Police investigate passing of counterfeit \$100 bill

Salado Police report that on May 6, unknown persons passed a counterfeit \$100 bill at a local business. Police warn businesses to be ever watchful of counterfeit bills when taking large bills.

"At this time in the investigation, we have little information on the suspects who passed the bill but the quality of the bill was poor at best," stated Lt. Bruno Matarazzo.

Salado police contacted the U.S. Secret Service to assist in the investigation.

"We need the help of all businesses in the Salado area to be vigilant when taking large currency," stated Matarazzo.

Numerous counterfeit bills have been passed in the Killeen and Temple area, but Lt. Matarazzo said that the Police department is aware of only one counterfeit bill being passed in Salado.

Lt. Matarazzo states that businesses should not assume the popular markmethod for detecting counterfeit currency. "In fact, it's useless in most counterfeit cases since the paper used is in fact US Currency," Matarazzo said, adding that "the counterfeiter will bleach a \$5 bill and overprint the paper with a \$50 bill or \$100 bill. When you mark it with the pen it reacts to the paper, not what's printed on it."

Matarazzo says a person should check the watermark on the right center of the bill to see if the face is the same as what is printed in ink on the bill.

"In the case I am working, the bill showed Ben Franklin's face printed in ink and Lincoln's face in the watermark," Matarazzo stated.


Bills of \$5 or more also have a magnetic strip embedded in them that will state what the value of the bill is. So if the magnetic strip does not match the amount printed in ink on

the bill, it is most likely counterfeit.

"These are the best ways to check a bill," Matarazzo stated, adding that no special equipment is needed -- "just your eyes and a light shining from the other side.

Matarazzo advises that any business or individual that thinks someone is trying to pass a counterfeit bill should not hesitate to call the police department at 947-5681. "Do not try to apprehend the suspect," Matarazzo stated. "If the suspect passing the bill is a true counterfeiter, he or she understands it's a federal crime and may become violent. Just note as much information as you can safely."

"In most cases a good counterfeit bill may be passed over and over again," Matarazzo said, "without anyone being the wiser until someone checks the bill ... or the bank runs it through the counting machine."

Sales taxes still down

So far, 2007 has not been as good to Salado retail businesses as 2006. In fact, each month this year has showed a decline in sales tax rebates to Salado. May was no different. The sales tax payment to the Village of Salado was three percent less this month than last May, down from \$33,662.76 last year to \$32,599.69.

For the year, The Village is trailing 2006 by almost five percent, having received \$141,429.81 through May, compared to \$148,437.71 through May 2006.

This downward movement bucks the trend set by the state, county and other cities in the county.

Belton, Harker Heights, Killeen and Temple all saw increases in their May sales tax rebates from five percent to more than 23 percent. Nolanville, however, suffered a remarkable 16 percent decline in sales tax rebates for May.

Bell County received a check for \$1.2 million, which is 17 percent more than than last May's \$1 million payment. For the year, the County is almost 10 percent ahead, with \$5.5 million received compared to \$5 million through May 2006.

Salado Library District is also running ahead of last year. The District received a check for \$23,053.15, which is four percent more than last May's \$22,102.11 payment. For the year, the Library District is two percent ahead, having received \$100,256.64, compared to \$97,802.57 through May 2006.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said local governments will receive \$542.5 million in May sales tax allocations, up 8.1 percent compared to May 2006.

Voters return incumbents

Salado voters returned incumbents to the Salado Independent School District (SISD) Board of Trustees, Village of Salado Board of Aldermen and Salado Public Library District Board of Directors with a high turnout on May 12.

Voters returned Chris Seaton to the SISD Board of Trustees, his second cast ballots in the Board three-vear term. Voters also elected Darrell Street to a three-year term on the board, his second time to be elected to the board.

Of the 1,116 ballots cast, Street had 701 votes, while Seaton had 540 votes. Michael McDougal had 479 votes and Tom Gidley had 383 votes.

In early voting, Street

had 411, Seaton had 314, McDougal had 301 and Gidley had 238.

In the Board of Aldermen race, voters returned Merle Stalcup and Curt Strong to two-year terms, the second term for both Aldermen. Voters also elected Forrest Holloway to the board.

A total of 661 voters of Aldermen election. Of that, Holloway received 425 votes, Stalcup received 368 and Strong received 305. David Apichino received 262 votes and Stephen Peters received 168 votes.


