Voting is heavy

Voter turnout has been heavy in the first days of early voting across the state and in Salado. In the first day of voting, 324 cast ballots in Salado for the General Election. By contrast, in the 2004 election, a total of 1,439 Salado voters (precinct 203) cast ballots during the entire General Election.

Throughout Bell County, 6,776 voters cast ballots during the first day of early voting. Overall in the 2004 General Election, 79,668 cast ballots in the presidential race.

Early Voting began Oct. 20, and continues until Oct. 31, with some un-

usually extended hours. Early voting will be at the Salado Civic Center 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Oct. 20-24.

On Oct. 25, the early voting will be extended 7 a.m.-7 p.m. and on Oct. 26 (Sunday), the polls will be open noon-5 p.m.

The polls will be open Oct. 27-31, 7 a.m.- 8 p.m. daily to finish the Early Voting period.

Election Day will move the polls from the Salado Civic Center to the Salado Church of Christ Activity Center due to space requirements. The polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Election Day Nov. 4.

Aldermen impose 90-day moratorium on springs

Salado aldermen, two weeks after voting to take no position on the controversy surrounding the spring at Sirena, voted to impose a 90-day moratorium on improvements and construction in and around the spring area.

Mayor Merle Stalcup said that he was asking for aldermen to impose the moratorium “while we determine ownership of the springs” and other issues surrounding the springs there.

“We need to see and determine what can and cannot be done at the springs,” Stalcup said.

Stalcup said that a title company and the General Land Board were currently researching ownership of the springs area.

“Right now, we have one party taking gravel out,” he said, “and another party putting it back in.”

At first, the ordinance adopted by aldermen read that the area of moratorium would be “at the site location of the Salado Creek, Pond and within two hundred feet from the banks of the Creek and Pond.”

Activities prohibited in the area would include any of the following activities: construction; excavation; extraction of soil, earth, rock, minerals etc.; filling of soil, earth, rocks, mixtures; dredging of the designated area; modification of the designated area; renovation to the designated area and any other improvements to the designated area that may alter, damage or hinder the natural state and condition of the designated area.”

After Alderman Stephen Peters pointed out that the ordinance as written would prohibit most property owners along the Creek as it passes through the Village of Salado from doing anything to their property,

the board amended the ordinance to narrow the area of moratorium.

Curt Strong amended his motion to approve the ordinance to be an area of “50 feet in radius with Sirena at its center.”

The board voted unanimously for the 90-day moratorium, which carries with it a criminal fine not to exceed \$500 per violation and civil penalties not to exceed \$1,000 per violation.

The ordinance states that the Village Board of Aldermen “is authorized to regulate property and water sources in its corporate limits by virtue of the Texas Constitution, the Village’s police power and by the Texas Local Government Code, Chapters 211, 214, 217, Texas Water Code Section 26.177.”

The ordinance allows for the Board to extend the duration of the temporary moratorium by a majority vote of the Aldermen.

Field trip, movie will focus on Gault site

Those interested in learning more about the important, nearby, archeological excavation known as the Gault Site have two opportunities coming up the weekend of Oct. 25-26.

On Oct. 25, the Institute for the Humanities is sponsoring a field trip to the site hosted by site director, Dr. Michael Collins. And on Oct. 26, the Gault School of Archaeological Research is premiering its new film about the project entitled “An Adventure in Time: The Gault Project.”

The field trip will last about two hours and will

include a tour of the dig and an in-depth explanation of the more than half million Clovis artifacts that have been excavated to date. Dr. Collins and his team will explain how the Clovis artifacts they are uncovering are rewriting some of the earliest human history and changing archeologists’ views on how the Americas’ were first populated.

