Plans unveiled for renovation of Stagecoach Inn

Stagecoach Inn has closed its operations for an extensive top-to-bottom renovation that may take more than two years to

The renovation, which will ultimately add 38 rooms to the hotel operation, will begin with the historic restaurant building, according to Clark Lyda.

Lyda is the principal investor and developer leading the Stagecoach 1943, LP group that was slated to purchase the Stagecoach Inn from Terry Potts on July 15.

Work will begin soon on the 1861 building that opened as the Shady Villa Hotel. The second story balcony of the old hotel is storied to have been the location of an anti-secession speech by Sam Houston. According to the Texana book "Texas Siftings," Houston reportedly had an exchange with a fiery secessionist from the crowd who shouted at him, "General Sam, we can whip them Yankees with cornstalks!"

"That may be true, but they have not agreed to fight with cornstalks," Houston retorted.

This is just one of the many stories that has kept travelers from around the state enrapt about the Stagecoach Inn.

That historic charm is part of what led Lyda to purchase the property and will continue to be a focus in the branding of the Stagecoach Inn as a destination for travelers.

Dion and Ruth Van Bibber opened the restaurant in 1943 and it quickly became a renowned bighway restaurant featured in Life magazine, Ford Times and on the prestigious Duncan Hines list. It was named by Texas Highways Readers as a Readers Favorite restaurant in Texas.

The distinctive menu, recited from memory by waitresses who had worked decades at the restaurant, included the famous hush puppies, tomato aspic, banana fritter and, of course, the Straw-

The team, according to Lyda, has "a clear understanding of the Stagecoach's history, the strength of the brand and people's affection for it, and the potential of the place to once again draw locals and visitors from across Texas."

Jeff Trigger and David Bull are the principals of La Corsha. They "have a lifetime of remarkable experience in the hospitality industry from operating the iconic Mansion on Turtle Creek in Dallas to the restoration of the Driskill Hotel in Austin.

Bull graduated from the Culinary Institute of America in 1994. He joined The Mansion on Turtle Creek in Dallas, Texas and became the youngest-ever sous chef employed by the hotel. Moving to Austin, he served as the executive chef of the Driskill Grill, earning the Austin American-Statesman's Number One Restaurant Award for three consecutive years. The Driskill Grill was recognized by USA Today as one of the country's Top 50 Hotel Restaurants. Food and Wine Magazine honored Chef Bull as one of "The Best New Chefs 2003." Bull has been nominated three times for the prestigious James Beard award for "Best New Chef Southwest."

La Corsha operates Congress Austin, a tri-leveled dining and drinking establishment that includes the popular Second Bar + Kitchen, Bar Congress and Restaurant Congress.

Trigger began his career in the hotel industry at Amfac Resorts in California and Hawaii. He was the managing director of The Mansion on Turtle Creek in Dallas and was recruited in 1999 to restore and reposition The Driskill Hotel in Austin.

With that success, Trigger launched La Corsha

Hospitality Group. Texas Monthly named Congress as the best new restaurant in 2010, while Esquire Magazine named it to its Top 10 list of new restaurants in the country. Bon Appetite magazine named Second Bar + nationwide as well.

Trigger was listed as a General Manager of the Year by Business Traveler Magazine and was named by Leaders Magazine as one of the Best Hotel Managers in the World.

Other developments for La Corsha include opening a Second Bar + Kitchen in the Domain, the development and construction of an East Austin boutique hotel, the Hotel Saint George in Marfa, and the Baker Hotel in Mineral

The first phase for the redevelopment program is the complete renovation of the existing restaurant. This will include demolishing and re-building the kitchen and service area. Current retail space on the west side of Main Street will be redeveloped to its earlier use as a conference center. Old-timers in Salado will well-remember when the Longhorn Room was on Main Street and hosted gatherings large

According to Lyda, the 5,000 square feet on Main Street will be refocused as a conference center in close proximity to the kitchen facility of the res-

and small.

