Silver Spur returns to vaudeville roots

Carr of Round Rock. Also on tap are the ribtickling musical stylings of Silver Spur troubadour Tony Blackman of Salado, who is also the theater's Technical Director.



The Obama Rules

If Barack Obama gets his way, the Oxford English Dictionary will have updated its definition of "distraction" by the end of the campaign: "Diversion of the mind, attention, etc., from any object or course that tends to advance the political interests of Barack Obama."

After his blowout win in North Carolina, Obama turned to framing the rules of the general election ahead, warning in his victory speech of "efforts to distract us." The chief distracter happens to be the man standing between Obama and the White House, John McCain, who will "use the very same playbook that his side has used time after time in election after election."

Ah, yes, the famous distractions with which Republicans fool unwitting Americans. Ronald Reagan distracted them with the Iranian hostage crisis, high inflation and unemployment, gas lines and the loss of American prestige abroad. Then, the first George Bush distracted them with the notion of a third Reagan term, as well as the issues of taxes, crime and volunteerism. After a brief interlude of national focus during two Clinton terms, another Bush arrived wielding the dark art of distraction.

Obama must believe that most Americans suffer from an attention-deficit disorder so crippling that they can't concentrate on their own interests or values.

Obama has an acute self-interest in so diagnosing the American electorate. His campaign knows he's vulnerable to the charge of being an elitist liberal. Unable to argue the facts, it wants to argue the law -- defining his weaknesses as off-limits.

Here are the Obama rules in detail: He can't be called a "liberal" ("the same names and labels they pin on everyone," as Obama puts it); his toughness on the war on terror can't be questioned ("attempts to play on our fears"); his extreme positions

on social issues can't be exposed ("the same efforts to distract us from the issues that affect our lives" and "turn us against each other"); and his Chicago background too is off-limits ("pouncing on every gaffe and association and fake controversy"). Besides that, it should be a freewheeling and spirited campaign.

Democrats always want cultural issues not to matter because they are on the least-popular side of many of them, and want patriotic symbols like the Pledge of Allegiance and flag pins to be irrelevant when they can't manage to nominate presidential candidates who wholeheartedly embrace them (which shouldn't be that difficult). As for "fear" and "division," they are vaporous pejoratives that can be applied to any warning of negative consequences of a given policy or any political position that doesn't command 100 percent assent.

We could take Obama's rules in good faith if he never calls John McCain a "conservative" or labels him in any other way. If he never criticizes him for his association with George Bush. If he doesn't jump on his gaffes (like McCain's 100-years-in-Iraq comment that Obama distorted and harped on for weeks). And if he never says anything that would tend to make Americans fearful about the future or divide them (i.e., say things that some people agree with and others don't).

This is, of course, an impossible standard. Obama doesn't expect anyone to live up to it except John McCain.

Tricky Congress using G.I.Bill as pawn to secure special interest legislation

The future of the "21st Century G. I. Bill" legislation is hazy at best these days, primarily because it's in the hands of Congress, and those "artfuldodgers" are using this important veteran's education-training modernization law as a "pawn" to pass unrelated tax-spend measures for NASA, crime prevention, hurricane assistance, wildfire prevention and special unemployment benefits for high jobless areas like California.

All of which have been tied to the "Supplemental Appropriation Act of 2008" which is the spending mechanism for the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

The updated G. I. Bill is the only "appropriately" related item added to the war funding bill.

In a "nutshell," (which is certainly the right word considering who's working on this mish-mash), we find that Democratic members, led by House Speaker Nancy Pelosi have cobbled together several billion dollars in non-military related spending; tied it to the popular G.I. Bill section of the War Funding appropriation; and fired it over to the Senate, who (in turn) made changes and finally sent it on to a Conference Committee for review.

TINKERING WITH G.I. BILL - "DISGUSTING"

Disgust - is probably the most descriptive word this column could find to characterize using the needed modernization of today's G. I. Bill, as a pawn to gain votes for special interest legislation.

Had the House and Senate allowed this enhanced G. I. Bill to be a separate legislative proposal, it would have passed with a veto-proof vote, since it provides the men and women, who have served our nation since September 11, 2001 so nobly and fearlessly, the financial assistance to attend colleges and\or vocational schools at a funding level equal to the "sky-rocketing" costs of higher education today.

