, Goodyear, kept compensation information confidential and it wasn't until decades after the fact she found out that she was being paid less. By the time of her retirement, she was paid \$3,727 monthly, while the lowest paid male doing the same job was paid \$4,286. Taking her employer to court, a jury found that she received raises less frequently than her male colleagues because of her gender. The jury awarded her damages for this intentional discrimination, but on appeal to the Supreme Court earlier this year, a majority tossed out the award because Ms. Ledbetter failed to file her claim within 180 days of her employer's discriminatory decisions — decisions she didn't have reason to suspect until long after they were made.

Pay discrimination based on gender is a violation of federal law and victims of such discrimination should be able to recover lost wages and perhaps other damages as well. But the Supreme Court has now made it practically impossible for victims to recoup damages when they have been discriminated against.

In order to encourage victims of discrimination to file their claims promptly, the law requires that they file within 180 days of the discriminatory practice. So far, so good. But the Supreme Court's decision in Ledbetter v. Goodyear Tire, interpreted the law to mean that the 180-day clock starts when the employer makes the discriminatory decision, not each time the employee receives a smaller paycheck. So, if the employee didn't learn about her employer's decision to pay her less when the decision was made, her claim of discrimination will probably be too late, even though the employer continues to pay her less money.

The pattern in the Ledbetter case is not unusual. In a 2002 case, another

employee didn't find out about her employer's compensation policies until a printout of salaries appeared on her desk seven years after her starting salary was set lower than co-workers. In a 1998 case, the employee found out about salary disparities when she read about them in the newspaper. Unlike discriminatory decisions to hire and fire, compensation decisions are typically confidential. Consequently, it makes more sense to start the clock each time the employer makes a discriminatory payment rather than when the decision to discriminate is made.

Ledbetter was a 5-4 decision in which the conservative majority rejected the consistent position held by most of the lower courts for years. Over 20 years ago, in a race discrimination case, the Court observed that "each week's paycheck that delivers less to a black than to a similarly situated white is a wrong actionable under Title VII." This common sense idea means that if the employee files within 180 days of receiving the discriminatory pay, he or she can have their day in court.

Some argue that the clock should start when a reasonable person would have discovered the wrong, but this vague standard is very difficult to apply in a compensation setting. In particular, employees may learn about pay differences but might not have enough information to suspect discrimination until much later. It's a cruel joke on the victim if their clock runs out before they even know it started.

Rather than opening the door to such time-consuming disputes, a better approach would be to change the law back to the definition that worked for decades and that has proven to be workable for both employers and employees. As it stands right now the Supreme Court has practically given employers a loophole to discriminate, as long as they aren't found out in 180 days.

Congress has a lot of difficult issues to deal with when it returns in September — Iraq, immigration, the deficit, on and on. But some problems are easy to solve if the political will to stand up to the White House and the business community is there. This is one of them.

Why isn't Texas in Top 10? State has terrible record for children

The University of Texas football team is in the midst of a run for the Big 12 Championship and possibly another turn as National Champions. The polls have the Horns in the Top 10 in the nation, much to the delight of Longhorns fans across the state.

Another set of rankings, released last month, paints a much more dismal portrait of Texas-Texas kids, that is. According to the 2007 KIDS COUNT Databook, Texas ranks 37th—just 13 from the bottom—in overall child well being.

If UT were consistently ranked near or at the bottom of Division I football on offense, defense, and in the overall rankings, Texans would be up in arms. Could you imagine the outcry if football rivals Ohio, Michigan, Nebraska, and Iowa were always better than us?

In the case of children, this really is the case.

According to the KIDS COUNT report, Texas ranks last in the nation with the highest rate of children without health care. In fact, Texas has been at or near the bottom of the health care rankings since 1998. By contrast, Michigan and Nebraska are tied for No. 2—with the second highest rate of kids with health insurance. Iowa is at No. 8 and Ohio ranks No. 14. Having a high number of uninsured kids doesn't just sound bad; it is bad for the

state's economy and our children's futures.

Uninsured kids often turn to high-cost emergency rooms for treatment, or delay care until medical conditions are more serious—and expensive. These charges are passed on to the community through higher hospital charges, higher private health insurance premiums, and higher local taxes.

