School board approves renovations of elementary gym

Salado I.S.D. school trustees, at their March 27 meeting, continued planning for the first day of the 2006-07 school year by approving a calendar, hiring teachers, selecting a firm for renovations and purchasing a used portable building for additional classroom space.

Work on renovating the Thomas Arnold Elementary school gymnasium should be complete before the beginning of school on Aug. 16.

The board approved

Greenway Enterprises, Inc. as the contractor for renovation of the elementary gymnasium.

Greenway estimated the renovation of the elementary gymnasium at just over \$150,000. In presenting the bond to the public in February, the school district estimated the renovation of the elementary gymnasium at \$250,000 and the renovation and expansion of the high school football stadium at \$250,000.

"This is a good problem to have," said trustees Frank Carlson of the lower cost estimate for the renovation of the elementary gymnasium.

elementary gymnasium will include electrical work, air conditioning units, sidewalks, lighting, insulation and work on the overhead doors to prevent loss of cooling and/or

The board authorized Greenway to begin work on the gymnasium, approving the \$151,355 expenditure.

No cost estimates for the renovation and expansion of the high school football field have been presented to trustees for

their approval.

Trustees also approved The renovations at the a \$10,000 for the purchase, transportation and placement of a portable building, which will add two classroom spaces to the elementary campus.

> "I do not like bringing this to you," Dr. Battershell said of her recommendation to purchase and move the portable building, adding that this solution to the overcrowded campus was a temporary solution until the new high school is competed for the first day of classes in August 2008.

Dr. Battershell re-

viewed a timetable for construction of the new high school campus on 50 acres at the corner of FM 2484 and Williams Dr.

of the Schematics school with numbers and types of classrooms should be completed in May or early June.

Architectural drawings will be complete and bids approved by the end of the year. Ground will be broken and work begun in March 2007 with completion in time for classes in Aug. 2008.

The time line calls for work to be complete in June 2008, giving the district two months' breathing room for moving in and overcoming unforeseen delays before class begins Aug. 2008.

In the meantime, the district will continue to address the crowding problems on the current campuses. In addition to adding a portable building, the district will consider sharing space between the three campuses. One way the district does that is in the use of the middle school for the dual credit courses taken by high school students.



The United Nations' shame, cont.

Wherever she is right now, the late Eleanor Roosevelt is probably having a kind thought about U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations John Bolton. The ambassador is the liberal bugaboo who was filibustered by Senate Democrats before heading to Turtle Bay, where last month he fought a valiant, losing fight to reform the U.N. Human Rights Commission.

Roosevelt was the commission's first chairman back in 1947, and thought it would play an important international role by shaming human-rights abusers. Over time, the commission's mandate evolved into passing over human-rights abuses in silence and, instead, shaming itself. Bolton had hoped to change the commission and infuse it with some of its old idealism. Nothing doing. He's finding that at the U.N. Augean Stables, the cattle always prevail.

The human-rights commission's abiding flaw is that it has no standards for membership. So, bloodthirsty tyrannies sit on it together with liberal democracies

Given the let's-all-get-along bonhomie of the United Nations, they all operate based on a vaporous consensus that strips the commission of any purpose. China, Cuba, Eritrea, Saudi Arabia, Sudan and Zimbabwe are all current members, ensuring ample representation of governments interested only in preserving their ability to jail their dissidents, repress their women and despoil their countrysides.

Human-rights abusers are particularly drawn to the commission so they can eliminate any diplomatic or moral threat it might pose to their misrule. They can vote as a bloc to oppose any strenuous language directed at themselves or fellow abusers. On the inside, they subtly influence the process in their favor.

John Bolton and the U.S. proposed reducing the commission's membership

from 53 countries to 30, thus making it harder to get on, and requiring a two-thirds vote of the General Assembly to approve members in an attempt to keep the worst abusers off. These reforms were effectively trashed.

The counterproposal passed last month by a 170-4 vote pegs the membership at 47, approved by a mere majority of the General Assembly. The biggest change is literally nominal: No longer will it be the United Nations Human Rights Commission, but the Human Rights Council. The moral stink will remain, whatever they call it.

Debates over the U.N. feature an odd dynamic. It is skeptics like Bolton who favor making it a more effective and worthy institution. It is the U.N. worshippers who have standards for the world body so low that it will always remain mired in disrepute. So it was that Jimmy Carter favored the evisceration of the reforms.

