# FEMA center coming to Salado

After declaring Bell County as one of the Texas counties to be a disaster due to flooding in June, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced last week that a Mobile Disaster Recovery Center (MDRC) will be set up in Salado July 24-26. The recovery center will be open at the Salado Civic Center on Main Street 9 a.m.-6 p.m.

Disaster recovery centers are a one-stop shop for affected individuals to learn more about the disaster aid process. Individuals can meet one-onone to learn about the status of their FEMA aid, or with mitigation experts to learn about how to avoid or reduce future disaster losses when rebuilding.

Officials from the US Small Business Administration will be on-hand to answer questions and help renters, homeowners, business of any size and private non-profit organizations fill out loan applications.

"A mobile DRC enables FEMA to help individuals throughout the state of Texas most effectively," said Federal Coordinating Officer Kenneth Clark. "MDRC's are a great place for citizens to get answers to questions they may have concerning the disaster aid process."

In addition to the Bell County location, mobile MDRC's will set up at Hood County Annex I in Granbury July 20-22, and the Weatherford Fire Station #3 July 28-30.

Fixed DRC's are open 9

a.m.-6 p.m. daily. FEMA is operating six fixed DRCs in Marble Falls, Haltom City, Eastland, Wichita Falls, Gainesville and Sherman.

On June 29, President Bush declared a major disaster for the State of Texas, triggering the release of Federal funds to help people and communities recover from the severe storms, tornadoes, and flooding that occurred June 16, 2007 and continuing. Details of the disaster declaration and assistance programs are as follows



# **Imbalanced on Talk Radio**

Rush Limbaugh, the conservative talkradio pioneer, has been called many nasty things before, but never a "structural imbalance." That's the fancy term a liberal think tank uses to characterize his success -- and to dress up its proposal for counteracting that success through new government regulation.

The report of the Center for American Progress on "The Structural Imbalance of Political Talk Radio" marks the latest phase in liberaldom's grappling with conservative talk radio. First came the attempts to create a liberal Limbaugh -- Mario Cuomo, Jim Hightower, et al. -- that fell flat. Then an entire left-wing network, Air America, was founded, and foundered. So there's only one option left -- if you can't beat them, and you won't join them, you can agitate for government to regulate them.

The report looks at a slice of 257 talk stations and concludes that more than 90 percent of total weekday talk programming is conservative. The supposed reason for this is, essentially, that media companies are conspiring to shove conservative radio down the throats of listeners in a way they couldn't if, among other things, government required broadcasters "to regularly show that they are operating on behalf of the public interest."

This is a pinched view of radio. There are upwards of 2,000 talk stations in the country that deal with news and issues, according to Michael Harrison of Talkers magazine, and they encompass all sorts of formats from National Public Radio to urban radio to shock jocks, none of which are dominated by right wingers. Conservative talk radio is a vibrant niche within that market, but there are many other places to go for news and opinion.

What is hard to find are liberal replicas of Rush Limbaugh, and that is due to the deepest structural imbalance of all --talent. Limbaugh and other top conserva-

tive talkers are silver-tongued, informative and -- importantly -- entertaining. These are qualities that can't be conjured out of nowhere, and designated liberal-radio saviors have tended not to have the requisite talent "on loan from God" (as Limbaugh puts it).

There have been conservative failures at talk radio for the same reason. Without the right mix of substance and entertainment, a host will fail to get ratings, and with that, be yanked from the air. "Ratings" is a word that appears only once in passing in the Center for American Progress report, because then it would have to acknowledge that conservative radio is successful exactly because it gets listeners.

The report avoids directly calling for a renewal of the constitutionally dubious Fairness Doctrine that mandated equal time for conservative and liberal opinions, although some Democratic lawmakers aren't so circumspect. After maintaining that the First Amendment protects nude dancing, they are ready to argue that it doesn't quite apply to people broadcasting conservative views over the airwaves.

