## Acclaimed photographer will exhibit, talk Nov. 3-4

Internationally acclaimed still photographer Keith Carter will be in Central Texas Nov. 3-4 to present a lecture in Salado and a gallery tour in Belton. His talk, Gumbo Ya-Ya/Life as Art, will be presented to the Institute for the Humanities in Salado 4-6 p.m. Nov. 4, at the Celebration Center, 216 Royal St.

His photographic exhibition, Ezekiel's Horse, is also now on display at the Bell County Museum in downtown Belton. It is a joint project of the museum, the Public Arts League of Salado and the Institute. The 55 duotone photographs are of horses and riders taken by the artist all over the world, from Connemara, Ireland, to the cave paintings at Lascaux, France, to Peru.

Of this exhibit, Mr. Carter said, "For me, horses are mythic, grand, elegant, companionable, intelligent, and dangerous. They are also mysterious. I confess that it has never been the wildness of horses that has attracted me, but rather their patience in the face of an unnatural domestication."

Carter's presentations are part of the Institute for the Humanities' fall series on the Arts entitled, The Arts: Windows to the Soul. The series is examining the relationship between the arts and humanities.

The Los Angeles Times calls Carter "a poet of the ordinary" and his haunting, enigmatic photographs have been widely exhibited all over the world. Both private and public collectors, treasure his prints and they are part of numerous permanent collections, including the Art Institute of Chicago, the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art,

and the George Eastman House, among others. The Wittliff Gallery at Texas State University houses his major collection. Nine books of his works have been published.

In addition to his photographic work, Carter teaches at Lamar University in Beaumont, where he holds the endowed Walles Chair of Art. He also conducts photography workshops around the country for amateurs and professionals alike.

Carter has received two National Endowment for the Arts Regional Survey Grants and the Lange-Taylor Prize from the Center for Documentary Studies at Duke University. In 1998, he received Lamar University's highest teaching honor, the University Professor Award, and was named the Lamar University Distinguished Lecturer the following year. He has also been the subject of an arts profile on the national television news program, CBS Sunday Morning.

Carter is deeply connected to the region where he has lived since he was

five years old and enamored of the eccentricities East Texas. He has made this part of the world the focus of his work throughout his career.

His subjects tend to be children and animals, or more broadly, Southern mystique in general. Carter's characteristic style is marked by a handful of hallmark elements, including a shallow depth of field that renders the majority of a picture out of focus.

Some of the events in this lecture series are only available to members of the Institute for the Humanities and their guests. ## Local woman killed when hit by truck on Main St.

Salado Police Department officers responded to a major accident in the 400 block of North Main St. Salado.

The responding officer arrived at the scene at 7:13 p.m. and noted the victim, an 81-year-old female who was killed when she was struck by a 2003 Ford F-250 pickup truck.

The victim has been identified as Fern Vickrey, of Salado.

Preliminary information shows that the victim was walking from the east side of the roadway to the west. She was wearing dark-colored clothing and the driver of the pickup truck, a 78-year-old male, stated that he never saw

her until he made contact.

The driver sustained no injuries, but was taken to the hospital for observation after the accident.

No charges have been filed against the driver. The case will be screened by the Bell County District Attorney's office.

The name of the driver has not been released yet.

## Early voting turnout is low in amendment, local option

Voters have responded to 16 proposed amendments to the Texas constitution and a local-option proposal with a yawn during early voting.

Only 379 voters had cast ballots in early voting through Oct. 29. Early voting ends Nov. 2. Election day voting will be Nov. 6.

Voters will decide on 16 proposed amendments to the Texas constitution during a Nov. 6 election. Salado voters will also decide whether grocery and convenience stores can sell beer and wine for off-premise consumption.

Early voting continues in several locations throughout Bell County: the Temple County Annex, the Belton County Annex, the Harker Heights Park and Recreation Center, the Killeen Community Center and the Salado Civic Center.

The remaining early voting will be 7 a.m.-7 p.m. through Nov. 2.

Election day, voters can cast their ballots 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Nov. 6. Election day voting for Salado will be conducted in-person at the Salado Church of Christ

Activity Center on Church St.

### A Dispiriting GOP '08 Race

Is this it? That's the question that hangs over the Republican presidential field, and the answer is, "Yes, this is it -- no shining conservative on a white horse, no new Ronald Reagan, is arriving to remake this race."

Newt Gingrich is not getting in, and apparently had no serious intention of getting in. Fred Thompson is in and has proved to be another flawed candidate in a field full of them. Someone has to win this race, but it's easier to find reasons why each candidate will lose rather than prevail.

Mitt Romney and Rudy Giuliani are doing best in the early state and national polls. The former Massachusetts governor and New York City mayor have been engaged in fierce arguments over the conservative purity of their records on immigration and fiscal issues in which the winner can only be "none of the above." Past purity is the hallmark of neither man, both of whom were elected as moderate-to-liberal Republicans in liberal areas that would abide no other kind.

It's the uncomfortable fit both men make as standard-bearer of a conservative party that helped create the opening for Thompson, but the former Tennessee senator is still acclimating to the race, and at this rate will be fully prepared and ready to run in the spring of next year, when the race will probably have been decided.

