Warrent issued against teacher for improper relationship

EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

Bell Co. Justice of the Peace Precinct Two Don Engleking on Feb. 18 issued a warrant for the arrest of Marcos Garcia for the second degree felony charge of Improper Relationship between an Educator and a Student.

Garcia, a first-year Salado I.S.D. teacher resigned today after Superintendent Michael Novotny received a report of an alleged improper relationship with a 16-year-old female Salado High School student.

Sup. Novotny informed parents through an email Feb. 13 that "we immediately began an investigation in cooperation with the Salado Police Depart-

Garcia, a Salado Junior High and High School teacher, resigned his position effective immediately Feb. 13, according to Dr. Michael Novotny.

Dr. Novotny told Salado Village Voice on Feb. 13 that he first learned of the alleged inappropriate relationship on the morning of Feb. 13 when the

parents of a 16-year-old female student came to him.

Dr. Novotny said that the allegations include inappropriate text messages and physical contact.

Salado Police Chief Jack Hensley turned the case over on Feb. 18 to the District Attorney's office, which filed the charges.

Chief Hensley said that the suggested bond for Garcia is \$100,000. The possible punishment for the second degree felony, according to Chief Hensley, is 5-99 years incarcer-

"We have no tolerance for staff members who commit these alleged transgressions," Novotny stated. "Upon learning of such behavior we thoroughly investigate the allegations, involve the Salado Police Department and/or Bell County Sheriff and the Child Protective Ser-

Novotny said that the district is "reviewing our existing policies and procedures for reinforcing our staff's knowledge about policies, laws, and ethics. We will be putting together a professional learning

activity in the near future to remind staff members about their obligations in this area, including the use (or misuse) of social media, text messages, Facebook, Twitter, and other resources."

"Recent events have taught us that despite the fact that certain activities are inappropriate at best and illegal at worst, staff can always use a refesher session on these matters," he stated.


This is not the first time for allegations involving a Salado teacher and stu-

Ex-Salado teacher Lisa Wagnon pleaded guilty on June 30, 2013 to sexual assault and was sentenced to 30 days in jail and 10 years deferred adjudication. That stemmed from allegations of an inappropriate sexual relationship with a 15-year male student that involved having sexual relations two times and other contact through cell phones and Facebook.

Wagnon was arrested in October 2012 and indicted by the Bell County Grand Jury in January 2013.

Local races filling

Three candidates have filed for Mayor of the Village of Salado, three have filed for Board of Aldermen and two incumbents have filed for Salado I.S.D. School Board.

Danney McCort filed for re-election as Mayor. Also filing for mayor are Alderman Hans Fields and former Mayor Rick Ashe.

Alderman Fred Brown filed for election, but withdrew from the race. "Over the last few months, a group of people have encouraged me to run for mayor; and I did, in fact, file for the position. Other qualified people have filed that are well liked and have earned their stripes in the community. Because

of this, I feel that I should gracefully withdraw my candidacy for mayor. I believe my time would be much better spent concentrating on being an effective Alderman and giving my support to whomever wins the mayor's race."

Three candidates have filed for election to the nison. Kinnison has filed Village Board of Aldermen: alderman Bryan Fritch, Amber Preston Dankert and former alderman and Mayor Merle Stalcup. Incumbent alderman Shannon Ashe announced that she would not seek re-election.

Two-term incumbents Kim Bird and Rodney Bell have both filed for Salado ISD Board of Trustees. Three three-year terms are open on the board. Donny Sequin has not filed for reelection.

Two two-year terms on the Salado Public Library District will be filled in the May election. Those are currently filled by Dr. Bob Denton and Bill Kinfor re-election.

The last day to file is Feb. 28.

The local positions will be decided in a May 10 election.

Also on the ballot for May 10 will be a local-option election "for the purpose of legalizing the sale of all alcoholic beverages, for off-premise consumption only."

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

The Party of Less Work


The Democrats once styled themselves the party of workers. Now, they are the party of people who would have been workers, if it hadn't been for Obamacare.

The Congressional Budget Office released a new analysis of the economic effects of the health-care law that estimates that it will reduce the number of workers, in effect, by 2.5 million in 2024.

This unleashed a torrent of arguments from the Democrats implicitly denigrating the value of work. Perhaps not since Southern "fire-eaters" attacked Northern "wage slavery" in the mid-19th century has a good honest day's work been talked about so dismissively.

The old jobs crisis was people not having jobs; the new jobs crisis is people having to work. The party devoted to combating inequality is now blithely unconcerned about a law discouraging people -- especially people down the income scale -- from earning more. So much for its championing of economic mobility.

A few caveats are in order: We aren't talking about jobs that are eliminated in the usual sense of discouraging employers from hiring, as some Republican talking points suggested. And the 2.5 Rich Lowry



Nonetheless, the number is devastating. Democrats want to pass it all off as ending the "job lock" that keeps people in a job only to preserve their health insurance. There is a little something to this, but it isn't the main problem. Obamacare has created a vast apparatus of subsidies, penalties and taxes that is effectively anti-work.

The CBO explains that Obamacare's subsidies, by giving people more resources, allow "some people to maintain the same standard of living while working less." And the way they phase out creates another disincentive, as "subsidies decline with rising income (and increase as income falls), thus making work less attractive." The penalties and taxes, meanwhile, "will ultimatesupply less labor."

Democrats consider all this and pronounce themselves well-pleased. Rep. Mark Pocan, D-Wis., sees only upside in peo-

ple working less: "What that means is instead they might be able to tuck their child in bed at night and read a bedtime story, or go to an activity, which means they're better off."