HISTORY OF A GREAT PROGRAM

Few Americans know (or remember) that the original G. I. Bill was the brainchild of Eleanor Roosevelt, who felt there was a need to "Provide returning servicemen and women an opportunity to receive education and training through a government program that would in a small way give them back their service years and provide them with an economic boost in the post-war period."

And so, just 16 days after the invasion of France by the Allied forces (D-Day June 6, 1944), FDR signed the original G. I. Bill, which had passed both Houses of Congress unanimously!

That measure is considered (even by our "anti-gummint" folks) to be one of the most far-reaching laws ever passed in this nation.

Its impact remains in effect, to this day, since it allowed millions of returning service personnel to attend college and vocational schools, which in turn created America's first legitimate "middle class" in our history.

And that large group of disciplined students went on to become the driving force that forged our nation's role as a global leader in critically needed endeavors including technology, commerce, manufacturing, science, medicine, education.

MODERNIZED G.I. BILL AND POLITICS

Today's updated 21st Century version of the G.I. Bill, is a product of the Congress, and as such - needs to be watched carefully, because of the political "sticky fingers" attached to it.

Major problem is having a President vowing to veto the entire Iraq war funding bill because, (according to the White House) the added cost of improving the veteran's education bill is too high.

The amount for war funding is \$165 billion. The G.I. Bill measure adds a relatively modest \$4.5 billion a year. And, both GOP and Demo supporters have properly noted that it's an integral part of the military appropriation bill.

Democratic presidential hopefuls Barack Obama and Hillary Clinton both voted for the new G. I. Bill and have harshly rebuked McCain for joining the Bush-Pentagon opposition to helping veterans with the new post-military education-training assistance program.

There are inherent (and risky) pitfalls for McCain, in siding with Bush on any issue, considering the number of Americans (72 percent) who disapprove of how the President is handling his job.

The greatest danger in being politically close to the Prez, is getting tagged with easily remembered (and humorously accurate) campaign epithets such as "McBush" or "Bush III" or worst of all - characterized as representing a "Bush Third Term!"

AND FINALLY.....

We are pleased to report that Salado's Congressman John Carter (R-Round Rock) is planning to co-sponsor the House version of Post-9/11 Veterans Educational Assistance Act (S22) and according to his office is in hopes of getting that measure up and running as a "stand alone" bill to strengthen the current six decade old WWII G.I. Bill.

As we noted earlier, this is how the matter should have been handled in the first place and hopefully when it does come up for a final vote in both houses - it will pass unanimously.

America is indebted to the men and women who are serving bravely in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars, and we can show our gratitude through this program that will give these fine young people a "real" opportunity to create a bright future, when they complete their military service.

Fraudulent internet pharmacies pose risks

The dangers of illegal drug importation have been highlighted in recent media accounts. The risks posed by fraudulent internet-based pharmacies led me to fight for the passage of my legislation, House Bill 1676, during the 80th legislative session. HB 1676 directs the Office of the Attorney General to conduct a public awareness campaign to inform Texans of the dangers of purchasing prescription drugs on the basis of "spam" type solicitation via the internet. Texas is the first in the nation to adopt such legislation and may serve as a model for other states to follow.

The Associated Press documented the struggle occurring in Panama in the aftermath of the death of 116 people as a result of counterfeit ingredients and lax regulation. The poisonings were caused by chemically-tainted medicines imported from China. Diethylene glycol, a chemical traditionally used in antifreeze and brake fluid, was embedded into health products ranging from cough-syrup to burn-ointments that were cleared by Panamanian authorities.

The tragedy in Panama reinforces the grave importance of the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's role in protecting the American public. The widespread poisonings in Panama foreshadows an imminent danger many Texans unknowingly face - the emerging threat of illicitly operated online pharmacies. Many consumers learn of internet pharmacies based on "spam" e-mail that lures them in with the promise of easy access to namepharmaceuticals at discount prices - often without a prescription.

While these illicit webpharmacies are packaged with professional looking websites, most are based in foreign countries and fall outside the scope of U.S. regulations as well as the jurisdiction of enforcement of consumer protections. These illicit pharmacies may dispense drugs that contain improper or unhealthy levels of an active ingredient, and that may be chemically tainted with dangerous impurities. There are few safeguards in place for consumers to ensure that what they ordered is what they get. Additionally, there are no legal recourses for consumers if they receive a harmful product. According to the World Health Organization, among online pharmacies that conceal their physical address, more than 50% of the drugs sold are counterfeit.

