Salado ISD is one of two school districts in Bell County to have a rating of 4.5 stars from the Texas Smart Schools Initiative. Troy ISD also had a rating of 4.5 stars.

The ratings were announced recently. Statewide, there were 44 five-star charter and public school districts in 2016. Another 104 districts earned 4.5 stars. Of the 44 five-star districts, 28 held that rank last year as well.

Salado ISD and Troy ISD both showed High Academic Progress and Very Low Spending per student to achieve the rating.

Texas school districts function in widely varying cost environments. Making direct financial comparisons among them would not be fair or appropriate. Instead, this study evaluates each district and campus against those identified as "fiscal peers", districts and campuses that operate in a similar cost environment, are of similar size and serve similar students. Many factors

Salado ISD showed High Academic Progress by scoring at or above 72 percentile of districts that were its Fiscal Peers.

To identify Fiscal Peers and Academic Progress, TXSmartSchools uses recognized statistical methods to create better, more apples-to-apples, comparison measures for spending and academic growth.

Despite being the wealthiest school district in Bell County in terms of property wealth per student, Salado ISD spends the least amount per students, according to the TXSmartSchools data, with an adjusted amount of \$7,988 per student in spending.

The Salado High School campus, which was ranked as a three-star campus, spends the most per student, \$8,113. The Junior High campus, also ranked as a three-star campus, spending \$5,761 per student. The Intermediate School, rated at four stars, spends \$4,832 per student. Bartlett ISD is the highest spending per student district in Bell County, with an adjusted amount of \$11,353.33 per student.

Combs troller Susan launched the Texas Smart Schools Initiative, a data integration platform that empowers Texas parents and educators to identify schools that are getting the "best bang for the buck" when it comes to spending and student performance. With expenses underwritten by funds remaining from Combs' various political campaigns, the data is offered to all, free of charge.

"Public education is one of the largest items in the state budget, so Texans need to know where their dollars are getting the highest return in terms of student performance," said Combs, a longtime transparency advocate. "With this platform, parents can find out which schools are beating expectations and educators can find peers whose success makes them worth emulating. It's truly an initiative that lends itself to the common good."

The program has its roots in the Financial Al-

location Study for Texas (FAST), a program created by the 81st Texas Legislature, which directed then-Comptroller Combs to "identify school districts and campuses that use resource allocation practices that contribute to high academic achievement and cost-effective operations." The resulting site and its innovative "FAST Tracker" tool proved useful to constituents across the state.

Texas Smart Schools, considered "FAST 2.0" by some observers, is the next generation of the concept, leveraging more complex data and enhanced processing to paint an even clearer picture of where educators and students are truly performing at the top of their class.



The Trump-Sanders Two-Step

The upshot of the Bernie Sanders and Donald Trump phenomena is that both parties are moving to the left.

Sanders' and Trump's styles and affects are very different -- the rumpled, oddball lecturer in Socialism 101 vs. the boastful, power-tie-wearing business mogul -- but they have worked in tandem to ensure that the center of gravity in this fall's presidential election will be further to the left than it has been in decades.

By seizing the initiative in their race from the beginning to what looks like an increasingly bitter end, Bernie Sanders has made Hillary Clinton, the cautious inheritor of a family political legacy built on centrism, into the mouthpiece of a watered-down version of his left-wing populism.

No matter how much Bernie Sanders hates the banks, Hillary Clinton despises them just as much (past paydays standing).

In effect, Sanders and Trump have executed a squeeze play on the Madam Secretary. Sanders pushed her to the left on trade and Social Security in the primary, when she disavowed the Trans-Pacific Partnership that she helped negotiate and embraced increasing Social Security benefits. probably won't be snap-

ping back to the center on those issues in a general election because it would open her up to Sanders-like attacks from Donald Trump.

If the grass-roots movement that Sanders has built will pressure Democrats all the way to the Philadelphia convention and beyond, Trump has arguably done more to pull the country's politics portside. He has, for now, managed to do what the Democrats and the media have been attempting for most of the Obama era: to kill off the tea party as a national

By dividing it, eclipsing it and making its animating concerns of limited government and constitutionalism into afterthoughts, Trump has neutered a heretofore potent vehicle against Big Government. With or without Sanders, the Democrats were going to drift in a more progressive direction. It was far from inevitable, though, that the Republican Party would de-emphasize its opposition to growth in the size of government. That is entirely the doing of Trump.