Imagine if we were as committed to ensuring the health of our youngest and most vulnerable as we are the health of our offensive and defensive lines.

Texas also ranks at the bottom on births to teens, with the highest rate of babies born to teens (ages 15-19) in the country. Iowa ranks No. 13, Michigan is at No. 17, and Nebraska ranks No. 20. Babies born to teen mothers are more likely to live in poverty, drop out of school, have a child while in their teens, and rely on public assistance.

Imagine if we were as committed to preventing pregnancy as we are turn-overs.

The report also finds that when it comes to lowest high school dropout rates, Texas ranks No. 27. Iowa and Nebraska are tied for No. 4, Ohio ranks No. 9, and Michigan is No. 16.

Dropouts cost Texas millions of dollars. According to a Center for Public Policy Priorities report, if every 16-19 year old who is not in school and does not have a high

school diploma simply graduated, Texas' combined earnings could increase by \$3 billion in income in just four years. Not only that, but study after study shows that an educated workforce is the primary reason why businesses relocate to states and expand current facilities.

Dropouts also have a greater need for government assistance. According to a national study by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, 40 percent of 16-24 year olds lacking a high school diploma received some type of government assistance in 2001. In addition, a dropout is more than eight times as likely to be incarcerated as a high school graduate.

Imagine if we were as committed to scoring high graduation rates as we are points per game.

Forget being No. 1; it's like we don't even make it to a bowl game when it comes to our children.

Children are 27 percent of our state but 100 percent of our future. Yet, we market our college players to win national awards and be top NFL draft picks but consistently let a potential group of All-Americans go without medical care or a quality education.

Come on, Texas. We can do better.



Eagles stalwart defense will be formidable in District 25-2A

Not a team you want to run against.

If you're a District 25-2A coach, you will quickly realize that throwing against the Salado Eagles defense is no picnic either.

As the Eagles enter District 25-2A with a Homecoming game against the 2-1 Academy Bumblebees, they bring with them a front five defensive line that averages more than 220 lbs. per man.

The defense has given up the fewest yards in rushing (160 total) through the first three games of the season. Only Lago Vista is even close at 162 yards rushing given up.

But consider this: Salado gave up these few yards rushing to some powerful teams -- 3A West, and District 21-2A's McGregor Bulldogs (picked to win that district) and Hamilton Bulldogs, who averaged more than 400 yards rushing in their first two games and only managed 115 yards on 45 carries against Salado.

The defense has allowed just 296 yards

passing in the first three non-district games. "Our first two opponents came out to test our secondary," Head Coach Jeff Cheatham said of West, which had 120 yards passing and McGregor, which has had the most success passing against the Eagles with 153 yards.

Linebacker Josh Bush (5'10", 200 lbs) leads the Eagles defense in tack-

les with 40, including 20 tackles against Hamilton. He has registered two quarterback sacks, one quarterback hurry and another tackle for loss.

Patrick Prince (6'1", 205 lbs.) follows Bush closely with 35 tackles through three games.

Defensive tackles Blake Heller (6'4", 250 lbs.) and Dallas Butts (6'3" 275 lbs.) clog up the rushing lanes, along with noseguard Tyler Coker (6'1", 220 lbs.) by registering 16 tackles, 11 tackles and 21 tackles respectively.

Defensive ends Colin Smith (6'0", 190 lbs., 16 tackles, five hurries) and Garret Ward (6'1", 180 lbs., 19 tackles, three hurries, an interception and knocked down pass) and cornerbacks Tyler Wright (5'10, 170 lbs., 18 tackles, four KDPs, two interceptions) and John Cruz (6'0, 170 lbs., 18 tackles, two KDPs, fumble recovery,) contain the outside for the defense.

Free safety Matt Fritsch (5'10, 175 lbs., 39 tackles, six KDPs, and three interceptions) and strong safety Leo Galvan (5'10", 180 lb., 30 tackles) defend against the pass and the open field run.

The Eagles defense has taken away the ball seven times in three games, six of them on interceptions with Fritsch leading the district with three picks, while Wright is close behind with two picks.

Only five times have offensive units been able to score on the Eagles through the first three games. Since facing Salado, those teams have all registered healthy 2-1 records, so the Eagles are facing no push-overs so far this season.

