Aldermen to review city manager

City manager Kim Foutz will be evaluated by aldermen at their Oct. 15 meeting, using a critique form that they discussed at

their Sept. 24 meeting.

The board will also discuss a possible land purchase at the Oct. 15 meeting, which begins at 6:30 p.m. at the Municipal Puilding

Building.

Beyond the job evaluation document itself, aldermen discussed who would and who would not provide input during the process. After she is evaluated, she in turn will begin an annual job performance evaluation of each of the city employees.

Alderman Dave Wil-

liams questions how Foutz' job for the past year would be evaluated since "this is the first one (job evaluation) and she has completed a full year of work without having these standards (in the job evaluation) to look at meeting. How will this year be handled?"

"We will have the job description to work from," Mayor Skip Blancett responded.

Alderman Amber Preston-Dankert brought up having city employees do an anonymous evaluation of the city manager as part of the process, adding that this gives the manager a view of "how the organization feels you are doing your job."

Alderman Michael Mc-

Dougal objected to this. "This is a slippery slope, folks. We are asking employees that Kim supervises to give us input on Kim.... We were elected to evaluate our administrator. If we can't do it, then shame on us.

"Something from that might be brought up that she is outstanding in certain areas," Dr. Preston-Dankert.

She also said, "There are things that we might not necessarily see that the staff sees."

"If we do this, you cannot pick and choose what you believe on this," Mc-Dougal said. "You have to believe all of it or none of it."

Foutz has a three-year employment contract with

the Village of Salado.

In other business, aldermen will discuss a proposed policy for Open Records Requests. The board will also discuss the following items:

Following an executive session, the board will consider action on the purchase of land for a wastewater treatment plant.

Keep Salado Beautiful will apply for \$90K grant Organizational meeting set Oct. 20 at Municipal Building

Keep Salado Beautiful invites local organizations and volunteers to a community meeting 10 a.m. Oct. 20 at the Municipal Building to discuss the application process for the Governor's Community Achievement Award and a \$90,000 grant.

"That would be a nice paycheck for all of the volunteer efforts," said KSB President and former alderman Susan Terry.

Terry said that KSB has invited all of the Community organizations to be represented. "The Governor's Community Achievement Award (GCAA) represents the work of an entire community," she said. "Keep Salado Beautiful will write the grant, but we would like to include the work that all of our volunteer organizations have completed in the 2015 calendar year."

The \$90,000 grant must be designated for landscaping on a Texas Department of Transportation right-of-way. "We anticipate our winning project will design landscaping for the south gateway sign," Terry said.

Early voting begins on Oct. 19 in the November Constitutional Amendment election in which seven amendments have been proposed.

Early Voting will be 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Oct. 19-23 with extended hours of 7 a.m.-7 p.m. on Oct. 24 and Oct. 26-30. Early voting locations will also be open Noon-5 p.m. Oct. 25.

Early voting locations in Bell County are the following locations: Salado Civic Center, 601 N. Main St., Bell County Courthouse Annex, 550 East 2nd Ave in Belton; Bell County Annex 301 Priest

Dr., in Killeen, Lions Club Park Senior Center, 1700 E. Stan Schleuter Loop in Killeen, Bell County Annex, 205 East Central Ave. in Killeen and Parks and Recreation Center, 307 Millers Crossing in Harker Heights.

Election day will be Nov. 3, 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Precinct 203 voters will cast their ballots on Election Day at the Salado Church of Christ Activity Center located at 225 N. Church St., Salado.

The following are the proposed amendments

2nd Ave in Belton; Bell Proposition 1 – SJR County Annex, 301 Priest 1: "The constitutional

amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from \$15,000 to \$25,000, providing for a reduction of the limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for those purposes on the homestead of an elderly or disabled person to reflect the increased exemption amount, authorizing the legislature to prohibit a political subdivision that has adopted an optional residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation from reducing the

amount of or repealing the exemption, and prohibiting the enactment of a law that imposes a transfer tax on a transaction that conveys fee simple title to real property."

Proposition 2 – HJR 75: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran who died before the law authorizing a residence homestead exemption for such a veteran

took effect."

Proposition 3 – SJR 52: "The constitutional amendment repealing the requirement that state officers elected by voters statewide reside in the state capital."

Proposition 4 – HJR 73: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit professional sports team charitable foundations to conduct charitable raffles."

Proposition 5 – SJR 17: "The constitutional amendment to authorize counties with a population of 7,500 or less to perform private road construction and maintenance."

Proposition 6 – SJR 22: "The constitutional amendment recognizing the right of the people to hunt, fish, and harvest wildlife subject to laws that promote wildlife conservation."

