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Village applies for trails grant for downtown

"We need a start," City Manager Kim Foutz told aldermen. "We don't have any trails and this gives us a start."

The proposed offroad trail connects Salado's College Hill Park with Salado Creek in a looped trail that parallels Main Street along Peddler's Alley, extends north to the south bank of Salado Creek, extends east along the banks of Salado Creek and then to the west side of Center Circle and back again crossing Royal Street and returning to Salado College Hill Park.

The application for funding through the Texas Department of Transportation, Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) grant authorizes Village matching funds to the tune of \$60,000 and federal funding of \$240,000 for a total project cost of \$300,000.

The board voted 4-0-1 in favor of authorizing application for the TAP grant with Hans Fields abstaining from the vote. "I don't know enough about it," he said as he abstained.

Prior to the vote, Fields questioned why the pro-

posed grant application had not come before the board in workshop ses-

Alderman Michael Mc-Dougal answered that the grant application had been researched and developed by a subcommittee that included himself, Alderman Amber Preston Dankert, Will Lowery, Darlene Walsh, Claire Hartman and David Olsen.

Fields questioned whether the local matching funds had been included in the budget. Foutz explained that the Village did not budget for this because the grant program was announced after the 2014-15 budget had been adopted. "Typically, you don't know if funds are going to be available when you are making out your annual budget," she said.

She added that the announcement of grant awards would not come until the fall of 2015 and that construction of the hike and bike trail would not begin until fall of 2016.

The deadline for submission of the grant application is May 4 and needed a resolution of support from the Board of Aldermen as part of the applica-

As Bell County, state moves out of drought, similarities to California considered

For most of Texas, the five-year-long drought has eased considerably, but not so for California, where conditions are the driest in the past 1,200 years. But there are similarities between conditions in the two states, says a Texas A&M University professor who also serves as the state climatologist.

Despite this week's rains in central Texas, western portions of Bell County remain abnormally dry, according to the Texas Drought Map.

Otherwise the rest of Bell County has moved out of the drought. Clearwater Underground Water Conservation District moved the status for the Edwards BFZ Recharge Zone from Drought Status 1 (Awareness) to No Drought in February. In fact, the Edwards Recharge Zone is currently at 102 percent of the Precipitation Deficit

John Nielsen-Gammon, professor of atmospheric sciences, says California is going through what Texas did in 2011-2012, where conditions were even worse than what the Golden State is experienc-

Nielsen-Gammon says the standard measure of a drought is the Palmer Drought Severity Index (PDSI) used by the National Climatic Data Center. March 2015 was the

first month since July 2010 for which the PDSI for the entire state of Texas was positive, measuring plus 1.42. The all-time low was minus 8.07, measured in September 2011.

"The 2010-2015 drought was the secondlongest statewide drought on record, eclipsed only by the 1950-57 drought, which is still considered the drought of record for

Village re-enters negotiations with Sanctuary

The Village of Salado learned earlier this month that it has moved into the final stage of consideration for an Economic Development Administration (EDA) grant to help construct a centralized wastewater treatment plant and delivery system.

The Village was informed April 3 by the U.S. Department of Commerce EDA that it is now being considered for a \$1 million grant that will require local funding commitments of \$5.32 million.

Those local funds will come from the \$10.55 million general obligation bond approved by voters in November 2014.

'We have had just two weeks to process this last stage," City Manager Kim Foutz said.

Aldermen voted unanimously at their April 23 meeting on a resolution to provide commitments and other documentation to the EDA for the final stage of the grant process.

Aldermen also met in a called meeting April 29 to further negotiations with Sanctuary Development in relation to wastewater, land use, design guide-

April 23 following an executive session to re-enter negotiations with Sanctuary after they had voted at a meeting last month to break off negotiations.

Aldermen also voted April 23 to end the lease with Morris Foster for the discharge of effluent from the Stagecoach sewer system onto acreage west of Salado. The lease will end in July. The Village also discussed in a workshop session an operator for the Stagecoach plant as Terry Potts informed the Village that he would not extend his contract to manage the system.

While negotiations with Sanctuary developers have been in executive session, they likely include partnering with Sanctuary to build a sewer plant.