Coach Cheatham doesn't expect that trend to change. "District 25-2A is hard to predict," he said. "All of the teams are well-coached and evenly

Consumer 'What-to-Do' Catastrophe Checklists

Before the Threat of a Catastrophe:

1. Alert police and fire departments to special conditions, such as an invalid who might require emergency evacuation.

2. Prepare an inventory list of personal valuables, household furnishings and equipment so any lost items can be accounted for.

3. Keep your insurance coverage current with rising building replacement costs. Make sure you have enough coverage for the furnishings and other items you've purchased since you first bought insurance. And buy flood insurance if you're eligible and vulnerable. Also, consider excess flood insurance where necessary.

4. Review your insurance policy annually. Are you sure everything important is covered? Keep it in a safe place where it can be retrieved easily after a disaster. Keep a quick-reference list containing your agent's telephone number, all your policy numbers and the respective insurance company names and phone numbers.

5. Know how to shut off your gas, electricity and water and how to board up vulnerable places around the house, such as doors and windows.

6. Plan a family evacuation and relocation strategy.

7. Take photographs or a video of all property and keep it in a safe place easily accessible after a storm.

NOTE: The next three items usually are recommended at the time of a hurricane watch. However, waiting until then is not a

good idea. First, consider the threat of tornados and other sudden catastrophes and, second, when a hurricane approaches, stores may run out of what you need as others make a bee-line to stock up, also.

8. Keep a supply of nonperishable foods and an emergency water supply; have essential drugs and a first-aid kit available. Keep these supplies fresh. Consider the purchase of a gasoline-powered generator.

9. Keep fresh batteries available for transistor radios and flashlights, and an extra supply of fuel for portable grills and stoves.

10. Have available the hammer, nails, tape and boards needed for protecting your residence from a storm or making necessary emergency repairs afterwards.

Consumer Checklist — What To Do After a Catastrophe:

1. Get in contact with your insurance agent as quickly as possible. Let him know about your losses. If you are relocated temporarily, let your agent know your temporary address.

2. Make only those repairs necessary to prevent further damage to your home or business. This must include covering breaks in a roof, walls or windows with plywood, canvas or other waterproof material. Do not have permanent repairs made without first consulting your agent. Unauthorized repairs may not be reimbursed.

3. Wait for an insurance adjuster to arrive to appraise your damage. Following a catastrophe, insurance companies schedule adjusters so that the most serious losses get priority treatment. Those policyholders are the most in need.

4. Keep all receipts for expenditures you've made to repair damage or to estimate the extent of your damage.

5. Prepare a detailed inventory of all damaged or destroyed personal property for the adjuster. Be sure to keep a copy. Your list should be as complete as you can make it and should include: a description of the item (and number, if more than one); date of purchase or approximate age; cost at time of purchase; and estimated replacement cost today.

6. Take photographs of the damaged property before

making any necessary repairs to prevent further damage.

7. Collect cancelled checks, invoices, or other papers that will assist the adjuster in obtaining the value of the destroyed property.

8. If you feel it is necessary, secure a detailed estimate for permanent repairs from a reliable contractor and give it to the adjuster when he arrives. The estimate should contain detailed specifications of the proposed repairs, and detailed repair cost prices and replacement prices.

9. Take photos of the damaged areas. These will help you with the presentation of your claim and will assist the adjuster in his investigation of your claim.

10. Even if home or business furnishings and effects look like "total losses," do not get rid of them until after they have been examined by an adjuster.

11. If your car has been damaged or submerged in a flood, move it to high ground and let it dry out. Do not attempt to start or operate it until it is thoroughly dried.

12. Wooden furniture should be cleaned as quickly as possible. Avoid rubbing in abrasives such as ash, plaster, or wall-board particles which have fallen on furniture surfaces.

13. Your dry cleaning establishment can help you evaluate the cleaning or restoration costs for clothing, furs and draperies.

14. Metal objects, including guns, drapery rods, and the electric motors in home appliances, should be dried and rubbed or sprayed with oil to prevent corrosion. Radios, televisions and other electronic systems should also be dried out, but not oiled.

15. Bedding and upholstered furniture must be dried immediately if saturated with water. Vacuuming will remove some of the odor and grit left by smoke damage, but these items should be separated from other possessions since they may affect nearby items.