In addition to health risks, the potential for identity theft and bank fraud is great. Many unsuspecting customers have attempted

to purchase medicine online to be surprised when their medicine never arrives and their personal and financial information is compromised and trafficked across the internet. Only then do they realize that the online pharmacy does not list a physical address and does not have a working telephone line.

Even in a case where a questionable online pharmacy delivers the promised drugs, unmediated and unassisted access to prescription drugs can pose a threat to the health of consumers. Medical providers and legitimate pharmacies advise patients of potential side effects and warn them of potentially dangerous interaction between drugs; unscrupulous online pharmacies offer no such warnings. Moreover, patients who attempt to self-medicate through dubious online pharmacies may treat the symptoms of their ailment without diagnosing or addressing the potentially dangerous underlying cause that a licensed healthcare professional would be qualified to catch.

While dangerous and alleged pharmacies are rampant, there are numerous legitimate pharmacies that provide safe and regulated prescriptions. A genuine pharmacy with an internet portal should be certified by the National Association of Pharmacy, and have the Verified Internet Pharmacy Practice Sites, or VIPPS, seal clearly displayed. To protect themselves, a wise consumer can identify signs that that are indicative of a fraudulent pharmacy. Warning signs are raised by any pharmacy

- Promises access to drugs without a prescription or promises prescriptions based solely on an online questionnaire;
- Fails to list a street address and working telephone number;
- Fails to offer a pharmacist consultation where that patient can ask questions:
- Asks the patient to sign a waiver; or
- Advertises through unsolicited, "spam" email.

The Texas attorney general can prosecute fraudulent internet pharmacies if they are located in Texas. Most often, illegitimate pharmacies are located overseas, and outside the purview of the U.S. and Texas law. Under HB 1676, Attorney General Abbott is instituting consumer protection warnings,

and, among other actions, has updated his website to inform the public to distinguish between legitimate

online pharmacies and


illegitimate, unlicensed pharmacies, at http://www.oag.state.tx.us/consumer/drugs.shtml.

While there are areas where government can make changes to improve our healthcare system, consumers should not have to resort to purchasing potentially lethal prescription drugs from questionable sources.

other things, that you will have to reconcile your investment styles.

A major, long-term study by researchers at the University of California found that women trade stocks less often than men, do more research before making an investment decision, and tend to stick with their investments longer.

The results? Women investors' portfolios outperformed those of men by 1.4 percent a year, according to the study. So, one might conclude that women's "buy-and-hold" investing style can pay off in the long run.

While it may be useful for you and your spouse to keep these gender-based tendencies in mind, you will still have to work out some common ground as you create investment strategies to meet your objectives. The key is open and frequent communication. Talk to each other and learn what the other is thinking. Ask yourselves these types of questions: Do we both want to save

Once you've started talking about these and other issues, you'll be able to start creating appropriate investment strategies. However - and this is an important "however" both you and your spouse still need to be aware of the potential dangers of staying too much in your "comfort zone." If you are an aggressive investor, willing to take greater risks with your principal in exchange for poten-



Bell County JP #2 implements electronic filing of civil cases

Bell County Justice of the Peace Precinct 2 takes the lead in implementing electronic filing of civil cases in Justice Courts in the State of Texas. A new law passed by the 80th Texas Legislature allowed Justice Courts to accept Electronic Filing and Service of Documents of civil cases.

Civil cases will be processed through the state web site "Texas Online." The state vender for Texas Online is BearingPoint Management & Technology Consultants.

Justice of the Peace Don Engleking stated that "He approached the Bell County Commissioners Court approximately two months ago to start the approval process. After receiving approval from commissioners, BearingPoint was contacted and they assisted the county in setting up the computer accounts. It has taken a combined effort between BearingPoint, Bell Co. Clerk's Office, Bell Co. Treasures Office, Bell Co. Auditors Office and Bell Co. Technology Services. Judge Engleking said everyone involved has been great to work with. BearingPoint took us through the process step by

On January 1st the judicial limits for Justice Courts increased from \$5,000 dollars to \$10,000 dollars. Judge Engleking made the request to commissioners in order to help the Justice Courts in Bell County who are receiving a large number's of civil cases. Engleking stated that "The hope is that local law firms as well as out of county law firms will take advantage of the convenience and file cases by

When the Texas Legislature passed the law allowing electronic filing [eFiling] for Justice Courts, they assigned responsibility to The Supreme Court of Texas to write and approve statewide rules. The high court completed their work in mid December and the new rules took effect on January 1, 2008.


