Today is last chance to register to vote in May 9 elections

Today is the final day to register to vote in the May 9 elections.

Bell County residents may register to vote in person today at the Elections Administrator's located in the Bell County Belton Courthouse Annex at 550 East Second Ave. in Belton. The office is open 8 a.m.- 5 p.m. weekdays.

If you do not have a Texas driver's license or a social security number, you will be required to present identification when you vote in person or enclose a copy of such identification with your ballot if you vote by mail. Identification includes: a current and valid ID; a copy of a current utility bill; bank statement; government check; paycheck; or other government document that shows your name and address.

The Village of Salado and Salado Independent School District will both have contested races in May while the Salado Public Library has canceled its election as only three candidates, all incumbents, filed for election.

Filing for two threevear terms on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees were incumbent Melanie Kirchmeier, former SISD board member Chris Seaton, Brad Bolick and Mike Matthews. The two candidates with the most

votes will be elected.

Three incumbents and a challenger have filed for two-year terms on the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen. Incumbents Fred Brown, Hans Fields and Michael McDougal all filed for re-election. David T. Williams has also filed, making the race contested. The three candidates with the most votes will be elected to the board.

Three incumbents on the Salado Public Library District Board of Directors will be re-elected to the board: Maurine Nathanson, Sara Pettijohn and Diane Hodyniak.

In-person early voting will begin on April 27 and end on May 5. Early voting will be weekdays 7:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. Extended early voting of 7 a.m.-7 p.m. will be held on April 28 and May 5.

Election day, the polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 9 at the Salado Civic Center.

The last day to apply for a ballot by mail is April 30. The last day to received a ballot by mail is 7 p.m. May 9.

The Salado Chamber of Commerce has invited all of the candidates to take part in its annual Candidate Forum.

The Forum will be held the evening of April 27, time and location to be announced.

Aldermen revisit request for Hay Meadow variance

Salado aldermen will revisit a variance request at their 6:30 p.m. April 9 meeting for property at 400 Hay Meadow for the placement of an accessory building outside of the rear

At a Feb. 19 meeting, aldermen granted a 45-day variance with stipulations that property owners Curt and Laurie Ducet seek approval from the architectural review committee of the Salado Creek Place Subdivision off of Center Circle and Indian Trail. The Ducets were to seek approval from the architectural review committee for the entire project, including the expansion of the existing building on the property for use as a home, construction of a separate garage and permanent placement of the accessory building. The drawings for the

residential project were approved on March 25 and signed by Sam Pfeister of the architectural review committee, according to documentation

In other business, aldermen will consider a request from the Village Secretary for administrative leave as well as a request to reimburse volunteers in the village for \$500 for gas and maintenance of equipment for mowing of public areas in the Village.

Following the regular meeting, aldermen will also meet in workshop session for discussion but no

Aldermen will discuss the proposed Bell County Municipal Utility District #3, a 1,221 acre development along FM 2843 and Triangle Road.

The board will also discuss the Stagecoach sewer, including establishing an operating budget, establishing user rates, obtaining operator services and effluent, contractual expenses and discharge alternatives.

They will also discuss terms and conditions for annexations of the schools.

In Defense of Indiana

Indiana is experiencing its two minutes of hate. Indiana's sin is that its Legislature passed and Gov. Mike Pence signed into law a Religious Freedom Restoration Act, setting out a legal standard for cases involving a clash between a person's exercise of religion and the state's

To listen to the critics, you'd think the law was drafted by a joint committee of attorneys from the Ku Klux Klan and the Westboro Baptist Church.

The enlightened are stumbling over themselves in their rush to boycott Indiana. Seattle and San Francisco are banning official travel, and Connecticut is following suit. The anti-Indiana backlash is a perfect storm of hysteria and legal ignorance, supercharged by the particularly censorious selfrighteousness of the left.

All the Indiana law says is that the state can't substantially burden a person's exercise of religion, unless there is a compelling governmental interest at stake and it is pursued by The law doesn't mandate any particular outcome; it simply provides a test for the courts in those rare instances when a person's exercise of religion clashes with a law.

Nineteen other states

have similar protections, and they are all modeled on a federal version of the law that passed Congress with near unanimity in 1993 (Indiana's law is arguably a little more robust than the federal version, since it applies to private suits). If these Religious Freedom Restoration Acts were the enablers of discrimination they are portrayed as, much of the country would already have sunk into a dystopian pit of hatred.