"An emphasis on meetings and special events in the adjacent Longhorn Room will enhance sales and begin to rebuild demand for lodging," Lyda stated. "Over the course of a year we intend to reestablish the brand and build a solid book of business for the restaurant and meeting facilities."

The second phase is to completely renovate, expand and re-open the hotel. Plans call for adding 38 rooms and an additional 5,000 sq. ft. in meeting

Salado sewer system costs now topping \$10.8 million

Cost estimates for the construction of wastewater treatment plant and sewer delivery system for Main Street, Royal Street and the west side of I-35 are \$10.38 million.

Add in three optional low pressure delivery systems and the price climbs to \$10.8 million.

Aldermen met with Kasberg Patrick & Associates (KPA) engineer Rick Kasberg for more than two hours during a special workshop session July 14 to review figures in order to prepare for selling and financing bonds that were approved by voters in November 2014.

Final design costs for the system itself total \$874,880 while preliminary engineering costs, studies, financing and land total \$785,000 according to the Summary of Task Items, Estimated Cost and Schedule

According to the schedule, final design would begin in December and continue through June with construction of the plant and delivery system slated for September 2016 through August 2017.

The schedule estimates the cost of construction for projects that will be designed by KPA (Main Street to the lift station at Stagecoach Inn) will total \$2.75 million and is contracted by the Village of Salado. The construction costs for the projects to be designed by Pape-Dawson (delivery system from Stagecoach Inn to the wastewater plant at The Sanctuary and the 300,000 gallon per day treatment plant) totals \$4.93 million. The letter of intent between the Village of Salado and Sanctuary stipulates that the Sanctuary would design the treat-

ment plant and delivery system from south of the Salado Creek. The optional low pres-

sure systems include these:

- A line along Salado Plaza Drive to Brookshire Brothers at a costs of \$50,000.
- A line above North Main Street connecting to a system at Vanessa Street at a cost of \$81,470.
- A low pressure system along Vanessa Street to north of Mary Lane for a

cost of \$314,105.65.

At their regular board meeting on July 16, aldermen will consider a resolution "authorizing various actions to prepare for the issuance of the Village of Salado, Texas Permanent Improvement Bonds, Series 2015; and containing other matters relating thereto."

Salado College Hill Park lands Trails grant

Salado College Foundation, Inc., has received a Texas Parks & Wildlife Trails grant in the amount of \$14,159 to improve the Salado College Park trail. In addition to the grant, the Foundation itself will need to contribute \$3,540 to this project as part of

its commitment. Total amount of funds obligated to the project is \$17,699. The earliest construction can begin is December

With this grant funding, Salado College Park will have a newly constructed trail from the statue of Col. E.S.C. Robertson and around Salado College ruins. The decomposed granite path will have a limestone curb to limit erosion. The trail will provide visitors to this historic site with a comfortable path to walk while learning about the

early founding of Salado and Salado College. The new path will replace the one constructed by Salado Masonic Lodge.

"With projects recently completed in the past nine months by the Foundation such as seeding the area with wildflowers which

came up in April and hanging 22 birdhouses," Foundation president Bill Kinnison said, "the park is becoming a unique site for visitors to Salado."

"The Foundation would not be at this point of development if it were not for the volunteers who created the planted beds and donated funds for maintenance of the site as well as preservation of the ruins itself," he added.

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

space. The property will have two swimming pools and a mineral spa.

The primary hotel entrance and reception will be moved to Main Street. The I-35 frontage of the property will be heavily landscaped, according to Lyda with a buffer against the highway noise.

The central portion of the site will be landscaped courtyard and include an outdoor event and activity spaces, new family areas around the main pool.

"We will also visually open the Stagecoach's connection to Salado Creek and connect to the village's trail system," Lyda stated.

"Our goal is to re-establish the Stagecoach Inn as a destination venue in Texas for small conferences, special events and weekend tourism travel," Lyda said, adding that the group will capitalize on "the strong brand of the Stagecoach Inn as an authentic place offering gracious hospitality."

