#### Salado will stay 4A for 2016-18 **UIL realignment**

Salado High School Eagles will remain in 4A competition for the next two years as the Universtity Interscholastic League (UIL) released its conference cutoff numbers last week.

The cut off for 4A Division II is 480 students enrolled in grades 9-12. Salado High School turned in an enrollment of 492 students in October. The top end of 4A, Div. II is 722 students.

It is unlikely that any of Salado's district football opponents will move up or down in the upcoming February 2016 realignment by UIL.

In 2014, the enrollment figures for District 11-4A Div. II football were as follows: Salado, 465, Caldwell, 511, Smithville, 540.5, La Grange, 610.5 and Giddings, 640.

Without significant growth, the district in which Salado competes for basketball and other sports will likely stay the same, with Salado being the smallest school by far.

Schools in District 25-4A had this enrollment for the 2014-15 alignment: Salado, 465, Llano, 496, Burnet, 924, Liberty Hill, 954, Taylor, 974 and Lampasas, 1,017.

Salado High has 76 transfer students enrolled this year.

Without those transfer students, Salado would drop to 3A competition, where the Eagles would compete in 3A, Division I in football. Student enrollment for 3A, Div. I is 319-479 students.

If Salado had been below the 480 student cut off, the Eagles would likely compete in District 10-3A Div. 1 with these opponents who turned in the following enrollment numbers in 2014: Florence, 315, Little River Academy, 369, Cameron Yoe, 390, Troy, 408, Rockdale, 447.

The Eagles would also likely compete in some form of District 20-3A if it had made the cut.

For 2014-16, District 20-3A was comprised of the following teams: Hearne, 233, Lexington, 270, Franklin, 288.5, Rogers, 307, Little River Academy 369, Cameron Yoe, 390, Troy, 408 and Rockdale, 447.



Salado Eagles tipped off the basketball season with a win over Faith Academy last week. University of Interscholastic League (UIL) announced the enrollment cut-off numbers for the upcoming realignment in February. Salado will remain a 4A, Div. Il competitor in football as the school had 492 students enrolled in October when UIL took the snapshots for realignment. The cut off was 480 students for 4A. Salado accepts 76 transfer students at the High School campus, which is about 15 percent of the total class enrollment. #### **BOA** approves Sanctuary deal

"There's not much to say," King Copeland told the Salado Board of Aldermen after an executive session of more than two hours Nov. 19. "Y'all have made up your minds. We're waiting for the shoe to drop. This is reprehensible... Go ahead, get at it."

The Board of Aldermen did just that, approving four motions relating to The Sanctuary development with no discussion from the board members. Amber Preston-Dankert voted against each of the motions, but they were carried by votes in favor from Fred Brown, Frank Coachman, Michael Mc-Dougal and David Williams.

Mayor Skip Blancett and Billy Hanks were set to sign those agreements at the municipal building 6:30 p.m. Nov. 25 aldermen. Those agreements were approved by the aldermen on Nov. 19.

The motions approved by aldermen were these:

• Motion to approve the Donation Agreement between the Village of Salado and Billie Hanks Jr., and Salado Utility Company, Inc. for the donation of 6 acres of land and Water Quality Permit No. WQ0014898001. Motion was made by Brown, second given by McDougal.

Copeland said that the Board of Aldermen and Mayor had "repeatedly disparaged constituents as negative naysayers and doom and gloomers."

"This is a matter of the first amendment and freedom of speech," he added. "We all realize Salado must progress," but added that citizens in Salado define progress in different terms than the Board of Aldermen.

'These viewpoints must be protected," he said, "unless you wish to rule with an iron first where other views are not tolerated."

Copeland called the board's executive sessions "vaguely described" and "out of hand."

"The exceptions that allow executive sessions are to be used sparingly," he said. "Case law is clear on the real estate exception. It allows closed session when open discussion would be detrimental in negotiating with a third party."

Negotiations were suspended with The Sanctuary on Oct. 8, but Copeland pointed to recent negotiations by one or two aldermen as "suggesting a walking quorum."

He referred to statements by the Mayor in September that the board would work in an open and transparent manner. "We were told that no major decisions would be made without citizens having had ample opportunity to weigh in."

Mayor Skip Blancett interrupted Copeland's comments, which had gone longer than the three minutes that are allowed under

Public Input.

Copeland said that he wanted to make a "point of order" at that point.

