## Hazards, budgets, buildings top Aldermen's agenda

Salado aldermen adopted a Hazard Mitigation Plan, discussed the 2007-08 budget and considered the recommendations of the Building Ordinance Review Committee among other business during their Sept. 6 meeting.

Aldermen adopted the Hazard Mitigation Plan. The Mitigation Plan establishes a Hazard Mitigation Planning group as a permanent community advisory body. Members shall serve one-year terms. The group is charged with surpervising the implementation of the Plan's recommendations within the Village's funding abil-

Other responsibilities of the Hazard Mitigation Plan Group include reporting annually to the Board of Aldermen with the following information:

- An annual review and/or update of the origi-
- · A review of any disaster or emergencies that occurred during the previous calendar year.
- A review of the actions taken, including what was accomplished during the year.
  - A discussion of any

implementation problems.

 Recommendations for new projects or revised action items. Such recommendations shall be subject to approval by the Village of Salado.

The report will also be submitted to the Central Texas Council of Governments, the state Division of Emergency Management and the Federal **Emergency Management** Agency.

## Salado ISD begins work on revisiting long range plan

The long range plan for volvement. Salado schools, Superintendent Robin Battershell told a group of citizens Sept. 10, is a chance "to look at our district through new eyes."

Dr. Battershell told the groups before they split into individual committees for organizational discussions that the "goal of long range planning is to provide direction for the school district over five years."

"It is not stagnant," she added. "It will probably change, but it is a general direction."

Members of Academic Excellence committee are chair Dr. Jean Kemp and Janet Kemp. Areas of responsibility include technology, curriculum, professional development, academic standards, policy, community education and special programs.

Members of Facilities and Finance are Rodney Bell, Clint Young, Lyndal Cabaniss. Areas of responsiblity include renovation projects, updates, new buildings, athletics/fine arts/career technology facilities, investment, fund balance, new campuses and timelines for growth.

Personnel/Human Resources committee members are Darlene Kirk, Joe Palmer. Areas of responsibility are certification, recruitment, retention, professional development, salaries and benefits.

Safety and Discipline commitee is headed by Joelle Wall. Its areas of concern are building security,

school/campus discipline, training, health, wellness, safety, crisis plan, parent and community communication.

**Community Awareness** and Parent Involvement members include Jessica Beyer, Audrey Gonzalez and Bob Roehmer. Its areas of concern include informing the public, bringing parents into the schools and involving other community members in the school.

After recruiting other members to the committees, the committees will begin meeting to review the previous Long Range Plans for completion, determine what information is needed to discuss the LRP. brainstorm, revise the plan and prioritize it before the groups gather again in January.

## **FEMA** denies public assistance for damages from June storms

Despite having more than \$400,000 in damages and losses due to the June rains and flooding, the Village of Salado will not get Public Assistance from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Salado alderman Forrest Holloway informed his fellow board members of this during their regular meeting Sept. 6.

Representatives from FEMA and the State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA) met with representatives from local

governing entities such as Temple, Belton, Killeen Salado and Bell County on Aug. 29 to determine the extent of damage to Bell County from the June flooding.

Police Chief Alan Rogers and alderman Holloway represented the Village of Salado in the determination meeting.

In order for Bell County to be eligible to receive public assistance from FEMA, the damage totals had to be more than \$700,000 county wide.

Salado's damages were determined to be \$417,890. Damages for the entire rest of the county were determined to be \$140,000.

Damages that were included in the estimate including Pace Park and Pace Park Dr. where damages were determined to be more than \$175,000, and the low water crossings in Mill Creek where damages were determined to be more than \$125,000.

Physical damages to Chisholm Trail, Whispering Oaks and Blaylock Drive were estimated at about \$60,000.

## **Exit Karl Rove**

Karl Rove loomed so large in our politics that no one could see him clearly. He was both underestimated and overestimated, and he leaves the White House with both significant political achievements and frustrated ambitions.

The underestimated Rove was never just a political consultant, but a keen policy mind. In baseball, he'd be called a five-tool player. He talked about Medicare Part B as fluidly and persuasively as he did voting trends in Indiana's 8th Congressional District. In terms of his importance to both governing and politicking, the only figure that comes close to him in recent memory is former Reagan and Bush I official James Baker.

The overestimated Rove saw his critics attribute practically anything they didn't like in American politics to him. For all his talent, he was one man. He didn't orchestrate every development harmful to liberalism throughout the past 6 1/2 years, nor did he stomp on puppies and kick children on the way to work every morning. His White House co-workers, almost to a person, say he was an honorable and kind colleague.