The renovation and expansion of the hotel is expected to take two years, Lyda said.

The group has applied to the Village of Salado for an economic development package that will include sales tax rebates, property tax abatements and sharing of hotel occupancy taxes for marketing of the property's meeting space. The board of aldermen will consider the package during its July 16 meeting.

Lyda is a lifelong central Texan. He fondly recalls weekend visits from Austin to the Stagecoach Inn with his family. A commercial developer, he was labeled by the Austin Chronicle as the "anti-developer developer" because of his inclinations toward preserving the historical and cultural integrity of the developments in which he has invested.

During a career that has spanned more than two decades, he has chosen unique projects, including most recently the Perry Mansion in Austin for renovation and redevelopment.

Lyda is the co-owner of Monument Cafe and El Monumento in George-

"It's not going to be Monument or Mexican," he told the Salado Chamber of Commerce, "It will be definitively Stagecoach Inn. We are hoping to make Salado proud."

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

St. Stephen Catholic **Church building progresses**

St. Stephen Catholic Church is slated to open its new sanctuary this fall. The new church will seat 500 congregants.

Church marked its 25th anniversary last fall. The church has its roots in Christ the King Catholic Church in Belton. In the spring of 1989, Bishop McCarthy asked Reverend Charles Davis from Christ the King in Belton to start a mission in Salado and designated Christ the King tyr) since the mission was Catholic Church in Belton as the "mother" church. This mission would be a place where both English and Spanish speaking residents would be able chased in 1990 on FM to celebrate Mass. Sister Nancy Pewterbaugh came to Salado to work with the people and to help organize the new mission. The first Mass was celebrated

on Mother's Day, 1989, at Tablerock Amphitheatre in Salado.

In July 1989, the Bishop asked Deacon Jordon St. Stephen Catholic Pfunter, from Hewitt, if he would become the Pastoral Administrator of the mission Salado as there would be no resident priest. About 15 families) named the mission Holy Rosary, however, the Bishop suggested that the name be changed to St. Stephen (after the first deacon marto be under the administration of a deacon instead of a priest which was an unusual situation.

Eight acres were pur-2268 and a small chapel was established. In 1991 a building was established for classrooms and living quarters and a building was moved onto the property to accommodate the growing congregation.

The first Mass was held at the new building on Easter Sunday April 19, 1992 with standing room only. The church published its first directory in 1994 with 79 families.

In 1999, a pavilion was enclosed for a parish hall and a kitchen was added.

Plans for a new church building got underway in

St. Stephen Catholic Church broke ground on the new church on Dec. 16, 2014 with construction beginning the following month.

During the groundbreaking, Father Aloysius Nzekwe says, "By this time next year, maybe we won't be sitting outside, but inside a new church building."



Sorry, Donald Trump has a point

You are hardly a namebrand company if you haven't dumped Donald Trump in recent weeks.


NBC, Univision and Macy's all have thrown The Donald under the bus, in the heaviest blow to schlock culture in this country since the cancellation of "Jersey Shore." The carnage ranges across media, encompassing reality TV ("Celebrity Apprentice"), entertainment properties (the Miss USA Pageant), fashion (the Donald J. Trump Signature Collection) and even fragrance (Success by Trump).

The shunning of Trump is in response to his, uh, presidential memorable announcement that included comments about the alleged rampant criminality of Mexican immigrants -- they're drug runners, rapists, etc. -- that were typically crude.

As it happens, Trump's new enemies are doing him an enormous political favor, at least in the short term. There are few things that benefit a Republican candidate in the current environment of left-wing bullying more than getting fired and boycotted for something he's said.

Trump's instantly notorious Mexico comments did more to insult than to illuminate, yet a kernel in them hit on an important truth that typical politi-

This is obviously correct. We aren't raiding the top 1 percent of Mexicans and importing them to this country. Instead, we are getting representative Mexicans, who -- through no fault of their own -come from a poorly educated country at a time when education is essential to success in an advanced economy.