16. Antiques, paintings, art objects, silver and brass must be given special care. Dry them with soft cloths, but do not apply oil or rub them. This treatment will mar or otherwise damage hard finishes or surfaces.



"Pursuing Authentic Worship" set for Oct. 12-14 in Temple

Local artist will host painting workshop at Stagecoach Inn

Artist Larry Prellop will host a Seascape Workshop at the Stagecoach Inn in Salado Oct. 22-24.



Antibacterial soap and your child

One thing I try to do in my line of work is to help my clients implement simple lifestyle choices that will help improve the quality and quantity of their lives. One of the most basic things I stress is developing a healthy, if not hardy, immune system. It is clear in America today that the focus is on an unnatural approach, including chemicals and drugs and not a more natural approach of strengthening our immune systems. The entire situation of our nation being reactive, versus proactive, to illness and disease by over-using antibiotics and chemicals is very sad to me; you see the human body is a marvelous creation that can have a more than capable immune system, we just have to strengthen it and then believe in it! This week I promised to discuss the topic of "Your Child and Anti-Bacterial Soaps, Fluoride in Tap Water and Synthetic Vitamins", because of the length of the discussion on Anti-Bacterial Soaps, we will discuss Fluoride and Supplements next week.

Anti-Bacterial Soap: ALERT: THE WORLD ISN'T STERILE! Parents should not be going out of their way trying to create a "Boy in the Plastic Bubble" atmosphere for their child (John Travolta, 1976). Whatever happened to playing in the dirt, or interacting with the earth to help us strengthen our immune systems? Why the bacteria phobia? Parents would be better off having their child just washing their hands with a regular (natural is best) soap than having a chemical laden antibacterial soap in the home. The simple act of applying soap to the hands and rubbing vigorously will cause the cell walls of any bacteria on the hands to be ripped apart by the soap, disintegrating and killing any bacteria present. Instead of getting into a discussion on the chemical make-up of these anti-bacterial soaps I am going to give you a good amount of information on the basics of the importance of washing our hands regularly.

Did you realize that it was just a 150 years ago that doctors used to amputate a limb on a patient in one room and within minutes would deliver a child in the next, without ever washing their hands? Don't believe me, Google search: Dr. Semmelweis. (Hint: Just by implementing the practice of frequent hand washing hospitals saw their mortality rate drop exponentially). Children who wash their hands effectively have fewer visits to the doctor, take fewer antibiotics, need fewer prescription medicines, have fewer illnesses, and miss less school than their counterparts. This has been demonstrated repeatedly. Schools with regular hand washing programs have measurably fewer infections in their students than schools with sporadic hand washing. Schools

without hand washing routines have large amounts of fecal bacteria detectable on classroom floors and carpets. What does it mean to wash effectively? Children (and adults) must be taught to wash their hands at all of the critical moments. These include washing after defecating, after handling diapers, before handling food, before eating, and before feeding children. They must also wash with water and a cleansing agent -- not water alone. Even washing with ashes and water, or soil and water, has been proven to be more effective than washing with water alone.

There have been times in my life that I have trained over 10 "gym" clients a day on average. When you are in that type of environment you learn quickly what needs to be done to keep yourself from constantly getting sick. Because it was clear I was constantly being bombarded with numerous types of bacteria I needed to create and follow a simple plan to stay healthy and vibrant. This

is what I determined was my best line of "acute" protection and/or defense. 1. Between the training of every client I would wash my hands with soap and water. 2. I quit putting my hands to my face, especially the eyes, ears, nose and mouth. 3. I would make sure I received a couple extra hours of sleep whenever possible. During this time of training 45-65 clients (which was taxing my immune system horribly by the way) a week I noticed, like clockwork, that every month I would be a little "off", which is what

I call it when my immune system was having to work hard to fight off "some type of bug." But, I never became ill, NEVER. The moral of the story is this: I cannot tell you the last time I was what you may say "under the weather". A big part of the reason is right here in this article!







