Salado wins first Lone Star Cup

Salado High School won the Lone Star Cup™, the University Interscholastic League (UIL) announced June 13.

With 60 points based on the performances of UIL extra curricular squads in athletics, academics and music, Salado was tied with Poth, but the Eagles' two state championships gave Salado the edge.

Salado tied Poth, with 60 points each in the race for this year's Class 2A Texas Dodge Dealers Lone Star Cup. Salado won the tiebreaker (most state championships) to collect its first-ever trophy: Salado won a state championship in baseball June 12 in Austin, while Poth was state runner-up in both volleyball and girl's basketball.

It's the second straight year for Poth to finish runner-up for the Class 2A Texas Dodge Dealers Lone Star Cup. Defending champ Tatum was seventh with 46 points.

The Texas Dodge Dealers Lone Star Cup™, honors the best overall athletic and academic programs in Texas. The annual Texas Dodge Dealers Lone Star Cup™ is open to all UIL

participant high schools.

One school in each of the five UIL classifications (5A, 4A, 3A, 2A and 1A) will claim the coveted Cup. High schools accumulated points based on their team performance in district and state championships. The winning schools in each classification will receive the Lone Star Cup™ trophy and a \$1,000 scholarship, also presented by the Texas Dodge Dealers.

Standings include State and Area Marching Band, Team Tennis, Boys and Girls Cross Country, Volleyball, Football, Boys and Girls Swimming and Diving, Boys and Girls Wrestling, Boys and Girls Basketball, Boys and Girls Soccer, Boys and Girls Golf, Boys and Girls Track and Field, One-Act Play, Academics, Softball and Baseball.

Other schools in the top 10 standings were these: New Boston, third, 55 points; Holliday, fourth, 50 points; Tuscola Jim Ned and Wall, tied at fifth, 48 points; Tataum, seventh, 46; Arp, eighth, 44 points, Big Sandy Harmony, Bushland, Crawford, tied at ninth, 40 points each.

Rescued animals find rehab, release back into own habitat

When we step out of our homes after a big storm such as the one that ripped through Salado on May 14, we look out at the trees that have been ripped out at the roots and think about the loss of shade, privacy and beauty.

But for wild birds and animals, the loss is more than aesthetic. The oak tree that is felled by a storm is home.

Saladoan Joyce Pennington discovered the impact that storms have on the native wildlife in the area following the storms of May 14.

"A friend asked me to take photos of their downed trees for the insurance company," she said. "In walking through their backyard overlooking Salado Creek, I noticed a bird that was face down in the grass and it was still breathing."

The bird was a baby hawk. Without an idea of how to help the bird, Pennington made several phone calls and learned that Belton Animal Clinic takes in injured birds.

Pennington turned the bird over to the Texas Parks and Wildlife in Temple, which contacted D.J. Ortman. Ortman lives in Moody and is the official wildlife rehabilitator for Bell County.

She has both state and national permits to care for and rehabilitate animals and release them when they are ready to go back into the wild.

Ortman on June 14 brought two baby Cooper's Hawks to release in Salado where they had been blown out of their nest in May. "There were almost a dozen birds that were blown out from the storm," Pennington said, "including a Red Tailed Hawk, two Barred Owls and several Screech Owls.

The birds were released in different locations. "It is important that they be released in a location where there is a good food source for all of them," Ortman said.

As the birds flew back towards the house, Ortman said that, "They will likely find a spot and stay for a couple of hours until they get their bearing on their surroundings."

It took the two baby hawks 20 minutes to find the safety of a nearby tree.

Later in the weekend, Pennington reported spotting the baby hawks screeching and flying near the creek.

"I had heard the 'parent' hawks screeching for several days this past week," Pennington said. The parents are pushing the fledglings out of the nest so that they can learn to hunt and fly. The parent hawk will then call them from time to time to check on them to see how they are coping with their hunting."

Ortman has been doing this kind of work for several years now in Bell County. Three years ago, she released 30 black-bellied whistling ducks in Rogers.