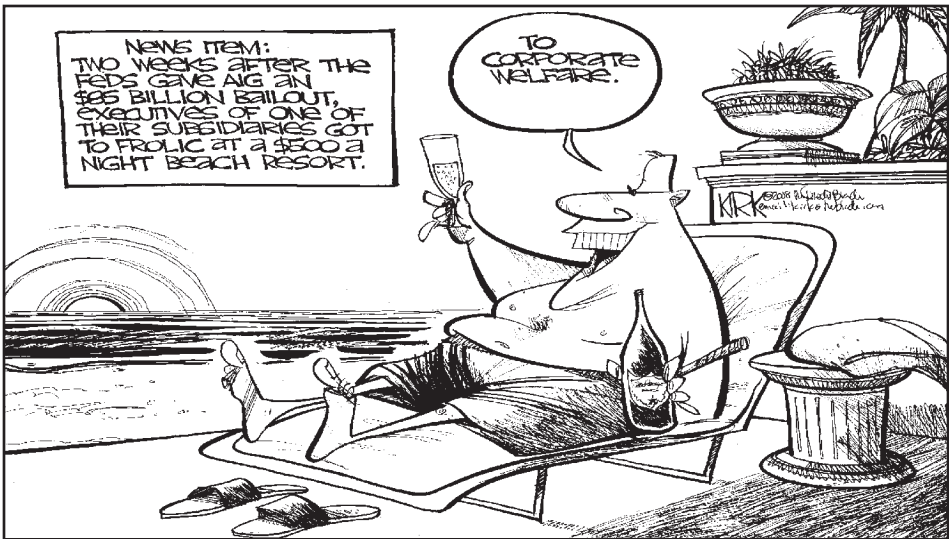

The grand illusion

The Bush years will be remembered for the cruel triumph of realism over illusion.

One of the era’s great illusions was spun by President Bush -- that the force of freedom was so irresistible, it would prevail in a place like Iraq even in the absence of law and order. Bush himself eventually realized his mistake. The second illusion -- fed by anyone who possibly could get rich from it -- is bursting now.

Wall Street is experiencing a terrible reckoning: No, interest rates can’t be held at unsustainably low rates -- 1 percent in 2003 -- without stoking wasteful investments; no, housing prices won’t always go up; no, home loans can’t be extended to people with shaky credit histories on scandalously easy terms (no money down!) with the expectation that they’ll be paid back; no, fancy financial instruments and computer models can’t eliminate risk; no, firms can’t exist on massive debt -- now-bankrupt Lehman Brothers had debts 35 times its capital -- without courting disaster.

It’s a sign of how fragile the entire financial edifice had become that a decline in housing prices of about 20 percent could precipitate the current near-meltdown. It’s easy to blame greed, as John McCain is doing at every opportunity, since it’s a given. Greed is endemic to the human condition, even if it is most visible on Wall Street. Lehman Brothers CEO Dick Fuld made \$22 million last year, leading his firm toward the abyss, while Wall Street doled out \$23.9 billion in bonuses in 2006. But everyone else joined in the wide-ranging bonanza.

As financial guru Ric Edelman writes, “The insurers got rich selling policies with fat premiums, brokerages got rich selling new securities, lenders got rich selling more loans than ever, builders, real estate agents, title settlement companies, appraisers, inspectors -- everyone got rich from the ensuing real estate boom.”

He could have included the politicians who enabled the irresponsible lending of Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac because they knew these “government-sponsored enterprises” -- since bailed out by the government at a potential cost of \$200 billion to taxpayers -- would line their campaign coffers. Fannie and Freddie were the “patient zero” of the financial contagion, encouraging and blessing the “subprime” loans that were a toxin spread throughout the financial system. Many Republicans, including McCain, wanted Fannie and Freddie reformed. As a largely Democratic cash cow, it was protected by Democrats, enamored of its mission of extending homeownership to those who -- it turns out -- couldn’t afford homes.

In this environment, it’s hard to resist calls for more regulation. But it has to be intelligent and measured. A basically solvent company, AIG was rendered illiquid by so-called mark-to-market accounting rules that say assets must be marked down to their value in the current market, even if they are ultimately worth more. This was a reform adopted in response to the Enron scandal that has worsened the current crisis.

Winston Churchill famously said that democracy is the worst system except all the others. The same could be said of capitalism. There is no way to eliminate all the human failings -- greed, exuberance, shortsightedness, fear and ignorance -- that created the predicates of this crisis and are fueling it now. If we pretend there is, we only foster another illusion.

Column recommends Sam Murphey for the District 55 House seat

The selection of Salado’s Representative in the Texas Legislative House - District 55, is of such importance to all of us here in the Village, that this column is breaking a long standing tradition, and will for the first time recommend the election of a candidate - Democrat Sam Murphey, to replace Dianne Delisi who has retired after many years of service to the district.

TWO VOTES NEEDED IN DISTRICT 55 RACE

This year the vote for the District 55 House seat will be unusual in that we will need to vote twice for our choice as representative on the General Election ballot. That ballot will contain both a “Special Election” section and the regular “General Election” listings.

The vote in the “Special Election” section of the ballot is to fill the unexpired term of Representative Delisi, and has three candidates listed - Sam Murphey (D), Ralph Sheffield (R) and Independent Danny Daniel who’s running to complete “only” the Delisi term which amounts to 70 days!