Leah Hayes, attorney for the Village of Salado, said that points of order may only come for the members of the body, not from the public.

Darlene Walsh also talked about the need for more public discussions of these important decisions. "Lots of good things can

She referred to a study by Kasberg Patrick Associates of the possibility of tying in to the Temple Belton Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant. "For the most part, that study has not been made available to the public," she said. "There has been very little discussion of the findings of KPA on regionalizations versus the costs of constructing and maintaining a new plant."

"There has been no discussion ever about saving dollars to buy or amend a permit, no discuss of maintenance people, no talk of saving testing and chemical moneys, or facing lawsuits from individuals who do not want to join or land taken by eminent domain," she said.

The Board of Aldermen will meet again at 6:30 p.m. Dec. 10. The board will meet only once in December, according to Mayor Blancett. Blancett told the audience that the usual first Thursday meeting is canceled to allow the community to take part in the Dec. 1 Salado Christmas Parade. The parade starts at 5 p.m. on Dec. 1 and goes from Royal Street to the Salado Civic Center.



#### After Paris, Empty Symbolism

The instant online symbol of global support for Paris after last week's attacks was a roughly rendered peace symbol with an Eiffel Tower in the middle of it. The French designer Jean Jullien sketched it as soon as he heard the news of the atrocity. He called it "Peace for Paris," and it immediately became a sensation on social media. Its success is a sign of the times. We have become experts at treacly online mourning. We take grotesque atrocities and launder them into trite symbols and slogans that are usually self-congratulatory and, of course, wholly ineffectual. The 19th-century author William Dean Howells once said, "Yes, what the American public wants is a tragedy with a happy ending." On social media, the happy ending is the widely shared and tweeted image or hashtag.

After the slaughter at the offices of the satirical French magazine Charlie Hebdo earlier this year, it was "Je suis Charlie," or "I am Charlie." It was a well-intentioned expression of solidarity, so long as you overlooked the absurd presumption of it.

You are Charlie? Oh, OK. Then draw a sketch of Muhammad and post

it online. Better yet, do it over and over again, until you get constant threats and your office is firebombed, just as a warmup. No, you aren't Charlie (for that matter, Charlie isn't even Charlie anymore -it's given up on mocking Islam for understandable safety reasons).

The "Peace for Paris" image is simple and emotive, if inapt. Paris doesn't need to give peace a chance. It doesn't need to make love, not war. It doesn't need to be more understanding or more hopeful. It needs to be better protected by all those unsentimental means that have been neglected in recent years, or overwhelmed by the growing threat of ISIS.

Paris -- and more broadly France and the West -needs more surveillance of suspected terrorists and police raids; a more restrictive immigration policy that doesn't create large, unassimilated Muslim populations, or welcome terrorists as refugees; and a serious, multilayered campaign to destroy ISIS

and deny it the safe havens from which it recruits and trains, and plots against the West.

If someone can come up with a catchy symbol for that, I'll embrace it (although "La Marseillaise" isn't so bad: "To arms citizens/Form your battalions/March, march"). Meanwhile, spare me the #PrayforParis hashtag. Forgive me if I'm unmoved by lighting up world landmarks in red, white and blue, or your putting a tricolor filter on your Facebook profile picture. And please don't tell me, in the words of the designer Jean Jullien, that "in all this horror there's something positive that people are coming together in a sense of unity and peace."

Nothing positive comes from innocents getting shot down in cold blood for the offense of going to a concert on a Friday night. If there aren't going to be more -- and worse -- attacks in our cities, the path ahead won't be one of unity and peace. It will be the hard, thankless work of protecting civilization from its enemies.

The Mayor and Billy Hanks and the partners in the Sanctuary are scheduled to sign the agreements at 6:30 p.m. Nov. 25 at the Municipal Building.

It's my understanding that Dankert voted NO to each Sanctuary Agreement because she could NOT agree to providing eminent domain rights to Billy Hanks, Jr. and Robert Sulaski the developer. For those of you who do not know what Eminent Domain means....in my opinion, the developer would have the right to take real estate property for development means. Payment would be required, of course, but if there is a dispute over the value of property the seller would be obligated to prove value. After going through this same procedure with the State of Texas, I can tell you that proving worth can cost an owner unnecessary thousands of dollars in surveying, attorney, and appraiser fees. So, eminent domain can be akin to a declaration of property "war" on individual property rights. Thank you Alderman Amber Dankert for your bravery in voting NO in an effort to protect individual property rights.

