# The Clans are coming Highland Games, Scots' Gathering at Pace Park this weekend

Texas' oldest and finest Celtic festival returns for its 54th year to Salado, Nov. 13-15.

The Scottish Clan Gathering & Highland Games will be held at Pace Park off Main Street in downtown Salado.

Guests can enjoy caber tossing, world-class Highland dancing and as many as 100 bagpipers parading during the festival held in the Park on Salado Creek.

"The Gathering," as it is commonly called, kicks off with a torch-lit ceremony Friday night, followed by a Welcome Social in the Central Texas Area Museum's Hall of the Clans, at 423 S. Main Street.

Saturday events begin at 9 a.m. Guests who pay the entry fee at the Park grounds can delve into Scottish ancestry and heritage with clan society representatives, tap their toes to lively folk performances, or explore items offered by the many vendors selling Scottish goods. Meanwhile, various cultural competitions will be taking place in every corner of the grounds.

While activities commence at 9 a.m., a formal Festival Opening Parade, followed by welcome speeches, occurs at noon, featuring the massed pipe bands and Scottish family clan society representatives carrying tartan ban-

Guests can also watch the athletic competition on Saturday with men ages 18 to 39 competing in the Open category, men over 40 making up the Masters class, and all adult women in their own category completing the same events, which include putting the stone, tossing the Scottish hammer, tossing weights for distance, as well as for height, and tossing of the caber. The competition begins at 10 a.m. and runs continuously. Officials judging will include Central Texas Area Museum President David Boyens, also a long time former Highland Games athlete.

More events include the Highland Dance competition, coordinated by Donna Cusack and Diane Krugh. Dancing Judge will be Tracey Walton of Birmingham, Michigan. Piper for the Dance Competition will be Douglas Frobese. The highly athletic dance contests will feature continuous performances of the Highland Fling, Scottish Hornpipe, Sword Dance, Sean Triubhas and the Lilt. Many past Salado competitors have been world champi-

Sending reverberations across the grounds such as those that bounce off wild mountains and dark glens in Scotland will be the bagpipe and drum competition, for individual pipers and drummers as well as for bands.

Participants will include the host band, Houston's St. Thomas Episcopal School, which previously has won five Juvenile World Pipe Band Championships held in Scotland. Other bands participating include the Silver Thistle Pipes & Drums of Austin and numerous other groups from all over Texas.

Renowned Piper Rose Adams of Austin will chair the piping competition. Others judging using rules of the Eastern United States Pipe Band Assoc., will include Robert Richardson, Ian K. MacDonald, and several others.

Drumming Judge will be Douglas Stronach, Toronto, Ontario, Canada.

Featured folks singers at the festival will include Carl Peterson, the Drambeauties, Ravenmore, and

Even more competitions include the shortbread contest and the bonniest knees contests to be held mid-day on Saturday. In addition, a worship service to include a "Kirking of the Tartan" ceremony will be held at 9 a.m. Sunday in the Salado Civic Center Building. Haney will preach at the service. The service will include a blessing of family tartans and a "Flowers of the Field" ceremony, honoring friends of the museum who have died in the last year.

Sunday also gives guests the chance to watch the children attempt athletic feats inspired by the adult Heavy Athletics performers. All children are invited to compete for no extra fee.

Another new event this year on Sunday after the church service will be a dog parade. Dogs whose owners pay the admission fee are welcome to join a parade through the grounds. All dog breeds are welcome if they "wear something Scottish" such as a plaid scarf.

Day passes to access all events on the Civic Center are \$15 for adults on Saturday and \$10 on Sunday. A two-day pass can be purchased for \$20. Admission for children 6-12 is \$6 either day. Children 13 and older pay adult admission. Younger children get in free. Saturday's pass, also provides free admission to an evening event known as the Tattoo.

Guests arriving later on Saturday can purchase a ticket to just the Tattoo. Tattoo guests enjoy a twilight performance of bagpipes bands, along with performances by some of the top festival talent, including folk singers and dance contest winners. The event begins at 5:30 p.m. Saturday evening. Cost for those attending the Tattoo only is \$6 for adults and \$3 for kids 6-12.

Another special event of the weekend will be the Tartan Dinner, a formal dress event, at 8 p.m. Saturday at the Terrace, across I-35 from the Salado Holiday Inn Express. Tickets are \$40 for individuals and \$75 for couples.

