Preview Party set at Inn on Creek for Art Fair Aug. 4



Village will outsource future **building inspections**

EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

The Village of Salado may soon begin outsourcing its building inspections after aldermen authorized Mayor Rick Ashe to begin negotiations with Bureau Veritas.

"Based on their credentials and services they provide, I have not seen anyone who provides that level of service," Bruno Matarazzo, code enforcement officer for the Village of Salado, told the board of aldermen.

Matarazzo currently conducts the inspections for the Village, in addition to his duties as an investigative police officer on the police force.

Under the contract, once approved by the Board of Aldermen, Bureau Veritas will handle the inspection process from plan review in the beginning to issuing certificates of occupancy at the conclusion.

"This will be exceptionally more cost efficient for the Village," Matarazzo said.

Matarazzo explained to the board that Bureau Veritas would send a "start up team" to Salado to work with Matarazzo, Village Secretary Dianna Zulauf and other building officials for the Village in establishing a work plan.

After the contract has been reviewed by Village Attorney Alan Bojorquez, aldermen will likely formally adopt it in August.

In other business at their Aug. 20 meeting, aldermen changed the requirement for

a building permit for storage buildings. Storage buildings in excess of 150 sq. ft. will require a building permit and inspection, while storage buildings of 25-150 sq. ft. will only require an inspection.

The board also approved a Grandfathering Ordinance, which regulates developments and construction which have been approved under previous zoning or subdivision regulations. The ordinance provides a timeframe in which a project must be completed before it must come back for approval. The complete ordinance can be found on the Village of Salado website, www.villageofsalado.org.

Village Treasurer Eldon Miller informed aldermen that the Village is running approximately \$31,000 over budget for income nine months through the fiscal year. The Village budgeted \$407,6000 in income through June, but has actualized \$438,336.84.

The Village has spent \$205,616,47 in operating expenses, which is almost \$10,000 less than budgeted. For capital outlay, the Village has spent \$155,000, which is almost \$22,000 more than the board budgeted for capital outlay expenses in 2006. The capital outlay expenses were \$125,000 for the municipal building renovations and \$30,000 for a backhoe.

Aldermen took no action on a citizen request for the Village to take over Center Street.

As Lieberman goes...

The Democrats' position on the Iraq War has been a muddle. Many top Democrats supported it, although it's hard to believe all of them had their hearts in it. Of course, the party's core supporters were passionately opposed from the beginning. This has led to the Democrats' pull-out, no-don't-pull-out, please-don't-ask-us-what-we-think pile of contradictions and evasions on the war.

The muddle is moving toward a resolution, and the vehicle for it is the Aug. 8 Democratic Senate primary race in Connecticut. Sen. Joe Lieberman has been a stalwart supporter of the war, and the left-wing blogosphere -- representing the party's mad-as-hell anti-war base -- has resolved to make him pay. Anti-war challenger Ned Lamont is such a threat to Lieberman that the three-term incumbent and former vice-presidential candidate is preparing to run as an independent in the general election, should he lose the primary.

A Lieberman loss could signal a turning point as significant, in its way, as the rise in the GOP of the Goldwaterites, who vanquished the liberal Rockefeller Republicans, or the ascendancy of the McGovernites, who sent the old hawkish Scoop Jackson Democrats packing. Unfortunately, there aren't many Lieberman-style hawks left in the party, which is Lieberman's problem.

John Edwards has repudiated the war and lurched left since his 2004 vice-presidential run. He leads in presidential polls in Iowa. John Kerry regrets his prior support of the war and wants a deadline, any deadline, for exiting Iraq. Even the cautious Hillary Clinton just turned her back on Lieberman by saying she would support Lamont if he wins the primary.

If Lieberman does lose, it will be a sign that Clinton herself is vulnerable to a challenge from the left in the 2008 presidential primaries. Then, she will be under

enormous pressure to walk away from her support of the war, too.