That leaves, among the plausible contenders, John McCain. His campaign crashed a few months ago because of his support for an amnesty for illegal immigrants, but an ember still burns amidst the wreckage because McCain is more authentic than Romney, more conservative than Giuliani and more vibrant than Thompson.

Once it seemed that the race would boil down to McCain, as the front-running candidate distrusted by conservatives,

and an alternative candidate to his right. Now, Giuliani has supplanted McCain in that top position. Pound for pound, Giuliani might be the most talented political horseflesh in the field, an excellent debater and proven leader. He'll need all that talent -- and probably more -- to overcome positions on cultural issues that are badly out of step with the GOP and a personal life as mayor that made Bill Clinton's look discreet.

Romney, Thompson and McCain are all grappling to be the alternative to Giuliani, with underfunded former Arkansas Gov. Mike Huckabee playing the spoiler. Romney is so eager to fight with Giuliani because it gives him pride of place in this anti-Giuliani competition.

If only the grounds on which he is fighting him weren't so dispiritingly backward-looking. He chose to rap Giuliani in the latest debate regarding the New Yorker's opposition to the line-item veto in the 1990s. The line-item veto was a fresh idea in 1980, but its relevance today is close to nil.

It's as if the candidates have not noticed they are facing a likely Democratic candidate, in Hillary Clinton, whose favorable ratings are inching upward toward 50 percent, and a Democratic Party with large leads in the polls on almost all the issues and an enormous advantage on fundraising. Gotcha games, conservative bromides and ritualistic invocations of Reagan aren't what the moment calls for. But, for the most part, it's what Republicans are getting.

Yes, alas, this is it.

### BUSH ON OFFENSE

**concluded and less wantonly undertaken."**

Will pointed out that a Democrat (of all species) is trying to pass a \$150 billion war surtax (up to 15 percent on all incomes) to pay Iraq-Afghanistan war-generated bills on a current basis - as Adam Smith suggested over two hundred years ago.

**Wisconsin Demo David Obey is promoting the surtax idea to pay for the war without increasing our nation's debt.**

He's also Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee and is making plenty of waves with his war-tax legislation.

# Don't believe Prop 15's hype Better ways for cancer treatment

As one whose wife died of cancer, I might at first blush appear surprisingly to be the grinch who stole Christmas. But it would be intellectually remiss not to reveal the shortcomings and alternatives to Proposition 15, on the ballot November 6.

Texans will be asked to authorize the state (that is, taxpayers) to issue \$300 million a year for 10 years (\$3 billion) for research on the causes and cures for cancer. Actually, the cost would be \$4.6 billion, with \$1.6 billion added for interest on the bonds.

It is a humane cause, but voters need more information. Here are five points you probably won't hear from Proposition 15's well-intentioned supporters.

One. The average cost of getting a cancer drug through the FDA's clearance process is now \$1.4 billion, roughly \$700 million for Research and Development and \$700 million for clinical trials. And it takes an average of eight years for a drug to gain approval through the FDA's Phases 1, 2, and 3 of clinical trials. Were the full \$3 billion given tomorrow to Proposition 15's newly proposed Cancer Prevention and Research Institute, the bond issue could fund only two drugs that would take nearly a decade for market approval. And they'd better both work, without a flaw or hitch.

Meanwhile, pharmaceutical companies are spending multiple billions of dollars each year on researching, testing, and providing cancer drugs.

Two. Just what would the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute spend money on? What types of cancer, what types of treatment? What types of researchers? Are taxpayers expected to provide an irrevocable, blank check for \$3 billion in good faith only?

Three. As Richard Epstein, Professor of Law at the University of Chicago and author of the recent book *Overdose: How Excessive Government Regulation Stifles Pharmaceutical Innovation*, urges, the FDA needs "to relax the rules on [drug] entry, not subsidize research, under the current system." There are many investigational drugs in clinical trials that the FDA has found both safe and effective enough to continue testing on human beings. Earlier access to these drugs would extend the lives of tens of thou-

sands of terminal cancer victims yearly.

My own wife received such an investigational drug, which extended her life by seven months and, more important, ridded her entirely of torturous, morphine-treated pain. Then, rather than relax the rules for such a safe and effective drug for many, the FDA took the drug off the market.

Four. Since Texas's Cancer Prevention and Research Institute would share its research advances ubiquitously with the other 49 states, the local Texas subsidies, notes Epstein, "would provide the greatest net benefit to cancer patients outside Texas, not those within it." It would therefore make greater sense to establish a national movement at the National Institutes of Health. All states share in the benefits, so let all states in some way help pay for them. "The liberalization of [FDA] approval rules," notes Epstein, "has the real advantage of stimulating research everywhere."

Five. Texans would gain more research advantages and faster not by giving local subsidies to a cancer institute, but by proactively working to encourage passage of the ACCESS Act in Congress.


This Act (Senate Bill 1956 and House Resolution 6303) would permit earlier access to promising investigational drugs that the FDA has found both safe and effective enough to continue testing on patients. The decision to use these drugs would remain between the oncologist and patient informed about possible risks. In an age of Vioxx fear and demand for drug safety, the FDA would still retain significant control and record-keeping under this Act.

Texans are a generous, compassionate people. But our compassion cannot be measured by government debt and new tax burdens, it must be examined in the light of impact. Sadly, Proposition 15's most notable impact will be the expenditure of \$4.6 billion that could have been used more effectively and efficiently in private hands.