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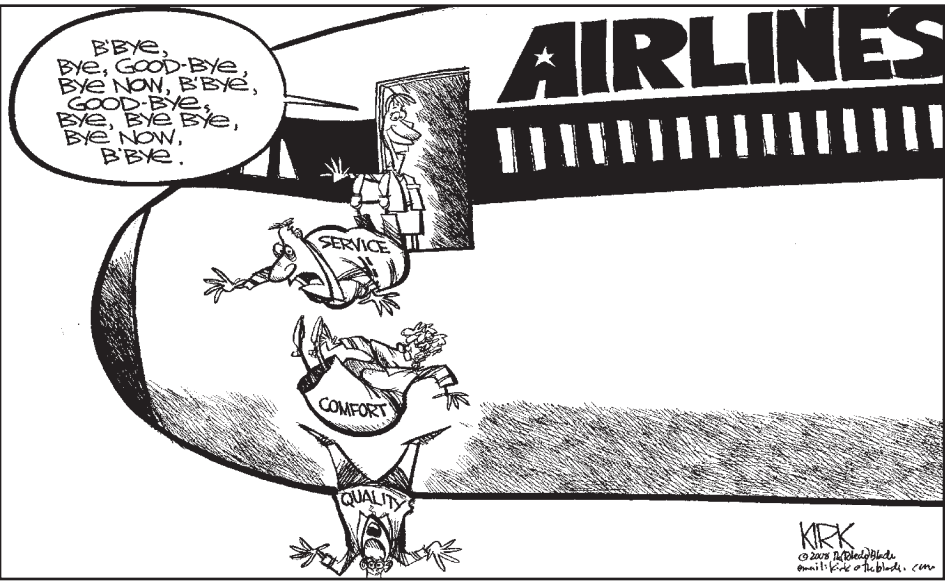

Scott McClellan, Official Spokesman

Scott McClellan has learned the profound wisdom of the old Groucho Marx line about not wanting to belong to any club that would have him.

The former press secretary has written a scathing memoir about his time in the Bush administration, but nothing he says in his book, dully titled (appropriately enough) “What Happened,” is as damning as the fact that he spent nearly three years as White House press secretary.

Likable, but maladroit and plodding, he was the perfect spokesman for the administration of Harriet Miers, Michael Brown and Al Gonzales. For anyone who doubted that President Bush too often valued loyalty over talent, there was McClellan stumbling through daily briefings to embody the point more eloquently than he ever could have stated it.

McClellan’s book has all the inherent interest of one of his briefings. He tells of an incident that was one of his “favorite moments” from working with then-Gov. George Bush in Texas. He stumbled upon Bush making sandwiches. McClellan picks up the tale from there: “For the next 20 minutes or so we munched on the sandwiches and talked about a variety of topics, few of which had to do with politics.”

No one was going to pay any attention to a book replete with such banalities, so McClellan had to “sex it up.” He took the conventional anti-Iraq War case and cut-and-pasted it into his book. He says that the administration engaged in a “political propaganda campaign” in the run-up to the war, doing “a disservice to the American people and to our democracy.” If McClellan’s provocative language is stripped away, what he is saying is unremarkable.

McClellan is more compelling when he complains about his treatment during the Valerie Plame case. He maintains that Karl Rove and “Scooter” Libby made cat-

egorical denials to him of involvement in the leak. Whether that was the case or he missed subtleties in what they told him, McClellan said things from the podium about the controversy that were untrue, and no one bothered to correct him.

That would have been grounds for resigning, but McClellan stayed. It wasn’t until a new White House chief of staff arrived and wanted a better press secretary that McClellan was forced out. The deep-think (and entirely commonplace) theme of his book is that Washington has a poisonous culture of the “permanent campaign.” But people fighting for what they believe is more admirable than rank, unprincipled careerism.

When McClellan first met with Bush in Texas for a job interview, Bush asked why he wanted to work for him. “Because I believe in you,” McClellan said. What about Bush’s agenda? McClellan hastily added he believed in that, too. But he didn’t in any meaningful way. He writes of the death penalty, which he defended in Texas: “I do feel significant doubts about it, much as I would later feel about the necessity of war in Iraq.” But he swallowed them: “I was called on, as official spokesman, to defend a position despite inner qualms about it.”

Lo and behold, here is Scott McClellan, ever the mouthpiece, spouting views that happen to suit the interests of his New York publisher and betray his foolishly loyal former boss. If he has any inner qualms, we’ll never know.

OUR DRINKING WATER IS REGULATED

by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) and they have determined that certain water quality issues exist which prevent our water from meeting all of the requirements as stated in the Federal Drinking Water Standards. Each issue is listed in this report as a violation and we are working closely with the TCEQ to achieve solutions.

WATER SOURCES: The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals, and in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water before treatment include: microbes, inorganic contaminants, pesticides, herbicides, radioactive contaminants, and organic chemical contaminants.

ALL drinking water may contain contaminants.

When drinking water meets federal standards there may not be any health based benefits to purchasing bottled water or point of use devices. DEFINITIONS

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)

The highest permissible level of a contaminant in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)

The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected health risk. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL)

The highest level of disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG)

The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contamination.

Treatment Technique (TT)

A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Action Level (AL)

The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Growth-and-income funds - As its name suggests, a growth-and-income fund is structured to provide the potential for both growth in value and current income payments, in the form of dividends. Generally speaking, these funds

are less risky than growth funds yet offer lower growth potential. But if you are interested in adding an income stream to your portfolio, these funds may be suitable for your long-term investment goals. Dividends can be increased, decreased or totally eliminated at any time without notice.

