Aldermen mull Strategic Plan, property tax

Salado aldermen will discuss an ad valorem tax during their meeting 6:30 p.m. March 20, following a decision that the board will make at 6:30 p.m. March 6 whether to enter into a contract with the Central Texas Council of Governments (CTCOG) to prepare a Strategic Plan for the Village.

Mayor Rick Ashe and aldermen met with representatives of the Central Texas Council of Governments Jan. 8 and Feb. 26 to explore the development of a Strategic Plan.

The Strategic Plan will identify the goals adopted by the board of aldermen to be accomplished for the Village, rank their importance and identify them as short, medium and long range in nature.

The process will cover several months. Part of this activity will be a survey of the Village. The cost of the proposed contract has not been released yet.

Aldermen will discuss the Strategic Plan at their 6:30 p.m. March 6 meeting at the Municipal Building.

They will discuss and consider adopting a property tax 6:30 p.m. March 20. As a type B municipality, the maximum tax rate that the Village could adopt is 25 cents per \$100 valuation.

"The reason a property tax is being explored is because the Mayor and Alderman are having a difficult time satisfying the expectations of the Village with the funds that are available," stated Forrest Holloway. "A significant road maintenance

program needs to be developed and the funds are just not available to support such a program."

The general maintenance of the Village grounds currently consists of only one person to maintain the park, which includes setting up the park for special events, repairing potholes, mowing community areas and assisting with keeping Salado clean and pristine.

Nine primary goals will be developed in the Strategic Plan, financed by the additional revenue of an ad valorem tax. With over \$100 million in property values in the Village of Salado, a 25 cent property tax would generate \$250,000 per year. The current budget is approaching \$600,000, funded by a one percent sales tax and utility franchise fees.

Those nine goals that will be developed in the Strategic Plan are these:

- 1. Additional revenue sources/stability.
- 2. City Manager form of government/style of city government.
- 3. Providing adequate services law enforcement.
- 4. Road Maintenance.
- 5. Define health, safety and welfare.
- 6. Commercial devel-
- Maintenance Per-8.
- sonnel. 9. Signage on IH35 and

throughout city. Aldermen say that they will work on other goals, but that the nine goals above are the primary ones

for the Village of Salado.

The last day to file as a candidate and have your name appear on the ballots for Village of Salado board of aldermen and mayor, Salado I.S.D. Board of Trustees and Salado Public Library District Board of Directors is March 10.

Two aldermen have Aesthetics of vil- filed for election to Mayor of the Village of Salado Michael Cooper and Merle Stalcup. In addition, Carol Walls has filed for election to the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen. Two two-year terms on the board, as well as the Mayor, will be decided in May. They are currently filled by Cooper and Suzi Epps,

who has said she is not going to run. The Village of Salado office reported to Salado Village Voice last week that Stephen Peters had filed as a candidate. This is incorrect.

Deborah Aldridge has filed for re-election to the Salado Independent School District Board of Trustees race or the Salado Public Library District Board of Directors race. Four others have filed in that race: Rodney Bell, Kim Bird, Robert Daniell and H.N. "Bud" Lewis. Salado voters will elect three candidates to three year terms on the Salado I.S.D. Board of Trustees. Those seats

are currently filled by Aldridge, Jackie Burson and Frank Carlson. Burson and Carlson have both stated that they will not seek reelection to the board.

Three two-year terms on the Salado Public Library District Board of Directors will be decided in May. Those seats are currently filled by David Carr, Hulda Horton and Ben Willingham. Carr has filed for reelection. Bob Denton has also filed for election to the board. Willingham told the newspaper that he was not going to run again.

The last day to file as a candidate in the May local election is March 10.

Record voter turnout

The Primary Elections March 4 saw record voters in Salado, in Bell County and across the state as 967 cast ballots in Salado's precinct 203 alone.

Of those 967 votes, 625 were in the Republican party primary where a race for State Representative District 55 and County Constable were down ticket races of interest.

Democrats turned out 342 voters in precinct 203, which is more than three times the 100 Democrats to cast ballots in the 2004 Primary.

