BOA addressing vacancies at City Hall

EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

Chrissy Lee will take over City Secretary duties beginning Oct. 1 as Mary Ann Ray will take an early retirement package at the end of the month. In addition, Mayor Skip Blancett has announced that he is turning over the investigation into Village Administrator Kim Foutz to Village legal counsel.

On Sept. 15, aldermen voted 4-1 to place Foutz on paid administrative leave "for a period not to exceed 30 days under terms set by the Mayor, in order for the Mayor or his designees to conduct an investigation into complaints against the Administrator and to determine if the Administrator's employment contract should be terminated for Good Cause."

Initially, Mayor Blancett announced on Sept. 15 that he would appoint Mayor Pro Tem Fred Brown and Alderman Michael

McDougal. That changed on Sept. 22 following the executive session when he announced that the Village legal counsel would conduct the investigation into complaints against the Administrator.

Aldermen on Sept. 22 voted unanimously to appoint Chrissy Lee as the City Secretary following an executive session to discuss "the appointment, employment, and/or reassignment of the following positions: interim Village Administrator, Village Secretary, Village Planner and Receptionist."

This will make Lee the fourth person as City Secretary since Margaret Murray left in October

Ashley Bingham is also leaving the Village. Lyndsev Barrett left Village employ on June 17.

The Village will honor outgoing employees at a 6 p.m. reception Sept. 29 at the Municipal Building.

Neighbors must work together to prevent spread of Oak Wilt

The oak trees of Salado are a rich heritage according to History of Salado, Texas compiled by Mary-Belle Brown and Bill Kinnison. One can imagine Native American tribes camping near or under trees by Salado Creek as they carved flint and hunted. Mexican and American settlers also chose to build homes around and near the trees such as Dr. Benjamin McKie and his wife Eva who built their home in Salado amongst giant oak trees. Their home is now known as Twelve Oaks. Today we see families and friends gathering under the trees to play in the creek and share a picnic lunch.

Because of this rich heritage and the grace and charm the oak trees bring to the Village of Salado, seeing the signs of oak wilt again appearing is disheartening. Learning to identify oak wilt and taking efforts to prevent the spread of the destruc-

tive disease caused by a fungus is our only hope of reducing the damage to

the oak trees in Salado. Basic information is useful to help in this effort. First, Saladoans need to be able to identify symptoms of oak wilt. Texas A & M Forest Service Oak Wilt Specialist Emily Driscoll says to look for leaves on live oak trees that develop yellow veins and eventually turn brown. Infected red oak trees' leaves are more difficult to identify. In early spring, the infected red oak trees' leaves may simply wilt or turn pale green and brown. Mature infected red oak leaves may turn pale green or brown on the edges and progress inward. Red oaks may form red fungal mats that begin underneath the bark. If you find these symptoms, contact a trained arborist to verify oak wilt and provide you options for your next step.

Secondly, if you have discovered oak wilt on your property, please notify your neighbors. Healthy

oak trees within 150 - 200 feet of the diseased tree can be treated with a good success rate according to Driscoll.

Last of all, we all need to follow these guidelines from the forest service to prevent new infections of oak wilt.

1. Do not prune oak trees from February through June.

2. When pruning oak trees, paint all the wounds and fresh stumps no matter what time of the year.

3. Most importantly,

when hiring someone to trim your oak trees, insist and verify that they have painted all the wounds and stumps. If diseased red oaks are discovered, cut and properly dispose of them immediately.

Even with more taking ACT, SISD increasing scores

With more than twice as many students taking the ACT test for 2016 than the previous year, Salado students increased by about a point in each of the four core areas and in the composite.

Salado tested 51 students for the graduating class of 2016, compared to just 28 in 2015, 37 in 2014, 27 in 2013 and 28 in 2012.

On the composite score,

Salado students increased the average ACT to 24.5 for 2016, compared to 23.0 in 2015 and to the 20.6 State of Texas average.

The greatest increase was in mathemetics. In 2016, SHS students scored an everage of 24.5 compared to 21.8 in 2015 and compared to the state average of 20.7.

