Road funding could lead to breakdown

After rejecting \$141,718.45 bid for reconstruction of a 0.2 mile of Chisholm Trail June 5, aldermen voted unanimously to consider adding \$50,000 per year to the road budget for a fiveyear plan to add sidewalks, Victorian-era streetlights and benches along Main Street.

Earlier in the day, city administrator Jim Reed told the board that he wanted "to be sure we are taking a realistic look" at Salado's approach to repairing and replacing road surfaces. Currently, the city budgets approximately \$135,000 for road resurfacing with another \$20,000 for minor road re-

He told aldermen that the Village has 68.2 miles of roads within its boundaries. "Cost estimates for seal coating roads in central Texas is \$13,000 to \$28,000 per mile," Reed

It could cost the village more than \$1.3 million to seat coat all of its roads, according to Reed. He said that the standard for resurfacing roads is a five to seven year basis, "depending upon the quality and condition of the road base underneath."

Salado has not seal coated roads in the past Star Grading and Paving several years. Instead, the road budget has been mostly dedicated to an approach of completely replacing about 0.2 miles of road per year, along with ribbon curbs to extend the life of the road. Replacement of the Smith Bluff bridge devoured one year's budget, as did replacement of Park Road due to the damage of the 2010 Salado Creek flood.

"If we wait until a road is in disrepair," Reed said,

"it will only cost us that much more to resurface it."

He estimated that seal coating all of the village streets would cost the Village about \$279,000 a year for the next five years. This would cost approximately 8.5 cents in additional property taxes, according to Reed.

"Seal coating is perfectly fine for most of the roads in Salado, as long as the base underneath is in good condition," he told aldermen in the workshop session.

"Seal coating is the least expensive method" for road repairs, according to Reed. "If we are under funding the most basic way to do road maintenance, then you need to know that. It will be much more expensive it we take another approach. This will help you decide what a realistic road budget is."

Reed warned that a budget of \$135,000 per year for roads is "going to result in infrastructure breakdown.

Area municipalities of like size to Salado spend anywhere from \$38,802 (Lorena 2013-14 budget) to \$577,984 per year for streets (McGregor 2013 budget).

Following the workshop, aldermen defeated a motion 2-3 to award a \$141,718.45 bid to Lone for the rehabilitation of Chisholm Trail from 3806 Chisholm Trail to Smith Bluff even though Lone Star was the low bidder.

Alderman Fred Brown said that the proposal "wipes out entire budget for year for a piece of road that is not that serious of a problem." Aldermen Michael McDougal and Dr. Amber Preston-Dankert vote in favor and Brown, Frank Coachman and SEE ROADS, PAGE 6A


While the south entrance to Salado is nearing completion, as well as the overpass on the south side and much of the work is completed on the north side of the project, the next 18 months will be crucial to the reconstruction of the ramps and underpasses at Salado Plaza Dr.

That portion of the overall project may be some of the trickiest part of the expansion of I-35 through Salado. Officials will have more information on what to expect in terms of begin and completion dates as well as impacts on traffic

Officials will always point people to the TX-DOT website for I-35 through Central Texas, my35.org and following TXDOT on Twitter for late-breaking news about closings and traffic chang-

TXDOT and construction officials will give an informal brief of plans beginning at 6:30 p.m, followed by an open session of questions and answers. Officials will also stay afterward for specific questions from residents, businesses and other interested parties.

Mayor Skip Blancett is working with TXDOT to organize the meeting. Several, if not all, aldermen are likely to attend the meeting, but no action or discussion by the board of aldermen will occur.

Public Arts League seeks cultural district designation From Sirena to Salado to bring Blue Lapis Light districts.

Legends to the Sculpture Garden to artists working in many media, Salado has been a home to the arts and to artists. Soon, it may have a distinction from the Texas Commission on the

Public Arts League of Salado filed an application through the TCA Cultural District program to designate much of the downtown and historic district as a Cultural District. Among the communities to receive the designation are these: Abilene, Alpine, Austin, Bastrop, Clifton, Dallas, Denison, El Paso, Fort Worth, Galveston, Georgetown, Houston (four), Hunstville, McAllen, Rosenberg, San Angelo, San Antonio, San Elizario, Smithville and

An Open Exchange of Ideas

Tiananmen Square, 25 years later

It's one of the most iconic images of the 20th century: a man standing perfectly still, facing a large tank as it bears down on him. He's unarmed and alone. Defenseless ... except for an unshakeable conviction that freedom is so important, it's worth risking your life.

Which is just what that man was doing when in June 1989, he joined thousands of other fellow citizens in China for what became known as the Tiananmen Square Massa-

cre. The tank, which was moving down Beijing's Chang'an Boulevard and could have plowed over him easily, stopped directly in front of him. He stood his ground.

The tank turned right to try and maneuver around him. He immediately stepped to his left and continued to block its path. The tank went left; he moved right back in front of it. Right again, then left. It was no use. His message was plain: You want to move? You want to continue to oppress us? You'll have to do it, quite literally, over my dead body.