According to the documentation for the EDA grant application apparently will utilize the Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination Permit (TPDEP) permit issued to Salado Utility, Inc., the private utility company formed in 2009 for the Highlands at Salado, which in 2014 became The Sanctuary at Salado, a 300-acre mixed use development.

tronic letter from Robert Sulaski, CEO of Sanctuary Development Corp. to Mayor Skip Blancett referencing the grant application to the EDA, Sulaski states: "We very much want to offer our assistance to Salado by joining you in planning for a sanitary sewer system serving Salado, its businesses and homes and Sanctuary."

According to the Sulaski letter, "Sanctuary proposed agreement with the Village of Salado is for Sanctuary to transfer its existing permit from Texas Commission for Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a 300,000gallon per day wastewater treatment plant."

"Sanctuary also proposes that it design the WWTP, associated lift stations, force mains and primary gravity lines (collectively the "Sewer System", publicly bid the Sewer System, then construct the Sewer System," Sulaski

further states in the letter. Once completed, "the Sewer System (along with the WWTP) would be transferred to the Village of Salado," Sulaski states in the letter.

The grant application

2013 renewal of the TCEQ discharge permit for Salado Utility, Inc. authorizing the discharge of "wastes from the Highlands of Salado Wastewater Treatment Facility SIC Code 4952 located north of the intersection of Shepard (sic) Drive and Farm-to-Market 2268, approximately feet north from the end of Shepard Drive in Bell County to Smith Branch, then to Salado Creek in Segment No 1243 of the Brazos River Basin." The renewal of the TCEQ permit expires in December

The grant application includes statements from other parties including Sanctuary, Stonecreek Settlement, Magnolia's, Inn on the Creek and The Range restaurant about the creation of jobs due to the future WWTP. Those estimates of created or saved jobs due to the EDA grant range from 17 jobs at Stonecreek Settlement to the creation of 2,500 jobs at Sanctuary.

Following an executive session April 23, aldermen voted unanimously to "reopen negotiations with Sanctuary Development including but not limited

a wastewater treatment plant, Planned Development, Design Guidelines, incentives and financing."

Aldermen set a special called meeting for April 29 (after press-time for this week's newspaper) for further negotiations with Sanctuary.

Funding for the development of the Sanctuary could come in the form of a Municipal Utility District (MUD) or, more likely, a Public Improvement District (PID).

During town hall meetings last year hosted by Sanctuary developers, Sulaski mentioned PIDs as a likely way that the development would pursue financing the considerable infrastructure necessary for the 300-acre proposed development. The Sanctuary development includes retail and office space, multi-family housing, single family housing, a boutique hotel, restaurants, an 1,800-seat entertainment venue and parks.

PIDs are partnerships of sort between developers and local governing bodies. Whereas developers basically form their own governing body and tax rate under MUDs, PIDs

developer borrows money from the local governing body, which sells bonds to finance the infrastructure The PID debt is debt. secured by the value of the land plus the improvements. PID debt is repaid through assessments on the property owners.

According to "Public Improvement Districts as a Land Development Financing Mechanism" prepared for the General Government & Finance Subcommittee by Development Planning and Financing Group, Inc. the Value to Lien Ratio for PID financing is typically a ratio ranging from 5:1 (most favorable) to 3:1 (least favorable).

According to the PID document, PIDs provide no financial risk for the municipality, does not reduce the city's bonding capacity, covers all outof-pocket costs of the city, accelerates development of amenities, increases the city's total tax base, serves as potential financing mechanism for needed city infrastructure and capital improvements and allows city to influence land uses in its Extra-Territorial Jurisdiction (ETJ).

Early voting is low so far in local city, school election

Early voting in the Salado ISD Board of Trustees and Village of Salado Board of Aldermen election began April 27 at the Salado Civic Center.

Early voting will be weekdays 7:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. through May 4. The final day of early voting will have extended hours of 7 a.m.-7 p.m. on May 5.

Election day, the polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. May 9 at the Salado Civic Center. The last day to apply for a ballot by mail is April 30. The last day to receive a ballot by mail is

7 p.m. May 9. In the first two days of early voting, turnout has

been slow. Only 41 have cast ballots in the Salado ISD Board of Trustees race. In the Village of Salado race, only 31 have cast

Appearing on the ballot for Salado ISD Board of Trustees are Brad Bolick, Melanie Kirchmeier and Chris Seaton. Kirchmeier

is a one-term incumbent and Seaton served three terms on the board before retiring two years ago.