In early voting, Holloway received 276 votes, Stalcup received 240 votes, Strong received 190

votes, Apichino 163 and Peters 115. In early voting, 416 voters cast ballots and 245 cast ballots on election day.

Patty Campbell and Susan Krals were returned to their second two-year terms on the Library Board of Directors. Campbell received a total of 671 votes while Krals received 466. Taylor Willingham had 435 votes and Thad Willson had 145 votes.

In early voting, Campbell had 408 votes, Susan Krals 284 votes, Willingham 268 votes and Willson 102 votes. A total of 667 cast ballots in early voting.

Overall 1,116 cast ballots in the Library elec-

Paranoia and the U.S. Attorney controversy


In "A Beautiful Mind," her bestselling biography of mathematician John Nash, Sylvia Nasar describes the process whereby he went mad. He spun coincidences and unrelated incidents into a pattern utterly detached from reality.

Nash's example suggests that if Attorney General Alberto Gonzales is at risk of losing his job in the flap over the firings of U.S. attorneys, New York Sen. Chuck Schumer might be at risk of losing his mind. He and his fellow Democrats leap from one hypothesis of wrongdoing to another, all in the service of their grand paranoid theory: that Karl Rove orchestrated the firings for nefarious reasons yet to be determined.

Former Secretary of Defense Don Rumsfeld liked to say that the absence of evidence isn't evidence of absence. Democrats have a simpler axiom in the U.S. attorneys case -- the absence of evidence is evidence. With every Justice Department document drop that shows no evidence of anything illegal or unethical, Democrats seem more convinced that there is a cover-up of some ill-defined wrongdoing.

Last month, Schumer was on TV -when is he not? -- saying that the firing of Carol Lam, the U.S. attorney for the Southern District of California, was the "most notorious" of the eight firings. Lam had prosecuted corrupt Republican Rep. Randy "Duke" Cunningham, who now is in jail. Schumer said that it was known Lam was going to prosecute more Republicans, so the Justice Department shut her down.

Put aside for the moment that the firing of a U.S. attorney alone won't shut down a particular corruption prosecution, which will be carried on by career prosecutors. As *National Review* reporter Byron York relates, in all the thousands of e-mails released by the Justice Department, there is no mention of Cunningham in connec-



tion to Lam, and the concerns about her performance centered on lax immigration prosecutions, which pre-dated the Cunningham case.

So much for the "most notorious" firing. Schumer has shifted of late to saying that the shifting explanations of the firings by Gonzales imply that he is "hiding something." From what we know of Gonzales' incompetent operation at the Justice Department, however, we can be certain that if he were actually trying to hide something, he would have revealed it by now

The U.S. attorneys inherently are political positions. They serve at the pleasure of the president and often are recommended by senators. This obviously doesn't mean that they should be partisan in their administration of justice, but they must share the administration's law-enforcement agenda. The most troubling firing is that of New Mexico U.S. Attorney David Iglesias, whom Republican Sen. Pete Domenici complained prior to the election wasn't pursuing a corruption case against Democrats quickly enough. If his termination was for explicitly partisan reasons, that would be inappropriate, but a senator complaining about a U.S. attorney is not in itself a scandal.

Whatever the wrongdoing is supposed to be at this particular moment in the U.S. attorney controversy, it no doubt will change. As he maneuvers to keep the story alive, let's just hope Chuck Schumer keeps his hold on reality.

Is SB889 another chink in government openness? 90 day gas tax cut plan could vanish thanks to price hikes

Texans would be well-advised to keep an eye on Senate Bill 889 by Jeff Wentworth (R-San Antonio), which sailed through the upper house (30-1) on April 18 and is awaiting action in the House State Affairs Committee. This seemingly innocent measure would (if passed) allow State agencies, our entire criminal justice system, all governmental subdivisions including counties, cities, school districts, and the myriad of other taxing districts (water, hospital, library, college, etc), to curtail the number of records a citizen may "freely" examine relating to the operation of these units of govern-

SB889 would permit these political entities to weaken a "treasured" open government right - through the onerous practice of charging citizens to read any State document, after the first 100 pages.

