Village to begin annexation of two developments

Salado aldermen will begin the voluntary annexation of two developments when they conduct the first public hearing on the annexation of The Sanctuary and Hidden Glen properties at their 6:30 p.m. Dec. 10 meeting.

Property owners of the 276 acres in the extra territorial jurisdiction of Salado that will comprise the majority of The Sanctuary submitted a petition for voluntary annexation into Salado.

JES Development has also submitted a petition for voluntary annexation of the 20 acre affordable housing development known as Hidden Glen.

In regards to the two property annexation requests, the board will discuss and consider taking action on the following steps: 1. adopt a timetable for completing annexation, 2. direct staff to perform activities necessary for the initiation of annexation proceedings; direct staff to develop a Municipal Services Plan; and 4. call for two public hearings.

Aldermen will also consider taking action on the request by The Sanctuary development for approval to pursue forming a Municipal Utility District. This item carried over from earlier meetings when the Village and Sanctuary had postponed discussions of the series of agreements to bring The Sanctuary into Salado and build the wastewater treatment plant on land donated by Billie Hanks and the transfer of the effluent discharge permit from Salado Utility. Under the consent

agenda, aldermen will consider these two items concerning the sewer system and Sanctuary development: 1. Approve agreement with Pape-Dawson Engineers for reimbursement or payment of expenses for engineering and surveyor services for the Village Wastewater Services Improvement Project in an amount not to exceed \$98,000 and 2. Approve agreement with Ron Carroll Surveyors for completion of certain surveying services for the Village Wastewater Services Improvement Project in an amount not to exceed \$10.000.

In other business, aldermen will have a presentation, discussion, and possible action on reconsideration of a variance to Section 4.2b, Protection of Drainage and Creek Areas, of the Subdivision Ordinance in accordance with Ordinance 2008-20 Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance, Section 40 Variance Procedures, for the Creekside Meadow subdivision.

The board will also have a workshop session to discuss the following items:

• Process and approach for review and approval of Standard Operating Procedures and General Orders for the Police Department.

• Land acquisition for a

Sanctuary forum slated Dec. 14

The Village of Salado will conduct a Town Hall Forum at 6:30 p.m. Dec. 14 on agreements recently signed by the Mayor and Sanctuary Development Co.

The Municipal Building is located at 301 N. Stagecoach Drive.

The Forum will include a review of the documents that were signed on Nov. 25, which include a Wastewater Services Agreement, Master Development Agreement, Tourism Marketing Agreement, and Chapter 380 Economic Development Agreement.

There also will be an opportunity for residents to ask questions.

Sanctuary plans a 297acre development south and east of Salado. The development is anticipated to include single- and multi-family residences, retail, restaurant, and hotel development. Sanctuary will donate six acres of land for a wastewater treatment facility as well as a sewer permit from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.

SISD meeting set on transfer policy

Salado ISD will hold an information meeting at 6:30 p.m. Dec. 17 at the Salado Intermediate School regarding the district's Transfer Policy.

Two years ago, Salado eliminated its transfer fee for students. Prior to that, children of employees could transfer without paying the fee.

Since then, Salado now accepts 237 transfers, which is 14 percent of the district's total enrollment of 1,669 students.

Because of the number of transfer students at the high school, Salado High will remain in 4A UIL competition for the 2016-18 biennium. The cut off for 4A Division II is 480 students enrolled in grades 9-12. Salado High School turned in an enrollment of 492 students in October. Of that number, 76 students are transfer students.

Ag CDE team wins first in state

Members of the Salado FFA Chapter traveled to Huntsville Dec. 3-5 to compete in Texas FFA's Leadership Career Development Events.

Salado's Public Relation and Agricultural Advocacy qualified for the state competition by finishing first or second in one of the state's 57 district competitions and first or second in one of ten area competitions. A total of 5,973 entries began the statewide-tournament in 13 different events which reflect classroom instruction in basic leadership skills.

