Aldermen to discuss Belton possibilities

Salado

Salado will not build a sewer treatment plant on The Sanctuary property, but will instead consider other options that might include partnering with the City of Belton to connect to a future extension line that Belton is planning south along I-35 to the Lampasas River.

Aldermen, after voting March 19 to send a letter to The Sanctuary that the village will not pursue plans to build a sewer treatment plant there, will meet in a special session to consider a professional services agreement with KPA Engineering for update of a study on regional wastewater services.

"We need to have better updated information on the potential of tying into Belton," Kim Foutz told *Salado Village Voice* this week.

Aldermen will draft a scope of services for KPA to investigate if there is the feasibility of becoming a wholesale customer of the City of Belton by tying into its southernmost sewer lines planned for construction over the next two years.

In February, the City of Belton approved a \$26 million, five-year water and sewer improvement plan that includes \$5 million to install sewer and water lines along I-35 from the Loop 121 intersection to the Lampasas River bridge. Foutz said that the possibility of tying into the Belton line could provide savings to both Salado and Belton. For Salado, the Village would not have to pursue the permitting process for a wastewater treatment plant, which can take up to a year, not build one at this time.

build a sewer line from the northernmost edge of the Salado city limits to the Lampasas River bridge, it would allow the City of Belton to extend its service area, according to Foutz.

But before this can be pursued, the costs and willingness of both municipalities has to be investigated first, which requires the services of KPA Engineering.

"These talks are very, very preliminary," Foutz said. "Before anyone can go further in them, we need up-to-date information."

About four years ago, the Village looked at the cost of tying into a future wastewater treatment plant that would discharge into the Lampasas River. But at that time, Belton had no plans at all for construction of a sewer plant for at least a decade in the future.

The extension of a sewer line south to the Lampasas River bridge in the next two years, however, changes the landscape for the Village to tie into the City of Belton as a wholesale customer.

Whether the aldermen in Salado and the council in Belton will pursue this potential plan needs to be investigated before the Village spends money designing plans for construction of its own treatment plant and delivery system.

If it can be hashed out, Foutz said, then Salado "It is my sense the Village is working on a plan that brings sewer to the Village and Sanctuary in a faster and less costly way. We are excited and cheering them on," Sulaski stated in a March 18 email to Salado Village Voice.

"This action does not necessarily preclude the Village from moving forward on agreements with Sanctuary as it pertains to platting, land use, a PID (Public Improvement District), impact fees or other opportunities to assist the Sanctuary in their planning and development process," the March 19 letter from the Village of Salado aldermen stated.

Future of Stagecoach Plant

In addition to making plans for future sewer service for the Village, aldermen are also in the midst of addressing present and future concerns of the current sewer plant that it owns, given to the Village as a gift on May 13, 2014.

Two issues are on the near horizon with what is called the "Stagecoach plant." First, Terry Potts informed aldermen that he did not want to continue as the manager of the plant beyond the end of his contract with the city in June.

Secondly, the cost of the plant effluent on property owned by Morris Foster will begin ramping up in Lung

Legislature may create Bell County MUD in SISD

Rep. Jimmy Don Aycock's office is sponsoring a bill for the creation of Bell County Municipal Utility District #3 outside of the Extra Territorial Jurisdiction of any Bell County city but within the boundaries of Salado I.S.D.

The proposed MUD #3 would encompass approximately 1,221.63 acre of property that is owned by Whitis Land Development Company, LLC off of FM 2843 and bordered by Triangle Rd. and Kuykendall Branch Rd. southwest of Salado.

While the size of the proposed MUD is known, not much else is at this time, including the number of lots and what types of developments are proposed. Phone calls to Bruce Whitis, is president of Whitis Land Development Company, LLC, were not returned on March 24.

Whitis and his father,

are well-known land developers in Killeen and western Bell County. Developments have included the Market Heights project, the Seton Hospital project and the commercial developments along Highway 190 commonly known as restaurant row.