The “general election” section will list three candidates for the full two year District 55 term in the lower House: Murphey, Sheffield, and Libertarian Chris Lane. For all practical purposes, the race will be between Murphey and Sheffield and it’s important to vote in both places on the ballot (special and general) so the winner will have a two-month head start in representing the district before the 81st Session begins at high noon on January 13, 2009.

MURPHEY’S RECORD

Sam Murphey has a long record of service to both our nation and the immediate area. He returned to Bell County after 22 years of active duty Army service with tours in Vietnam, Korea, Europe and Fort Hood. He then went to work for Congressman Chet Edwards as district director headquartered in Belton, when Edwards represented the 11th District which included Bell County.

Murphy and his wife Peggy kept their home in Bell County and Sam commuted to Edwards’ main office in Waco, after the DeLay-Perry redistricting shenanigans in 2004 put Edwards in the 17th District. Sam remained as Edward’s top aide until last year when he retired. Shortly thereafter Representative Delisi announced her early retirement, and Murphey decided to enter politics on his own and filed for the District 55 House vacancy.

Bell Countians who worked with Murphey during his years as Congressman Edwards’ assistant in Belton - found an unusual public servant. “Unusual” in that he consistently followed his boss’s practice of serving everyone equally. That unique trait is called nonpartisanship (in political parlance) and is rarely found in the political arena.

It’s also one of the special qualities that makes Sam Murphey particularly well prepared to represent all of us in District 55 - not just Democrats, or Republicans, or Independents, but everyone.

IMPORTANT DIFFERENCES NOTED

There are a number of major differences between the two leading candidates for the District 55 Texas House

seat - Sam Murphey (D) and Ralph Sheffield (R). This column has selected two of the more significant and offer them as noteworthy examples:

First is the matter of school vouchers. Murphey has been consistent in his opposition to school vouchers. He has stated throughout the campaign: “Robbing our cash strapped public schools to pay for private school vouchers is wrong. Parent and teacher organizations agree with this position and have offered me their support, which I’m proud to accept.”

Sheffield’s position, on the other hand, has not been straightforward. In two debates with Murphey, he categorically denied supporting private school vouchers. However, it was discovered that Sheffield “strongly supports” private school vouchers, according to information he sent to the Free Market Foundation, a conservative political association.

Also, in checking Sheffield’s financial contribution reports, this column discovered a donation to Sheffield from James Leininger for \$27,500. Leininger is a wealthy South Texan who has supported school vouchers over the years with vast sums of money given to pro-voucher political action committees and candidates - according to the *Temple Telegram*.

Second example concerns another contribution to the Sheffield campaign, that this column believes is (or should be) a factor in the District 55 representative race. The contribution amounts to \$30,000 given by Houston homebuilder Bob Perry (no relation to the Governor).

“Lobby Watch” (published by Texans For Public Justice) reported recently that Bob Perry contributed 72 percent of all the money that Texas homebuilders gave to Governor Rick Perry and Lt. Governor David Dewhurst, as well as to 50 (mostly) Republican Senate and House members from 2005-2008. Total: \$2,877,299.00.

Which prompts the question: “Why is this wealthy homebuilder giving so much money - primarily to Republican State officials and candidates like Sheffield?”

In the main, the answer revolves around the “all-out” effort Perry and the Texas homebuilding lobby are making, to keep the Texas Residential Construction Commission (that they created) from being shut down by the Texas Sunset Commission. That recommendation reportedly due to the TRCC’s dismal record of supporting homebuilders over dissatisfied home buyers. Keeping the TRCC in place is crucial to Perry and other homebuilders - hence the need to have a voice (financially) in the “sunsetting” decision.

Sam Murphey was asked directly last week if he would accept contributions from Bob Perry. “Absolutely not! I haven’t received, nor would I ever accept, a Perry contribution,” Murphey stated emphatically.

REMEMBER TO VOTE ON NOVEMBER 4

It is hoped that this column has prepared a succinct and objective case that warrants the selection of Sam Murphey as our next representative in the Texas Legislature. It has been presented with abiding confidence that citizens of the district will be proud of the work this good man will accomplish for both the State of Texas and “all” the residents of District 55.

