Salado High School has named the top two graduates for the Class of 2007. They are Valedictorian Crystal Schoellmann and Salutatorian Molly Rooney.

Crystal Schoellman has been named Valedictorian for Salado High School's graduating class of 2006-

Schoellman will graduate with a 103.05 grade point average.

An attendee of Salado schools since the fifth grade, Crystal is the daughter of Rosanna and Matthew Schoellman.

During her time at Salado, Schoellman stayed busy both with academics and extra curricular activities. She participated in Salado's state championship UIL academic teams for all four years of high school. She recently placed second in State in Prose Interpretation, and finished first place in that category on the district level in her junior and senior years.

In addition, Schoellman was a seven-year member of the Salado band, where she played the clarinet. She also participated in the UMHB Conservatory

Memorial Day Service at planned Salado Cemetery

Friends of Salado Cemetery Association will host the annual Memorial Day Service at the historic Salado Cemetery on Baines St., beginning at 9:30 a.m. May 28. Area residents and visitors are invite to attend the service to join in horoning of veterans of nine different wars who are buried in Salado Cemetery.

What we know as Memorial Day was originally known as Decoration Day. Down through the years, there have been several cities and towns which have taken credit for celebrating the beginning of this memorable gathering. One of these stories is that a gentleman named Henry Wells, who owned a drug store in Waterloo, New York came up with the idea. He suggested that all the shops in town close for one day to honor the soldiers who were killed in teh Civil War and who

were buried in the local cemetery.

On the morning of May 5, 1866, the townspeople placed flowers, wreaths and cross on the graves of the Northern soldiers in the cemetery. There are also reports that women's groups in the south were decorating graves before the end of the Civil War. It has been difficult to prove conclusively who originated the practice. Many believe that there were numerous beginnings in different towns where people came together to honor the soldiers killed in the Civil

Decoration Day was officialy proclained on May 5, 1868 by General John Logan, National Commander of the GRand Army of the Republic, in his General Order Number 11, which reads in part: "The 30th of May, 1868 is designated for the purpose of strewing flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in the defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village or hamlet churchyard in the land. In this observance, no form of ceremony is prescribed but posts and comrades will in their own way arrange such fitting services and testimonials of respect as circumstances may permit." In the Northern states, the 30th of May was observed as Decoration Day, while the Southern states commemorated their war dead on different days. Some of the Southern state still follow this practice.

The name of Decoration Day was changed to Memorial Day in 1882 and soldiers who had died while serving their country prior to the Civil War were also honored. Memorial Day was designated as a public holiday in most states.

President Richard Nixon declared Memorial Day to become a federal holiday to be observed on the

last Monday in May under the National Holiday Act of 1971.

Since the National Holiday Act of 1971, the traditional observance of Memorial Day has diminished. Many Americans have forgotten the meaning and traditions of Memorial Day. At many cemeteries, the graves of the fallen veterans are increasingly ignored and neglected. Many people no longer remember proper flag etiquette for the day.

Some believe that Memorial Day was intended for honoring all the deceased buried in a particular cemetery, not just for those who died while serving their country. The National Commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars stated in his 2002 Memorial Day address: "Changing the meeting date of Memorial Day in the National Holiday Act of 1971 merely to create a three-day weekend has undermined the meaning of the day. No doubt this has

contributed to the nonchalant observance of Memorial Day." There have been efforts to change the date back to May 30 but have a local Boy Scout troop. been unsuccessful.

Friends of Salado Cemetery Association chose to meet on the last Monday because many people had a holiday from their work on this date. The very first Memorial Day was celebrated at the Salado Cemetery on a Saturday. Many volunteers in the Salado area have worked together to have a successful and meaningful service. Flags are placed on the grave of every veteran buried in the cemetery by The Association usually has soldiers from Ft. Hood participate in the service. Area residents are encouraged to attend.

The Great Clinton/Obama Feminist Pander


The front-runners in the Democratic presidential race have discovered the power of an idea whose time has passed: socialism in women's wages. Its power is in pandering to feminist voters, and its time passed because it never made any sense even when it was a bright, shiny new bad idea some 30 years ago.