The irony is that an era of Republican politics

characterized by insistence on doctrinal purity and anger at Beltway dealmaking is ending with Trump at the helm of the GOP. It's a little like the agitation of the French Revolution, all aimed at achieving more liberte, egalite, fraternite, concluding in the rule of Napoleon Bonaparte.

However ideologically indistinct Trump was during the primaries, he has gotten fuzzier since becoming the presumptive nominee. The lazy line on Donald Trump is that he's a far-right populist. Not at all. He's a centrist populist.

The key to moving the GOP to the center wasn't high-minded scolding about its tone and unreasonableness, as Jon Huntsman, John Kasich and Jeb Bush all attempted, but an extremely combative tone and a few signature unreasonable positions. Once Trump established his reputation as a bomb-thrower, it didn't matter that he was to the left of everyone else in the

Between Sanders moving Clinton further from the center and Trump moving the GOP toward it, the socialist and the mogul have forced American politics to take a collective step to the left. Rich Lowry is editor of the Na-



Central Texas Food Bank formerly Capital Area Food Bank of Texas doubles capacity to serve

On June 1, the Capital Area Food Bank of Texas will officially become the Central Texas Food Bank, a change that emphasizes the organization's commitment to serving everyone in its vast 21-county service territory. With the new name comes a new logo and color palette designed to illustrate the

Food Bank's emphasis on distributing the freshest and healthiest food possible. The rebranding coincides with the Food Bank's mid-June move into its new 135,000 square foot facility that will more than double its capacity to serve the growing need for hunger relief in Central

Texas.

The Food Bank was founded in 1981 by a small group of Austinites who recognized the need for food assistance in the area. In that first year, the Food Bank distributed just 330,000 pounds of food most of it canned goods, beans, rice and peanut butter. Since then, the organization has grown from serving just Austin to a 21 county territory that's twice the size of Massachusetts and home to over 470,000 children, seniors and adults facing hunger. Last year the Food Bank distributed almost 34 million pounds of food, onethird of which was fresh produce, yet still fell short of meeting demand by an

estimated 30%. "The name change underscores our commitment to serving everyone in our 19,000 square mile service territory," said Hank Perret, President and CEO of the Central Texas Food Bank. "With the help of our nearly 250 Partner Agencies, we are on the front lines of hunger relief in Central Texas from San Saba to Fairfield and from Waco to Luling. And our new stylized carrot logo illustrates our emphasis on distributing the freshest and healthiest food possible."

On June 20, the Food Bank will officially begin operating out of its new facility located at 6500 Metropolis Drive in the Met Center. The new facility features 2.5 times the dry storage space, seven times the refrigeration and freezer capacity, a commercial kitchen and 15 loading docks -up from just two


in the current building. "Our increased capacity comes at a crucial time," said Perret. "As the population of Central Texas continues to swell, so do the challenges faced by many of our neighborschallenges that often force them to make difficult choices between paying rent, buying medication or putting food on the table. This new facility will be a big step in helping us close the hunger gap."



Salado Eagles face the 3, 10-0) is ranked #8 in state, leaving just two of the eight Region finalists outside of the Texas High School Baseball Coaches May 19 top 10 rankings: Salado (27-11, 9-1) and Little Cypress-Mauriceville (24-10, 7-8).

Salado and Sweeny have faced one familiar opponent this season, both winning two out of the three games they played. Salado beat the Taylor Ducks 1-0 on April 8, lost 5-1 on April 26 and won the rubber match to determine the 25-4A championship 1-0. Sweeny beat the Ducks in the Area round of the playoffs. After losing the first game 2-1, Sweeny bounced back to thrash the Ducks 10-0 and 13-4 to advance.

