Work begins on Stagecoach

Restaurant shoots for Valentine's opening

Stagecoach Inn Restaurant may open as early as Valentine's 2017, according to general contractor Mark Rawlings.

Rawlings began work earlier this month on the restaurant, stripping it down to the bare bones.

"We're glad that the bones are in good shape," said Clark Lyda, principal of the Stagecoach 1943, LP group which now owns the Stagecoach Inn.

Nathan Quiring, project architect with Clayton and Little architects, told *Salado Village Voice* that the first focus on the overall project is "to get the restaurant up and running."

That work will include a complete remodel of the kitchen area, and a reimagining of the building that has been added to and expanded on since the original Salado Hotel and then Shady Villa opened in 1860.

"It seems like it has been added to every decade," Quiring said with a laugh.

The front entry will remain a welcoming place. Dining areas will include the glass-lined rooms surrounding the atrium, the original groundfloor rooms of the old two-story building, the large room immediately behind the entryway. The upstairs of the 1860 building will be used for small meetings and groups.

The large room on the north end of the restaurant will be used for groups and gatherings, according to Jeff Trigger, of LaCorsha, which will manage the property when it is completed.

Once the restaurant opens its doors, the Longhorn Conference Center will continue to serve in its capacity for groups and

The team put together for this project are no strangers to challenges of historic structures.

In 1998, restoration specialist Mark Rawlings turned his focus to the hotel industry beginning with the restoration of the historic Driskill Hotel in Austin.

According to his biography, other hotel clients followed including the Hilton Austin, Barton Creek Resort and Spa, Lakeway Resort, Sheraton Capitol, Vintage Villas at Lake Travis, Hilton Garden Inn, Doubletree Guest Suites, Stephen F. Austin Intercontinental, Omni Southpark, as well as the historic St. Anthony in San Antonio.

He is also the contractor for The Baker Hotel in Mineral Wells.

Jeff Trigger is the president of LaCorsha Hospitality Group. LaCorsha has developed Second Bar + Kitchen on Congress Ave. in Austin, Boiler Nine Bar + Grill, at the Seaholm Power Plant in Austin, the Hotel St. George in Marfa and Hotel Settles in Big

Search to begin for new Salado Village Administrator

Aldermen contract interim administrative services with Miller

David Miller will begin work as the interim city manager for Salado next week, working three days per week on a contract basis of \$50 per hour.

Miller was most recently the deputy city manager for the City of Bedford, a position he held for five years. He was the city manager of Kennedale. He holds a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration. He holds a Master Peace Officer certification and is a certified firefighter and certified emergency medical technician.

Aldermen voted at their Oct. 13 meeting to contract with Texas First Group on

a month-to-month basis for city administrator services following an interview with Miller in executive session.

Mayor Skip Blancett told Salado Village Voice that the Village will "begin to immediately advertise for the position."

While the aldermen want to move quickly to find a permanent city manager, Blancett said that "We want to make sure that this time we get the right person and the right contract in place."

The Village will continue to seek guidance from Kerry Sweatt, principal owner of Texas First Group, in its search for a permanent city manager, according to Blancett.

Texas First Group assisted the Village in contracting with Miller for city manager services.

According to its website, "Texas First Group was created to provide interim management services for Texas municipalities."

Aldermen voted at their Oct. 6 meeting to unilaterally sever the employment agreement with Kim Foutz, who was hired in September 2014 as village administrator.

The date of the severance is Nov. 7, according to Mayor Blancett. In the meantime, Foutz will remain on paid administrative leave, a move aldermen took on Sept. 15 when they voted to put her

on leave "for a period not to exceed 30 days under terms set by the Mayor, in order for the Mayor or his designees to conduct an investigation into complaints against the Administrator and to determine if the Administrator's employment contract should be terminated for Good Cause."

After appointing aldermen Fred Brown and Michael McDougal to conduct the investigation, Mayor Blancett announced that the city attorney would conduct the investigation.

