Hans Fields, who has not yet filed for re-election told Salado Village Voice on Feb. 3 that he has not decided whether he will seek a third term on the Board of Aldermen. He is the longest-serving member on the current Board of Aldermen.

Fred Brown, who has served one term as an Alderman, told Salado Village Voice on Feb. 3 that he will file this week for re-election to the Board.

All three incumbents ber of citizens who file for on the Salado Public Library District Board of Directors will seek reelection to the board. They are Maurine Nathanson, Sara Pettijohn and Diane Hodyniak.

The last day to file as a candidate for election in these races is 5 p.m. Feb. 27. This includes filing as a write-in candidate in any of the races. Applications are available during regular business hours at each of the political subdivision offices: the municipal building for the Village of Salado, the administration office at the Salado Civic Center for the Salado ISD and the Salado Library on N. Main for the Library District.

If there are not enough candidates to justify an election, the governing bodies of those political subdivisions can vote in early March to cancel the

HOT tax for Expo, codes, new subdivision top agenda

Bell County Commissioner Tim Brown will discuss with Salado aldermen at their 6:30 p.m. Feb. 5 meeting a proposal for a county-wide hotel/motel occupancy tax of two percent that will be dedicated proposed expansion of the Bell County Expo Center.

The presentation is one of several items on

the agenda, including a hearing on changes to the building codes ordinance and review of a concept plan for Amity Estates, a 194-lot subdivision in the extra territorial jurisdiction of Salado.

Aldermen will update the Village building permits and building codes following a public hearing on the matter.

The Village currently has the 2009 versions (with local amendments) of the International Existing Building Code, the International Residential Building Code, the International Mechanical Code, the International Energy Conservation Code and will maintain those with the revisions.

The Village will add

the 2009 International Fire Code with local amendments; and the 2009 International Fuel Gas Code. The proposed changes will also replace the 2009 International Electric Code with the 2011 National Electric Code.

The changes to the ordinance will also amend the plan review and inspections and permit applications sections of the ordinance to provide authority to the Village Administrator to oversee these processes.

A hard copy of the revised ordinance can be viewed at the municipal building or online at www. saladotx.gov.

Aldermen will consider and take action on the Concept Plan of Amity Estates, a proposed subdivision in the ETJ of the Village. Amity Estates is a five phase subdivision of 177.473 acres at the southwest corner of the intersection of FM 1670 and West Amity. When completed, it will have 197 lots.

The board will also hear a presentation on controlling the buzzard population.

The White House's **Emily Post moment**

The White House has now become a stickler for protocol, especially when it comes to relations between the two political branches.

The new persnicketiness arises from House Speaker John Boehner's invitation to Israeli Prime Minister Bibi Netanyahu to speak before a joint session of Congress in March. The invite is being denounced as a major breach and new low in Washington because he didn't, as had been the traditional practice with such invitations, coordinate with the White House.

As far as violations of the separation of powers in the Obama era, it's hard to see how this even comes close to registering. Maybe Emily Post wouldn't approve, and with a different administration it would be worth honoring every courtesy, but we are far beyond that now.

President Barack Obama has a notoriously piratical attitude toward Congress. He deliberately and gleefully trampled all over its role as the lawmaking branch, and cast aside his own as the executor of the laws. He has distorted the constitutional order to suit his whim, and now his allies are peeved that John Boehner made a wayward speaking invitation?

According to David Rogers of Politico, the speaker's office had tried to coordinate with the White House on a prior 2011 invitation to Netanyahu and got no response. More to the point: The speaker leads a coequal branch of government.

He can invite or not invite anyone he wants, up to and including the president, who is only invited to give the State of the Union address before a joint session of Congress as a matter of tradition. He can invite Phil Robertson or Neil deGrasse Tyson, the archbishop of Canterbury or the pope, just as he pleases.

The speaker shouldn't have to wait for White House sign-off for his invitations to address the House any more than the White House should coordinate with him whom it invites into the Oval Of-

The context of Netanyahu's visit is, of course, the nuclear talks with Iran. The administration is in a panic to get a deal with Iran, any deal. At this point, it doesn't want to hear a discouraging word

from anyone, least of all Netanyahu, who is such a powerful communicator. It's not as though the White House opposes on principle interventions by foreign leaders into our Iran policy.