While Rove obviously had a profound influence in the Bush administration, Bush still would have signed the No Child Left Behind education law, cut taxes, nominated conservative judges, waged the war on terror and invaded Iraq without him. It has been a parlor game during the entire Bush presidency to identify the real driving force in the Bush administration -- sometimes it's been Vice President Dick Cheney, sometimes Rove -- when history will show that it was Bush himself all along.

Bush-haters focused their vitriol on Rove, and it became all the more venomous for its misdirection. The energy the left devoted to the Valerie Plame flap can't be understood outside of the imperative

to "get Rove." All the supposed scandals congressional Democrats are now obsessing over will lose some of their "oomph" as Rove, their white whale, slips off into the distance under his own power.

For all the investigating, he was never plausibly accused of anything particularly out of bounds, let alone criminal. His besetting sin was winning elections.

It's in his ambition to realign American politics that he fell short. Big government "compassionate conservatism" degraded into the indefensible excesses of the late GOP congressional majority. The vision of an "ownership society" foundered with the failure of Social Security reform. Outreach to Hispanics backfired when it was based on a nonenforcement of immigration laws offensive to law-and-order conservatives.

On top of all this came the crushing charge of incompetence that threatens to overwhelm all else in the Bush legacy. Rove can't be blamed for that. He didn't run the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and he wasn't in charge of Phase IV post-combat military operations in Iraq. But the issue of competence alone ensures that there will be no Bush Republicans next year. The question for the GOP presidential candidates isn't whether to distance themselves from Bush, but how far and how soon.

If a Republican wins the presidency in 2008, it will have to be Rove-style -- a masterful, but narrow victory won in parlous political circumstances.

asked if enough money was being dedicated to street maintenance and repair. The street maintenance budget maintains the same amount for street resurfacing, \$35,000, but cuts the amount for potholes from \$4,000 this vear to \$2,000 next year. The Village will no longer contract for repairing pot holes and instead the Village maintenance worker will repair pot holes.

"We should have someone with the proper equipment do a survey of our roads and tell us exactly what condition they are in," alderman Michael Cooper said, so that the Village can plan accordingly how best to spend its limited road dollars. He added that he knew of a firm that had done this type of survey work both Georgetown and Round

Cooper added that he had recently driven all of the roads in Salado to get



an idea of their condition, rating them on a scale of 10. "The vast majority of our streets," he said, "I rated as an eight. Very few did I rate below a five."

"I did not see as much damage to the roads from the flood as I thought there would be," he said.

The Sept. 6 meeting was the first of two public hearings on the proposed \$650,000 budget that will approximately require \$70,000 in deficit spending. Income for 2007-08 is estimated at \$587,800, which is about \$16,000 more than the current year budgeted income. With \$648,625 in expenses before a \$6,000 Capital Outlay for a future police car, the Village reserve will dip from the \$220,028 anticipated to start the fiacal vear Oct. 1 to \$159.203 at the end of 2007-08 budget

The \$648,625 in expenses for 2007-08 is more than \$50,000 above the current year budgeted expenses, excluding the \$38,000 capital outlay for a new police car in 2006-

In addition to raises for Village employees, increased professional fees for planning and inspections, the proposed budget includes \$30,000 for hiring a City Manager for part of the year. Hiring a City Manager is one of the long-term goals that the Board of Aldermen have adopted for the Village.

administrative The expenses, including the professional fees and city manager's position, increases from \$161,070 this year to \$223,685 in 2007-08. The Village is anticipated to spend \$86,000 - 13 percent – of the budget on

professional fees; among those fees are \$24,000 for planning, \$15,000 for engineering, \$7,000 for auditing, \$20,000 for inspections and \$20,000 for legal

The police department budget is lower in the proposed budget, \$216,450, than in the current year budget, \$217,050. The only cuts in the police department budget are \$4,600 from equipment and forms, bringing it to \$4,400 and \$2,600 from crime prevention reducing it to \$3,000.

No citizens' comments were given during the first public hearing on the budget Sept. 6. The second public hearing on the proposed budget is Sept. 20, after which the board of aldermen will adopt the budget.

