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Buzzard abatement sits atop aldermen agenda

Noise.

And a lot of it. That's what Salado residents can expect if the United State Department of Agriculture comes into Salado to help rid it of Turkey Buzzards and Black Buzzards.

"Sounds like a 12-gauge shotgun going off," Adam Henry said of the handheld explosives that will be used repeatedly during the hours of dusk to keep the buzzards from returning to their roosts in dead trees near Salado Creek and Center Circle.

Salado aldermen discussed at their Feb. 5 meeting a buzzard abatement program through the USDA Wildlifre Management division. The board has set it for an action item at its Feb. 19 meeting.

If an agreement with the USDA Wildlife Management division can be reached, work can begin shortly after and would take about two weeks or early March to complete.

Henry told aldermen Feb. 5 that this annoyance program has had some success in other places in moving the buzzards from areas where they are a nuisance (generally in populated areas or in areas where their feces may cause problems to water or cell towers).

The USDA works with an advocate. What vul-

to start abatement on their properties," he said, adding that the program is paid for by the county and will be done at no cost to the city.

Because the USDA Wildlife Services team will be coming into the city limits to operate, they will require an agreement signed by the Village in order to start. Part of that agreement will likely have to include a waiver of the Village Noise Ordinance, which does not allow fireworks, firearms or the like to be discharged in the city limits except for during Salado Legends.

In addition to the handheld pyrotechnics, Henry said, wildlife officials may also hang effigies near the roosts, as well as helium balloons with flashing lights and noises "to run off the birds."

The program generally takes about two weeks, with the wildlife team setting up before dark. "This way we won't be waking yp the kids and working folks at sunrise," Henry said.

The program may include cutting down the dead trees that have become roosts for the migratory birds, which will be leaving the area this spring.

Temple resident Dwight Peak told aldermen that he felt "the vultures needed Because they eat rotten meat, it protects me and you from disease. If the vultures leave, what will dispose of the dead animals they eat?"

He said that vulture removal in India ended up having an economic cost of \$50 billion.

"Is the expense of moving or killing them justified," Peak said. "They are magnificent animals when you watch the fly. They have their own beauty and place in nature and we should respect it."

Amity Estates Concept Plan Approved

Aldermen approved the Concept Plan for Amity Estates, a 173-acre subdivision at the southwest corner of FM 1670 and West Amity Road, in the Extra Territorial Jurisdiction (ETJ) of Salado.

Amity Estates is a fivephase residential subdivision that will have a total 197 lots.

The Village engineer confirmed that the concept plan conforms with all requirements for this stage of review.

There are no new thoroughfares planned for the area. The plan provides for four entrances into the subdivision: Bozon Drive connections West Amity and FM 1670; Day Drive connects into FM 1670 and Few Oaks connects to West Amity.

Measles outbreak renews vaccination debate

AUSTIN, Texas - Doctors, parents and politicians across the country are involved in a heated debate over vaccinations, following a measles outbreak that began at Disneyland in California.

Top health leaders link the outbreak to children who were not vaccinated for the disease.

Dr. Lainna Callentine, a pediatrician in Illinois, says it's crucial that parents discuss with their pediatricians their reasons for or against choosing to vaccinate their children.

"As a pediatrician, my

role is to educate and to empower parents to make healthy decisions on behalf of their children," she states. "But I have to respect that a parent has a right ultimately to make that decision and that is not my personal right on their behalf."

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), more than 100 people from 14 states, including Texas, were reported to have measles in January, most of them linked to the Disneyland outbreak.

Parents may choose to not vaccinate, or delay vaccinating, for religious beliefs, medical issues, poverty or a lack of access to medical care, but regardless of the reasons, some doctors refuse to accept patients whose parents are anti-vaccine. Callentine says that sends the wrong message.

"I see a problem with physicians who do not allow healthy dialogue and questions," she says. "When you push them out of your practice, you're really pushing them into the arms of perhaps some of the charlatans out there who are feeding a lot of misinformation."

According to a Pew Research Center report, about 68 percent of Americans say vaccines should be re-

quired, and 30 percent say vaccines should be a matter of personal choice.

Callentine adds that there is a lot of information available about vaccinations, and parents should be fully educated before making a decision for their child.

"It's important for parents to understand the information they are looking at and where that information comes from. It's also important to understand how those illnesses are transmitted," she stresses. "There's a lot of other factors that they need to look at as far as risks to the vaccine, or risks to contracting that illness."

County seeks support for Expo expansion through HOT

Bell County Commissioners are seeking support for proposed legislation that will allow the County to levy a two percent hotel occupancy tax to benefit expansion of and improvements to the Bell County Expo Center.

Commissioner Tim Brown, who has represented Salado for the past two decades, spoke to the Salado Board of Aldermen Feb. 5 seeking their support through a local resolution for the implementation of the county-wide HOT.

