PALS leads effort for Cultural District designation for Village; Deadline is June 1

From Sirena to Salado Legends to the Sculpture Garden to artists working in many media, Salado has been a home to the arts and to artists.

Public Arts League of Salado is working to apply through the TCA Cultural District program to designate much of the downtown and historic district as a Cultural District.

The program is not a grant program, but a designation program with an annual deadline of June 1.

PALS is sponsoring a meeting to garner support for the Cultural District at 5 p.m. May 26 at the Village of Salado Visitors Center. The meeting is open to the public.

The Cultural District designation may help Salado in securing arts and restoration grants. PALS secured a matching grant from TCA to bring Blue Lapis Light to Salado for

performances in July 2014 and in April.

The Cultural District designation will also help with marketing Salado as an arts and culture destination. Just two dozen districts have been designated by TCA and Salado would be the smallest community to receive such a distinc-

This will be the second time that Salado has applied for the designation. PALS led an unsuccessful effort last year.

Among the communities that have received the designation are these: Abilene, Alpine, Austin, Bastrop, Clifton, Dallas, Denison, El Paso, Fort Worth, Galveston, Georgetown, Houston (four districts), Hunstville, McAllen, Rosenberg, San Angelo, San Antonio, San Elizario, Smithville and Winnsboro.

SISD trustees change class ranking policy

Salado school trustees adopted at their May 18 regular meeting a change to its local policy governing Class Ranking as well as its local policy governing Transfer Students.

The board adopted the change to Local Policy EIC: Academic Achievement: Class Ranking on a 5-0 vote. Board president Kim Bird vacated the room before and throughout the discussion of and vote on the policy change.

The proposed change recommended by Salado ISD Administration strikes the following sentence from the section on Early Graduates: "An early graduate shall be ranked with the class in which he or she graduates and shall be eligible for all local honors."

That sentence is replaced in the new policy, which immediately goes into effect, with this sentence: "Early Graduates: The student's rank in class shall be computed with that year's graduat-

ing class. An early graduate shall not be eligible for valedictorian or salutatorian honors but shall be allowed to tie in rank with a four-year graduate. An early graduate shall not be allowed to displace a fouryear graduate."

The policy also lays out the requirements for valedictorian and salutatorian as these:

1. "Have been continuously enrolled in the District high school for the four semesters immediately preceding graduation, with enrollment no later than the 10th school day of the fall semester of the

student's junior." 2. "Completed the Recommended Program, the Advanced/Distinguished Achievement Program, of the foundation program with the distinguished level of achievement.

And the new requirement adopted by trustees: 3. "Be graduating after exactly four years of enrollment of high school."

The policy change is one that Dr. Novotny recommended after reviewing the policies of 200 other school districts. In a high school credit or essence, it holds harmless the four-year students who may not have had the same opportunity to take as many Pre-AP or AP courses as students who graduate early.

The changes in offerings and the changes in the weights assigned to advanced credit courses by the school district has resulted in some unforeseen inequities that may affect class rankings and honor graduates.

Those inequities include these:

Current juniors did not get to take Pre-AP World Geography, but sophomores were able to take the Pre-AP World Geography. This class has an additional 10 points of weight.

A second inequity was an eighth grade elective technology class that counted toward high school credit and toward the student's GPA. That class was a regular class and could actually lower a student's GPA because it was not considered advanced credit. The class is no longer counted toward

GPA for the current eight grade students.

A third inequity is that prior to two years ago, any advanced credit course, whether it was Pre-AP, AP or dual credit, counted an additional 10 percent toward the student's GPA.

Two years ago, the district revised those weights so that Pre-AP counts an additional 10 points, dual credit is an additional 15 points and AP course is an additional 20 points if the student takes the AP test. If the student does not take the AP test, the weight of

the AP class is 15 points. Current juniors only got 10 percent weight added for the Pre-AP courses they may have taken as freshmen. A sophomore who graduates ahead of his class may have added weight for the Pre-AP courses taken their freshman year.

