

BoA gets glimpse of needs budget expenses of \$1.9M

“Nobody said this job was going to be easy.”

Alderman John Cole’s statement following the July 18 presentation of the “Needs” Budget for the Village of Salado may end up being the understatement of the year, considering the additional needs presented are almost double the current general operating budget.

Village administrator Don Ferguson told aldermen that the “Needs” Budget is a three- to five-year projection of the actual needs of each village department to meet projected service demands.

He hastened to warn aldermen that this was not a proposed operating budget, but was intended “to raise awareness of the actual needs of those responsible for the day-to-day operations of the village.”

If added to the current general operating budget, the needs budget would be \$3.1 million. The current general operating budget is \$1.1 million.

Ferguson divided the list of needs into three areas: manpower, capital outlay and professional services.

Manpower expenditures include administrative positions of an assistant village administrator and an accounts payable/municipal court clerk at \$172,222. A full-time code enforcement officer would cost \$58,107. Three more police officers, bringing the force to seven, would cost \$224,890. A maintenance foreman would add \$49,112. This brings the manpower needs to \$504,331.

Capital Outlay needs include these items: drainage improvement study, \$75,000; minor drainage improve-

ments, \$100,000; wayfinding signage program, \$150,000; codification; \$12,000; large format scanner, \$6,000; three vehicles, \$45,000; five computers, \$11,300; rebuild Pace Park playground, \$45,000; Main St. public restrooms, \$76,000; street signs, \$65,000; street improvements, \$360,000; Pace Park restroom, \$38,000; Pace Park pavilion, \$70,000; Pace Park lawn development, \$200,000; visitor trolley, \$16,500. Total Capital Outlay needs: \$1,269,800.

Professional services needs are these: mowing/landscaping services, \$30,000; Salado Volunteer Fire Department, \$10,000 added; animal control, \$5,000; Associate Judge, \$1,500; general engineering, \$7,500 added; legal services, \$15,000 added and Comprehensive plan, \$100,000. Total professional services: \$169,000.

Aldermen did not discuss revenue streams for funding the Village. This will be done in later sessions.

The current property tax rate for the Village of Salado is \$0.62760 per \$100 valuation. It is in the middle of the 11 cities in Bell County that levy property taxes, with Killeen having the highest tax rate of \$0.74980 and having the lowest tax rate of \$0.47380.

While the Village is in the midst of the other cities in Bell County in terms of overall property tax rate, it is the highest when it comes to debt service taxes, with a rate of \$0.41850 per \$100 valuation. The M&O tax rate for the general budget is \$0.20910.

“If you were to fund all of this,” Ferguson said, “you would go from the lowest M&O tax rate to the highest.”

Open House set Aug. 1 for State Rep. Buckley’s Salado office

State Representative Brad Buckley (R-Salado) announced the grand opening of a district office in Bell County, Texas.

The office, which is located inside the Historic Fowler House near downtown Salado, will serve constituents of House District 54 in Bell County.

The office’s grand opening will be held at the Historic Fowler House, 1301 North Stagecoach Road, Salado, from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m., Thursday, August 1. The office will be open to the general public and the event is free to attend.

“I stand ready along with my staff to serve the people of Bell County, and this office will allow me to work more closely with local and

county officials, as well as serve my constituents more effectively,” Buckley said.

House District 54, which spans southern and western Bell County and all of Lampasas County, will be served by two offices; one in Salado, Texas and a second office in downtown Lampasas, which will serve constituents in Lampasas County. The Lampasas County district office, located in the Lampasas County Courthouse, 501 Fourth St., Suite 301, Lampasas, officially opened to the public on July 10.

Rep. Brad Buckley is a first-term legislator from Salado, Texas, and represents part of Bell County and all of Lampasas County in Central Texas. He holds a Bachelor of Veterinary Sci-

ence and a Doctorate of Veterinary Medicine from Texas A&M University, and is a local veterinarian in Killeen, Texas. Dr. Buckley is a cattle rancher and raises and trains cutting horses. He is the proud husband of Susan and father to Emily, Erin, and Bo, all of whom are Aggies.