It deserved its place on the junk heap, given that women have been improving their place in our economy without far-reaching governmental intervention. Nonetheless, Hillary Clinton has renewed her push for her Paycheck Fairness Act, and Sen. Barack Obama has endorsed the Fair Pay Act. Whenever the word "fair" features so prominently in Democratic legislation, the odds are that it is economically illiterate, and this legislation doesn't disappoint.

Discrimination against women is already illegal and employers have to give women equal pay for equal work. What Clinton and Obama want to establish is the more nebulous concept of "comparable worth," or equal pay for different work in female- and male-dominated pro-

This intervention is supposedly so urgent because women make only 77 percent of what men do. Feminists believe that this wage gap is caused by The Man -- and that's not just a metaphor: He's really a man -- who carefully sets women's wages to keep them below that of members of the patriarchy in good stand-

Never mind that the 77 percent figure is, in the words of Hudson Institute economist Diana Furchtgott-Roth, "flawed and bogus," failing to account for the most basic variables. The figure for men and women who work 40 hours a week is 88 percent. Baruch College economist June O'Neill finds -- adjusting for factors like schooling, lifetime work experience and workplace characteristics -- that the gap



almost disappears, with women making 95 percent of men's wages.

Different pay for different professions persists, of course. Nurses aides (89 percent female) have more education than truck drivers (97 percent male), but their median earnings are just 57 percent that of truck drivers. This isn't discrimination, but a reflection that driving cross-country is unpleasant work. Women tend not to want to do it.

That kind of choice is a key factor in the male-female wage differential. Average earnings for male physicians are \$170,000, for female physicians \$100,000. Bias? No, as Furchtgott-Roth has noted, "many women choose to go into pediatrics, psychiatry and family practice, all lower-paying fields than surgery, which is more demanding in terms of hours."

Many women choose professions that are compatible with having kids, and when they have children, tend to take a break from their careers (whereas men actually work more). Economist O'Neill writes, "Women continue to work part time more than men and to choose work situations such as work in nonprofit institutions and occupations that more easily can be accommodated with home respon-

Hillary Clinton and Barack Obama ight wish this fact weren't so, but there's banshee (Dewhurst scolded the smolno way for them to legislate it out of existence, even with a very bad, dated idea.

Senate ruse and House insurgency mark final tempestuous days as session nears May 28 "sine die"

The "Day of Reckoning" for the 80th Legislative Session is at hand and within the next few weeks, report cards for the 181 members of the House and Senate will be made public, along with those issued to Governor ("Landslide") Perry, and Lt. Governor David

Meanwhile, House Speaker Tom Craddick is spending the remaining session-days manning the barricades against an insurgency created by what Craddick loyalists term "an unruly gang of traitorous" fellow Republicans, led by longtime friend and topgun Jim Keffer (R-Eastland).

The rebellion, the second one this session, includes a near-majority of the 150 member lower house (divided between 69 Demos and 81 Repubs), who want old Tom's scalp (and his speaker's gavel) "now" rather than waiting for the usual arm-twisting "pledge" card fiasco that traditionally accompanies the end of a session.

We suspect the current insurrection will fade and Craddick will then demand (and probably receive) one final term as Speaker (for a total of four) in exchange for promising to "play nice" during the interim period and the 2009 session.

LT. GUV'S TOUGH DAY IN SENATE

Speaker Craddick was not the only legislative leader having problems last week. Across the Rotunda, on the day before the lower house uprising, Lt. Governor David Dewhurst tried to "finesse" the Democratic faction within his "restive gang of 31" by calling for a fast, non-agenda vote, in order to bring the highly partisan Voter-ID bill up for debate.

He did this while a number of Democrats (all 11 of whom oppose the measure) were wandering around outside the Senate chamber. One of them - John Whitmire (D-Houston) was reportedly in the men's room.