The biggest winner is Howard Dean, left for dead after his infamous 2004 Iowa "scream." Lamont is a straight Deaniac, not just in his opposition to the war, but in his demographic profile: white, well-off and highly educated. These are the same people who backed the successful peacenik insurrection of George McGovern in 1972, and now they are bidding to make their control of their party all the more complete.

Their main issue is the war, but they also represent a general repudiation of the one hiccup in the post-1972 McGovernite dominance of the party, the Clinton administration circa 1994-1998. Clinton was pro-growth, pro-free trade, tonally moderate and willing to use force abroad. Al Gore spurned this winning centrist formula in 2000, but he felt compelled to make a bow to it by picking the moderate Lieberman as his running mate. Now, the Democratic party is on the verge of saying a Lieberman-style hawkish-centrism is utterly anathema.

Lieberman could still win the primary. Even if he loses, he could win the general election as an independent, showing that the party's left wing doesn't have wider appeal. But if Lieberman is ousted from his seat, it will be a decisive victory for the party's haters and anti-war bloggers. The Democrats' muddle on Iraq will finally have ended, and the party will be the poorer for it.

State AG presents partisan redistricting scheme that boots Doggett, saves Bonilla

The three judge federal panel created by the Supreme Court (after the Texas Congressional redistricting machination was declared partially unconstitutional) received the State's proposed district realignments last week from Attorney General Greg Abbott. This new scheme is probably the most blatant partisan regurgitation of the high court's specific invalidation, within the totally jumbled congressional map. That monstrosity you recall was contrived by Tom DeLay in 2003.

What the Supreme Court focused on when they kicked the Texas plan back for a judicial "fix-up", was District 23, that included part of Laredo and west to El Paso's County line -designed solely to protect Republican Henry Bonilla.

Abbot has created a map that gives Bonilla a relocated (safe) District, carved from Bexar and Travis Counties. It's also designed to destroy Doggett's District 25 (perennial GOP goal) and convert the Capital City into a "sham" Republican town, whose voting patterns will not sustain the change - especially if looked at objectively, rather than through foggy sectarian GOP-glasses.

The three appellate judges have set August 3, for oral arguments in Austin. The AG's contentious new boundary manipulation will be the top agenda item. Also expected will be those affected by the restructured maps; plus a roundup if the usual political partisans; several State officials; and no doubt a gaggle of lawyers - always on hand to represent any side of an argument.

What eventually evolves from this new cartographical nightmare is anyone's guess - but rest assured the AG's plan will never be approved (in toto) since it fails to meet even minimal standards of fairness or voter right's protection

VIETNAM VERSUS IRAQ

It should come as no surprise that political writers, commentators, and other troublemakers, have finally gotten around to comparing the furor generated by the Vietnam War to the surprisingly modest public uproar directed at our current entanglement in Iraq-Afghanistan.

What most of these gurus-ofquesstimation have uncovered are not the similarities between the two embroilments, but more interestingly they have, we believe, put their collected fingers on the underlying reason why Americans have not forced today's administration to call a halt to the Iraqi hostilities, through disruptive tactics used during the Vietnam era.

The public turmoil in those days included anti-war uprisings on college campuses; the desperate damnation of the war by parents; protest marches in hundreds of cities nationwide.

Convulsions that caused President Lyndon Johnson to give up his reelection plans; and later forced a "Watergated" Richard Nixon to sign a cease-fire agreement (Paris-1973) that allowed our troops to withdraw from South Vietnam.

EMOTIONAL DISPARITY

The underlying reason for the disparity in emotions between the two prolonged conflicts appears to be the fact that Vietnam was fought primarily by young men "drafted" into the military, as compared to today's

all-volunteer armed forces in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Having America's youth, drafted from a wide variety of socio-economic groups, in uniform and fighting a war, brings to bear more immediate and intense feelings in the minds of families and elected officials, whereas those who volunteer - for widely differing reasons, do not create "anti-war" emotions with as much bitter political resonance aimed at those who put our young people in harm's way.

