Sales taxes up again for village

The December sales tax allocation to the Village of Salado were up but the Library District's payment was down for December.

The Village of Salado was paid \$29,580.53 in December, which is almost five percent more than last December when the Village received \$28,312.43. For the calendar year, the Village is about five percent of 2007; the Village had received \$357,682.26 in 2008 compared to \$341,702.71 in 2007.

The Village collects a one-percent sales tax within its boundaries of approximately two-square

The Salado Public Library District received \$20,443.86 in December which is five percent less than last December's \$21,586.97. For the year, however, the Library District is four percent ahead, having received

\$259,373.69 compared to \$250,336.47 in 2007.

The Library District levies a half-cent sales tax within its boundaries that are the same as Salado Independent School District and encompass about 100 square miles.

Bell County government received a check of \$1.05 million in December, which is three percent more than last year's December payment of \$1.02 million. For the year, the County has received \$13.58 million compared to \$12.99 last year, an increase of almost five percent.

The growth shown by the Village and by the County are similar to the growth shown statewide.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said the state collected \$1.98 billion in sales tax in November, up 4.7 percent compared to November 2007.

'For the first three months of the state's 2009 fiscal year, state sales tax collections have continued to grow," Combs said. "However, the increase is less than in the past three years, and collections from important sectors such as retail trade and construction have declined slight-

The Comptroller sent cities, counties, special purpose districts and transit systems their final sales tax allocations of 2008 — \$488 million, up 9.2 percent compared to last December. Despite the economic slowdown, Combs said local governments collected \$5.9 billion in sales tax this year, 6.3 percent more than in 2007.

Combs sent Texas cities December sales tax allocations of \$328.5 million, up 9.5 percent compared to December 2007. City sales tax allocations during calendar year 2008 totaled \$4 billion, up 5.6 percent compared to 2007. Counties' December sales tax allocations totaled \$30.8 million, up 11.8 percent compared to December 2007. Counties received \$365.8 million in sales tax during calendar year 2008, up 7.9 percent compared to last year.

Ten local transit systems received December sales tax allocations of \$109.7 million, a 5.1 percent increase over December 2007. Sales tax allocations to transit systems this year totaled \$1.3 billion, up 6.2 percent compared to the 2007 total. December sales tax allocations of \$19.2 million went to 150 special purpose taxing districts, an increase of 26.4 percent compared to last December. Special purpose districts received \$215.1 million during 2008, up 19.1 percent compared to 2007.

"In addition to our Christmas Project and Back-To-School Shopping Project. Salado Family Relief also helps qualifying families with assistance on Rent and/or Electric bills," Oas said. "Due to the state of the economy, we have had a lot of requests these past six months.

Marilyn Fleischer helped to organize the efforts of two school employees into a concerted effort.

"I saw Dana Britt and the late Mary Ribeiro going through piles of old toys to sort them out to give to the young school kids they came across every day," Fleischer said. "After working with them one year, I knew there was a definite need in Salado."

Fleischer worked with representatives from churches and civic groups to organize the Salado Family Relief Fund. The first effort of the SFRF was to provide Christmas to screened families in Salado.


During its infancy, the SFRF collected more than \$15,000 from Saladoans and Salado groups to give to the victims of the Jarrell tornado.

"It was then that we decided to organize into a 501c(3) organization and elect a board of directors," Fleischer said.

Obama's new Clinton administration

Barack Obama has succeeded where Hillary Clinton failed. She hoped to win a third Clinton term, but it is her vanquisher who is reconstituting the Clinton administration.

Obama's nominee for treasury secretary, Timothy Geithner, served under Clinton Treasury Secretaries Robert Rubin and Larry Summers. Summers himself is Obama's choice to head the National Economic Council. Both are part of Rubin's circle, known for its brains and its relative moderation.

Few would have guessed back when Obama rose from the snows of Iowa that highly experienced economic technicians would represent "change we can believe in." Thankfully, Obama's airy rhetoric about a new kind of politics was more a pitch for impressionable new voters than a description of his governing style.

