Mayor will face challenger in May

In the first days of filing for local elections, two candidates have filed for Mayor of the Village of Salado and two incumbents have filed for Salado I.S.D. School Board.

Danney McCort filed for re-lection as Mayor. Alderman Hans Fields filed for election as Mayor.

No one has filed, as of presstime, for the aldermen election. Two twoyear terms on the board are open this May. Incumbents are Shannon Ashe and Bryan Fritch.

Two-term incumbents Kim Bird and Rodney Bell have both filed for Salado ISD Board of Trustees. Three three-year terms are open on the board. Donny Sequin has not filed for reelection.

Two two-year terms on the Salado Public Library District will be filled in the May election. Those are currently filled by Dr. Bob Denton and Bill Kinnison. Neither has filed, as of presstime, for re-election.

The last day to file is Feb. 28. Applications are available in the offices of each governing body.

Election ID cards available at DPS offices

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding Texans in advance of the upcoming primary election that Election Identification Certificates (EIC) are available at all Texas driver license offices for individuals in need of proper identification required to vote in elections in Texas.

The 2014 primary election in Texas is March 4, with early voting from February 18-28.

Most residents already have an acceptable form

of photo identification needed for voting and will not need or qualify for an EIC. If an applicant already has any of the following documents, they did not need an EIC: Texas driver license - unexpired or expired less than 60 days at the time of voting; Texas personal identification card - unexpired or expired less than 60 days at the time of voting; U.S. passport book or card unexpired or expired less than 60 days at the time of voting; Texas concealed handgun license – unexpired or expired less than 60 days at the time of voting; U.S. Military identification with photo – unexpired or expired less than 60 days at the time of voting; U.S. Citizenship Certificate or Certificate of Naturalization with photo.

To apply for an EIC, applicants must visit a driver license office and complete an Application for Texas Election Certificate (DL-14C).

To qualify for an EIC, an applicant must: Bring

documentation to verify U.S. citizenship and Identity; be eligible to vote in Texas (bring a valid voter registration card or submit a voter registration application through the Texas Department of Public Safety); be a Texas resident and be 17 years and 10 months or older

To avoid delays or complications, DPS urges potential applicants to make sure they have the necessary documentation before arriving at the office.

The EIC receipt an in-

dividual receives will include their photo and can be used for voting until the permanent card is delivered by mail.

The EIC is free of charge to qualifying applicants and is valid for six years. There is no expiration date for an EIC for citizens 70 years of age or older. The EIC can only be used for the purpose of voting in an election and may not be used as personal identification.

The following DPS offices in Bell County will be open Saturdays through March 1 to issue EICs only (in addition to regular office hours): Killeen Office, 302 Priest Dr.; Temple Office, 6612 South General Bruce Dr.

Wear Red Feb. 7 women's heart health

AUSTIN, Texas - When one mentions a heart attack, the first vision that comes to mind is often a man grasping at his chest. However, heart disease actually takes the lives of more women than men. To raise awareness of the prevalence, cardiologist Dr. Rawa Sarji said it is time to Go Red for Women.

"By wearing red, living a healthy lifestyle and 'speaking red:' by spreading the message that heart disease is killing our mothers, daughters, sisters and friends," Sarji said.

The American Heart Association's 10th annual Wear Red Day is Feb. 7, when all are asked to don some red clothing to show support for women's heart health.

Women are less likely than men to call 911 if they are experiencing heart attack symptoms. Sarji said they may include the classic chest pain that radiates down the left arm, "which can be associated with sweating, shortness of breath, nausea. In women, they can present similarly. They can also present with jaw pain, dizziness, so it's very important for women to be very cognizant and, if they are having symptoms, seek immediate medical attention."

Sarji also noted steps a person can take to reduce the risk of heart disease. They include quitting smoking, eating healthy food and getting exercise on a regular basis. Cardiovascular disease is responsible for nearly one-third of all deaths in the United States.

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Wendy Davis Unplugged

Perhaps the slogan of the Wendy Davis campaign should be that behind every successful woman is a good man.

The Texas gubernatorial candidate needs no introduction. Her filibuster of a bill to ban abortion in Texas after 20 weeks made her an instant star for progressives and much of the media -- because few things are as stirring as a principled stand in favor of near-infanticide.