Salado FFA also placed 1st in the Agricultural Advocacy Contest and were named State Champions. Team members included: Nolan Maldonado, Kylee Hubbs, Gabe Kane, Kylar Combs and Casey Williamson. There were 258 teams entered to compete in the agricultural advocacy contest which is a new state record.

They hate what we hold dear

The Paris attacks have occasioned a wide-ranging debate about what they mean and how to respond, involving Islam and its role, military strategy and, oddly enough, how Muslims in New Jersey reacted to Sept. 11 (thanks, Donald Trump). It's all very interesting and, for the most part, quite important.

At bottom, though, the import of the Paris attacks is not complicated: ISIS terrorists are enemies of our civilization.

In Paris, they chose their target well. They assaulted a city that dates back thousands of years and has been a leading Western capital going back to the Capetians, a place representing geological layers of Western civilization, and its glories and conflicts and follies.

To simplify crudely, the Western story began in the 5th century B.C. on an Athenian hillside where people sat and voted on public questions and, over the course of millennia -and with multiple, often clashing sources, from the Romans to the Catholic Church to the Enlightenment -- produced our current liberal dispensation. The West respects the rule of law, which protects the individual from the caprice and degradations of the powerful. It



divides church and state. It governs by the consent of the governed. It honors the dignity -- and the conscience and the rights -- of the individual. It celebrates reason, discovery and creativity, and gives a wide berth to commerce and entrepreneurial ener-

Obviously, this hasn't always been true, and the road to the adoption of these norms has been winding and bloody, sometimes spectacularly so, in great clashes within and among Western powers. But they have created the conditions for stupendous human flourishing.

It is represented in staggering artistic and literary expression, in awe-inspiring scientific, technological and medical advances, and in mind-boggling levels of economic development that mean the average Westerner lives like a sultan compared to the average person throughout most of history. If we are inclined to take any of this for granted, we should have a renewed sense of its wonder and fragility when it is

under attack from barbarism. ISIS embodies a theocratic totalitarianism that seeks to subject the human spirit to its perverted dictates. It kills, in part, as an advertisement for its own vileness and brutality. It gleefully vandalizes ancient cultural treasures, and considers Paris "the capital of prostitution and obscenity.'

We are different, although we aren't ourselves responsible for that. The West is our windfall. None of us were at Runnymede in 1215 or Philadelphia in 1787. None of us contributed a brush stroke to a Rembrandt. None of us invented the steam engine or the iPhone. None of us discovered penicillin or the polio vaccine. None of us fought at Poitiers, and very few of us at Normandy.

If you are not thankful and humbled by all of this, you are an ingrate. Your freedom and material comfort depend on generations of sacrifice and ef-

CALIFORNIA'S INDUSTRIAL FARMERS ARE DOUSING SOME THIRSTY CROPS WITH FRACKING CHEMICALS.

Ask anyone who's lived through California's drought: Water scarcity is getting scary. And banning long showers isn't even a drop in the bucket when it comes to finding a solution.

The biggest water sponge by far is food production, yet agri-giants continue to douse their vast fields like there's no tomorrow. Do you know how much water today's industrialized food system sucks up?

Just one little almond takes 1 gallon. A single walnut? 2 gallons. A head of lettuce? 12. A cluster of grapes clocks in at a whopping 24 gallons.

Here's the worst part: Big Oil says not to worry, because it can offer a gusher of H2O to food producers. Believe it or not, companies are now selling their fracking wastewater to agribusiness for irrigating fruit and vegetable crops.

This is water that Exxon-Mobil and other drillers mix with a witch's brew of some 750 toxic chemicals before power-blasting it into underground rock formations.

The drillers have had to reclaim and store this contaminated water, but - "eu-

reka," as someone must have shouted - rather than store it, they decided to spray it on

America's fruits and vegetables.

It's perfectly safe, the always-trustworthy oil industry tells us, because they treat the water to remove all the nasty, cancer-causing chemicals they use first.

But studies have discovered toxins remaining in some of the "treated" water too, and a California science panel found that state regulators have no adequate testing process, nor any controls in place, to stop the contamination of crops.