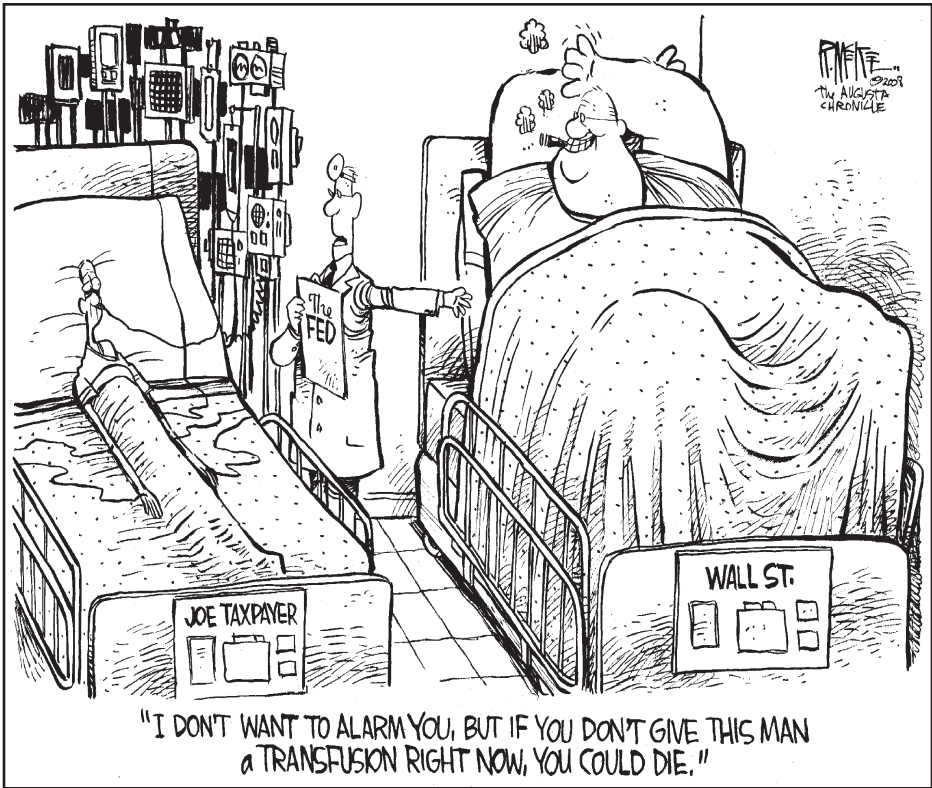

The Gault site is one of the most important archeological sites in the United States and is located just a few miles from Salado in north Williamson County. The Gault site is considered to be the most prolific site of its kind in the world. More than half of all the Clovis artifacts found worldwide have come from only 10 percent of the site. There is also considerable evidence that an even older prehistoric culture lies beneath the Clovis artifacts at the site.

Eagles shut down Lago Vista 22-0

Salado Eagles shut down the highest-rated offense in District 25AA, holding the Lago Vista Vikings to just 72 yards total offense and shutting the visitors out Oct. 17, 22-0 to improve to 4-0 in district play.

With Rogers at 3-0 following those Eagles' 45-10 win over the Lexington Eagles Oct. 17, Salado sits atop the district and has secured a playoff spot regardless of the outcome of the next two games against Academy on Oct. 24 and Rogers on Nov. 7.

While the defense choked the life out of the Vikings Slot T offense, which had averaged 379.8 yard per game prior to the contest in Salado, the Eagles offense tallied 342 yards of total offense.

Most of that came on the ground as Salado pounded out 259 yards on 43 rush-

ing attempts. Tyler Wright led all rushers with his third 100+ yards rushing game of the season, carrying the ball 15 times for 132 yards and one touchdown. Wright had 34 and 32 yards and was caught behind the line of scrimmage only once on the night.

He punched in the first touchdown of the night, a one yard dive on a fourth down.

The Eagles took 18 plays, 17 of them on the ground, to drive the length of the field, scoring on the one yard dive by Wright. Wright carried the ball 7 times for 37 yards on the drive. The only passing play was a 21 pass from Garret Ward to Tyler Coker to get across the Eagles 40 yard line. Coker scored a two-point conversion for Salado's 8-0 lead with 1:05 in the first quarter.

Tight end Coker had two catches, one for 31 yards and the other for 21 yards to lead all receivers. Trae Liller had two catches for 17 yards total while Wright caught a 10 yard pass and David Michael caught a five yard pass.

Lutz was five of five passing for 57 yards while Ward was two of three

passing for 36 yards.

The Eagles scored a second touchdown in the second quarter after Salado forced the Vikings to their second three-and-out series.

Lutz returned a Lago Vista punt for 26 yards, giving the Eagles the ball at the Viking 42 yard line. Wright burst through the Vikings' defense for a 32 yard run, setting up Lutz for an 11 yard quarterback keeper around end. The second scoring drive took only three plays and 1:07 of time. The PAT kick by Peralta gave Salado a 15-0 lead.