Building Ordinance Re-

The Village should rewrite the permit application so that it is more user-friendly. The permit application for specific types of construction – car ports, room additions and the like - should reflect submittal items required for that type of construction and Burea Veritas, with whom the Village contracts for inspection services, would make themselves available to each contractor to discuss submittal requirements if necessary. Permit applications would be on the Village of Salado printed forms. The fee structure should remain the same, however, it should be review to determine that the Village is not losing money. The Village should continue to use the 2001 Building International

These were the five recommendations of the Building Ordinance Review committee appointed last fall by the Board of Aldermen last year and chaired by Alderman Merle Stalcup.

"The committee decided that the codes were not the problem." Stalcup stated in his report to the board, "However, it was the administrative )the process and the forms) as well as the fees for the construction."

The committee researched other possible firms to perform inspection and site plan review for the Village. Three firms made presentations to the committee and to the board of aldermen: MetroCode, Inspection Tech Services and Bureau

A week after entering into a contract with the Village to conduct inspections and site plan review, Metrocode backed out of the agreement. The Village continues to use Burea Veritas for inspections and site plan review.

Aldermen took no action on the committee's recommendation.

#### **Tourism Chair**

Aldermen also approved John Anderson, chief executive officer of Stagecoach Properties, Inc., to serve a one-year term as chair of the Tourism Council. The Tourism Council will oversee a \$300,000 budget in 2007-08 after the occupancy tax





## **Eagles travel to Hamilton**

Salado Eagles travel to Hamilton to face the Bulldogs at 7:30 p.m. Sept. 14, after beating the Bulldogs' cross-district rival Mc-Gregor handily 29-7 last week.

With a chance to start the season 3-0, Coach Jeff Cheatham is looking at his best start since coming to head the Salado program.

Both teams bring 2-0 records into the contest. While Salado has handled perennial tough guys West and McGregor, Hamilton's earlier opponents were not as powerful: tiny A Hico

and Jarrell, which placed third in District 26AA last year behind Salado.

Hamilton is picked third in District 21-2A behind McGregor at number one. The Bulldogs went 9-2 last year, 4-1 in district play.

They return 11 offensive players and 12 defensive players from last year's squad, including four offensive starters and six defensive starters.

Jordan Lowe (5-10, 155 lbs.) moved from wide receiver last year to running back this year and

will bring plenty of speed out of the backfield as will running back Garrett Bax. The offensive line is anchored by Mayton Stork (6-4, 210 lb.), a three year starter for the Bulldogs.

On the other side of the ball, Asa Hamilton, an all-district selection, and Seth LeBlanc will tie up the line for Hamilton as defensive tackles.

Hamilton is a runheavy offense, so look to the battle being decided at the line of scrimmage, where Salado definitely holds the edge.

#### Salado beats Bulldogs 29-7

## **Eagles 2-0 after McGregor**

Stopping McGregor on a fourth down punt attempt and then scoring on their first play from scrimmage, the Salado Eagles controlled the momentum of their Sept. 7 contest, beating the speedy McGregor Bulldogs 29-7 on their home turf.

The Eagles scored on their first offensive play when Seth Collins ran for seven yards, after the Salado defense stopped McGregor on a fourth down punt attempt early in the first quarter.

Salado then controlled the rest of the four quarters, never trailing and holding McGregor scoreless in the first half.

Leo Galvan dove in from the one yard line midway through the second quarter to put Salado up by two touchdowns. touchdown capped a 57 yard drive highlighted by runs of 14 yards and 13 yards respectively by Galvan and Seth Collins. David Rosenau hit senior tight end Blake Heller for a 17 yard pass after scrambling out of the pocket on a third down and 13 to move the ball to the McGregor eight yard line. Jerod Lutz pushed it to the one yard line before Galvan dove into the end zone. Matt Fritsch scored a two point conversion to bring the score to 15-7.

The home team Bull-dogs' only score came on a five yard touchdown run by Joe Seward midway through the third quarter.

Seward's touchdown was the finishing touch to a 53 yard drive, the key play of which was a 33 yard pass from Seward to Marcus Thompson on a third down and 14. The PAT brought the score to 15-7 at 6:02 in the third.

The rest of the game belonged to Salado as the Eagles scored twice in the remaining six minutes of the third quarter.

The Eagles drove 67 yards in five plays, including back-to-back runs of 34 yards and 14 yards by Galvan. Fritsch, stepping into the quarterback slot briefly while Rosenau's ankle was wrapped on the sideline, scored on an eight yard run for the Eagles with 4:02 left in the third quarter. Galvan booted the extra point for a 22-7 lead.

Salado then surprised the Bulldogs on the ensuing kick off with a high short kick that John Cruz fell on for the Eagles at the McGregor 40 yard line.