In English, Salado students increase their SAT average score to 23.9 from 22.1 last year. The state average is 19.4 in English.

Salado scored its highest in Reading, though it was the smallest increase, scoring 25.1 compared to last year's 24.3 average. The state average in Reading was 21.0.

Salado also increased a point in Science, raising last year's average of 23.0 to 24.0 this year. The state average in Science was 20.7.

In addition to increasing the average scores on the ACT, Salado students also showed 57 percent

benchmark veloped by ACT. ACT restablished the following as College Readiness benchmark score designated college courses. The benchmark score is the minimum score needed on an ACT subject-area test to indicate a 50 percent chance of obtaining a B or higher or a 75 percent chance of

scores were 18 on the ACT English Test to be ready for College English Composition; 22 on ACT Mathematics to be ready for College Algebra; 22 on Reading test to be ready for Social Science and 23 on ACT Science to be ready for College Biology.

Using those benchmarks, 57 percent of the Salado students were considered college ready in all four areas, compared to the 28 percent statewide.

For college English composition, 90 percent of Salado students were ready for college, compared to the 57 percent statewide; 78 percent were ready for college algebra compared to 42 percent statewide, 75 percent were ready for college social science compared to 43 percent statewide and 63 percent were ready for college biology compared to 35 percent statewide.

A Big, Beautiful Black Swan

If you aren't seriously contemplating the biggest black swan event in American electoral history, you aren't paying attention.

Fifteen months ago, Donald Trump was a reality-TV star with a spotty business record and a weird penchant for proclaiming that he was on the verge of running for president. Now, he's perhaps a few big breaks and a couple of sterling debate performances away from being elected 45th president of the United States.

Trump has no experience in elected office and, unlike past nonpoliticians elected president, hasn't won a major war. He perhaps knows less about public affairs than the average congressman. He has repeatedly advertised his thin-skinned vindictiveness and is trampling on basic political norms. No major political party has ever nominated anyone like this.

Trump now has a legitimate shot at winning the general election because he got the lucky draw of at least the second-worst presidential nominee in recent memory and, pending how she fares over the next two months, perhaps the worst.

All it took for Trump to wipe away most of Hillary Clinton's lead was acting like a somewhat normal presidential candidate.

Have a meeting with a foreign leader. Give some policy speeches. Read from a teleprompter at rallies. Use his NPR voice when appropriate.

None of this required strategic genius, only a decision not to throw away the election with repeated episodes of self-indulgent stupidity. Democrats should be feeling a creeping sense of panic:

-- They are trying to win with a candidate who is loathed and distrusted and has few redeeming qualities. As Yuval Levin, editor of the journal National Affairs, points out, corrupt and dishonest politicians are often entertaining, and dull politicians are usually earnest and honest. Hillary manages to be both boring and corrupt.

--No one can be certain that her health is what the campaign says it is. Even if nothing else ails her, if Clinton has another episode in public like the one on Sept. 11, the bottom might fall out.

--President Obama probably can't close Hillary's enthusiasm gap. Obama is an adept campaigner, but there is no evidence he ever successfully transferred enthusiasm for himself to another candi-

--If the kitchen sink hasn't killed off Trump, what else is there? The Clinton campaign has already used his greatest hits of most offensive statements in countless TV ads. If none of this has sunk Trump, what's left?

--A compelling Trump debate performance could change perceptions of his suitability to be commander in chief. Hillary is trouncing Trump on this attribute by a 2-to-1 margin. If Trump shows up and seems plausible during the biggest moment of the campaign, he could vastly improve his standing on this basic question of readiness.

All this said, Hillary probably still has an advantage. She has a campaign and Trump doesn't, and that must count for something. Demographics favor her. But if Trump can hoist himself over the bar of acceptability, he might give the voting public enough permission to make this the change election it is naturally inclined

A Trump victory may not be likely, but it isn't farfetched. And no, stranger things haven't happened.

In Bell County, bowhunting in and around Salado is legal. Safety and shooting with caution is always the daily thought process. No one without training should be shooting in the city limits or highly populated areas.