Mike Matthews' name appears on the ballot for Salado ISD Trustee, but he announced April 21 that he was withdrawing from the race. While his name will remain on the ballot

he asks voters to only con-

sider the other candidates. The two candidates with the most votes will be elected to three year terms on the board of trustees.

Three incumbents and a challenger have filed for two-year terms on the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen. Incumbents Fred Brown, Hans Fields and Michael McDougal all filed for re-election. David T. Williams has also filed, making the race contested. The three candidates with the most votes will be elected to the board.

Traditionally in Salado about half of the votes cast are cast in early voting.

Aldermen hopefuls on sewer, condition of roads, annexation

We put the following questions to the candidates for the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen. Their answers are below:

1. How is Salado doing in preparation for a sewer system? What approach do you think is best for the Village, tying into Belton, partnering developer(s) or going it alone? (200 words)

2. What can/should Salado do to expand its boundaries in terms of annexation? (100 words)

3. How is Salado doing in terms of the conditions of its roads? What should it do differently, if anything? (100 words)

Question One: The primary consideration in a sewer system is to deliver the best product to the citizens of Salado at a reasonable cost, and in a timely manner. When considering a joint venture with Belton, running a sewer line to the Lampasas River will be very costly, and we don't know what the revenues will be. This is a very important aspect as to how the operations will be funded, and how Salado will be able to service the debt and retire the bonds. Going it alone will increase the time it will take to put in a sewer system by an additional year. Time to finish would be 30 months. Partnering with a developer that already has a WWTP permit may be our best alternative: (1) A developer can build a plant much quicker than the Village; (2) The Village would have oversight of the construction. (3) Instead of having a privately owned system at our back door that we cannot control, the Village could own and operate the facility, and serve the residents of Salado. (4) Construction time would be cut from a minimum of 30 months to 18 months or less, resulting in quickly resolving Street and expanding opportunities on the West side of Salado.

Question Two: Any services that citizens expect in a community cost dollars, and those dollars come from taxes. The only way we can increase services without increasing taxes, is by taking in property that is in our extra territorial iurisdiction (ETJ) and expanding our tax base. Our ETJ is now being protected by Salado, which keeps other communities from annexing them. These areas use the services that Salado provides, like police and fire protection, without paying any city taxes. We need to decide if an area should be annexed into the corporate limits of Salado, or released from our ETJ, thereby reducing the costs to our Village.

Question Three: The committee that just completed structuring the road program for the Village has done an outstanding job of identifying, in order of need, the collector roads that have the heaviest traffic, down to the less traveled streets. There are 3 major collector roads that are set for construction this summer. The major problem is that the budget of the Village is very low, so in turn the amount of money that can be used for road repair or reconstruction is very limited. This, in itself, is another compelling reason that the annexation issue has to be addressed. Another way that additional revenue to the Village for street improvements will be gained, will be through the controlled new retail development on the west side of I-35. This will happen as soon as the Village can provide sewer service to this area.





Question One: The BOA, in my opinion, is not doing well in preparation for a sewer system. It has been six months since the bond passed, and we still have no land on which to build a system and have not started the 6-12 month process to get a permit. The Sanctuary wants the Village to build them a sewer plant that we can use for a while. We have looked once again at tying into the Belton system. Both of these options will require the Village to build a second plant for Salado use in the future. I personally don't agree with all the secrecy regarding current negotiations with the Sanctuary and the Belton pipeline. I think that the people of the Village should hear the offers and have a say in the result. They are paying the bill. My personal opinion is that we should obtain land, get a permit and build our own plant. I don't vote my personal opinions but rather what my constituents tell me is best for our Village. The BOA is no longer considering building a plant to take care of Salado and the growth a plant will bring-rather, one that will require many hundreds of users in order to operate

cost effectively. Question Two: Because of our size, Salado must have landowner's mission and the property must be contiguous to the Village limits in order for the Village to annex any property. There are few options that Salado can employ. Tax breaks on property, trading or giving away property in the ETJ that refuse annexation. People living in the Salado ETJ need to understand that Belton, Killeen and Temple are aggressively moving towards Salado and due to their population they can annex without property owner permission or request. The board has chosen a team to work on this issue and results will be forthcoming in the next few months.