Also, I believe that Alderman Amber Dankert felt the public should have the right to know what's in agreements prior to signing with Mr. Hanks/Sanctuary. Thank you AGAIN Alderman Amber Dankert for your leadership and for your consideration of all Salado taxpayers.

Following are some questions, in my opinion, the public might want answers to before our elected officials obligate taxpayers financially, and otherwise, for decades.

- · What are the final agreement details with Billy Hanks?
- What bills are taxpayers responsible for, and what is Billy Hanks responsible for?
- Must taxpayers, and the Village, support a Public Investment District (PID) so Billy Hank's developer can

pay for infrastructure?

- · How many years, and at what percentage, does Billy Hanks gets tax abatement for houses or retail/ commercial properties?
- Does Billy Hanks have a required schedule of development so we can plan for additional property & sales tax revenues?
- What financial obligations must Village taxpayers pay to Billy Hanks / Sanctuary?
- What, if any, penalties must Billy Hanks pay if no development occurs?
- What type businesses/ housing can be built on Billy Hanks property and will there be opportunity for public input i.e., low income housing, or gas stations/ drive thru's in the Historic District?
- Is there ANY prohibition against Billy Hanks/ Sanctuary building an open air music venue for thousands on the 8 Lakes Property (next to a Village neighborhood of hundreds)
- Sanctuary adhere to the same procedures for zoning and planning required of every other developer in town?

• Must Billy Hanks/

- When does Billy Hanks/Sanctuary ANY of their property?
- When does Billy Hanks provide title to the six or eight acres and for the wastewater plant (WWTP) permit?
- Must the Village WWTP permit be amended? If yes, what is the cost and how long will it take?
- Is it true that the Village must pay for hauling sewage if treatment is not available for Billy Hank's property?
- How long before the user income pays for the operation and maintenance of the WWTP?
- Are engineering and drainage studies by Billy Hanks/Sanctuary required to insure storm water, and/ or wastewater doesn't flood Village neighborhoods or
- Can Billy Hanks continue to claim Agricultural Exemption for land? For how long?
- How long does the Village provide free wastewater to Billy Hanks/Sanctu-

NOTE: Salado, I believe, is on the verge of changing from primarily a tourist destination. The only question is will the residents, business owners, and Village government demand to be part of that change, or will they sit back and sign over our Village's future and its planning to

outside developers? I have tried to inform the Village taxpayers/businesses what's now taking place with Sanctuary, but it's ultimately up to all of you to come to meetings and to speak out. I have tried to encourage the Mayor, and our Alderman, to focus on improving OUR CURRENT Village business districts BEFORE making deals with outside developers. However, in my opinion, they seem intent on reconfiguring our town so that "Town Center" is South and East of our current business districts.

I fear our citizens will wake up too late, however. In my opinion it may take wastewater flowing down Smith Branch Creek flooding Mill Creek homes, or a leak of sewage and/or water runoff down Royal Street, or ever increasing property taxes to pay for the operation and maintenance of our wastewater treatment plant, or maybe our businesses will finally figure out that Sanctuary never did want to become part of our Village.....they want to become our Village. 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

#### The obligatory finesse

#### Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

The obligatory finesse is a play used by declarer to win a trick that he would otherwise surely lose. Because the play is not a favorite to succeed, it is used by declarer more out of desperation than

Consider the North-South spade holding in this hand. The normal way for declarer to start playing this combi nation is to lead a low spade toward the queen in dummy. If the queen holds the trick (marking West with the ace), declarer next returns a spade from dummy and plays low after East produces the ten or jack, hoping West started with the doubleton ace.

Observe that it would be wrong for South to cover the jack or ten with the king because the king would lose to the ace and South would eventually have to lose another spade trick. This maneuver is the so-called obligatory fi-

favorably placed for declarer, it gains him a trick. Occasionally, the defense

can invoke a countermeasure to the obligatory finesse, as in the present deal. South is declarer at four spades, and West cashes the K-A of clubs, then continues with the queen.

If South is allowed to go about his business unimpeded, he will, as we have seen, lose only one trump trick and so make the contract.

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#### But if the defense functions perfectly, South can be defeated. When West leads the queen of clubs, East ruffs with the ten, even though it appears routine to discard on his partner's high club. South is helpless against

this defense. He is forced to overruff with the king -- otherwise, he is down immediately -- and lead a trump toward the queen.