Part of the proposed expansion, partially funded

through the HOT revenues, will be the construction of an equestrian center and an air-conditioned exhibition center.

The proposed expansion is estimated at \$25 million, according to Brown. It would address limitations of the Expo Center that were identified in a 2008 study by Conventions, Sports & Leisure (CS&L).

That study process included a local market visit, in-person interviews with Bell County area individuals, analysis of local market conditions as well as regional and national trends, analysis of facility data from 26 comparable and competitive facilities, analysis of the socioeconomic data of those competitive regional facility markets, telephone interviews with event producers, including 100 equine, livestock, agricultural and convention events and 700 surveys of attendees at recent Expo Center events.

The survey concluded that Bell County Expo has several strengths, including a centralized location in th the state, proximity to Dallas, Austin, San Antonio, Houston and Waco, interstate access and Ft. Hood and growth characteristics.

Weaknesses pointed out in the survey were the modest size of the metro area, driving distance to largest regional cities, hotel inventory within close proximity to the center, lack of visitor amenities near the center, impressions of event producers regarding the area's "destination appeal" and competitive in-state environment in terms of facility products.

Physical limitations of the Expo Center include the lack of an indoor dirt arena, significant limitations in RV hookups, proximity issues to stalls, warm-up and loping areas, and lack of climate control in large facilities.

According to the study, a new Multipurpose Facility would free up dates in the existing Main Arena

for events better-suited for the concrete-floored, spectator-oriented venue, match the needs/requirements of more equine/livestock/agricultural events, reduce relative costs for both events and attract new events and new visitors to Bell County.

The 2008 study calls for construction of the Multipurpose Arena with these considerations: a dirt floor, ring size targeting 45,000 sq. ft. (300 by 150 feet), bleacher seating for 2,000, climate controlled and connected to the existing center, 30,000 sq. ft concrete floor exhibition space plus added stall/ pen space under same roof and additional storage and temporary pen space.

While the initial 2008 study called for a minimum of 200 RV hookups for competitors and attendees of these events, Brown told aldermen that the new plan scales it back to fewer than 30 hookups.

Alderman Hans Fields asked Brown if he could see those plans and was told that they would be made available to them. He asked if the study had been updated and Brown told him that the county was not going to spend another \$50,000 to study the issue further.

The study estimates that the expansion would

The Kochs Ride Again

It was interesting while it lasted, but the 2016 election is now officially "bought." The purchasers are the Koch brothers, and the price, a cool \$889 million.

The news that the network organized by David and Charles Koch plans to spend roughly \$900 million in the 2016 cycle has freaked out Democrats, outraged so-called campaign-finance reformers and inspired hand-wringing about the future of the planet Earth.

The despair is misplaced. One sign it is still a free country is that a band of like-minded people, devoted to principles they consider essential to the country's thriving, can get together and try to affect them in public policy.

For all that campaign reformers hate the Kochs, the brothers' network is, in part, their creation. "This is the natural consequence," campaign-finance reformer Lawrence Lessig griped about the \$889 million, "of a regime with essentially no contribution limits."

Actually, it is the invitable consequence of



If Reince Priebus and Debbie Wasserman Schultz are limited to raising \$32,400 per donor annually, they will inevitably lose ground to outside groups.

Rather than freeing up the parties, advocates of greater regulation want to make it as difficult, or perhaps even impossible, for everyone else to raise and spend money on politics. The only obstacle to this ambition is -- damn you, George Mason -- the Bill of Rights, specifically the First Amendment.

That is why Democrats like current House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi hope to amend the First Amendment to allow the government the latitude to further limit political speech. Until such time (and may it never arrive), the Kochs and their allies get to run free.

The left always wants to paint the Koch brothers as self-interested, to better fit the stereotype of the robber baron distorting government for his own ends. But they are the rare breed of businessmen who don't seek special favors from government, who in fact oppose them on principle. They are capitalists

who hate crony capitalism. In the libertarian paradise that they seek, the Kochs would be freer of government regulation -- but so would everyone else.

The \$889 million figure is not quite what it seems. It encompasses all the Koch spending, including support for academic programs and think tanks. Nor is "buying" an election all it is cracked up to be. The Kochs spent some \$400 million on the 2012 election, and came up empty.

The brothers are archvillains, regardless. The left is invested in trying to find a way to squeeze them out of the political process, because it instinctively hates anything being unregulated, including political activity.

Also, its attitude is "influence for me, but not for thee." The left, by and large, owns the media, academia, the big foundations and Hollywood. Compared with all of that priceless political and cultural influence, the spending of the Koch network is a pittance.

The Koch brothers will onetheless remain targets, so long as they continue to so prominently represent and advocate for a free society.



increase usage of the center by 35 events, including 29 equestrian events. It could increase event days to 600 from the current 493 days and increase event attendance from 406,189 to 497,774.