If combat troops in the middle-east today were, for the most part, draftees as was the case in Vietnam, there is little doubt that the nation would have already erupted in militant demonstrations. And, in all probability the hostilities would have been resolved months ago.

BRING BACK THE DRAFT?

If the above theorem is reasonably correct - then the thoughts of Boston Globe journalist - Joan Vennochi, would make wise guidelines for future leaders to follow. Specifically - that reintroducing the draft might insure future wars are fought either with every citizen's efforts or are not worth fighting at all, nor losing a single soldier's life.

IRAQ WAR PASSES 40TH MONTH

For the History buffs among us - particularly those who love dates and statistics - we offer the following: Last week (July 19) the war in Iraq passed its 40th month, which is nearing the World War II total of 44 months and 7 days (December 7, 1941 - August 14, 1945). We will equal the time fought in WWII on November 26.

American involvement in the first world war lasted 19 months (April 1917 to November 11, 1918). The Iraq war-insurgency has already lasted longer than the Korean War - 37 months, 2 days. And all of these conflicts pale in comparison to the time we spent in the Vietnam tragedy. Twelve long years (1961-1973).

THE NEW BUSHSPEAK

Democrats giggled; Republicans rolled their eyes; the public nodded and grinned; and even Bush-bashers eased up their fault finding momentarily - all because George "Potty-Mouth" Bush offered a realistic analysis on how UN-leader Kofi Annan could quickly wind up Hezbollah's current insanity against Israel.





Universal Pre-K?

A Losing Proposition

High costs, few benefits make idea bad for Texas kids, taxpayers

In a 2006 United Way poll, nearly three-fourths of Texans supported fullyfunded pre-kindergarten for all students, regardless of income.

But in June, 61% of Californians voted against an initiative to create universal public preschool there.

Since universal pre-K was defeated so handily by voters in California, why would people in the more conservative state of Texas be so seemingly supportive of the idea?

While the concept of giving every child the opportunity to attend preschool appears laudable, in reality it is an expensive notion that results in little but an expanded version of the struggling K-12 education bureaucracy and a massive financial hit to taxpayers.

When faced with the decision, California voters realized that universal pre-K isn't all it's cracked up to be.

First, California voters realized universal pre-K is expensive and inefficient. California enrolls 66% of four-year-olds in public or private preschool. States with universal pre-K typically enroll about 70%, so California would have likely only placed an additional 4% of students in pre-K. Considering the \$2.4 billion allocated to the initiative, taxpayers would have spent \$100,000 per additional student! And this price

tag would likely grow; a universal pre-K program that began eight years ago in Quebec now costs 33 times more than anticipated.

In Texas, the increase

in pre-K participation would likely be even smaller. About 50% of four-year-olds already participate in statefunded pre-K or special education. Another 11% participate in the federal Head Start program, and an estimated 35% are enrolled in private preschool, although there may be some overlap in the programs. Still, staggeringly number - up to 95% - of Texas four-year-olds participate in some sort of preschool program, and it is unlikely that universal pre-K would increase this number.

California voters also realized pre-K may not be the best option for all children. Studies claiming positive returns on spending in pre-K largely include only lowincome, minority, and at-risk children. In fact, one study examining the effects of preschool non-disadvantaged students found no longterm benefits. Research out of England suggests that the best environment for most young children is at home with a parent.

And a 2005 Stanford-UC Berkeley study concluded that centerbased preschool can actually have a negative effect on social skills, especially for low-income children.

Despite these findings, only 8.4% of the funding California would have gone to enroll high-risk students in preschool. California voters apparently decided it would be better to target limited taxpayer resources to those students only, rather than wasting more than 90% of the proposed funding on kids who would receive no academic benefit.