International funds - You can choose from several types of international funds: global funds, which invest in both U.S. and international stocks; international funds, which invest primarily outside the U.S.; country specific funds, which focus on one country or region; and emerging market funds, which concentrate on small, developing countries. These funds generally invest for growth, but they involve special types of risk, such as currency fluctuations and the prospect of investments being affected by political

or economic turmoil.

Bond funds - When you invest in a bond fund, you are seeking current income, in the form of interest payments, and the chance to help stabilize a portfolio that might be heavily weighted toward stocks. You can choose from municipal bond funds, corporate bond funds, mortgage-backed securities funds and U.S. government bond funds. Although bonds funds generally contain less investment risk than stock funds, they carry a different type of risk: purchasing power risk. In other words, the interest payments you receive from your bond funds may not always keep up with inflation. Keep in mind that bond funds are subject to interest rate risk and fund values may decline as interest rates rise.

Money market funds - These funds invest in short-term debt instruments and are managed to maintain a stable net asset value of \$1 per share, however the value of fund can fluctuate

and it's possible to lose money. Many people invest in money market funds if they want to "park" funds for a short time before investing it elsewhere. You might also use a money market fund as an "emergency fund" containing six to 12 months' worth of living expenses. While these types of mutual funds have some obvious differences, they also share two important traits in common. First, financial professionals choose the investments, which is obviously a benefit to you. Second, mutual funds, by owning many different types of securities, offer the advantage of diversification. (Diversification, by itself, cannot guarantee a profit or protect against a loss in a declining market).

A financial advisor can help you choose those mutual funds that are appropriate for your needs. But it's still your responsibility to know about the funds in which you invest - so, before writing a check, read a fund's prospectus which can be obtained from your financial advisor. The prospectus contains more complete information, including the funds investment objectives, risks, charges and expenses that should be carefully considered.

Whether the market is up or down (and particularly if it's down), buying a "fixer-upper" and updating it can prove to be a profitable venture. As with any real estate investment, however, it's wise to enter with eyes wide open. Knowledge and caution will help you avoid common pitfalls.

The ideal candidate for such a purchase would be

priced roughly 30 percent below the value of nearby homes, and located in a community with low crime rates and good schools. The only thing you can't repair or improve is a poor location.

And just because you can improve almost anything doesn't mean that you should! Avoid homes in need of truly major (and unprofitable) repairs such as the foundation, structural plumbing, or complete kitchen and bath renovations. Because these features are simply expected by buyers, they won't necessarily add any value to your offering.

Another aspect that is often overlooked is your fixer-upper's proximity to where you live. Keep it within an hour's drive, because you'll want (and need) to check in regularly, probably daily, while your repairs and renovations are in progress. The cost of fuel is high enough these days that you don't want to blow your profits on your gas tank!

There are many fine homes being offered at lower prices by motivated sellers. Don't overlook the opportunity these properties present!



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Wages: It pays to look at the big picture

Charles Dickens captured the spirit of an era in a single sentence: "It was the best of times; it was the worst of times." For American workers, that sentiment still seems to apply.

On the one hand, there's a lot to be grateful for. "Today, the typical job involves less mindless repetition or physical exertion and more mental activity than in the past," notes economist James Sherk of The Heritage Foundation in an upcoming paper. He adds it also requires a greater level of education and is safer and more comfortable than it was a generation ago.

Still, a case could be made for the second half of Dickens' sentence -- that we're in the "worst of times." According to RealClearPolitics.com, polls show that almost 80 percent of Americans think the country is on the "wrong track." And a recent USA Today poll found more than half of all Americans think "their standard of living is no better today than five years ago."

It's understandable they might think that, since they're frequently told the "rich" are getting richer while members of the middle class are merely working more. In a 2006 paper, the liberal Economic Policy Institute wrote that, "Despite strong growth in labor productivity, hourly wages for most workers are not keeping pace with inflation." But there's more to com-

pensation than wages, and benefits have actually grown faster than worker productivity.

Almost a third of the average employee's compensation is paid in benefits. Add wages and benefits together and "over the past 40 years compensation per hour and output per hour -- that is, productivity -- have moved almost in unison," Sherk found. One federal measure of total compensation shows it rose by 3 percent from 2003-2006 and by 9 percent from 2000-2006, even after adjusting for inflation.

Benefits -- including health coverage, 401(k) plans and paid sick leave -- are expensive, yet critical.

Health care, for example, costs employers more than it did decades ago because employees get more, and our entire society reaps benefits. Better health care allows workers to live longer, healthier lives.

How about the claim that employers are "squeezing" workers?