So far, President-elect Obama has acted with a ruthless pragmatism. He ignored the yowling left-wing blogosphere when it demanded Joe Lieberman's head, turned to the initially pro-Iraq War Hillary Clinton for his top foreign-policy job, and staffed up with former Clintonites. Obama has been a shape-shifter throughout his brief political career, and the latest shape -- an establishment Democrat determined to do whatever works -- is the best version yet.

Obama appears to be reconsidering for now his promised repeal of President Bush's "tax cuts for the rich." Twice during the primaries, Obama hinted that he might put off the tax hikes if the economy was in distress, but he could never admit what was obvious: Proposing tax increases in the teeth of a recession was madness

If Obama is wise, he'll not only jettison his plans for a tax increase that in aiming at the rich would also hit successful small businesses, but also will put off

his plans for a "cap-and-trade" program to tax the use of fossil fuels, forswear all his protectionist sentiments from the primaries, and ditch his support for a "card check" plan to promote the unionization of the American work force. Anything that burdens business should be anathema to Dr. Fix-the-Economy.

For now, the showpiece of Obama's economic program is a massive stimulus bill that the Democratic Congress wants to have ready for his signature as soon as he departs the Capitol Hill steps after his inauguration. Even some conservative economists believe a fiscal stimulus is necessary to keep us out of a deflationary spiral, but Obama is only asking a Democratic Congress -- given to fiscal incontinence even in rosy economic circumstances -- to do what comes naturally.

We can't know what new twists the crisis will take. We do know that Obama will need more than a ruthless pragmatism to navigate through it. In his masterly "The Great Inflation and Its Aftermath," Robert Samuelson chronicles the extraordinary stalwartness of President Ronald Reagan when he allowed Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volcker to squeeze inflation painfully out of the economic system the last time we had a downturn this severe, in 1981-1982

That took guts. Obama will need them as well, and they won't be on loan from any adviser, no matter what his pedigree.

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Column covers political spectrum from "Car Czar" to Dallas recount, plus Speaker and Governor's race

Who among us would have dreamed last December that this year's holiday season would be celebrated "slap-dab" in the middle of a full fledged recession? And instead of spending our time in a full-tilt "shop 'till you drop" mode, we're trying to decide who to select as our first "Car Czar!"

Not known at this writing exactly how a "bridge loan" will be made to the Detroit automakers (thus staving off their uncertain journey into bankruptcy), but all signs point to the President authorizing Treasury or the Federal Reserve to lend up to \$14 billion to GM, Chrysler and Ford - from the unused TARP (or other) funds.

In any event the government will become part owner of at least two of the big three auto giants, with a presidential appointee to monitor the taxpayer loan and see that car-makers keep their promises to "go and sin no more!"

It's been a wild ride thus far. We've bailed out the financial markets that helped screw up the economy. Kept the discredited "F and F" gang (and AIG) from tanking and now we have the ailing auto industry hopefully taking aim on restructure, reform and competition for the long haul.

Cost of all this, you ask? Don't - just accept the fact we are creating a "here to eternity" mortgage on America. Our next challenge will deal with making the monthly payments on that debt!

INTERESTING QUESTION

The Congressional Oversight Panel, created to watchdog the Treasury Department's \$700 billion "rescue plan" to stabilize our financial system, raised a troubling question in hearings held last week in Washington. The inquiry by the lone GOP panelist, Rep. Jeb Hensarling (Dallas): "Congress has told automakers they would have to reform before they get federal aid, but the Treasury Department didn't require financial institutions to present a viable business plan or replace "failed" executives prior to receiving their funds - why not?"

Last week's congressional hearing by the oversight group blasted the Treasury Department's less than transparent "economic bailout" plan that was, according to the panel, primarily assisting banks, but with no discernible results benefiting average

* * * * IT'S OFFICIAL: GOP BY 19 VOTES

It's official, after two recounts of some 42,631 votes, incumbent Linda Harper-Brown (R-Irving) was declared the winner of the November 4, District 105 Texas House seat by 19 votes!