In our toxic contemporary politics, it's a sign of success if you drive your opponents batty. Rush Limbaugh might be a structural imbalance, but his critics appear simply imbalanced.

# Guv refuses Fed demand; Politics vs public health; Texas flag pledge

Governor Rick (Landslide) Perry received a letter on May 10 signed by James Oberstar (D-Minnesota), Chairman of the House Committee on Transportation-Infrastructure, and Peter DeFazio (D-Oregon), Chairman of the Subcommittee on Highways. Both men "strongly discouraged" Perry from entering into public-private (road construction) partnership ("PPP") agreements, citing "these agreements do not adequately protect the public interest."

Both Oberstar and DeFazio noted that their "committee will work to undo any State PPP agreements that do not fully protect the public interest and the integrity of the national (highway) system."

#### PPPs HIT WITH MORATORIUM

Readers will recall that the recent 80th Legislature slowed "PPP" contracting with privately owned foreign and domestic companies that want to build and operate toll roads in Texas. Lawmakers did this by passing a two year "soft" moratorium on current and pending contracts, especially those with international road builders.

Perry is a leading proponent of using foreign road builders to construct toll roads in Texas. His most questionable move in that direction was the "signed" feasibility contract with the Spanish road giant Cintra-Zachry, to create the Trans-Texas Corridor (TTC-35). This agreement will eventually include (if it passes the moratorium milestone) not only construction of TTC-35, but also management of the roadway and collection of toll-fees. All that for a measly \$10 billion upfront payoff in exchange for the 50 year lease that will produce a net profit of \$300 billion!

The question raised throughout this debate remains: "Who should buildoperate our toll roads and collect the fees?" State leaders, who managed to pass fifth grade arithmetic, know that highway bonds are excellent (tax-free) investments. Of even greater importance - state controlled toll-roadways produce huge (treasury) surpluses. So why let foreign countries set our toll-fees and reap these benefits? We all know the answer to that question - Texas needs to plan and manage its own tollways - period!

#### ABOUT THE WORD "NO"

Governor Perry's response to Congress (53 days later) took five pages and some 1275 words, ending with an inch-high printed signature, indicating (we presume) wonderment at what there is about the word "NO" that new House Democratic leaders don't understand.

Well - old "Landslide" may be "wondering" about Congress (and the word "no") but the rest of us will continue "our wondering" about Perry and his preoccupation with the Republican privatization-of-government orgy, something that's never worked and never will - not in Texas nor Washington.

#### POLITICS TRUMP PUBLIC HEALTH

A chilling account of inexcusable political interference by the Bush White House, was reported last week by several former US Surgeon Generals, who testified before the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee.

The most damning disclosure came from Vice Admiral Richard Carmona (Bush's Surgeon General, 2002-2006)

### Recovering from floods, preparing for future

The recent floods in north and central Texas are a tragic reminder of the devastating impact natural disasters have on our families, businesses and communities. In recent years. our state has weathered hurricanes, tornadoes, floods, droughts and wildfires in unusual frequency and severity. However, when disaster strikes, we rise to the challenge and recover. As your senator, I am committed to helping Texans in every possible wav.


Earlier this month, I saw firsthand some of the flooding that impacted over 6 million Texans across 49 counties. In some places. entire neighborhoods were underwater and families were forced to evacuate to higher ground. Roads I had traveled with my family near Lake Texoma only a few weeks ago were completely submerged.

To help Texans recover and rebuild. I have worked directly with the president's administration and the governor's office to obtain federal disaster declarations for a growing number of counties affected by recent flooding. A federal declaration makes grants and loans available for recovery efforts, such as basic home or business repairs and the rebuilding of vital public infrastructure. In some cases, federal assistance is also available to offset economic setbacks like business or agricultural losses. Archer, Bell, Burnet, Cooke, Coryell, Denton, Eastland, Grayson, Hood, Lampasas, Parker, Starr, Tarrant, Victoria, Webb, Wichita and Williamson counties have

Unfortunately, flooding is not the only natural hazard to affect our state. Few Texans can forget the destructive impact Hurricane Rita had on our coastal region. This powerful storm struck while much of the Gulf Coast was still reeling from the effects of Hurricane Katrina. Many Texans who had welcomed displaced neighbors into their homes suddenly became victims themselves.