Fowler House

The Fowler House was built in 1872 by Josiah Fowler, who moved from Burnet to Salado to teach at Salado College. Fowler co-authored with his older brother Abijah “Fowler’s Arithmetic” textbook that was used in the early schools of Tennessee, Virginia and Georgia. According to “Annals of the Fowler Family,” by Glenn Dora Fowler Arthur, “Josiah,

born July 16, 1811; died July 4, 1888, in Salado. In 1853 Josiah Fowler moved from Cocke County, Tennessee, to Burnet County, Texas, near Marble Falls, on the Colorado River, where he built himself a marble residence (of the native marble, which is destined to outlast many generations, and is still in possession of the Fowler family).

Capt. Josiah Fowler, a confederate veteran, built the Fowler House in the Greek Revival style, according to the National Register of Historic Places application in 1983. It is a two-story rectangular plan with a one-story ell to the rear, gabled roof with end chimneys and interior chimney in the ell.

All abilities playground finds home at Civic Center

“Now we go to work,” Tiffany Schreiner told Salado aldermen July 18 about the all abilities playground.

Schreiner reported to aldermen that the Salado ISD Board of Trustees agreed earlier in the week to hold land on the grounds of the Salado Civic Center on Main St. for the next two years.

During the next two years, Variety Texas, working with Sirena Fest, will go forward with completing the plans and raising the funds for construction of Phase

One of the all abilities playground on the grounds of the Civic Center on the property between the Village Garden and the practice ball field.

The group considered placing the playground at Pace Park, but site preparation costs would be about \$100,000, according to alderman Amber Preston-Dankert, who also serves on the Sirena Fest board.

“To utilize that site, we would have to level the entire existing playground,” she said, explaining that the structure of an all-abilities playground would be taller and wider than the cur-

rent playground structure at Pace Park. The current playground at Pace Park was built in the early 2000s when with money raised by Salado Moms who sold the personal tiles at its entrance. The fundraising effort was led by then-mayor Rick Ashe and his wife Shannon.

Additionally, existing power lines would have to be moved to accommodate the structure and lateral lines for the pavilion restrooms would also likely have to be moved.

“Parking is the other issue,” Preston-Dankert explained. “All of the parking

on the top level next to the playground would have to be designated handicapped parking. Any other parking would have to be on the lower level road.”

When the site prep costs neared \$100,000, the Sirena Fest group that is raising money for the all abilities playground quickly realized “We could almost build the first phase of the playground for that amount,” Preston-Dankert said.

“We want it to be a central Texas regional facility,” Schreiner said. “We see child therapists bringing their clients to this. A space

like this doesn’t exist in very many places.”

Proceeds from last year’s Sirena Fest and Mermaid Parade were dedicated to the effort to build the all abilities playground.

This will continue with the 2019 Sirena Festival and Mermaid Parade, which is planned for 11 a.m.-5 p.m. Oct. 5 along the creek.

A Mermaid Ambassador Brunch will be held 11 a.m.-1 p.m. Sept. 12 at The Venue by Inn on the Creek. Tickets are \$100 for the Brunch and are available online at <https://www.varietytexas.org/mermaidbrunch>. Dead-

line is Aug. 15 to make reservations for the Mermaid Ambassador Brunch.

The Brunch will include a menu prepared by La Luncheonette, owned by Sirena Fest board member Brooke May. The menu will include tea cakes and biscuits with butter, a Mediterranean asparagus salad with juniper berry vinaigrette, smoky mushroom shooters and chicken and waffle tacos with papas bravadas.

Fed may limit July interest rate cut to 0.25%, rather than 0.5%

The Markets

After hitting a record and crossing the psychologically important 3000-mark last week, the S&P 500 Stock Index, our favored benchmark for the stock market as a whole, declined in value 1.23% for the week ending on July 19 to close at 2976.61. The market slowly dropped all week amid a flurry of less-than-optimal news from second-quarter earnings and suggestions that the Fed will limit its July interest rate cut to 0.25%. The market consensus last week was that a 0.50% cut was in the cards. That market decline dropped the 12-month return to 6.2% and the gain from the end of last September to a miserly 1.5%. In short, the stock market is pretty much where it was ten months ago.

One of the questions that have been raised by market analysts has concerned why the market was up at all since last October as corporate profits have declined and the economy is showing signs of stagnation. One answer that makes sense is that the corporate income tax savings enacted at the end of 2017 have largely not gone into new corporate investment but rather into share buy-backs. Looking at the data reveals that the earnings per share have not declined with real net earnings because there are fewer shares outstanding because publicly traded companies have been buying their shares back on the open market. Unfortunately, unless companies reinvest and create more profit, share buy-backs have proven historically to be only a short-term fix to a longer-term problem. Company executives have responded that with the uncertainty of potential high-tariffs sending the economy into a recession, long-term investing is unpalatable.