## Prop. 15 is right medicine to help us cure cancer

We all have the face of someone in mind when people talk about cancer. Someone who is no longer with us. Someone in treatment. Someone who survived.

Cancer is one of our most formidable enemies. It is the number one cause of death for Americans under the age of 85 and claims the lives of more than 37,000 Texans every year.

It is largely out of our control if cancer strikes, who it strikes and where. We can commit to an exercise regime, champion our friends not to smoke and teach our children to eat their vegetables. But we do not know what causes some cancers or who they will victimize, and while cancer treatments continue to advance there is no cure.

With such a great Goliath before us, the questions remain: When will there be a cure? And who has the grit to get us there?

Texans have an opportunity to answer these questions on November 6th. We can choose to take up the gauntlet and slay this giant by making a decade-long commitment to infuse cancer research with \$3 billion. We can choose to provide cancer research with \$300 million annually at a critical point when cancer research continues to make medical leaps towards targeted treatments, but the federal government is ratcheting down funds for cancer research.

There are 400,000 can-

cer survivors in Texas right now, and approximately 95,000 more Texans will hear the dreaded words "you have cancer" this year. We believe passing Proposition 15 will inspire doctors, patients, and their families to persevere in their fight, knowing that there is a renewed effort underway to find a cure.

While scientists have made many advances in their understanding of cancer, there is still much we don't know. We cannot pinpoint a single cause. We do not know why normal cells that divide and grow in an orderly fashion morph into cancerous cells that grow out of control to ravage the human body.

We believe that three billion dollars will help produce answers that ultimately save lives.

Perhaps those dollars will lead to the discovery of a single cure for cancer or maybe they will lead researchers to discover new therapeutic approaches that specifically target different kinds of cancer.

Building on the successes of mainstay, broad spectrum cancer treatments like chemotherapy and radiation, researchers are exploring more treatments that target the cancerous region, instead of the entire body. Other cutting-edge research is delving into new arenas like light therapy, nanotechnology and gene therapy. Providing more money to these efforts can deliver more treatment options.

With \$300 million in annual cancer-fighting funding, we can broaden the front in our war on cancer to include more rare strains of the disease

while deepening our investment in cures for the most common types.

In addition to accelerating existing research efforts, new funds will also attract the world's leading medical minds to our state. This research capital will increase the collaborative efforts among our state's universities and medical centers. The six-major university systems in Texas will help screen the research applications that seek these state funds.

If the people of Texas approve this constitutional amendment, they will double funding for cancer research in our state. Proposition 15 will create the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas, which will be authorized to issue \$3 billion in general obligation bonds to fund cancer research, clinical trials, and laboratory facility construction throughout Texas.

One cannot put a price tag on the value of a human life, but Texas voters can commit to a decade-long investment in cancer research. We believe more research will lead to more answers, more cures and, ultimately, saving more lives.

Cancer is a personal burden with a public solution. Like thousands of cancer survivors, in the face of this dark enemy we can choose not to bow down, retreat or despair. We can research, build our medicinal weapons and find cures. On November 6th, Texans have opportunity to strike a blow against cancer by voting yes on Proposition 15.

## War on terrorists gets goofier



# Do you have the right beneficiaries for your IRA?

Do you invest in either a traditional or Roth IRA? If so, you're making a smart move, because an IRA offers you a tax-advantaged way to save money for retirement. And of course, you want to save as much as you can, because you could spend two or even three decades as a retiree. But if you don't use all your IRA funds, what will happen to them? If the beneficiary is a young person, the distributions can then be "stretched out" over a long period, which can help enhance the potential tax-deferred growth of your IRA assets.

You can name a trust as a beneficiary. You don't have to name a human being as your IRA beneficiary - you can name a trust, which is a legal arrangement giving you

great control over how, and when, the IRA assets will be distributed. By designating a trust as beneficiary, you can accomplish any of several goals. For example, if you have remarried, a trust can provide a lifetime income stream to your current spouse, with the remaining assets ultimately passing to your children from an earlier marriage. A trust can also let you decide when your children or grandchildren can receive the assets in your IRA, and how much they can get at any one time. In addition, a trust can enable you to make charitable gifts while gaining tax benefits. (To create a trust, which can be a complex instrument, you'll need to consult with your legal advisor.)

You can name multiple beneficiaries. If you'd like to split your IRA among several children, you can name them all as beneficiaries. Once you die, the life expectancy of the oldest beneficiary generally will be used to determine the payout period for all the beneficiaries. However, each beneficiary can choose to create his or her own IRA, called an "inherited IRA," as long as all these separate accounts are established by December 31 of the year following your death. The inherited IRA owners can then take distributions based on their individual life expectancies.

Your financial and legal advisors can assist you in choosing appropriate IRA beneficiary designations. Take the time to choose wisely. After all, you've worked hard for many years to build your IRA, so you'll want to make sure it ends up in the right hands at the right times.

President Ronald Reagan once defined a taxpayer as "someone who works for the government but doesn't have to take the civil service exam." Sadly, there's some truth to his statement. The average American works from the beginning of the year until April 30th just to pay his tax bill. The rest of the year, he works for himself. As prices rise on everything from food products to gasoline to health care, families should be allowed to keep more of their hard-earned income. But Congress may be about to burden American families with thousands of dollars in new taxes.