Other inequities may spring up because of the course offerings from year to year, according to Dr. Novotny. For example, AP Statistics was not offered this year because, but was offered the previous year. This year, AP Biology was offered, but is not going to be offered next year. Because of these situations, an early graduate student might have an opportunity at more AP classes than a four-year student.

Also, if new AP courses are added, younger students might be able to take AP classes that an older student does not have the opportunity to take.

The policy does not affect the class standings this year, as there are no early graduates for the Class of 2015.

The change gives any student who is considering graduating early next year and further on the information they need regarding class ranking and that early graduates will not be considered for Valedictory and Salutatory designations in time enough to shape those decisions, according to Dr. Novotny.

For those students who do graduate early, their rankings will be with the graduating class that year in a co-rank, which is important for students trying to achieve the top 10 percent rankings required by state university's.

Jeff Kelly gave the motion, which received a second from Darrell Street.

In other business, the oard also amended its Transfer Policy by striking one sentence from it. Under the old policy, if a student transferred out of Salado they would be allowed to remain an SISD student until the end of the semester in which they transferred without going through the transfer process. The new policy will require students who move out of SISD to apply to be accepted as a transfer student as soon as they move, rather than waiting until the end of the semester.

The district considers the following criteria in approving transfer students: "availability of space and instructional staff, the student's disciplinary history, the student's attendance records, and the student's academic records, including, but not limited to, course grades and state-mandated assessment scores."

Salado Cemetery Association will again host the annual Memorial Day Service at 9:30 a.m. May 25 at the Historic Salado Cemetery on Baines St.

"Everyone is invited to honor our veterans on this special day and pay tribute to their service to our country," said Bill Kinnison, Salado Cemetery Association board member.

The purpose of the Memorial Day ceremony is to remember the veterans buried not just in Salado Cemetery but in all of the Salado-area cemeteries, including family and church cemeteries, by a roll call of their names. All veteran's grave sites

will have flags placed on their graves. The veterans are from the Texas Revolutionary War, Early Day Rangers, Home Guard, Indian Wars, Mexican War, Confederate and Union Armies, WWI and II, Korean War, Vietnam War, and from peace time service.

The Memorial Day ceremony will consist of: the Bell County Sherriff's Posse presenting the colors; honors to each of the armed services; a Commemorative Air Force flyover; and a brass ensemble lead by Clayton Capps playing music for the program. Keifer Marshall, as WW II veteran, is scheduled to give Memorial Day remarks. LTC (Ret) Stephen Peters, Cemetery Board Treasurer, will read the roll call of veterans' names this year. Taps will be played at the conclusion of the ceremony.

Light refreshments will be served following the closing of the Memorial Day ceremony. Seating will be provided by the Village of Salado, but the number of seats is limited, guests are encouraged to bring lawn chairs, also umbrellas, as tradition has it, the event is held outside in spite of sun or rain.

"We hope to see you at the Memorial Day ceremony," Kinnison said.



White Grub Damage

LYLE ZOELLER TEXAS A&M AGRILIFE EXTENSION

Above ground we know them as that harbinger of summer, the ever present and all too numerous June beetle (or Junebugs). Below ground we know them as a white grub or grub worm, the larval stage of the coming beetle. Texas is home to almost 100 species of beetles, but the most damaging to turf grass are the June beetle Phyllophaga crinite and southern masked chafer, Cyclocephala lurida.

Warm season grasses such as bermudagrass, zoysiagrass, St. Augustine grass and buffalograss are very susceptible to white grub damage, although cool season grasses such as fescue, bluegrass and ryegrass may also be attacked. Damage from white grubs in Texas can occur anytime between June and October, depending on the region, during the three larval life-states, or instars of the life cycle of the adult beetle.

Apart from size, there is little physical difference in the three instars of the larval development, all being creamy white and C-shaped. The first two larval instars require about three weeks each to complete development and the third instar actively feeds until cool weather arrives. It is this third stage which is responsible for most turfgrass damage. At this stage it is a large grub (1/2 to 1 inch long) with a voracious appetite. Large groups of thirdinstar white grubs can quickly destroy turfgrass root systems resulting in significant loss of turf vigor and susceptibility to drying out, especially in hot weather.

