Salado Glassworks buys Peddler's Alley for expansion of gallery, studio

A small rocket ship is emblazoned on each of his glass shop's T-shirts, popular items for tourists and locals alike to purchase and wear.

And indicative of the growth of Salado Glassworks and artist Gail Allard II. Salado Glassworks purchased the Peddler's Alley buildings and the .58 acres they sit upon to expand Allard's gallery and studio.

It's been several years since the original Peddler's Alley has had any retail use, but Allard has plans for the 6,000 sq. ft. former granary.

The front of the building will be for an expanded Salado Glassworks location that will have a much larger gallery of his hand blown glass art, as well as the glass and metal art of Aaron Gist and the glass and jewelry art of Sara Whitis. The studio furniture by REVELation Decor's Allie and Benjamin Guenther and paintings by Chad Hines.

The studio itself will be approximately three times the current cramped quarters in which he has been working and teaching Aaron Gist since November 2012.

Gist is learning the ancient craft in the same way Allard learned it, by doing. Allard recalled how he first came across glassblowing by visiting the Purpelass studio in

Street being built," Allard says of the location just steps off of south Main St. and College Hill.

At the time he opened in Salado, he considered Fredericksburg and other towns in Texas but says he recognized "the potential of what is going on in town and the kind of charm it has going for it."

And Allard says he wanted to bring some "excitement" to Salado. So he brought fire.

A couple thousand de-

tion, it is the fact that we are making something by hand, here on the spot," Allard said. "For the kids, it is definitely the fire."

And the transformative art that he creates making everything from large vessels to lamps to hearts to Easter eggs to beer mugs to pumpkins to Christmas ornaments.

"That they can get involved and help create their own one-of-a-kind piece makes it very special and something they will remember for a long time," he said.

Using social media, billboards and print, Allard has grown the business demonstrably. Enough to have been named the Salado Chamber of Commerce Person of the Year.

His business plan for the expansion will be to improve on what he has already created.

The new location will have an expanded viewing room, a larger gallery space, a party room for groups who want to come and make things, and a home space in the back for his wife Jennifer and son Gail III.

Salado voters on Mav 10 will elect a Mayor, two Aldermen and three school board trustees as well as deciding whether liquor stores will be allowed within the Village. The polls will be open at the Salado Civic Center 7 a.m.-7 p.m. in the local elections. Early voting ended on May 6 with 446 voting in the Village of Salado races and 623 voting so far in the Salado I.S.D. race.

Allard worked under Rhynearson for some nine years. He then joined the non-profit Salado Arts Workshop before opening in the small metal building currently housing his gallery and studio.



TX MG Register gathers for 39th year in Salado

British automobile pioneer Cecil Kimber and his MG Motorcar Company Ltd. could hardly have imagined the impact their first sports car would have on the automotive world. And now 90 years later, and more than 30 years since the last MG rolled from the storied factory at Abingdon-on-Thames, that passion shows no sign of letting up.

This infatuation (some might say obsession!) is kept alive today by the more than 200 enthusiastic members of The Texas MG Register (TMGR). The TX MG Register was formed 39 years ago and celebrated their very first event in Salado at the Stagecoach Inn. Since that time, TMGR members have always gathered in Salado during Mother's Day weekend - enjoying the town and celebrating their little British cars.


TX MG Register members are custodians of more than 500 classic British automobiles, ranging from a 1930 M-Type fabric covered roadster to some of the last MGBs produced. TMGR members are devoted to maintaining and enjoying one of the world's favorite cars.

Most automotive historians agree that America's affection with open, two seat sports cars began with the MGTC model of the 1940's, a distinction acknowledged in later company advertising with the slogan "The sports car America loved first". Like many a bride, servicemen returning from England after World War II brought home the tiny British roadsters they fell in love with during the war. Slightly more refined TD and TF models followed, and it was devotees of these "T Series" MGs who formed the original Texas MG Register in 1975. In 1993 the club welcomed owners of "modern" MGA and MGB models, and became the TMGR as it is today; a diverse group of all ages, backgrounds and interests hailing from all parts of Texas, the nation and even as far away as Australia!

The TMGR's bylaws establish that the club is "primarily dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of MG cars". For some members this means showing their meticulously restored cars at the spring "Gathering of the Faithful" (GoF) held every year at Salado. Many enjoy disproving the myth of British automotive unreliability with a hearty challenge to both man and machine, driving hundreds, sometimes thousands of miles to Salado for this annual event.

As Jim Yule, a past President says: "The Texas MG Register is about having fun. It's about enjoying MG's and the down to earth folks that own them." Look for a convoy of MGs travelling Bell County roads this May 9-11 and congratulate the TX MG Register members on their 39th Anniversary! The cars will be on display on the grounds of The Venue by Inn on the Creek on May 10. Films crews from velocity channel will be filming the MGs on their rally.







The Comprehensive Plan, supposedly the blueprint for the future, is not looked at by the board as a whole, let alone discussed and updated. We have a village run by volunteers, many of whom have full time careers. This was effective in the early days after incorporation but as we have grown in size and added staff this is no longer a viable scenario. We have embarked on the path towards the solution, namely to engage the services of a full time, professional city manager. Secondly, I feel that the village should consider increasing the terms of office for the Mayor and Aldermen to three years from two which would also provide more continuity in those positions.







Salado United Methodist Church has established a columbarium on the campus of the church.


A columbarium is very similar to a mausoleum, instead of spaces for caskets, a columbarium has niches for urns which contain cremated remains.

Contract Bridge

There are no magic rules to guide one to the best opening lead, and often the wrong choice will produce a disastrous result.

Consider this deal where South wound up in six clubs doubled. Perhaps East should have opened three spades, which might have shut the opponents out of the bidding. Instead he started with one spade, allowing North-South to find their club fit.

West's spade lead was a dubious choice, as he should have realized that North's four-spade cuebid indicated a void in the suit and that a spade lead would therefore accomplish nothing. Whether West should have led a diamond or a heart is debatable -- but his actual lead proved fatal.

Declarer ruffed the spade in dummy and led the queen of clubs, on which East followed low. South made a good guess by going up with the ace and leading five rounds of hearts, discarding all three of his diamonds in the process



heart, but by then the setting trick -- East's ace of diamonds -- had already flown the coop. As a result, declarer made the slam and scored 1,660 points instead of going down one, which would have been his lot had West led a diamond originally.

Had it occurred to West that a spade lead was wrong, he might, of course, have misguessed and led a heart, in which case declarer would still have made the contract. But then again, West might have led a diamond and beaten the slam.

The bottom line is that since a spade lead did not figure to gain anything for his side, West should have dismissed it as a possibility and considered an alternative.