Salado has Scottish culture embedded in its history going back to the days when Empresario Sterling Robertson brought about 600 Scottish families to Central Texas just before and after the Texas Revolution. His son, Elijah Sterling Clack Robertson, founded the village by donating lots of land (which became Main Street) to be sold to build a school, which became known as Salado College. The wife of one of their descendants, Mrs. Sterling (Lucille) Robertson founded the Central Texas Area Museum which began sponsoring this festival 54 years ago. During the Gathering each year, Salado celebrates its historic place as the "Scottish Heart of Texas."

# BOA closing in on Sanctuary deal

Salado aldermen will further discuss the Sanctuary development project as well as the proposed agreement for the donation of land and Water Quality Permit during a Workshop Session 6:30 p.m. Nov. 12. The proposal and agreements, which were indefinitely postponed in October, were put back on the discussion agenda on Nov. 5 and aldermen appear ready to move forward

with the agreements.

However, the board had just been given a package by Sanctuary developers late in the afternoon of Nov. 3 that had not yet been reviewed by legal counsel and village staff. The board met in executive session Nov. 3 with legal counsel Alan Bojorquez to discuss the renewed agreements.

The board voted 5-0 to rescind the postponement

of discussion regarding agreements with Sanctuary on Nov. 5.

Aldermen are reviewing the agreements, which in essence have met their demands of the Sanctuary to include these major points:

• All of the property of the proposed Sanctuary development will be annexed into Salado at the

# James prez: company has pushed 'as hard as we can'

"We have pushed our schedules as hard as we could and so has TxDOT," Mike Kilgore told an angry audience gathered for a Town Hall meeting about the expansion of I-35 through Salado.

The 3.5 mile stretch of road will be mostly completed by May 31, 2016 according to Kilgore, who is president of James Construction, a wholly owned subsidiary of Primoris Services Construction.

That is 11 months after the initial contract completion date of July 2015. James Construction was awarded the bid for the construction of the project by being \$500,000 less than the next lowest bidder.

"If you are the low bidder and are bonded to complete the work, you get the job," Kilgore said.

Regardless, evidently, of whether your company has a history of finishing

jobs on time or not.

The May 2016 is the fi-

nal milestone in a handful of milestones agreed to on Oct. 5 by James Construction and TXDOT officials. Other milestones include

The first milestone is Oct. 31 when James will open a dedicated turn lane for the access road at FM 2484 southbound to help with travelers trying to reach the northern end of Main Street. Currently, travelers must take exit 286 (FM 2484) and cross over the interstate. Then they can travel through construction on a two-way access road until they reach the northern end of

Main Street.

The next major milestone will be the opening of the southbound frontage road south of Thomas Arnold to FM 2268 (Holland Road). The bridge was closed due to some damage to asphalt caused by the flood of May 2015. Nine months later, it will be reopened on the new expedited scheduled agreed to by James and TXDOT.,

The Salado Plaza connection to Williams Dr. will be opened no later

than March 11, 2016, according to Kilgore. The temporary traffic barrels on Main Street at Salado Plaza have been in place since Fall 2014.

The mainlanes bridge over the Salado Plaza extension will open on May 9, according to Kilgore.

Greg Malatek, Austin District Engineer for TX-DOT, told the audience that electronic boards would be put up on both the southbound and northbound highway to warn travelers of when to exit to get to Salado. The boards, expected to be up by Thanksgiving and staying up through the New Year, will be placed a mile south of the Main Street exit for northbound traffic and a mile north of exit 286. Other boards will be put up immediately before each of the two exits. On the southbound access, signs will alert travelers to cross the interstate and then turn right on the east side access road to reach the north end of Main

## **Obamacare is still failing**

For the press, the debate about Obamacare is over. There may be a few proverbial Japanese soldiers wandering on isolated islands yammering on about the failure of Obamacare, but word will eventually filter down to them, too.