Finally, California voters realized universal public pre-K would likely decimate the private sector, shutting down thousands of private preschools and actually reducing choices for parents. While a system could be structured to include private providers, it is unknown what effect increased government regulation (and increased costs) would have on those providers.

According to one estimate, universal pre-K would cost Texas taxpayers \$2.3 billion – all for a program that has failed to demonstrate long-term positive effects in other states and countries.

Just as in California, universal pre-K is a losing proposition for Texas taxpayers, parents, and children.

Baby boomers need to avoid the "legacy gap"

• Durable General Power of Attorney - This document allows your parents to appoint another person to conduct their business affairs if they become physically or mentally incapacitated.

In addition, you will want to look over the beneficiary designations on your parents' life insurance contracts and qualified plans, such as 401(k)s and IRAs. It's especially important to update these designations if remarriages and stepchildren are part of your family picture.

Of course, it's not easy to manage the estateplanning process. So, in addition to working with an attorney, you and your parents may well want to consult with a tax advisor to make sure everyone's interests are protected.

Do whatever you can to help your parents leave the legacies they desire. You'll be doing them a great service - and you could be taking a large burden off their minds.

OW DOES YOUR GARDEN GROW?

We all know that a first impression counts, and at no time does that hold more true than when a potential buyer approaches your home. Regardless of how much you've cleaned and improved the interior, the buyers' decision is often made in just

YOUR seconds, before they've even entered the home.

By spending just one to two percent of your home's value on improving its "curb appeal," you could boost your sale price by five percent. Interior upgrades sometimes only recoup eighty to ninety percent of the investment, so carefully consider how you'll budget your home preparation costs.







Jones entertains pilots

Curran L. "Jack" Jones of Holland held court at the Stagecoach Inn in Salado on June 27, relating events that he was involved in over 60 years ago to four people from Southern California who had traveled from san Antonio to Salado to meet him.

MacWilliams Scott Newport of Beach, California, vice president/ treasurer of Friends of the American Fighter Aces, and Dennis Thomas of Moreno Valley, California, president, were in San Antonio for the 47th annual reunion of the American Fighter Aces Association which was held at the Hyatt Regency from Thursday, June 29 to Sunday, July 2. The two were accompanied by Thomas' wife and brother.

To be eligible for membership in the AFAA, you had to e a fighter pilot who shot down five or more enemy aircraft in air-to-air combat. Retired Air Force Colonel Jones is a five victory ace and a member of the AFAA. The Friends of the AFAA are people who have an interest in the aces and their history, and so they came to meet one

in Central Texas.

In May of last year, Jones was invited by Southern California Friends to be on a panel of aces from the Pacific and China Theatres of World War II. Unfortunatley, Jones was not able to make the trip. After meeting two other pilots from Jones 35th Fighter Group who did participate, Thomas and MacWilliamson were eager to meet Jones.

"We've seen pictures and stories about Jack in at least ten different books," said MacWilliams. "And since he couldn't make the trip to California, we decided we would go to him."

MacWilliams considers it an honor to have met Jones. In fact, he called it the highlight of his trip. "He's living history. These guys were there right at the beginning of the war when things were really bad. They were undertrained, out-numbered an ill-equipped. They were flying the obsolete P-35 Airacobra, which was no match for the much faster, higher flying Japanese airpplane over New Guinea on June 9, 1942 in his single engine P-400, which was the export version of the P-39, intended for delivery to the British. he did it to protect Lyndon

Johnson, who was an official observer from Washington, D.C., sent there to see how General Douglas MacArthur was doing in New Guinea.

The purpose and goal of the Friends of the American Fighter Aces is to educate the public on the accomplishments and sacrifices of the fighter aces and to perpetuate the history, according to Mac-Williams. "These guys are all getting up there in age (Jones will be 87 in October), and somebody has to keep their memory alive after they're gone."

Colonel Jones spent about two hours with his visitors, telling stories, anwering questions and autographing some books they had brought along especially for the occasion.