As federal relief efforts focused on other Gulf Coast states, I worked to ensure that Texans hit by Hurricane Rita received equal treatment alongside our neighbors. Federal authorities initially proposed to reimburse local governments in Louisiana for 90 percent of their recovery costs, while compensating Texas cities and counties for a significantly smaller amount. But, Hurricane Rita didn't discriminate along state lines and neither should the federal government. Working with my colleagues, I was able to enact the same reimbursement rate for Texas and secure billions in aid for rebuilding efforts.

Our farming and ranching communities have also been hard-hit by disas-Last year, drought and wildfires caused an estimated \$4.1 billion in crop and livestock losses in nearly 200 Texas counties. These losses were overwhelming for many of the families and individuals in

our vital agriculture industry. Thankfully, working with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Congress helped offset these losses and brought significant disaster assistance to our Texas producers.

While we cannot predict when and where natural disasters will strike, proper advance planning is vital to the protection of our families and the rebuilding of our communities. I urge you to do your part by making sure that you and your family have a safety or evacuation plan ready for floods, fire, severe storms, tornadoes and-if you live in a coastal area-hurricanes. I also encourage you to obtain realistic insurance coverage for your home or business, as no government relief will ever be entirely sufficient. You can visit the Department of Homeland Security's website, http:// www.ready.gov, for emergency planning advice and practical tips.

If your family or business has been a victim of a natural disaster, please feel free to contact FEMA or my office at http://hutchison. senate.gov to find out what assistance may be available. We are not able to prevent natural disasters, but working together we can protect our families and communities and help rebuild when calamities occur.







Marker, had the program been in place at that time, each is now forever lost. To ensure that there is no further infringement on that legacy left by Salado's earlier residents, members of the Society respectfully provide the following information:

The original plan for the expansion of I-35 as presented in 2001 indicated that it would be on the west side of the Interstate. This would have caused minimum damage to the ambience of Salado's Historic Village. However, the new plan presented on May 3, 2007 indicated that the expansion between FM 2268 and Thomas Arnold Road will be further to the east than previously planned. This eastward movement will seriously impact on the historical nature of our Village and

directly affect both the historic Stagecoach Inn and the First Baptist Church. Each is a long-time institution in our Village.

The Stagecoach Inn is known throughout Texas. When you mention Salado, you are almost always asked about the restaurant at the Stagecoach Inn. The Inn's original building was constructed in 1860, and many early Texans, including Sam Houston, were guests at the Inn. The office of the Stagecoach Inn is located on land where Archibald Willingham, the first white settler to live in the Salado Springs area, built his log cabin around 1848. Long a part of Texas' history, the Stagecoach Inn has received a Texas Historical Commission Marker and is listed in the National Register of Historic Places. Any construction that infringes on the property now occupied by the Stagecoach Inn will seriously endanger the histor-

ic ambiance as well as the economic viability of this Texas landmark.

The First **Baptist** Church was founded in 1864 and has also received a historical marker from the State. It has occupied the same property since 1878. Although the original building located on this historic site was not dedicated until the last Sunday in December, 1878, the pastor serving when the church's building committee was named in 1877 was George Washington Baines. Baines was the great-grandfather of United States President Lyndon Baines Johnson. In addition, he served from 1855 to 1860 as the first editor of the first Baptist newspaper in Texas, as the president of Baylor University in 1861, and as the president of the board of trustees of Baylor Female College in Belton, now the University of Mary Hardin Baylor. This historic church, which has been

served by many Texas legends and has included in its membership many others, now stands at risk because of the widening of the interstate highway. When originally constructed, who among its membership could have ever imagined that the church's future would be endangered not by events happening on the old Chisholm Trail passing just on the east of its sanctuary but by an Interstate highway located on the then empty prairie spreading to the west.