The religious-freedom laws once were associated with minorities that progressives could embrace or tolerate -- Native Americans who smoke pevote as part of religious ceremonies, Amish who drive their buggies on the roads, and the like. That was fine. It is the specter of Christian small-business people -- say, a baker or a florist -- using the laws to protect themselves from punishment for onting out of gaywedding ceremonies that drives progressives mad.

Why? The country has an enormous wedding industry not known for its hostility to gays. The burgeoning institution of gay marriage will surely survive the occasional florist who doesn't want to provide flowers for a samesex wedding for religious

As a practical matter, such a dissenting florist doesn't make a difference; the affected couple might be offended, but can take its business elsewhere. But for the left, it's the principle of the thing. For all its talk of diversity, it demands unanimity on this question -- individual conscience be damned. So it isn't bothered when religious wedding vendors are sued or harassed under anti-discrimination laws for their nonparticipation in ceremonies they morally oppose.

It's not clear that Religious Freedom Restoration Acts will shield these kind of business people (they haven't, to this point). It might be that more specific exemptions are necessary. But the mere possibility that the Religious Freedom Restoration Act might protect a baker opposed to gay marriage is enough to create a furious, unhinged reaction.

Muzzling the Marketplace of Ideas

"Congress shall make no law ... abridging the freedom of speech." The words of the First Amendment couldn't be plainer. Yet more than two centuries after the Bill of Rights was written, they remain the subject of fierce de-

Actually, I should amend that (no pun intended). These words would be the subject of debate ... if debate were permitted. But these days, apparently, we're all so thin-skinned that we can't bear to hear an opinion that challenges our worldview.

This is even true, ironically, at our institutions of higher learning. Some colleges are far more interested in swaddling their students in a protective bubble than in teaching free speech.

Consider what happened to Omar Mahmood. The University of Michigan student last year wrote a satirical piece for the campus newspaper, the Michigan Daily, listing the ways that the pervading culture of right-handedness victimizes left-handed people.

"The biggest obstacle to equality today is our barbaric attitude toward people of left-handydnyss [sic]," he wrote. "It's a tragedy that I, a member of the left-handed community, had little to no idea of the atrocious persecution that we are dealt every day by institutions that are deeply embedded in society."

Anyone familiar with the political correctness that pervades so much of society will recognize what Mahmood was lampooning. The victim mentality is particularly acute

on many campuses, with professors nursing and even inflaming cultural conflicts on every level, leaving everyone walking around on eggshells.

In such an environment, Mahmood's column could have served a valuable purpose. An actual debate -- imagine! -- could have ensued.

But no. The Daily's editors couldn't risk damaging the precious little psyches of his fellow students with anything as retrograde as a dissenting point of view. Mahmood had created a "hostile environment" for those hothouse flowers, he was told. Why, an unidentified staffer "felt threatened" by his column. Somebody pass the smelling salts!

Mahmood's apartment was vandalized. He was

A Thumping Cruz-a-palooza

THE TEXAS SENATOR AND PRESIDENTIAL WANNABE CAN'T EVEN IMAGINE THE TRUTH.

Senator Ted Cruz's recent announcement of his presidential candidacy was a real Cruz-a-palooza.

It was part Ronald Reagan, part Elmer Gantry, part John Lennon, and part Jerry Falwell — yet it was totally Ted Cruz, full of blather and bloat.

Cruz thumped the word "liberty" again and again during his speech, like a televangelist thumping the Bible. "We stand together for liberty," the candidate declared one final time at the conclusion of the show, which was staged at Falwell's Liberty University.

That was more than a little cynical.

While the mass media reported that Cruz drew a packed house of 10,000 Liberty students, few news stories mentioned a pertinent fact about the crowd: The budding scholars were not at liberty to avoid his speech. Their school made attendance mandatory.



Another word reprised throughout the event was "imagine." Cruz uttered it 38 times in a sort of dreamy imitation of the John Lennon song. "Imagine health care reform that keeps government out of the way," warbled the sen-

Imagine, indeed. Cruz's family once received free, platinum-level coverage from Goldman Sachs, where his wife was a top executive. But when she took leave from the Wall Street giant to join Cruz's anti-government crusade, they were suddenly left with no health

coverage. No problem for a hypocrite like Cruz. The day after his big speech, he said he plans to sign up for Obamacare, the very program he demonized and once shut down the government in an attempt to

But it was in the speech's finale that Cruz reached his crescendo of cynicism: "It is a time for truth," he bellowed.