A special part of the meeting came when Jones' wife, Joyce, appeared with a framed picture and letter. The picture was of Jones in front of his P-38 (the plane that replaced the out-dated P-39's, and which Jones referred to as "assisted living"). The letter was one he had written to his mother during the war.

Jones is a member of the Holland Chamber and Holland American Legion.

Boutwell, 2006 Texas State Artist, returns to Salado for his 38th Art Fair

The Salado Art Fair marks it's 40th anniversary this year and George Boutwell has shown his work at the last 38 of them. To recognize the Texas artist's loyalty over the years, the Art Fair is honoring Boutwell as this year's Poster Artist, and he responded by producing a scene specifically for the occasion.

For the past 34 years George Boutwell's full time occupation has been touring Texas showing his art and searching for interesting things to paint. Over his long career, Boutwell has risen to a position of prominence in the world of Texas artists. Though born in Connecticut in 1943, Boutwell's family eventually found their way to Texas by the time George had entered the first grade.

Self taught because he could not afford formal art lessons, Boutwell sketched constantly, sometimes completing as many as 100 per day, and absorbed every book on art in the public library.

finding After employment professional artist, Boutwell finally had the opportunity and income to enroll in the professional art classes that he had so long desired. Success soon followed, and just recently, Boutwell was selected by the Texas State Legislature and the Texas Commission on the Arts to be the 2006 Texas State Artist in the category of twodimensional art. A former art director for Texas Highways Magazine, Boutwell has been a fulltime working artist since 1973. In addition to being named Texas State Artist, Boutwell also rendered a painting of Hank Aaron's record-setting 715th homerun, which hangs in the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, NY.

One thing that Boutwell has earned a reputation for is his calendar work, featuring scenes of Texas. He self-produced and published his first calendar in 1986, and has produced one every year since, with each year highlighting a different

aspect of the Texas landscape. For example, the 2006 version features Spanish missions of Texas. Some area landmarks Boutwell has painted over the years include the Westphalia Store, the Westphalia Church, Saint Paul's Church near Marlin, Blue Ridge Baptist Church near Marlin, The Bell County Courthouse, The Coryell County Courthouse, Health Camp Restaurant in Waco, Hill County Courthouse, The Texas Theater in Hillsboro and the Ellis County Courthouse. At this year's Art Fair, Boutwell will have not only a selection of his original watercolors and prints, but also copies

of his previous calendars.







Wilsonart prez speaks to Rotary Bill DeGaetano, it began in Los Angeles Transferture in the I



President of Wilsonart International, provided the Rotary Club of Salado with an overview of the company which employs over 1,700 Central Texans at its Temple facilities.

DeGaetano, a 25-year employee of Wilsonart, gave a short history of the company, explaining that it began in Los Angeles over 50 years ago, and was originally named American Desk.

A customer was instrumental in having the company move to Temple. It has since grown to be the largest manufacturer of its type, passing Formica several years ago, De-Gaetano noted. Wilsonart now employs over 3,500 people worldwide.

In 1967, the company was acquired by Rexall/Dart, and was once part of Kraft Foods. They are now a subsidiary ITW, which also manufactures a variety of items, including auto parts.

Wilsonart itself, De-Gaetano continued, is a company valued at \$13 billion. Laminates, adhesives and edge molding are manufactured in Temple.

The company, says DeGaetano, has always had the business model of "common sense" and was one of the first to employ the strategy of "just-intime" inventory, where

the company warehouses only 15 days worth of inventory in 24 different locations throughout the country, while at the same time guaranteeing sevento-10 day delivery from order and manufacture to delivery. As a result of successfully maintaining this policy, DeGaetano says that the company has retained some of its customers for over 50 years.