This assumption is so deeply embedded that it is impervious to new evidence that Obamacare is an unwieldy contraption that is sputtering badly. Yes, Obamacare has covered more people and has especially benefited those with pre-existing conditions (to be credible, Republican replacement plans have to do these things, as well), but the program is so poorly designed that, surely, even a new Democratic president will want to revisit it to try to make it more workable. Enrollment is falling short. The Obama administration projects that it will have roughly 10 million people on the state and federal exchanges by the end of next year, a staggering climbdown from prior expectations. The Congressional Budget Office had predicted that there would be roughly 20

million enrollees. Premiums are rising. Not everywhere, but steeply in some states. Indiana is down 12 percent, but Minnesota is up 50 percent. Health-care expert

Robert Laszewski points out that it is the insurers with the most enrollment and therefore the best information about actual enrollees who have tended to request the biggest increases -- a sign that they don't like what they're seeing in their data.

Relatedly, the economics are shaky. According to a McKinsey & Co. analysis, last year health insurers lost \$2.5 billion in the individual market that Obamacare remade. Obamacare co-ops that were supposed to enhance choice and lower costs have been failing, and almost all of them are losing money, a victim of the absurd rules (no industry executives on their boards, no raising capital in public markets, etc.) imposed on them by the law.

The problem Obamacare in a nutshell is that on one hand, by imposing motley regulations and mandates, it increases the price of health insurance, and on the other hand, by providing subsidies, it tries to hide the

cost -- but not enough. According to an analysis of the health consultancy Avalere, the poor or near-

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poor have been signing up, but enrollment steeply drops off further up the income scale as the subsidies fall away. It found that three-fourths of uninsured people earning less than 150 percent of the federal poverty level got coverage through Medicaid or the exchanges, while a small fraction of the uninsured making more than 250 percent of the federal poverty level have enrolled.

For them, it's just not a good deal. A study of the Obamacare exchanges by researchers at the Wharton School concluded that "even under the most optimistic assumptions, close to half of the formerly uninsured (especially those with higher incomes) experience both higher financial burden and lower estimated welfare."

As Robert Laszewski points out, on the individual market, Obamacare is essentially a monopoly. It gives money to people to buy its product and through the individual mandate punishes those who don't. And yet it is still having trouble making the sale.

The soldiers who haven't given up yet are right -- this isn't over.

## **Can Jeb Bush Even Spell Integrity?** Former Florida governor cashed in

Those odds get worse if you have to hire someone else to attest to your honor. How intriguing, then, that Kristy Campbell – a spokeswoman for Jeb Bush's presidential campaign — felt moved to tell us that "Jeb's record" is "one of integrity."

This testimonial from a paid flack follows the still-evolving news story that Bush immediately cashed in on his name and state government contacts after leaving the Florida governor's office in 2007. Jeb became a richly paid legislative consultant and board member to major corporations that had received lucrative benefits from his own administration.

With cynical chutzpah, this presidential wannabe now campaigns as an ethics reformer, piously preaching against the corrupt coziness between moneyed interests and government officials. But in the last eight years, this scion of the Bush dynasty has pocketed at least \$18 million in personal payment from his own quiet spins through the revolving door of government-corporate corruption.

Only four months out of office, for example, Jeb got a nice sinecure as a board member for the insurance giant Tenet Healthcare, which ran several of Florida's private hospitals under the state Medicare program. In 2006, Tenet was

found to have cheated patients and taxpayers with more than \$1 billion in overcharges. To settle this malfeasance, the corporation paid only \$7 million.

at the time the agreements are executed.

- The property that is annexed will continue to be zoned as agricultural exempt until the final plat for an area is approved, at which point it will be rezoned according to the approved-upon Development Agreement. Commercial properties will receive a 50 percent property tax abatement for a period of 15 years. Residential properties will not receive a property tax abatement.
- Sanctuary developers and Billy Hanks will donate between six and eight acres of land for the Wastewater Treatment Plant, as well as Water Quality Permit No. WQ0014898001. Enough land will be donated that a 600,000 gallon per day plant can be accommodated.
- The Sanctuary will receive the effluent water for a period of no more than 15 years, after which time it may choose to purchase the effluent water from the Village.
- The Sanctuary developers agreed to the terms of the economic development agreement for a period of 15 years. This includes rebates of sales taxes and a Tourism Marketing agreement for hotel motel tax revenues for the developer and assignees.

Mayor Skip Blancett said that "they will have documents available for final review on Thursday at the workshop. We will not see it again on our agenda until we are 100 percent ready."

He added that, "They are going to do things our way. We are getting this on our terms."

He said that if the final documents do not prove that, then aldermen will immediately begin pursuing purchase of properties on the west side of I-35. "Both are good for building a treatment plant and have a creek for discharge," he said.