The Golden Dream of Carlo Chuchio by Lloyd Alexander: If your kids like the Harry Potters or **Eldest**, they may enjoy this new book by the late Newberry Medalist, Alexander, who also wrote the beloved "**Chronicles of Prydain**," a widely-read series in the history of fantasy. Carlo, an orphan, meets a bookseller who sells him a book with a map to treasure and Carlo takes off on his adventure. Carlo gains wisdom and the capacity to love, thanks to his adventures on the road and what he learns from his fellow travelers.

The Dangerous Book for Boys by Conn and Hal Iggulden: The is the bestselling book for every boy from eight to 80, covering essential boyhood skills such as building tree houses, learning how to fish, finding true north, and even answering the age old questions of what the big deal with girls is. In this digital age there is still a place for knots, skimming stones and identifying spiders. Intentionally old-fashioned and politically incorrect.

Leven Thumps and the Gateway to Foo by Obert Skye: Leven is a teenage Oklahoma orphan, eking out a wretched existence in the misleadingly named Rolling Greens Deluxe Mobile Home Park in Burnt Culvert, Oklahoma. However, this timid 14 year old boy cannot only glimpse into the future, but he can manipulate it. And so his life changes and his destiny is fulfilled as he learns about a secret gateway that bridges two worlds, the real world and Foo, a place created at the beginning of time in the folds of the mind that makes it possible for mankind to dream, hope and imagine. This is a debut novel by Skye and has gotten very good reviews.

The King's Fifth by Scott O'Dell: The late Scott O'Dell received a Newberry Honor for this insightful take on Spanish conquistadors in the New Spain of the 1540's. Their no-holds-barred lust for gold is seen through the eyes of a 15 year old cartographer as he joins in search of the fabled Seven Cities of Cibola. This long out-of-print book is very welcome back.

"*High School Musical*" – the DVD: We have had many requests for this DVD and now it is in. The popular captain of the basketball team and the brainy academic girl break all the rules of East High School society when they secretly audition for leads in the school's musical. As they reach for the stars and follow their dreams, everyone learns about acceptance, teamwork, and being yourself. And it's all set to "gotta-get-up-and-dance" music.

Here are some titles for the adults:

The Art Thief by Noah Charney: In a small Baroque church in Rome, a magnificent Caravaggio altar-piece disappears in the middle of the night. In Paris the curator of the Malevich Society is shocked to discover the disappearance of their greatest treasure—White on White by Kasimir Malevich. In London, at the National Gallery of Modern Art, the museum's latest acquisition is stolen just hours after it was purchased for more than six million pounds. Three thefts are simultaneously investigated in three cities, but these apparently isolated crimes have much more in common than anyone imagines. A dizzying array of forgeries, over-paintings, and double-crosses unfolds as the story races through auction houses, museums, and private galleries.





There's Got To Be Another Way

Contract Bridge

Some deals seem so cut-and-dried to declarer that he scarcely pauses to think before starting to play. This can be a dangerous and costly practice, as evidenced by today's exhibit. After making a pre-emptive two-spade overcall, South wound up in five spades doubled and was delighted by the dummy his partner tabled. Certain he was about to make his contract with an overtrick, he put up the ace of diamonds and led a spade to the ace.

When East showed out on the first spade, declarer suddenly realized he was in deep trouble. He did the best he could by playing the K-Q of spades and conceding a trick to the jack in hopes the defenders would try to cash a heart before taking two diamonds. In that case, he could ruff the heart and dispose of his third diamond on dummy's fifth club.

But West returned the three of diamonds after winning the spade, and East had no trouble diagnosing the situation. Since West had led high-low in diamonds, indicating a doubleton, East knew declarer had started with three cards in the suit. So after taking the second diamond, East played another diamond to set the contract one trick.

South should have recognized at the outset the danger posed by a 4-0 spade division -- certainly a strong possibility on the bidding -- and stopped to consider what he could do to counter that threat. Had he done so, he might have found the solution.

The winning play is simple, but not obvious. All South has to do is refuse to take the first diamond trick! If West started with a doubleton diamond -- a virtual certainty given the bidding and opening lead -- the contract is assured.

Assuming West continues with a diamond, declarer takes the ace and plays four rounds of trump. West wins the fourth spade but cannot return a diamond, and South is home.

These entertaining and educational shows take place at noon and 3 p.m. daily in the Birds of Prey Arena.