The limit per person is two does and two bucks. I would encourage hunters to leave the beautiful bucks in our city. It is well known that this -- Bow Hunting -- is the cheapest way to help control the overpopulation of Deer. One company has ad-

vised us that their charge for sharpshooting will be \$250 per deer. This does include processing for the needy. I would also encourage hunters in Bell County to donate as many of their deer as possible to THE NEEDY.


The deer count was accomplished and the Texas Dept. of Parks and Wildlife has suggested that Salado harvest 300 (THREE HUNDRED) deer this year!

Although the City is working on plans, they don't have the money to pay for such a task. Most of the harvest this year will need to be accomplished by individuals and professionals that volunteer.

Management of our overpopulation of white tails will be a yearly ongoing issue and modified yearly. The TDPW will issue permits for hunters in Salado. However,

your regular hunting license is legal. The City will work with the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture for possible sharpshooting during the regular hunting season. If and when money is available, other agencies may be used to deal with this issue.

Central Texas Area Museum hosts writer/waters expert Ron Coley

The Central Texas Area Museum, in conjunction with the Institute for Humanities Salado, will host a talk by renowned oceanic and waters expert Ron Coley, Sunday, Oct. 9 at 3 p.m., in the Museum Event Hall. The event, which will include a Q&A session and book signing, is free and open to the public. The museum is located on South Main Street, across from the Stagecoach Inn.

Coley is an internationally-recognized, award-winning filmmaker and underwater photographer, an innovator of SCU-BA equipment, and an educational leader, author and publisher. Throughout his 40-year career, he has explored the world of water and its relationship to humankind. His new book, The Fountains of Saint Mark, about the Texas' San Marcos River sys-

tem, will be available for purchase at the museum event.

For 20 years, Coley was Director of the Aquarena Center for Environmental Education for Texas State University in San Marcos. Prior to that, he developed special underwater instruments for the U.S. Navy SEALS and the Experimental Diving Unit; and was responsible for bringing to market the COM-PUTEK diving computer that introduced air-integrated information with pictographic displays.

About the Museum

The Central Texas Area Museum (www.saladoscottishfestival.com) was established in 1959 to preserve the pioneer history of Central Texas and its colorful cultural diversity. The Museum houses artifacts of early frontier days in this region as well as a library of books and papers that document the settlement and heritage of the area. The Museum, a 501(c) non-profit organization, is located in a 100-year-old rock building on South Main Street in downtown Salado, Texas, across from the historic Stagecoach Inn.

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complications. The best way to prevent the flu is by getting vaccinated each year.

This year's vaccination will protect against the strains A/California/7/2009 (H1N1) pdm-like virus, A/Hong Kong/4801/2014 (H3N2)like virus; and B/Brisbane/60/2008 like virus (this is B/Victoria lineage virus). Flu viruses are constantly changing, so the vaccine is updated each year based on which influenza viruses are making people sick, how those viruses are spreading, and how well the previous season's vaccine protects against those viruses.

The seasonal flu vaccine will be available through March 31, 2017, through the PACT and/or Specialty care teams.

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

Eighteen early pioneers designated "Historically Significant" to the founding and early settlement of Salado are the focus of the walking tour. Seven grave sites have Texas Historical Commission markers. Five additional grave sites in the cemetery remain to be researched for historical markers. The early pioneers on the tour are: Col. Hermon Aiken, Dr. Welborn and Louisa Barton, Captain Milton Damron, Rev. James and Fannie Ferguson (parents of Gov. Ferguson), Capt. Robert Bonner Halley, Dr. Samuel Jones, Professor James Lowry Smith, James Anderson, Rev. George Washington Baines, Dr. Benjamin McKie, Archibald J. Rose, Leroy A. Griffith, John Paine, Jon Wesley Ray, Emily Bumpass Stockton, Col. Elijah Sterling Clack Robertson, Judge Orville Tyler, and Granville N. and Sophia Vickrey. Besides being noted Salado pioneers, these individu-

Both teams scored in the third.


Midway through the third, St. Dominic quarterback Clay Orrison dove in from the one. The PAT was good to bring the score to 35-17.