Market & Economic Update

The 10-year U.S. Treasury note yield followed the stock market's lead, dropping 7 basis points (3.3%) from last week's reading to close at 2.056%. With the 90-day T-bill yielding 2.038%, the yield-curve is technically no longer inverted even though the two through five-year notes have yields in the 1.7% range. That combination signals a clear message of uncertainty. West Texas Crude joined in the dirge, closing the week at \$55.87 per barrel, down 7.34% despite fresh bad news from the Strait of Hormuz. Oil is down about 20% from a year ago and the major change has been a lower demand forecast as the world economic growth slows.

The Economy

June data continues to trickle in and most of it seems to confirm that we are, other than in consumer spending, neither growing nor shrinking. The Federal Reserve announced this week that U.S. industrial production was flat in June after increasing 0.4% in May. Industrial production is up 1.3% from last year but declined at a 1.2% annualized rate in the second quarter.

The Association of American Railroads (AAR) reported that rail freight volume is down 7.6% from June of last year. The AAR noted that rail volume in the U.S. reflects the same trend across the developed world and has been slowing since last October. Overall freight volume, including truck, rail, air, and barge, fell 5.3% in June compared with last

year, despite an increase in oil transport volume of 23%. In another suggestion that things may be slowing, U.S. housing starts fell 0.9% in June from May. Meanwhile, residential building permits declined 6.1% from last year. Building permits are a leading indicator and a year-over-year drop typically precedes a recession by 10 to 12 months.

Retail sales, the main engine of the American economy, rose a seasonally adjusted 0.4% in June from the previous month and are up a solid 3.4% from a year ago. Even as production, transport, and other industrial statistics suggest we are entering a dangerous area of zero growth, the American consumer continues to spend freely. Some of the biggest gains were in activity at clothing stores, restaurants, and building-material supply stores. Because consumer spending is about 70% of the U.S. economy, Moody's Analytics is forecasting a second-quarter GDP annualized rate of growth of 1.7% rather than the flat-to-negative number that industrial data would suggest.

The Conference Board U.S. Leading Economic Index (LEI) declined 0.3% in June following no change in May and a 0.1% rise in April. So far, the indicators are not predictive of a recession so much as a slowing in growth. Recessions historically have followed when the LEI declines for three consecutive months or fall more than 1%. So far the warning flag is not up, but this economy bears watching.

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Middle-Class Joe cashes in

The American middle class just got a lot richer.

Joe Biden, who invariably and tiresomely refers to himself as “Middle-Class Joe,” made \$15 million the first two years after the end of the Obama administration.

According to one estimate, it takes an annual income of \$420,000 to be in the top 1% of earners. Biden made 26 times that in 2017. He used to be remarkable among top politicians for not being very wealthy, but even in the old days of straitened circumstances, he and his wife were making about \$400,000 a year, enough to make the top 1% in Delaware.

This doesn't discredit any particular Democratic policy proposal, but it shows that in inveighing against the 1%, many top Democrats are attacking a group they are happy to be part of.

The Bidens bought a \$2.7 million vacation house on the beach, a luxury far out of the reach of the vast majority of Americans. If Biden has felt any guilt, he has yet to show it.

We shouldn't begrudge Biden, or anyone else, getting what the market is willing to pay him, and spending it on things he enjoys. But what's true of Biden is as true of other denizens of the 1%, a category that includes people across all sorts of industries and professions.

What distinguishes the buck-raking of a politician like Biden is that he is simply cashing in on his fame, rather than adding any true value the way an entrepreneur does, or providing important services like a doctor or an accountant.

Writing books (often with the help of a ghostwriter) and showing up and giving speeches is perhaps the easiest money in America, and it is uniquely the path to wealth of politicians.

This road is so paved with gold that even Sandinista-friendly avowed socialists can make a bounty, as Bernie Sanders has without apology, indeed with a prickly defensiveness. “I didn't know that it was a crime to write a good book, which turned out to be a bestseller,” he huffed at a community meeting.

It's also not a crime to use tax loopholes to keep from paying more than necessary to the IRS, as Biden can attest. The Wall Street Journal reports that the former vice president, a longtime critic of tax loopholes exploited by the rich, himself used a loophole that Democrats have long tried to eliminate to save about half a million on his tax bill.