The Oct. 6 vote to unilaterally sever the employer agreement came on a motion by alderman Amber Preston-Dankert

to follow the advice and financial support of the village insurance carriers supporting unilateral severance of the agreement.

The Village is obligated to a severance amount of 12 months of the administrator's salary current (\$80,000) plus the value of any accrued and unused vacation and sick/personal leave days. Of the severance obligation, the Village will pay \$40,000 and the Village insuror will pay \$40,000, according to Mayor Blancett.

Severance Benefits include continued health insurance benefits of \$517 per month for up to six months provided Foutz does not take earlier full time employment and ben-



efits elsewhere.

Finally, according to the employment agreement, "In the event of a Unilateral Severance, the parties agree not to make disparaging comments or statements about each oth-

The Agony of the Republicans

Less than a month before the election, the Republican speaker of the House says he won't defend or campaign with his party's presidential nominee. The nominee has responded by slamming the speaker on Twitter, and his campaign manager is accusing some (unnamed) elected Republicans of sexual harassment against

The Donald Trump campaign and the Republican Party show every sign of entering into an ugly death spiral. The revelation of the Trump "Access Hollywood" tape occasioned a historic rupture, with elected Republicans around the country denouncing Trump and calling on him to step aside.

Any hope of Trump turning a corner with his relatively competent second debate was dashed when House Speaker Paul Ryan told his colleagues that he is concentrating on saving his House majority as a check on Hillary Clin-

It is a fact that one out of two major-party presidential campaigns fail. Some fail badly. But the GOP may be about to experience an unprecedentedly wrenching debacle because its nominee is an ideological interloper with no impulse control or regard for political norms. No matter how bad or weird the campaign seems

now, it could get worse and stranger still.

Bob Dole was a horrible presidential candidate and not a particularly conservative Republican. But he was an honorable man who had a loyalty to things bigger than himself, including his political party. When Republicans had to cut him loose in 1996 to try to save their congressional majorities, he was a good and loyal soldier.

Does anyone expect that of Donald Trump? His investment in the party is nil, and he takes all slights personally, whether they are from Alicia Machado or the speaker of the

The "Access Hollywood" tape was a tipping point. In isolation, perhaps Republicans could have looked beyond it. But after o many controversies and interventions and alleged pivots, the dam finally broke.

The split creates the predicate for a GOP internal war until November and beyond. It will pit swing-state Republicans and those who want to save them, like Paul Ryan, against Trump's hard-core base and the balance of ordinary partisan Republicans. The disunity itself will be damaging and dispiriting. There will be every

incentive for Trump to exacerbate rather than try to smooth over, or at least look past, the divide. Hitting back at his party critics energizes his fans, and, if he is headed for a loss in November, it sets up a stabbed-in-the-back narrative after the election. So his party detractors are insiders, quislings and, to believe his campaign manager Kellyanne Conway, sexual harassers.

The period before the first presidential debate, when Trump pulled close to a tie with Hillary Clinton, feels like an eon ago. He had come back with a month of relative discipline beginning in mid-August that now looks like a parenthesis in an otherwise recklessly selfish campaign.

That Trump would become a poisonous wedge issue within the GOP was always a plausible worstcase scenario. Now, it is upon us. Trump supporters in the primaries wanted to "burn it down." They may well be able to point to the wreckage of the post-November GOP as an indicator of their smashing suc-


open. The sidewalks on the southbound frontage road are being completed. The last major part of the project is completing the Thomas Arnold exit.

Saving the Old Red Schoolhouse

Earlier this month, the Salado Historical Society dedicated a new Texas State Historic Commission historical marker at the Salado Civic Center. The marker commemorates the life of Alice Joy Gray Hamblem, who donated the land for a Salado Public School in 1924.