Trump's comments made it sound as though Mexico is sending us moral defectives. But immigrants are willing to work. Immigrant men ages 18-65 are in the labor force at a higher rate than native

It's just that a lack of education hampers even hard-working people. This is illustrated in an exhaustive report by Steven Camarota of the Center for Immigration Studies, which favors a lower level of immigration.

Immigrants here from Mexico -- which has sent more immigrants than any other country for decades -- have the lowest levels of

For all its crassness, Trump's rant on immigration is closer to reality than the gauzy cliches of immigration romantics, who are unwilling to acknowledge that there might be an issue welcoming large numbers of high-school dropouts into a 21st-century economy. If we don't want to add to the ranks of the poor, the uninsured and welfare-dependent, we should have fewer lowskilled immigrants -- assuming saying that is not yet officially considered a hate crime.

The point could be made much more deftly and accurately by anyone not named Donald J. Trump. In the meantime, he fills the vacuum, and enjoys the whirlwind.

Supreme Court gives a welcome check on bureaucratic power

To say that conservatives haven't had much to cheer about at the Supreme Court lately is an understatement.

Much has been said and rightly so -- denouncing the judicial acrobatics required to save Obamacare and strike down state bans on samesex marriage. So I wanted to take a moment to spotlight a case where the Court got it right: Michigan v. EPA.

As the saying goes, even a blind pig finds an acorn once in a while. And in ruling that the Environmental Protection Agency improperly ignored costs when it decided to regulate hazardous air pollutants from power plants, the majority made the right call.

At issue is Section 112 of the Clean Air Act, which directs the EPA to reduce air pollutants if the agency deems the regulation "appropriate and necessary." Part of what goes into determining what regulations are, in fact, "appropriate and necessary" is cost. And when it comes to the regulation in this case, the Court found that the EPA hadn't done that.

By the agency's own estimation, its rule to regulate emissions from coal and oil-fired power plants would result in compliance costs of \$9.6 billion annually. The direct benefits of the rule -- again, according to the EPA -- was \$6 million a year.

No, that's not a misprint. For a mere \$9.6 billion, you can save \$6 mil-

"To put that in perspective," writes energy and regulation expert Nicolas Loris, "it's the cost-benefit equivalent of renting \$1,600 in scuba gear to collect four quarters at the bottom of the lake. Every year."

But wait, didn't the EPA claim that there were indirect benefits to be realized from this rule, anywhere from \$37 billion to \$90 billion per year? They did. The alleged benefits included reductions in particulate matter and sulfur dioxide emissions from power plants, both regulated under a different section of the Clean Air Act.

But as Heritage Foundation experts Alden Abbott and Daren Bakst pointed out, "the agency didn't take these benefits into account when deciding to regulate. In fact, the EPA's regulatory impact analysis didn't play a role in determining whether it was 'appropriate and necessary' to regulate."

Even if all these indirect benefits were taken into account, we'd have to balance them against the fact that the EPA's cost estimate, as high as it is, is almost surely much lower than the true cost. According to Loris, the agency grossly underestimated the number of power plants that would be adversely

affected. That explains why industry projections -- which were much higher -- are likely more accurate.


It's not just a matter of waste, as bad as that is. The EPA's rule in this case would have enacted a fiscal toll on all of us. The industries affected by it would have been forced to pass the costs onto its customers.

And I don't just mean the price of energy would have risen. I mean the cost of almost everything. It takes energy to produce the goods and services we buy. The inevitable result of this rule, had it been allowed to stand, would've been fewer jobs and a weaker economy. And all for what appears to be a pitiful benefit.

Another reason this decision is important: The courts tend to defer to the judgment and interpretation of the regulatory agency in question. But this time, common sense won out, and the courts provided an important check on the power of unelected bureaucrats. We could use a lot more of that.

