Aldermen moving forward on sewer

Salado aldermen will meet in executive session with their attorney at 4 p.m. April 10 to discuss the proposed gift of the Stagecoach Inn sewer to the Village.

City administrator Jim Reed told aldermen at their April 3 meeting that he was moving forward on a two pronged approach on the sewer. The first is the acquisition of the Stagecoach Inn sewer and assuring that its immediate operations are done at no cost to the Village. This will likely involve a lease agreement with Terry Potts, owner and operator of Stagecoach Inn Hotel and Restaurant.

Reed said that the board needs to move forward on the other prong of the sewer, the long term solution for a sewer system. "We are still on the timeline that I gave you some time back. To meet those timelines in order to adequately inform the public and to have the maximum amount of time to get this together before the public before a bond election, I will need clear direction from you."

He asked aldermen to give him their ideas of what the proposed service area would be for a bond election to be brought before voters in November. "We should look at cost figures for a number of different service areas. The same plant will be able to serve much more than just Main Street if we can afford the collection system."

He said that recent discussions with Texas Department of Transportation officials may lead to an approach to serving the downtown area by including main collection lines along Church Street with connections to Main Street and other downtown properties as well as to the east side of the access road.

"This way, we do not have to take over Main Street," Reed said. " Properties on the east side of Main could come under Main and tie into a line going down Church St."

He said that he would like to go forward with a conceptual design and perhaps have an initial open house for the conceptual design on April 21.

On May 4, the bell of Salado's First Baptist Church will toll to mark the beginning the church's 150th anniversary celebration. The children of the church will each take a turn tugging on the rope of the original bell to signal the start of the celebration. The tolling of the bell will summons people to gather for Sunday School which will start at 9:15 a.m.

The worship service will start at 10:30 a.m. Since the church was organized as a "Baptist church of the Missionary order," those who have been baptized into the fellowship of the church during the past years will be recognized. A video clip of interviews with former pastors and a video outlining the history of the church will be shown. The music service will consist of hymns of the 1860s and the pastor, Dr. Travis Burleson, will deliver the sermon.

Lunch on the Grounds will be served at noon under a tent that will be set up on the parking lot behind the church offices. The lunch will feature barbeque and all the fixin's from one of Salado's local caterers. Special guests will be introduced during luncheon. These guests will include descendants of early-day church members, government officials, denominational leaders, university presidents, and former staff members.

Watch for wildflowers

Dear Editor:

One of the joys of living or driving in the country at this time of year has always been the beautiful vistas of wildflowers. --Ditches overflowing with bluebonnets, wild honeysuckle, primroses, buttercups and a variety of other beautiful flowers. Shades of blue, pink, and yellow everywhere. But more and more I notice that homeowners are mowing -- not just their yards, but the ditches adjoining their yards and fields. Not only does this destroy this season's wildflowers, but eliminates the possibility of their returning in following seasons. If left to bloom and then to seed out for next year before any mowing is done, these wildflowers will return to be enjoyed in the years ahead.

In addition to the wildflowers this would save, there are also the things

which live on the nectar of the flowers -- such as butterflies, honeybees, -or the things which shelter and nest in the spring grasses, such as cottontail rabbits, roadrunners, quail, etc. If every corner of your property is mowed to look like a golf course green, where will any of these little living things -- and others such as turtles, toads, lizards -- live and make their homes. The doe need places to hide their fawns. There is a ripple effect when we systematically destroying any part of nature. Where there are fewer flowers, there are fewer insects. Where there are fewer insects, there are fewer songbirds, such as Mockingbirds, which live on insects, etc.

Surely there is a way to take into consideration the preservation of other living things. I hope we don't let our obsession with neatly trimmed "every-

thing" destroy the habitat and the beauty that fields and ditches of wildflowers provide. Instead of the monotony of green in mowed ditches and fields -- is the beauty of endless variety of color!