White House economic adviser Jason Furman made an inapt comparison. "Getting rid of Social Security and Medicare would cause more 95-year-olds to work," he said. "You wouldn't judge whether Social Security or Medicare are good or bad based on what they do to labor supply."

No, you wouldn't -- because they are programs for the elderly. Discouraging work among 95-yearolds is different than discouraging work among people in the prime of their lives. No one told us when the bill was being considered that Obamacare would have some of the same effects as a retirement program.

The latest CBO numbers are part of the growing list of facts about Obamacare that, if they had been widely acknowledged before its passage, would have doomed it in Congress. But that debate seems so long ago. It was ly induce some workers to back when both political parties professed to be pro-work.

Their latest ploy is a "partnership" with Staples, the office supply chain. In a pilot program, 82 Staples big-box stores opened "postal units" to sell the most popular (and most profitable) mail products.

The most pressing need for Salado to continue to draw visitors to the downtown area is the pressing and overwhelming need for proper and adequate bathroom facilities. There is one waste water processing plant located on the banks of Salado Creek that provides services to some 20 accounts all located on the south side of Salado Creek. This processing plant has been offered as a gift by a long time citizen of Salado. This plant has been in operation for a very long time. My wife and I relocated to the Village in 2002, we live in Salado Oaks Subdivision. Over this time, we have never ever noted any odors emanating from the plant location. Permits for a sewer treatment plants





John was the organist for Knott's Berry Farms for more than 30 years.

The men returned to Texas, settling in Salado in July, 2006 on John's sisters' ranch.

John has been the head organist at St. Francis Church for four years in addition to helping other churches with their music ministry. He frequently played at the Christmas pageant, summer gatherings, private home parties and funerals throughout the community. He performed a concert for the new organ at the Salado Presbyterian Church and a concert for the pipe organ at St. Francis Episcopal Church.

John is preceded in death by his parents. He is survived by his brother Carl, Jr. and wife Bernice, Pineville, LA; sister Mable O'Neal, Salado and many nieces and nephews.


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Bizzare is the word for it **Contract** Bridge

Pass

Opening lead — three of clubs.

By Steve Becker

Declarer is sometimes called upon to make a play that might at first appear bizarre, but which, upon subsequent analysis, proves to be absolutely essential. For a striking example, consider this deal where West led his singleton club against four spades, dummy playing the deuce, East the seven and South the ace.

Declarer led a spade to the king, losing to the ace, and East returned the queen of clubs. It was at this point that South showed his mettle by playing the five instead of the king.

As a result, he made the contract. When East continued with the nine of clubs, South followed low and West ruffed, but that was essentially the end of the hand. Declarer's only losers proved to be a spade, a club and a club ruff.

Now let's go back to trick three and see what would have happened had South played the king of clubs on East's queen, which seems the normal thing to do. In that event, South would have gone down one, losing a spade, a club ruff and two more club tricks to East's J-9.

It is not difficult to demonstrate that ducking the queen of clubs is the right play. South cannot go down if he ducks the queen, regardless of how the opposing clubs are divided, but he can go down if he covers the queen with the king and the opening lead turns out to be a singleton.

Since making the contract is always declarer's No. 1 priority, it must be right to duck the queen at trick three. The ducking play, unusual as it might appear, has everything to gain and nothing to lose.

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Flushing Out Rodents

This is a Hammer

Q: My mother-in-law was visiting over the holidays and kept saying she could smell a mouse. I looked all over but couldn't see or smell anything. Was she just being paranoid? -- Jim in Worcester, Mass.

A: Believe it or not, it is possible to smell that a mouse is present in your home. Field mice, for example, build nests in the walls near an entry point. The nests give off a unique musty smell, caused in

part by bits of fur padding the nest and urine (mice dribble urine constantly). Mice also are small and sneaky, usually coming out only at night when the family is asleep and the sound level in the house is low. They travel under cover as much as possible, either along the inside of the walls or the back of cabinets and behind countertop items.

How do they get into the house in the first place? According to Terminix, mice can squeeze through a crack that a pencil will fit through (sightly

larger than 1/4 inch in diameter). Rats can get through a quarter-sized opening. So small openings in the foundation of a house are common entry points. Openings around pipes or cables are prime spots as well. Mice also might climb in through the attic, exploiting openings around soffit vents or damaged sections of the roof or eaves.

To find out if you have a rodent infestation, head for the kitchen and foodstorage areas (like the basement and pantry). Pick a lower-level shelf and remove all the items, then inspect the back of the shelf, with a flashlight if need be. Look for telltale mouse droppings (they look like black rice grains). You

also might see an unusual amount of spilled grains (rice, oatmeal, etc.) or crumbs, and you might detect a faint musty odor.

Inspect the food containers you just took out. Cardboard boxes with gnawed corners indicate mice have attempted to get into them (they often will be chewed through, with their contents spilling out). Plastic bags also will be compromised, and mice can even gnaw through the plastic tops of metal coffee

Next, check the attic and crawlspace areas. Use a flashlight to look for droppings along the support beams, and inspect insulation for damage caused by burrowing rodents.

If you don't find evi-

dence of mice or other rodents in the house, don't assume there is no infestation, particularly if you notice a musty smell. Schedule an inspection by a pest-control service to confirm whether or not you have an infestation.

HOME TIP: Leaf piles, unturned mulch, junk piles and stacked firewood are

tempting shelters for all kinds of rodents. Locate them several feet from your house, garage or shed, and remove junk piles as soon as possible.