Blancett also said that he wants to move forward with design of the system and begin putting "pipe in the ground by January of 2016."

Alderman Fred Brown

said that "We are in the driver's seat for first time with Sanctuary."

Aldermen approved a large area of the city limits and extra territorial jurisdiction (ETJ) that the Village will propose to the **Public Utility Commission** (PUC) as the area for Certificate for Convenience and Necessity (CCN) for wastewater services.

According to Rick Kasberg of Kasberg Patrick Associates, it is not necessary for the Village to have a CCN in order to provide wastewater services, "but it shows the territory you plan on serving over a long period of time."

Kasberg advised aldermen to establish a CCN in order to protect the future areas that the village might serve. "If anybody in that area is going to serve sewer," he said, "it is going to be us." A CCN can prevent additional Municipal Utility Districts (MUDs) from establishing their services "Close to town," Kasberg

The northern boundary of the proposed CCN will be the southern boundary of the Belton CCN. The southern boundary will abut proposed MUDs southwest of the Village. The eastern boundary, Kasberg explained, "is as close as we can get to the drainage divides as possible. Inside the boundary of the CCN, the land flows toward the city, outside of the boundaries flow away from the city,"

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
### Central TX **Marine Corp Breakfast held** Nov. 14



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

# Eagles face #10 team in state in first round of football play-offs

After holding on to beat the Smithville Tigers in the final game of the regular season, the Salado Eagles will face the #10 Bellville Brahmas in the first round of the 4A, Div. II playoffs at 7:30 p.m. Nov. 13 at A&M Consolidated High School in College Station.

Salado's win breaks a 23-game losing streak under coach Brent Graham and gives Graham a 2-28 record in three seasons as Eagles head football

After giving up two touchdowns in the first quarter, Salado answered with a score in the second quarter on a 32 yard pass from Hayden Ebeling to Jake Harvey.

Cutter Hudgens returned a Smithville punt 81 yards for a touchdown, but the kick failed to bring the Eagles within a point.

The Tigers answered with a scoring drive in the third period. Malachi Jones scored his second touchdown of the game, this time on a five yard run.

Hayden Ebeling, who led the Eagles rushing attack with 109 yards on 21 carries, scored later in the third on a nine yard run.

Ryan Kyburz found senior receiver Tyler Stairs in the end zone for a two-point conversion to tie the game at 21-21 going into the

The Eagles took over the lead in the fourth on a three yard run by Ebeling and the PAT kick gave Salado its final score of 28-21.

The Bellville Brahmas bring an 8-2, 4-0 district record into the game, while the Eagles are 1-9 and 1-3 following their 28-21 win Nov. 6 at home over Smithville.

The Brahmas had two early non-district losses; 40-15 to Stafford, ranked #8 in 4A, Div. 1 and 28-26 to the Giddings Buffaloes, who are ranked #8 in 4A, Div. 2 with a 10-0, 4-0 record.

While the Brahmas lost closely to Giddings, winners of District 11-4A, Div. I, they beat Caldwell, the second place team in 11-4A by a score of 41-30. Giddings handled Salado

The top four teams in each of the 16 districts in 4A, Div. 2 make the playoffs for a six-round system. In fact, in District 10, all four teams made the playoffs. Houston Scarborough went 1-9 and 0-3 in district

10 play and will face the West Orange Mustangs who are 9-1 and 4-0 in District 11 play. Scarborough broke a 60 game losing streak early this year and went to the playoffs in 2014 with an 0-10 record. Of the 96 teams in 4A, Div. 2, only 20 will miss

the playoffs.

The Giddings Buffaloes finished the season in the top spot of District 11-4A and face the Sweeny Bulldogs. The Bulldogs are 2-8, 1-3 for fourth place in District 12-4A. They play at Ricebird Stadium in El Campo on Nov. 13.

The Caldwell Hornets finished in second place in District 11-4A with a record of 6-4, 3-1 in district. They face the Columbus Cardinals, the third place team in District 12-4A with a 5-5, 2-2 record.

La Grange struggled to a third place finish in District 11-4A after making it to the Regional finals last year. With a 7-3, 2-2, the Leopards will face the 7-3, 3-1 Wharton Tigers, the second place team from District 12-4A. Wharton Tigers were the runner-up last year before bowing out in a first round loss to Gid-

dings.