There is still much more that needs to be done to rein in the EPA, and Congress should now take steps to do just that. But let's not allow this victory to pass by unnoticed.


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Empresario's Son: Col. E.S.C. Robertson's influence on founding of Salado reaffirmed

An old trunk sits in the middle of Michael and Nancy Kelsey's office in their downtown Belton home, a home built in the mid-19th century with old portraits of ancestors and scenes of Bell County history. In it are the personal letters portraits and other documents from the life of Elijah Sterling Clack Robertson, the son of empresario Sterling Clack Robert-

The documents heretofore have remained private among the descendants until four years ago when the Robertson descendants began a refurbishing of the 150-year old Robertson Plantation. Cile Cowan and Sterling Ambrose gave the Kelsey's access to the personal documents of Col. Robertson.

Michael is a retired librarian having served more than three decades at Temple Public Library. He

They have spent the last four years scouring through the documents which are on loan from the Robertson descendants, as well as the multiple volumes of the Papers Concerning the Robertson Colony, compiled, edited and published by the late Dr. Malcolm McLean. They have also gleaned historical data from Bell County tax records and deeds and from the E.S.C. Robertson papers at the University of Texas Dolph Briscoe Center for American History.

The Kelseys will publish an in-depth biography of Elijah Sterling Clack Robertson later this year, re-affirming Col. Robertson's principal role in the founding of Salado in 1859 with the establishment of Salado College.

Michael rejects the claim that Salado was es-

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oversaw the genealogical tablished in 1852 because of the establishment of a post office at that time.

> According to the records of that time, the only post office in the area was much closer to Prairie Dell than to Salado. It was midway between Belton and Georgetown, the county seats of Bell and Williamson County respectively.

> "The reference to it being 'Salado' was because of the custom at that time of identifying a post office by the closest stream, which was almost five miles away," Kelsey states.

> Col. Robertson refers to riding seven miles to that post office in some of his early letters back to his family in Austin. Robertson lived for a short time in the Archibald Willingham cabin in 1854 while he began building the first family home on the property that he owned in the Salado area.

> After completing that house, he brought his family up to Salado, which was still very much a frontier. Sure, there were dozens of settlers identified along the Salado, but no concentration close enough to call it a town.

> Robertson then began work on the 22-room plantation home that continues to grace Salado and remains in the family. It is perhaps the most complete architectural example of a plantation in Texas, complete with the slave quarters, smoke house, brick

There are plays that may appear to make no sense at all but are nevertheless demonstrably correct. Consider this deal where you're declarer at five clubs. West leads the king of spades, and the question is how to play the hand. Let's say you win the spade with the ace, play the king of trumps and then lead a low diamond from dummy. You plan to play the ten from your hand, but, unfortunately, East produces the jack, which you win with the king.

You next lead a diamond to the ace and play a third round of diamonds, hoping West will have to win the trick, which would ensure the contract. But East takes the third diamond with the queen and returns a heart, and down you go.

You could say that the outcome was unlucky, but,

ing to shoulder a goodly portion of the blame. You could have adopted a different line of play that would have significantly increased your chances of making the contract.

Although it's certainly not the sort of thing you see every day, the correct play is not to take West's king of spades with the ace at trick

one! Instead, you let him hold the trick, after which there is nothing he can do to stop you. Let's say West leads another spade at trick two. You win with the ace and discard a diamond from your hand. Then, after cashing the ace of trumps, you lead the K-A of diamonds and ruff a diamond. This establishes dummy's 7-6 of diamonds, on which you can later discard the K-9 of hearts, and you finish with an overtrick.

It is true that ducking the opening spade lead costs you a trick you didn't have to lose, but you get the trick back because you no longer have to lose a diamond. More importantly, you gain control of the diamonds and can establish them without running the risk that East will be able to win the third round of the

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

kitchen, stables and family graveyard.

