



Gault research pushes back date of earliest North Americans

For decades, researchers believed the Western Hemisphere was settled by humans roughly 13,500 years ago, a theory based largely upon the widespread distribution of Clovis artifacts dated to that time. In recent years, though, archaeological evidence has increasingly called into question the idea of “Clovis First.”

Now, a research team led by Thomas Williams from the Department of Anthropology at Texas State University, working at the Gault Site about 12 miles southwest of Salado off of FM 2843 (Florence Rd.), has dated a significant assemblage of stone artifacts to 16-20,000 years of age, pushing back the timeline of the first human inhabitants of North America far before Clovis. Clovis artifacts are distinctive prehistoric stone tools so named because they were initially found near Clovis, New Mexico, in the 1920s but have since been identified throughout North and South America.

The team, which also includes Texas State’s Michael Collins, Nancy Velchoff and Sergio Ayala, published its findings in the online journal Science Advances on July 11 in an article titled “Evidence of an early projectile point technology in North America at the Gault Site, Texas, USA.”

Dr. Collins has spoken in Salado on multiple occasions about the Gault site, as


has Dr. Clark Wernecke, an adjunct professor at Texas State University.

“These projectile points are unique. We haven’t found anything else like them,” Williams said. “Combine that with the ages and the fact that it underlies a Clovis component and the Gault site provides a fantastic opportunity to study the earliest human occupants in the Americas.”

The Gault Site encompasses a valley at the intersection of the Edwards Plateau and Blackland Prairie. It would have had great appeal to early human arrivals because of the reliable springs that provided ample water for both humans and wild game during drought, and high-quality chert (flint) outcroppings were valuable for use in crafting tools and projectile points.

The presence of Clovis technology at the site is well-documented. Excavations below the deposits containing Clovis artifacts revealed well-stratified sediments containing artifacts (Gault Assemblage) distinctly different from Clovis. Using optically stimulated luminescence age estimates, the researchers dated the Gault Assemblage to a range of 16,000-20,000 years ago.

Significantly, the Gault Site excavation provides evidence pushing back earliest human habitation of North America by at least 2,500 years, and identifies a previously unknown, early projectile point technology unrelated to Clovis. Within a wider context, this evidence suggests that Clovis technology spread across an already

well-established, indigenous population.

The Gault Site has proven to be one of the richest archaeological sites in North America as more than 2.6 million artifacts have been found there.

“There is a stone floor there,” Wernecke says. “It is 12,700 years old and there are clues to a structure being built on top of it.”

“That makes it the earliest house in North America,” Dr. Wernecke added.

The Gault site has been known for its artifacts for almost a century. In 1929, the first anthropologists from the University of Texas were able to excavate the site, named after the owner of the property at that time, for about eight weeks.

A burnt-rock midden produced Clovis-era tools two years before the Blackwater

find in New Mexico.

Over the years, the property changed hands several times and fell victim to archaeological looting. In fact, at one point, people could pay just \$10 to dig all the artifacts they would want to dig in a day.

Despite this damage to the original site, there remained an archeological record that may prove that the Americas were populated much earlier than scientists have originally hypothesized.

In 1998, the lower jaw of a juvenile mammoth and ancient horse bones surrounded by a large number of Clovis artifacts were discovered.

Archeologists, Dr. Wernecke said, discovered a great deal of chert, some of

Salado Alumni raising funds to place Veterans’ Memorial

The Salado School Alumni Association’s current project is to erect a Veterans’ Memorial on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center. This entire project has an estimated cost of \$15,000.

“We hope this will be raised by fundraisers and individual donations,” said Alumni Association President Nancy Carter.

The Association took on this project based on recent information coming to light about the story of how Salado students, in the late 1940s, built a “memorial” in memory of six young men from Salado High School who gave their lives for their country in World War II.

The students built a large circle of rocks and planted six crape myrtles inside the circle. Through the years, and during the time the “old red school” (now the Salado Civic Center building) stood abandoned, the story of why the rocks and crape myrtles were there was lost.

“Their memorial was probably removed during renovations to the property,” Carter said. “When our members heard that story, we were moved by what these students had done to honor their classmates. Our Alumni Association agreed to take on the installation of a new veteran’s memorial to recognize, not just our six

young men who lost their lives in World War II, but for all of our veterans.”