This would also increase the annual operating budget for the Expo Center from \$2 million in revenues and \$2.7 million in expenditures to \$2.8 million in revenues and \$3.4 million in expenditures.

"No facility of this type operates at a profit," Brown said, "They aren't intended to be profit-centers." Instead, these facilities bring "people into town who spend money in the local hotels, restaurants and other businesses."

The study estimates the expansion could drive an additional \$9 million into the Bell County economy annually. Of that, almost \$2 million would be in added hotel revenues, \$2.8 million in added restaurant revenues and \$1.1 million in other areas.

Salado area business owners are not convinced, at least those who spoke during the public comment section of the meeting Feb. 5. In earlier attempts by Bell County Commissioners to garner support for the county tax, Salado has been neutral at best and more likely in opposition to it.

Jill Shipman, who owns Settlement Stonecreek with her husband Johnny, said that in the 15 years of operating Stonecreek, she has rented one cottage due to an event at the Expo Center. "This does not benefit us in any way," she said, adding that if the dirt facilities are expanded, "it will be in direct competition with Wildfire Ranch."

Creta Ferrin, owner of Salado Creek Jewelers, said that the added tax "will put a hardship on all of us."

Will Lowery, owner of Inn on the Creek. The Venue and The Shed properties, said that in the past

back to the municipalities about 15 percent of the revenues "to target their marketing to enhance the lodging industry," Brown said. For Salado, that could mean \$9,100 per year, according to Judge Burrows.

Aldermen will discuss the topic at their Feb. 19 workshop meeting. By then, the City of Killeen, which has stood in opposition to previous attempts at the county HOT tax, may have brought the proposal to a vote. The Killeen City Council decided on Feb. 3 that it would bring the topic to a vote at a future meeting. Greater Killeen Chamber of Commerce President John Crutchfield told the Killeen city council that the public policy committee was in opposition to the proposal, adding that his priority for the Killeen Chamber was getting a third building on the campus of the Texas A&M University-Central Texas.

Among local bodies that have endorsed the Bell County HOT are the Chambers of Commerce, Economic Development Corporations and City Councils of Temple, Belton and Harker Heights, according to Burrows.

The state hotel occupancy tax is 6 percent. It is governed under Chapter 156 of the Texas Tax Code and the state hotel occupancy tax is administered by the Texas Comptroller's office, largely used for the general governmental operations of the State. According to the Comptroller's office, A\a portion of the state hotel occupancy tax revenue also goes toward funding tourism promotion through Texas's ad campaign. Most Texans know this successful ad campaign by its famous tag-line, "Texas, it's like a whole other country."

According to the Texas Hotel and Lodging Association's guiding document "What Cities Should Know to Administer the Hotel Occupancy Tax," metropolitan areas in Texas such as Houston and

the highest hotel occupancy tax rates in the nation with a combined rate of 17 percent and 16.75 percent respectively.

If the Bell County HOT is authorized by the state and then adopted by resolution of the Bell County Commissioner's court, the HOT tax rate for the Village of Salado and its ETJ will be 15 percent (6 percent state rate, 7 percent municipal rate and 2 percent county rate).

HOT revenue is strictly regulated by state legislation for its usage by counties and municipalities. It may only be used to promote tourism and the convention and the hotel industry, and that use is limited to specific projects.


According to the THLA document on HOT expenditures, HOT tax revenue may be seen on these items: Constructing, maintaining and operating a convention or visitor center; Furnishing facilities and personnel for the registration of convention delegates; Advertising and promotional programs to attract tourists; Encouragement and promotion of the arts; Historical restoration and preservation projects and advertising to encourage tourists to visit historic sites and museums; Sporting events where the majority of the

participants come from out of town; Sports facilities that routinely host regional or national tournaments; Coliseums or multi-use facilities; Signage directing the public to sights and attractions frequently visited by tourists; and Transportation to tourist attractions.

There are currently 73 Texas counties authorized by state law to collect county hotel occupancy taxes. Of those, two dozen counties collect the county HOT in addition to the HOT levied by the municipalities of those counties. In these counties, the county-wide HOT is affected by an overall HOT ceiling. For example, in Harris County, where the county HOT is 7 percent, it is only 2 percent in Houston, where the city's HOT is 7 percent.

Of the 73 counties levying a HOT, 11 counties are

occasions that this proposal has come up, local businesses and lodging properties have asked the County for a protocol to make it easy for these properties to see that there are opportunities for additional lodging in Salado when there are events at the Expo Center. He said that for many of the lodging properties, those opportunities do not exist. "In the past decade at Inn on the Creek,' Lowery said, "the number of guests staying with us from the Expo Center has absolutely been inconsequential."

According to Brown and County Judge Jon Burrows, the 2 percent HOT would generate about \$1 million annually. The county plans on remitting







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
