Seniors win 3 golds at State

Salado senior Ryan Simmons added two golds to his silver and bronze medals earned at the UIL State Track Meet during his career in Salado High. Senior Rachel Hildebrand also added a gold medal to her own silver medal from last year's State Track

Simmons earned gold

in both the discus and shot put while Hildebrand earned gold in the 2A girl's shot put.

Simmons won the 2A boys division in the discus with a throw of 170-10 in the finals of the competition. His throw of 170-08 led the pack of nine competitors in the preliminary round. He threw the discus

170-10 on his second attempt in the final round to beat Andrew Perez of Taft's mark of 163-05. Jackson Tyner of Edgewood was third with his first throw of 154-01.

Simmons also won the shot put with a mark of 57-00, which he threw on his third attempt of the day.

His mark beat Tavaris

Owens of Whitney by 10 inches. Mason Davis of Vanderbilt Industrial was third with a mark of 53-

Last year, Simmons earned silver in both events. He threw the discus for 174-05 for the silver in 2013. He threw the shot put for 54-05.25 for second place in 2013.

In 2012, as a sophomore, Simmons earned bronze in the 3A boys discus with a throw of 162-09. His mark of 53-11.50 as a sophomore was good enough for fifth place in the state in 3A division.

Hildebrand won the 2A girls shot put with a throw of 39-10 on her third attempt. That mark beat out Julisa Williams of Woodville's effort of 39-05.25.

As a junior, Hildebrand was second last year in the 2A girls shot put with a mark of 40-06.25.

Morgan Hill ran the 110 Meter Hurdles in 15.78 to place ninth overall in the race. Her seed time of 15.07 was third in qualifying for the state meet.

Voters elect new Mayor, 2 new aldermen, return incumbents to school board, plus one

Skip Blancett decisively won the race for Mayor of the Village of Salado with 290 votes, more than 100 votes than the second place contender Rick Ashe. Blancett will be given his oath of office at the 6 p.m. May 15 Board of Aldermen meeting at the Municipal Building, 301

Stagecoach Rd. Newly-elected alder-Amber Preston-Dankert and Frank Coachman will also be given their oaths of office at the meeting and the board will elect a new Mayor Prothe four person race for two spots on the Board of Aldermen with 357 votes, followed by Coachman with 314 votes.

In the Salado ISD Board of Trustees race, Kim Bird and Rodney W. Bell were returned to the board. Kristi Jarvis will join them.

Early voting was heavy as 448 cast ballots in the Village races during that period. On election day May 10, voted for a total of 691 ballots being cast. In the race for Mayor, Blancett captured 43 percent of

197 votes in early voting and 93 votes on election day. Ashe followed with 187 votes, 126 in early voting. Incumbent Danney McCort had 104 votes and alderman Hans Fields took in 97 total votes.

448 ballots cast. Incumbents Kim Bird and Rodney Bell were reelected to three-year terms on the Salado ISD Board of Trustees. Kristi Jarvis

was also elected to the Board of Trustees. Bird received 716 votes, 416 in early voting; Bell received 534 votes, 360 in early voting. Jarvis received 499 total votes, 337 in early voting. Brian Sunshine received 413 votes.

A total of 985 ballots were cast in the school board race.

Salado voters also overwhelmingly approved a local option elect to allow for "The legal sale of all alcohol beverages for offpremise consuption only." In that election, 441 voted in favor and 225 voted

According to the Village of Salado 2013 Zoning Ordinance 2013.08 Zoning Use Chart (page 76), package stores are a permitted use in the Historic District, Local Retail, Regional Retail, Mixed Use, Business Park and Commercial zones of the Village. They are not allowed in Office zones.

The 2010 Zoning Ordinance would allow Conditional Use Permits for Beer and Wine and Mixed Beverage Sales in the Use Chart. No such use was defined for Package Store.

Village accepts Stagecoach sewer plant

Mayor Danney McCort signed a letter May 13 thanking Morris E. Foster, chairman of Stagecoach Properties for the donation of two tracts of real property totaling 4.972 acres and the wastewater plant located at 401 South Stagecoach Road.

The letter marks the culmination of six months of negotiations between the Village of Salado and Foster to accept the sewer treatment plant that treats water for the Stagecoach Inn and more than a dozen other downtown businesses. The plant has a capacity of 50,000 gallons per day and currently utilizes less than 40 percent of that

total capacity.

The negotiations seemed to stall in early January when it looked as if the Village would not accept the property, but city administrator Jim Reed recommended going forward with accepting the

For the time being, the plant will continue to be operated by Terry Potts, owner of Stagecoach Inn, on behalf of the Village, Mayor McCort said.

He proposes that his company Stagecoach Properties, Inc. gift the current sewage plant, all gathering lines, discharge permits, 2.2 acres of land including a parking lot and

all associated equipment to the Village of Salado.