Friday 13th was good day for stock markets

Market & Economic Update

The Markets
It may be Friday the 13th but it was a good day for the stock market as the S&P 500 (SPX) ended this fateful Friday up 1.5 percent for the week at 2801.01. That puts the venerable Index up 4.78 percent year-to-date and 13.91 percent from a year ago. It also puts us back above the 2800 line and only about 72 points below the all-time high of January 26. The driver to the gains was corporate earnings. The first two major banks to report, JPMorgan Chase and Citigroup, posted double-digit profit increases for the quarter, mostly driven by the new tax law. Even so, the stock price gains were muted by continued fears of the economic fallout of a major trade war.

Underscoring those fears of future earnings and economic pain, the U.S. 10-year Treasury note continued its long, slow slide in yield, closing the week at 2.831 percent, down from 3.11 percent two months ago. Gold, too, coasted downhill for the week to \$1,241.80 down 10 percent from the \$1,379 per ounce it fetched at the end of January. West Texas Intermediate oil declined 4.52 percent for the week to \$70.58 on Wednesday's news that Libyan oil exports were resuming but it is still up over 50 percent from a year ago, primarily due to the squeeze on Iranian exports. The dollar has remained largely unchanged for the past several weeks.

The Economy

One of our favorite government offices, the Bureau of Labor Statistics ("BLS") reported that the U.S. Consumer Price All-items Index ("CPI") rose 2.9 percent for the 12 months ending in June. This is the largest one-year rise we have seen in about six years. Two major elements contributing to the jump were the rise in energy costs we cited above, and cost of services, a result of the labor shortage. Economists are predicting that the tariffs currently in place could increase inflation by about another 0.6 percent. If the nearly 3 percent inflation we have seen over the past year were to persist, inflation could be running at a 3.5 percent annual rate a year from now.

The effect of that level of inflation is not just that we would be paying more for the same things but that it would serve as an imperative to the Federal Reserve to raise interest rates. While future interest rates are always uncertain, if the Fed were to raise short-term rates to get ahead of or equal to inflation at that level, short-term rates would be nearly a percent higher than

the 10-year rate is today. It is that kind of "inverted" yield curve that has historically preceded recessions by about 18 months.

In a shadowing of things to come, the Import Price Index for June was up 4.3 percent from a year earlier. While the full effects of tariffs have yet to show in final pricing, the rise in the cost of imported items appears to be largely from the already imposed tariffs and can be expected to filter through to the things we buy as consumers in the not-too-distant future. The good news is that export prices were up in June even more with a rise of 5.3 percent for one year. The export rise in both volume and pricing appears to have been a rush to get ahead of foreign retaliatory tariffs.

In spite of the longer-term risk of a recession in or about 2020, the near future looks bright as the ECRI Weekly Leading Index remains near its all-time high at 148.5, an indicator that economic growth should remain strong for at least six months to a year into the future. The University of Michigan Consumer Sentiment Survey dropped to its lowest point in six months with expectations dampened by news of the trade war and rising prices on some consumer goods but is still in positive territory. Consumers, investors, and business owners reported that they have generally gone from thinking that the tariff and trade-war announcements were a negotiating tactic to a growing belief that they are going to take effect and have a negative impact on economic activity.

In another bit of good news, the bank loan default rate continues to decline. That same credit improvement can be seen in the high-yield bond default rate. A year ago, the high-yield default rate was 4 percent while last month it was down to 3.4 percent with an even lower default rate of 2.5 percent predicted for the first quarter of 2019. That forecast reflects a consensus that the U.S. GDP annualized growth will likely come in at or about 4 percent for the second quarter. Double-digit corporate earnings growth and a 4 percent growth rate for the GDP would normally generate a stock market boom but investors realize that this is a one-time jolt of stimulus as the tax cuts show up on balance sheets but a combination of supply constraints, tariffs, and higher interest rates are likely to offset the tax cuts within 24 months.






Draft drawing of Salado Middle School Ground Floor

Don't Cry for Angela Merkel

Angela Merkel is, her supporters like to gloat, the leader of the free world. Just don't ask her to spend as if she is.

Donald Trump has made the German chancellor one of his favorite rhetorical targets, especially over Germany's anemic defense expenditures. This has led to worries about the future of the trans-Atlantic alliance, and reflexive support for Merkel among the American political elite.

Trump shouldn't openly mock Merkel, or suggest that there have been annual dues to NATO that Germany has failed to pay. Trump tends to view foreign countries like contractors trying to scam him in a development deal. This scants history, geo-strategy and the national pride of other countries -- as usual, Trump would benefit from at least a gesture toward statesmanship.