Wilsonart is a fully international company, with about 10 percent of its business outside the U.S. and sales offices throughout the world. In spite of the pressure to move manufacturing out of the country Wilsonart has maintained 97 percent of its domestic product

manufacture in the U.S. The company's number one product is "high pressure laminate," noted DeGaetano. Some of the more interesting products are digital reproduction laminates carrying logos or photos; DiGaetano used a Coke laminate to demonstrate.

In addition to laminate, a number of other products are now being produced. Wilsonart started the manufacture of flooring in 1995, and now also make decorative metals for customers such as casinos, and produce solid surfacing called Gibralter.

DeGaetano repeatedly talked with pride of the company's "support of employees"; these activities include matching charitable donations, and sponsoring of youth sports activities. The company is also major contributors to the community in organizations such as United way, Ralph Wilson Youth Club, and Scott and White Hospital, he said.

Specific questions on nutrition

I seem to struggle with my blood sugar levels. What are some simple ideas to balance out my energy with proper nutrition?

Resistance Training -Are you taking part in any type of resistance training exercise program? Most people don't realize this, but resistance training is a great way to fight insulin LIFESTYLE AND WELLNESS

resistance. The point is simple; make your muscles use up the stored glycogen so the glucose in the blood stream has a place to go. If your muscles are unable to absorb the glucose circulating in the bloodstream, your adipose (fat) will. This will put you on the fast track toward creating the disease Type II Diabetes (Adult Onset).

What is the best way for me to get all of the nutrients I need to have for optimum health?

Improve the quality of all of your foods. Begin moving to organically raised/grown foods and away from conventionally farmed foods. We were created to digest, absorb and assimilate foods in their natural states, so cut back or avoid all altered/ manufactured foods. Make sure to improve the variety of foods you are consuming as well.

If, after improving your quality of food intake, and you still would like to increase your nutrient intake at this point. Begin a daily regimen of one of these super-foods: wheat grass, barley grass or a mixture of green vegetable

If you still want to add a vitamin/mineral complex to your daily regimen, make sure it comes from a

whole food source, and is not synthetic.

A special note on supplements:

The supplement industry is a very poorly regulated industry. The majority of the supplements on the market, unless entitled "pharmaceutical grade," have little to no resemblance to what the label says.

My wife and I have been following a nutritional program for about two months now, she looks and feels great, I have gained weight and feel awful, how can that be?

Welcome to individuality; chemical a term that explains the

differences between one human's metabolism and another's. Because of this bio-chemical individuality one meal can help one person to lose fat and feel great, another to have no response at all, and still another to gain weight and feel horrible.

Why? We are all different. I personally am a Protein Type and I need to consume fatty proteins throughout the day or I will not function well. If I were to go on a low-fat or non-fat high carbohydrate regimen I would not only feel lousy but I would be on my way to creating Adult Onset Diabetes (I would have a very difficult controlling weight). I don't do well with a large amount of carbohydrates at all. Some people are Carbohydrate Types and others Mixed CONTINUED ON PAGE 12B







Light summer grilling ideas

Grilled Fish Tacos with Thai Slaw

This Asian twist on typical Baja fish tacos is a celebration of colors and textures with chewy purple cabbage, crisp red onion, creamy green avocado and crunchy orange carrots. The Thai flavors of lime, peanut, chili and a hint of coconut bring new life to a Southern California classic. Grilling the fish makes these tacos lighter and healthier than the common battered and fried version.

Serves 4-6

Fish Marinade

- 1/2 cup tamari
- 1/4 cup lime juice (about 2 juicy limes)
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 TB red chili paste
- 2 garlic cloves
- 1 TB honey
- 1/4 cup coconut milk
- 2 lbs mahi mahi, skin removed

Thai Slaw Dressing

- · 1 TB fish sauce
- 1/4 cup lime juice (about 2 juicy limes)
- 2 tsp sesame oil
- 1 tsp red chili paste
- 1/2 cup coconut milk
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- maple syrup (optional)
- red pepper flakes (optional)

Thai Slaw

- 2 cups red cabbage, thinly sliced
- 2 carrots, shaved or peeled
- 1/2 cup daikon, cut into matchsticks
- 1/2 medium red onion, thinly sliced
- 3 TB cilantro, chopped
- Flour tortillas
- · avocados, sliced

To marinate fish, whisk together tamari, lime juice, water, red chili paste, garlic, honey and coconut milk. Pour over fish and marinate one hour in refrigerator.