It doesn't hold up. "Over the past 40 years," Sherk says, "the compensation that companies pay their employees has held constant at slightly over 70 percent of national income, never deviating more than a few percentage points from that number." It's been so steady that "in the first quarter of 1968 employee compensation was 69.9 percent of national income. In the last quarter of 2007 it was 70.6 percent."

Employees are actually doing better, because there's more money to go around. Our economy has grown by leaps and bounds since the 1960s. And that rising tide has benefited those near the bottom of the economic scale as well as the wealthy.

Yes, unemployment jumped last month to 5.5 percent. But even so, the unemployment rate remains remarkably low by historical standards.

Economic growth can be scary. As new jobs are created, old jobs often go away. But the results are positive. Our economy has indeed lost many low-wage manufacturing jobs, but has created more high-wage jobs in engineering, computer science and nursing.

Things aren't perfect. There are economic problems in our country today, as there will always be. Americans may well carry too much debt, for example. But we don't end up in Dickensian debtors' prisons.

We may act, at times, as if we're living in "Bleak House." But the facts on wages and jobs show we should have "Great Expectations" for our national future.

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Salado sales taxes drop for first time in 2008

For the first time this year, sales tax rebates to the Village of Salado dropped compared to the previous year as the Village received \$19,854.29 in June.

This is 19 percent drop from 2007 payment of \$24,627.19. For the year, however, the Village is running five percent ahead, having received \$174,205.23 through June, compared to \$166,057.00 through June 2007.

Rebates were also down for the Salado Public Library District, which received a rebate check of \$16,327.61, compared to last June's payment of \$19,098.99, a drop of more than 14 percent. For the year, the Library district has been paid \$126,733.09 which is six percent more than the \$119,355.63 paid through June 2007.

Salado's drop in sales tax revenues for the month

bucks the upward trend in Bell County and in the state.

For June, the County received \$1,023,786.58, which is almost six percent more than last June's payment of \$969,750.02. For the year, the county is running five percent ahead of 2007 with \$6,837,674.92 received so far, compared to \$6,495,507.51 received through June 2007.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced that the state collected \$1.8 billion in sales tax revenue in May, a 4.7 percent increase over May 2007.

"For the first nine months of fiscal 2008, state sales tax collections are up 5.8 percent over the same period in fiscal 2007," Combs said. "While increases are smaller than in 2006 and 2007, growth in state sales tax revenues continues at a healthy rate."

“For the past three summers,” Pennington said, “we have seen two to three of them on the creek.”

The native habitat of the black-bellied whistling ducks is Central and South America. “They are sometimes seen on the Gulf Coast on Padre Island and Mustang Island,” Pennington said, “They are unusual guest for Central Texas, however, the creek and the deer feeders are attractive to them so they have continued to return to Salado Creek.”

Pennington added that she saw 10 of the whistling ducks in the creek this weekend. “They have a black underbelly, rust-colored wings with

a large white bar across them along with bright orange bill and feet,” she said, adding that “They make an odd whistling sound when flying over or communicating with their flocks.”

then joined by the escorts for lunch and swimming. They were all presented T-shirts for their keepsakes

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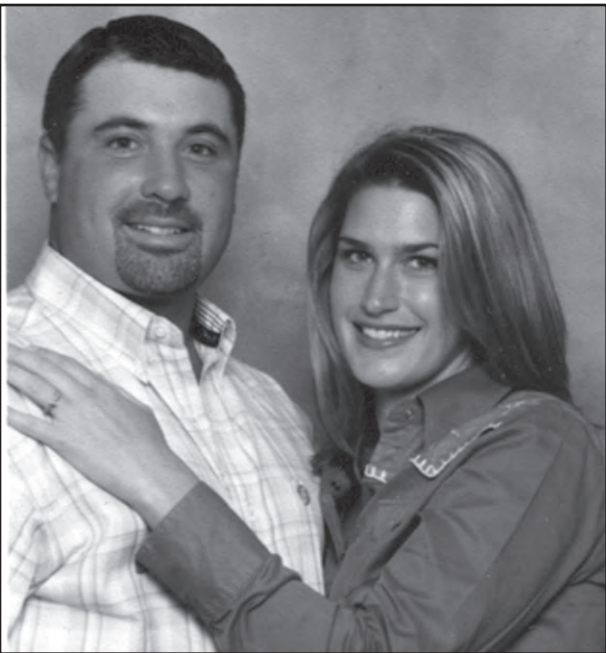


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Juana Woods named to Harding Univ. dean's list