Sweeny beat the Robstown Cottonpickers in three (3-1, 1-10, 8-2) to get to the Region IV Final. Robstown was ranked #7 in state at the time of the loss, ending their season at 29-7 and 12-2 in district.

The Bulldogs return six players from last year's 24-8-1, 8-2 Regional Quarterfinalist squad. Head Coach David Luster has two years' experience at the helm, earning 52 career wins.

Returning starters for the Bulldogs include Hayden Fails, senior outfielder and catcher. Fails batted .208 with 18 RBIs last year, earning third team All-State honors. Senior catcher and pitcher Shawn Kelley received All-State honorable mention. He hit .260 with 21 RBIs last year. Senior shortstop and pitcher Docy Erickson hit .318 last year with 18 RBIs. Senior infielder and pitcher Jacob Mathis also earned All-State honorable mention. He hit .323 and had 23 RBIs. Senior outfielder Dax McCleary batted .231 with 10 RBIs. Senior pitcher and outfielder Jonathan Svoboda was named the District pitcher of the year with 49 strikeouts. He also hit .328.

Wilk led the squad with three hits while Dunnahoo had two hits. Wolf and Dobbins also recorded hits in the game.



At the San Angelo Nature Center, we have a topic each month on which we focus. This month, it is on a type of insect that is often maligned due to it's ability to cause injury and yet surprisingly beneficial.

The European Honey Bee (Apis mellifera) is a species that can be encountered almost worldwide, with the exception being the Antarctic region. In Texas, this Honey Bee occurs statewide, regardless of the myriad of climates and habitats that this state offers. This species was introduced to America by European set-

Her job is to lay pairs of legs, as well as eggs, and what a job of this three body parts. The front she does. The second type of bee is the drones. These drones are the males (or fathers) of the hive. Their primary duty is to reproduce. There may be only a few hundred drones in each hive. The third type of bee is the worker bee. These are the backbone of the hive as they have more job responsibilities than the other types. They are all female, and they feed the babies (as well as the queen), they guard the nest, and they find nectar and pollen. Worker bees have pollen baskets on their legs that they utilize to carry the pollen from flowers back to the hive.

The last type of bee is the larvae. These larvae begin their life as a tiny egg laid in a cell made of wax. When they hatch, they look like small grubs and this is the part of the life cycle when they are known as larvae (plural for larva). As the larvae eat the food provided by the worker bees, they grow larger and become a pupa. The last step of this metamorphosis is when the adult bee crawls out of the

The primary diet of the Honey Bee is sugary nectar and powdery pollen, both which are collected by the worker bees as they visit flowers. Individual bees may visit fifty or more flowers in one trip to and from the hive. This spreads pollen from one flower to another, assisting the flowers to make more seeds and fruits. A worker bee detects a flower and lands on it. It then collects nectar inside of the flower by sucking it up with its tongue as it

combs the pollen into the


pollen baskets on its legs

and flies away either to the

next flower or back to the

Worker bees use two special dance routines to alert other bees where nectar is located. The first, known as the "round dance" is performed when the food is within one hundred and ten yards from the hive. The second is known as the "waggle dance", and this performance is utilized to communicate that the food is farther away. These dances can tell the other workers not only how far to go, but also which direction the

food is. Honey is utilized not only by the bees themselves, but also by humans. Uses include food, as well as medicinal purposes. More honey is made in China than any other country, followed by the United States.

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





Are you signing up for a home security scam?

Tips to keep in mind when door-to-door sales representatives knocking

WACO, Texas—If you live in a home, chances are you have talked to a sales representative eager to sell you cleaning supplies, cosmetics or magazine subscriptions. This summer. Better Business Bureau serving Central, Coastal, Southwest Texas and the Permian Basin advises you to be on guard the next time a sales representative knocks on your door.

During the spring and summer months, home security systems or alarm businesses hire traveling sales agents to go doorto-door, according to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC). In some cases, these sales representatives will use high-pressure or deceptive sales tactics to get potential customers to buy expensive home security systems or equipment.

According to the Texas Attorney General, under Texas law, a door-to-door seller must advise you verbally and in writing that you have a right to cancel the sale within three days. The sales representative must also give you a contract or receipt stating the date of the sale, the name and address of the merchant and a statement of your right to cancel the contract, which includes the address where you send your cancellation notice.

