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Wildflower festival promises busy weekend in Salado

Salado will host the 13th Annual Wildflower Art Fair & Festival on March 21-23 with events at the Salado Civic Center, The Range at the Barton House and throughout the Vil-

It is a weekend long celebration of music, art, food and drink, and handmade crafts by artisans from Texas and other parts of the U.S.

The fun-filled activities will be spread throughout the village, beginning with the Arts & Crafts Festival located on the Salado Civic Center grounds on Main Street. Fifty vendors of handcrafted arts and crafts will be located under a single tent offering unique items.

The outdoor food court will host several local food vendors and non profit groups, while the Wild West Soda Stand offers home-made sodas for your sipping delight.

The Arts & Crafts Festival hours are 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. on March 21, 10 a.m. - 10 p.m. on March 22 and noon- 4 p.m. on March 23. Live music will be

playing on the Civic Center grounds during the Arts & Crafts Festival on March 22 and 23. The Civic Center will also host a skydiving demonstration provided by Skydive Temple, located just south of Salado.

Admission to the Arts & Crafts Festival is \$2 for adults, children 12 and under are free.

The first ever Salado Pub Crawl will take place Wildflower weekend at 6 p.m. on March 21. Tickets are \$19.95 and includes a collectible Pub Crawl Pub participants will travel to five different pub locations in Salado and have their cups filled with a different craft beer at each stop. Crawl stops are: Alexander's Distillery, The Shed, The Range at the Barton House, and the Stagecoach Saloon.

High speed chase ends on I-35 in Salado

DPS and Salado Police stopped a white male suspect after he allegededly led DPS on a high speed chase from Elgin to the 285 mile marker on I-35 in Salado. The suspect was in custody at about 11:45 a.m. March 14.

The suspect was driving a silver Ford F-150 pickup truck.

According to witnesses, the tires on the truck were blown out from about the I-35 and Hwy 195 area in northern Georgetown. By the time the driver stopped, both tires on the passenger's side were off and the rims had collapsed.

"Oh yeah, he was on rims (in Georgetown) and they already had the helicopter and about a dozen DPS cars on him at that point," Arthur Vasquez, a resident of Pflugerville who saw the chase in Georgetown, told Salado Village Voice on the scene in Salado.

Another witness told Salado Village Voice that "he blew past us in Jarrell

Put the public back in public information

NATIONAL POLICY MANAGER SUNLIGHT FOUNDATION

This week is Sunshine Week, a nationwide discussion about the importance of access to public information and what it means for you and your community. During this week we pay special attention to our collective obligation to bring some "sunshine" to the often shadowy processes of government decision-making.

Different governments have different ways of inhibiting effective oversight of government decisionmaking, from intentional stonewalling and secrecy to budget-driven decisions to reduce hours and staff-



These problems, while diverse, may have a similar solution: Public records and the content of public meetings should be considered public data, and accessible to anyone who wants it, including electronically.

Technology has made the transmission of information easy and inexpensive, and when we demand electronic, online access

to public information, we add a new and important method of bringing sunlight to all corners of gov-

When we ask that public data be made regularly available on a website, we don't have to wait for responses to our requests to find out about government activities. We can find out about decisions made in our name, right on our own computers. We can find out about upcoming government committee meetings on our own phones. We can download information that lets us compare existing and past government behavior. We can evaluate the impact of different kinds of deci-

The Russian Reset to Nowhere


The "reset" with Russia had a brief, unhappy life. It began with then-Secretary of State Hillary Clinton presenting her Russian counterpart with a mistranslated reset button reading "overcharged." It ended with current Secretary of State John Kerry denying knowledge of the late, unlamented policy on "Meet the Press": "Well, I don't know what you mean by the reset."

Memories are short in Foggy Bottom. And understandably. Who wouldn't try to forget a geopolitical initiative that has been exposed as willful naivete and strategic obtuseness from the beginning?

George Kennan wrote the famous "Long Telegram" at the outset of the Cold War. President Barack Obama would have needed only "A Very Brief Telegram" at the outset of his administration: "Bush's fault."

This was a perverse misreading of history. Of all President George W. Bush's failings, not giving the Russians a chance wasn't one of them. He notoriously looked into Russian President Vladimir Putin's eyes at the beginning of his presidency and saw sweetness and light. By the end, his illusions were shattered by the Russian invasion of Georgia in 2008.

He was 0 for 3. It didn't take a student of Russian history, or of international relations or even of the model U.N., to know that this would end in ashes.

At one level, the Obama administration was guilty of the human impulse of wanting to see the world as you would like it to be,

rather than as it is. At another, the president is not particularly interested in international relations. It was appropriate that one of his statements on the crisis came at an elementary school while announcing his latest budget, which reduces the U.S. II levels. Because we all know that we will never face an unexpected, unpredictable international crisis again.

Whereas Obama has the left's traditional discomfort with American power, Putin has no such guilty conscience. Whereas Obama believes we've entered a paradisiacal new period in history when everyone can be constrained by international norms, Putin has no such delu-


President Obama said recently that Ukraine's stability and success are "in Russia's interest." Not if you are Vladimir Putin and stung by the humiliation of the Russian empire's diminishment after the end of the Cold War and informed by Catherine the Great's belief that the only way to secure Russia borders is to extend them.