Lago Vista recovered a fumble hand off to Matt Ming on a reverse play with 1:58 left in the first half and drove from their own 46 to the Salado 21 before Adin Menkin missed a 38 yard field goal with no time left in the half.

That was the closest the Vikings would get to scoring as the Eagles defense held Lago Vista on its side of the midfield stripe throughout the second half.

Salado scored once with 11:53 left in the game on a nine yard run by Foster, after he had run the ball for 18 yards and the first down. Salado drove 65 yards in 2:45 and seven plays for the scoring series. Jace Peralta booted the second PAT of the night for the 22-0 lead.

Patrick Prince led the

defense with 12 assisted tackles (AT), a solo tackle (ST), a tackle for loss (TFL), a big hit and caused a fumble.

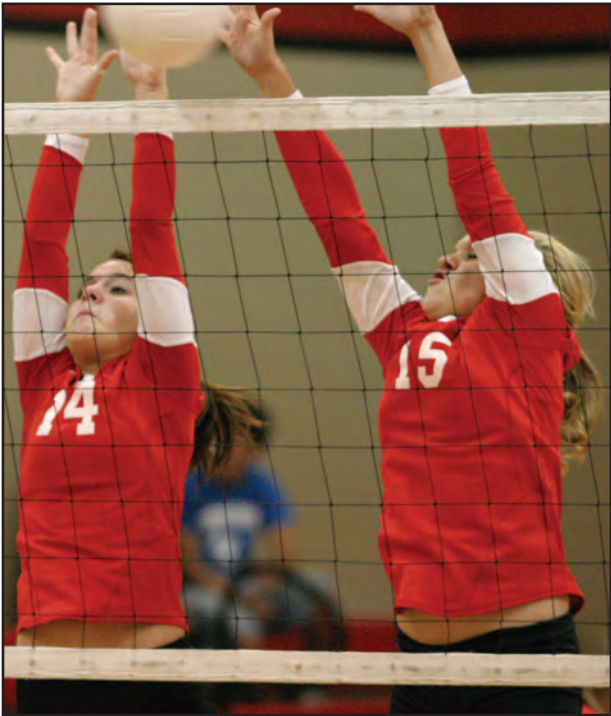

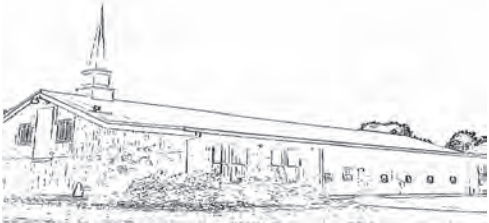

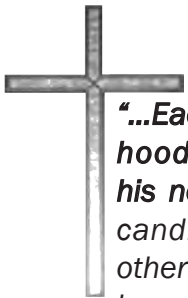

ety, plot twists and clever dialogue," notes Grainger Esch, Co-founder and Executive Director of the five-year-old, 156-seat theater,

"But Shue imbued the play with homespun, multi-faceted characters, pointing his satiric sword toward the greedy and the intolerant rather than the jaded, idle aristocracy.

"Laughs are plenty, but there is an underlying message that takes this work beyond the realm of mere comic fluff," adds Esch, who plays "Froggy" LeSueur, a British demolition expert who is training army recruits near a fishing lodge in southern Georgia.

Before departing, "Froggy" tells the widow Meeks, proprietress of

the lodge, that his friend Charlie a pathologically shy man who's overcome with fear at the thought of making conversation with strangers, is from an exotic foreign country and speaks no English.

The fun begins as Charlie overhears more than he should, including evidence of some nefarious activities from locals who think he doesn't understand a word they say. The wildly funny climax, in which things go uproariously awry for the "bad guys" and the "good guys" emerge triumphant, was given a standing ovation on opening night.

Saladoan Tony Blackman plays the sad-shy-playful foreigner Charlie Baker who "Froggy" has

brought along to provide some relief from Charlie's dying wife. Blackman, the Spur's Technical Director, also gets credit for placing an elaborate set on the limited stage without it appearing cluttered.

"What we lack in size, we make up for with heartfelt performances by our dedicated seven-member cast," Blackman said. "Providing the heartbeat for those performances is our Musical Director, Nelda Milligan, who has arranged lovely musical accompaniment, and, in the fine Silver Spur tradition, performs it live.

Betsy Tyson, President of Salado's Living Room Theater handles the role of Betty Meeks. The seemingly humble Rev. David Lee is played by Jacky Dumas of Temple, a drama teacher at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor.