Fed up, California Assemblyman Mike Gatto has introduced a bill to require warning labels on all state produce irrigated with fracking water. This would empower consumers, rather than Big Oil, to decide whether fracking chemicals belong on our families' dinner plates. For more information, contact: www. WaterDefense.org.

Debate. It's the hallmark of an open society. We may hold different points of view on a certain topic, but we can express those views freely, without fear of repercussions.

Unless, that is, you dare to question the idea of manmade global warming. That, apparently, puts you beyond the pale. You can insist the 1969 Apollo moon landing was staged, or that 9/11 was an "inside job," and it's "live and let live" time. But disagree with the view that climate change is not only occurring but is caused by human activity, and you invite a stay in a rubber room.

Or a jail cell, to be more precise. That's what 20 academics at such prestigious universities as Columbia, Rutgers and the University of Washington have in mind for those who disagree on climate change. They recently wrote a letter to President Obama and Attorney General Loretta Lynch requesting that dissenters be criminally prosecuted.

How, you may ask? They actually want the government to target climate-change skeptics with the Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations (RICO) Act. That's right. They want to cap the critics with a law created specifically to go after organized crime. Their opponents are no better than drug cartels and the Mafia, apparently.

And why? Because, they claim, the skeptics have "knowingly deceived the American people about the risks of climate change." It's their contention that certain companies and industries know that their activities are causing global warming, but are determined to cov-

that point of view. My question is, if these academics are so certain they have the truth on their side, why are they so concerned about the views of dissenters? Oh, the dissenters slow progress in addressing the problem, the academics reply:



In reality, of course, these academics simply can't abide having anyone disagree with them. So ... away with the skeptics. Make them disappear.

So fierce is their righteous indignation at those who commit environmental heresy that it's blinded them to the fact that their proposal clearly infringes on the free-speech rights of others. And what irony: If anyone should be fostering a free exchange of ideas, it's those who work at our nation's universities. Instead, they're leading the charge against debate. Just ask Philippe Verdier, who for many years was France's chief weatherman. His nightly forecasts have been a national institution. But Philippe isn't on the job anymore. He was dismissed after he wrote in a book that climatologists have "taken the world hostage" with misleading data. "We are hostage to a planetary scandal over climate change -- a war machine whose aim is to keep us in fear," he writes. Whatever the aims of the climate-change crowd, it's obvious that they will not tolerate dissent. The academics who wrote the president insist that "an overwhelming majority of climate scientists are convinced about the potentially serious adverse effects of human-induced climate change on human health, agriculture, and biodiversity." They're wrong about their numbers (many climate scientists disagree with them), but surely they believe it. If so, why worry? If they enjoy an "overwhelming majority," why urge the president to prosecute the tiny fringe that opposes them? Whatever the reason, prosecution is not the answer. If you can't stand the heat in the debate room, don't try and bar the doors to others.

The importance of planning the play can never be overemphasized. To play first and think later is to put the cart before the horse, and all too often a declarer who plays mechanically will have reason to regret a hasty play made earlier.

For example, take this deal where West led a heart against three notrump. Dum my's nine won the first trick, and declarer led a spade to the queen, which also won. The next spade lost to East's ace, and he returned a heart. South played the jack, won by West with the king, and the heart continuation was taken by South's ace. At this point, declarer found himself staring forlornly at dummy's three good spades, and with no way to reach them, he eventually finished down one.

Fueling our Kids and the future: school lunch

In the past three decades, much has changed in our food system and society. Schools aren't purchasing as many fresh foods, yet they have more nutrition requirements to fill. Schools got away from purchasing locally. The number of local farms to purchase edible food from

has become scarce.

Recently, my kids invited me to eat lunch at school. Their school lunch menus show what items are locally sourced. Granted, I get to be a farm to school geek for a living, but to me that also meant an average parent would know that locally grown, fresh food was prepared in their school's kitchen.