To make slaw dressing, combine fish sauce, lime juice, sesame oil, red chili paste, coconut milk and peanut butter in small pot over medium-low heat. Cook, stirring often, for 5 minutes. Taste and add a bit of maple syrup if more sweetness is desired and red pepper flakes if more spice is needed.

Combine red cabbage, carrots, daikon, red onion and cilantro. Mix in one-half of the slaw dressing.

Preheat grill to medium heat. When ready, cook fish on oiled grill surface, around 5 to 7 minutes on each side or until fish is opaque and flakes easily with a fork. To warm tortillas while grilling fish, wrap tortilla stack in aluminum foil and place on grill grate over low heat, turning once while fish cooks. Remove fish and roughly chop. Serve fish in warm tortillas, topped with Thai slaw, sliced avocados and extra Thai slaw dressing.

Grilled Pineapple & Mango with Balsamic Glaze Gluten-Free, Vegetarian

Add a scoop of vanilla ice cream for a perfect summer dessert.

Serves 6-8

- 1/2 cup balsamic vinegar
- 3/4 cup unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 2 TB honey
- 2 TB fresh mint or basil leaves, chopped
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 ripe pineapple, peeled, cored, and cut into rings
- 1 ripe mango, sliced lengthwise
- Skewers (metal skewers or wooden skewers soaked in water 1 hour)

Prepare grill for cooking.

In a small saucepan over high heat, boil the balsamic vinegar for 5 minutes to reduce by half. In a small bowl, combine the reduced vinegar with the butter, honey, basil and salt. Whisk the butter until smooth and all ingredients are blended.

Thread a pineapple ring onto each skewer and lightly brush with balsamic glaze. When fire is medium-hot (you can hold your hand 5 inches above rack 3 to 4 seconds), grill fruit in batches on lightly oiled grill rack, turning once, until browned and slightly softened, about 5 minutes total. 





Bridge

Contract

From the very start, a fine declarer envisages the play of the hand as a whole. He is careful not to segregate the problem of how to play to a particular trick from the problem of how to play the entire hand.

Take this case where West leads the ten of hearts against three notrump. It is certainly not difficult for South to conclude that East has a string of hearts headed by the A-J.

Ordinarily, declarer would play the queen from dummy to assure himself of two heart tricks. Certainly, in most hands, that would be the right way to handle the suit.

But here the proper play is the nine of hearts, not the queen. The purpose is to get East to duck. South should be focused more on the importance of winning the first trick than in creating an extra trick in the heart suit.

East is likely to duck if the nine is played -- and if he does, South makes the contract. He wins with the king, overtakes the queen of clubs with dummy's king, takes a diamond finesse and finishes with nine tricks consisting of a heart, six diamonds and two clubs.

Of course, East might prove to be a suspicious soul. When the nine is played from dummy, he might start asking himself all kinds of questions and conclude that something is rotten in the state of Denmark. He might then go up with the ace in order to lead the K-Q and another spade, defeating the contract.

Declarer cannot force East to duck the heart by playing the nine, but he is more likely to accomplish his purpose by doing so. If the queen is played instead, East is sure to take the ace and will most probably shift to a spade on the assumption that South has two heart tricks coming.