For such U.N. supporters, it appears that genuinely high-minded multilateralism is not as important as maintaining the United Nations and other international bodies as an irritant to American power. Carter made a personal promise to the ambassadors of Egypt, Pakistan and Cuba -- not a democracy among them -- that he would side with them on commission reform.

Eleanor Roosevelt would no doubt be surprised at how low her treasured world body has sunk, and who is working to make it better.

Battle lines form as special session nears; White House info control; Will Katrina refugees be moved to Salado?

Battle lines pitting school property taxpayers against business franchise-tax-evaders are forming, now that the **Texas Tax Reform Commission** has press-released a preliminary look at what they intend to recommend to Governor Rick Perry and the Legislature.

Commission Chairman John Sharp will formally present his group's plan directly to lawmakers this week, in preparation for the April 17 special session.

Primary aim of the Governor's "Tax Reform" group is to cut the state's maximum school property tax, which in turn will hopefully meet most of the Supreme Court's order to constitutionally fund the public schools of Texas.

Failure to achieve these mammoth high-dollar goals will cause most Republican office holders much grief in November when they go to the public for reelection purposes - particularly "Crazy Hair" Perry who wants an historic ten year term as Governor.

BUSINESS TAX TO EXPAND

Sharp's group will also recommend: A broad based tax on gross receipts of all Texas businesses (including professional partnerships); Increase the cigarette tax a dollar; And borrow a billion (or so) from the current State surplus - all of which should raise the needed \$6 billion to offset cutting the maximum school property tax from \$1.50 to \$1.00

The powerful Texas Association of Business will no doubt take the position that replacing the current unfair franchise tax might be palatable - provided it doesn't "damage" their membership's profit levels.

Lawyers across the State will fight the plan since they would be roped into paying a business tax for the first time.

Another problem - nothing in the Tax Reform Commission's report pumps new money into the schools for instruction, transportation or the emotionally charged demand to increase teacher salaries.

Also, keep in mind that the Supreme Court may not approve what legislators eventually come up with, and decide to close the schools until lawmakers do what they've been told to do - i.e. fund public education constitutionally!

WHITE HOUSE CONTROLS INFORMATION

A recent TV documentary noted an alarming practice taking place at the highest level of our government, and one that should be challenged and stopped - through a loud (and angry) public outcry.

The popular "60 Minutes" program explained in verifiable detail how governmental reports on "global warming" are routinely sent to the White House for review and "editing," before being released to the public.

Complaints from "apolitical" Federal scientists, (many of whom are among the nation's finest), indicate their scientific documents have been completely rewritten, whenever the "irreversible" dangers of global warming are mentioned.

These "rewrites" are done by Bush's West Wing staffers, in order to belittle the disastrous "cause and effect" of uncontrolled greenhouse gas produc-

Government scientists are given a choice: (1) They are only to recommend "further study" of this industrially created problem; or (2) Stop publishing their findings altogether. Outright dismissal or early retirement being the only other options.

The free flow of information to and from our government - other than that which might imperil national defense - must be maintained and protected. Even if it embarrasses the President

and/or the party in power. Censoring government information to fit a "party line" is but a short step to "selectively" controlling the media (which many conservatives believe would be a great idea).

And an even shorter step towards a "one-party-autocracy."

KATRINA VICTIMS MAY BE RELOCATED TO SALADO

The Governor's Office is expected to make an important announcement this Saturday, April 1, concerning the permanent relocation of Katrina refugees who have been sheltered in Texas the past seven months.

A top staff member, speaking on condition of absolute anonymity, indicated that the Village of Salado, along with other rural communities, could be involved in the relocation plan. There are 200,000 former New Orleans residents living in Texas and with no immediate prospects of being able to return to the Crescent City, the federal government has decided to fund the permanent move of these refugees to smaller communities - like Salado.

Village officials would not comment, on any overtures being made by state or federal officials, to accept what is rumored to be some 200 families, which would add an estimated one thousand new Salado residents.

A federal grant of up to \$50,000 per family, plus direct grants to involved communities would be made "up front." Until housing projects are constructed (mostly at the expense of the Feds through HUD) newcomers would be temporarily assigned use of FEMA trailers, currently deteriorating in Arkansas.

Two hundred of these units could be moved to Salado in less than a week, according to officials.

IMPACT ON SMALL COMMUNITIES

The impact will be heavy on communities like Salado, as hundreds of refugees arrive without normal necessities like furniture, clothing, transportation or jobs.