Her personal Horatio Alger story also was catnip for the press, thrilled by the trajectory of the former teen mom who lived in a mobile home and eventually earned a law degree at Harvard.

Given her enormous wave of positive coverage, it's remarkable that Wendy Davis felt the need to gild the lily, but so she did.

"By 19," her website said, "Wendy was a single mother." Actually, as Wayne Slater of The Dallas Morning News reported, she didn't get divorced from her first husband until age 21. She lived in a mobile home alone for a few months after the two separated, before moving in with her mom and then into her own apartment.

According to her website, she got through school



"with the help of academic scholarships and student loans." This is true, but elides the fact that after she married Jeff Davis, a successful lawyer 13 years her senior, he paid for her last two years at Texas Christian University, and cashed in his 401(k) and took out a loan to put her through Harvard.

The marriage eventually hit the rocks. He tells Slater: "It was ironic. I made the last payment, and it was the next day she left." When they divorced, Jeff Davis was awarded parental custody of the kids, rare in Texas.

None of this need necessarily be damning -- in any case, it's not unusual for ambitious politicians to take advantage of supportive spouses -- but it wasn't the story Davis told about herself.

In a profile last month, the "Today" show accompanied her back to the mobile home as if it were taking Abraham Lincoln back to his log cabin. Of course, there was no visit to, let alone mention of, the "his-

toric home in the Mistletoe Heights neighborhood of Fort Worth" (in Slater's words), where she was living with Jeff Davis by age 24.

When the Abbott campaign naturally seized on the Dallas Morning News story, Davis fumed on Twitter, "These attacks show that Greg Abbott's completely out of touch with the struggles that I faced and so many Texans face."

To suggest that Abbott is unfamiliar with struggle is offensively stupid. When he was a law student in his 20s, he was out jogging when a tree fell on him, shattering his spine. He spent months recovering in the hospital and has been confined to a wheelchair ever since.

Supporters of Wendy Davis have risen to her defense on the novel theory that it is sexist to demand that a newly minted feminist icon avoid misleading people. For them, all that really matters is her abortion extremism. Everything else is a detail, including her life story.

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Big Brother Blows It Our expensive, illegal, and invasive spy program isn't even helpful for stopping terrorism.

President Barack Obama's support for the NSA's domestic spying program prompted a critic to say: "Given the unique power of the state, it is not enough for leaders to say: 'Trust us, we won't abuse the data we collect."

Oh wait, that wasn't a critic speaking - it was Obama himself. In January, he tried to shush critics by insisting that the threadbare slipcover of reforms he was throwing over the massive spy machine should convince us that all is well. So please, people, just go back to sleep.

Less than a week later, however, a blaring alarm went off in Washington, shattering any drowsiness that Obama had hoped to induce. The alert came from a small, little-known federal agency called the Privacy and Civil Liberties Oversight Board, set up by Congress back in 2007 to be an independent

monitor of the spook establishment's privacy infringements.

In a stunningly blunt 238-page report, the fivemember panel of legal experts concluded that NSA's bulk data collection is illegal, probably unconstitutional under the First and Fourth Amendments, a serious, ongoing threat to Americans' privacy and liberties, and essentially useless at stopping terrorist acts.

"As a result," wrote the panel's majority, "the board recommends that the government end the program."

Especially telling is the

finding that NSA's invasive phone sweeps constitute an ineffectual anti-terrorism tool. The agency and its apologists keep claiming - without any proof - that total vacuuming of domestic communications is necessary to prevent the next 9/11 attack.

But the privacy panel did an in-depth analysis of this repeated assertion, and wrote: "We have not identified a single instance involving a threat to the United States in which the telephone records program made a concrete difference."

Afghanistan: Don't Get **Out, Get Smart**

"For him, it's all about getting out."

That sentence from "Duty," the new book by Robert Gates, should worry all Americans. Because if the former secretary of defense is correct about how President Obama feels about the war in Afghanistan, then we can expect that part of the world to become much more dangerous in the years ahead.

Withdrawing all U.S. troops from Afghanistan by year's end, as the president is now on track to do, would be a serious mistake. Experts fear that Taliban leaders are simply using the negotiations process to gain international legitimacy and stall for time.

Basically, they're trying to run out the clock until the U.S. leaves. And knowing that President Obama continues to show disinterest in what Gates and others portray as an "inherited war" can only help them do just that. The fact that insurgent attacks have been on the rise gives us an unsettling glimpse into what's to come once U.S. troops are gone.