Proposition 7 – SJR 5: "The constitutional amendment dedicating certain sales and use tax revenue and motor vehicle sales, use, and rental tax revenue to the state highway fund to provide funding for nontolled roads and the reduction of certain transportation-related debt."

Hillary's Gun-Control Non Sequiturs

Hillary Clinton has a new gun agenda that is the same as the old gun agen-

We all are appalled and heartsick over the country's mass shootings, which aren't any less shocking for their routine occurrence. But that doesn't mean we know how to stop them. The Pavlovian Democratic reaction is to offer a raft of familiar gun-control proposals, whether or not they have any bearing on mass shootings.

Hillary's ideas are a testament to the essential sterility of the gun debate, no matter how much heat it generates. There is no way around the fact that marginal changes will do little or nothing to stop mass killers, while more sweeping changes -- even if they were practicable or wise -- run afoul of the Second Amendment.

Among other things, Clinton wants to renew the assault-weapons ban, which we had for 10 years before it lapsed in 2004. To review: A so-called assault weapon is a semi-automatic rifle tricked out with frightening-looking cosmetic features. It is functionally indistinguishable from any other semi-automatic rifle.

Assault weapons might play an outsized role in crime in Hollywood productions, but not in real Rich Lowry



life. Rifles generally aren't used in shootings, let alone assault rifles. All rifles account for about 300 homicides a year. A Department of Justice-supported study of a possible renewal of the assault-weapons ban called its effect on violence "perhaps too small for reliable measurement." Clinton wants to close the "gun-show loophole," which is one of the great cliches and myths of the gun-control debate. The loophole doesn't actually exist. Federally licensed dealers have to run a background check or otherwise ascertain that a purchaser has passed one, even if the dealer is selling at a gun show. Private sellers don't have to conduct one -- whether or not they are selling at a gun show.

The inordinate focus on gun shows might make sense if there were evidence of an epidemic of criminals using them to get their weapons. There isn't. A study in the journal Preventive Medicine of criminal offenders in Chicago found that most obtained their guns through connections. "Rarely," the study said, "is the proximate source

either direct purchase from a gun store, or theft." Clinton also seeks to tighten up background checks. The problem is that very often the mass shooters don't have criminal records and haven't otherwise been adjudicated. This makes it impossible to use background checks to stop them from buying

If it matters, none of this has anything to do with the Oregon shooting. The killer apparently used handguns to mercilessly shoot down his victims (although he also had a rifle, an AR-15). All of his 13 guns came from federally licensed dealers. He passed background checks. What Hillary has done is take a national tragedy and declared that it ought to catalyze us to pass a series of non sequi-

Her proposals aren't well-thought-out, cause Democrats don't think when it comes to guns. They hold the same subrational belief President Barack Obama expressed in his impassioned post-Oregon statement: that preventing mass shootings is easily within our power, with enough political will. Would that it



Pursuing Peace Through Luck

Is the world becoming safer or more dangerous?

Few people would select the first option. It doesn't take Russia launching air strikes in Syria (to cite only one recent example) for most to admit that tensions are ris-

So why in the world are we cutting defense spend-

And not by small amounts. The U.S. military -- which is smaller today than it was on 9/11 -- has had to contend with cuts amounting to more than \$180 billion over the last four years. And there's no relief in sight.

In fact, President Obama is preparing to veto a bipartisan bill that would increase the national defense budget by 6 percent. And all because he's upset that it wouldn't increase non-defense spending by the same amount.

Playing political games with national security is beyond the pale. Yet it's happening.

Meanwhile, as defense expert Justin Johnson notes in a recent article, Iran is receiving \$150 billion under the deal it recently forged with the Obama administration.

international sanctions. this money -- which had been held in non-Iranian banks -- wasn't accessible to Iran. But that's not the case anymore.

Sure, it won't have the full amount to spend however it would like. The U.S. Treasury Department estimates the regime will have about \$50 billion left after it settles its debts. But that's still a lot of money available for it to plow into its military.

And when you take into account the increased revenue that's sure to come in as the country's economy revives, it's obvious that Iran's military can only become stronger and better equipped over the next few years.

"The contrast with the United States could not be more striking," Johnson writes. "While the Iranians are flush with cash and increase spending on their military and terrorist proxies, the United States continues to dramatically cut our military spending."

The Army is cutting 40,000 soldiers.

The Navy won't have an aircraft carrier in the Middle East this fall for the first time in years.

The Air Force has proposed cutting whole fleets of aircraft.

So why are we making such deep cuts, and why now? Blame the Budget Control Act. Signed into law by President Obama in 2011, it was designed to curb federal spending. A worthy goal, to be sure, but the BCA was a blunt instrument.