Declarer thus shapes his play with an eye on the contract rather than on the extra heart trick he can make.

the Board of Aldermen supports the rights of private property owners and advocates clarity, predictability, and efficiency in the Village's regulatory program; and

the Texas Legislature altered the general rule, through adoption of Chapter 245, Texas Local Government Code ("LGC 245" or "Chapter 245"), by requiring that each permit in a series of permits required for a development project be subject to only the regulations in effect at the time of the application for the project's first permit, and not any intervening regulations; and

pursuant to Texas Local Government Code Section 211.006(a), the Board of Aldermen has the authority to establish procedures for enforcing its zoning regulations and boundaries; and

pursuant to Texas Local Government Code Section 212.002, the Board of Aldermen has the authority to establish rules governing plats and subdivisions of land; and

the Board of Aldermen finds that it is necessary and proper for the good government, peace or order of the Village of Salado to adopt an ordinance establishing a framework within which property owners and the Village can determine what projects have obtained Grandfathered Development Status under certain regulations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Aldermen of the Village of Salado:

ENACTMENT

The Village of Salado hereby adopts the Grandfathered Development Status Ordinance, which is attached hereto and incorporated into this Ordinance for all intents and purposes.

PASSED AND APPROVED this, the 20th day of July 2006, by a vote of 3 (ayes) to 0 (nays) to 0 (abstentions) of the Board of Aldermen of Salado, Texas.

Whatever happened to all the electric cars from the 90s?

Dear EarthTalk: I'm familiar with the hybrid cars now widely available, but what ever happened to the purely electric cars that were around 10 years --Peter Zilly, Bellingham, WA

The main problem with the electric cars that reared their heads briefly a decade ago was their ability to only go so far on battery power. Charges lasted just 50 miles or so, so you were in trouble if you needed to go farther or ran out of juice somewhere in-between electric outlets. Hybrids, on the other hand, which have side-by-side electric and gas motors, never need to be plugged in and instead use the motions of their gas-powered engines (as well as those of the car's wheels and brakes)

to keep their batteries charged at all times. And with a huge infrastructure of gas stations, refueling is always as easy as pulling over to fill up.

Electric car advocates have long touted their alternative vehicles as primarily short-distance commuter cars. At a 50mile range, most electric cars could make such short trips without the need for recharging. One need only plug their vehicle into an electric outlet in the garage overnight to charge up the battery for the morning commute,

and if needed then plug it in at the office for the return trip later.

But most people want more from their cars than just the daily commute--and gassing up takes minutes whereas recharging takes hours--so

sufficient demand never materialized. Hybrids, though they do use gasoline, are as versatile as conventional cars--and the coming "plug-in hybrids" (covered previously in this column) promise to substantially

efficiency, to perhaps 100 miles per gallon or more, by using the electric motor exclusively for short runs and commutes and the gas engine only for long trips.

working to improve them. Technological advances in battery life and engine efficiency mean that electric vehicles may be able to roam farther than ever before. According to EVWorld.com, drivers looking to go electric will soon have a few options:

California-based Tesla Motors will soon be accepting deposits on orders for its Tesla Roadster, and plans its first deliveries for 2007. Tesla claims its car can go 250 miles on a charge, which can even be extended further through its "regenerative braking" technology, similar to that which is employed in the hybrids.

And Spokane, Washington's Commuter Car Corporation is taking orders for its Tango 600 (a kit you have to assemble) and its Tango 100 and 200 models (fully assembled). with plans to deliver by 2007. Actor George Clooney was Commuter Car's first customer. The Tango can only go 60-80 miles on a charge, but boasts of its ability to go zero to 60 in four seconds and attain a top speed of 150 miles per hour.

Elsewhere. Californiabased AC Propulsion is working with Toyota on a Scion electric conversion, and Cleanova, based in France, is developing an electric Renault Kangoo, a popular European car.

consideration to keep in mind about electric vehicles is that, if your utility is a dirty coal-fired plant, tapping that power could mean creating more pollution than driving a gasoline powered car. But progress in renewable energies may well solve that problem and help usher in a new era for electric vehicles.