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

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

Art in the Garden - The Pennington Compound



The five acre spectacular and unique estate of Joyce and CR Pennington (CR describes it only as home) has a commanding panoramic view of the beautiful Salado Creek. It is a natural landscaped parkland composed of multi pocket gardens and fine art sculptures and artifacts. They have embraced the deer population and sometimes as many as 20-30 are grazing on the expansive lawn among the art. There is a network of stone walkways, terrac-

es and patios which connect the main home with a large party barn, a pavilion, office and guest quarters. Deer resistant and Texas-tough natives are grouped into plant communities that fill various niches around the existing lawn and to enhance their outdoor sculpture and art collection. Within the gardens, several fountains add visual and audible interest both by the striking art pieces they are and the soothing sound of the splashing water drops on the rocks below.

The Pennington's have

a vast collection of art in their landscape that represents a dramatic sense of place. An outstanding piece of sculpture titled "Shaman of the Benediction" by Bill Worrell (who, by the way, studied under Salado's Lonnie Edwards) has been placed on a stone out-cropping overlooking the creek. Nearby, is the sculpture of the "Spirit Stick", also by Bill Worrell. This Texas artist has been inspired by ancient pictographs and petro glyphs of the Lower Pecos Native Americans in creating his art. The



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

symbols surrounding the Shaman represent the earth, sun and spirit that we all share. The spirit sticks were objects carried by the Shaman to help in their mission to awaken powerful healing spirits. Another outstanding piece is a bronze sculpture depicting a soaring eagle by Salado's Ronnie Wells. Other pieces in the gardens are from noted artists Jim Eppler (Texas wildlife artist), James G. Moore (signature bronze garden bells), Paolo Soleri (collection of bronze wind bells) and architectural artifacts collected around the world and exhibited throughout.

The native and adapted plants chosen are massed together to form texture, color and contrast. Included are groupings of yellow and purple trailing lantana, pink skullcap and autumn sage interspersed with bright accents of sculptural artichoke agave with their blue-gray leaves and background shrubs consisting of Texas sage, vibrant firebush and thryallis or 'golden showers'. Thryallis is a stunning highly deer resistant evergreen shrub that will shower one with profuse golden blooms from spring until frost. These mostly flowering species create a habitat which welcomes the birds, butterflies and bees




tne property for the deer. Yuccas, prickly pear cactus and santolina (lavender cotton) can be found on the outcroppings of Surrounding the property are magnificent old native live oaks, some dating back 250 years with smaller Texas native trees such as crape myrtles, possumhaw holly and yaupon holly with their vibrant red berries in the fall that the birds love.

The garden tour will be on Saturday, Oct. 8 from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.

A rarely seen photograph of the second story of the original First Baptist Church of Salado chapel being moved. When the First Baptist Church was built, the Salado Lodge #296 Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons owned the title to the second story. The church met on the ground floor and the Masons met on the upper floor as many of those early day Masons were members of the Baptist Church. In the 1950s, when the First Baptist Church built its first brick chapel, the Salado Masonic Lodge #296 moved the second story to its current location at 90 S. Church St. There will be many historic photos of the Lodge as well as many of the Past Masters of the Lodge on display during the October 23 Open House. A stitch in time

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

A defender should always think in terms of how many tricks his side needs to set the contract. This becomes his goal for that hand, and if he absent-mindedly loses sight of it, disaster might soon

Consider this deal where West led a spade against four hearts. Dummy's king took the trick, and declarer led a low trump to his hand, to which East followed low.

South won with the queen and cashed the ace of spades, discarding a diamond from dummy. He then conceded a trump to East's ace, but the defenders could no longer collect more than a diamond and a club, so declarer made the contract.

It is easy to see that if East had gone up with his ace on the first heart lead from dummy and returned a diamond, South would have gone down one. 


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The Texas Spotted Whiptail lays eggs

Wild About Texas

The Texas Spotted Whiptail (Cnemidophorus gularis gularis) is one of eleven species of "racerunners" that live in Texas, and it arguably has the largest area of distribution. It can be observed statewide, save for a small portion of the Texas and Louisiana border, and the northern-most section of the panhandle. It also occurs to the north in the southern quarter of Oklahoma, west to southeastern New Mexico, as well as southward to the central portions of San Luis Potosi, Mexico.