"We are already seeing the Taliban and al-Qaeda

staging a comeback following Obama's mishandling of the surge in Afghanistan and the drawdown of forces planned in 2014," according to James Carafano, vice president of foreign and defense policy studies at The Heritage Foundation.

The question, to borrow a phrase from Gen. George S. Patton, is whether we want to -- in effect -- pay for the same real estate twice. Do we want history to repeat itself? Because the price of neglect can be steep.

Consider what happened after the Soviets pulled out of Afghanistan in the 1980s. The U.S. cut off aid and all but turned its back. That helped make it possible for terrorist networks to grow virtually unchecked, putting us directly onto the road to 9/11.

Α U.S. withdrawal from Afghanistan would also make it more difficult to keep neighboring Pakistan in check. As Heritage's Lisa Curtis noted in


testimony before Congress last year, numerous terrorist groups in Pakistan keep the region unstable and contribute to the spread of global terrorism. Their proxies operate in Afghanistan and India.

Pakistani officials have made some effort to crack down on these groups, but their success has been far too limited and sporadic. They've received nearly \$27 billion in civil and military aid over the last decade. It's time to enforce strict conditions on future aid by insisting that Pakistani officials crack down on terrorism in all its forms. Unless we force them to act as more reliable partners, we'll make no real progress in this war.

It's also crucial that we drop any plans to pull out of Afghanistan entirely. Curtis recommended "a robust residual force presence" there beyond 2014, and with good reason. We need the people there to know that the U.S. will

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

"Each year more and more Texans make the choice to participate in the Donate Life Texas Registry, and every new donor has the potential to change the lives of many others." As of Dec. 31, 2013, the organ donor registry included 4.8 million Texans, accounting for 25 percent of the state's adult population. Last year's monthly registration totals averaged approximately 138,000 individuals, an astonishing 177 percent increase over the average monthly totals for 2012.

"In four short years, Donate Life Texas and the Texas Department of Public Safety have increased the number of registered donors in Texas from 500,000 to nearly 5 million," said Patti Niles, president of Donate Life Texas. "DPS provides a simple way for Texans to register as donors while they go about their regular business. We've always known that Texans are generous; we just had to find a way to make it convenient to register. On behalf of those awaiting

transplants, we sincerely thank DPS for providing a convenient opportunity for Texans to Donate Life."

The 79th Texas Legislature created the registry in 2005, and in recent years, legislation has helped streamline the registration process, and additional DPS training has helped increase participation. Residents can register at their local DPS office when applying for or renewing a driver license or identification card, or they can enroll online at www.donatelifetexas.org www.donevidatexas. or org.

Two state agencies the DPS and the Department of Motor Vehicles and three organ and tissue recovery agencies - Life-Gift, Southwest Transplant Alliance and Texas Organ Sharing Alliance participate in the registry.

Currently more 11,000 individuthan als are awaiting organ or tissue transplants in Texas - and more than 120,000 nationally. In 2013, according to Donate Life Texas, 143 DPS registered donors saved 486 lives.

Charlene Ochsner Carson is also a published historian and is active in preserving the history of the First Baptist Church of Salado and the community. She is the archivist for her church and the Salado Historical Society.

Salado enjoys a classic history. Many stately Greek Revival mansions have been built in Salado. many of them bearing historical markers today. Herds of cattle followed the Chisholm Trail across the spring-fed waters of Salado Creek. Dusty cowhands rested and ate their fill at the old Shady Villa Hotel. The stage stops at the hotel always brought excitement and, occasionally, renowned visitors such as Stephen F. Austin, Gen. Sam Houston, and Gen. Robert E. Lee.



Contract Bridge

An important part of declarer's job is to pay close attention to how the opponents defend on each deal. It is good policy to assume that the opponents are defending in their own best interests, so whatever they do should be given careful consideration.

Take this case from the 2003 North American Open Pairs, where declarer failed to draw the proper inference from the opponents' line of defense. South reached four hearts, and West led the spade deuce.

East took the top two spades and continued with a third spade, ruffed by South with the three as West followed with the queen. East's unusual defense -- helping declarer establish dummy's ten as a trick -- failed to make an impression on declarer, who next led the queen of hearts and let it ride after West followed low.