Today's open record laws require governmental agencies to provide, for perusal, all requested documents free of charge. Printed copies of these records are charged at a "per page" rate determined by the Attorney General

These current procedures are provided for in the Texas Public Information Act of 1973 which is our State's follow-up version of the 1966 federal Freedom of Information Act.

SB889 FRAUGHT WITH DANGER

At first glance SB889 appears innocuous, but think about it for a moment. What if you, as a citizen, learned that the State was planning to initiate a major change (by law or edict) affecting you, your business, your family, or your home? And let's further suppose it's essential you look at a variety of related state documents - until you find the ones needed to protect yourself. You would naturally go to the appropriate agency and ask to "look at" all records dealing with the matter.

A relatively short (free-visual) review would reveal what records will assist you. Next step would be to request copies of the pertinent documents, which (by law) would be provided at the going rate per page. That's how the system works today.

Those procedures are certainly in line with your rights as a citizen - especially if you believe in the principle that "open record laws sustain open government."

We should also remember that most state records are lengthy. Especially voluminous are court records and public hearings - so the first 100 page "free look" is laughable, when it comes to examining government paperwork.

SENATOR WENTWORTH'S RESPONSE

Senator Wentworth's aide Katie Henry told this column that the Senator's bill was intended to keep local jurisdictions from being "harassed with demands, by unhappy patrons, for thousands of pages of documentation for visual review - all having to be provided free-of-charge, and in a timely manner, at high cost of personnel time and effort."

NEWSPAPER GROUPS OPPOSE S889

The Texas Press Association which includes the Texas Daily Newspaper Association and most of the state's weeklies, is officially on record opposing SB889. The TPA indicated there are a variety of "unintended consequences" associated with such a

measure. Included would be the "chilling effect" placed on citizens with this "pay to look" contrivance.

One major key to keeping Democracy strong (and open) is a citizen's right to peer into the sometimes murky depths within our government's multilayered structure. A right that keeps bright lights shining on the machinations of elected and appointed officials.

"Open record" statutes help keep these Pooh-Bahs honest, knowing the public is watching their moves - and "checking" their recorded "minutes" that documents both written and oral deliberations and decisions.

POLITICIANS AND THE MEDIA

There is little question that most inquiries into the public record of state government comes from the media. One might hazard a guess that the near-unanimous vote on SB889 is also indicative of the generally negative attitude politicians have towards the media, although few would confess to that charge.

However, the GOP (in particular) has attached "liberal" to the "media" for so long that it's become one word, indicating displeasure towards all but "their own" fourth estate bewailers.

CONSPIRACY ADVOCATES

"Conspiracy advocates" also hopped on SB889 and fired a finger of dismay at those who would slow down free and open access to public records (as SB889 does to a degree). "What's next?" they hollered, "Will we soon be excluded from public hearings, board meetings, and will secrecy become the 'fait accompli' among those in government who really don't trust the public with anything other than paying taxes?"

This column doesn't subscribe to the notion that SB889 fits into the total "conspiracy" category, but anything that hampers "open government" in any way, should be exposed and excised!

Charging a fee to "look" at a public record - is a step in the wrong direction, if we wish to keep government open and accessible to those it serves.

* * * * * STATE GAS TAX CUT

The Texas Legislature, with between \$8-14 billion left over after they approve the next biennial budget, is about to do something "helpful" for a change. They have a bill ready for conference study that would drop the 20-cents-per-gallon State gasoline tax for most of the summer driving season.

Dealers would be required to pass this along or face misdemeanor penalties, including paying back any excess money they collect. The \$700 million loss to transportation and public education funds, as a result of the 90 day gas tax cut, would be replaced from the State's surplus.

Our Prediction? If past predilections of oil companies and their dealers are any guide, the 20-cent break will be swallowed up by rapid gas-price hikes. The reduction will vanish and our temporary "happy" (translation - "cheaper") motoring will be enjoyed for only a few days - at best.

Hope we're wrong - but this is too good a deal for the greedy to skip - and a \$700 million dollar up-for-grabs profit is like the politician's speciality: "If he isn't kissing babies - he's stealing their lollipops."

I wrote the following letter to Mr. Henry R. Richardson, Jr.; P.E., Texas Department of Transportation; 100 South Loop Drive; Waco, Texas 76704-2858 concerning the expansion of Interstate 35 through Salado. It is important that all Saladoans give input to TXDOT on this important matter.