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
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## **Lady Eagles earn All-District honors**

## Robertson Gala benefits Historic Preservation

The Ambrose and Cowan families, sixth generation owners of the Robertson Plantation and descendents of E.S.C. Robertson, are hosting a gala to benefit historic preservation in Salado on 7-10 p.m. Dec. 3.

The Gala affair will feature heavy hors d'oeuvres catered by The Range at the Barton House and live music by Pam Bland and Drs. Matt Rogers and Guy Okeson.

Tickets to the Robertson Plantation Gala are \$100 each and will benefit three Salado non-profit organizations: the Central Texas Area Museum, the Robertson Colony-Salado College Foundation, and the Salado Historical Society equally.

The host families are opening the entire Robertson home for the Gala event, including the private residence upstairs. Although the Robertson home is on the Salado Christmas Stroll home tour on December 3-4, only the downstairs rooms will be open for viewing at that time.

Colonel Elijah Sterling Clack (E.S.C.) Robertson was a Texas pioneer, patriot, soldier and jurist and was one of the founders of Salado College. E.S.C. and his wife Mary Elizabeth Robertson began building their Greek Revival style plantation home in 1856 and completed it in 1860. In addition to the 22-room mansion, there are slave quarters and a family cemetery on the plantation grounds.

The purpose of the Central Texas Area Museum is to tell the history and development of Central Texas, to provide a safe and accessible place to preserve and exhibit these items which tell its history.

Founded in 1973, Robertson Colony-Salado College Foundation is responsible for "carrying on and supporting a public park, public education, charitable, literary, scientific or religious activities; and to convert the property (College Hill) into a historical shrine, and will beautify and maintain same, continuously and permanently, through the years, in memory of the gallant pioneer and worthy men and women of Texas."

The Museum is open for visiting free of charge Tuesday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Museum features an exhibit room in which exhibits are on permanent display. It also has a reception and meeting hall containing more artifacts and suitable for special events or traveling displays.

As the only entity specifically created to preserve the rich heritage the Village of Salado, the Salado Historical Society is guided by two basic purposes.

• To collect information and exhibits which can help to establish or illustrate the exploration, settlement, and development of the area. To accomplish this, the Historical Society works to preserve and make available to any interested party those records, archives, and other documents that may help to illustrate the history of Salado and the immediate area.

• To work cooperatively with national, state, area, and village officials to preserve the historical integrity of the Village. To accomplish this, the Society seeks to identify and preserve the Village's historic buildings, monuments, and markers and to ensure that any new construction or renovations within the Village's historic district conforms to the guidelines established for this district.



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### Meeting Nov. 17 on CWD in deer

In July, Chronic Wasting Disease was detected in a white-tailed deer in Medina County, Texas. This disease, first discovered in 1967 in Colorado, affects the nervous systems of white-tailed and mule deer, elk, moose, and red deer. For the first time, the disease was seen in whitetails in Texas, creating significant concern among wildlife professionals, deer breeders, and hunting industry professionals. Although there is no evidence of transmissibility of the disease to humans or livestock, the seriousness of the disease for wild animals demanded a quick response.

While much effort has been spent on the part of various organizations to address the concerns and needs of landowners, we would like to reach out more specifically to the hunting public regarding education on this disease.

Although there is no indication yet that CWD has infected deer outside of the closed, high-fenced facilities in Medina and Lavaca counties, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Texas



Animal Health Commission are working to assess the scale of the situation, including potential infection of wild white-tails. Hunters are the critical piece in the puzzle for monitoring and managing CWD: hunters can contribute tissue samples from harvested deer, and maintaining healthy deer densities, as Texas wildlife managers have done for years, is the best tool to prevent the spread of CWD.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension and Texas Wildlife Association will be hosting a series of "town-hall" style meetings for hunters to educate them about the disease, its history, symptoms, and transmission, as well as informing hunters how they can participate in monitoring efforts and reminding hunters of safe carcass handling practices.

The next meeting is scheduled for 6:30-8:30 p.m. Nov. 17 at Texas Parks and Wildlife Headquarters, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin.

These instructors will cover topics including Vegetable Gardening, Basic Botany, Soil Testing and Soil Basics, Irrigation and Water Issues, Landscape Design, Pesticide Safety, Turf Grasses, Composting, Vermiculture and Earthkind Principles, Entomology and Plant Diseases; as well as Growing and Using Herbs, Fruit and Nut Trees, Wildscape Gardening and Plant Propagation.