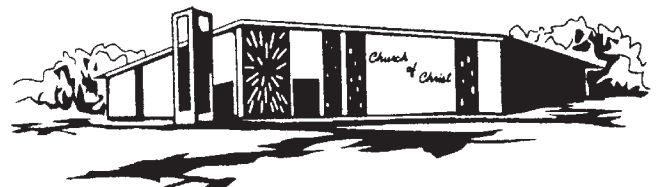

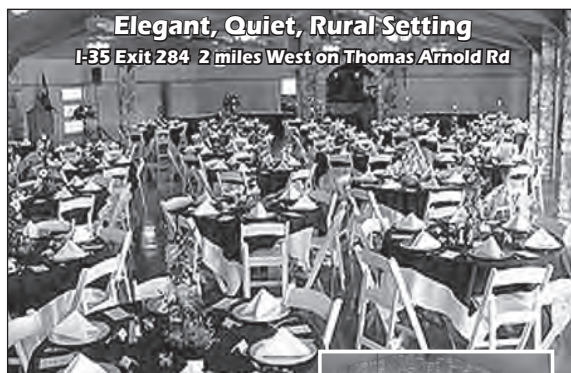


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Final weekend for Summer of Slapstick show

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The trickless double

Contract Bridge

When your partner makes an unusual bid, you're supposed to try to figure out what it means. Sometimes partner's bid is so weird that you know at once it can't mean what it professes to mean. The problem that then arises is to work out what it does mean, and this is not always an easy task.

Let's say you're West and your partner doubles five hearts on the sequence shown. It does not make much sense to conclude that East has just found a couple of aces he overlooked when he bid three spades over one diamond. Normally such an overcall denotes an acute absence of defensive tricks.

The double of five hearts therefore cannot be based on high cards, but must instead be lead-directing, denoting a hand containing a void.

Partner is expressing his belief that if you lead his void suit, there will be a reasonable prospect of defeating the contract.

Since the double bars a spade lead, you must choose between a diamond or a club. In theory, East could be void of either suit, but from a practical standpoint, the odds heavily favor the void being in clubs. This conclusion can be reached by assuming that North-South are far more likely to hold seven clubs than 11 diamonds.

With a club lead, the contract goes down one or two tricks, depending on whether declarer takes the club finesse at trick one. If he does, East ruffs and returns a spade, and another club lead puts South down one. If declarer plays the ace of clubs on the first trick, he goes down two.