Question 3: As a peorepresentative the board for 4 years, I have seen little done on our roads in spite of the citizens asking year after year. We had a survey of the roads 5-6 years ago. Due to lack of work on the roads conditions have not

changed. The same roads still need attention. Yet we wasted time doing another survey. This year some road work will be done with \$400,000 being spent on roads; also \$50,000 on Main Street. It will remain to be seen if there is \$250,000 in the budget for road work next year due to all the commitments being agreed to by the board.



Michael McDougal Question One: BOA is progressing quite well with planning and executing a sound sewage treatment program. We are actively reviewing three options. We are studying with our engineer, a regional cooperative arrangement with the City of Belton that includes a treatment plant location approximately five miles north which will require running lines this distance. Cooperative agreements are usually cost savers, but this distance as well as other factors incur excess expenses for us. However, a plus for this option is that the completion time frame could be advantageous when compared to a stand-alone system.

We have re-opened negotiations with The Sanctuary Development Group that would provide a treatment plant location southeast of the Village. This will be a part of our expedited time line for system review and negotiations. This would include housing construction, hotel accommodations, sales, and entertainment theatre that must support the ambience of our Vil-

The third option is a stand-alone system that requires some additional explorations which will further the expectations of our downtown area and west side of I-35.

Each option contains positives and negatives which include time-line implications, financial liability, and of course operational responsibilities. I will support the option that provides the absolute best value, with the most favorable time-line.

Ouestion Two: I am a member of our ETJ/Annexation committee which includes specialists in real estate development, land ownership and economic development. We are currently reviewing sound processes that will positively impact land owners, many of which are owners of large tracts of property. Each of these properties will make a significant difference in funding our current Village and certainly will greatly contribute to future Village economic growth. Adding properties from the ETJ will enable the Village to continue a modest tax structure which will in fact, enhance the overall fiscal condition of the Village. I fully support the initiative of responsible annexation.

Question Three: I presently Chair the Committee on Village street and road repair. Our five (5) village residents and I have personally and collectively evaluated the entire Village road network structure. Further, we have consulted with proven experts in the areas of road repair and maintenance. We have initiated three types of repair: crack seal (local maintenance), sealcoating (inter-local, Bell County) and reconstruction (Wheeler, APAC contracting).

My view is to leave street committee in place, as they have prepared a practical, affordable plan. Continue with annual contracting services and interlocal agreements with Bell County. Each service has proven to be most effective and cost efficient.



David Williams Question One: It has

the Sewer Bond was approved. We are not where I believe we had hoped to be by now. A plan is only as good as the day you make it. Project management is really about managing change. We have seen a lot of change. Project management is also about risk management. How do we minimize our risk of further delays? One possible way is to break up the overall project into smaller bites. For example, running piping down Main Street, Royal, and Thomas Arnold could be separated from the decision of what Sewer Facility would be best for Salado. While discussions and options over sewer plant construction continue to be addressed, sewer line construction could be under way. Also, designing in optional tie in points in the system would facilitate future options and again reduce risk.

Question One: The greatest challenge in preparing adequately for the potential growth in enrollment of Salado ISD over the next 5 to 10 years is adequately funding the district operations. The greatest tool Salado ISD can possess operationally is quality educators teaching the students. Unfortunately, the teacher pay scale and stipends at Salado ISD are not equivalent to other districts in the area. While the media and other outlets like social media at time degrade teachers worth, we as shareholders must remember teachers are professionals with specialized certifications. To continue the academic success Salado historically enjoys, Salado ISD will need to recruit top talent as the student body population grows over the next 5 - 10Additionally, as years. Salado ISD grows the top talent recruited should be considered for promotion to instructional support and administrative duties to allow professional growth from within a great