Each month seasonal foods are taste-tested in

the classroom. Recipes and shopping tips also come home. Considering cuts to food science and ag classes in many schools, or not learning these basic skills at home... some parents simply do not know how to prepare fresh produce. Farm to School gives us a chance to change this.

When I ate school lunch, I saw a tray of nutritionally dense food. It made me feel good that the school is feeding the kids to perform well.

As a kid growing up in rural America, I could not imagine a world that agriculture and food prep skills weren't a part of. But, today I see how quickly we are losing these skills. Farm to School is a tool for us to use to provide self-sufficiency and a better health legacy to our future keepers of the food system.



Dps offers tips to avoid vehicle theft during the holidays

of Public Safety is reminding Texans about the potential for vehicle thefts during the holiday season and is advising individuals to takes extra precautions to guard against possible auto thefts. Vehicle burglaries are also a concern during the holiday season.

"The holiday season is a busy time for everyone - including criminals; and DPS is urging Texans to do what they can to keep vehicles and valuables safe from possible thieves," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "The months of December and January can be prime times for auto theft and burglaries. lock car doors and store valuables out of sight."

In December 2014, 5,717 automobiles, pickups and motorcycles were recorded stolen, making it one of the highest months for vehicle thefts that year, outside of the summer months. In addition, more than 13,190 vehicle burglaries were reported and \$13.3 million in property stolen last December, also making it one of the highest months that year.

DPS offers the following tips that Texans can follow to help protect against vehicle theft: Never leave your car

running unattended, even

The Texas Department It is important to always for a quick visit to a business or store.

> Never leave keys in the car or ignition, inside a locked garage, or in hidea-key boxes.

> Always roll up your windows and lock the car, even if it is parked at your home.

> When possible, always park in high-traffic, welllighted areas.

> Install an anti-theft device that locks the steering wheel, column or brakes, especially if your vehicle is considered to be at increased risk for theft. Never leave personal documents, vehicle ownership title or credit cards in your vehicle.

Always keep valuables or property hidden out of sight or locked in the trunk.

If your vehicle is stolen, report it to the police immediately. DPS also encourages individuals to keep a copy of their license plate and vehicle identification number on hand in case of theft, since police will need this information to take a report.

Txdot urges drivers to 'plan while you can' for sober rides this holiday season

Impaired driving campaign seeks to curb increase in holiday fatalities due to alcohol

The Texas Department of Transportation's "Plan While You Can" campaign urges party goers to plan for a sober ride this holiday season. The campaign runs through Jan. 1, 2016 and coincides with an increase in DUI patrols and enforcement.

"The holidays are a time of celebration and family, but they also require responsible decisions and planning if alcohol is involved," said TxDOT Executive Director LtGen Joe Weber, USMC (Ret). "Our goal is to save families from the heartbreak of losing a loved one. Finding a sober ride is easy and it can save you from being arrested, injured or killed. There is no excuse for drinking and driving."

During last year's holiday season (Dec. 1, 2014 - Jan. 1, 2015) there were 2,412 alcohol-related traffic crashes in Texas, resulting in 190 serious injuries and 110 fatalities. This was nearly an 8-percent increase in alcohol-related traffic fatalities over the previous holiday season.

Central to the "Plan While You Can" campaign is a statewide tour featuring an interactive dodgeball game that uses custom gaming technology to replicate the effects of alcohol on a person's reflexes. As participants play, virtual drinks are added and the players' on-screen avatars become less able to dodge "snowballs." incoming The game demonstrates how even one drink can slow reaction times.

Additionally, TxDOT is hosting a contest on its Facebook, Twitter and Instagram social media accounts. Participants who tag up to three friends in a tweet or a post with the hashtag #PlanWhileYou-Can will be entered into a giveaway for a donated gift card from a retailer, restaurant or entertainment venue. To enter and learn more, follow TxDOT on its social media accounts.

As always, TxDOT strongly encourages everyone to plan for a sober ride before going out. Visit SoberRides.org to find alternatives to drinking and driving, such as:

Calling a taxi or using a transportation app on your smartphone.