Dear Mr. Richardson:

I am writing to you regarding my concerns over the proposed encroachment of Salado's Historic District east of the widening of I-35, scheduled to begin in 2008 with acquisition of additional right of way.

Your published maps, showing an overlay of widenings involving access roads are, first of all, hard to read. I did my best! Correct me if I am wrong, but it appears that contrary to what we learned from TXDOT at hearings in 2001 and 2003, you are proposing an additional 70 feet on the east through Salado, in part to protect the historic Robertson Ranch on the west.

Your revised plan not only encroaches upon a DOZEN or more properties and sites listed in the National Register of Historic Places, as opposed to the one marker at the Robertson Ranch, which is well to the west of the interstate, your plan affects the fragile Historic District with additional highway noise and signage

Our Historic District, centered along Main Street (the old Highway 80), is already a stone's throw from Interstate 35. Any additional encroachment, even just the additional noise of trucks and automobiles, affects the ambience of a village whose economic lifeblood is its historic and peaceful nature. People from all over Texas come to Salado to spend some quiet time in a beautiful and historic place near Salado Creek. There are at least 18 properties and

sites here listed in the National Register of Historic Places, only one of which is on the west side of I-35--the Robertson Ranch, which is well to the west of the Interstate.

Our economy is driven by the special, historic ambience of our village. Please don't take that away from us by another encroachment into our fragile Historic District. Very respectfully,

More inconvenient truths

Fiscal irresponsibility is largest threat facing American government

Shortchanging out Hurricane Watch Center



With Iraq, Hurricane Katrina, and the Walter Reed hospital scandal - maybe you thought that the incompetence of the White House had bottomed out.

What we have here is another example of incompetence and callousness. Maybe if a Category 5 storm threatened Washington, we'd get our satel-





Village returns to western roots for Heritage celebration

The cowboys are tall and dark – the strong, silent type. Their finery will be provided by local artists and artisans, and visitors are invited to stroll among them and pick out a favorite.

In celebration of the heritage of the Village, and in recognition of its resident artists, the Salado Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring an Artist in Action event. Beginning June 1 over a dozen six foot tall metal cowboy silhouettes will be placed along Salado's Main Street. Throughout the first two weekends of June, local artists and artisans will be applying their skills and talents to decorate these figures with their artistic

visions. Some will use paints, others clothing or trinkets, yet another plans to apply wood veneer to the figure. There may even be one that visitors will be encouraged to decorate.

"It should be fun to see what each artist does to embellish these figures, converting a common article into a work of art," said event organizer, Robert Pascoe. "Just as there are various styles of painting, we anticipate each interpretation to be unique; some intriguing, some confusing, some radical, and others thought-provoking."

The figures will be on display throughout the Salado business district from June through August. Prizes will be awarded for most original, most unusual artistic medium, and most popular. All of

the completed works of art will be auctioned off Labor Day weekend.

Whether visitors come to watch the cowboys get dressed up in early June or choose to meander among the resulting artworks throughout the summer months, they will have a chance to vote for a favorite.

Pascoe described what he sees as the value of silhouettes, saying, "Monetarily, they are not worth much, as they were provided wholesale by a local merchant. However, they add value to the community in several ways. First, they will provide a festive, colorful flare to the Village. Next, they will complement the three events planned by the Chamber for this summer; Salado Heritage Days to be held the weekend of June 16, Old Glory Days to be held the weekend of July 20, and Art in the Park held the first weekend of August."

Visitors to town may use a self-guided tour of the Village to see various interpretations of the single theme, and to vote for their favorite. Pascoe added, "We're creating a venue to get visitors to come to town and stroll through our business district."

This project idea was supported by Salado's tourism consultants, Des-Development, tination during a town hall meeting on May 5, Pascoe pointed out. They noted that it fit nicely with the artist in action brand being considered, added life and color to the village. and provided a destination event to Salado's schedule. They also noted that these figures provided visitors with an activity that is available all of the time, Pascoe continued.

"Our long range plan is to repeat this event every quarter using a new 'canvas'," said Pascoe. "This will keep people coming back to the village to see what we're up to." Discussions are already underway for the fall theme, with locally-crafted scarecrows a strong leader, he noted.

cost-cutting techniques that reduce overall quality. He compares the solid wood and traditional joinery he uses to the chipboard, fake wood grain, and mechanical fasteners found in store-bought pieces. "With traditional building techniques, a custom piece will last for generations," Pascoe says.