"This is an excellent opportunity for Salado to own at little to no cost an established sewage operation that would benefit most of Main Street and have the opportunity to expand in the future," Foster

The plant, or at the very least, the land that it currently occupies, may play a part in the ultimate construction of a sewer system for the business district of Salado. Reed was authorized to spend up to \$10,000 to draft initial proposals for the possible sewer system in hopes of bringing a bond election


before voters in Novem-

The Village has conducted numerous studies of sewer systems with projected price tags. These proposed costs in 2010 ranged from \$3 million for 61 current connections to more than \$8.7 million for 147 current connections.

Reed said that he wants to have firm cost estimates and proposed design of a sewer system in July to give voters a chance to educate themselves about the cost and benefits of the sewer system.

In addition to accepting the sewer system, the village will enter into a lease for the land to which the effluent is pumped, according to McCort. The annual price in year one will be \$500. It will increase annually until year five, when the cost will be \$5,000. The Village will likely seek alternatives for the effluent in that time.

The Village is also revamping the lease with Stagecoach Properties of the downtown restrooms, lowering the cost to \$300 per month for seven years.

lion Americans have food allergy. Out of the 15 million Americans, 6 million are children. That number equals about 1 in 13 kids.

The most common food allergies include peanuts, tree nuts, milk, shellfish, soy, wheat, and eggs.

However, a person can be allergic to any food.

A reaction can be mild to anaphylaxis. Approximately every 3 minutes someone having an allergic reaction is sent to the ER.

We became aware of my granddaughter's peanut allergy after she had been given a graham cracker cookie with peanut butter. She had an immediate reaction and had to be taken to the emergency room. She was 18 months

old.

Since that time she has been taught not to accept food from anyone without questioning the ingredients. Responses by adults to her questioning have been anywhere from "how do I know," "why don't you bring your own food to the class party," to shrugs followed by dismissal. She is now eleven years old.

Peanut allergy is the most common allergy but it can be the most deadly.

Do you know what some baked goods at Brookshire Brothers, all M&M's, and Snyder's Pretzels have in common? They are all manufactured in a plant with peanuts or tree nuts. These are products children who have a nut allergy must avoid.

Because life activities are at risk, food allergies are covered under the Americans with Disabilities Act. They are classified as a hidden disability.

Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 is a plan which is available for children with food allergies. Parents can insist a 504 plan be put in place

for their child in any public school in America.

This 504 plan must be followed. If not followed, federal funds can be in jeopardy and lawsuits may occur.

There is no cure for food allergies. Avoidance of the food is absolutely necessary.


A Hero for the Ages

Jeremiah Denton, the Vietnam War POW who died in March at age 89, uttered one of the great statements of defiance in American history.

In 1965, he was shot down in his A-6 during a bombing run over North Vietnam. He became a captive for more than seven years and endured an unimaginable regime of torture, humiliation and isolation, managing to retain his dignity and spirit even as his captors went to hideous lengths to snuff them out.

Soon after his capture, Denton was taken to Hoa Lo Prison, or the Hanoi Hilton, where he led the resistance to the North Vietnamese efforts to extract propaganda confessions from their prisoners. As Denton related in his book, "When Hell Was in Session," they tried to starve one out of him. He began to hallucinate, but he still refused. They took him to the "Meathook Room" and beat him. Then, they twisted his arms with ropes and relented just enough to keep him from passing out. They rolled an iron bar on his legs and jumped up and down on it. For hours.

Denton agreed finally to give them a little of what they wanted, and he hadn't



recovered from this ordeal when the Vietnamese told him he would appear at a press conference.

Denton told a fellow POW that his plan was to "blow it wide open." He famously blinked T-O-R-T-U-R-E in Morse code during the interview, a message picked up by naval intelligence and the first definitive word of what prisoners were being subjected to. When asked what he thought of his government's war, Denton replied, "Whatever the position of my government is, I believe in it, yes sir. I'm a member of that government, and it's my job to support it, and I will as long as I live."

The legend is that under the pressure of the Inquisition, Galileo said of the Earth, "Yet, it moves." That Martin Luther said, "Here I stand, I can do no other." Denton's words aren't an embellishment. They were seen by millions when they were broadcast in the United States, and he almost immediately paid for them in torment so horrifying that

he desperately prayed that he wouldn't go insane.

When the American involvement in the war ended and the POWs finally were released, Denton made a brief statement on the tarmac upon his return, no less powerful for its simplicity and understatement: "We are honored to have had the opportunity to serve our country under difficult circumstances. We are profoundly grateful to our commander in chief and to our nation for this day. God bless Ameri-

A Roman Catholic, Denton told his family that he had forgiven his captors and, after recounting to them what he had gone through, that he didn't want to speak to them of it again. His son James says he often heard him say -- with typical modesty --"That's over. I don't want to be a professional jailbird."