One word of warning this time of year, is that rattlesnakes could also be in fields of wildflowers --so anyone stopping for photos should certainly check out an area carefully before planning photo shoots there with their children. But just because this is a possibility which needs to be considered, doesn't mean it is a probability which would necessitate the destruction of the season's flowers.

Please enjoy the beauty these flowers provide, and be a guardian of this beauty for those who come after you. Please consider

FORUM An Open Exchange of Ideas **Obamacare's master** of false assurance

A core competency of Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius is issuing false assurances.

administration An about-face has left the Cabinet official looking like the Baghdad Bob of American health insurance. When Rep. Kevin Brady, R-Texas, asked her at a hearing two weeks ago whether the administration would extend the Obamacare enrollment period beyond March 31, she responded with a crisp and direct: "No, sir."

To the uninitiated, that sounded like an unmistakable denial of any intention to delay the enrollment period. The uninitiated were sadly misled.

The secretary subsequently referred in her testimony to a delayed enrollment period for people who were unable to enroll "through no fault of their own." It turns out that the administration's definition of these frustrated wouldbe enrollees includes ... well, everyone. The Washington Post reports that the administration will rely on the "honor system" to determine if people enrolling past the deadline are hardship cases,

A few weeks ago, a spokeswoman for the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, which runs HealthCare.gov, told reporters "we don't actu-



ally have the statutory authority to extend the open enrollment period in 2014."

As if that would be an obstacle. The enrollment extension is in the same spirit as the administration's partial enactment in 2012 of the DREAM Act through executive fiat -- after President Barack Obama said in 2011 that he didn't have the authority for such a change.

It is a testament to the Obama administration's audacity that it doesn't just defy the critics' view of its lawful authority, it defies its own view of its lawful authority.

News of the extension of the enrollment period came on the same day that the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia heard arguments in Halbig v. Sebelius, a case involving arguably the most sweeping act of lawlessness in Obamacare's implementation.


The text of the Affordable Care Act says that only exchanges set up by the states are eligible for subsidies. Since so many states didn't set up exchanges, the Obama administration decided that

enrollees on the federal exchanges can also get the subsidies. Its defense in Halbig v. Sebelius is, true to form, that the law doesn't mean what it says. Obamacare has been a long workshop in improv tragicomedy. The delays, regulatory rewritings and extensions are always an attempt simply to live for another day, to put off the political pain of cancellations, or rate hikes, or layoffs, and to get just enough traction to make the law viable.


Millions have signed up for the exchanges, but it's not clear that the demographic mix is right to avoid steep premium increases by insurers in 2015. So far, it looks like young people -- essential to making the economics of the exchanges work -- aren't signing up in the necessary numbers. The extension is surely a ploy to squeeze every last "young invincible" out of the current enrollment period, and hope the news for the rates in 2015 isn't so bad.

And after that? It's anybody's guess. All we know for sure is that whatever Kathleen Sebelius says today may not be operative tomorrow.



When is a signal not a signal? Answer: When it obviously does not mean what it says.

For example, take this case where South gets to four spades on the bidding shown. It is not clear whether West should lead the ace of hearts, the suit his partner bid, or make the more aggressive lead of a diamond, hoping to get a diamond ruff.

Be that as it may, West fortunately elected to lead a diamond. Had he led the ace of hearts instead, declarer would have finished with an overtrick.

East won the diamond lead with the jack and continued with the ace and king. It was on the third round of diamonds that West made a most unusual play -- he discarded the ace of hearts!

Under the circumstances, there was no way



East could construe this play as a signal for him to lead a heart next. Rather, East reasoned that his partner was trying to stop him from shifting to a heart. So East continued with a fourth round of diamonds, and West's jack of trumps became the setting trick.

Observe that if East had shifted to a heart instead of leading another diamond, which he very well might have done without West's extraordinary discard, declarer would have had no problem scoring the rest of the tricks. But West had recognized that a heart shift by East could easily prove fatal, and he headed off a potential disaster by making the most dramatic discard he could find. (c) 2014 King Features