President Obama declares that Russia is on the wrong side of history. That may be a clinching argument in a debate over gay marriage at Wesleyan University, but won't carry much weight with Putin. He thinks he can make history move with lies, thuggery and iron.

It's now Obama's challenge to prove him wrong.

In L. Frank Baum's novel, The Wonderful Wizard of Oz, the "wizard' turns out to be a phony - just an old guy sitting behind a curtain, using his booming voice to spew nonsense in a vain effort to fool people.

But now, a century after Baum's fictional Oz, a real-life incarnation of the phony wizard has been discovered - hiding behind not one, but two curtains. He's recently been circulating his nonsense in full-page newspaper ads that hyperbolically denounce economists who favor raising the minimum wage as "radical researchers."

The ad directs readers to a website named MinimumWage.com, implying that it supports the positions of independent, unbiased, and non-radical economists. But, no — it's not a group at all, just a curtain.

What's behind Something that goes by the name of The Employment Policies Institute, which sounds rock solid, but it too is just a curtain.

Go to 1090 Vermont Avenue NW in Washington, the address of this "institute," and you won't find any economists or any other employees. The institute has none. Instead you will find the old wizard sitting there - manipulating

the big restaurant chains. They want to keep profiting by paying poverty wages to their workers, so they've hired Berman to trash any and all who support raising America's wage floor.

Many states and cities have developed open data policies that make this kind of proactive release of public data a reality, and this allows for civic-facing technologists and others to make this public information more accessible to more people.

In Chicago, readily available data about municipal lobbying has enabled civic technologists to develop easy ways to visualize the strength of lobbyist involvement in city lawmaking.

In Philadelphia, people were able to use campaign finance disclosures to demonstrate how much and to whom city wards were contributing-and also how much was coming to fund city campaigns from outside of the city or even the state.

Open data policies can also lead to the crowdsourcing of useful information for cities to use in improving their service to citizens.

In South Bend, Ind., civic technologists built an interface that allowed people to both report vacant buildings to the city and for the city to let people know about existing plans

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
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SHS speakers place in TFA State

Salado Youth Leadership's adventures continued with their session on

Feb. 25. During this session, the group set off to tour places of significance to Bell County. They started their journey at the County Clerk's office, where they received a little taste of Bell County History. While there, the students learned about how the documents had been preserved for many years. These documents include anything from birth and death certificates to cattle books and marriage licenses.

After their history lesson, the group then traveled across the complex to the Bell County Jail. There, they were taken through the process that a normal inmate would take after they had been arrested. One student in particular had an experience like no other while in the jail. Freshman Parker Seaton explained this experience when he said, "I was used as an example, so my mug shot was taken, my fingerprints were entered into the system, and I was even patted down in a holding cell. It truly was a big eye opener. The experience literally scared me straight; I don't think I ever want to be arrested." This tour of the jail gave the students

a unique look at what they would go through if they were to ever be caught up in a situation that is not appropriate for the leaders the students are supposed to be for their community. After the group's tour of the jail was over, they met with some of Bell County's attorneys, commissioners, and judges. During this encounter, they learned how the system works whenever someone is caught doing something illegal, such as breaking and entering. The students then had time to discuss situations with the attorneys, commissioners, and judges about what happens to teenagers of similar ages to the students whenever they are taken into

custody. The group concluded their journey at the Bell County Museum. There, they were informed some more of the historical significance of Bell County. These students learned more about how Bell County started, its peoples, and how the county

got to where it is today. "The overall experience we had as a group was quite intriguing. What we learned throughout that single day will stay with me for the rest of my life"-Brittany Vrooman

The group's next adventure will be on March 27 when they visit Scott & White hospital for a session on drinking and texting while driving.

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

I have it on good authority that this deal actually occurred in a pair championship some years ago. There is no point in saying that hands such as South's are never dealt, as the players involved would testify to the contrary.

South opened four notrump, planning to bid a grand slam if his partner showed one ace in response to Blackwood. But South was playing against very active opponents, and by the time it was his turn to bid again, East-West were in six hearts.

Reluctant to settle for a small penalty, and convinced that he could not make seven clubs, South ventured six spades. It seemed to him that on the bidding, North would have spade length. At any rate, he fervently hoped so. When East doubled, South stood solidly behind his decision and passed.

West led the king of diamonds, and South was home. He won with the ace and played the K-Q-J of trumps, East holding up the ace until the third round.

East returned a diamond, ruffed by declarer with the deuce, his last trump. South then ruffed the ace of hearts in dummy, drew East's last trump with the ten and ran his clubs to score the slam.

West could have defeated the slam with a club lead, but that does not detract from the credit due South for his bold bid. South might have been carted off in an ambulance had his partner been short of spades. But he took the position that six hearts doubled would yield a poor result and that he could not lose much -- and might gain a lot -- by his seemingly reckless bid.