The habitats that this elegant lizard prefers are arid to semi-arid grasslands, rocky arroyos, and rocky hillsides. They are most common on sandy soil where there is a sparse covering of shrubs and trees. They are also commonly observed near resi-

from irrigation. The Texas Spotted Whiptail is an elongated reptile that is covered with small granular scales of equal size along its back and sides. It is one of the larger whiptail species that occur in Texas, with adults reaching a total length of one foot, although the average is between seven and nine inches. The background coloration is tan or brown, and the back is adorned with either seven or eight light stripes that run lengthwise from the neck to the tail. These lines can be white, yellow,

occasionally faint

green. There are numerous

light spots that appear in random order in between these light stripes, giving this animal the common name. The long tail, which can be up to 65 percent of the animal's total length, is either brown or orange in coloration. The belly scales are much larger and plate-like in appearance, and in females are light in coloration. Males have dark blue-black mottlings on the belly and orange chins during breeding season.

Texas Spotted Whiptails, like other lizard species, are "cold-blooded", or ectothermic. This means that they do not generate heat from the inside of their body, as mammals and birds do, but rather are dependent on outside sources for heating and cooling. They are active throughout the day from March to November, and unlike many other reptile species, the high metabolism of this lizard enables it to be observed during the hottest part of the

summer afternoons. This species of lizard is a dietary generalist, feeding on both animal matter

as well as plant material. The term for this is omnivorous. It feeds primarily on small beetles, ants, grasshoppers and other arthropods, but it will occasionally feed on certain leaves and flowering blossoms like the dan-

delion. The Texas Spotted Whiptail is oviparous, which is a fancy way of saying that it lays eggs. After emerging from the winter-long brumation period (reptiles do not hibernate in the true sense of the word), males will search out females to mate. After mating, the female will lay a small clutch of eggs (between two and six) in moisture retaining soil. Older, large females can lay two to three clutches of eggs per summer. After approximately two months of incubation, the delicate four inch long young emerge prepared to fend for and care for them-

These lizards are nervous and can be quite wary. They are constantly on the move, foraging for food in the ground cover and loose soil. Occasionally they will stop to bask in between meal items, but their metabolism is such that they will begin to forage within minutes of stopping. Their movement is based on short bursts of speed, rarely more than a few feet at a time unless they feel threatened. Look to observe this speedy lizard in and around city parks and nature trails.












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

Mosquito sample in Temple positive for West Nile

A mosquito sample in Temple has tested positive for the West Nile Virus. The West Nile Virus is transmitted in Texas by the Culex Quinquefasciatus mosquito. Lab results confirming the positive test result were reported to the Bell County Public Health District Sept. 20.

The positive mosquito samples were collected from a residential area located East of Interstate 35 and West of 31st Street between Avenue K and Avenue T. Test results suggest at least some of the Culex mosquito population in this area are carrying the West Nile Virus. Bell County Public Health District has had no reported cases of West Nile Virus among Temple residents this year. Frequently healthy people do not experience symptoms

of the virus so most cases go unreported. toms include: headaches, fever, body aches, a rash near the bite site and joint pain. A feeling of fatigue and weakness can last for weeks. A small percent of people experience more severe symptoms that include: stiff neck, a high fever, sleepiness, disorientation, coma and paralysis.

Bell County Public Health District wishes to remind Bell County Residents to be vigilant about mosquito bite prevention and mosquito habitat reduction around their homes. Protect yourself and

your family against the West Nile Virus by following the recommendations

such as the 4 ds: • Drain standing water in flower pots, pet dishes

or clogged gutters so mos-

quitoes don't have a place to breed and treat water

that can't be drained, • Defend by using an EPA-approved insect re-

pellent, and • Dress in long sleeves

and pants when outdoors. • Dusk and Dawn - Culex mosquitoes are most active at dusk and dawn, protect yourself by reducing your time outdoors when mosquitoes are most

Bell County Public Health District is working with Temple officials to reduce mosquito breeding habitats in Temple.