The BCA hardly touches what is causing federal spending to soar -- entitlements such as Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid. But it's dealt a serious blow to the national security budget. And like a damaged vessel out at sea, it's been taking on water ever since. Entitlements, meanwhile, are climbing with abandon.

True, the U.S. spends more on defense than Iran does. But we also have many more threats worldwide to deal with, so the amount is hardly unjustified. You can't buy peace on the cheap.

"Russia has invaded Ukraine and is flexing its muscles elsewhere," writes Johnson. "China is building islands and gutting our computer networks. North Korea shows signs of another space launch or perhaps a nuclear test. And Islamic terrorism is still a grave threat to the United States."

Meanwhile, the refugee crisis in Europe continues, the Taliban is on the rise in Afghanistan, and Chinese hackers are mining our national secrets.

Is this the time to be holding our security hostage? So the Department of Housing and Urban Development can get an extra \$6 billion? So the Department of Labor can get \$1.3 billion more? To bag an additional \$500 million for the EPA, it's necessary to make ourselves more vulnerable to attack?

We've been quietly transitioning from "Peace through strength" "Peace through luck" for some time now. Let's hope we can reverse course -before it's too late.





Contract **Bridge**

By Steve Becker

There's surely something paradoxical about the statement that bridge is a relaxing game, when the fact is that you can't ever afford to relax -- if you want to do well.

Take this hand, for example, where West leads a heart against three notrump. Declarer plays low from dummy and wins East's ten with the king. He then cashes the ace of clubs and continues with the queen, but West plays low, and East shows out.

This is a disappointing development for South, because if West had taken the king, a minimum of 10 tricks would have been ensured.

But South sees there is still a chance to make the contract, so he leads a low heart and, after West plays low, finesses the nine. When the nine wins, he leads the jack of clubs, forcing West to take the king

trick, and South's troubles are over.

The finesse of the nine is certainly unusual, since South started with three sure heart tricks and appears to be jeopardizing one of them. However, it is necessary because he needs an extra entry to dummy to establish the clubs and then get back to

cash them later.

However, the fact is that West was asleep at the switch at the critical point in the play. Having smartly refused to take his club king at trick three, he relaxed at trick four -- and, as we said at the start, you just can't afford to do that in bridge. When South led the low heart toward dummy, West should have put up the jack. Had he done that, nothing could have saved declar-

West knows from East's play of the ten at trick one South has the king and queen of hearts. West should therefore try to prevent declarer from gaining an extra entry to dummy by inserting the jack when South leads the six. It can cost West nothing to make this play, and might wind up gaining him a great

1 1/2 teaspoon sugar

1 teaspoon chipotle chile powder

1 teaspoon ground cumin

1 teaspoon paprika 1/2 teaspoon coarse sea salt

4 pounds (about 4) English-style beef short ribs, English style, each about 6 inches

3/4 cup prepared barbecue sauce

In a small bowl, combine mustard, sugar, chile powder, cumin, paprika and salt. Sprinkle the mixture all over the ribs, rubbing it in with your fingers, and set aside for at least 20 minutes, or cover and refrigerate for up to 1 day.

Preheat the oven to 275°F. Cover a large baking sheet with aluminum foil and place the ribs on it. Bake in the middle of the oven until the ribs are fork-tender and the meat has shrunk away from the ends of the bones, about 2 hours.

When ribs are tender, prepare a grill for medium-heat cooking. Mix the barbecue sauce with a tablespoon or two of water (this will make basting easier). Place the ribs on the grill and cook, turning them and basting them frequently with the sauce, until well browned and nicely glazed, about 15 minutes. (Be careful not to let the sauce burn; move the ribs to a cooler area of the grill if they begin to char.) Transfer to a platter and serve.

HARD CIDER SPICE CAKE WITH APPLES AND CARAMEL GLAZE Serves 16

What's not to love about this sweet, warmly spiced cake that's moist and dense from apples and golden raisins? Aromatic hard cider echoes the apple flavor, and does double duty by plumping the raisins and making the glaze. Perfect for brunch, teatime or a homey dessert, this cake also makes a great hostess gift.



1/3 cup golden raisins

2/3 cup hard apple cider

3/4 cup (1 1/2 sticks) unsalted butter, softened, plus more for the pan

2/3 cup granulated sugar

2/3 cup firmly packed light brown sugar 4 eggs, at room temperature

1 teaspoon vanilla bean paste or pure vanilla extract

2 cups all-purpose flour 2 teaspoons baking powder

1 1/2 teaspoon ras el hanout spice blend

Finely grated zest of 1 lemon 1/2 teaspoon coarse sea salt

2 apples, such as Granny Smith or Pink Lady, peeled and shredded Cider Glaze

1 cup sifted powdered sugar

1 teaspoon lemon juice

1/4 teaspoon coarse sea salt

Combine raisins and hard cider in a small heavy saucepan and bring just to a simmer over medium-high heat, and then remove from heat. Let raisins soak for about 20

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Butter a 9-inch Bundt pan. Using an electric mixer on medium speed, beat together butter and sugars until mixture is light and fluffy, 3 to 4 minutes. Add eggs one at a time, beating after each addition, and then beat in vanilla. In a bowl, sift together flour, baking powder, ras el hanout, lemon zest and salt. Add flour mixture to butter mixture and beat on low speed just until ingredients are incorporated.