Bruce Whitis is a partner in W & B Development, a Killeen company that pushed for the formation of Bell County MUD #2, approved by two voters in November 2014. Two voters cast ballots in favor of four propositions concerning the Bell County MUD #2 including approval of \$238 million in bonds for roads and water infrastructure for a development of some 4,000 houses. Turnbo Ranch is the name of the development that will be near Trimmier Rd. in Killeen's ETL

MUDs are temporarily created by the Texas legislature and ultimately approved by the voters. "By cally two residents on the hundreds to thousands of acres that will be eventually developed by builders. The initial approval of the bonds to create the MUDs financing mechanism are also voted on by the handful of voters in the boundaries set forth by the legal description in the bill proposed to form the MUD.

About 500 of the 1,100 MUDs in Texas surround Houston, but are growing in popularity in other areas that lie outside of large cities such as Dallas and Austin. Several have cropped up in Williamson County as a way for a developer to fund the infrastructure of a large development without paying for those roads, sewers, wells, etc. out of their own pockets.

Tom Cotton's Truth Bomb

Republican Sen. Tom Cotton hasn't been frogmarched from the Russell Senate Office Building -- yet. To believe the Arkansan's harshest critics, that's only because felonious traitors don't get the punishment they deserve. Cotton wrote an open letter to the leaders of Iran pointing out true and obvious things about our constitutional system, and the world came crashing down on his head.

Disgracing the Senate, per a hyperventilating Vice President Joe Biden, was the least of his supposed offenses. He was aiding Iranian hard-liners, violating the Logan Act against subverting U.S. foreign policy and committing an act of treason. If there were any doubt about the latter, the New York Daily News ran a picture of him and fellow Republican signatories of the letter on its front page with the subtle headline "TRAITORS."

Cotton's alleged sedition is hard to fathom. It's not as though he wrote secret letters to the Irani-



foreign policy (that's what then-Speaker Nancy Pelosi did when she went to Damascus and met with Bashar Assad). Cotton wrote a letter and posted it on his website. As Brian Beutler of The New Republic pointed out, the letter is functionally indistinguishable from an op-ed. The contents of Cotton's letter shouldn't have been news to anyone. It is inarguable that as a matter of domestic law a subsequent president can get out of the agreement at will and Congress can pass laws in contravention of the agreement, if a president will sign them. If these are things the Iranians don't know, shouldn't someone tell them?

The foreign-policy debate in the Age of Obama is the world turned upside down. In the president's transposition of the norms of American foreign policy, inviting the leader of a close ally to address Congress is an affront, and forging a -- to put it gently -- highly generous deal with an enemy is such an urgent necessity that no one should say a discouraging word. A more confident ad-

ministration would have brushed off Speaker John Boehner's invitation to Bibi Netanyahu, as well as the Cotton letter. The Obama administration is so defensive because it has a lot to be defensive about. It has been outnegotiated by the Iranians. Once, we wanted to prevent Iran from having a nuclearweapons capability. Once, we wanted zero enrichment, and so did the United Nations. Those goals have long since been abandoned by an Obama administration desperate for any deal so it can include an opening to Iran among the president's legacy achievements.

So, here is my own seditious foray into interfering with the conduct of U.S. foreign policy:

To Whom It May Concern in Tehran,

You are unlikely to ever encounter someone this weak and credulous again in the Oval Office.

The president used to say that no deal is better than a bad deal. Now, that line is inoperative. It's any deal is better than no deal, and woe to anyone who

Safety is a top priority in SISD

The safety of our students is Salado ISD's top priority. We have implemented several initiatives during the past few years to provide an even safer environment – both physically and emotionally – for our students.