Unfortunately, scammers have also been known to pose as home security sales representatives. These scammers are after your personal and financial information, or

they may be casing your home for a potential burglary. Summer is an active time for this type of activity because many residents are home during the day to answer the door.

If a sales representative comes to your door, your BBB advises the following:

Know who you are buying from. Before you open your door or let anyone into your home, ask to see a photo ID, business card and some proof of the business they're representing. Also, ask for a physical address and for local references.

Do your research. Look up the business online and get references from your friends, family, neighbors or from the company's current clients. For a business you can trust, check out BBB's Accredited Business directory at checkbbb.org.

Resist pressure to "buy now." One sign of a security system scam is a sales representative that may pressure their way into your home and then refuse to leave. Don't be pressured to take advantage of a time-sensitive offer, like "once in a lifetime" or "today only." Instead, do some comparison shopping and take time to decide whether you want the product being sold.

Get written estimates. A reputable business won't try to sell you anything before completing a professional assessment of your needs and layout of your home. Ask plenty of questions, and find out

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White Grubs in Texas Turfgrass

White grubs are the larval stage of insects commonly known as May or June beetles (or Junebugs). Texas has almost 100 species of these beetles, most of which do not cause significant economic damage

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to crops or horticultural plantings. A few species, however, commonly damage turfgrass and other cultivated plants.

White grubs, sometimes referred to as grubworms, injure turf by

underground plant parts. Damaged areas within lawns lose vigor and turn brown. Severely damaged turf can be lifted by hand or rolled up from the ground like a carpet.

feeding on roots and other

The most important turfgrass- infesting white grubs in Texas are the June beetle, Phyllophaga crinita and the southern masked chafer, Cyclocephala lurida. Warm season grasses like bermudagrass, zoysiagrass, St. Augustinegrass and buffalograss are attacked readily by both types of white grubs, with most lawn damage occurring during summer and fall months.

Cool season grasses such as the fescues, bluegrass and ryegrass are also susceptible to the June beetle and southern masked chafer, though such grasses tend to be attacked more frequently by a May beetle, Phyllophaga congrua. Damage from May beetles often appears in the spring and early summer, before injury from other white grubs becomes evident.

Most turfgrass-feeding white grubs in Texas, such as the June beetle and southern masked chafer, require 1 year completing their life cycle (a 2-year cycle is suspected in a portion of the grub populations in north Texas). The May beetle, Phyllophaga congrua, requires 2 years to develop. For simplicity, the following discussion will be limited to species

Life Cycle

with 1-year life cycles. Once a year, in late spring or summer, adult beetles emerge from the soil to mate. Mated females then return to the soil to lay eggs. Within about two weeks the eggs hatch into small white grubs that feed on grass roots. The pupa, or intermediate stage between the larva and the adult, occurs the following spring and is the last immature phase of the insect's development cycle. Adults subsequently emerge from the pupal stage when environmental turf does not grow vigor-

conditions are favorable in early- to mid-summer. Most damage from white grubs occurs during midsummer to early-fall when the larger larvae are actively feeding.

Adult. The adult stage of the various white grub species are heavy-bodied beetles, 1/2 to 5/8 inch long, brown, with long, spindly legs. The June beetle and southern masked chafer emerge from the soil and fly at night, usually after a significant rainfall or irrigation. Flight periods may last for several weeks, during which time mating and egg-laying occur. During flights, large numbers of adult beetles, primarily males, may be attracted to lighted windows or other lights at night. Females, being less active fliers, usually are less common around lighted areas than are males. For this reason, turning off outdoor lights during adult flight periods may not sub- stantially reduce subsequent white grub damage. Heavy white grub infestations often can be found in areas with little or no outdoor lighting.

After mating, female beetles dig 2 to 5 inches into the soil to lay eggs. Each female can lay up to 30 to 40 eggs, which hatch in approximately two weeks.