Although the Village of Salado may not be large in terms of population, it has become one of Texas' greatest historical treasures. It was home to one of our State's earliest colleges, Salado College, which opened in 1860. Salado also contains one of the largest collections of Greek Revival homes in Texas. Many of these have been recognized as historic homes as evidenced by the fact that the Village's historic district has received 30 Texas Historical Markers. It has also received four 1936 Texas Centennial Markers, has 20 buildings listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and has been awarded 12 Salado Landmark Awards. Therefore, any infringement of the Village's historic district will endanger not only the Stagecoach Inn and the First Baptist Church but also the ambiance of one of our State's historical

treasures. The members of the Salado Historical Society realize the need to expand I-35 and appreciate the efforts of State officials to remedy a roadway that is becoming increasingly

congested and dangerous. We also realize that, as concerned Texans, the members of the committee charged with planning this expansion are also concerned with preserving the unique portion of our State's history reflected within the Village of Salado. Yet, as trustees of Salado's historical legacy we feel that you need to hear our voice and feel our concern. There must be a way to simultaneously widen the expressway and protect the truly vital and real segment of Texas history that is Salado. We trust that you will find that way.

# Protect yourself from identity theft

First, the bad news: There's still plenty of identity theft out there. Now, the better news: There's not as much as in previous years. And now, the best news: You can do a lot to protect yourself from being victimized.

If you're not familiar with the concept of identity theft, it basically involves someone getting some pieces of information about you - name, Social Security number. credit card numbers, "preapproved" credit card offers - and using this data to make purchases or withdraw funds from your accounts.

In 2006, some 8.4 million Americans were hit by identity fraud - but that's half a million fewer victims than the year before, according to a study conducted by Javelin Strategy & Research. The study also found that, in 2006, the average victim of an existing account fraud paid \$587, out of pocket, in consumer costs associated with the fraud, while victims of new accounts opened in their name paid,

on average, \$617.

The overall decline in identity theft may indicate that more people are acting to protect themselves - but the average cost per person shows that fraud victims still can get hurt. How can you reduce the chances of being victimized by identity theft? Here are some suggestions:

Shield your credit card from prying eyes and ears. Thieves can now use camera cell phones to take photos of your credit cards while you're making purchases. Don't pull your credit card out until the moment you're going to use it, and put it away after it's used. If you're making a contribution over the phone to a political or non-profit group, don't give out your credit card number unless you're sure the organization is legiti-



Use secure sites when shopping online. Before giving out your credit card number to make a purchase on the Internet, make sure you're on a secure site - one that begins with https://. (The "s" stands for "secure.") Also, the site should display a small lock or other security seal.

Shred those documents. If you are purging old investment statements, tax returns and bank documents, use a shredder. And while you have the shredder out, use it on pre-approved credit card offers.

Go "virtual". Try to replace paper statements from banks, financial services providers and credit card issuers - with online versions. Many businesses will be quite happy to save the cost and expense of mailing account statements to you.

Check your bank statements. Whether you get your bank statements online or on paper, check them at least a few times a month. If you find a transaction that looks unfamiliar or questionable, call your bank to find out more

Get your credit report annually - To request a copy of your credit report, you can call the three main credit bureaus: Equifax (1-800-685-1111), Experian (1-888-397-3742) Trans Union (1-800-888-4213). Check your report closely for "surprises" or unaccounted activity.

Guard your personal information. Don't carry around your Social Security card in your wallet. In fact, unless it's truly necessary, as when you're filing official papers, don't give out your Social Security number. Also, change the PIN number on your cash card once in a while.