In 2004, 507 Republicans turned out for the Primary and in 2000 278 Republicans turned out for the party Primary in which George W. Bush received 239 votes and John McCain received 23.

McCain received 347 votes in this year's primary and with four wins on the March 4 Super Tuesday, locked up the Republican nomination for president.

Hillary Clinton, who won Texas and Ohio this week, took Salado's precinct by a large margin, 212 to 128 for Barack Obama.

The precinct caucus was a different matter as 150 people turned out for the Democrat primary, electing 30 delegates to the March 29 Bell County convention.

The Salado Republicans will send 26 delegates to the county convention on March 29 as 15 attended the precinct convention. The group passed 11 resolutions to propose to the county convention.

Roger Laird fended off a challenge at the Repub-

baritone John Van Cura and tenor, Robin Roewe from Houston will present this charming and entertaining program, with Kim Van Cura as pianist.





A Famous hand

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

This deal occurred in the quarterfinal match between Norway and Italy at the 1997 world team championship in Hammamet, Tunisia. It features a truly brilliant play by Italy's Lorenzo Lauria, who found the only way to defeat a slam that appeared certain to succeed.

The deal was the last in the 96-deal match. At one table, the Italian North-South pair reached five clubs and made six. After a heart lead and a trump shift, declarer drew trumps and led a diamond to the jack. When the finesse worked and the diamonds divided 3-2, declarer had the rest of the tricks.

At the second table, the Norwegian pair of Tor Helness and Geir Helgemo were North-South, and the bidding went as shown. Lauria, East, won the opening heart lead with the king and went into a lengthy huddle.

As Lauria contemplated his next move, the Vu-Graph commentators analyzing the deal before a large audience observed that the only way to defeat the slam was to return a diamond into dummy's strong suit. This is not a play that would occur to many, and most players would no doubt elect to continue with a second heart, shift to the queen of spades or perhaps return a trump.

After several agonizing minutes, Lauria, crediting Helgemo with a hand such as the one he had, found the killing diamond shift. With his only diamond thus expended before trumps could be drawn, declarer could no longer utilize dummy's long suit, and the slam went down.

Despite Lauria's magnificent effort, the Italians narrowly lost to the Norwegians, who were then eliminated in the semifinal by the eventual champion, France.

The Lipid Hypothesis is damaging to your health

Why this is just not true!

1) Half the people who get heart attacks do NOT have elevated cholesterol levels.

2) Half the people with elevated cholesterol do NOT suffer from Coronary Heart Disease. So, it seems, cholesterol and saturated fat have been given a bad rap and polyunsaturated fats play a very small role, if any at all, in reducing the risk of heart disease. This shouldn't surprise any-

body, as the last century of American Nutrition (as well as other cultures) will point out that we have been completely duped by the non-fat and lowfat food industries, and the medical and fitness communities that support them. Point in hand: A) Animal fat consumption has dropped over 21 percent since 1910. B) Whole milk consumption has decreased 50 percent. C) The consumption of butter has decreased from 18 pounds per year to four pounds. D) Over the past 80 years, cholesterol consumption

has increased a mere one percent. E) Vegetable oil consumption, including hydrogenated oils, has increased 437 percent. F) Sugar consumption went from five pounds per year in 1900 to 163 pounds per year today (No, that's not a problem!).

Combine this with the fact that when in 1921 Dr. Paul Dudley White invented the first Electrocardiograph, he was ridiculed by his Harvard colleagues because there was no reason to detect the early onset of heart disease because cardio vascular disease was not an issue! You see, heart disease was so rare before 1920 that Dr. White was told to spend his time, energy and money on a more profitable branch of medicine. Wow, how

times have changed.

And for those of you who are thinking to yourselves, "but we live so much longer now than we did then." We do? Bad news, we don't. Yes, it is true that more people reach old age these days, which do skew the numbers, but this is predominately because of the high rates of infant and child mortality in 1920. But are we really living longer? Cardiovascular disease is considered an elderly disease, or a disease that attacks the majority of people (90 percent) after the age of 60. Did you know that after billions of dollars spent on drugs and procedures in America we have only gained 6.46 years of life over the last 82 years (for those who live to the age of 60)? Yes, if you lived to be 60 in the year 1920 you could expect to live 15.54 years longer, and in 2002 if you lived to be 60 you could expect to live 22 years longer. Six Point Four Six Years? In my opinion, that is a horrible return on our hard-earned money (once again, we have been duped). After you reflect on the number of procedures and medications that keep people alive today, it isn't too difficult to make an argument we are in far worse health than those who lived in America in the 1920's.