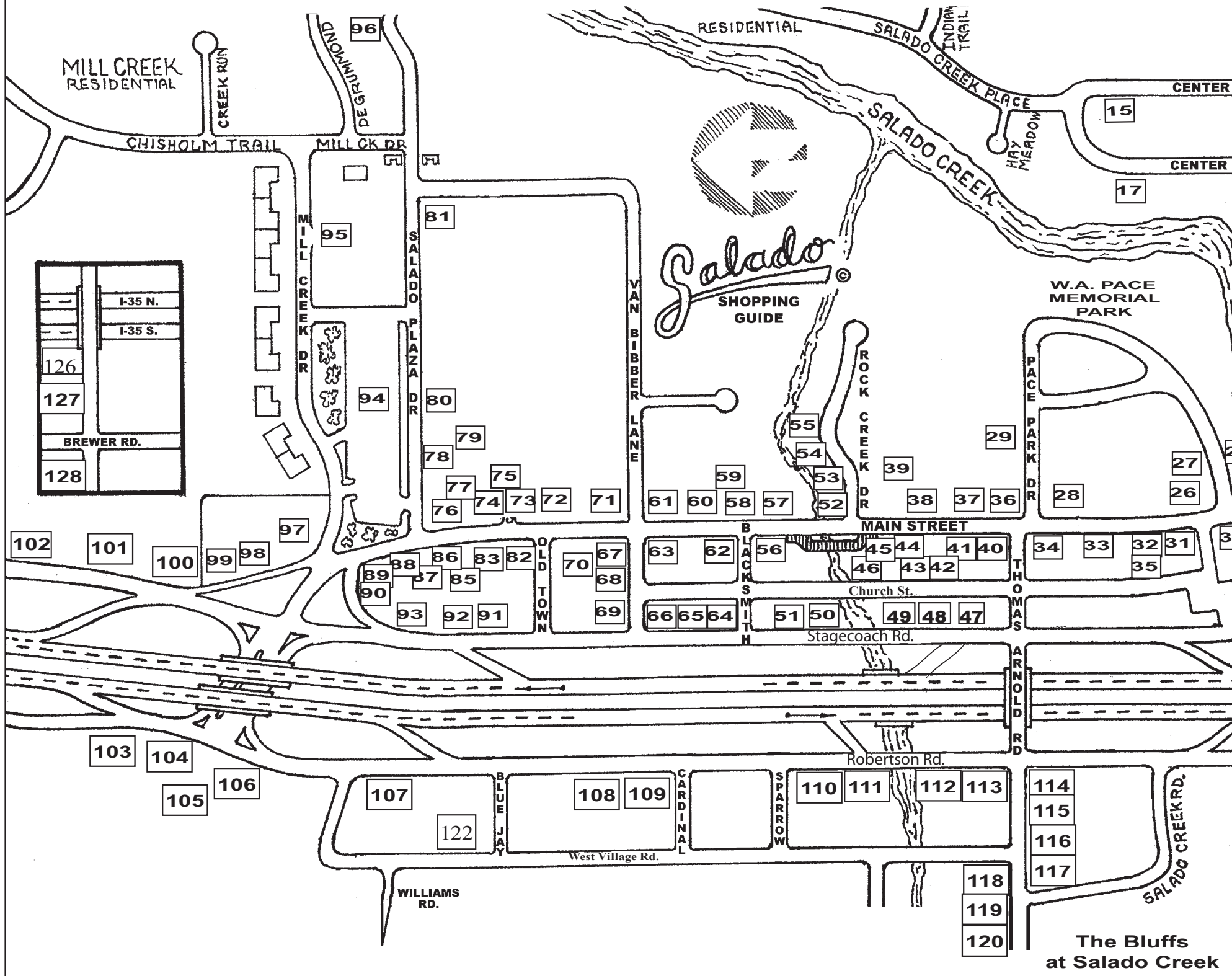

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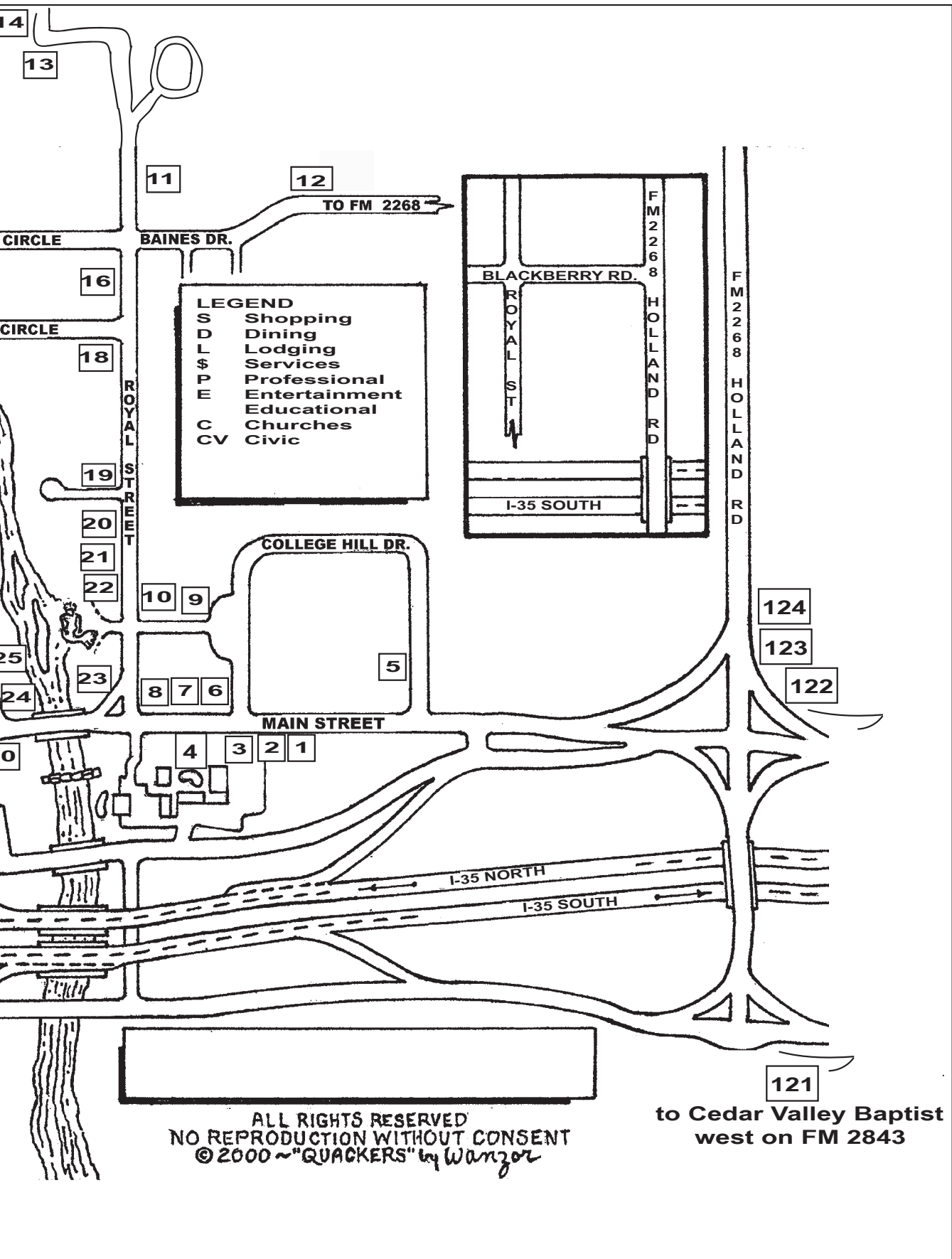

