GOP voters return two local lawmen

Bell County Sheriff Eddy Lange staved off two opponents in the Republican Primary, earning 55.14 percent of the votes while Constable Rolly Correa defeated former Constable Roger Laird in the Precinct 2 race on March 1.

Neither Lange nor Correa will have a Democrat opponent in November.

Shay Luedecke will be the new County Tax Assessor-Collector after winning the Republican primary with 62.63% of the vote.

Ted Cruz had a good night in his home state, earning 30 delegates in his bid for the Republican Presidential nomination, tallying more than 1.2 million votes. Donald Trump followed with 752,334 votes for 17 delegates. Meanwhile on the Democrat side, Hillary Clinton earned 32 delegates with 918,491 votes to Bernie Sanders' 16 delegates with 467,641 votes.

U.S. Rep. John Carter defeated Mike Sweeney in the Republican Primary and will face Democrat challenger Mike Clark in November.

Scott Cosper and Austin Ruiz will face each other in a run-off to be the Republican nominee for the State Representative, District 54. Cosper led with 42.60 percent of the vote and Ruiz had 39.55 percent. The winner will face Democrat Sandra Blankenship in November.

Susan King and Dawn Buckingham will face off in a runoff for the Republican nominee for State Senator, District 4. The winner will face Demo- April 24.

crat Virginia 'Jennie Lou' Leeder in November.

At the state level, there will be run-offs for the Republicans for Judge Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2 between Ray Wheless and Mary Lou Keel; Judge Court of Criminal Appeals Place 5 between Scott Walker and Brent Webster and for Railroad Commissioner between Gary Gates and Wayne Christian.

The only run-off election for Bell County Democrats is in the Railroad Commissioner race where Cody Garrett and Grady Yarbrough will face each other.

Early voting in the primary run-offs will be May 16-20 with the election day voting on May 24. The last day to register to vote in the primary run-offs in

Gov. Gregg Abbott, Senator John Cornyn and U.S. Rep. John Carter will be on hand for the dedication of the 5 November, 2009 Fort Hood Memorial at the Killeen Civic & Conference. Salado artist Troy Kelley invites local friends and organizations in Salado to the formal ceremony and dedication 3 p.m. March 11 at the Killeen Civic & Conference Center, 3601 S. W.S. Young Drive in Killeen.

Kelley began work on the idea shortly after the mass shooting in which 13 victims were killed and another 31 wounded.

Ground was broken some five years later in 2014 on the memorial which was designed by

Kelley. Kelley created a sculpture to honor each of the 13 victims killed in the shooting, using objects and symbols that were dear to them. He met with family members and gathered the momentos together before sculpting each into a memorial for the victim.

The sculptures sit on black granite columns around the perimeter of the memorial, which has a pyramid at its center with an American flag from its

"It's been a labor of love," said Kelley. "Each sculpture represents an individual. Please go ahead and touch them. Eventually, the favorite places to be touched on the objects will become shiny."

Unlock Terrorist's Phone

The FBI wants access to the iPhone of San Bernardino terrorist Syed Rizwan Farook, and Apple CEO Tim Cook is resisting and putting his refusal in apocalyptic terms. Should Apple comply with a judge's order to help the FBI, we're supposed to believe, it will have created the privacy equivalent of a doomsday device, making everyone vulnerable to the intrusions of government and depredations of hackers and criminals.

This is trite marketing -- only Apple can save us from Big Brother, and by the way, please keep buying our phones -- masquerading as bravery.

In the San Bernardino case, one wonders whose privacy Apple thinks it's protecting. As former prosecutor Andrew Mc-Carthy notes, Farook is dead. There is no doubt that the government has probable cause to search his phone. And the phone in question didn't even belong to him. It is the property of his former employer, the San Bernardino County Department of Public Health, which had the right to search it at will and is fine with the FBI gaining access to it.

Apple wants to give the impression that the key to Farook's phone is the key

to the kingdom, but it's not so. As Timothy Lee explains on the website Vox, the FBI doesn't need to defeat the encryption on Farook's phone and thus, in theory, endanger the encryption on other phones. It just needs to get into the phone. For that, it needs to get past the first line of defense, the device's pass-

This is possible through what is called "brute force." A robot can punch in every possible combination until the phone unlocks. Except the iPhone has security features to defeat anyone who doesn't know the passcode. The FBI wants Apple to change the software on Farook's phone so it can force the device open.

This isn't Armageddon. As Lee writes, "Apple has tacitly admitted that it can modify the software on Farook's iPhone to give the FBI access without damaging the security of anyone else's iPhone." No one is going to have his or her privacy compromised because the FBI, in this one instance, with heroic technological exertions,

gets into a dead terrorist's phone.