Truth?

This is a guy who fabricates facts to foment fear among the fringiest rightwingers. The good news is that the more he campaigns, the more obvious it will become that he can't even imagine the truth.

fired from the Daily, of course.

Unfortunately, this isn't an isolated incident. Hardly a week goes by without news about one campus or another preventing unpopular views from being expressed. According to the Foundation for Individual Rights in Education (FIRE), which tracks such violations, most U.S. colleges are guilty.

And "this isn't just an American problem," Jim DeMint, president of The Heritage Foundation, noted in a lecture at Yale University. "Academia spans nations, and its diseases can swim across oceans." Thus, for example, Oxford University canceled a pro-con debate about abortion "because, apparently, men aren't allowed to have opinions on such things anymore." Even the pro-abortion debater found that ridiculous.

But more and more, this is our world. We don't debate, we demonize. The New York Times Magazine documented this trend in a chilling article titled "How One Stupid Tweet Blew Up Justine Sacco's Life." It showed how Sacco and others have lost jobs, endured vicious threats and been forced into hiding for daring to make ill-conceived jokes or off-the-cuff remarks that others found offensive.

Part of the problem, surely, is rooted in basic ignorance of American history and our founding documents. That's why I opened by quoting the First Amendment. It may strike some readers as too basic to even mention, but numerous surveys show an alarming degree of ignorance and illiteracy.

Heck, you don't even need a survey. Jimmy Kimmel and other latenight comics often mine this ignorance for laughs with their man-on-thestreet interviews.

But there's nothing funny about the underlying cause. Or with its effect: a society where political correctness makes debate impossible and only those who express the "accepted" opinion are permitted to speak.

"You don't communicate with anyone purely on the rational facts or ethics of an issue," wrote Saul Alinsky in "Rules for Radicals," the bible of the so-called progressive left. "Pick a target, freeze it, personalize it, and popularize it."

Personally, I'll stick with the First Amendment.

The Lost Track of Time

Local author returns to Salado April 11 to sign debut children's book at Fletcher's

Paige Britt will return to a place that she says that as a kid was "full of magical treasures" when she comes to Salado's Fletcher's Books & Antiques to sign her recently-released debut book, "The Lost Track of Time."

Britt will be at Fletcher's Books and Antiques 4-6:30 p.m. April 11 to sign the book which was officially released March 31 and was dubbed in a Publisher's Weekly starred review as "an exuberant homage to the power of imagination and creative problem-solving, as well as the importance of making time for oneself, one's dreams, and one's friends."

"I was lucky enough to grow up in a town with a bookstore," Britt says of Salado, where she moved with her family in 1974 to live in the Barton House. Her parents are Darwin and Carolyn Britt. Her father moved the historic storefronts from Santa Anna, Texas that have become a landmark in Salado best known as Salado Square.

Paige attended elementary school in Salado and high school in Belton, where she was influenced by English teacher Weeta Sue Evans. Britt graduated from Belton in 1987 and earned a bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of Texas at Austin in 1991.

After graduation, she became an editor at the Institute for the Humanities at Salado, working alongside Dr. Harry Wilmer and Nancy Lefler to produce educational programs for adults. While at the Institute, she edited a series of essays from famous thinkers, teachers and writers on spirituality and reli-



gion. She fell in love with the topic and a few years later enrolled in graduate school. Paige received her master's in theology from Fuller Theological Semi-


nary in 1996.

She eventually returned to central Texas and taught creativity and spirituality classes at the University of Mary-Hardin Baylor in Belton. She also began her career as a writer and instructional designer at Enspire, an e-learning company in Austin.

She eventually left the corporate world to pursue her passion for writing children's literature. The Lost Track of Time is her first book.

The Lost Track of Time is described as a magical fantasy, an allegorical cautionary tale, a feast of language and a celebration of creativity.

In it, Penelope is running out of time. She dreams of being a writer, but how can she pursue her passion when her mother schedules every minute of her life? And how will she ever prove that writing is worthwhile if her mother keeps telling her to "get busy!" and "be more pro-