The election day tabulation gave the incumbent a 29 vote win over Democratic challenger Rob Romano, which required a mandatory recount by the Dallas County Election Department.

The second count included provisional as well as overseas ballots and ended up with a 20 vote win by Harper-Brown.

Romano, immediately asked the Election Division of the Secretary of State's Office in Austin for another recount due to the "new" razor-thin margin of victory.

The additional verification was made last week by the Dallas Election

Officials and the Republican incumbent was certified as the winner, this time with a "final" 19 vote victory.

With District 105 nailed down on the Republican side of the House of Representatives - the membership is officially divided with 76 GOPers and 74 Democrats. Presumably enough Republican votes to determine the Speakership for the 81st Session, slated to begin at high noon on Jan. 13, 2009.

BATTLE FOR SPEAKER CONTINUES

Speaker Tom Craddick (R-Midland) and his loyalists are pulling out all the stops to try and stem the tide of an uprising within the conservative ranks, where there are rumored to be as many as ten potential speaker candidates vying for "Uncle Tom's" chair.

Some 64 (of the 74 Democrats) have signed what some members are terming an unconditional "ABC" pledge ("Anyone-but-Craddick") in opposition to the Speaker's bid for a fourth term.

Demos may be waiting on the sidelines for a chance to play "kingmaker" by shifting allegiance to help Republicans elect a new speaker and being first in line for "choice" committee assignments.

The word "Chutzpa" comes to mind when we think of Craddick's current scramble for another term as Speaker. Readers will recall the closing days of the last session that nearly ended with his ouster resulting from a near "palace coup" that took some fancy parliamentary legerdemain to keep the dissidents from prevailing.

AND FINALLY.....

This week's column has covered the political waterfront from Car Czars; to recounting November 4, votes (a third time); to the feisty House Speaker Tom Craddick and his future; and ending with the upcoming gubernatorial rumble that's already making waves despite being 23 months down the road.

Senator Kay Hutchison is forming the proper committees to become a full fledged candidate for Texas Governor. She can legally keep her Senate sinecure while running for Governor, although there is a political downside to doing so. Old Rick "Landslide" Perry has already indicated he plans to run for a fourth term.

Democrat Chris Bell, who almost won two years ago, has not been heard from recently, but may join the fray along with Kinky Friedman who has opined he might do a number of things - none of which will be helpful to anyone.

The dark horse in this important race is Republican Lieutenant Governor David Dewhurst. He has stockpiled plenty of money for a gubernatorial run - but insiders say he really wants to be a U.S. Senator.

Perry is in hopes Hutchison will resign early on, so he can appoint Dewhurst to the Senate, thus removing the one candidate who most observers feel can win without a runoff against all comers, including the incumbent and Hutchison.

Texas politics could provide a 2009 breather from the ongoing recessional worries - fact is any reduction in that subject will be worthwhile and welcome.

Reader seeking information on Salado sewage treatment location and plans

Dear Editor,

I'm looking for information as apparently Salado is going to get a domestic sewage treatment plant. I saw in a local paper that Salado Utility, Inc. has filed an application with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality for a permit. The permit is to discharge treated domestic wastewater at an average daily flow not to exceed 300,000 gallons per day. That amount of sewage effluent is what I would expect to be generated by about 2,000 people which, I believe is approximately the population of Salado. While there are no details of the plans by Salado Utility, Inc., to me it stands to reason that they are planning on treating sewage from an area about the size of Salado and with the plant being located so close to Salado, I have to think Salado residents are the targets.

Another thing I find a little disturbing is that the location is given as "ap-


proximately 6,560 feet northeast of the intersection of I-35 and Farm-To-Market 2268." According to my reckoning that places this sewage treatment plant just a little east of the Salado Cemetery or a little east of the Mill Creek area. Since no street address is given, it is difficult to pin down the exact location.