For the following 43 vears the "Red Brick Schoolhouse" located at 601 North Main Street was the only school in the district. The student enrollment gradually increased enough to need another building so in 1967 the district opened Thomas Arnold Elementary School. Students in grades seven through twelve remained in the Red Brick Schoolhouse for the next twelve years until the district opened Salado High School (which is now Salado Junior High School). The Red Brick Schoolhouse was vacant starting in 1979 and the building

gradually deteriorated to the point of almost being torn down. However, some community members and Salado High School alumni collected over \$500,000 in donations to repair and renovate the building in 1992. The building was then renamed the Salado Civic Center.

The school district continues to own the Salado Civic Center and our central office is located there. Several other organizations have rented space in the building over the last 25 years, including the

Salado Chamber of Commerce and Visitor's Center, the Village of Salado, the Salado Public Library, the Salado Historical Society, and the Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools (TAPPS). Each of these organizations eventually relocated to another location.

Last month the school district began a seven year lease with Bell County for three of the offices downstairs in the Civic Center. This space is for the five Bell County employees, including Justice of

the Peace Don Engleking and Constable Rolly Correa, who were previously leasing space at Horizon Bank.

The Civic Center also has large and small meeting rooms used by many other groups, including the Salado Lions Club, Salado Community Choir, Hidden Springs Homeowners Association, ESL and GED classes, wedding receptions and family reunions. In addition to recognizing Alice Joy Gray Hamblem for generously donating the land back in 1924,

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


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Paul's Journey performs at Cedar Valley Baptist Oct. 29

Tim Cook Named to TFA Hall of Fame

Salado speech and debate coach Tim Cook was inducted into the Texas Forensic Association Hall of Fame at the annual TFA convention in San Antonio on October 6. Cook will join three other inductees as a member of the 2016-17 class of the Hall of Fame.

"Tim is a role model as he leads, teaches and contributes to the community of forensics at Salado High School and the entire state of Texas," Kandi King, TFA Hall of Fame Chair said.

Only 23 speech coaches have been inducted into the Hall of Fame since its inception in 2006.

"When asked the question, 'Who was the most influential person who had the greatest impact in your life?' My answer is always Tim Cook,'" former student and state champion Jen Dula Macdonel said.

Cook joined the Salado High School staff in 2005 and built the foundation for a speech and debate team that was not only known throughout Texas, but respected nationally.

"Mr. Cook has been a tremendous part of Salado's UIL academic success. He takes students and builds their confidence and skills to the point that they can become state champions and national contenders, J. J. Jonas, Salado Director of Theatre and UIL Academics said.

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Salado High School debate coach Tim Cook was recently inducted into the Texas Forensic Association Hall of Fame.

"Mr. Cook is more than a teacher and coach—he changes the lives of the young people who pass through his classroom."

In addition to coaching speech and debate, Cook took on a new UIL event in 2013. When the Young Filmmakers contest was announced, Cook decided to make that part of the opportunities he presented to his students. With no prior experience, he built the team and their skills from the ground up. The first year, they were named state champions.

"Tim Cook is one of the most dedicated coaches/ mentor there is," former student and state champion filmmaker Monte Berry III said.


Cook's reputation goes far beyond Salado. Many coaches cite Cook as the inspiration they followed to become great coaches.

"Ask anyone close to me and I've always credited Tim with starting my coaching career. It was an incredible run made possible only by his dedication to the activity and willingness to take a chance on an unproven fellow like me," Josh Aguilar, debate coach at San Marcos High School said.

Cook's college professor had this to say about him: "Tim Cook has worked very hard all his life to be the best competitor and coach," former college debate coach Tony Allison at Cameron University said.

Cook has produced numerous UIL state champions, state medalists, and national qualifiers and serves as a member of the UIL Regional Advisory Board. He regularly assists other schools with contests, volunteers at the state meet, and presents yearly at the UIL Capital Conference.