The legislation in question is bipartisan, and reasonable enough. Sponsored by Sens. Robert Menendez, D-N.J., and Mark Kirk, R-Ill., it would restore sanctions that have been loosened on Iran in the event there is no deal by the new June deadline for negotiations. And it would steadily tighten them thereafter. The White House is worried that the prospect of more sanctions will destroy its delicate dynamic with Iran, although Iran has continued to extend its tentacles in Yemen, Syria and Iraq without any fear of spooking us.

In a congressional hearing last week, Sen. Menendez lambasted the administration line on the sanctions bill that "sounds like talking points that come straight out of Tehran." That is from a leading foreign-policy voice of the president's own party. At least the unwelcome guest, Bibi Netanyahu, will be more polite.

Free and open internet needed for innovative, competitive economy

If you're reading this online, thank net neutral-

Net neutrality is the principle that all Internet content must be delivered equally. This article shouldn't be transmitted more slowly than another one. Your cat video shouldn't be given priority over a TED Talk. More importantly, your small business' website shouldn't be loaded slower than Amazon's. Put it this way: Net neutrality prevents preferential treatment; it is freedom from interference.

That freedom is crucial to businesses large and small. According to Fast Company, Amazon calculated that just one more second of page loading time could cost \$1.6 billion in sales each year. Amazon could probably handle that loss, but most small businesses probably couldn't, and some might not get off the ground. Imagine if Hulu or Netflix had, in their infancy, been forced to pay high fees or face tortoise-like loading speeds.

So when the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) released a proposal that would have allowed Internet Service Providers (ISPs) to slow down traffic and charge a fee for higher speeds, small businesses took no-

My company serves nonprofits-churches, domestic violence groups, educational institutions groups that cannot afford to pay for faster speeds. Yet without Net Neutrality, commercially-sponsored content would be streamed in no time, while groups like these which are dedicated to helping people could see their speeds slow to a crawl. Our mission is to empower people who do good in the world. This proposal would be devastating to that goal, and the groups we work with.

As many as four million people commented on the proposal, with the vast majority supporting net neutrality and less than 1% opposed. Business groups like the American Sustainable Business Council (ASBC) joined in, helping to make the business case for net neutrality: too many businesses simply can't afford to have their communications slowed.

The FCC should understand that there's a sure-fire way to protect net neutrality: reclassify broadband to fit under Title II of the Telecommunications Act, thereby giving the FCC the power to ensure that consumers be protected.

The reclassification argument has support from none other than President Obama. "For almost a century," he explained, "our law has recognized that companies who connect you to the world have special obligations not to exploit the monopoly they enjoy. It is common sense that the same philosophy should guide any service that is based on the transmission of information whether a phone call, or a packet of data."

Small businesses need net neutrality—as does the economy as a whole. We can't have a system where established companies with deeper pockets play by a different set of rules. That runs contrary to the American entrepreneurial spirit. That's why net neutrality has strong support on both sides of the political aisle.

ISPs have argued that reclassifying broadband under Title II will harm consumers-that too much regulation would snuff out investment and innovation, and lead to larger bills. It is understandable that the industry would not want additional regulation. But in reality, reclassification would simply legally enforce the status quo. The Internet now is a place where content gets distributed equally, without forcing people to pay for the privilege. That's the way it

should stay.

Yes, ISPs would lose a potential revenue stream. But, considering ISPs have already created an artificial scarcity in broadband by locking up a large percentage of metropolitan fiber in agreements with municipalities, that's a poor argument.

ISPs in many parts of the country already benefit from a near-total lack of competition, and our Internet speeds are slower-and cost more-than in many other countries. Letting ISPs interfere with traffic will only make matters worse-the Inter-

net that works best is the one that works with the least interference.

We need an Internet that's open and free to all, and we must ensure that all American businesses can remain competitive, both domestically and globally. Covering broadband under Title II may not be ideal, but it's currently our best hope to ensure the Internet remains a place for inno-

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