The majority of America is making an effort to lose some weight or drop some body fat. Unfortunately, for many, the motivational drive is there for all of the wrong reasons. It is one thing to lose weight if you are obese, don't feel well, or are lacking proper energy levels and want to achieve optimal health. It is another thing to spend excessive amounts of energy trying to get "thin" or trying to develop a physique/figure that is considered "in" or even "healthy". If you have read this column in the past you will know that I believe and teach that "thin" and "healthy" are not necessarily the same thing. You can be "thin" and unhealthy just as easily as you can be "heavy" and unhealthy, let alone, a little heavy and healthy. We should all aspire to be HEALTHY first, and then achieve the body we desire.

Because of this ill-conceived notion that "thin is in" and that achieving this goal should be reached no matter the cost (even if it means the loss of your health) there have been numerous "diets" created, even re-created, to help you achieve this "thinness".

Today, let's discuss five popular concepts for dieting that you now see being endorsed on infomercials, your favorite "rag mag", and even possibly, by your favorite actor/actress or television personality. Let's play a little FACT and FICTION:

1. Low-Calorie Diets A. Fiction-By consuming fewer calories, by eating less and even skipping meals you will lose weight. B. Fact-Yes, you will lose weight initially, but it won't be predominately fat. Once your metabolism slows and you begin to struggle with deprivation you will then put on more weight than you initially started with.

2. Restrictive Macro-nutrient Low-Calorie Diets A. Fiction-Not only will you lose weight by eating less, but you now consume no so-called "fattening" foods, creating either a low-carbohydrate, low-protein or low-fat diet. B. Fact-Yes, you will lose weight initially, but these results will not be long-term. The body will become malnourished without the benefits of either proper glucose, essential amino acids or fatty acids and the benefits of the function of each.

3. Low-Fat Diets A. Fiction-Fat has a higher caloric density than carbohydrates and protein which will make you fat, plus fat is the leading cause of heart disease. B. Fact-Proper high quality fat intake is essential in losing unwanted body-fat, plus it helps you to stay satiated between meals. Poor quality (rancid, altered, high omega 6 intake) fat intake are some of the reasons behind numerous health challenges today, including heart disease.

4. Low-Carbohydrate

Diets A. Fiction-Insulin is an anabolic hormone which causes us to be fat, so consuming carbohydrates will make us fat. B. Fact-You can and will lose a great amount of WATER weight when you cut carbohydrates out of your diet. But, this weight is not fat and you are destroying your metabolism by not balancing your hormones. This will cause you to gain more fat in the long-term.

5. Liquid Diets A. Fiction-By consuming meals from drinks and shakes you can control your calorie intake. This is a low-calorie diet where your nutrient intake comes from a genetically engineered powder or cheap low quality protein and low cost sugar product. B. Fact-High quality food will never be replaced with shakes, drinks or powders. Drinking your meals creates all sorts of metabolic issues including improper digestion and insulin responses.

In time, each of the popular approaches to weight-loss above will create an environment where the body will have to eat itself up to survive. Eating a proper nutritional regimen of quality foods will BUILD YOU UP not TEAR YOU DOWN like the diet concepts listed above. The long-term side effects of the fad diet concepts above are:

- A. Early Death
- B. Degenerative Disease
- C. Autoimmune Diseases, including Lupus and Asthma
- D. Digestive Issues, including Fungal Overgrowth and Leaky Gut Syndrome
- E. Immunity Issues, including Colds and Fevers
- F. Depression and Fatigue
- G. Hormonal Imbalance Issues, including Arthritis Pain and Sleep Disturbances
- H. Damaged Metabolic System, leading to Decreased Lean Body Tissue and Increased Fat Storage

So, how is the quality of food you are consuming? How frequently are you eating? Are you combining your meals with a balance of healthy fat, quality proteins, real carbohydrates and non-starch vegetables?