Garrett Clark, 13, of Belton makes his stage debut as Ellard Simms, the simpleton brother of spoiled heiress Catherine Simms, played by Rebekah Grayson of Salado. Tom Rolls, also a local, plays racist county property inspector Owen Musser.

Kevin Carr of Round Rock will step into the role of "Froggy" on selected occasions during the run. Preston Kirk of Spicewood, TX, will assume the role for the Nov. 7-8 and 14-15 performances.

Contract Bridge

Let's first imagine you're an average bridge player. Then let's stretch your imagination further and assume there's a national championship in progress at a nearby convention center. Since you've never seen the experts play, you decide to go there to see for yourself whether these sharks are as good as they're cracked up to be.

You get there bright and early one day and sit down alongside Harry Grumble (South), an expert who's said to be almost as good as he thinks he is.

On the very first hand, he gets to three notrump as shown. Maybe you wouldn't have bid his hand the same way, but, when dummy appears, you realize that our hero has somehow stumbled into the best contract.

Grumble ducks two rounds of hearts and wins the third one with the ace. Since that's what you'd have done, you are not particularly impressed. But when he next leads a spade to the king, you start to wonder why in the world he did this rather than run his diamonds first.

You get no time to consider the question, because Grumble leads a diamond from dummy and plays low after East produces the jack! This proves to be another lucky shot,

because he winds up making three notrump, whereas he would have gone down had he tried to run the diamonds by leading them from his hand, or had he not ducked East's jack.

When you go home and study the hand, you realize it was more than just blind luck that induced Grumble to choose this line of play, and that maybe he knows a thing or two more about the game than your regular crowd does. It kind of makes you think.