Rosenau hit Heller for a 13 yard touchdown on third down and eight nine plays later with 1:25 left in the third quarter. Galvan's boot made the final score 29-7 as the teams swapped possession throughout the fourth quarter.

Salado amassed 325 yards of total offense, 209 on the ground and 116 through the air, while the stingy Eagle defense held McGregor to 160 yards total offense, almost all of it -- 133 yards -- coming through the passing game.

McGregor's senior quarterback Joe Seward

threw the ball 37 times, with 13 completions and one interception. His favorite targets were Nic Clark, three catches for 42 yards, and Marcus Thompson, three catches for 54 yards.

Salado senior quarterback David Rosenau had 10 completions on 19 throws for 116 yards and one touchdown. His top receivers were Leo Galvan, three catches for 37 yards, Blake Heller, two nabs for 30 yards and one touchdown catch, and Jerod Lutz, three catches for 22 yards.

Galvan led all rushers with 90 yards on 10 carries and one touchdown, while Seth Collins had 82 yards on 15 carries and a touchdown.

Salado had 15 first downs during the game and did not turn the ball over to McGregor.

Matt Fritsch had nine tackles, one solo, two knocked down passes and an interception to lead the Salado Eagles defense.

Other defensive standouts were these:

Garret Ward, five tackles, one solo, a quarterback hurry and five knocked down passes.

Patrick Prince, eight tackles, one solo, a tackle for loss and a quarterback hurry.

Blake Heller, five tackles, a tackle for loss, a quarterback hurry and the Big Hit of the night.

Josh Bush, six tackles; Tyler Coker, five tackles; Tyler Wright, three solo tackles, two knocked down passes.



was increased from four percent to seven percent earlier this year. Anderson has completed one threeyear term on the Tourism Council.

He will take the seat vacated by Suzi Epps, as aldermen can no longer serve as chairmen of standing committees. The Tourism Council has two vacancies on it, after implementing term limits; Epps and former aldermen Jackie Mills will leave the Council at the end of the month.

#### Gravel Removal


Lakeview Services offered to remove the gravel that has piled up at the low water crossing of Salado Creek in Mill Creek at no cost to the Village. The firm did this for the Village in 2005 for \$7,000, removing 100 truckloads of gravel that moved downstream by rains to collect at the bridge.

"Any gravel the city might want to save and stockpile," Richard Waters, owner of Lakeview Services, stated in an Aug. 2 letter, "we will stockpile within the city boundaries for \$100 load."

The rest of the gravel, presumably, would be stockpiled elsewhere for use by Lakeview Services.

Aldermen took no action on the proposal. Instead, the Village will investigate whether the gravel from Salado Creek can be given away in such a manner. The Village has a permit to remove gravel from the stream that is good until June 2008.

Alderman Cooper recommended that the Village review the permit and make sure that the Village is not doing something that it shouldn't by allowing him to reuse the gravel. "The gravel belongs to the state of Texas," Cooper said.







## **Cook places at National debate**

The Salado Debate team traveled to Dallas to compete in the 19th Annual Grapevine Classic TFA and TOC qualifier Sept. 7-8 at Grapevine High School. The debate tournament is considered one of the premier tournaments in the nation.

Salado High School Junior Tyler Cook was named Second Speaker in Lincoln-Douglas debate at the meet.

One hundred and twenty two Lincoln-Douglas debaters from fifteen states participated in the tournament. In attendance were some extremely prominent debate programs throughout the nation: Bellaire High School (TX), Bronx Science (NY), Caddo Magnet High School (LA), Dowl-

sic is a qualifier for the National Tournament of Champions in LD. It is regarded as the championship tournament of the "national circuit." In order to qualify, competitors in Lincoln-Douglas Debate must earn two bids at designated qualifying tournaments. Some of these designated tournaments are: Barkley Forum (GA, Greenhill School (TX), Harvard University (MA), University of California at Berkeley (CA), Wake Forest University (NC), Yale University (CT), and University of Texas at Austin (TX).

The Salado Debate team will compete next at the 21st annual Greenhill Fall Classic Debate Tournament on September 15-17. Last year, 130 schools and 121 Lincoln-Douglas debaters from 24 states competed in the Fall Classic

The Mean Green Workshop was established in 2003 to provide a nationally-competitive debate institute. As I promised last week, this week I am going to list and review a number of high quality food sites where you can attain the best food Texas has available for you and your family. But first, I would like to add two new sites to the rather long list of sites mentioned in earlier columns.

