



Northbound Frontage U-Turn onto Main Street will change Feb. 8

Starting Feb. 8, at 7 a.m., the U-turn off of the northbound frontage road to Main St. will close. Northbound frontage road traffic will drive to the intersection with Main St. and turn right to access downtown Salado on new temporary pavement. Access to Main St. will be maintained. Northbound and southbound traffic, on Main St., will still be able to access downtown. Mill Creek Dr. and Salado Plaza Rd. will continue to have access to Main St. The contractor will be preparing to construct the new northbound frontage road in this area.

Salado will play Waco area schools in new football district

Salado will travel north and east instead of south-east during the next two years of football. The Eagles will play in District 9-4A Div. II football in the 2016 and 2017 seasons. The Eagles will be the smallest school by about 15 students, having turned in an enrollment of 492 students. Other schools in District 9 include Waco Robinson, 712 enrollment, Waco Connally, 660, Lorena, 537, Fairfield, 513, Mexia, 507. For the past two years, Salado has competed in District 11-4A, traveling southeast to play football against Caldwell, Giddings, Smithville and La Grange. The shortest distance Salado traveled was 74.9 miles to Caldwell. Giddings is 78.2 miles away, Smithville is 91 miles away and La Grange is 112 miles away. While Fairfield is an even farther drive than La

Grange at 115 miles, the other schools in Salado's new district are much closer. Mexia is 93.5 miles away, Waco Connally is 58.9 miles away, Robinson is 46.4 miles away and Lorena is 38.8 miles away. The Eagles will play basketball in the same district as last year, with one addition. Leander Glenn High School joins the district with grades 9-10 in 2016-17 and grades 9-11 in 2017-18. Salado and Llano are the smallest schools in District 19-4A with 492 and 493 students respectively. The student enrollment counts really jump after that with Leander Glenn, 815, Burnet, 939, Taylor, 1,007, Lampasas, 1,024 and Liberty Hill, 1,091. With a recorded enrollment of 492 students, Salado is the 10th smallest district in 4A. Salado High has 76 transfer students enrolled this year.

Without those transfer students, Salado would drop to 3A competition, where the Eagles would compete in 3A, Division I in football. Student enrollment for 3A, Div. I is 319-479 students. Without the 76 transfer students, Salado would be smaller than three of the schools competing in District 10-3A Div. I, which is composed of several of Salado's historic rivalry teams, including Jarrell, Academy, McGregor and Troy. District 10-3A, Div. I includes Cameron Yoe, 452 students, 44.3 miles travel distance; Troy, 444 students, 24.9 miles travel distance; Rockdale, 427, 47.5 miles travel distance; McGregor, 413 students, 40.3 miles travel distance; Academy, 406 students, 16.4 miles travel distance, Jarrell, 392 students, 16.4 miles travel distance and Franklin, 348 students and 77 miles travel distance.

The battle for the soul of the right

At the moment, the Republican establishment is relevant to the presidential-nomination battle only as an epithet.

The fight for the Republican nomination isn't so much a vicious brawl between the grass roots and the establishment as it is a bitter struggle between traditional conservatism and populism that few could have foreseen.

Conservatism has always had a populist element, encapsulated by the oft-quoted William F. Buckley Jr. line that he would rather be governed by the first 2,000 names in the Boston phone book than by the Harvard faculty. But the populism was tethered to, and in the service of, an ideology of limited-government constitutionalism.

The fight between Ted Cruz and Donald Trump is over whether that connection will continue to exist, and whether the conservatism (as represented by Cruz) or the populism (as represented by Trump) will be ascendant. Cruz did all he could as long as possible to accommodate Trump, but now that the fight between them is out in the open, the differences are particularly stark.

Cruz is a rigorous constitutionalist. He's devoted

much of his career to defending the Constitution and has argued numerous cases before the Supreme Court. Trump has certainly heard of the Constitution, but he may know even less about it than he knows about the Bible.

Although Cruz is more flexible than his reputation suggests, he has the long baseline of consistency that you would expect from a genuine believer in a political philosophy. Trump has a few long-running themes and bugaboos, but has been all over the map on almost everything and sometimes will meander from one position to another within the same answer, in keeping with his lack of ideological anchor (and limited knowledge of policy).

The two have completely different political styles. Trump is instinctual and has a roguish charm, whereas Cruz is earnest and tightly disciplined. If almost everything about Trump is unconventional, Cruz is outwardly a very traditional politician.

The irony of Cruz's position now is that, despite

all his outsider branding, he is not getting savaged by the establishment. It is Trump who calls him a hypocrite and a liar. It is Trump who says he's a nasty guy and a maniac with a temperament problem. And it is Trump, of course, who constantly raises doubts about his eligibility to serve as president.

If you guessed a key event in the nomination fight would be the "othering" of the most potent tea-party conservative in the country by a billionaire businessman with a long trail of liberal positions and a history of praising President Barack Obama -- well, then, you forecast the GOP race perfectly.

In short, Cruz is under assault from a segment of the anti-establishment, although Cruz takes every opportunity to portray himself as the victim of the machinations of dastardly political insiders. The reality is that the establishment is sitting on its hands, agonizing over whom it loathes least, Trump or Cruz, while the fight between populism and conservatism rages.

The battle for the soul of the GOP is now a battle for the soul of the right.

Curbside Recycling has been a huge success. In 2014 you brought 10.5 tons of mixed recycling (cardboard/plastic/paper) and 4.3 tons of metal (tin and aluminum) to the Keep Salado Beautiful Recycle Center. We converted to curbside recycling and in 2015 you saved 32 tons of mixed material and 9 tons

Refinancing makes sense

Last week we successfully refinanced \$3.135 million of previous bonds from an interest rate of 4.00% to an interest rate of 1.44%. This will save the taxpayers of our school district between \$29,325 and \$34,900 per year for the next eight years, for a total savings of \$255,100.

This is the fourth time in the last five years that we have refinanced previous bonds to a lower interest rate.

These bonds were refinanced at different times because bonds have to be in existence for at least ten years before they are eligible to be refinanced. As a result of all four of these bond refinances, the taxpayers of Salado will save a total of \$3,138,337.

These savings have helped us reduce the Salado ISD tax rate. Our

school district tax rate is now the lowest it has been in the last fifteen years. In fact, in the last twenty-five years (since the 1990-1991 school year) there is only one school year (1997-1998) in which we had a lower tax rate than our current rate. Our tax rate is also lower than the majority of the other school dis-

tricts in Bell County. This recent refinancing of bonds will hopefully allow us to lower our tax rate again next year. While we are very proud of the excellent education that we provide to our students, we also work very hard to be good stewards of the taxpayers' hard earned dollars that pay for our students' education.

Manna from Hell

Many go to war and die, but a few go to war and thrive. So, see, it balances out.

had agreed to play transfer bids, he mistakenly decided that North was asking him to bid the next higher-ranking suit, so he bid six diamonds.

Realizing that South had misunderstood the six-club bid, North retreated to six notrump. West led a spade, and declarer had no option but to play low from dummy.

After winning with the queen and cashing his clubs and hearts, declarer took a second spade finesse to bring the slam home for a score of 1,440 points.

At the second table, South became declarer at three notrump, rather than six, and West had no trouble finding the normal lead of his fourth-best diamond. East-West quickly collected five diamond tricks, so South went down one for a loss of 100 points.

We're not sure if there's a moral here, so we'll just say that sometimes the scales of justice seem to be tipped the wrong way.