Identity thieves are clever - so do whatever it takes to keep them out of your life.







# Labor of Love gets final touch

The once neglected corner in Mill Creek at South Ridge and Old Mill Road, was unsightly after the county re-routed it in 2000.

To create a safer, more controlled intersection, it was changed from a curve, sometimes taken at too high speeds, to a 90 degree intersection with a stop sign.

The old ruts, former fragments of asphalt paving, rocks, tangled vines, neglected trees, weeds, and drainage problems were left barren to thrive as they could...and they

Carol Strong realized that if the neglected corner was to improve, she would have to take action. Beginning her recovery from a 10-year illness, she began working on the corner. She recruited Miriam Jordan and in 2004 they established who owned the property and got permission to improve it. They laid out an amateur plan with pad and pencil for earthen berms on which plants would grow, requested initial funding from the MCCA, and secured water use approval from property nearby. After some questioning, MCCA granted them \$1,000. Faced with earthmoving needs, boulder rocks to be moved, and a need for large amounts of good top soil, the project began in 2005.

With a plan, promised funds, and four volunteers, this immense undertaking began to take form.

Two men, Joe Oliver and Bill Pinkston, worked with Carol and Miriam for weeks pruning trees, spreading soil, loading and moving small rock, cutting weeds, laying brick/ gravel walkways, weeding, and watering. The stage was set and planting and mulching began, with Curt Strong hauling the mulch into place. This same group continues to improve and maintain the garden. Gary Gillos, Mill

Have you ever wondered why the artificial sweetener market is a \$1.5 BILLION industry? Have you thought recently about the increase in artificial choices you have concerning your tea, coffee or baked goods? Have you noticed the dietary trend towards low or non-sugar products? Have you been overwhelmed with the concept of low-glycemic and high fiber products? Well, if you have, and you want to make sense of it all, please read this and the following two weekly articles that will break down all of the misconceptions concerning artificial sweeteners and their effect on your health.

If you have followed this column at all you now realize I stress eating foods in their natural state. Why? Well, to put it simply, it is one of the simplest concepts to follow when developing your optimal health.

What exactly do I mean by "eating foods in their natural state?" To fully explain, let's take a look at this question from a number of angles. First, think of yourself as a hunter and gatherer who only consumes products in the same state as when they are killed, picked or

As an example, which would be the best choice for improving your health or to look at it another way, which food would take a smaller toll on your health? Eating an apple or applesauce or drinking apple juice? Okay, now that the majority of you have said, "the apple, duh." Let me ask you this. Which product normally finds itself at the majority of breakfasts and lunches around the country?

Though the apple is the simple choice, "natural" choices are not in vogue, refined and processed are. Once the apple has been refined to become applesauce it begins to lose valuable nutrients as well as valuable fiber. Also, the applesauce will begin to play havoc on your blood sugar levels because of its increased glycemic-index (how quickly or slowly the food breaks down into blood sugar/glucose). The apple juice is more refined

than the applesauce so it has even less nutritional value, plus a substantial increase in calories and sugar content.

The formula for accelerated aging and degenerative disease: Increased Calories and Sugar combined with Decreased Nu-

Secondly, though obviously minerals and vitamins are natural in nature, when would you ever consume them out of context or without consuming them with a plethora of other micronutrients and secondary nutrients? The answer is; you wouldn't.

Though we can find a cheap isolated vitamin or mineral to purchase, when in real life would we ever consume grams and grams of these specific isolated nutrients by themselves? In America we have reduced our food down to a group of vitamins and minerals believing they will be of some benefit, but the truth is, once these nutrients are out of the context of the spectrum of nutrients that natural foods provide, these micronutrients can be detrimental as well.

This topic has led to all sorts of recent confusion in the health industry because for every study that comes out promoting the ingestion of mega doses of vitamins and minerals as beneficial there is one that refutes it and says that this type of supplementation can be detrimental to your health (some anti-oxidants of the past are now seen as oxidizers).