Finding suitable land for low income housing and large apartment "projects" will be difficult, but the federal government has promised the host communities all the help they will need.

That "offer" stirred up at least one disgruntled Saladoan who noted (anonymously) "The durn government is great on promising the moon and delivering next to nothing!"

PROPERTY TAX LOOMS

If the new housing projects are placed in the Salado ETJ the cost of services would be minimal, but with the large numbers involved - Federal and State officials will eventually demand all services be provided and without doubt Salado would be forced to enact a property tax to meet the needs of so many new arrivals.

ANOTHER SCHOOL BOND ISSUE?

School officials might have to order a second bond vote to enlarge the recently approved high school, as well as expanding the elementary and middle school campuses - in order to handle the expected 365 new students.

Most of the newcomer's housing would be government owned high-rise apartment projects that would create little or no property tax income to help support the school's increase in student population.

Long-time Salado resident, Earl L. "Pete" Creasey was honored by the Baylor "B" Association as a Baylor Legend for Men's Basketball during the men's game against Texas A&M University last month.

Creasey was named to the 17-man Baylor All-Centennial Basketball Team. The squad, selected by a combination of fan voting and an expert panel, represents the greatest Bears basketball players of all time. Baylor celebrated its 100th season of men's basketball in 2005-06.


The team, which includes the late Bill Henderson as its honorary coach, also consists of Vinnie "The Microwave" Johnson, Terry Teagle, Terry Black, Aaron Bruce, William Chatmon, Pete Creasey, Carroll Dawson,

Larry Gatewood, Darrell Hardy, the late Don Heathington, the late Hubert Kirkpatrick, Jerry Mallet, Darryl Middleton, Jack Robinson, Brian Skinner, David Wesley and Micheal Williams.

Baylor basketball officially began in 1906-07 with a seven-man squad that won its first two games and finished 5-6. The Bears' storied history includes Final Four appearances 1948 and 1950, a national runner-up finish 1948, five conference championships as well as the heroic tragedy of the 1927 Immortal Ten team.

During his time at Baylor, Pete Creasey was a 3-year letterwinner in track and field, as well as in basketball. In 1939 his athletic performances earned him All-Southwest Conference honors

What do you expect from your investments?

If your investment portfolio is even moderately diversified, you probably own both stocks and bonds. And that's a good idea, because diversification is essential to your success as an investor. But you also should know what to expect from different types of investments - because the more you know, the more likely you are to make the right moves.

Unfortunately, some people's expectations get distorted, due to what may be happening with their investments. For example, a couple of years back, many investors saw the value of their bonds rise sharply, causing some to look at these investments "growth" vehicles. But is that an accurate assessment?

Probably not - although some recent statistics are quite interesting. From December 1999 through February 2003, long-term government bonds rose about 13 percent, while the S & P 500 - one of the most well-known stock market

indices - fell by about the same amount. This is the second greatest period ever of superior bond returns relative to stocks - and one of the few in the past 80 years, a time in which stocks have consistently outperformed all other investments.

And so, while you can't base all your investment decisions on what has gone before, it's generally a good idea not to plan on selling your bonds before they mature and make a profit. Instead, plan for what bonds do provide: current income in the form of monthly or quarterly interest checks. As long as you own your bond, you will always receive the same amount in interest (assuming the issuer doesn't default), no matter how much the bond's

current value fluctuates.

stocks Many provide current income, in the form of dividends. But if you're like a lot of people, you buy stocks for their growth potential. In other words, when you buy stocks, you anticipate the price going up, so that when it's time to sell, you can make a profit.

And, although past performance is not an indication of future results, over the long term, stock prices historically have risen. In fact, from 1926 through 2005, largecompany stocks provided an average annual return of more than 10 percent, while small-company returned, on average, more than 12 percent, according to Ibbotson Associates, an investment research firm. Small company stocks do fluctuate more than that of larger companies.

Of course, you can't

assume that, for a given year, your stocks will return 10 percent, 12 percent - or anything at all. In the short term, stocks go down as well as up, so you shouldn't be shocked at losing principal over a single year, or perhaps a couple of years in a row.

But if you buy an array of high-quality stocks and you hold them for the long term - at least five to 10 years -you increase your chances to achieve some growth.