In 2001 and 2003, I helped pass historic reductions to death taxes, capital gains, small business and income taxes. This sweeping tax relief benefited millions of Ameri-

can families and small businesses. An increase in the child tax credit from \$600 to \$1,000 per child has helped families whose budgets are often pinched. And I am proud to have championed a significant reduction of the marriage penalty by doubling the standard deduction. Lower tax rates for individuals and small businesses have spurred growth and stimulated our economy to reach new heights. In fact, we have created more than 8.1 million new American jobs since the cuts took effect—more than all other major industrialized countries combined—through 49 consecutive months of

job growth and nearly six years of uninterrupted economic expansion.

Rather than make these successful cuts permanent, the new majority in Congress plans to introduce a trillion dollar tax package that could overwhelm middle class families and stifle business growth. If the current pro-growth tax rates are not extended, more than 90 million households nationwide will face immediate income tax hikes. 115 million Americans will pay higher taxes in some form, and the projected annual income tax increase would be an average of \$2,755 per Texan.

Additionally, Congress must take immediate action to repair the Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT). In truth, for many families the AMT is not really an alternative nor a minimum. Congress established the tax in 1969, responding to reports that 155 wealthy households used loopholes to avoid paying any income taxes at all. It set a high income level above which taxpayers were required to pay a set percentage in taxes, rather than filing a traditional tax return. The income threshold has remained largely unchanged since enacted, and has not been appropriately adjusted for inflation.

The AMT may have applied to a few hundred rich household in the 1960's, but due to our economic growth in the last 40 years and generally higher incomes, it now traps millions of American families. It has crept down from the mansions of 1969 to today's suburban middle class homes. If Congress fails to adjust the AMT for inflation for tax year 2007, a family of four earning \$60,000 a year could be hit with nearly \$2000 in new taxes. In all, 23 to 26 million Americans could suddenly find themselves taxed at the same rate as the super rich. They could even be hit with penalties and interest for underpaying their estimated taxes.

The continued prosperity of our nation depends on the sound policies that we have employed over the last six years. Saddling Texas families and businesses with new taxes would have sharply negative effects on your family budget and our entire economy, and we can afford neither. As your Senator, I will continue to work to ensure low, fair taxes that help Texas families keep more of what they earn.

# Eagles face Buffs, who fight to remain in hunt of play-offs

Salado (8-0, 5-0) secured a play-off spot on Oct. 26 with its 35-21 win over the Troy Trojans (6-2, 4-1). Meanwhile, the Florence Buffaloes, after winning the first two weeks of district, are hanging on to the slim hope of a play-off spot with a 4-4 mark, 2-3 in district.

So when the Eagles host the Buffs at 7:30 p.m. Nov. 2, both teams will have something to fight for: for the Buffs, it is their chance at squeezing into the playoffs.

For the #7 Salado Eagles, it is to get one step closer to a perfect regular season. Salado is as close as the Eagles have been to such a mark in more than two decades.

Salado brings the top-ranked offense and the top-ranked defense in District 25AA into the game, while Florence has the second-ranked defense, having coughed up 1,704 yards.

The Eagles have put up an average of 363.3 yards offense per game. Last week, in a shoot-out with the Troy Trojans, Salado put up almost 500 yards total offense, with 247 yards in the air and 223 yards on the ground with no single back carrying for more than 100 yards.

In fact, seven Eagles carried the ball for Salado in the Troy game. Meanwhile, Rosenau threw passes to six different receivers in the game.

The Eagles defense will continue to be stingy, although they gave up almost 300 yards last week, which is almost double their average per game allowance. For the season, the Eagles have allowed just 179.9 yards offense per game. The majority of those yards have come through the air, as Salado opponents have thrown for 1,037 yards in eight games.

The Eagles have the toughest defense to run against, allowing just 402 yards on the ground through eight games.

Florence, coming out of a spread offense, runs the ball a lot. Thus far, the Buffs have run up 1,338 yards, while passing for just 711 yards.

The Buffs spread the ball among several runners, but quarterback Blake Brimer leads the team with 645 yards on 114 carries. He has also thrown 114 times with 711 yards and two touchdowns.

## Salado's Rosenau wins battle of quarterbacks

# "Rose" leads Eagles past Troy

Give this one to Rose, as the senior Salado quarterback David Rosenau is called.

Rosenau -- in a contest of the two top-ranked teams in District 25AA and a battle of two of the best quarterbacks in the district -- threw the ball for 247 yards and ran for another 49 yards to lead the undefeated Salado Eagles to a 35-21 crucial win over the Troy Trojans Oct. 26. Rosenau ran for one touchdown and threw two touchdown passes on the night

It truly was a battle of the quarterbacks as Troy senior quarterback Jacob McMurtry tested the Salado Eagles secondary, throwing the ball 44 times with 16 completions and 249 yards,

Completely abandoning any pretext of a balanced offense, the Trojans went to the air again and again, as McMurtry's offensive line gave him enough time to loft bomb after bomb, testing Tyler Wright, Matt Fritsch, John Cruz, Jerod Lutz and Garret Ward in the Eagles secondary.