When it became apparent what "slyboots" Dewhurst was doing (as the unannounced vote got underway) Demos scurried around and brought their troops back on the floor for the "unscheduled" balloting.

All returned except Whitmire who arrived as the vote was ending with GOPers having racked up the needed two thirds majority to start debating the measure (19-9).

The Houston Senator was furious, and carried on like a "potty-mouthed" dering Whitmire and told him to settle down or be removed).

Whitmire's tantrum however, secured both time and a second vote. Enough time to pull Sen. Carlos Uresti (D-San Antonio) out of his sick bed in a nearby apartment (he had the flu) and assist him to the Senate floor. Demos then had enough votes to block the two-thirds needed by Republicans and the artful plot "fizzled" - final tally 20-11.

Without doubt, Dewhurst is still kicking himself for allowing the second vote. Especially after flim-flamming Demos with a slick "quick" vote, knowing one member was out sick and another in the


Senior named National Merit Scholar finalist

High School's Blake Hancock has found himself in rather elite company.

Vetted through a pool

dents across the U.S., Hancock was recently named a National Merit Scholar finalist. The finalist designation is reserved for less than seven percent of students, and Hancock's inclusion marks the first placement of an SHS student in the rolls of National Merit finalists.

Like many high school students, Hancock took the PSAT his junior year. He did not expect much from the experience, except maybe to gauge how he might fare in his senior year on the actual SAT - the standardized instru-

ment which, along with the ACT, plays such a vital role in the college admissions process.

Soon after, though, he discovered that his score on the exam - which measures critical reading, mathematics and writing - was among the top in the nation, and that he had been named a National Merit semifinalist. The semifinalists are narrowed down even further over the course of the students' senior year, where academic standing and course work, as well as SAT scores and a personal essay are used to determine the finalists, who are then eligible for one of the National Merit scholarships.

Hancock made the cut. and as a result received a scholarship which he will apply to Arizona State University in the fall - a school which, because of Hancock's National Merit status, in turn offered the senior a generous scholarship package which he says was too good to pass up. He tentatively plans to pursue computer science studies.

The entire process caught Hancock off guard. "I was taken by surprise by it, and didn't really know how to react," said Hancock, who admits he's still not sure precisely what his PSAT score was. "I don't know what it was. but it must have been ok."

Blake, the son of Annette and Mike Hancock. should not have been all that surprised by his success, though. He was a four-year participant in UIL, including this year's state title-winning Calculator Team, and last year's Mathematics Team, which placed second at the state meet. He also suited up for the Salado Eagle football squad all four years of high school, and ran Varsity track as a freshman.

A member of the First Baptist Church of Belton, Hancock has also participated in a number of mission trips in recent years.

And despite the honor of being the first Salado student in memory to be named a National Merit finalist, Hancock maintains a humble perspective on his accomplishment. "I just give credit to God for all the blessings in my life," he said.


Salado Western Heritage Days set for June 16 and 17

The "Sizzle" and the "Steak"

As I wrote last week in this column, we are going to spend the next month on re-educating ourselves on the difference between marketing "sizzle" and scientific "steak" in the health, wellness and fitness industries. I will be using concepts gleaned from a successful "wellness" magazine targeting the baby-boomer population. It is not a "rag-mag," or even a popular bodybuilding magazine. This magazine is what I would consider one of the more "safe" wellness magazines on the market. Unfortunately, all of these companies need to make a buck and they all seem to have hidden agenda.

What was the "sizzle" for the marketing ploy? Drop a couple sizes in a couple months. Honestly, this isn't the most obnoxious piece of marketing I have ever seen, as this is actually possible if you are disciplined enough to stay on a proper nutritional and exercise program. Unfortunately, the problem is the article itself. Here is the supposed "steak": A scientific based exercise and nutrition program that uses "targeted muscle development, which firms and smooths underlying tissue." The article is entitled: "Wipe Out Cellulite." Uh-oh.