Question Two: All campuses are quickly reaching capacity with the projected growth of Salado, which Salado ISD will need more facilities erected or add on classrooms either using portable buildings, or creating new wings on existing structures. Moreover, the facilities for the Arts, Athletics, and Ag facilities are not equal to districts of the same size. For example, Salado is the only school in the currently aligned 4A district without a Fine Arts Performing Arts Center. Addition-

ally, every "home" sport-

ing event is equivalent to an away game, with our high school teams needing to travel to Salado Junior High to practice or compete. Last but not least, just from an aesthetical perspective when you walk by the SJH, SIS, and TAE campus the paint and trim on the building is peeling with paint missing in many areas. TAE: Fair; SIS: Good; SJH: Fair and SHS: Fair



Melanie Kirchmeier Question One: Every month the Salado School Board reviews the enrollment figures at each campus. At the beginning of 2015, we reviewed projected enrollment through year 2027. Dr. Novotny projected the critical year when each campus would outgrow their current facility. Being well informed about the growth of Salado is crucial for planning for Salado ISD. The SISD staff meets regularly with the Village of Salado so the School Board is well informed on growth and projected increase in enrollment. The Board recently approved a strategic planning agreement which will detail many aspects of our school district to include growth projection. Strategic planning is extremely important so we can plan for the next five to ten years in a rational, educated process. I also attend the Village of Salado Aldermen meetings when critical items affecting the school will be discussed.

Question Two: In April of 2014, SHWGroup presented a Facility Condition Assessment that evaluated each campus as well as the auxiliary buildings. While we have an excellent maintenance department at Salado ISD, the needs of each campus differ simply because of the age of the buildings. Salado High School and Intermediate School are our two newest buildings. They have been well maintained and are in good condition. The Jr. High School was built in 1979 and is in fair condition. The elementary rated poor since there are many mechanical systems that need to be upgraded to today standards. They function and have been maintained, however, the life span is reaching their limit. The Ag Facilities are in need of upgrades and since we

have an award winning Ag

Department, it would be wonderful to provide our students the facilities to continue on their successful path. The athletic facilities differ in condition

The district has already begun the process of accessing the current facility conditions and capacities along with staff and curriculum reviews in order to evaluate what will be needed for upcoming requirements. The district is also retaining the services of a consultant group who will very soon begin the process of long range planning. This group is specialized in long range planning and has done so for many districts, large and small. It will be good to have an outside set of eyes and ears who will facilitate meetings with staff, parents, students, and community members over the next several weeks and months with the goal of determining the needs and wishes for the district in order to set a course of

action for the superinten-

dent and board. So, yes, I do believe the district is on the right path to adequately plan for growth.

2. Last year the district received a Facility Condition Assessment report prepared by SHW Group. Facility evaluations were based on "functional operation, age, expected life, appearance, fault and/or failure", interviews with facility administrators, written surveys completed by staff, and site inspections. All that information was compiled along with costs and a "Facility Condition Index" score was calculated. Those scores rated the: Elementary poor; Intermediate - good; Jr high - fair; High school good; Football/track - fair; Baseball - good; Softball good; Arts center - fair; Ag barn - poor; Civic center/ admin - poor; Transportation/maintenance - poor

Also an "educational appropriateness" summary was provided for each facility including current enrollment and capacity, compliance with TEA standards, and facility priorities.

There are many options and scenarios to consider, but as to "what needs to be done" that will hopefully become much clearer after the long range planning is completed as discussed in the answer to question 1.

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

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


Salado Community **Chorus "Spring" Concert set for** April 30

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

Baylor to accept Temple College transfers through agreement

Baylor University and Temple College recently announced the creation of a formal Baylor Bound transfer agreement that will help students transfer more easily between the two institutions and continue to expand educational opportunities for young people all across Texas.

Temple College President Glenda Barron and Baylor President and Chancellor Ken Starr signed the partnership agreement during a ceremony in the Leopard Room at the Pavilion at Temple College.

As one of its goals under the Pro Futuris strategic initiative, Baylor intends to create 10 Baylor Bound partnerships during the next five years. The Baylor-Temple agreement is the fifth partnership, along with McLennan Community College in Waco, Tyler Junior College in Tyler, Blinn College in Brenham and Collin College in McKinney.

The Baylor Bound pro-

gram will serve highly motivated Temple students who, upon meeting the program's criteria, will transfer to Baylor to complete their baccalaureate degrees.