With Dallas Butts sidelined due to injury, the Eagles defensive line had a hard time getting to the 6'5" senior quarterback from Troy, rushing four and trying to cover McMurtry's plethora of pos-

ing a 46-yard pass from Rosenau to Matt Fritsch to bring the ball to the Trojan five yard line. From there, Leo Galvan bulled the ball in on two runs, the touch-down being a two yard run at 11:52 in the game. Galvan kicked the extra point to make the 28-14.

McMurtry continued to throw the ball deep, as Salado defenders gave coverage on four straight deep passes before John Cruz intercepted a deep pass at the Salado 19 yard line. The Eagles could not move the ball and were forced to punt from their own 24 yard line. A low snap to punter Garret Ward resulted in a partially blocked punt that went less than 20 yards. Troy's Josh Fredrick caught the punt on the bounce and ran it back to the Salado 24 yard line.

On first down, McMurtry hit Lesikar for his second touchdown catch of the night. The extra point brought the score back to a one-touchdown game of 21-28 with 9:21 left to play.

Salado took the ensuing onsidies kick and a five yard penalty against Troy for excellent field position at the Trojan 47 yard line. The Eagles lined up at the Troy 15 and Rosenau kept the ball on a quarterback draw, but fumbled at the five yard line, where Justin Gregory fell on it for the Trojans.

Three straight incomplete passes left the Trojans punting from deep in their own territory. Fritsch made a fair catch for the Eagles at the Troy 33 yard line with 6:05 remaining in the game and a tenuous 28-21 lead.

Three plays later, on a third down and 10, Rosenau hit Clayton Whitmire for a 33-yard touchdown pass. The extra point gave the Eagles the final score of 35-21.

Salado led throughout the game, scoring on the second play from the line of scrimmage. Jerod Lutz took a hand-off on a sweep, getting a good downfield block by Collins, and ran 54 yards for a touchdown with 11:05 in the first quarter. The PAT was blocked, giving Salado an early 6-0 lead.



Ask Chad Cassidy about his heroism in the face of insurgent gunfire, dragging two of his fellow Marines to safety, and he will deflect the spotlight by saying he was just acting as any Marine would.

But ask his parents, Joe and Marty Cassidy, of Salado, and you will get a different answer altogether.

"He's an action figure," Cassidy said of his son, who enlisted in the Marine infantry in 2001 rather than entering in the officers' ranks with his master's degree from Southwest Texas State University.

Cassidy was presented with the Silver Star medal for valor, the third-highest medal for bravery in combat, at Camp Pendleton on Oct. 18. Marines who served with Cassidy in his Two-Five platoon were at the ceremony, as well as his parents.

Cassidy was awarded the medal for his actions in late 2004 in Fallouja, Iraq. A sniper, Sgt. Cassidy was caught in the streets of Fallouja between explosions of enemy mortars. Snared in this bracket of explosions, Cassidy suffered a collapsed lung, lacerated liver and kidneys and an injured leg from the shrapnel from the third mortar explosion

that threw Cassidy into a nearby courtyard.

Regardless, he went back into the street and dragged two wounded Marines to safety while gunfire from insurgents pelted the streets.

Now a Second Lieutenant, Cassidy was awarded the medal when he returned from deployment to Iraq, his third in the region.

Following his second deployment, Cassidy graduated from officer candi-

dates' school, and joined the Second Battalion, Fifth Regiment of the Marines, which just completed a seven-month deployment.

For his deployments to Baghdad in 2003 and Fallouja in 2004, Cassidy was attached to the Third Battalion, First Marine Regiment.

His fellow Marines pay him the highest compliment when they say he is a "lead from the front" type of commander.

## Heavily treed lot makes Mill Creek house a hideaway: home on tour

Discovering a beautiful, country-size treed lot within the city limits can be a remarkable find these days. Colonel and Mrs. Joe McKethan, in 2006, were fortunate to purchase a home on such land that fit both their desires- his for the country and hers for the city.

The home at 701 Indian Trail will be one of six private homes and three public buildings open during the annual Tour of Homes sponsored by the Salado Historic Society Nov. 30-Dec. 2, a popular feature of the Salado Christmas Stroll.

When Colonel McKethan retired from the Air Force, he and his wife returned to their roots in Waco for Mrs. McKethan to care for her ailing mother. When family obligations no longer prevented them from moving, they chose the village of Salado- a frequent shopping stop on their many trips down I-35 to visit a daughter in Austin.

"We always stopped for a quick peek in the shops," stated Mrs. McKethan, "and always remarked on how lovely the town was. So when trying to decide where Joe and I wanted to live, Salado was the only town we could agree on. We found the house, made an offer, and then returned home to put the Waco home on the market. Five weeks later we had two closings scheduled and have never looked back."

The two-story white brick home is situated on a tree-covered lot that many of the local deer seem to consider their private reserve. One baby deer was even born at the foot of the stone deck on the rear of the house much to the homeowners' delight.

"The house was not at all what we had envisioned when we began house-hunting. We wanted a Texas look a limestone, single story home with a wide front porch. This house is two-story, white brick, modern and smaller than we wanted. But the lot is what sold us on the property. I often say we just bought an expensive deer-blind. We really enjoy watching the variety of wildlife," stated Colo-

The treed lot does welcome the visitor. The McKethans have taken out many of the scrub cedars and fallen deadwood and have had work done on the weather creek that runs through the property. A long driveway leads to the partially secluded home.