EFiling is not new to district and county courts. These courts have been authorized to except elecEmployees from the

Choosing alternatives

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

Assume you're declarer at three notrump and West leads the heart four. How would you play the hand?

After winning the heart, you can count six top tricks -- two spades, two hearts and two diamonds -- so you need three more. Only two suits offer a chance to produce that many tricks -- diamonds and clubs. The question, therefore, is which suit offers the best chance of getting you to your goal.

Let's consider the diamonds first. Obviously, if you cash the A-K and the opposing diamonds divide 2-2, your troubles are over. The chief objection to this approach is that the missing diamonds will divide 2-2 only 40 times in 100. More importantly, if the suit does not break evenly, it is unlikely you will be able to score nine tricks before the opponents take five.

In the actual deal, for example, if you played the A-K of diamonds and found the suit divided 3-1, you could switch to clubs,


East wins the first club and returns a heart to knock out your second heart stopper. When you play a second club, West's ace, his two good hearts and the queen of diamonds defeat you.

Alternatively, if you tackle clubs first, you could go down if the hearts were divided 5-2, since the opponents would most likely collect two clubs and three hearts before you can score nine tricks.

The dilemma is actually easy to resolve if you assume that West's opening lead is his fourthbest heart. In that case, since you see the three in dummy and the deuce in your hand, West cannot have more than four hearts.

For this reason, after taking the first heart trick, it is best to lead the queen of clubs. East wins and continues with a heart, and you force out the other high club. West cashes two hearts, but you then have the rest of the tricks, and it does not matter whether the diamonds are divided evenly or not.

The toll of childhood obesity

Childhood obesity creates a multi-faceted challenge that involves not only the children of America, but their parents, their schools and our government. The impact of childhood obesity on our families, and our nation will be quite devastating. Here are just a few comments from specialists around America:

John Foreyt, director of Behavioral Medicine Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, estimates that almost every American will be overweight or obese by 2040. Very few, possibly 5 percent to 15 percent, might be able to maintain a healthy weight, he says. "But most of us are in trouble," Foreyt says. "We are affected so strongly by the environment — fast food, big portion sizes and the lack of a need to be active — that we are doomed."

Samuel Klein of the North American Association for the Study of Obesity says, "More lives are being lost to obesity than any war or terrorist attack".

Yale public-health expert Dr. David Katz believes, "Today's kids may be the first generation in history whose life expectancy is projected to be less than that of their parents!"

Excess poundage takes a terrible toll on the human body, significantly increasing the risk of heart disease, high blood pressure, stroke, diabetes, infertility,

gall-bladder disease, osteoarthritis and many forms of cancer.

The total medical tab for illnesses related to obesity is \$117 billion a year, and climbing, according to the Surgeon General. Revenue from So-

Revenue from Social Security and Taxes will drop substantially as life expectancy drops in America, creating an even greater burden for the U.S. government.

With the decline of proper nutrition in our homes and schools, and the discontinuation of mandatory physical education in our schools, there has been a tremendous increase in Attention Deficit Disorders and Childhood Depression

My answer to this epidemic is quite simple, but unfortunately difficult to implement, as we live in a "convenience food culture" where the lifestyle trends lean toward longer working hours, more working mothers, and time-poor/ cash-rich parents. Conventional wisdom would lead us to believe that we are obese because we are eating too much, but this is only a small part of the story. Americans are malnourished while consuming thousands of calories more than we need. The

displacement foods that our children spend the majority of their lives eating are loaded with calories and have little or NO nutritional value. I will even take it one step further and say, "children may have enough will power to stop eating if they have eaten enough calories, but no one has enough will power to stop eating if they have not consumed the essential vitamins, minerals, fat and proteins their body's need". This is one of the main reasons people struggle on diets that are loaded with non-fat/low-fat manufactured foods.

Here is a simple to understand approach for parents and their children:

Go back 200 years and think of the foods that would be available, and EAT THEM.

Consider yourself a Hunter and Gatherer. Eat only foods that were killed, caught, gathered, picked or harvested.