Ultimately, by knowing what to expect from your stocks, bonds and any other securities you may own, you can draw up a longterm investment strategy appropriate for individual needs, goals, risk tolerance and time horizon. You may want to work with a financial professional to determine why you own what you do, what you might anticipate from your holdings and what changes you may need to make.

Gov. Perry dodges Coalition - with good reason

EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

Rick Perry is dodging the Blackland Coalition.

He was the only candidate for Texas Governor invited by the Coalition who skipped the March 24 political rally at Seaton Hall.

Not that the Governor would have been welcomed with open arms by the several hundred people gathered there to hear from candidates in the November election.

Nor would he have found much solace from the three candidates all lobbying for his seat: independent hopefuls Carol Keeton Strayhorn and Kinky Friedman, both of whose campaigns were collecting signatures to get on the November ballot, and Democrat Chris Bell.

While the Blackland Coalition was formed to oppose Gov. Perry's TransTexas Corridor, little time was spent by the candidates on the issue, or alternatives to the widereaching proposal.

Strayhorn However. labeled the TTC as Perry's "TransTexas Catastrophe," before rallying against Perry and his "band of land-grabbing highway henchmen."

'In a Strayhorn administration," the State Comptroller told the crowd, the TTC "will be blasted off the bureaucratic books

Strayhorn said would say "no to the largest landgrab in history... no to destroying croplands... no to double taxation.... and no to a \$184 billion boondoggle that would replace Texas' freeways with tollways."

She added that the governor should "protect private property rights, not sell them to a foreign corporation."

The TTC, she added, is a "toll scheme that would cost drivers \$120 each day, each way" to cross Texas.

"That's not democracy," she said. "That's highway

Strayhorn added that she has called repeatedly on Gov. Perry to support a constitutional amendment that would "protect the private property rights of Texans."

'You will have a strong voice in Austin," Strayhorn told the crowd. "TxDOT will not do whatever the hell it wants."

While writer Kinky Friedman had plenty of quips about why he should be governor, he had little to

say about what he would do if elected.

"I'm the only candidate running that has no political experience," Friedman said during his time at the podium.

Pointing to political experience, Friedman noted more than 50 decades of politics shared by his opponents. "Look where that's gotten us," he said.

He also pointed to Ronald Reagan's first race for governor of California. A friend of Reagan mentioned that he had no experience in the race, compared to a wealth of experience of his opponent. "That's exactly what I am running against," Reagan said at the time, echoed by Friedman who paints himself as an outsider much like Jessie Ventura who shocked political pundits by being elected as an independent governor of Minnesota.

"What Jessie didn't realize is that wrestling is real and politics is fake," Friedman said.

He added that in the last governor's race, "Perry and Sanchez spent \$100 million come back to live in the state to drive 71 percent of you away from the polls.3

Friedman hopes change that by reaching disheartened and disillusioned voters and show them that "it's not always the guy with the most money who wins.... it's the guy with the biggest

"MLK is not just a road," he said. "JFK is not just an airport. They were people who dared to dream."

Democrat Chris Bell, was much more hyperbolic a speaker than either Stravhorn or Friedman, but did take the opportunity to note his differences with the governor and the Republican party.

Bell filed the initial ethics complaint against Tom DeLay when he held a seat in the U.S. Congress. He was repaid by having his district redrawn to be heavily Republican, losing it in the 2004 election.

Bell said it would be poetic justice if the ethically embattled DeLay were to be "unseated by the voters in November and have to

where his old friend Chris Bell was Governor.'

He told the group that it wouldn't take money to stop the proposed TTC. "It will take a new governor to do that," he said.

Bell said that one reason he is asking Texas voters to fire Rick Perry is that "Perry is taking ethics lessons from Tom DeLay.'

Those ethics are playing out across the state in ways that hurt most Texans. "Budgets are not only fiscal documents," Bell said, "They are moral documents. There are human costs associated with the lines of a budget."

Those costs are something Bell said Perry has forgotten as he toadies to big money. When faced with budget worries, Bell says that Perry slashes programs like children's health insurance and increases taxes on "exotic dancers, bottled water and snacks."

"We are proud of Texas, Mr. Perry," Bell said. "We just are not very proud of what you're doing to it."

No foolin': Smokin' Spokes bike ride pedals around April 1

With weather predictions calling for temperatures around 80 degrees for the weekend, the Fourth Annual Smokin' Spokes Bike Ride should provide riders good conditions to pedal through some of the finest scenery in Central Texas, all the while benefitting the Salado Volunteer Fire Department. The ride will be held April 1, beginning 8 a.m. at the Salado school grounds.