Apple's position is basically, Don't worry about ISIS, don't worry about tracking down every possible lead in a terrorism case. Worry about what cooperating with the government might do to the company's reputation, and about a parade of horribles that might ensue if we slide from here several miles down a slippery slope.

If Apple wants to avoid getting coerced by Congress into building a real "backdoor" to all its software, a much larger and more fraught proposition, it has embarked on a foolish course by choosing such an unsympathetic test case. The chances are high that Apple will be seen to be acting unreasonably -since it is acting unreasonably.

Apple's contribution to American life is a product that is almost impossible to live without. The company is synonymous with sleek and cool, and has an enormous reservoir of goodwill. It shouldn't diminish it by staking out an indefensible position and elevating it to faux high principle. Unlock Syed Rizwan Farook's phone. Rich Lowry is editor of the National Review. Leopard Frog

Leopard Frog often called a True Frog

Taxonomists are the group of scientists who attempt to neatly classify animals into categories. This group of scientists can be classified themselves as either "splitters" (those who believe that slight morphological differences such as pattern or color separate otherwise identical animals into species or subspecies) and "lumpers" (those who believe that slight morphological differences are nothing more than clinal variation). Without good research involving DNA, I tend to be more of a "lumper" and the species of frog depicted today is a prime example of why I lean that direction.

Plains Leopard Frogs (Rana blairi) and Rio Grande Leopard Frogs (Rana berlandieri) both belong to a family that has eight representatives here in Texas. This particular frog family is known as the "true" frogs based on their long legs, extraordinary jumping ability and habitat selection. As with other members of this family, Leopard Frogs prefer to live in areas of permanent water such as lakes, ponds, rivers, and creeks, and cattle stock tanks are also frequented. Specimens are often seen basking on or along the shorelines, and many will take refuge in the footprints left by cattle and horses that have come to the tank to quench

their thirst. The Plains Leopard Frog occurs from Lake Michigan westward to the Dakotas, then southward to the panhandle region of Texas. The Rio Grande Leopard Frog occurs from the southern panhandle of Texas westward through southern New Mexico and then southward to San Luis Potosi, Mexico. Neither range further eastward in Texas than the Hill Country. As currently recognized, the separation of these two "species" is roughly divided by the I-20 corridor.

The dorsal coloration of



this medium sized complex of frog can vary from tan to brown to even green. What is consistent is the leopard-like array of light brown or dark brown spots that adorn the back, giving this group its common name. The front legs are short, and are generally flecked with dark spots. The back legs are disproportionately long, with feet that are extensively webbed. There is no webbing on the front feet, nor are there any toe-pads. The eardrums are exposed on the side of the head and are known as the tympani. One of the characteristics that has been used to separate these two frogs has been the presence of a light spot in the middle of the tympani of the Plains version, while the Rio Grande version lacks such a spot. However, throughout the entire known range of the Rio Grande variety, I have witnessed a tympani spot in the Rio Grande group. The skin is smooth, save for a prominent light colored skin ridge that runs along the head from the back of the eye to just above the back leg.

Adult females are slightly the larger with mature individuals approaching four and one half inches in body length. Males are smaller, seldom exceeding three inches. Differentiating males from females can be problematic at best. Generally, males during breeding will have their vocal sacs under their chins extended, having the appearance of folds of skin under the chin.

Like other amphibians, Leopard Frogs live a dual life. Like most frog species, breeding is initiated by the late spring thunderstorms that generally occur. The breeding call of the male is distinctive, and can best be described as a series of loud two to

three snores or clucks. Once a receptive female approaches the male, he will clasp the female around the waist and externally fertilize the thousand or so eggs. This activity is known as amplexus. Once the eggs hatch, the fishlike tadpoles are primarily herbivorous, although they have been known to feed on small waterliving invertebrates and even tadpoles of other species. Leopard Frog tadpoles are large, growing up to three inches in total length. They are typically brown, with a reticulated pattern of spots on the tail. Metamorphosis can occur quickly (several weeks) or be prolonged, up to several months. The time parameters are chiefly dependant upon things such as water quality, pH levels, heat, and drought. Eventually, all the tadpoles metamorph into small froglets, developing air-breathing lungs rather than gills, absorbing the tail, and

developing legs. Leopard Frogs alert and shy, and can be extremely difficult to approach too closely, especially during the day. Once they hop into the water for safety, watch for them to emerge at the surface several feet from the shoreline. However, they are quite approachable at night, and many will sit completely still when the light from a flashlight is pointed in their eyes. To observe this group of frog, look along the shores of just about any permanent body of water throughout the Panhandle and west Texas.


This complex is still hunted for biological studies, and hundreds of thousands are dissected in classrooms throughout the United States annually, but populations appear to be stable.