If you or a loved one are taking statin drugs (with their known side-effects), such as Lipitor (can statins steal your memory, damage your liver, do they do what your doctor say they do? If you don't know, you should!), please look into this Lipid Hypothesis/Fat Myth and determine if your doctor is treating your disease or

Side-Note for Women:
In a workshop held at the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, researchers looked at every study that had been published about the risk of having high or low cholesterol and came to the same conclusion: Mortality was higher for woman with low cholesterol than for woman with high cholesterol.

Side-Note for Men: Dr. Gilles Dagenais and associates concluded that high cholesterol levels are not associated with CVD in Canadian males. This conclusion was reached after having followed 5,000 healthy middle-aged men for more than 12 years.

Side-Note for Everybody: Frank B. Hu, Journal of the American College of Nutrition (2001)-"It is now increasingly recognized that the low-fat campaign has been based on little scientific evidence and may have caused unintended health consequences."

The Girvin Social Club

Several years ago I interviewed a man in Girvin who had a donkey that could do tricks. He could lie down, turn over, smile and nod his head. The donkey was extremely talented. The man who owned the animal, Paul Zeitner, actually lived in Old Girvin, a nearby ghost town. He would play his harmonica and the donkey brayed in accompaniment. It was amazing.

Some years later I visited with Mildred Helmers, who owned the Girvin Social Club. It's a beer joint that serves ranchers, oil field workers and folks who erect wind turbines. Girvin is near the Pecos River between McCamey and Fort Stockton. The Girvin Social Club is the only going business there since the post office closed some time ago.

The beer joint was closed for a while. Jason Jones bought it two years ago. He says he got it primarily for his bride to be. He is in the electrical business.

You would not believe how busy that place gets. It is in a remote location, to say the least. Some people would say it is the middle of nowhere because there's not much within miles of by

it. But it's on US highway 385, which carries a lot of traffic.

The Girvin Social Club is rustic. If it didn't have cars and pickups around it, you would swear the place had been abandoned. Inside, patrons put their names and clever sayings on the rafters and wall studs. There is a lot of old stuff around. The huge Satellite TV looks out of place. This is a drinking establishment. There is no food for sale. Occasionally Jason or some of his customers will broil steaks outside on a cooker. People make donations to cover the cost.

The place has a jukebox and a pool table. When a good danceable song comes on, people get up and dance and the pool game has to wait until the song finishes. It is a small place. Some folks play dominoes or cards. You can relax there. Nobody is stressed out at the Girvin Social Club. It's open sev-



en days a week.

Jason sometimes entertains his customers with his singing and guitar playing. Occasionally a visiting DJ will drop in and play for a dance. Saturday night it's standing room only. A few dogs, goats and donkeys roam the premises just outside the door. The place has lots of character.

"We get all kinds of folks in here," says Jason. "The first timers always say they'll come back because they feel so comfortable here. Most of them do, if they live within a reasonable distance."

Every once in awhile someone will drink too much. If they live in Mc-Camey, 11 miles away, or on a nearby ranch, Jason or somebody from the club will take them home.

"We're wanting to build an RV Park so people can stay overnight," says Jason. "We might even make a resort out of this place."

Re-Liberators

BAGHDAD, IRAQ--"Greeted as liberators" has become one of the most scoffed-at phrases of the Iraq War. But a top U.S. general here plays on the phrase in describing security gains during the past year. "In some ways," he says, "our soldiers have come to be seen as re-liberators."

The neologism seems apt in the crisp, cool dusk of a Saturday evening in a Sunni neighborhood here in the Dora section of this city.

American soldiers, who a few months ago couldn't venture here without being shot at, are mobbed by clamoring children as soon as they leave their vehicles. Stores are open on a street that was deserted just months ago. An American captain -- "the mayor" of the neighborhood -- is greeted by name by an Iraqi boy who runs up to shake his hand, and two women approach him to ask about being hired by the Iraqi government as teachers.