As in previous years, a variety of routes will be available for riders to choose Unfrom, with each route differing in distance and overall difficulty.

Riders can pick from 15, 27, 57, 70, 85 and 102 mile rides. All routes will begin and end at the Salado school grounds at 550 Thomas Arnold Road. Most routes will take cyclists east to the Summer's Mill area, and also west to Stillhouse Hollow Lake.

There are rest stops designated with each route. "we placed most of our rest stops at very scenic locations," said Kevin Reichert, Smokin' Spokes organizer. "One is on the shore of Stillhouse Hollow Lake; one is at the Overlook Park on top of the dam to Stillhouse Hollow; and one is at Summer's Mill."


For the most competitive cyclist, the 102-mile route will provide quite a challenge. This route encompasses all the best riding that Salado has to offer. Riders will head west out of Salado into the foothills on this route, then wind theirway through the hills west of town until arriving at Eagle's Nest Road. Climb to the top of Eagle's Nest Road (walking is permitted, to enjoy a panoramic view of Bell County. Continue on to Crow's Ranch Road, back out to more incredible views of Stillhouse Hollow Lake. Head toward Long Bridge across the west end of the lake. There is a rest stop on the shore of the lake, just past the bridge. Take a break at the rest stop before riding on towards Nolanville Hill, which is steep and more than a mile long. A few miles past Nolanville Hill, cyclists will come to a rest stop on the dam overlooking Stillhouse Hollow Lake at Overlook Park.

Bring the camera and get

some action photos from atop the dam. From there. cyclists head out east of Salado towards Summer's Mill. Keep the camera handy for the rest stop at the waterfalls at Summer's Mill. Continue on south towards the rest stop at "Too Late Gate" at mile 76. The "Too Late Gate" gets its name because it will be closed at 3 p.m. Cyclists on the 102-mile route will need to average 11 miles an hour to get through the gate before it closes. The long cyclists will then finish up the ride with a tailwind and some "rollers" coming back into town, along with the final stretch down Main Street in Salado. There are eight rest stops on this route.

The shorter routes encompass sections of the 102-mile route. Maps of all of the routes can be found at www.saladospokes.com.

Entry fee is \$30 for onsite registration. Camping areas will be available after 5 p.m. March 31 and







White-colored foods can cause big problems

There have been a number of sayings that may have caught your attention in the past concerning white bread, such as: "The whiter the bread, the sooner you're dead" or even "quick death."

But interestingly, and more importantly, white bread isn't the only problem. There are a number of white foods that wreak havoc with your health. Foods like refined flour, pasteurized and homogenized milk, processed salt, vegetable oils, and of course, sugar are equally as detrimental. Let's take a look at each and see where the problems lie, and discuss what might be better choices.

Problem: Refined flour can be found in the majority of convenience foods in America; including breads, pastries, and cereals. Once the bran is removed from the grain the food has lost all of its nutritional value, making it an empty calorie, if not a "naked" calorie. Manufacturers commonly refer to refined flours as "bleached and enriched" and you will find this terminology listed in the ingredients of cheaper breads and baked goods.

Answer: If you want to consume bread, look for breads that are made from organic and "sprouted" grains. These breads will be much safer and actually have some nutritional value.

Problem: Pasteurized and Homogenized milk is far from the wholesome and natural state that comes from the cow or goat. Commercialized milk should be considered "convenience" as it is so altered as to without nutritional Pasteurization kills beneficial enzymes, bacteria, vitamins and

minerals in the milk. Homogenization drastically changes the make-up of the milk that it can cause digestive issues. Additionally, unless the milk says "organic" on the container, you are consuming hormones and antibiotics that are passed on by the cow or goat.

Answer: If you drink milk because you want to increase the calcium in your diet, increase the amount of green leafy vegetables instead. These vegetables will increase your nutrient intake for the day with very few added calories and with no added sugar. If you love dairy products, find a farmer who produces milk from free range grass fed cows or goats. Make sure that there are no hormones, antibiotics or any type of pesticides being used as

Problem: Processed salt has very little nutritional value. Sodium Chloride (NaCl) in processed salt is so altered that our bodies have a difficult time ridding itself of it. This may lead to joint issues and kidney problems. Table salt may also contain aluminum-based anticaking agents, dextrose, silico-aluminate and sodium acetate that may cause a plethora of health

Answer: Buy an unprocessed sea salt. It contains numerous trace minerals that are beneficial to your body.