The first site can be found at eatwellguide. org, which just may be the easiest and most comprehensive way for you to find wholesome, fresh, sustainable food. If you are interested in finding food in our area or even when you travel that is healthful, humane, better for the environment, and that supports family farmers you will want to check this site out. There is an easy to navigate search engine that will enable you to find farms, stores, other outlets and even restaurants in the United States and Canada.

The next website I might recommend is localharvest.org. This is a site that will not only help you find organic produce but will also explain the difference between certified organic, naturally grown, biodynamic, certified naturally grown, transitional, conventional, and grass-fed or pastured foods. This site also introduces the new movement of Community Supported Agriculture or CSA. "Community Supported Agriculture is a way for the food buying public to create a relationship with a farm and to receive a weekly basket of produce. By making a financial commitment to a farm, people become "members" (or "shareholders," or "subscribers") of the CSA. Most CSA farmers prefer that members pay for the season up-front, but some farmers will accept weekly or monthly payments. Some CSA's also require that members work a small number of hours on the farm during the growing season. Many farms offer produce subscriptions, where buyers receive a weekly or monthly basket of produce, flowers, fruits, eggs, milk, coffee, or any sort of different farm products."



#### **Intelligence Chief speaks to Rotary Club**

## Progress slowly being made in Iraq

The lowest number of attacks per week since August 2006.

The lowest number of Improvised Explosive Devices (IED) since April 2007

More caches of weapons have been found and confiscated through June 27, 2007 than through all of 2006.

Significant Al Qaeda and Shia extremist leaders have been eliminated or captured.

Civilian murders in Iraq and Baghdad are the lowest they have been since 2006.

These July statistics are some of the successes that Col. Jerry Tait Jr. pointed to since the surge in troops in Iraq. "You may not read or hear about these so much," Col. Tait told the Salado Rotary Club during a special luncheon meeting Aug. 27.

Col. Tait spoke before the Rotary Club the day before he returned to Iraq as the Director of Intelligence, Multi-National Corps (MNC).

The job of the military in Iraq is simple: improving security. Issues of governance and economics -- while the military presence may have some effect on those -- are "the responsibility of the State department, not the military," Col. Tait said.

When he returns to Irag, Col. Tait that he

would have 300 working directly for him. "There are 5,600 intelligence professionals in Iraq," Col. Tait said. "They are doing a great job."

Of the 172,000 MNC troops in Iraq, 160,000 are U.S. personnel.

The MNC have several priority tasks, including these:

- 1. Protect the population.
- 2. Coordinate reconciliation efforts among parties involved.
- 3. Defeat Al Qaeda Iraq and other extremist groups.
- 4. Continue to develop the ability of Iraqi Security Forces to defend the general population.
- 5. Improve the Government of Iraq capacity of self-governance.

6. Protect the force.

MNC Intelligence is working to address external influences on the war in Iraq, particularly the influence of Iran.

Iran is bringing in weapons, injecting money and training militants.

The influx of Sunni extremists into Iraq has been troublesome. The Sunnis are coming from "a whole list of countries," Col. Tait said, "but they are coming across the Syrian border."

"We are making progress with Syria on this," Col. Tait said, adding that although there have been some meetings with Iran, "the jury is still out on that one."

Col. Tait also spoke of the progress made in the transition from MNC presence to Provincial Iraqi Control (PIC).

Seven of the 18 provinces in Iraq have been turned over to PIC. However, in Iraq, "All roads lead to Baghdad," Col. Tait said.

Baghdad is still the most dangerous place in all of Iraq. "The most spectacular attacks you hear about are there," Col. Tait said, adding that most of the attacks on troops and the general population are not suicide attacks. "Suicide attacks are used for spectacular effect to try to demoralize the public."

The attacks are now happening in strange places, Col. Tait said, because the insurgents "cannot go where they used to be able to go" since the surge in troop levels.

With five additional brigades targeted for Baghdad and the surrounding area, MNC forces are working "side by side with Iraqi Army and Police forces to enforce the law," Col. Tait

said. "It is a cooperative effort."

Col. Tait explained that Iraq is not a typical insurgency. "The classic insurgency approach is to Clear, Hold and Build," he said. "In Iraq, it is Clear, Control and Retain."

After addressing the military situation in Iraq, Col. Tait discussed the governance and economic issues in the country.

One of the roles of the US presence in Iraq is to support the provincial capacity to develop itself, to support Government of Iraq's budget execution in the provinces, and support Rule of Law assistance in local provinces and to help with elections.