This does him no good because West rises with the ace and returns the ten of clubs. Dummy has to follow suit, whereupon East once again trumps his partner's high club -- this time with the jack -- to secure a one-trick







#### CRANBERRY BAKEWELL TART

Studded with tart cranberries and baked in a whole wheat and almond crust, this spin on a traditional English confection is perfect for filling your kitchen with holiday fragrance. A crust that doesn't require chilling or rolling out makes for quick work.



1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted

butter, softened, plus more for the pan

2 1/2 cup fresh or frozen cranberries, divided

3/4 cup sugar, divided

1/4 cup orange juice

1 1/2 cup plus 3 tablespoons whole wheat pastry flour, divided

1 1/3 cup almond meal, divided

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt, divided 1/4 cup expeller-pressed canola oil

1/4 cup ice-cold water

2 teaspoons finely grated orange zest

1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

1 egg plus 1 egg white

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Butter a 9-inch round tart pan with a removable bottom. Combine 2 cups of the cranberries, 1/4 cup of the sugar and orange juice in a medium saucepan. Place over medium heat, cover and cook for 5 minutes. Uncover, stir well and cook, stirring often, until cranberries have popped, 4 to 5 minutes more. Remove from heat and stir vigorously until jammy.

Meanwhile, in a large bowl, whisk together 1 1/2 cups of the flour, 1/3 cup of the almond meal, baking powder, cinnamon and 1/4 teaspoon of the salt. Add oil and ice-cold water; stir with a fork until a dough forms. Press into bottom and sides of the prepared pan. Spread warm cranberry jam evenly over the bottom.

Combine remaining 1 cup almond meal, 1/2 cup sugar, 3 tablespoons flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt and orange zest in a food processor and pulse until blended. Add butter, vanilla, egg and egg white and purée until smooth. Spread evenly over jam and tuck remaining 1/2 cup cranberries into batter. Place on a baking sheet. Bake until tart is golden brown and just springs back when touched, about 40 minutes. Cool on a wire rack until warm. Gently press on the pan bottom to remove tart. Transfer to a plate and



Spread bread cubes on 2 large baking sheets; let sit on the counter overnight, or bake in a preheated 300°F oven until just dried, about 15 minutes. Transfer to a large bowl. In a large skillet, heat oil and butter over medium heat. Add mushrooms and cook, stirring frequently, until very tender, about 10 minutes. Stir in shallots and celery and cook for 3 minutes more. If using to stuff a turkey, cool completely and follow stuffing directions for your recipe. If baking separately, preheat the oven to 350°F. Spoon stuffing into a large buttered baking dish. Smooth the top and bake until browned and crisp, about 50 minutes.

#### **Expert offers tips for healthy** Thanksgiving dinner

AUSTIN, Texas - On Thanksgiving Day, cooks in homes across the nation are faced with the challenge of setting a table with food that's not just delicious but also safe to

And Amy Simonne, a professor with the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, has a few tips.

She stresses a healthy dinner begins with good preparation, and even though it may seem counter intuitive, she says don't wash your turkey before putting it in the oven.

"It's better for you to minimize handling of the raw poultry," she points out. "Just put (it) in the pan. Cooking can destroy the germs, but washing raw poultry is not going to



Turkey should be cooked to at least 165 degrees to be considered safe.

remove the germs."

Simonne explains that washing your bird can help scatter potentially harmful bacteria across kitchen surfaces, which can end up

in side dishes. She also reminds cooks and all guests to practice good personal hygiene. Wash your hands, and make sure you use serving spoons with long handles

for dishes, just in case someone forgets.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, turkeys should be cooked at a temperature

no lower than 325 degrees. Simonne says don't rely on those plastic indicators - use a food thermometer to make sure the internal temperature reaches at

least 165 degrees.

Simonne says after dinner, cooked foods need to be eaten within two hours. After that, it should be refrigerated or thrown

"If you want to save the turkey, when the turkey is cooled down to, let's say, room temperature, then you need to put that away pretty quickly, let's say within an hour," she advises. "That would be really an ideal time.'

Simonne says you can divide leftovers into small portions and keep them in the refrigerator for three to four days or in the freezer for two to six months.

According to the USDA, food-borne illnesses can lead to longterm health conditions, and are linked to 3.000 American deaths each

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