Problem: Vegetable Oil is an oil that we consume way too much of in America. Polyunsaturated fats, including vegetable

oils, are very unstable and cannot be heated, so you should not cook with them. Research today links heated vegetable oils with rancidity which increases the free radical make-up in the body. Margarine is a vegetable oil based product that is loaded with trans-fatty acids, making it closer to a plastic than a fat, and should be avoided completely.

Answer: A great way to increase your quality fat intake to is to consume organic green vegetables and non-roasted walnuts and almonds. Eggs and meat from free-range chickens and animals produce an excellent source

of Omega-3 essential fatty acids. If cooking, use coconut oil, ghee or lard. The top mono-unsaturated oil is extra virgin olive oil, which is much better choice than canola.

Proper nutrition is the primary factor when making lifestyle changes to improve your health. Reduce, if not remove, the preceding "white" foods from your diet and replace them with the "colorful" options and you will see and feel the improvement.

serious danger of losing two hearts and a spade trick. If he takes the ace of hearts at trick one, draws trumps and forces out the ace of spades, the defenders are likely to cash two heart tricks and defeat the

To protect against this, declarer must arbitrarily assume that the hearts are divided 5-2. The question then is how to proceed. One possibility is to duck the first heart, take the second one, draw trumps and lead a spade.

If the defender who started with only two hearts has the ace of spades, declarer comes home a winner, because that defender will not have a heart to return after taking the ace of spades. Dummy's heart loser is later discarded on declarer's third spade.

In the present case, however, after East produces the heart jack at trick one, South's correct play is to take the ace of hearts immediately! He reasons that West cannot have the K-Q of hearts, since West would have led the king with that holding.

South therefore credits East with the Q-J after East plays the jack on the first trick. Declarer can't make the contract if East has Q-J-x, so he takes his ace hoping East started

After drawing trumps, South leads a spade. Whether East or West turns up with the ace does not matter, because either way the defense is unable to cash more than one heart trick. South's ten blocks the suit and is the critical card that prompts declarer to take the ace of hearts at trick one rather than hold

Course he had two-way radio and called an ambulance. It took me into Kerrville and I spent two weeks in the hospital getting healed up."



TXU Electric Delivery Company is proposing to construct a new 345 kilovolt (kV) electric transmission line in Bell and Williamson Counties. The proposed transmission line will be approximately 40 miles long, depending upon the route certificated by the Public Utility Commission Texas. of The proposed transmission line will connect the proposed Salado Switching Station (located northeast of Salado, Texas on Rose Lane in Bell County) to the existing Hutto Switching Station (located west of Hutto, Texas on County Road 119 in Williamson County).

TXU Electric Delivery is committed to routing the proposed transmission line in a manner consistent with the values of the local communities, the Texas Utilities Code, the Public Utility Commission of Texas Rules and Policies, and the need to provide reliable electric service to this area of Central Texas. In support of the routing process, TXU Electric Delivery is holding two public participation meetings to solicit input for use in determining the preferred route for the proposed transmission line and share information about line routing alternatives. PBS&J, a consulting firm retained by TXU Electric Delivery for the project, has identified preliminary alternative transmission line routes for consideration which are shown as dashed lines on the map to the right and will be available at the meetings to discuss these routes. Maps with greater detail will be exhibited at the meetings. 

Spring is time to clean, seal outdoor decks

(StatePoint) through any neighborhood in the U.S. and you're likely to find more than just a few outdoor decks. In fact, decks have become more popular than ever before and can provide decades of use, provided they are well maintained.

To combat the damaging effects of weather and the discoloration caused by grease, dirt, moss, algae and other plants, your deck should be properly cleaned and sealed.

Throughout the year, keep an eye on your deck. Brush off fallen leaves and other debris so organic materials don't rot and leave mildew. If your deck surface is near the ground and air circulation is limited, you might want to consider covering the soil with a polyethylene barrier topped with decorative rock to prevent moisture damage underneath.

If it is time to apply a stain, it's important to remove existing deck coatings and start with a fresh surface. There are a number of commercial cleaners available, however, oxygen bleach is one of the safest, as it is non-toxic, safe for plants and doesn't harm wood nor remove its color. Note that chlorine bleaches (or sodium hypochlorite) if used improperly can kill vegetation that surrounds your deck, remove natural color from your wood and accelerate corrosion of nails.