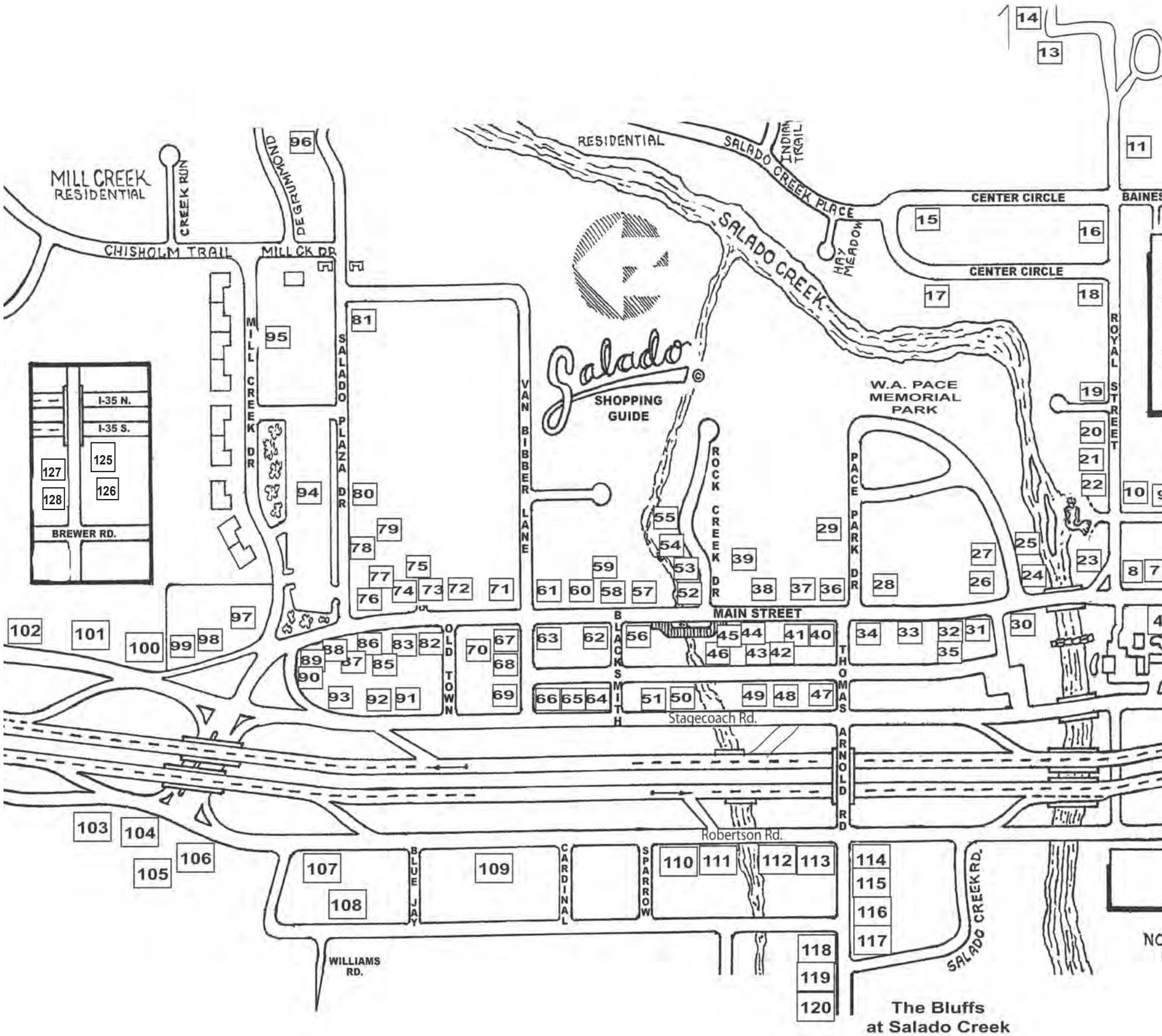



Why primitive culture diets may be better for your overall health

I often wonder why our country has not given more thought to the studies done on nutrition by anthropologists. What is wrong with a “primitive” diet that creates straight teeth with no cavities, good physiques, and resistance to disease? Why not take a look at traditional nutritional concepts that create fine bodies, ease of reproduction, emotional stability and freedom from degenerative ills?

A quick look at the nutritional regimens of the people from villages in Switzerland, Gaelic communities in the Outer Hebrides, the indigenous peoples of North and South America, Melanesian and Polynesian South Sea Islanders, African tribes, Australian Aborigines and New Zealand Maori, and one would quickly see the importance in understanding the value of these traditional diets rich in essential nutrients.

If you have any interest in improving the quality of your health or the quantity of your life, you may want to take a good look at the differences between “their” Traditional Diets versus “our” Modern Diet. Basic Premise: The Traditional Diet maximized nutrients and the Modern Diet minimizes nutrients. How?

1. Traditional Diets food come from fertile soils where Modern Diets come from depleted soils.
2. TD’s focused on organ meats over muscle meats, where MD’s prefer muscle meats and consume literally no organ meats.
3. TD’s were loaded with natural animal fat but today’s diets are loaded with processed vegetable

oils. 4. If dairy products were consumed in a Traditional Diet they were raw and/or fermented versus today’s pasteurized/ultra-pasteurized and homogenized dairy products.

5. In past cultures, grains and legumes were soaked and/or fermented, but today grains are refined and grains/legumes are very rarely prepared properly.

6. If soy was consumed, it was in small amounts and only after a long fermentation process. Unfortunately, now the majority of soy foods are man-made, industrially processed, genetically modified and consumed in large amounts.

7. Back in the day, bone broths were always available, now the majority of soups can be found to be loaded with MSG and artificial flavorings.

8. In Traditional Diets there wasn’t a concern for refined sweeteners as there is now because everything was unrefined.

9. The food that was indigenous to each tribe was loaded with natural vitamins compared to today where synthetic vitamins are either added to the food or taken alone.

10. During the agriculture age, and before the industrialization age, farms used traditional seeds with open pollination, versus now where the lands are loaded with Hybrid and GMO seeds.

11. The focus was always on traditional cooking and there was no irra-

diating or microwaving of the foods (www.westonaprice.org).

People constantly tell me that they know how and what they should eat. But do they really? (I certainly hope they did not get this idea from looking at a nutritional pyramid) Do they understand their metabolic make up? Do they understand the workings of the hormones Insulin, Cortisol, Ghrelin, and Leptin, and how they affect their bodies? Do they know all of the ways a “one-size-fits-all” or “cookie cutter” diet will increase cellular turnover and in effect accelerate their aging process? Do they understand the damage that is done by consuming a modern day diet? Probably not, but for now, I want to make this point, no one, and I mean NO ONE is improving their health by consuming a modern day diet (I don’t care what you look like or what you feel like, it is literally impossible). Be it an infant, child, teenager, adult or senior, everyone can benefit from practicing some of the concepts learned from the basics of the traditional diet.

Making films for the fun of it

I had the privilege recently to judge the American Motion Picture Society's annual film competition. Three of us watched the entries for eight straight nights. Some of the sessions lasted up to four hours. When they asked me to be one of the judges, I said yes without realizing what a grueling time was ahead. It was fascinating, though. The 63 entries came from all over the world. The categories were nature, travel, experimental, documentary, adventure drama and comedy. The length of the entries ranged from two minutes to half an hour. The first film we watched was from Madagascar. It was about lemurs, little creatures that

bounce from one point to another instead of walking. It was totally enthralling. The second one we watched, also in the nature category, was titled "Wagtails" and showed some incredible footage of birds in England carefully building an architecturally superb nest on top of a row of fencing only to see it blown off during a windstorm (it won for best photography). One entry from Africa was about predatory animals and had some gruesome shots of wild dogs catching their prey and eating it.