"Mr. Cook is deserving of the title Hall of Famer because what he brings to his students is enduring and something his students take with them for the rest of their life," SHS junior Hannah Wilson said. "I'm lucky to inherit the legacy he brings to Salado High School."







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

Contract Bridge

When you're playing a seemingly hopeless contract, you can sometimes accomplish your mission by enlisting the aid of the enemy. For example, take this deal where South bid and made six spades.

This overly ambitious undertaking was entirely South's fault. His jump-shift to two spades on only 13 points in high cards, while marginally acceptable, suggested a possible slam.

But having already stretched his initial response by several points, South should not have gone to six unilaterally, which is what he essentially did later. He could have bid four spades over three to indicate minimum values for the jumpshift, or four diamonds over three spades to see whether North was interested in going beyond game.

West led a diamond, and declarer saw that he had two apparently inescapable heart losers. But he also saw he might make the slam if he

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Red-tailed Hawks have a large range

Wild About Texas

While growing up on the plains of the Texas Panhandle I can remember numerous observations of large and majestic birds of prey perched along roadways and soaring up above the cotton fields. Invariably, the raptor species that I was observing was the common Red-tailed Hawk, and observing one of these incredible birds now is just as exciting as it was decades ago when I was just a budding naturalist.

The Red-tailed Hawk (Buteo jamaicensis) is a large bird of prey that found throughout most of North America, from Alaska southward into southern Mexico. Throughout the majority of the continental

United States it is a nonmigratory species, save for a few populations from the Canadian border that travel to warmer climates during the winter months. In fact, this variety of raptor has the largest range of any diurnal bird of prey in the western world.

This particular species of hawk is a habitat generalist, able to live in just about any type of habitat that supports tree life, including mesquite trees of the Panhandle, the liveoaks of the Edwards Plateau and the pines forests of the Trans-Pecos mountains. But even at that, as long as the habitat includes areas where this visually keen species can nest and survey the landscape readily, such as tall fence-posts and utility poles, that area will be effectively utilized.

Upon initial observation, the Red-tailed Hawk appears to be drab in color. Upon further inspection, however, it is obvious that the colors and patterns are arranged in a very random, yet detailed manner. The under parts, particularly the breast area, are offwhite and are marked with an assortment of vertically placed dark brown lines that vary from thin to thick. The upper parts are brown, with an intricate array of dark and light swirls and circles. The underwing areas are white like the belly and are also marked with darker bar-

The head is primarily brown with light lines and the thick curved bill is black with a fleshy

the upper bill known as the cere. The eyes are large and are muddy yellowish in color. The scaly yellowish legs and feet are feathered almost all the way to the long, powerful talons.

As the name implies, the tail ranges in color from a deep brick red to a pinkish-buff and this coloration sets this species apart from other raptors that also inhabit their range. As stated earlier, Red-tailed Hawks are large, in fact they are the largest of the 8 species of the genus Buteo that occur in Texas. An adult specimen can approach a body height of 25 inches with a wingspan of just under five feet. Large adults can

weigh up to 3 pounds. Breeding takes place in late spring, and it is thought that this species mates for life. The two to three bluish white eggs are laid approximately a month later in a nest built by both parents that is made of sticks and twigs. These eggs are large, nearly 2 ½ inches in length and are occasionally spotted with brown. The amount time for incubation varies, but it generally takes about a month. The young stay in the nest for an additional six weeks, and are fed by both parents.

This species of hawk is known for its feeding propensities, consuming large amounts of many harmful mammals such as mice, rats and rabbits. However, it is not limited to such a specific diet as reptiles, amphibians, insects, arachnids, fish, crustaceans and even other birds are readily consumed. Its keen eyesight from the large eyes is capable of seeing prey from several hundred feet above ground

Studies of this large bird of prey suggest that populations are holding steady, and although many are killed (illegally) by either poisoning or shooting, as well as by cars, the Redtailed Hawk is still thankfully a common sight along Texas roadways.



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
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
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