Regardless of the exact location, it means that my house will be downwind of this plant when we have a northeast or east wind. Having spent a considerable number of hours and days around domestic sewage plants, I know how they can smell during an operational upset which is going to happen from time to time. According to the permit application this plant will be using a biological membrane reactor, which so far as I know is the latest in domestic sewage treatment technology. However, the influent to the plant and the proposed digester will still have the unpleasant odor normally associated with such plants. In addition, the permit application states the digested sludge will be trucked away from the plant. I can only hope that truck does not use the main roads of Salado because if it does and is involved in an accident, well, suffice it to say it will not be pretty.

While I know I'm not very well versed on what goes on in Salado, this plant application was a total surprise considering the reaction I saw to the proposed power line that is to be built east of town. The sewage plant will also be east of town, but not as far east as the power line and it has a much greater probability of being an unpleasant neighbor than does that high voltage power line.

If someone can shed some light on the plans for this plant and from whom and how it will be paid for, it will be appreciated.


Capt. Hill earns Army **Achievement Medal**

Well-being in 2008: **Nutrition & Sleep**

LIFESTYLE AND WELLNESS

Over the past year I have brought up numerous concepts concerning improving your well-being by simply improving your lifestyle. Today, we will review a number of these daily changes that can slow the aging process and move you toward optimal health! (Part 1 of 2)

1. PROPER TRITION: When taking on the challenge of improving your health and fitness levels, there are three major components that must be monitored: Nutrition, Resistance Training, and Cardio Respiratory Training. Now this may surprise you, but the most important component is simple and clear, you must begin with NUTRITION.

Here is the reason why. If you eat properly for your genetic and environmental make-up (your own bio-chemical individuality), you not only can keep disease at bay but you can also begin the process of disease reversal. Before I work with anyone on any Lifestyle and Wellness Program, I require an initial session that goes over proper nutrition.

Following a proper nutritional program is by far the most difficult of the three components to follow because it is a 24-7-365 challenge, but the benefits can and should be remarkable.

To follow the basics of a properly created nutritional program you must focus on these three variables first: 1) The Quality of your Food, 2) The Frequency of the Meals Consumed, and 3) The Combinations (or ratios) of your Carbohydrates, Protein and Fat.

Then and only then, when you have mastered these three variables do you begin to really focus on portion size. If you begin to eat foods with an increased nutritional value (quality), more often (frequency), and combine them properly (macro nutrient combinations), not only will your health improve, but a by-product of proper nutrition will be an improved physique and/or fitness level. Another beneficial by-product of proper nutrition is its helping control a plethora of hormonal levels, including: insulin, glucagon, cortisol, ghrelin and leptin!

PROPER SLEEP: 2. A good night of quality sleep of seven to nine hours will help the body rest, but also, recover, repair, and recuperate. There are many systems in the body and they are all interconnected, so if one system does not recover from the stresses of the day, all of the others will be affected.

If you are having physical, emotional or hormonal issues, it could be related in some way to your lack of proper sleep. The immune system can be compromised up to sixty percent with just one poor night of sleep.

We need to make a conscious effort to improve our sleep patterns or our organs and glands will feel the effects and will succumb to accelerated aging and disease. It is no wonder that sleep deprivation has been linked to vitamin deficiencies, diabetes and hypoglycemia, among other health challenges.

Here are some things to remember when prioritizing sleep in your life. Just as we have moved away from real food, we have moved away from getting up at the crack of dawn and going to bed as the sun sets. Synthetic light (light bulbs, television screens, computers, etc.), just like modern convenience foods, is a new phenomenon and it clearly has an adverse effect on our health. The body has a circadian rhythm that normally follows the cycle of the sun. But man-made light, made to imitate the sun, can throw the body's natural rhythm If you followed a healthy circadian rhythm you would see hormonal patterns develop. This is important, as the balance of hormones in your body is a major indicator of your health.