"We at Temple College are excited for the opportunity to enter into this historic partnership with Baylor University for the benefit of our students. Baylor Bound opens the door for Temple College students to seamlessly transfer to Baylor University with the potential for scholarship support. Working together, we will make it possible for TC students to get the higher education they need to be successful in life," Dr. Barron said.

"The remarkably popular Baylor Bound program represents an affordable alternative for many community college students who wish to complete their degree studies at Baylor University," Starr said. "We are grateful to Temple College for entering into this collaborative partnership, which will expand educational access for students both in this community and throughout Central Texas."

The Baylor-Temple agreement helps to solidify a commitment on the part of both institutions to provide an educated and skilled workforce.

Students may declare their intent to transfer to Baylor by submitting the Baylor Bound application prior to enrolling at Temple or while enrolled as a full-time student. Admission to the program will be determined by Baylor's Office of Admission Ser-

Temple students who become part of the Baylor Bound program can choose a plan from 66 majors, all of which are articulated through specific MAPS - or Major Academic Planners – that will assist them as they move toward timely degree completion. More information about these majors and

course transfer equivalency between Baylor and Temple is available at www.baylor.edu/advising/ bbmaps.

Students must be enrolled in an approved A.A. or A.S. academic program leading to an approved Baylor B.B.A., B.A., B.S.W. or B.S. degree and refer to Baylor's Major Academic Planner when planning coursework.

Advisers from both institutions will help students select courses that satisfy program requirements to allow for a successful transition from Temple to full-time status at Baylor. Temple Baylor Bound students also will receive information about scholarships for transfer students and special transfer residential experiences. Also, Temple students will have access to Baylor's libraries via the Interlibrary Loan Agreement as well as special opportunities to visit the Baylor campus and meet with Baylor representatives.



Texas because of its length combined with its driest year at the end of the drought," he notes.

"But as of April 21, about 35 percent of Texas is still in a drought to some extent, and an additional 10 percent of the state is still experiencing abnormally dry conditions."

Altogether, Nielsen-Gammon explains, about 20 percent of Texas is still rated in severe drought or worse. The driest locations are the northern Panhandle to Fort Worth, and a broad swath west of San Antonio.

While conditions have improved in Texas, they have worsened in California, where 46 percent of the state is in exceptional drought, according to U.S. Drought Monitor figures.

"But that's still a far cry from the peak of the drought in Texas, where in October of 2011, about 88 percent of Texas was in exceptional drought," adds Nielsen-Gammon, a native Californian who grew up in the San Francisco area.

California's woes are magnified because it produces 50 percent of the nation's fruits, vegetables and nuts and it remains the No.1 agricultural state in the U.S. with more than 80,000 farms. The state legislature recently ordered cities and towns to reduce their water usage by 25 percent, but California farmers are exempt, even though agriculture accounts for 80 percent of water use in the state.

"Many California farmers had already experienced severe cuts in their water allocations - some have been cut to zero," Nielsen-Gammon notes. State officials fear California's problems will worsen - the state has already lost 20,000 agricultural jobs and that number could double and have a ripple effect across the country.

The Dallas-Fort Worth and Houston areas are experiencing above-normal rainfall since Januarv, as are the Corpus Christi and Midland areas, Nielsen-Gammon notes.

The long-range forecast for more rain is a bit mixed, he says.

"The official outlook from the Climate Prediction Center calls for an El Niño to persist or intensify through next winter, meaning that Texas has a good chance of above normal rainfall again next winter," he points out.

"But first, Texas has to get through the heat of this summer, but even with the heat, there is some good news," Nielsen-Gammon

"The widespread rains this winter and early spring should help keep the ground moist as Texas heads into summer, and that in turn will keep temperatures relatively low. Also, the El Niño conditions should reduce the amount of hurricanes in the Atlantic this season."

As for California, Nielsen-Gammon says the Climate Prediction Center's outlook for that state is not as promising, with California not expected to see much, if any, rainfall enhancement from El Niño over the next year.

"The only good news if you can call it that - is that the dryness in California this past year is at least as much a fluke as Texas's dry 2010-2011," Nielsen-Gammon adds. "It can always happen again, but it probably won't for a good long time."