Classes will be held at the Bell County Extension Building located at 1605 N. Main Street, Belton 76513, and to learn more about what it means to be a Master Gardener, please read on!

History of the Master Gardener Movement? The Texas Master Gar-

dener movement began in 1978 in recognition of the need to support Texas Agricultural Extension Service agents who were experiencing overwhelming demands for horticulture information. In 1979, the first local Master Gardener chapter was organized in Montgomery County and through the next seven years, more chapters organized throughout the state.

In 1987 the Texas Agricultural Extension Service made an official commitment to the Texas Master Gardener Association by hiring a statewide coordinator. Guidelines were

established requiring a minimum of 50 hours of formal training and 50 hours of volunteer service to become a Master Gardener, but individual organizations are allowed to set additional time commitments. The organization's 500 page training handbook was also completed.

In 1991 a formal statewide non-profit organization was formed and officially named the Texas Master Gardener Association. Local county Master Gardeners are also members of this state organization.

During this time the State established guidelines and programs which were identified as essential to all local Master Gardener chapters. These included answering homeowner horticultural questions in support of the local Extension Agent which is at the heart of most Texas programs. Other in common programs include offering the local community a speaker's bureau on gardening topics, classroom gardening for youth, community gardens and information booths at local events.



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

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

## Think you've won the lottery? Don't fall for this scam.

BBB offers advice to protect yourself against lottery and sweepstakes scams.

When it comes to playing the lottery, the odds are not in your favor. In fact, the chances of winning the jackpot is 1 in approximately 292 million.

Whether it is by mail, phone or in person, scam artists use the promise of prizes and large cash winnings to steal from honest people. Victims often get unsolicited phone calls, emails or letters notifying them that they have won a large sum of money or a prize. This is not a new scam, but it is a persistent problem.

Many times the contest

letter or caller will explain that in order to collect your winnings, you first have to send a small upfront fee to pay for processing or taxes. Following these instructions, victims wire the money or use a prepaid debit card but never receive their "winnings."

Better Business Bureau frequently receives complaints from senior citizens about sweepstakes and lottery scams; however, many of these scammers randomly contact consumers and may not be aware of the demographic.

According to the Federal Trade Commission's 2014 Consumer Sentinel Report, over 5,500 complaints against lottery and sweepstakes scams were reported in Texas. Consumers allege the calls request upfront funds in order to receive their winnings. Remember, it is illegal for U.S. citizens to participate in foreign lotteries, and any correspondence from a foreign country should be immediately discarded as a

In February 2015, BBB unveiled Scam Tracker, an interactive online tool consumers throughout the U.S. and Canada can use to find and report scams and fraud. Since its launch, nearly 700 sweepstakes and lottery scams across the U.S. have been reported.

To protect yourself from lottery and sweepstakes

scams, your Better Business Bureau serving Central, Coastal, Southwest Texas and the Permian Basin warns you to beware of these red flags:

You can't win a contest you didn't enter. You need to buy a ticket or complete an application to participate in a contest or lottery. Scammers seek their targets by phone, email or a letter. Research the business, and verify that it is legitimate. Go to checkbbb. org or ftc.gov.

You are offered "toogood-to-be-true" prizes. Almost always, people "win" a large sum of money or brand new vehicle - but there is always a catch. Scammers attempt to make

it sound easy to claim your prize with phrases like, "Send me a \$100 gift card and I will deliver your brand new car right to your door!" Remember, if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

You have to give personal information. Any time someone asks for your bank account number, Social Security number or other sensitive information that is an automatic red flag. There is no need to access financial information, like a credit card number, in response to a sweepstakes promotion.

You have to pay to win. Don't be blinded by the promise of a large sum of money in the future. If they are asking you to give them money first, that's a red flag. According to the Federal Trade Commission, it is illegal to ask you to pay to enter a sweepstakes or lottery or buy something to increase your odds of winning. Legitimate prizes do not come with processing fees, and taxes are paid directly to the Internal Revenue Service after winnings are collected.

You have to wire money or use prepaid debit cards. If you are asked to use these methods in order to collect a prize or money that is a major red flag. It is difficult to track these types of transactions, and often, there is no way to get your money back.