Christmas is the McKethans' favorite time of year and they decorate every room in the house. "We usually have an informal tree in the dining room that features a miscellaneous collection of decorations gathered through the years as we traveled around the world. The more formal tree in the living room primarily features our collection of Christopher Radko ornaments. Since we now have an affinity for deer, we have added deer ornamentation to that tree as well," said Mrs. McKethan. Throughout the home are antiques collected by the couple during their time in England and an eclectic collection of artwork ranging from a signed colored lithograph by Salvador Dali and works by French watercolorist Huchet to a 16th century court portrait of King James II of England.

The kitchen offers a setting for the McKethans' collection of wooden Santas displayed above the cabinetry. The upstairs of the home has a computer room which is decorated with lighted village scenes. The guest bedroom offers

s small tree dedicated to Noah's Ark figurines and the master bathroom features a small tree with dainty shoe decorations- mostly replicas of shoes displayed in the New York Museum of Modern Art.

The exterior of the home focuses on the large rock deck that offers a view to the treed landscape... and the deer. "We love to have potted urns overflowing with flowers sitting around the deck and patio, but they don't last long with the deer around. The four-legged visitors sometimes venture onto the patio to eat what they choose- even those shrubs and flowers that are supposedly deer resistant," laughed Mrs. McKethan. "They seem to have a mind of their own. We have on rather large doe my younger daughter named "Terrorist Deer" as the animal has no fear- she will come right up to the deck, hang her head over

the Deck, stand nose to nose with one of the pups, and snort.

Other houses on the tour are Terry and Linda Weaver, Shepherd's Glen; John and Shirley Lett, 3213 Chisholm Trail; Joe and Dottie Oliver, 615 Quail Hollow; Sam and Dalena Kanouse, 2513 Hester Way; and Rod and Sheryl Russell, 1005 Center Circle.







# Difference between a diet and a regimen

In the next four weeks we will be taking a look at some of the more popular diets and the books that accompany them. We will be delving into a number of books that you may have read and some programs that you may have tried to follow at one point or another in the past.

I personally like the word "regimen" over "diet" as the word diet quickly paints a picture in our mind of "restriction and deprivation", as well as possibly a feeling of "desperation and failure". So when we take a look at these best-selling books promoting all sorts of diets and programs, we will be focusing on developing two things: 1) a new nutritional regimen that we can implement into any lifestyle and 2) concepts that will help us separate fact from fiction. My goal for each of you is to help you develop a newfound approach creating new habits that will only impact your well-being positively.

Here is Progressive Wellness Services five concepts on "diets" or nutritional "regimens":

1. All nutritional regimens should focus on HEALTH first, FITNESS second and AESTHETICS last. I find it disturbing that America is focused on the "size" of the gut instead of the "health" of the gut.

2. All nutritional regimens MUST not only be "attainable" but "sustainable". Programs that focus on only one macronutrient, like say carbohydrates or protein, or rely on deprivation may be attainable short-term, but most likely will not be sustainable long-term.

3. A nutritional regimen cannot be of the "cookie-cutter" or "one-size-fits-all" variety! Each of us has our very own biochemical individuality. It IS true that one specific nutritional regimen may make YOU healthy and give you the ability to become fit as well as drop unwanted body-fat, but do nothing for your child and actually makes your spouse fat and diseased.

3. Focusing primarily on the Law of Thermodynamics while dieting can cause more damage than good. If your primary focus is on caloric consumption you didn't make it past concept number one and you will find yourself failing to reach the goals of improved health and fitness. Concerning food, there are three things that are more important than the quantity of food you consume daily: A. The quality of food that you are consuming, B. the combinations

of carbohydrates, proteins and fats you consume at each meal and snack, and C. the frequency of meals consumed throughout the day.

4. A person consuming the proper daily regimen of food will experience an improved energy, mood and mental clarity, fullness and satisfaction will increase and once healthy, body-fat will decrease. Remember the initial focus here is well-being not weight-loss, so once your regimen begins to improve your health you will begin to receive all the benefits that come with proper nutrition, including a healthy emotional and mental well-being. Food should be viewed as a drug, if this drug is used properly you can expect excellent if not amazing results but if you use this drug improperly you can expect poor if not painful results.

5. The nutritional regimen MUST have worked

in other societies. It is clear that America is trying to reinvent the wheel concerning promoting proper food intake with fad-diets, convenience and specialized non-foods as well as an abundance of wide-ranging supplements. Other than corporate profits I am not sure why, as there are dozens of cultures throughout history that have proven that by just eating foods indigenous to their tribe that it is possible for humans to live into their hundreds

with vitality and no sign of disease, including dental caries, cancer and cardiovascular challenges. This reinventing the wheel approach has just left us relying on drugs and procedures while a healthy regimen of food could have, and has, prevented the majority of America's health challenges!