We installed an access card system at all four of our schools, which now allows us to keep all of the external doors locked. Visitors buzz in at the front door and the receptionist can see the visitor on the video camera and talk with the person over the intercom prior to unlocking the door remotely. In addition to safety and security audits that we conduct every three years, we have had the Texas Association of Schools Boards (TASB) conduct assessments of the district security measures and also provide training to all of our employees. These services are provided free of charge because TASB is our insurance carrier.

We conduct annual criminal background checks on school volunteers. School district employees are continually background checked because we subscribe to a Superintendent's Corner by Dr. Michael Novotny

service that immediately notifies the district via email if an employee was ever arrested. We also conduct annual driving record checks on school district employees that transport students.

We have a school counselor at all four of our campuses and we have two registered school nurses in the district to provide students easier access to these professionals who can support their wellbeing.

We encourage students to come forward and tell trusted adults – such as parents, teachers, counselors or principals – about potentially harmful situations. They can do this in person or by using Safe-Schools Alert, a service that allows students, parents, employees, and community members to report sensitive issues, suspicious activities, or other student-related safety issues anonymously to school administrators through text message, e-mail, phone, or a website. We recently did a presentation for all of our secondary students regarding SafeSchools Alert and other student safety topics, including bullying, cyberbullying, harassment, sexting, and inappropriate relationships.

It has beaucoup issues — including deceiving its own investors, cheating more than 2 million of its credit card customers, gaming the rules to overcharge electricity users in California and the Midwest, overcharging activeduty military families on their mortgages, illegally foreclosing on troubled homeowners, and...well, so much more.

(excluding the plant that Foster continued to own at that time because it also served more than a dozen lessors of retail property that he owns).

Future management of the Stagecoach plant, which will ultimately be destroyed when a sewer system is built to serve Salado, has not yet been decided but the Village is investigating contracting with area plant manager/ operators to provide those services.

The Village is also considering its options when it comes to the effluent from the Stagecoach plant. The plant has a state permit that allows it to discharge effluent into Salado Creek. The discharge pipe, which has not been used in more than a decade, is near the low water dam at Salado Creek.

The discharge limitations in the permit are very stringent, Foutz said. The daily average flow of effluent cannot exceed

50,000 gallons per day with the average discharge during any two hour period not to exceed 104 gallons per minute.

The daily average for total suspended solids cannot exceed 20 mg per liter with a daily maximum allowed of 45 mg/l. The limitations for E. coli in the water cannot exceed a daily average of 126 mg/l with a single grab maximum of 399 mg/l.

In addition to these standards, the effluent cannot contain more than 4.0 mg/l of chlorine after a detention of at least 20 minutes. This must be monitored at least five times per week. The pH shall remain between 6.0 and 9.0 standard units, monitored monthly. There can be no discharge of floating solids or visible foam and no discharge of visible oils in the effluent. Finally, the effluent shall contain a minimum dissolved oxygen of 2.0 mg/l. Using the permitted

issuance of effluent into Salado Creek rather than having it applied to land owned by Foster may be a solution to the escalation of costs for the land application.

According to the May 13, 2014 contract signed by then-Mayor Danney McCort and Morris Foster, the cost for the use of the effluent field are these: no cost through November 2014; \$500 per month for December 2014-May 2015, \$1,500 per month for June 2015-November 2015; \$2,500 per month for December 2015-May 2016; \$3,500 per month for June 2016-November 2016; \$4,500 per month for December 2016-May 2017 and \$5,000/month beginning June 2017 through the end of 2018.

With only a dozen commercial end-users at this time, these are costs that are not attainable, according to Foutz.

term." Foutz said.

At their March 9 meeting, aldermen discussed using the current permit for the plant which allows for the treated effluent to be put into Salado Creek.

There was discussion about the possible impact on the listing of the Salado salamander, but alderman Fred Brown said that "if we are already approved for it, why should we involve the feds or anyone else?"