There are other advantages to a custom-built piece. Pascoe can size a project to your specification and finish it to blend with your existing decor "I have one customer who loved the style of a table from a well-known furniture store, but wanted it 8 inches wider and a darker color. With the store, it's what you see is what you get. I was able to match both the style and customer's requirements." In many cases, Pascoe is even able to beat






Well, here is a motto to live by: If it looks too good to be true, it probably is! Save your mon-





On May 21 a celebration event is planned for parents, students and mentors, 11:30 a.m. at Pace Park, and will include hot dogs, clowns and facepainting.







to abandon the normal way to play a suit. One of the most important reasons for this is to try to prevent a particular defender from gaining the lead.

Special circumstances

sometimes force declarer

Examine this case where West leads the diamond king against four hearts. When dummy comes down, South sees there are two possible losers in spades, two more in trumps and another in diamonds. If he loses all of them, he goes down two.

On the more positive side, however, declarer notes that he is far more likely to lose one trump trick than two. Furthermore, if everything goes well, he may also be able to discard a loser or two on dummy's clubs.

The problem for South from the start is to try to keep the defenders from scoring four tricks before he can take 10. To this end, he must find a way to stop East from gaining the lead and returning a spade through the king.

Accordingly, declarer ducks West's king of diamonds at trick one to prevent him from later putting East on lead with a diamond. After West exits with a diamond to dummy's ace, South's next concern is how to tackle the trumps.

Ordinarily, with this trump combination, declarer might play the ace and another heart. But here, given the circumstances, there is too much danger that East might gain the lead with the king. At trick three, therefore, declarer leads dummy's trump seven and lets it ride after East plays low.

West wins with the jack but is helpless. Whatever he returns, South picks up East's king on the next trump lead and easily makes the contract. In fact, if West does not cash his ace of spades after scoring the trump jack, declarer finishes with an overtrick. (c)2007 King Features Synd.,





The glory days of La Macarena

La Macarena is a popular restaurant and bar in Villa Acuna, just across the border from Del Rio. Jorge Ramon has the place now. His dad founded it in the late '30s and it has been in the family ever since.

"We've been fortunate to have had several U.S. Presidents visit us here on the patio," says Jorge. "Lyndon Johnson used to come here after he was out of office. He loved cabrito. Presidents Eisenhower and Nixon also were here."

When the movie, *The Alamo*, was filmed at Brackettville, John Wayne and the whole crew used to visit La Macarena on a daily basis.

"I got to take John Wayne to the dentist one day," says Jorge. "He had a bad toothache and my brother-in-law was a dentist. His office was just half a block from here, so we walked down there. John Wayne was having

lots of pain. I just couldn't help but admire how big the man was. I waited in the lobby there just outside the dentist office and I heard John Wayne cry and scream. I thought, what a sissy. He came out holding his jaw and we walked back to La Macarena. He drank a bottle of tequila and forgot all about his tooth."

La Macarena used to have a bullring. Bullfighting fans would sit on the patio, visit and drink, then go to the bullfights and return to the patio and drink some more. People from all over west Texas made special trips to see the bullfights in Villa Acuna. Jorge's dad, a Carta Blan-

ca distributor, advertised the bullfights in a unique

"He would put the whole city band on the back of the truck and go to Del Rio before the bullfights and just go play down the streets of Del Rio, which was a small town then."

The bullfights took place the first Sunday of each month from April to November. Bullfighting went into decline in the 1970s.

"That's when animal rights started getting very strong. People just wouldn't come because of that. People started losing interest and the crowd that used to come started getting a little older and

the younger generation just didn't care for it. We took the bullring down in 1977"

Jorge is active in chambers of commerce in both Acuna and Del Rio. He helps stage the Running of the Cows event in Acuna each April. People run in front of cows around a downtown square.

There is a parking lot where the bullring used to be. It sometimes is filled with cars because Jorge is keeping up with the times.

"We still have our patio and we have a little band on weekends. We keep our bar open daily. Next to the parking lot we have a little slot machine business and we're getting ready to start building an events facility so we can offer meetings and everything. We're going to put some rooms up on top."