Biden is by no means the lead scourge of the wealthy in the Democratic field. He's been outflanked on this issue by Sanders and Elizabeth Warren, who herself made nearly a million dollars last year. At a recent fundraiser, he said that rich people shouldn't be demonized. Of course, Biden was talking to a room of fellow rich people.

On CNN the other night, he was back as usual to calling himself Middle-Class Joe. It's probably too much to ask him to give up that shopworn self-image. Still, he and many of his colleagues would be truer to how they live their own lives if they began to more fully embrace and promote the idea of their fellow

Americans getting rich.



Newborns are children younger than 1 year of age at the time of enrollment.

"I know what it's like to be the parent of newborns and paying for college was not always at the top of my mind," Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said. "That's why we're reminding new parents to take advantage of the opportunity to lock in this year's rates."

Under the Texas Tuition Promise Fund, the state's prepaid college tuition program, participants can purchase tuition units and lock in future costs of tuition and schoolwide required fees at most Texas public colleges and universities, based on today's prices.

Enrollment at 2018-19 prices closed on Feb. 28 for children 1 year of age and older. The next annual enrollment period begins on Sept. 1, with new contract prices based on Texas public college costs for the 2019-20 school year.

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

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Treasure hunter shares stories

"If you can find it, it's yours," treasure hunter Cody Drake said of the 14 kt gold wedding band he found and then immediately lost a week earlier at Salado Creek.

Drake told an audience of about 100 people gathered at the Salado Museum on July 20 that he was recognized by a young boy and his father while metal detecting in the creek. He showed the young boy the ring he had just found in the creek. "He tossed it in the tall grass and hollered at his dad, 'let's go find it!' Well, it's still there."

Turns out, Drake spoke too early. He found it two days after the exhibit and is now holding onto it more tightly!

Drake spoke to the audience and shared a display of the treasures he has found in the past several months while metal detecting up

and down Salado Creek.

Drake has been a self-confessed treasure hunter since childhood, as he admired his father who became "religious" about mining for gold.

His first real dig was a famous one during the summer of 1997, when he volunteered at the woolly mammoth find overseen by Arizona State University's

Brad Archer.

"I did that all summer long," he said. During the day, he would dig the site and at night he would watch the grounds to guard against theft.

That site produced two woolly mammoths, a giant sloth and a turtle, all of which are now extinct.

Drake has found many treasures in the two decades

he has hunted in Arizona ranging from armor, weapons and coins during the Spanish colonial period to gold jewelry, tools and musket balls.

One of his prize finds is a hand-forged shovel with a 75-calibre musket ball piercing the middle of it.

Drake has been stationed at Fort Hood and while in this area has been scouring Salado Creek on time off from his Army job.

He showed some of the many items he has found in the gravel beds of the Salado Creek: old bullets, remains of a pistol, lots of jewelry, a spoon with a bullet through it, a 1903 nickel among lots of other coins and what he described as "a ton of square head nails."

"The Creek must have flooded and brought a lot of old houses down with it over the years," he conjectured.

He has found several rings as well, perhaps from weekend swimmers in the creek or believers who have been baptized there.

Drake donated all 5,000 of the artifacts to the Salado Museum. "I felt it was only right that it was lost in Salado, rediscovered in Salado and that's where they belonged," he told *Salado Village Voice*.

But he will have the stories, especially of rediscovery of the ring he found, when he shares his stories of treasure hunting.

Drake can be found on Facebook as The Arizona Treasure Hunter, where he shares his discoveries with followers and histories of old mines and treasure troves that have been lost.






that he was going to need a considerable amount of luck to get home safely. Unless he could hold his losses to two clubs and the ace of spades, the contract would fail. This meant that East had to hold the spade ace and West the diamond king.

So at trick two, South crossed to the jack of hearts and led a spade toward his hand, winning with the king after East followed low. A second spade was taken by West, who returned his remaining club.

East cashed the Q-K of clubs, West discarding a spade, and then led a fourth club. Declarer ruffed with the queen of hearts to prevent West from overruffing, whereupon West got rid of his remaining spade. When South now tried to ruff his last spade in dummy, West ruffed with the nine to defeat the contract.

In planning to play East for the spade ace and West for the diamond king, declarer had the right idea, but his execution left something to be desired. In order for his plan to work, the diamond finesse had to succeed, so South should have taken that finesse at trick two and then proceeded as before.

This would have left dummy's jack of hearts in position to overruff West on the third round of spades, if that became necessary, and the contract would have been made.