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

There are some decisions you must make at the bridge table where you can't be sure you're right. That is the nature of the game, and the best that can be done in these cases is to exercise your best judgment and hope everything turns out all right.

Take this deal where you're in four hearts and West cashes the K-Q of spades, on which East plays the 4-8. West shifts to the club deuce, and you follow low from dummy, losing to the king. Back comes the nine of spades, which you trump as West follows with the three. The only problem remaining is to avoid a trump loser. Normally, you'd play the A-K, hoping to catch the queen on the first or second round.

Granting that that's what you usually do with nine cards of a suit missing the queen, playing for the drop is something you should always think about twice. Sometimes it is right to abandon the so-called percentage play in favor of the finesse, and in this case, you should do a bit more investigating before deciding what to

Accordingly, after playing a trump to the ace, you cash the A-K of diamonds and ruff a diamond, on which East's queen falls. When you now lead a second trump and East follows low, you are faced with the crucial decision.

West almost surely started with the A-K-Q-3 of spades, given East's failure to signal at trick one and West's discontinuing the suit after the second trick. The clubs appear to be divided 4-4, judging from West's fourth-best lead of the deuce.

Since East also seems to have started with three diamonds to the queen, it follows that his original distribution was 3-3-3-4, making the trump finesse likely to win. Maybe vou shouldn't bet the old family homestead on it, but the finesse now has better than a 50-50 chance of succeeding.

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
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
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Some good & bad advice



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

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

Balance a forced-air heating system

Q: It doesn't seem to matter whether I open or close the registers in certain rooms -- my house is constantly too cold in some spots and too hot in others. The insulation seems fine, and the heater is working fine. I change the filter every two months. What else can I check? -- John P., Worcester, Mass.

A: You may be able to further balance a forced-air heating system if dampers have been installed within the delivery air ducts leading to the registers. Check along the air duct run as far as possible to locate air dampers. These are indicated by a wing nut installed directly in the duct that does not seem to be

joining anything.

If this wing nut is perpendicular to the duct (say, the duct is horizontal but the wing nut is oriented vertical), the damper is closed, restricting airflow. Use a screwdriver or manually turn the wing nut parallel to the duct, thereby opening the damper.


Try to locate as many of these dampers as possible. Working with a partner who is inside the living area of the house, find out where these ducts lead and if air flows or stops flowing to different areas of the house depending on whether the damper is open or closed.

Then, label the damper. Using a permanent marker, write the duct's

destination (such as the living room or a bedroom), and mark what angles the wing nut should be at when closed and when open.

Using this method of opening or closing dampers in the air ducts, you can balance the heating system a bit better so that additional warm air flows into colder areas of the house and is diverted from parts of the house that are too hot

HOME TIP: To save on heating costs, don't turn a thermostat to its highest setting hoping to quickly heat a room -- keep it at a lower temperature setting and give the system about 20 minutes to bring the room up to a comfortable temperature.

Dear EarthTalk: Is it true that palm oil, common in snack foods and health & beauty products, is destroying rainforests? If so, what can consumers do about it?

It's no wonder that worldwide demand for palm oil has surged in recent years. Long used in cosmetics, palm oil is now all the rage in the snack food industry, since it is transfat-free and therefore seen as healthier than the shortening it replaces.

But to produce palm oil in large enough quantities to meet growing demand, farmers across Southeast Asia have been clearing huge swaths of biodiversity-rich tropical rainforest to make room for massive palm plantations. Today palm oil production is the largest cause of deforestation in Indonesia and other equatorial countries with dwindling expanses of tropical rainforest. Indonesia's endangered population, orangutan which depends upon the rainforest, has dwindled by as much as 50 percent in recent years.

The clearing of these forests is a big factor in global warming, given how much carbon dioxide (CO2) trees store when left alone. Once forests are cut, tons of CO2 heads skyward where it does the most harm. Also, when not replaced by palm

sive timber harvesting and a widespread conversion of the land to agriculture, which would add a heavy pollution load onto the already compromised land, air and water. It is up to the countries involved in palm oil production to regulate the industry and budget sufficient funds for enforcement. But with huge profits coming in from the sale of palm oil, public officials in Indonesia and elsewhere are loathe to clamp down on their golden goose.