And be careful if using a high-pressure washing device, as it can easily erode the soft, light-colored wood fibers if not used properly.

Whichever cleaning process you decide on, make sure the deck is completely dry before applying stain. If you want your deck's natural wood color to shine through, you will want to use a clear stain. Note that you typically have to reapply a clear stain every 12 to 18 months. If you use a semitransparent or tinted stain, you should only have to restain every three or four

Consult a trusted professional about which stain is right for you.

Keep in mind that with stains, you often get what you pay for. So be careful if you're looking to save money, as it could result in having to reapply stain sooner than with a higher quality product.

Extend the life of your deck and continue to enjoy it for years to come by taking proper care of it today. After all, there are worse ways to spend a nice day than working outside on your deck.

the rose bush, chirping all the while. This is a wonderful old rose that is very drought tolerant with the single flowers opening buff-yellow, changing to pink and then crimson. Most often all three colors appear together. It is sometimes called the "Butterfly Rose." Another rose that was beginning its bloom cycle was the Knock Out rose, a beautiful repeat bloomer. Near the roses on the north side of the garden, the Mexican buckeye was showing off its delicate blooms in contrast to the bold dark seed pods.

As you amble along the path from north to south, you may enjoy seeing red poppies and purple spiderwort sprouting from the cracks along the side. Also, crossvine, Texas wisteria and passionflower vines were in bloom. The crossvine blooming timed to coincide with the annual migration of the hummingbird. on the lookout for these charming additions to our natural gardens.

Of course, as one wanders down the path, you should look up occasionally so you can see the goblin in the elm tree placed by Salado sculptor, Troy Kelley. Troy has another public art piece at the south side of the bridge, the Troll and Billy Goat Gruff, a bronze sculpture given to the Village of Salado and made possible mainly by the fundraising efforts of the Public Arts League of Salado and the generous

support of all Saladoans who give and donate their talents.

On the south side of the garden another Mutabilis rose was in bloom as well as the fragrant Texas mountain laurel, the colorful salvias and the bush germander with its lavender flowers and attractive silvery gray-green foliage. One anticipates what will be in bloom next week or the next as the weather warms and new growth sprouts each day. This garden is a public garden that we can enjoy each and every day. There are comfortable benches along the path where one can sit and encounter the activity transpiring in the garden.

During the garden tour, there will be docents present at the Green Bridge garden who have a printed garden guide listing all of the many native plants located in the garden and of course, there will be new and different blooms, smells and activity.

Other stops

Other stops on the Salado tour this year is the historic Baines House, owned by Rod and Sheryl Russell, where the garden abounds with native plants, blooming shrubs, towering trees and whimsical garden art; the private informal country cottage garden of Les McCollum and Richard Teeler that enhances the garden spirit as one strolls through the abundant flowering perennials, herbs, roses,

agaves and native plants; Barton and Jeanie Jones' private estate located at a former historic grist mill site on Salado creek with stunning natural views from the limestone cliff and with interspersed native plantings; park-like private yard and garden of John and Barbara Robertson with a wet weather creek, a charming potting shed, vegetable garden and delightful perennial and annual plantings; and the private yard and garden of Joe and Dottie Oliver, a woodland setting with lovely pool area decorated with pots of annuals and tropical plants.

The tour, sponsored by the Garden Club and Public Arts League of Salado, will be held on 10 a.m-4 p.m. May 6 and 1-4 p.m. May 7.. Gardens will be self guided with volunteers helping to answer questions when needed. Tickets are priced at \$10 and are good for both days. Alternatives to Teflon cookware?

Dear EarthTalk: With the recent hubbub over the chemicals used to make Teflon linked to health problems, what is the safest cookware to use in preparing meals for my family? -- Wyatt Walley, Needham, MA

When the health risks associated with making Teflon first came to light last year, many cooks trashed their non-stick cookware and went back to using their old stainless steel pots and pans. But what many people didn't realize was that even stainless steel is not immune to controversy regarding health impacts.

In fact, stainless steel is really a mixture of several different metals, including nickel, chromium and molybdenum, all of which can trickle into foods. However, unless your stainless steel cookware is dinged and pitted, the amount of metals likely to get into your food is negligible.