I can't tell you how many times I have heard, "I know how to eat, I just need to know how to exercise and drop this weight". This statement is sad as it never LOOKS like these people know how to eat. So in all truth, they don't know how to eat! Unfortun-





# Markers to be dedicated

A visit to the Old Salado Grave Yard, located in the center of Salado Cemetery, shows the grave sites of a number of men and women who came to Texas during the days of the Republic of Texas or shortly thereafter and who contributed greatly to the founding and growth of Salado, Bell County, and the State of Texas. These individuals have been designated as "Salado's Heroes." Each individual or couple has made a unique contribution to our history.

Students from area schools have studied about them, visited their graves, and written papers on their impressions of the lives of these men and their wives. To assist in learning more about these early pioneers, Volumes I and II of The Story of Bell County and a copy of Tyler's History of Bell County have been placed in the Salado Intermediate School Library for students to access. Stories about all of these early settlers can be found in these valuable reference books.

The Salado's Heroes' Project is a joint endeavor of Friends of Salado Cemetery Association and the Salado Historical Society. It is an on-going project of historical research and preservation and is concerned with securing Texas State Historical Commission Subject Markers to be placed at the grave sites honoring these pioneer residents. This project will play an important role in preserving and promoting the rich heritage enjoyed by the Village of Salado and the part which these heroes and their descendents have played in the growth and development of the Village of Salado, of Bell County and of the great State of Texas.

The Salado Historical Society and Friends of the Salado Cemetery Association will dedicate Texas

historical markers at the gravesides of two of the Salado Heroes. The marker dedication will be at 9 a.m. on Nov. 10 in the Old Salado Graveyard, where markers will be unveiled at the graves of Col. Hermon Aiken and Mrs. Margaret Aiken and Captain Milton Wesley Damron and Mrs. Sarah Pennington Damron.

**Col. Hermon Aiken and Mrs. Margaret Aiken**

Hermon Aiken came to the Republic in the 1830's and was a patriot during the Texas Revolutionary War. He was Captain of a ship which brought arms, ammunition, immigrants and supplies from New Orleans to the Texas Army. After the war he settled in Harris County and began a prosperous trade business. Later he served in the United States Army during the Mexican War. Additionally, Aiken served as a volunteer Ranger fighting Indians on the Texas frontier.

The Aikens later migrated to Bell County first settling on Cedar Creek where the Village of Aiken was established and later moved to the Elm Creek area west of what is today the location of Troy. They raised a large family of twelve children. Later they moved to the Village of Salado and played an active role in the development of Salado and Bell County. Col. Aiken was a surveyor for the Milam Land District and did survey work in what later became Falls, Coryell, and McLennan Counties. He surveyed the land donated for the building of Salado College and creation of the Village of Salado. He was one of the founders of Salado College and served on the first Board of Trustees. Hermon died in 1860 and Margaret died in 1877. Both are buried in the family plot in the Old Salado Grave Yard. A citizen of the Republic of Texas Marker has been placed at the grave site by

members of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas.

**Captain Milton Wesley Damron and Mrs. Sarah Pennington Damron**

Milton Damron was born on May 10, 1824 in Weekly County, Tennessee and Sarah was born on April 30, 1832 in Missouri. The Damron and Pennington families joined the Mercer Colony in Missouri and came to the Republic of Texas in 1844 settling first near the Trinity River in Henderson and Ellis Counties and later migrating to the Bell County area.

Milton was born May 10, 1824 in Weekly County, Tennessee. Sarah was born April 30, 1832 in Missouri. Milton and Sarah were married in Travis County in 1846. Three daughters were born to the union. The couple first settled on the Lampasas River near Comanche Gap later moving to the Little River near Three Forks. Later the couple moved to Salado so their daughters could be educated at Salado College.

Milton was the first Tax Assessor-Collector after Bell County was organized in 1850. He was a member of the first Grand Jury in Bell County. Additionally he served as a Ranger protecting the settlers from the Indians and was a member of the Independent Blues. When the Civil War broke out, Captain Damron raised a Cavalry Company which later became a part of the Confederate Army.

Following the war he again became active in the community and served as a State Legislator for Bell County.

Milton Damron died April 28, 1887 and Sarah died September 23, 1876. The couple is buried in the family plot in Old Salado Grave Yard. A Citizen of the Republic of Texas Marker has been placed there by members of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas.

He wrote the book in part as a sort of love letter to the Brazos River at a time when he thought it was going to be flooded by the Army Corps of Engineers. In November 1957, he put his canoe in the Brazos up near Possum Kingdom Reservoir and paddled it 175 miles. Like Kerouac's *On the Road*, he too sought to understand what was happening in America in the mid century, but unlike Kerouac's intense, frantic soul seeking along America's highways, Graves moved slowly and deliberately down the river he loved. Then he recorded his journey in a history/memory narrative that went on to transform his career as a writer. If you get a chance, check it out and experience this classic for yourself. Also

look at the article in Texas Monthly here at the library for an updated take on John's journey down the Brazos.

So that's it for now folks. Enjoy these wonderful crisp fall days of sunshine and cool breezes. It's great to be outdoors now but when that sun goes down and it gets nippy in the late afternoon, you will be looking forward to snuggling down with that warm afghan, that good book or movie, and a cup of warm cocoa (or a nice glass of wine)!

**Testing an Assumption Contract Bridge**

By Steve Becker

This hand occurred in a duplicate pairs tournament, but the principle it demonstrates would be equally applicable in rubber bridge.