You should suspect white grub damage if you see irregular shaped areas of turf which appear less vigorous or dead or dying. In our area, this damage will typically appear in the summer months, beginning in June. If the damaged area of your lawn can be easily pulled from the soil due to lack of root structure, you should suspect white grubs as a possible culprit and take steps to confirm your suspicions.

Examine several soil sections of at least 3 to 4 inches across and 4 inches deep (take deeper samples in sandy soils). A good rule of thumb is to take several soil plugs from diverse areas of the lawn (up to one square foot per 1000 square feet of turf). Do include areas at the edges of suspected grub damage. Five or more grubs per square foot justify treatment and the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension system recommends several researchproven controls, both non-chemical and chemi-

Recommended chemical controls include the use of beneficial nematodes within the genera Steinemema and Heterorhabditis. Nematodes are microscopic worms that attack white grubs and other soil inhabiting insects. Purchase commercial nematode products through garden supply catalogs or at retail garden

supply outlets. This product must be applied through a hose-end or hand-held spray to thoroughly mix the nematodes with water. The water is necessary for the nematodes to be able to travel down through the soil to reach the grubs. Apply at least ¼ inch of water to the turf before application of the nematodes and ¼ inch of additional water after application for maximum effect. Recent research has shown that under good conditions, commerciallyavailable nematodes are capable of reducing white grub populations by 50 percent or more.

For white grub worm control via application of the newer chemical insecticides which are more persistent and less toxic to beneficial arthropods and earthworms, proper timing is critical.

One of these products, the insecticide imidacloprid (Active Ingredient) is effective against small and medium-sized grubs and may kill some grubs larger than ½ inch long. However, the insect growth regulator halofenzozide (Active Ingredient) is lethal only if applied to the early growth stages (instars 1 and 2, e.g. 3-6 weeks after the eggs hatch.

Fortunately, both halofenzozide and imidacloprid may be applied early and remain persistent in the soil. Adult beetles emerge and mate in late spring or early summer. The females return to the soil at depths of 2 to 5 inches following flight

periods which may last for several weeks and can lay up to 30 or 40 eggs. Therefore, in Central Texas, the best treatment time if utilizing either halofenzozide or imidacloprid products to prevent the emergence of the third-instar stage of the white grub is early to mid-July.

If grub damage is already present, use products containing trichlorfon or carbaryl. Products containing pyrethroid insecticides (such as permethrin, esfenvalerate, cyfluthrin and bifenthrin), bind to soil particles and remain close to the surface, even after irrigation, so are less effective against white grubs, especially in clay

Two or more applications may be needed if soil conditions are unfavorable, e.g. difficult to penetrate. Dry soils will benefit from pre-watering the area to be treated. Apply ¼ to ½ inch of water the day before treatment to improve soil penetration of the product and to encourage the grubs to come closer to the soil surface where they will come in contact with the product. Likewise, avoid application to soil that is too wet as this can result in equally poor penetration as well as run-off and loss of product.

When the soil condition is right, post-treatment irrigation is essential following the application of any grub control product in order to assure the insecticides reach the root zone and the grubs. Immediately apply ½ to 1 inch of water following application of any liquid formulations. Granular products should be watered into the soil within 24 hours of application to minimize the product's exposure to people, pets and wildlife. Use a rain gauge or straight-sided can to confirm the proper volume of irrigation applied.

Always keep environconsiderations in mind when using any insecticide product and always follow all label instructions. Most insecticides are indiscriminate and can have detrimental effects on beneficial organisms such as earthworms. For this reason and because unnecessary insecticide applications can increase the risk of insecticide resistance, routine "preventative" applications of insecticidal products is not recommended for white grub control. Keep in mind that some

insecticides can be toxic to birds and other wildlife. In addition to reading and following label directions, please read all precautionary statements pertaining to potential environmental hazards. Apply only at recommended rates, avoid use near streams and ponds and irrigate treatments promptly to reduce the risk to non-target organisms. Do not dispose of leftover pesticides in sewer or storm water drains as this can result in toxicity to fish and other aquatic organisms.