Yet Germany's defense spending, or lack thereof, is a disgrace. One would think the country would have been embarrassed onto a different trajectory after German troops -- Panzerregiment 371, to be exact -- had to use

broomsticks instead of guns in a NATO exercise in 2014. But Germany evidently doesn't embarrass easily. NATO countries, after a long vacation from history after the end of the Cold War, agreed at a summit in Wales in 2014 to spend 2 percent of their gross domestic product on defense annually within 10 years. It is the biggest economy in Europe and fourth largest in the world that is the serious laggard. Germany spends all of 1.2 percent of GDP on defense. As Elisabeth Braw points out in Foreign Policy magazine, its military is short on tents and winter clothes, most of its tanks aren't battle-ready and it has a shortfall of about 20,000 officers and NCOs. It is promising to get to 1.5 percent GDP ... by 2025 (when a Trump second term would be ending).

Merkel is happy to browbeat other EU countries over their fiscal and migrant commitments, but

please don't bother her to spend on her own defense. The old saw is that NATO exists to "keep the Soviet Union out, the Americans in, and the Germans down." But the last item, given the deep streak of pacifism in postwar German politics, is no longer apt. The EU, not military conquest, is now Germany's tool for European influence.

Germany still has a gauzy view of what matters. Its foreign minister has argued that its development aid should count against its goal for military spending, fundamentally confusing soft and hard power.

Needless to say, if Vladimir Putin is tempted to challenge NATO somewhere on its periphery, he's not going to be dissuaded by Germany's foreign-aid budget or its openness to

Middle Eastern migrants.

It's not clear how seriously Germany takes the Russian threat (although it sent some troops to Lithuania last year). Germany has been supportive of the proposed Russian pipeline, Nord Stream 2, that would make Europe more dependent on Russian natural gas and bypass Ukraine. It's Trump, the alleged tool of Putin, who has been complaining bitterly about the project.

With Putin looming to the East, NATO remains a vital tool of Western power. It's not an imposition to ask that Germany act like it.

it engraved in what he described as "the earliest art in the Americas."

The University of Texas was able to secure a three-year lease, during which time more than 1.2 million artifacts were recovered. About half of those artifacts were from the Clovis era.

In fact, about 85 percent of all Clovis-era artifacts that have been recovered in the Americas come from the Gault site.

Volunteers, students and archeologists have carefully made their way through more than 48 cubic meters of the site down to the Comanche Peak bedrock. Wernecke explained that whenever a chert is found, it is carefully noted where exactly it was found. Each piece is highly documented, resulting in a catalog of paleo-Indian America that has not been seen in any other location.

Wernecke explained that one section measuring 10 centimeters in depth and

one meter squared resulted in finding 16,629 flakes..

"If it was larger than a quarter, we know exactly where in the earth it was taken," Wernecke said.

Pieces have been examined at the microscopic level to determine how it was made and how it was used, whether it was for cutting bone, hide, plants or for some other use, according to Wernecke.

"We would like to use our favorite tools out there, which is the trowel," Wernecke said, "except chert comes from the rock in the Edwards Plateau and is stronger than steel. Hand trowels would just leave a big silver and gray scar."

So instead, the carefully scrape away the layers millimeter by millimeter, centimeter by centimeter with chopsticks. "Outside of a prison escape movie," he said, "I have never heard of that much earth moved with such small tools.... the chopsticks."

The patience has yielded rewards as the Gault School is now in the process of analyzing the finds and publishing a book based upon those analyses.

While the excavation work is complete, the Gault School partners with the Bell County Museum and the Williamson County Museum to offer half-day tours of the site once a month.

Gault Archaeological Site Tours leave from the Bell County Museum in Belton. The 2.5 hour tour covers about one mile of gentle terrain. Space is limited to 30 persons. Participants will meet at the site at 8:30 a.m. and the tour will begin at 9 a.m. Maps will be provided one week prior to the scheduled tour date. Fee is \$10 per person, payable to the Gault School. 

Lesser Earless Lizard

Lesser Earless Lizards are oviparous

This column is being written based on the conversation that I had recently with two separate farmers in the Texas Panhandle who had both observed (and one photographed) a species of lizard that they had never witnessed before in their lifetime. Whether this lack of notice was due to them not being observant previously or just the plain innocuousness of just an “ordinary” lizard, I will not even begin to speculate. However, it was clear that both of these gentlemen had observed a very unpretentious lacertian species that is fairly common, and that variety was the Lesser Earless Lizard.