What are some of the basics on cellulite? First of all, we might be better off calling it, "bulging fat cells." Cellulite is made of strands of fibrous tissue that connect the skin to deeper tissue layers and also separate compartments that contain fat cells. When fat cells increase in size, these compartments bulge and produce a waffled appearance of the skin.

Though the amount of fat on your body is predominately based on your lifestyle, the distribution of fat is based primarily on your genetic make-up. So, you will need to drop the proper amount of fat over your entire body to reduce, if not completely remove, the amount of

squat and lunge. There are enough variations of squats and lunges that they are beneficial for every level of conditioning level. If you want to waste your time you will continue to follow your instant gratification instincts and believe the lie of "spot reduction" and follow a program that

kicking, sweeping, glute-

squeezing and bun burn-

ing. What a mess!


Do you want to defeat cellulite once and for all? I hope I don't have to mention in this article that creams and wraps will only be successful shortterm and in many instances they are dangerous!





Road to Austin makes for a great trip

On any given Saturday night in Austin, a music lover can find Tejano, blues, jazz, Texas rock, traditional country, British Invasion, and even opera somewhere, but to find all those forms of music together in one place on one night, is something special and -- for lack of a better word -- unique.

Musicians from a multitude of influences came together for a four-hour celebration of the impact of music on Austin and the impact of Austin on music, culminating in honoring fellow Texan Kris Kristofferson with the inaugural "Texas Music Legend"

Musical director Stephen Bruton, who has played guitar for Kristofferson and Joe Elv among many others, arrived on stage at the Auditorium

Porsche and was joined in the house band by 10 other musicians and singers who backed the impressive lineup of local legends and those who will be the next generation of music heroes.

Bruton commanded the 11-piece house band that backed fan favorites such as Bonnie Raitt, Joe Ely, Delbert McClinton and Malford Milligan as well as rising stars such as Ruthie Foster and James Hand. Musicians took their turn on the stage that recalled the architecture and feel of the capital's first large musical venue: The Millet Opera House.

While The Road to Austin: The Live Music Capital of the World showcase swirled the aesthetics of the historic Millet Opera House into a mix of high-end sound and graphics, it was not without its faux pas, chiefly the giant 30 foot by 50 foot screen behind the stage that did

But who needs visual effects when the music is what matters, as it clearly did Saturday night.

From start to finish, The Road to Austin was about music -- more precisely about music that should and must be heard live and loud. Whether it was the gospel-influenced praise of Ruthie Foster, the British Invasion blues of Ian McLagan or the Latin music of Joel Guzman and Sarah Fox, all the performances had this in common: energy, effervescence and excitement

Even crusty old Kristofferson, whose songs are best known by other singers such as Willie Nelson, Johnny Cash, Ray Price and Janis Joplin, was touched by the respect shown him by the dozens of artists and thousands of fans gathered for the evening.

Kristoffer-Frankly, son's deep baritone voice was off on the evening. It cracked and broke during his performances of the classic songs of country that he penned: "Sunday Morning Coming Down,"

"Help Me Make it Through the Night" "For the Good Times" and, at the end of the evening, "Me and Bobby McGee."

Yet, it is easy to forgive a man for his voice cracking a bit when he has inked some of the most beautiful lyrics in music of any genre: "Lay your head upon my pillow, Hold your warm and tender body close to mine, Hear the whisper of the rain drops flowing soft against the window, And make believe you love me one more time. For the good times."

While Kristofferson, Raitt, Milligan, McClinton, Ely, Eric Johnson might be names quickly recognized by most folks, some of the relative unheard-ofs taking the stage finished their brief sets with new fans. Chief among those were Ruthie Foster, a pint-sized woman with a voice as big as her native state, and James Hand, who hails from West, Texas and who harkens such comparisons to Hank Williams (Senior not Junior) and George







"You can just say an address and OnStar will tell you how to get there," she says.

About 40 miles into the trip, one of the passengers needed to make a phone call to somebody at our destination. He tried to use his cell phone, but he was out of range.

He did whatever is necessary to get the OnStar operator on the line. She happened to be female. By her accent, we could tell she was probably from a place halfway around the world.