He finished the home about the time that tent meetings were held to discuss building a school in the area. At an October 8, 1859 tent meeting at Salado Springs, a group of prominent Bell County men decided to build a school. The Salado College Joint Stock Company was founded and \$5,000 in stock was sold to begin the school. Robertson served as the President and Secretary of the Stock Company board.

Robertson donated 100 acres to Salado College. Ten acres was for the college itself, while the rest of the property was surveyed into lots and sold, the proceeds of which benefited the building of Salado College.

The College was incorporated by the Texas Legislature on February 8, 1860 for a period of 20 years, during which time Salado flourished. In 1867, Salado incorporated with Judge. O.T. Tyler serving as the first Mayor. Tyler moved to Salado so that his children could attend Salado College. Tyler was one of the trustees of Salado College.

Salado College contributed to the growth of Salado to the point that there were 900 residents in

But that growth would not last and when the railroad bypassed Salado, its decline would be inevitable, resulting in a village that many have called a time capsule of the Antebellum days of Texas.


Robertson Plantation featured on Salado Historical Society Tour

holes in hosta leaves and wilting stems mean insects and diseases have moved into the garden. Don't let these intruders reduce the beauty and productivity of your landscape. Work in concert with nature to prevent and control these pests and you will be rewarded with a bountiful harvest and landscape filled with beautiful blooms.

Monitor. Take regular walks through the landscape. Not only is it good exercise, but it will improve your mood and you'll discover problems earlier when they are easier to control. Look for discolored leaves, spots, holes and wilting. Inspect the underside of the leaves and along the stems to uncover the cause of the problem.

Identify. Once you discover a problem, identify the culprit. Your local extension service, garden center or reliable internet resource can help. Once identified, you can plan the best way to manage the culprit.

Invite the Good Guys. Toads, lady beetles and birds help control many garden pests. Attract them to the garden by planting herbs and flowers to attract beneficial insects, adding a house for the toads, and birdbath for songbirds. Avoid using pesticides and learn to tolerate a bit of damage. A few aphids or caterpillars will bring in the ladybeetles, lacewings, birds and toads that are looking for a meal.

Clean up. Many insects and diseases can be man-

strong blast of water from the garden hose will dislodge aphids and mites. reducing their damage to a tolerable level. Or knock leaf-eating beetles and other larger insects off the plants and into a can of soapy water.

Pick off discolored leaves, prune off diseased stems and destroy. Be sure to disinfect tools with 70 percent alcohol or one part bleach to nine parts water solution between cuts. This will reduce the risk of spreading the disease when pruning infected plants.

Adjust care. Reduce the spread and risk of further problems by adjusting your maintenance strategies. Avoid overhead and nighttime watering that can increase the risk of disease. Use an organic nitrogen fertilizer like Milorganite (milorganite. com) which encourages slow steady growth that is less susceptible to insect

and disease attacks. Mulch the soil with shredded leaves, evergreen needles or woodchips. This will keep roots cool and moist during drought, improve the soil as they decompose, and also prevent soil borne diseases from splashing onto and infecting the plants.

chemical options insects. A yellow bowl filled with soapy water can attract aphids, a shallow can filled with beer and sunk in the ground will manage slugs, and crumpled paper under a flower pot for earwigs are just a few ways to trap and

kill these pests. Or cover the plants with floating row covers. These fabrics allow air, light and water through, but prevent insects like bean beetles and cabbage worms from reaching and damaging the plants.

Organic products. Organic products like insecticidal soap, Neem, horticulture oil and Bacillus thuringiensis can be used to control specific pests. And even though these are organic, they are designed to kill insects or disease organisms, so be sure to read and follow label directions carefully.

Take Note. notes on the problems and solutions in this season's garden. Refer to these next year to help you do a better job of monitoring and managing garden pests. And when shopping for new plants, select the right plant for the location and choose resistant varieties whenever possible.

A little eco-friendly gardening can go a long way in creating a beautiful and productive garden.