Also, SeaWorld's Chris Bellows brings the popular "Amazing Animals" show to the Main Tent twice a day, with shows at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m.

The Casting Kids activity in the Fishing and Aquatic area invites young people ages 7-to-14 to test their flipping, pitching and

casting skills, learn about fishing, conservation and protection of the great outdoors and win prizes. Participants will also have a chance at competing for a quarter of a million dollars in scholarships and prizes to be given away nationwide.



Once on a family trip I put in a new tape from Manny that I had just received. He told about drinking with a buddy of his and the buddy didn't want to ride with Manny because he had too much to drink. On the tape, Manny told about sliding off the highway, turning over and the tape record-

Manny and I get together occasionally now, either in Texas or Minnesota. We still laugh a lot. While in the Army we went to a Boston hotel ballroom where a dance had been scheduled, but was canceled. Feeling good from a few whiskey sours, we pulled a huge American flag from its holder on stage and started marching around with it, humming the stars and stripes forever. We marched out the front door of the hotel with that flag. No one seemed to notice. I still have that flag and Manny has the eagle from atop the flagpole. When we get together, we always have them with us and have our picture made with the eagle and the flag.

Learn how to Rock Out at Salado Silver Spur

The Salado Silver Spur Theatre \$5 FilmFest continues this week with showings of the critically acclaimed "The School of Rock". The showings will be 7:30 p.m. Sept. 27 and 2 p.m. Sept. 30.

These films are open to the public for a \$5 fee and are preceded by a discussion of films by members of the Salado Cinema Society.

"The School of Rock" has a lot going for it, great music, authentic performances but chiefly, it's got gonzo funny guy Jack Black's best role -- and best performance -- as Dewey, zany guitarist for a small-time band that dumps him for being overzealous. (No wonder they're small time.) For rent money, Dewey fakes his way into substitute teaching 10-year-olds at a snobby prep school. Bored by their curriculum, he ignores it. He secretly shapes his sheltered students into a rock band. Their final exam: to kick his ex-mates' butts in a battle of the bands. Forget the "three Rs." Only one R matters in this class, and it's "Rockkkkkk!"

Though the set-up is preposterous and the outcome semi-predictable, the movie works wonders. It skewers rock's bombastic excesses but also

celebrates its history and passions, deftly balancing send-up with homage. There's also a soft spot for kids who are ready to blossom, Fame-style, if they just get the chance. Black preaches rock's glories with evangelical conviction and conspiratorial charm. Aping histrionic heroes from Meat Loaf to AC/DC, he's a defiant champion of music now defined by its dinosaurs, playing clichéd riffs with fierce devotion and leading his unholy crusade with delirious -- if not delusional -- rapture.

As the school's prim principal, Joan Cusack is less a tiresome nemesis than a repressed bureaucrat eager to escape a career treadmill. Beneath her pinstriped veneer beats the heart of a Stevie Nicks fan. Since kids are in the mix, Rock sidesteps sex and drugs, focusing instead on rock's exciting sense of liberation. The kids -- being true musicians -- aren't bad actors, they really play great Rock and Roll, and their punchy theme song is a showstopper.

Their teacher may be a crazed goof, but his enthusiasm is infectious, and in his weird, warped way he makes sense. These kids aren't being educated so much as indoctrinated and liberated. Time to ditch

conformity and rock out! Parents needn't worry. A feel-good film that plays like The Bad News Bears Go to the Fillmore, Rock is more mainstream than anarchist -- which might surprise fans of its director, Richard Linklater, the Austin-based indie auteur known for his edgy Slacker and Dazed and Confused. Yet Linklater strikes just the right power chords here. He respects rock enough to keep it real, and he has enough rein on Black to ground his wildness in warmth while avoiding easy sentiment.

Equally gratified should be loyal oldsters dismayed by rock's submersion in today's culture of pop posers, and uninitiated kids who didn't realize how cool rock could be. But whoever buys a ticket, to paraphrase Dewey -- who in turn steals from AC/DC -- for those about to see School of Rock... we salute you." The \$5FilmFest from the non profit Silver Spur Support Service and Cinema Society continues in the coming weeks with showings scheduled of "Them", "Invaders from Mars", "Bride of Frankenstein" and "Young Frankenstein". 