Finally, when looking at what is considered food today, it is important that we understand how synthetics and artificial products come into play. Synthetics and artificial products are as far from being in the natural state as possible. These are pseudo-foods that you would never find in na-

If the body has a tough time breaking down and using foods that are refined and processed, think bodily systems when we are consuming products that have been manufactured in the past century

So let's get practical and take a look at a couple of everyday examples.

Here is a list of foods, rated from best to worst concerning your health (prioritized by three categories: real food, refinement (glycemic-index), artificial), that you may add to a cup of tea or coffee: stevia (herb), raw honey (real, no refinement), honey (real, moderate refinement), table sugar (real, high refinement), artificial sweeteners (not real).

This is what the break down of dairy looks like with the same criteria: Grass-fed Raw goat's Grass-fed Raw cow's milk, Pasteurized and Homogenized Whole goat's milk, Whole cow's milk, 2% cow's milk, 1% cow's milk, and Skim cow's milk. In my opinion, milk doesn't "do the body good" and should be considered as a convenience food with low nutrient and high sugar content (specifically 1% and

Answer this, what other animal consumes milk in adulthood? What other animal consumes another animals' milk period? Add in milk allergies and lactose intolerance and it is no wonder why it is one of the most marketed "foods" to children today!

If you like your dairy, consume it in its most natural state, raw and from an animal that was grass-fed.


As you have come to see, artificial doesn't have to be something that is synthetic, but something that the human body doesn't

recognize as "natural".






# Jonah would be jealous

Local woman shares her story of being lost in the Gulf waters

Saturday, June 30th, started with the excitement of a morning fishing trip with my two sons, Jason and Jeremy Buckner. Together with Alvin Kay and his son, Mike, we set off from Port Aransas in a 21' Mowdy bay boat. On our way past the jetties, we threw out 3 fishing lines and trolled to the blue water. At approximately 9 miles out, my youngest son, Jeremy, hooked a kingfish. As he was reeling it in, it swam under the boat at which time Alvin Kay turned off the motor. As the boat slowed, water filled the scoop hole where Jeremy was standing. Mike stepped over to help as a wave hit the opposite side of the boat. The combination of uneven weight and the force of the wave capsized it, leaving us in the water with the boat upside down. Our day quickly turned from an offshore fishing trip to a crisis situ-

Simultaneously, Jason, Jeremy and Mike determined everyone's location and got us onto the hull of the boat. The young men's military training aided them in assessing the situation and taking action. Life jackets, drinking water, and a small tackle box with three flares were salvaged. For the next two hours we floated and tried to flag down any passing boats. Once, we saw a boat 300 meters away and lit one of the flares. No one saw us.

Eventually, the young men realized the canopy was acting as an anchor. Jeremy and Mike dove under the boat, disconnected it, and brought it to the surface. After a little engineering, they turned the canopy into a sail. For the next seven hours we rocked back and forth and thought of family who would miss us and surely notify the authorities.

Alvin Kay's daughter, Lisa Kay, was the person we knew would be most persistent in getting us help. We just didn't know when she'd place that call and how long it might take for the Coast Guard to find us.

As the day grew longer and the waves got higher, we continued to pray and keep a vigilant watch for any boat or plane that might help us. About 7:30 p.m. as the sun started to set in the Western sky, Jeremy spotted a jet flying parallel to the shoreline and our modified sailing vessel. I said several urgent prayers at that point. The jet made a large circle toward the end of the Port Aransas shoreline and then turned and slowly started toward us. Jeremy took the second flare and got ready to strike it. When the jet was within 400 yards we all agreed that he should light the flare. He struck it once and the tip broke off. He continued to try to strike the flare with our encouragement. I closed my eyes and prayed out loud. He struck again, and the striker caught fire which he then used to ignite the flare. The jet was almost over us. We were waving our arms and yelling. The jet passed over us without any indication that they saw us. It kept going away from us and then made a very large circle back to its original path. Then it turned and came straight










toward us.