Another role is to help improve the economic situation in Iraq. One of the chief impacts on the national economy in Iraq is the "huge brain drain there. Over a million Iraqis have left and many of them include the top minds in all areas of business and science," Col. Tait said.

In order to promote the economy, there must be safe zones. Through loans and other programs, jobs can be created there to get the unemployment rate down from the 50 percent rate that it is now. Vocational and education programs must also be made safe for the students.


## Texian Navy Day Sept. 15

The Salado Chapter of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas will meet on Sept. 15. The program will be presented by Mary Hodge in her home on Thomas Arnold Rd.

This first meeting of the fall coincides with the celebration of Texian Navy Day. This date commemorates the engagement between a Texian privateer, the San Felipe and a Mexican war schooner, the Correo. It was the first victory in the War for Independence in Texas, happening even before the first land battle at Gonzales.

On Sept. 1, 1835 the San Felipe, transferring its passengers and cargo to the steamer Laura, was approached by the Correo. Among the passengers was Stephen F. Austin returning from his Mexican prison

Both ships made ready to board and capture the other. Heavy cannon and rifle fire was exchanged for about an hour, with the Correo sustaining heavy damage. The next morning, pursued by both the San Felipe and the Laura,

the Correo was forced to surrender, its crew taken prisoner and its cargo seized.

A month later the capture of a cannon at Gonzales sparked the first land battle of the revolution and in November the Consultation, the first revolutionary assembly of Texas, made one of its first acts the issuance of letters of marque to privateers (including the San Felipe) for protection of the Texas Coast.

The contribution of the Texian Navy is not as well-known as that of the Alamo defenders. It is easy to forget how important the waters of the Gulf were to Texas. Waterways were the highway for SEE TEXIAN NAVY PAGE 12B





Consider this case where South started with eight sure tricks and several possibilities of developing a ninth. He knew that the chance of a 3-3 division of six missing cards was about 36 percent, and that the chance of winning either of two finesses was about 75 percent. For that reason, he decided to try two club finesses rather than depend on the spades or diamonds splitting 3-3. He therefore took the heart lead with dummy's queen and led a club to the jack. West won with the queen and returned a heart to South's ace. Declarer crossed to the spade king, 119 120 121 122 led a club and finessed again. After the ten lost to West's king, South could not recover, and he finished

down one. While it is true that South ran into some bad luck, the fact remains that he should have played the hand differently. The best plan is to win the first heart with the king, lead a low spade and play low from dummy!

Let's assume a heart continuation by East, taken by South with the ace. Declarer next cashes the A-K of spades and plays a fourth spade, establishing dummy's eight of spades as his ninth trick. The queen of hearts is South's entry to the game-going trick.

The advantage of this approach is that it allows declarer to make the contract not only when the opposing spades are divided 3-3 (36 percent) but also when they are 4-2 (48 percent). Obviously, an 84 percent chance is better than a 75 percent chance. and that is good reason for declarer to select this line of play.





First, she covered the work of Woody Guthrie whose father and grandfather lived in Bell County. This was followed by a description of the arrival of the Czechs in the area, who came at a rate of 35,000 annually at the peak of their immigration.

Texas western music was pioneered by Fay Willingham, (related to the Salado Willinghams), who started the band Riders of the Purple Sage and was the first to perform Cool Water. They followed the Sons of the Pioneers as Roy Rogers back-up band. Willingham's stage name was Willing. William Warren who wrote "The Wild Side of Life (I Didn't Know God Made Honky Tonk Angels)" is buried in Hillcrest Cemetery.

Others mentioned were Joe Tex, Little Joe and la Famalia, and Blind Willie

Benoit closed the program with a history of Jules Bledsoe, of Waco, who was the son of a freed slave. His voice was so impressive that on a trip to New York Jerome Kern heard him sing and wrote

the song "Ole Man River" in Showboat especially for his voice. The original recording was played for the audience. Bledsoe went on to perform with the Metropolitan Opera. Bledsoe studied music in Chicago, Paris, and Rome. In his career he performed in operas, musicals, and motion pictures; he was also a pianist and composer. Bledsoe was just 45 years old and at the peak of his career when he died unexpectedly in Hollywood in 1943.

Benoit has an educational background in Journalism with study at LSU, UT, and culminating with a Masters degree from the University of Mary Hardin Baylor. She has lived in Texas for 30 years and now does historical research for Hillcrest Cemetery in North Temple.