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

Melanie Kirchmeier, Community Builder award recipient

Salado Masonic Lodge #296 presented Melanie Kirchmeier with the Community Builder award during a luncheon held at Salado High School on June 27.

In accepting the award, Kirchmeier said she is only practicing the "example momma and daddy set for us growing up."

With family, friends and members of Salado Masonic Lodge in the audience, Kirchmeier talked about the importance of family and the support she has received.

"My husband Bob has supported me every step of the way because he knows that giving back to the community is the joy in my heart," she said.

Art Wadford, Worshipful Master of Salado Lodge, recounted some of the ways Kirchmeier has volunteered in Salado over the years.

"Melanie is a tireless supporter of Salado schools, whether in her position as a SISD trustee or in her work as a founding member of the Salado Education Foundation," Wadford said. "She and her company Century 21 Bill Bartlett are financial supporters of Salado schools in numerous ways."

"If there is a sponsorship of a Salado school function or group, you will find the Century 21 logo there," he added. "She also contributes her time and money to raising funds for the local Volunteer Fire Department, Salado Chamber of Commerce, Salado Community Foundation and the professional associations with which she is affiliated."

Kirchmeier was a founding volunteer for the Salado Family Festival, which raised funds to build the first soccer fields in Salado.

She headed the Salado Christmas Stroll, one of the largest events in Salado bringing thousands of people to Salado. She has overseen and been a member of the Salado Business Association and is serving a three-year term on the Salado Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors. She is the vice chair of the Chamber board this year.

She is in her second term on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees, which oversees the education of almost 1,500 Salado students.

She is also an active

and supporting member of her local church in Salado.

"It would be a shorter task to list the local efforts she is not involved in," Wadford said, "than the efforts that she personally and professionally supports."

A graduate of Salado High School, Melanie attended Southwestern University in Georgetown before returning to Salado to raise her family and build her professional career.

"She is highly regarded professionally and personally by her colleagues and her competitors because she is a woman who lives up to her word when she gives it," Wadford said. "It is for her integrity and ceaseless volunteering in her hometown that we give the Community Builder Award to Melanie Kirchmeier."

In accepting the award, Kirchmeier spoke on the impact that the Masonic fraternity has had on her family.

Her daughter Kayla was diagnosed at age four with cerebral palsy. One doctor advised drastic surgery in which the muscles of her legs would be removed from the bones and reattached. "She would have to be in a body cast for several months and there would be years of physical therapy to follow," Kirchmeier recalled. Seeking a second opinion, Kirchmeier was told by another doctor to take a "wait and see" approach because Kayla was walking.

"I was torn between these two dramatically different prognoses,"

Kirchmeier said, when she was recommended by one of the doctors to contact the Scottish Rite Hospital in Arlington. "He told me that the chief at Scottish Rite had trained them both," Kirchmeier explained.

But Kirchmeier added, she would need for a Mason to recommend Kayla. "I had seen their pictures in the paper," she said. "I know one personally because he sat on the pew next to me in church."

That was the late Bill Piper, a Past Master of Salado Lodge who Kirchmeier said immediately brought the paperwork to her to begin the process of seeking treatment through the Scottish Rite Hospital for Children.

"When we first went there, it was so different than every other hospital," she said. "This hospital was built for children and for their families. It was filled with bright colors and had play areas."

That began a relationship of care lasting more than a decade in which they would travel to the hospital twice a year for therapy. That care was extended to include the Scottish Rite dyslexia program, considered by many experts as a premier program in the field of education.

"All of this was free to us," Kirchmeier said, "paid for by the Scottish Rite Masons.'

Kirchmeier told the local Masons that earlier in the week, her daughter. a graduate of Mary Hardin Baylor, had signed a contract to teach pre-K with Bartlett I.S.D.

"Teaching has always been her dream," she said. "It would not have been possible without the help and support of the Scottish Rite and the Masons."

Editor's note: I am a member of Salado Masonic Lodge. I nominated Kirchmeier to the Lodge Awards committee for the Community Builder.

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


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