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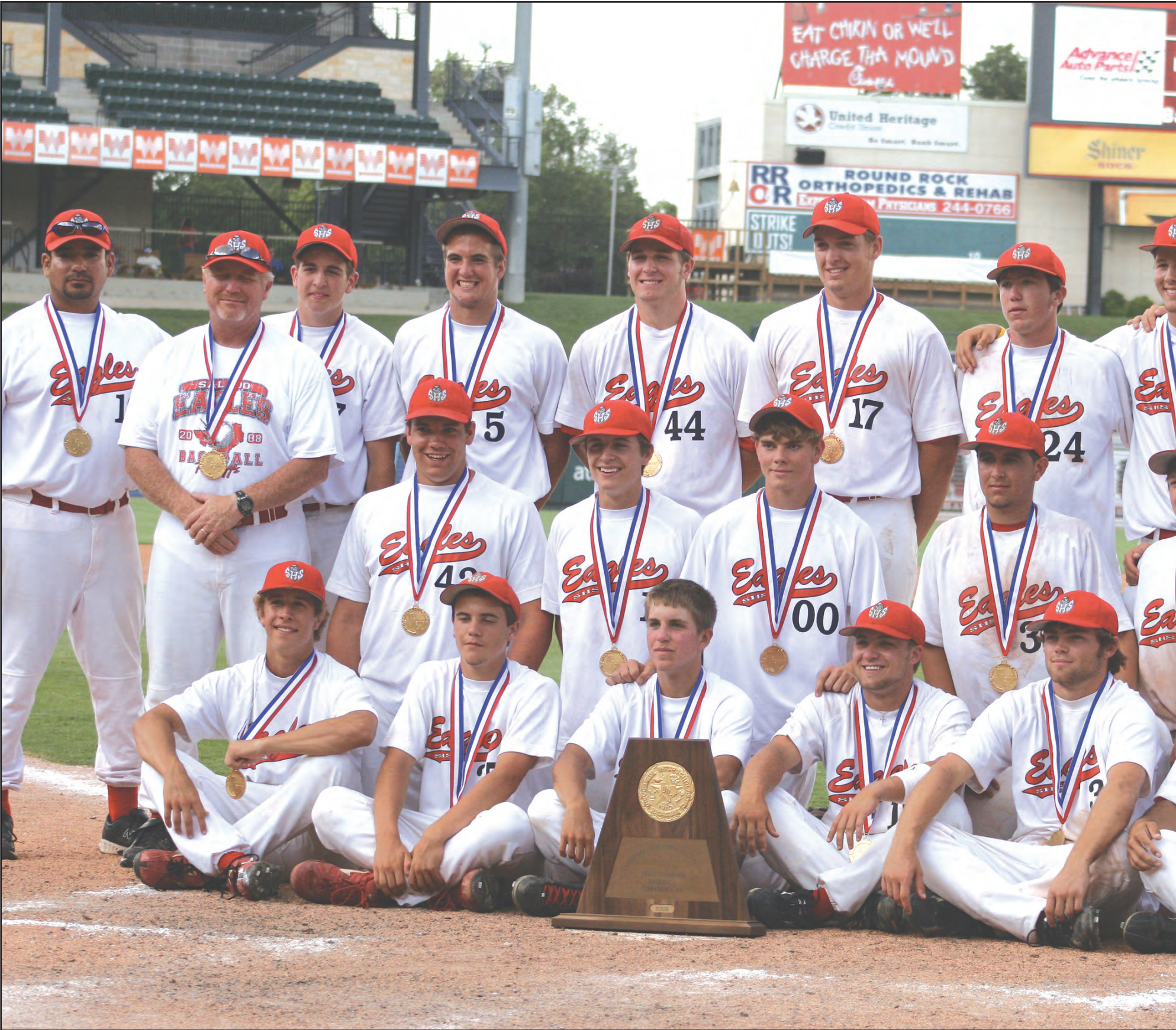
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State Champion Salado Eagles

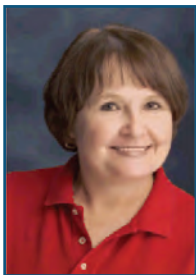

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

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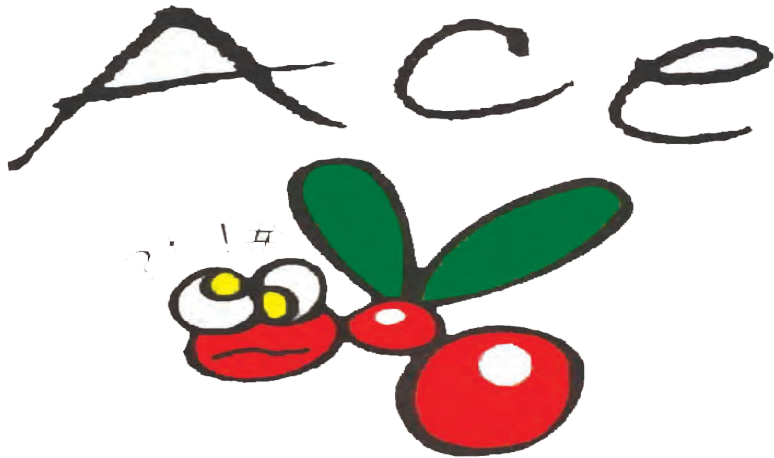