These filmmakers are all amateurs, although some of their work looked professional. The rules state the entries must be made strictly for the love of the medium and not for any commercial gain. Entries that earned money were not allowed. Now that the competition is over, I hope some of these make their way to television or movie houses because they are of high quality.

Although it is called AMPS (American Motion Picture Society), very few entries came from the United States. The first night of judging there was only one: a travel piece on Chicago. Filmmakers from other countries made

movies located in the USA. A group from the British Isles made a movie on forest fires in Utah. A group from Germany did a piece on Indians. On the other hand, some students from Iowa State made a movie in Africa.

The topics were fascinating. One was about body painting. What appear to be girls wearing shirts are actually girls wearing only their painted skin. We saw copper-smiths and potters make incredibly beautiful items by hand. Some of the entries were about Venice and Iguazu Falls. Others were about penguins. We judged on the story, photography, editing, and sound.

When it was all over, the winning entry was a piece from Belgium on Flanders Field, the American Memorial Cemetery from World War One. The production techniques involved, using evocative music and historical photographs and archive film material, made it truly remarkable.

It just barely won. Coming in an extremely close second was a film from Poland on the Auschwitz concentration camp. It was riveting. Stunning. It won the best foreign film award.

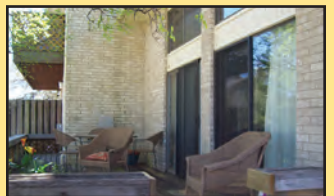

TEMPORARY MORATORIUM ON IMPROVEMENTS & CONSTRUCTION TO SALADO SIRENA POND AND SURROUNDING AREA

AN ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF SALADO, TEXAS, ESTABLISHING A TEMPORARY MORATORIUM ON ANY CONSTRUCTION, MODIFICATION, RENOVATION, DREDGING, FILLING, EXCAVATING, GRADING, MINING, EXTRACTION OR OTHER IMPROVEMENT ON THE SALADO SIRENA POND, AND SURROUNDING AREA; AND PROVIDING FOR THE FOLLOWING: FINDINGS OF FACT; A PURPOSE; COMPLIANCE REQUIRED; SCOPE OF JURISDICTION; APPLICABILITY; EFFECTIVE DATE; DURATION; INCLUDING CRIMINAL FINES NOT TO EXCEED \$500.00 AND CIVIL PENALTIES NOT TO EXCEED \$1,000.00 PER VIOLATION; A REPEALER; SEVERABILITY; AND PROPER NOTICE AND MEETING.

- WHEREAS,** the Board of Alderman of the Village of Salado seeks to maintain the historical value, significance and importance of the Village of Salado Creek, Sirena Pond (the "Pond") including the Boiling Springs (the "Springs") and surrounding areas; and
- WHEREAS,** recent events and actions have threatened the quality and natural state of the Village Pond and Springs containing the historical Village statute "Sirena of Salado"; and
- WHEREAS,** the Board of Alderman finds that a temporary moratorium is necessary and prudent in order to protect the *status quo* so that the Board of Alderman may adopt the appropriate administrative and regulatory amendments, rules and procedures.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMAN OF THE VILLAGE OF SALADO, TEXAS:

B. Moratorium

Prohibited Actions: the following actions are prohibited at the site location of the Pond, Springs and within a fifty foot (50) radius surrounding the Sirena of Salado statute:

- (1) Any construction;
- (2) Any excavation;
- (3) Any extraction of soil, earth, rocks, minerals, etc;
- (4) Any filling of soil, earth, rocks, mixtures, etc;
- (5) Any dredging of the designated area;
- (6) Any modification to the designated area;
- (7) Any renovation to the designated area;
- (8) Any other improvements to the designated area that may alter, damage, or hinder the natural state and condition of the designated area.

3. ENFORCEMENT

A. Civil & Criminal Penalties

The Village shall have the power to administer and enforce the provisions of this Ordinance as may be required by governing law. Any person violating any provision of this Ordinance is subject to suit for injunctive relief as well as prosecution for criminal violations. Any violation of this Ordinance is hereby declared to be a nuisance.

PASSED & APPROVED this the 16 day of October, 2008, by a vote of 5 (ayes) to 0 (nays) to 0 (abstentions) of the Board of Alderman of the Village of Salado, Texas.