Larva. White grub larvae are creamy white and C-shaped, with three pairs of legs. After hatching, the white grub passes through three larval life-stages, or instars. These instars are similar in appearance, except for their size. Firstand second-instars each require about 3 weeks to develop to the next lifestage. The third-instar actively feeds until cool weather arrives. Thirdinstar larvae are responsible for most turfgrass dam- age due to their large size (1/2 to 1 inch-long)and voracious appetites. Feeding by large numbers of third- instar white grubs can quickly destroy turfgrass root systems, preventing efficient uptake of food and water. Damaged

ously and is extremely susceptible to drying out, especially in hot weather.

When cool weather arrives, white grubs become dormant until the following spring. During this dormant period white grubs do little or no feeding and cause little dam- age. Occasionally white grubs will be found in turfgrass areas that fail to green up in the spring; however, the damage is primarily the result of feeding that occurred the previous fall. Spring and winter treatments for white grubs with 1-year life cycles generally are ineffective in preventing turf damage.

Pupa. The pupal stage follows the third-instar and is the life stage during which the white grub trans- forms, or metamorphoses, into an adult beetle. The pupal stage does not consume food and does not move through the soil. This life stage occurs during the spring and lasts approximately 3 weeks. Pupae can be found in small earthen cells three to six inches below the soil surface. White grub treatments applied during the pupal life stage are both ineffective and unnecessary.

Managing White Grubs

Knowing when you have a problem. White grub damage can be detected by the presence of irregular-shaped areas of weakened or dying grass in the lawn. Less- severely damaged turf lacks vigor and is more vulnerable to invasion by weeds. Depending on location within the state, damage may appear any time between the months of June and October. Turfgrass damaged by white grubs has a reduced root system and is easily pulled from the soil. Grubs should be readily found in the top few inches of soil, in the turfgrass root zone. Turfgrass usually recovers from white grub damage by fall or the following

At least one turfgrass disease, Take-all Patch, can sometimes be mistaken for white grub damage. Take-all Patch occurs most frequently in spring and early summer and can be distinguished by the rotted appearance of the roots. In contrast with white grub damage, dead spots caused by Take-all Patch may persist into the summer months.

Some Texas lawns never suffer white grub damage, while others are damaged year after year. If your lawn consistently dies out in patches during late summer and if you can verify that white grubs are the culprits, you may benefit from a preventative treatment. On the other hand, if you want to minimize your use of insecticides and don't mind sampling for white grubs. By confirming that you have white grubs before treating your yard, you can avoid spending money on grub control and reduce pesticide use.

Non-chemical controls. Several non-chemical treatments are avail- able controlling white for grubs. Beneficial nematodes within the genera Steinernema and Heterorhabditis are tiny worms that attack white grubs and other soil inhabiting insects. These microscopic worms can be purchased in stores or through garden supply catalogs.

Chemical control

Not all lawns, athletic fields, or golf courses require regular treatment for white grubs. Infestations of five to ten grubs per square foot is considered the threshold above which damage occurs, and though it is possible to sample for white grubs to determine whether treatment is needed, few people want to dig up areas to sample for these insects. Consequently, for turf that has high value or has a history of white grub damage, annual treatment may be justified.

Most of today's white grub preventative insecticides have relatively long persistence in the soil;

who will perform the installation and monitor the system. Some businesses subcontract work to a third party. Remember, don't let anyone who hasn't made an appointment into your home. If an estimation or installation needs to be done, call the business directly to make an appointment.

Know your rights. The Texas Business & Commerce Code states that you have three days to cancel a contract for goods or services sold to you, regardless of whether you have received the goods or ser-

vices. This "cooling-off rule" only applies to transactions made at someone's home or at a seller's temporary location. Keep your receipt or contract and a copy of your cancellation notice. Remember, you are not obligated to return goods to the seller until you have recovered either your money or your agreement to pay money.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A FEE TO DEFRAY COSTS OF COLLECTING DELINOUENT FINES, FEES, COURT COSTS, AND OTHER DEBTS PURSUANT TO ARTICLE 103,0031 OF THE TEXAS **CODE OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE.**

This ordinance imposes a 30-percent fee on delinquent municipal court fines and other debts to the Village of Salado.