Fold apples into batter. Drain raisins, reserving soaking liquid. Fold raisins and 2 tablespoons of the soaking liquid into batter (reserve remaining liquid for glaze).

Spoon batter to the prepared pan, smoothing the top. Bake until cake is golden brown and the center springs back when touched, about 45 minutes. Cool cake in the pan on a wire rack for 10 minutes. Invert cake onto the rack and cool for at least 1 hour.

Meanwhile, make the glaze: In a medium bowl, whisk together 1 cup of the powdered sugar, lemon juice, salt and remaining soaking liquid until a thick, pourable glaze forms (add remaining 1/4 cup powdered sugar if needed for a thicker glaze). Immediately pour glaze over cake, moving slowly and evenly to cover as much of the cake as possible. Let glaze set before serving.

But keep in mind, there are also more houses on the market during the prime season, meaning more competition. So while there is seasonality, it should not dominate your decision on when to sell.

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



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EMV chip cards effective nationwide

Better Business Bureau serving Central, Coastal, Southwest Texas and the Permian Basin advises all retail businesses to get new EMV chip card readers installed this month. By the end of 2015, 70 percent of credit cards and 40 percent of debit cards in the U.S. will have embedded security chips called EMV (Europay, MasterCard and Visa). EMV cards will eventually replace magnetic stripe cards completely. In fact, many banks and credit unions are already issuing EMV cards to current account holders.

The EMV cards allow consumers to use their cards globally and makes in-store transactions more secure. They also help reduce credit card fraud and identity theft. The chip generates a unique, one-time code that is difficult to counterfeit but

is needed for each transaction to be approved.

October 1, 2015, is an important deadline for American businesses – it is when a "liability shift" occurs that moves the responsibility for covering losses to the business where a fraudulent charge occurs. If a business does not have the new EMV reader, they are liable for the cost of any purchases made with a counterfeit card. In other words, the card issuer will no longer absorb the loss.

Businesses need to replace the old magnetic swipe machines as soon as possible. Most large retailers have already made the change, but many small and independent businesses have not. EMV readers cost around \$25 (for a basic device that plugs into a smart phone), and go up to

about \$300 for a countertop model with all the "bells and whistles." They are available from major electronics retailers and online. A business's credit card processor may be able to provide additional information or recommendations.

Many consumers have already received new credit and debit cards with the EMV chips (it is the small metallic square located on the front of the card). The only other noticeable change for consumers will be when they shop at retail stores with EMV technology. Instead of "swiping" their card, consumers will "dip" the card into a slot in cases - "tap" the card on a flat reader. It may take a few moments longer than the old swipe card, but the transaction will be more

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What About Those Pumpkins?!

Just from the orange color (beta -carotene) as we all learned in school, we get a extremely great source of Vitamin A from pumpkin. One-half cup of canned pumpkin will yield about 26908 IU of Vitamin A. Pumpkin provides another valuable nutrient, potassium, and one-half cup will yield approximately 250 mg. Pumpkin is low in calories (that is by itself minus creams or toppings that you may add), about 41 calories per half cup. In addition to potassium, pumpkin provides several valuable minerals of

calcium, phosphorus and

magnesium, and is low in

sodium.

Now that we have the nutritional value of the pumpkin, what do you look for in a fresh pumpkin..... look for pumpkins in the 3 to 5 pound range, with no soft spots. The stem should still be attached and dark green. You can keep a whole pumpkin for up to a month at room temperature and in the refrigerator for up to 3 months. One small pumpkin should be enough to make a couple of pies. In additional to making pies, add pumpkin to baked products, as it adds great moisture, not to mention the valuable nutrients. If you buy fresh pumpkin, wash the exterior of the pumpkin, use a serrated knife to cut through the surface, scoop out the seeds (save for roasting if you wish), remove the stringy bits and scoop out the pulp of the pumpkin and roast, microwave, or steam the pumpkin. Use the cooked pumpkin in pies, muffins, cookies, soups, sauces or

as a filling for ravioli. Now use the pumpkin 'shell' to design a decorative 'face' for your home or front

Enjoy a pumpkin this fall, not only for the nutritional value, but for some fun decorating. Don't forget the Pumpkin Spice Latte.