The Lesser Earless Lizard (*Holbrookia maculata*) is one of three species of this genus that occurs in Texas. It can be commonly observed throughout the Panhandle region, the Big Country, the Trans-Pecos, and less frequently along the northern periphery of the Edwards Plateau. Outside of the borders of Texas, it may be spotted northward to South Dakota, westward to southern Arizona, and southward to central Mexico.

The primary habitat that this relatively discreet lizard prefers is arid to semi-arid naturally occurring grasslands. However, most of the native grasslands in this state have been severely overgrazed or completely replaced by agriculture fields of plants like cotton and wheat. It is in these areas where this species has adapted to thrive in spite of the exposed soil with less covering. A less frequented habitat selected is the creosote-strewn gravelly soils of the Trans-Pecos.

The Lesser Earless Lizard is taxonomically divid-

ed into three races within the confines of the state of Texas: the Great Plains Earless Lizard (*H.m.maculata*) which inhabits the entire Texas Panhandle; the Eastern Earless Lizard (*H.m.perspicua*) that resides in the Big Country and western Cross Timbers eco-regions; and the Speckled Earless Lizard (*H.m.approximans*) which can be seen in the Trans-Pecos areas east of the Guadalupe Mountains. Because these three races are almost identical to one another save for a few color discrepancies, there is a considerable amount of discussion among biologists in regards to the taxonomy of this species.

The dorsal coloration of this sexually dimorphic lacertian species depends greatly on the sex. Adult males are typically some shade of light brown while the females are usually reddish. Regardless of the sex, this homely lizard sports 7-8 pairs of darker dorsal spots that are separated by a distinctive light stripe down the center of the back. On some individuals there is a secondary row of obscure blotches along the sides of the body; these spots are divided from the primary blotches by a faint light stripe. Both sexes are decorated with 2 vertical black bars immediately behind the forelegs; these bars are more prominent in the males than in the females. The scales on the back are small and granular in appearance and texture, and as the common name implies, there are no external

ear openings. Males are the larger sex, achieving total lengths of nearly five inches. Unlike many other lizard species, the tail is quite short, usually only 35% of the total length of the lizard.

Lesser Earless Lizards, like other lizard species, are “cold-blooded”, or ectothermic. This means that they do not generate heat from the inside of their body, as mammals and birds do, but rather are dependent on outside sources for heating and cooling. They are active throughout the day from early April to October, and unlike many other reptile species, the high metabolism of this lizard enables it to be observed as they scamper from hiding place to hiding place during the hottest part of the summer afternoons.

This species of lacertian feeds exclusively on insects, particularly ones that fit easily into its small mouth. Moths and flies are apparent favorites, although any small beetles are consumed with great enthusiasm.

The Lesser Earless Lizard is oviparous, which is a fancy way of saying that it lays eggs. After emerging from the winter-long brumation period (reptiles do not hibernate in the true sense of the word), males will search out females to mate. After mating, the female will lay a small clutch of eggs (between two and six, average of four) in moisture retaining soil. After approximately two months of incubation, the 1.5 inch long young replicas of their parents emerge from their underground nest prepared to

fend for and care for themselves. Depending on the summer rainfall amounts, a female may lay anywhere from 2 to 5 clutches of eggs during a 5-month spring/summer span.

Lesser Earless Lizards are common, but not commonly seen. They are adept at quickly running short distances between shaded areas, quickly disappearing into the shadows of small covered areas. It is often found in Prairie Dog towns, and many individuals will utilize the burrows of this rodent for shelter.







at all four hands -- that if you return a low diamond, your side can snatch four diamond


tricks to set the contract. But if you don't return a low diamond at trick three -- perhaps because you were taught not to lead away from a king, or always to return your partner's suit -- declarer finishes with 10 tricks.

Regardless of what you might have been taught, however, the fact is that in this case you must assume West has the ace of diamonds to give yourself any chance of beating the contract.

To assume that South has the ace of diamonds -- or to ignore entirely the question of who has the ace -- and blindly return a heart would be giving up. It is obvious that declarer will score at least nine tricks -- four spades, two hearts (you can't be sure who has the king) and three clubs -- if you play "safe" and return a heart.

It is true that West must have somewhat more strength in diamonds than just four to the ace -- he must have at least the jack with it -- but this is merely an extension of the original assumption.