North elected to sacrifice against five diamonds, hoping South would go down only one for minus 200 points and thus prevent East-West from scoring 400 points for making five diamonds. The idea was good, and should have been rewarded, but South misguessed the trump situation and wound up down two -- 500 points -- for a poor score.

West led a diamond and shifted to a low club. East took the ace and returned a club, the jack losing to the king. West then exited with the jack of hearts.

Declarer had lost three tricks and now had to make the rest to avoid a deadly score of minus 500. He won the heart with the king, cashed the ace of spades, ruffed a diamond in dummy, then led a spade on which East followed low. The question now was whether to finesse or play for the queen to fall. After considerable thought, South played the king and went down two.

It is true, mathematically, that declarer is better off in the long run to play for the queen to drop rather than finesse when he is missing Q-x-x of a suit. However, this was a special case where declarer should have finessed.

South's assumption, at the critical point, that West started with Q-x, is not valid because it means that West could not have made five diamonds, since he would have had to lose two spades and a heart. This in turn meant that a score of minus 200 would yield a poor result.

Declarer must therefore assume that the spades are divided 3-1 in order to justify the sacrifice bid. He is bound to do badly if he plays for the drop, and can get a good score only if the finesse wins because West started with a singleton spade.

# The Good, The Bad and The Ugly at Silver Spur

The Salado Silver Spur Theatre's Thursday \$5 FilmFest continues this week with the classic 1966 Sergio Leone western "The Good, the Bad and the Ugly." This movie was the last of the "Dollar" spaghetti westerns that used Clint Eastwood as the man with no name. This is arguably the greatest of all foreign-made "western" movies, not so much for its story but for its characterizations and the incredible cinema photography. I know this was shot primarily in Spain with Italian extras but if the American West and its people didn't look like this they should have.

With a happily jaundiced and penetrating eye the movie follows its three main characters—the laconic bounty-hunter Blondie (Eastwood, then verging on superstardom), the murderous Angel Eyes (Lee Van Cleef), and the tragicomic bandit Tuco (Eli Wallach)—as they cross the American Southwest pursuing a fortune in buried gold. As each man works to hinder his rivals with a barrage of lies, beatings, double-crosses, and ambushes, they all must dodge involvement in the Civil War (surprisingly active in that part of the country), with its attendant threats of wholesale slaughter and brutal POW camps. Because no

single one of them knows exactly where the loot is hidden, the three gunmen are forced into a grotesque game of leapfrog through the deserts, battlefields, and war-ravaged towns that separate them from their treasure.

Sergio Leone is a great director. If you don't believe me listen to Quentin Tarantino as he has often stated that this is the best directed movie he has ever seen and one of his all-time favorites. He works in extremes, switching in the blink of an eye from widescreen landscapes the size of national parks to subatomic close-ups that reduce the human body to a pair of narrowed eyes, a callused trigger-finger, or facial pores that look like open petri dishes. The opening is brilliant: it's a series of short sequences presenting the three main characters.

What makes Leone's work even more powerful is his collaboration with Ennio Morricone, who might have composed his best musical score here.

The cinematic thrills and action continue through November as they have scheduled "The Sand Pebbles," "The Godfather," "The Dirty Dozen" and "Pulp Fiction" for each Thursday of the month. # Comanche's windmill man

"They're the sentinels of the plains, they called them. Lot of people used windmills for landmarks, for navigation, for travel. They stuck up above everything, so they could see them a long ways off. People used windmills for scouting the territory, looking for their kids, they'd get up there to signal their neighbors, they did a lot of things on their windmills."

Cliff Conway has a windmill business in Comanche.

"There's plenty of windmills to work on. I work around a hundred mile radius of Comanche trying to keep these old things going. I've been doing it now for 24 years."

Cliff says the major problems he encounters on windmills are from wind damage and neglect.

"Biggest thing is lack of oil. If people would just put oil in them when they need it, they wouldn't have near as many problems with them."

He says a lot of people collect windmills.

"At one time there were over a hundred companies making windmills in the United States. The Aer-

motor Company out of Chicago made windmills until 1960. Out of all the mills that have ever been made, theirs is kind of the Cadillac. They've had the best lastability, therefore I work mostly on Aermotors. There are a few Bak-ers, a few Dempsters, and a few Heller-Allers. There are several other different brands that I work on, but mostly Aermotors."

Aermotors are still being made in San Angelo.

"A lot of these windmills that I work on have never been overhauled. And they've been up for 80 years. It's just amazing that there's never been a mechanical invention that man has come up with that seems to last as long as a windmill."

Cliff doesn't mind climbing a windmill tower.

"It's pretty rewarding. That's I guess what fascinated me about getting

into this business. The view from the top of the windmill. I just love to see scenery and you can really see it from up there."

People who grew up to the sound of a windmill still love that sound today.

"A lot of folks have a sentimental value attached to their windmills. They tell me 'that was my grandpa's windmill.' I think they like the little rhythm that it makes as the rod goes up and down. That's what most people prefer."

Cliff says as long as he's able to climb windmills, he'll be working on them.

The windmill meant a lot to the early pioneers. It was their own personal statue of liberty. Descendants of those early pioneers may live in the city, but they go to the old home place and listen to the sound of the windmill. And they remember.