The neighborhood is a showcase of a counterinsurgency campaign that has emphasized securing the population and getting to know local players. "We live in the neighborhood," explains Col. Ricky Gibbs. "How did we get there? We moved to the sound of the guns." It took months of combat for his troops to roust al-Qaida and establish outposts in his section of the city. Once it became clear that the Americans weren't going anywhere, "the people came out in droves."

The Army has contracted with an influential (and very brave) local doctor-turned-businessman in the neighborhood for road repairs, trash pickup and electricity generation. All of which means local jobs.

The question now is whether the enhanced security will harden into -- in a phrase the U.S. military uses often now -- "irreversible momentum" that will make the second liberation more enduring than the first, even as the U.S. begins to draw down the additional brigades of the surge.

It should be the Shia-dominated Iraqi central government contracting with people like the doctor. It can't (out of incompetence) or won't (out of sectarian motives). "We've had an American awakening and a Sunni awakening," he says, referring to the surge and the Sunni turn away from the insurgency. "Now we need a government awakening."

The central government hasn't attempted to consolidate change bubbling from below. There are 80,000 mostly Sunni security volunteers seeking integration into official security forces or transition into civilian jobs. There are volunteer teachers -- like those petitioning the American captain -- who await government salaries. Yet the government has left billions of dollars in revenue unspent.

In the meantime, we fill the gap, in keeping with the military's axiom that "money is ammunition." Commanders use discretionary funds at their disposal to contract for services and provide seed money for businesses.

"I can't spend it fast enough," Col. Gibbs says. This so-called CERP funding will run out in the summer, and Gen. Petraeus is asking for \$480 million more of it. Congress would be scandalously foolish to reject him.

Everyone acknowledges that Iraq's progress is fragile. The country is still violent, al-Qaida hasn't been totally vanquished, and the Shia south has its own alarming problems. But we have to try to capitalize on the opportunities created by the surge. There's not going to be a third liberation.

Reasons for large GOP crossover vote are varied and troubling

LARGE SCALE CROSS-OVER VOTING

The word that encapsulates this year's quadrennial presidential primary, would have to be either "confusing, perplexing, or improbable" (take your pick) or select a new all-purpose term which best describes how our elected-class is playing together (during primary days) in their national and state political-sandboxes.

Added to the "normal" (acceptable) obfuscation associated with today's politics, is the matter of cross-over voting. This is traditionally done by voters who, for a variety of reasons, change their political allegiances - but rarely for the apologetics that are in play this year.

Conservative news sources have confirmed reports of a major "cross-over" vote that began soon after the January 3 Iowa caucuses. The word "troubling" is also used by GOP operatives for what's motivating some "unhappy" Republicans to vote Democratic in the current primary-caucus season

WHY GOPERS ARE VOTING "DEMO"

Rich Lowry, Editor of the hardcore conservative *National Review*, told his readers that an inordinate number of Republicans were voting in the Democratic primaries and caucuses - for Hillary Clinton!

Senator Kirk Watson (D-Austin) accused TxDot of "creating" a problem in order to "carry out their agenda of privatizing the second largest highway system in the world." Senator Tommy Williams (R-The Woodlands) called for an audit of TxDot's books.

Results of the \$1.1 billion error will no doubt result in an audit and further hearings and heartburn for TxDot.

PRIVATIZATION: "PURE QUACKERY"

As to the "privatization" matter, Texans are cognizant of Governor Perry's push to privatize our tollway system. We're also aware of the perpetual Republican quest to privatize government services, at all levels. And who can forget their "charlatan's" motto: "Privatization shrinks 'gummint' and lowers taxes."

Those unfortunate ideas, once implemented, have historically resulted in significantly higher costs, coupled with less efficient service, to the public. A matter that's been objectively proven, despite contrary propaganda that advocates are constantly huckstering.

ALTERNATIVE TO PRIVATIZING ROADWAYS

What's really needed, is for all of us to accept the need for "new" taxes to finance "new" highways, or at the very least place a cost-of-living index on gasoline taxes.