He certainly wasn't that. Denton went on to become a U.S. senator from Alabama. With his passing, we've lost a hero whose example of faithfulness and duty should be for the ages.

It's time to toss these corporate oligarchs out of the people's business



Time to check your mailbox

Salado Postmaster Matt Klunk reminds customers that it is time for them to check their mailboxes.

Each year, the third week of May is designated by the U.S. Postal Service as Mailbox Improvment Week to encourage customers to examine and, if necessary, improve their mailboxes.

Mailboxes should be approved by the postmaster general, safe to use, conveniently located and neat in appearance.

Check your mailbox to see if you need to replace loose hinges on the mailbox door, repaint a fading or rusted mailbox, remount a loose mailbox or replace or add house num-

A mailbox should display the street number, box number and/or any other address information in a contrast color with letters and numerals not less than one inch in heaight.

It is generally in the customers' best interest to display the address information on both sides of the mailbox since police, fire and rescue personnel often depend on mailbox information to locate people and may be approaching from either direction.

Customers should install mailboxes with the

bottom of the box at a height of between 3-1/2 and 4 feet. Curbside mailboxes must be on the righthand side of the road in the carrier's travel directionin all cases where traffic condition make it dangerous to drive to the left to reach the mailboxes or where doing so would constitute

a violation of any traffic laws. Mailboxes shoudl be

Bridge

There are plays in bridge that on the surface seem to make no sense, but that are nevertheless entirely logical when analyzed more closely. For example, consider this deal taken from "Test Your Finessing" by Scottish expert Hugh Kelsey.

Assume you're in three notrump and West leads a low heart. You win East's jack with the king, and the question is how to give yourself the best chance for the contract. Of course, you see only the North-South hands while you try to figure this out.

You have seven sure tricks, and it is obvious that the best source for the two additional tricks you need lies in diamonds. It might therefore seem automatic to lead the jack of diamonds at trick two, planning to follow low from dummy and hoping to find West with the queen. If West has the queen (a 50-50 chance), you're certain to make the contract.

But alas, this method of play fails when East wins the jack with the queen and returns a heart. Eventually, you lose three heart tricks and two diamonds and so finish down one.

Kelsey points out that there's a much better approach that is far more likely to succeed: cross to the king of clubs at trick two and lead the three of diamonds toward your hand at trick three! If East has the Q-x or Q-x-x of diamonds, he is virtually certain to follow low, and if he does, you're sure to get home safely.

Furthermore, even if West has the queen of diamonds, you are also in great shape. He wins with the queen but cannot make an effective return. Whatever he does next, you make three notrump.

To tackle diamonds by leading low from dummy's K-10-x-x toward your J-9-8-x certainly goes against the grain, but in this deal it is surely your best bet.

ENERGY STAR® Appliance vs. Conventional

The opportunity for Texans to save money on energy efficient appliances is fast approaching. The state's annual ENERGY STAR® Sales Tax Holiday May 24-26.

"This is a great opportunity for Texans looking for ways to stretch their family budgets," Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said. "Shoppers can save money up front by not having to pay sales tax when buying appliances during the holiday weekend and the energy efficient products can help reduce utility bill costs."

Shoppers are expected to save an estimated \$3.8 million in state and local sales tax during the Memorial Day sales tax holiday.

During Memorial Day weekend, Texas shoppers get a break from state and local sales and use taxes on purchases of certain energy efficient products.

ENERGY **STAR specification of programmable thermostats was suspended on December 31, 2009; however, any existing stock of ENERGY STAR labeled programmable thermostats offered for sale by retailers is still eligible for the exemption.

ENERGY STAR Qualifying products will display the ENERGY STAR logo, which may appear on the appliance, the packag-

ing or the Energy Guide label. ENERGY STAR is a joint program of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Department of Energy. Earning the ENERGY STAR means a product meets strict energy efficiency guidelines set by these two federal agencies.

There is no limit on the number of qualifying items one can purchase during this sales tax holiday, and an exemption certificate is not required.

The tax-free holiday also applies to Internet and catalog sales of eligible products, provided that (1) the item is paid for and delivered to the purchaser during the exemption period; or (2) the purchaser orders and pays for the item and the retailer accepts the order during the exemption period for immediate shipment, even if delivery is made after the exemption period.

Layaway plans can be used to take advantage of the sales tax holiday. Layaway sales of eligible products qualify for the exemption when either the final payment on a layaway order is made and the merchandise is given to the customer during the exemption period, or the item is selected by the customer and the order is accepted into layaway by the retailer during the exemption period for immediate delivery upon full payment, even if delivery is made after the exemption period.





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The Bell County Cooperative for Exceptional Children

Parents should be aware that these records might be needed by the student or parents for Social Security benefits or other purposes.

Parents of former students who received special education services, or former students who are over the age of 18, who do no want their records destroyed should contact the Bell County Cooperative for Exceptional Children at 254-657-8155 before July 1, 2014.