This was the opening East had hoped for. He took the king and returned his fourth spade, and South had to go down one. If he ruffed low, West would overruff with the ten, and if he ruffed with the jack, East's nine would become a trick.

Declarer could have averted this ignominious outcome simply by crossing to the jack of diamonds and leading a heart toward his Q-J-7. As long as the opposing hearts were divided 3-2, this would have assured the contract.

If East rose with the king d returned a spade. South

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could ruff with the jack, after which his queen and dummy's ace would take care of the missing trumps. And if East did not rise with the king, declarer would win and play the ace of hearts next to achieve the same result.

Finally, if West had the king of hearts, leading a heart toward the Q-J-7 would also limit the defense to one trump trick.


It is true that if West had led a club initially, or if East had shifted to his singleton club at trick two, the contract could always have been defeated -- but that's another story.

BBB Alert: Cell Phone Scam Rings Up Charges

Better Business Bureau (BBB) warns cellphone users about a new scam that can result in unauthorized charges appearing on their monthly wireless statement

Consumers in several states report receiving calls on their mobile phones in which an unknown caller hangs up after one ring. When the cell owner returns the call, they are billed \$19.95 for the international call fee. They may hear music, then advertising while they are unknowingly connected to a caller-paid toll service or chat line located outside the country. At \$9 per

minute, these calls can add up quickly.

The Caribbean area codes that appear on the caller ID often have been reported to be from the Dominican Republic (809), Jamaica (876), British Virgin Islands (284), Grenada (473) and Dominica (767).

The practice of third parties placing unauthorized charges on wireless accounts is called "cramming." If you have fallen for this scam, be sure to alert your cell phone carrier immediately and keep an eye on you cell phone bill. The earlier you document the fraud, the better

your chances of having some or all of the charges removed

To protect yourself from unauthorized charges on your cellphone bill, BBB offers the following tips:

 \cdot When in doubt, don't pick up or call back. If you don't recognize an out-ofstate telephone number on your caller ID, ignore it.

· Understand your mobile bill. Be sure to keep track of what services you pay for, that way you will be able to determine if any charges are unauthorized.

· Keep a close eye on monthly statements. Anyone can become a victim

of bill cramming. Monitoring your bill is the best way to determine whether or not you've been affected. The sooner you spot any unexpected charges, the sooner you can stop them.

· Add restrictions to your account. Contact your service provider to see if you can restrict third-party billing on your account.

· Inform other users on your mobile phone plan. It's important to let other friends and family members on your cellphone plan know about this scam, and to ignore phone numbers they do not recognize.

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Space Heater Safety Tips less of the type of portable

Q: In my neck of the woods we don't usually have cold winters, but this one has been a doozy. My mother hauled out her ancient space heater in December. A couple weeks ago I was visiting her and noticed that some laundry had fallen out of the basket and was lying atop the heater! Fortunately it was not turned on, but I'm terrified of what could happen. Can you remind your readers to keep the area around space heaters clear at all times? --Lacy S., Valdosta, Ga.

A: You just did, and I thank you for it. Regard-

electric heater you have, it must be set up so that there is 3 feet of clearance around it, and placed on a heat-resistant surface (bare floor, for example, not carpet).

Additionally, make sure that the outlet being used can handle the amount of electricity the space heater will draw. Don't plug anything else into that outlet.

Consider replacing older space heaters. While I've seen many models built as long ago as the 1950s that are very sturdy, they often do not meet current electrical standards and can use a lot more power than newer models,

meaning higher electric bills.

What's the best space heater to purchase? I'm not a fan of the classic opencoil model, and there are alternatives. For example, an enclosed oil heater, which looks like a radiator on wheels, circulates heated oil through each section and provides indirect heat and a greater measure of safety. There are heaters that fit inside a kitchen's kickspace. oscillating tower heaters, and heaters disguised as fireplaces or standing vases.

Portable heaters range in price from about \$50 to several hundred dollars, so take a look at several options both in the home-

improvement store and online. Make sure any heater you consider has the UL (Underwriters Laboratory) label. Heaters with thermostat control can provide greater energy savings. And it's important to make sure you purchase a heater that can handle the size of the room where you'll use it the most. (Check the sizing chart on the heater's packaging.)

HOME TIP: Plug your space heater directly into a wall outlet, not a power strip; if an extension cord is needed, choose a heavyduty cord of 14 gauge or larger.

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