As to the construction of toll roads, we should demand that the legislature permit TxDot to create Turnpike Authorities, sell bonds, build the roadways themselves and plow the toll-profits back into future highway construction.

Unfortunately, we're forced to admit that neither of these options are likely to take place with Repubs in charge.

Margaret Spellings, the U.S. Secretary of Education, was in Texas recently to discuss public education issues and outlined achievements resulting from the federal No Child Left Behind Act. This law is under Congressional review, and Secretary Spellings is working with our federal leaders on ways No Child Left Behind can provide greater flexibility, and provide additional resources, for states and school districts to encourage innovative practices.

Public education is a top concern of mine. As a member of the Public Education committee, I will work on several key issues during this interim period. The committee has been charged with studying issues ranging from teacher retention to evaluating early childhood education programs. Additionally, I am eager to investigate new instructional technologies, including supplementary online instruction, professional development, and course delivery methods.

While online options should not replace direct educator-to-student teraction, these online innovations have the potential to improve access to educational opportunities for children in underserved and rural areas of our state. Educational IT could become a new tool for teachers in and out of the classroom.

Having innovative online capability in Texas schools could help close the gaps in course offer-Smaller districts that have limited coursework by discipline, or are unable to attract a teacher with certain credentials, will be able to compete more evenly with larger districts. Additionally, teachers may be able to collaborate with other classrooms and schools to enhance the students learning experience.

The national media has reported that nearly a half a million children are currently enrolled in some form of online coursework in other states. It is important that the Public Education committee consider best practices in online delivery, and examine the relative costs and benefits of these applications versus traditional delivery models.

Other states have implemented multiple strategies regarding online instructions. In Florida and Illinois, online coursework is restricted to older students and is used mainly as a supplement to traditional education. On the other end of the spectrum, Wisconsin has put in place robust course offerings that

include young students, using IT primarily as a replacement for traditional classroom instruction. The latter approach may work well for non-traditional students with medical or other constraints, but would not advantage all children.



During the ceremony Cassie Pipes, sister of the groom, read a scripture passage for the bride and groom.


"Trumpet Voluntary" was beautifully performed by Jason Howard for the recessional music.

Foote's work has been recognized with two Academy Awards, two Tony awards, a Pulitzer Prize, the National Medal for the Arts by President Clinton, and more. You are sure to recognize many of his works to include the screenplays for "To Kill a Mockingbird," staring Gregory Peck; "Tender Mercies," starring Robert Duvall; and "The Trip to Bountiful," for which Geraldine Page won an Academy Award for Best Actress.

A town meeting will be held 7 p.m. March 13 at the Civic Center to inform the citizens of the opportunities this will bring to Salado and the surrounding cities. Dr. Castleberry

will be present to answer questions and give more information.

To welcome works, the newly established Tablerock Repertory Theater will feature two of Foote's works: "Blind Date" and Foote's adaptation of William Faulkner's "Tomorrow" on June 5, 6, 7 and 12, 13, and 14 (both shows each night). These productions will feature both New York-based actors and local professionals. A fall season also is planned for September and October.

What does this mean for our Salado arts community? The professional Repertory Theater in Salado is only a start--other members of the Salado arts community also are engaged in the dialogue and excited about the possibilities the Society brings. Professional performances will have a central pull for state and regional equity actors, Broadway play aficionados, and play/screen writers. Our geography makes this possible, but obviously, the impact to our community extends far beyond play attendance.

This requirement averages out to 30 hours per year. Teachers can gain their hours by taking advanced coursework at a college or university. Each course is then credited for 15 hours.

Additionally, an educator has the option to attend approved conferences and seminars for credit. Identifying programs and best practices that work in other areas can assist our teachers and education professionals to keep on top of their professional development. Greater efficiency and choice in the process could lead to increased student performance and teacher satisfaction.

In the future, the legislature and policymakers may have to balance the role of the state in determining the direction of online delivery. In Illinois, these initiatives have been state run and financed, while Wisconsin has moved in the direction of privately operated online initiatives. Looking at best practices, and costs and benefits now will serve Texans and our children with additional pathways for increased student achievement.