Some on the board have discussed moving the outlet pipe to a location that is not upstream of the Salado salamander known habitats. Foutz told Salado Village Voice this week that in her discussions with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, she learned that if the Village moves the outlet pipe for effluent, it would have to go through a new permitting process, something that could take six months or longer. "That's not something we can do," she said

under these temporary directors in which an election must be held to elect the first permanent directors. The MUD can extend the temporary directors for another four years.

Whereas municipalities have a state limit on their property tax rate, MUDs have no limit on the tax rate they can assess, according to the Texas Legislative Council.

Those taxes can be used to retire the debt on roads, water, sewer and other services, as well as the continued maintenance and operation of those services.

The proposed area for Bell County MUD #3 lies within the Certificate of Convenience and Necessity (CCN) of what was known until recently as the Chisholm Trail Water Supply, now operated and managed by the City of Georgetown Utilities. Chisholm Trail has a CCN that includes parts of Williamson, Bell and Burnet Counties. The vast majority of its customers are in the city limits and ETJ of Georgetown, though it does include Liberty Hill, parts of Leander, Florence and the southern part of Bell County in its CCN. No other water supply can provide water in that area, unless the provider releases it from its area of CCN. There are no customers of the Chisholm Trail/Georgetown Water Supply within the Salado ISD boundaries. In lieu of purchasing water from a supply company, property owners can drill their own wells. which is how homeowners in Hidden Springs development further west off of FM 2843 get their water. Individual wells can be drilled, but now fall under regulations set by the Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District. Private use wells that are registered with

Clearwater but are exempt from further regulations must be on tracts of land at least 10 acres in size and may not have the ability to pump more than 25,000 gallons per day.

These small production wells of less than 25,000 gallons per day can be drilled on property that is smaller than 10 acres, but then falls under Clearwater regulations and reporting. Any proposed small-production well to be dug on property smaller than 10 acres must be approved annually by Clearwater directors and must be on property of at least two acres in size.

Further, any well that can produce more than 25,000 gallons per day must be registered and regulated by Clearwater, as are all of the groundwater wells for Salado Water Supply.

If the proposed MUD is not served by a central

sewer system of some sort, then each lot must meet the Bell County Health Department minimum requirements for septic systems. For any piece of property divided after 1989 for single family residential, it must be at least a half acre if it is served by a public water supply. If it is served by a well, the lot must be at least one acre.

Trustees authorize negotiations for annexation of Thomas Arnold campuses into Village

Salado schools and the Village will begin negotiations between Superintendent Michael Novotny and city manager Kim Foutz to bring the Thomas Arnold campus into the boundaries of the Village of Salado.

The 50-acre location currently abuts the limits of the Village and can be voluntarily annexed into the Village. It houses three school campuses, as well as a football stadium,

baseball field, softball field and soccer practice fielders for the school district.

Salado school trustees voted March 23 to authorize Dr. Novotny to negotiate with the city, with stipulations that the district wants its marquee signs to be grandfathered into compliance with the sign ordinance, that any future building permitting fees be waived and that any tap fees for the schools to tie into a future sewer system also be waived by the city.

Dr. Novotny said that

gaining access to a cental sewer system would release approximately three acres that are currently dedicated to lateral lines for on site sewer treatment.

The district has not pursued annexation of the Salado High School property because it is not yet contiguous to the city limits. If that changes when Salado begins to pursue the sewer system service area, the district will likely request annexation so that it can tie in to the sewer.

The school district approximately spends

\$40,000 per year for the treatment of waste water at the Salado High campus.

The annexation of the school properties not only furthers the boundaries of the Village of Salado, but opens up possibilities for annexations of other properties ripe for development into the Village.

When sewer becomes a reality for Salado, those properties may quickly seek annexation in order to be more densely developed for residential and commercial uses.





Three-time Grammy nominee, Pat Green will perform April 18 in his first Johnny's appearance.


Named "the Springsteen of the South West" in People Magazine, Green has sold over 2 million albums, released a collection of hits at country radio. He has sold out shows