These days, many health conscious cooks are turning to anodized aluminum cookware

as a safer alternative. electro-chemical anodizing process locks in the cookware's base metal, aluminum, so that it can't get into food, and makes for what many cooks consider an ideal non-stick and scratchresistant cooking surface. Calphalon is the leading manufacturer of anodized cookware, aluminum but newer offerings from All Clad (endorsed by celebrity chef Emeril Lagasse) and others are coming on strong.

Another good choice is that old standby, cast iron, which is known for its durability and even heat distribution. Cast iron cookware can also help ensure that eaters in your house get enough iron--which the body needs to produce red blood cells--as it seeps off the cookware into food in small amounts. Unlike the metals that can come off of some other types of pots and pans, iron is considered a healthy food additive by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. Consumers should beware, though, that most cast iron cookware needs to be seasoned after each use and as such is not as worry-free as other alternatives. Manufacturing is the leading American producer of cast iron cookware.

For those who like the feel and heat distribution properties of cast iron but dread the seasoning process. ceramic enameled cookware from Le Creuset, World Cuisine and others is a good choice. The smooth and colorful enamel is dishwasherfriendly and somewhat non-stick, and covers the entire surface of such cookware to minimize clean-up headaches. One other surface favored by chefs for sauces and sautés is copper, which excels at quick warm-ups and even heat distribution. Since copper can leak into food in large amounts when heated, the cooking surfaces are usually lined with tin or stainless steel.

But if you're concerned about the build-up of solid

waste in our landfills, don't trash your nonstick cookware just yet. According to DuPont, the finished product of Teflon does not contain any of the production-process chemicals linked health problems in factory workers. And the U.S. **Environmental Protection** Agency says that ingesting small particles of Teflon flaked off into food is not known to cause any health maladies. With proper use and care, such pots and pan--which constitute more than half of all cookware sales in the U.S.--should be safe to use for years to come.

Dear EarthTalk: I've heard that gas-powered lawn mowers, despite their small engine size, actually pollute as much as cars. If this is true, is there a greener way to cut my grass? -- Jon Haufe, Seattle, WA

Reports about those noxious fumes emitted from gasoline lawn mowers are indeed true. A Swedish study conducted in 2001 concluded, "Air pollution from cutting grass for an hour with powered a gasoline lawn mower is about the same as that from a 100 mile automobile ride." Meanwhile, the 54 million Americans mowing their lawns each weekend with gas-powered mowers may be contributing as much as five percent of the nation's air pollution, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The problem is that small engines emit disproportionately large amounts of carbon monoxide, volatile organic compounds and nitrogen oxides that contribute to smog. The human health effects of smog-laden air are well known, and include inflammation and damage to lungs, increased risk of asthma attacks, and lowered levels of oxygen the bloodstream, which can aggravate heart conditions.

Fortunately, the EPA is now phasing in new emissions standards for gas mower engines that will result in a 32 percent smog reduction for all models made starting

in 2007. And with even more stringent standards slated to go into effect soon in California, environmental leaders are hoping that the old adage for automobile trends ("as goes California, so goes the nation") will soon apply to lawn mowers too.

But even with such progress, gas power is not the only option. Ecoconscious consumers looking for a new mower should consider, among other options, any of the electric models now available. The easy part is the price, as many models cost less than \$200. The trade-off is that they only work for small lawns and must be tethered to a power outlet during use. Also, going electric is not necessarily a way to reduce pollution overall. According to Consumer Reports, "Achieving a net environmental savings from switching to electric mowers depends on the efficiency of the power plant" from where the electricity originates.

If money is not an issue, the \$2,500 solar-powered "auto mower" from Husqvarna can't be beat for both eco-friendliness and convenience. It wanders unattended around any level lawn, its collision sensors carefully avoiding contact with anything but the grass itself. While it is currently not available directly in the U.S., some Husqvarna dealers are willing to special order it from Sweden where it is manufactured.

Another option, and a much more affordable one, is the Solar Powered Mulching Mower from Gaiam, which is in essence a cordless electric Black & Decker mower modified with a small solar array to turn sunlight into power. The battery on the \$795 mower can also be charged by simply plugging it in.

Of course, the greenest choice of all is the mower than runs on three square meals a day and a good exercise regimen: the venerable humanpowered reel mower. The most popular choices are from American Lawn Mower, which makes nine models including a child-size. They can be found at retailers like Ace Hardware and Target (and at local hardware stores) and in catalogs like Real Goods and Smith & Hawken.