Eat foods only in their natural state.

When shopping, shop the perimeter of the grocery store. You will find 90% of fresh, natural, and whole foods outside the aisles: fresh produce, meat, fish and poultry.

Running 100 miles uphill

Pat Johns of Plano, Texas is the only person who has run the 100 mile Himalayan marathon four times. He started running 33 years ago for weight control. After getting a job in the corporate world just out of college, he put on some extra weight and found himself at 215 pounds. Now he weighs 195. He calls himself a Clydesdale.

"It's a category for runners who are big, old and slow," says Pat. "I've never really wanted trophies. All I want to do is complete the race. I usually finish in the middle of the pack."

He says running is a progressive disorder.

"You start running a little bit, then you do a 10K, by Tumbleweed Smith

then a half marathon, then a full marathon, then you go crazy and start doing some of the ultra marathons. My first was the Pikes Peak event where you run up to 14,000 feet, then turn around and come back down again. After I did that one three times, I thought I was ready for the Himalayan run."

Pat felt confident when he got to the India-Nepal border where the race takes place. Then he met people wam the 4000 mile on River and rai

who swam the 4000 mile Amazon River and ran the 1100-mile Iditarod on foot in 30 below weather. It was then he decided to delve into the motivation of the people running the race. He decided it's not about running. It's about Pat left the corporate world a couple of years ago and is now an internationally-recognized motivational speaker. He got his start by speaking to a couple of Rotary clubs in the Dallas area, telling about his experiences as a runner and relating them to life. Pat has written a book, "Footprints In the Shadow of Giants," which features some of his philosophy and photographs.

He says the Himalayan 100 is the most beautiful of all the 60 marathons he has run. On the trail, run-

ners can see the four tallest peaks in the world. It is a grueling race.

"It's 104 miles over five days," says Pat. "The first day is the worst. It's 24 miles with an 8,000 feet vertical gain. We go from 6,000 feet to 14,000 at about a nine-degree angle. The second day is a 20-mile run, the third day is 30, then the last two days are 13- and 17-mile runs. A lot of people fall and get scratched up pretty bad. I've seen some terrible ankle, knee and wrist injuries. It's just amazing what people are capable of doing."

In his presentations, Pat stresses the fact that we are trained to believe that we're limited and can't do things. But the reality is that people are limitless and can re-condition themselves to believe that anything is possible.

The first time Pat ran the Himalayan marathon in 2000, 60 runners from 15 countries competed. Half of them were from the US.

Focusing on a few simple nutritional rules will create tremendous results when fighting against childhood obesity. Children should daily:

Tax credits may help with education costs

Summer jobs may help with tuition costs this fall, but whether you are paying for a college education or a teacher buying items for your classroom, education credits and deductions can help lower your tax bill.

"Don't overlook these important benefits when considering all the expenses involved with education," said Clay Sanford, an IRS spokesman in Dallas. "You can do all your homework on these subjects at IRS.gov."

The Hope Credit, Lifetime Learning Credit or the Tuition and Fees Deduction may help offset the cost of higher education for you, your spouse and your dependents.

Sanford said the amount of these credits and deductions are based on the qualified education expenses, such as college or vocational school tuition and enrollment fees, that you paid during the year and may be limited by your modified adjusted gross

income. Room and board, insurance or personal living expenses are not considered qualified education expenses.

The Hope Credit, which is up to a \$1,650 tax credit per student per year, is available for only the first two years of college or vocational school.

The Lifetime Learning Credit, which is up to a \$2,000 tax credit per tax return, applies to undergraduate, graduate and professional degree courses and there is no limit to the number of years you can take this credit.

The Tuition and Fees Deduction, which is up to a \$4,000 deduction from your income, applies to undergraduate, graduate and professional degree courses. This deduction may be beneficial as the modified adjusted gross income limits are higher than the thresholds for the Hope and Lifetime Learning Credits.

Are you paying Student

Loan interest? You may be able to deduct up to \$2,500 from your income per tax return. Student Loan interest may be deducted even while your student is in school if you are paying the interest immediately rather than deferring the payments.

You cannot claim the Hope Credit, Lifetime Learning Credit and the Tuition and Fees Deduction for the same student in the same year. You will want to choose the credit or

deduction that provides the greatest benefit. However, you can claim the Student Interest Loan deduction and one of these other benefits simultaneously.