Several of the largest palm oil producers have joined forces with banks and nonprofit groups to try to green up the industry. In 2003, some 200 commercial entities in the global palm oil supply

green-friendly practices throughout the industry. The group celebrated its first shipment of "sustainable palm oil" to Europe this past November.

Despite progress, many green leaders are skeptical that RSPO has the teeth to make a positive impact on the fast-growing palm oil industry. Greenpeace International considers RSPO to be "little more than greenwash," pointing out that at least one RSPO-certified producer-United Plantations, a supplier to Nestlé and Unilever-is deforesting Indonesia's vulnerable peat land forests. And Sinar Mas, another major RSPO player, has cleared tropical rainforest all over the country for its

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chain met and established the Roundtable on Sustainable Palm Oil (RSPO) to promote the growth of palm oil in an environmentally friendly manner. RSPO works to develop definitions and criteria for the sustainable production of palm oil, while facilitating the adoption of more

palm oil plantations, and is still expanding rapidly. Greenpeace is calling for a moratorium on deforestation throughout Indonesia so that the RSPO and the government can take stock and then proceed accordingly.

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Sheets or liquid - What is the best fabric softener choice?

Dear EarthTalk: Which is better for our environment: to use dryer sheets in the dryer or liquid fabric softener in the wash? It seems they both have properties that are not very green.

-- Deborah, via e-mail

If you're concerned about the health and safety of your family members, you might want to stay away from both conventional dryer sheets and liquid fabric softeners altogether. While it may be nice to have clothes that feel soft, smell fresh and are free of static cling, both types of products contain chemicals known to be toxic to people after sustained exposure.

According to the health and wellness website Sixwise.com, some of the most harmful ingredients in dryer sheets and liquid fabric softener alike include benzyl acetate (linked to pancreatic cancer), benzyl alcohol (an upper respiratory tract irritant), ethanol (linked to central nervous system disorders), limonene (a known carcinogen) and chloroform (a neurotoxin and carcinogen), among others.

Since fabric softeners are designed to stay in your clothes for extended periods of time, such chemicals can seep out gradually and be inhaled or absorbed directly through the skin. Liquid fabric softeners are slightly preferable to dryer sheets, as the chemicals in dryer sheets get released into the air when they are heated up in the dryer and can pose a respiratory health risk to those both inside and outside the home.

For those who don't want to give up the benefits of fabric softeners but are afraid to risk exposure to potentially toxic chemicals, National Geo-

graphic's Green Guide recommends adding either a quarter cup of baking soda or a quarter cup of white vinegar to the wash cycle. Either one will soften clothes, while the latter will also address static cling. (Be sure not to mix either with bleach, though, as resulting chemical reactions could cause noxious fumes.) If eliminating static cling is your top priority, try drying naturalfiber clothes separately from synthetic materials. The combination of cotton and polyester is often the culprit behind static cling. Better yet, reports Green Guide, line dry synthetic clothing, as it tends to dry fairly quickly anyway.

A few companies have heeded the ever-increasing call for greener, safer ways to soften clothes and reduce static cling. Seventh Generation's Natural Lavender Scent Fabric Softener and Ecover's Natural Fabric Softener are both good choices that rely on vegetable products and natural essential oils instead of harsh chemicals

to get the job done.

Another safer option is Maddocks' Static Eliminator, a non-toxic, hypoallergenic reusable dryer sheet made out of a proprietary, chemical-free polynylon. The Canadian company Maddocks originally developed the material to rid industrial-scale mechanical systems of explosion-inducing static electricity, but soon realized that it could benefit consumers as well, who can now buy the sheetseach one is good for some 500 wash loads—from natural foods retailers as well as from several online vendors.