As it approached, the pilot curve the plane directly over us and we could hear the jet wash. At that point, we knew that we had been spotted. The jet continued to circle us until the Coast Guard Cutter arrived. The crew on the cutter threw out the rescue donut and pulled

us in one by one onto the boat. Once we were all aboard, the anxiety, frustration, and fear of the day left us relieved on the deck.

This experience has made us aware of the importance of being prepared before leaving shore, and has made us as family and friends, MATES.

# **Wood-Grilled Leg of Lamb** accompanied by Sangria

Save your best bottle for another day. For sangria, use a reasonably priced, reasonably good unoaked red wine with fruity, spicy notes. When peaches aren't in season, a ripe pear or an apple is a good substitute. We've added orange liqueur, which imparts a sweet citrus punch. You may leave it out if you wish.

Serves 4

1 bottle (750 ml) red wine

1/2 cup fresh-squeezed orange juice

1/4 cup orange liqueur, such as triple sec

1/4 cup sugar

1 small orange, thinly sliced

1 small lemon, thinly sliced

1 peach, pitted, peeled, and diced

1 cup 365 Everyday Value™ Italian lemon soda,

In a large pitcher, combine wine, orange juice, orange liqueur and sugar; stir to dissolve sugar. Stir in fruits and refrigerate until chilled and the flavors have blended, 2 to 8 hours. Just before serving, gently stir in soda; serve sangria over ice.

Start fire, using the equivalent of 2 gallons of charcoal. While coals are heating, roll and tie the leg of lamb. When coals are glowing, spread the coals into 2 piles on opposite edges of grill. For extra flavor, toss mesquite chips (soaked in water for about 15 minutes) over hot coals prior to cooking.

Place cooking grill over coals. Place a piece of foil in the center of the grill to catch drippings. Place lamb on foil and cook covered with air vents open for 75 to 90 minutes. Remove from grill. Let stand 10 minutes before slicing.

1/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp pepper

2 cup corn kernels (fresh or frozen)

1 pint salsa

Bring stock, chipotle, salt to a boil. Add yams, simmer until tender. Strain yams, saving broth. Purée yams with 2 cups liquid.

In a medium saucepan, sauté onion, garlic, and rosemary in olive oil for 2 minutes. Add remaining cooking liquid and yam purée. Bring to a boil and whisk in polenta in a steady stream. Reduce heat slightly, cook until polenta pulls away from sides of pan, stirring constantly (20 minutes). Remove from heat.

Stir in honey, corn, season with salt, pepper. Pour into lightly oiled 13" X 9" pan. Refrigerate. When firm, cut into squares.

To reheat, place in 350°F oven for 15 minutes.

Serve with salsa.



With Pakistan North-South, the bidding at the first table went as shown. North's two-diamond bid was artificial and showed a balanced hand with lots of high-card points. East's three-diamond bid was natural and indicated lots of diamonds. North's double was essentially for

South responded three spades, and North, overwhelmed by his 20 highcard points and excellent trump support, raised to four spades. This illadvised move -- based not on real tricks but on points -- proved disastrous. West led his singleton diamond, and the Swedish pair took seven tricks in a row to extract an 1,100-point pen-

East won the diamond lead with the ace and returned the deuce of diamonds, asking for a club return after West ruffed. West duly obliged by leading the queen of clubs, covered by the king and ace. East then cashed the jack of clubs before leading a third round of diamonds. The hapless declarer ruffed with the ten of spades, which was overruffed by West with the jack. West then returned another club, ruffed by East, who cashed the ace of hearts to put an end to the slaughter.

At the second table, where North was also overly impressed by his points, the Swedish pair similarly got to four spades. Luckily, they were not doubled and managed to go down only three, so Sweden gained 800 points on the deal.