How many of us would have had the courage to stand there in the face of what seemed like certain death? How far would we have to be pushed before we said, "Enough"?

The people of China had certainly been pushed quite a bit by that point. The scene described above was the climax of a series of events that began almost two months earlier when former Communist Party General Secretary Hu Yaobang died of a heart attack.

Yaobang had supported reforms that helped bring economic opportunity and some political reforms to China. But hardline Party members forced him from office because he ap-

peared to tolerate student protests that pushed for further freedoms. Now he was truly gone, and many people throughout China were in mourning.

Wang Dan, the main student leader of the Ti-ananmen Square protests, was among those who encouraged tens of thousands of students, workers and civilians to fill the streets of Beijing in the wake of Yaobang's death. On May 13, they began a hunger strike.

"After the hunger strike, the student movement transformed into a country of political protest with a lot of other groups like workers and especially intellectuals," Wang reflected 20 years later. "That made our government very scared."

So it was not surprising when martial law was declared on May 19. "Until martial law, I didn't say it was very serious," Wang said. "We had such a tradition of student protest. But when the government issued the martial law, I started thinking 'Wow, this is kind of big and very serious.' This martial law made student and government become enemies. Before that, we still had hope for the government."

Matters came to a head on June 3, when armed troops and the government's tanks rolled in and cleared the protestors from Tiananmen Square. Bloodshed followed the next day. Hundreds had been killed by the time the lone protestor some later dubbed "Tank Man" made his unforgettable stand.

Unforgettable, that is, as long as we strive to keep the memory of it alive.


That's why, for example, the Victims of Communism Memorial Foundation marked the 25th anniversary of the Tiananmen Square Massacre on June 11 with a wreathlaying ceremony attended by foreign ambassadors, Chinese dissident leaders, members of Congress and other Washington dignitaries.

The memorial statue for the VOCMF, in fact, is the "Goddess of Democracy," a bronze replica of the statue erected by Chinese students in Tiananmen Square in the spring of 1989. Many world leaders have visited the memorial site in Washington, D.C., to pay their respects and lay commemorative wreaths.

"We never thought a student movement could ever become so big," Wang said. But should we be surprised? History shows that the human desire for freedom can move mountains. It can embarrass a government. It can even stop a tank.

penetrable obtuseness to conclude that the most salient thing to know about University of California Santa Barbara killer Elliot Rodger is that he was a white male who didn't like women.

Yet many liberal commentators have managed it in the painful festival of stupidity that has followed his horrific act of mass murder. The reaction has featured rants about sexism, white privilege and Hollywood, all of which are absurdly detached from the reality of what happened at UCSB.

It is usually only the details of these sorts of rampage killings that differ, not the central element: a sick young man not getting proper treatment for his severe mental illness. Rodger's mother had been so frightened by his YouTube videos that she alerted his counselor, and the police visited his apartment. According to The New York Times, Rodger had been

prescribed risperidone, an anti-psychotic, but evidently refused to take it.

Even without that background, it is obvious that Rodger's final YouTube video and his 140-page manifesto promising to exact vengeance upon the women who spurned him are the ravings of a deranged person; as such, it is the derangement itself, not the content of the ravings, that is most important. Nonetheless, some commentators have plumbed his lunacy for meaning as if they were reading "The Bell Jar."

Washington Post film critic Ann Hornaday led the way with a piece asserting that it is "clear that his delusions were inflated, if not created, by the entertainment industry he grew up in" (his father

works in Hollywood). According to Hornaday, "a sexist movie monoculture" dangerously misled Rodger into believing that he could always get the girl in the end.

Salon ran a piece by Brittney Cooper arguing that "white male privilege kills." Cooper seems to believe that severe psychiatric disorders are something that rich white kids are prone to because they consider themselves so en-

The other interpretation is that, as Jessica Valenti put it in a piece for The Guardian, "misogyny kills." There is no doubt that Rodger hated women. But who watches Rodger's final video promising to annihilate all of unworthy humanity like a god and thinks: You know what's wrong with that guy? The sexism. If only he were cool with women, he would want to spare humanity from his wrath.

Nonetheless, the Twitter hashtag #YesAllWomen got started as a rebuke to Rodger's toxic attitude to women. It cataloged all that women suffer from sexism. I don't doubt that it's hurtful, to sample one of the tweets, to be a female shark biologist told that the public isn't ready to see you on camera. It just has nothing to do with Elliot Rodger's condition or his crime.

The reaction to the UCSB killings is sadly typical. Our political and media culture has proven impervious to serious discussion of severe mental illness and how it is treated in this country.

Rep. Tim Murphy, a Pennsylvania Republican, actually has a proposal to make it easier to treat the severely mentally ill. Alas, his bill won't get a viral Twitter campaign because it focuses on the real problem rather than exploiting the latest horror for cheap ideological points.

Fast food giants pick their workers'

No matter how small the haul, a thief is a thief, right?

If a poverty-wage fastfood worker sneaks out a couple of burgers to take home to the kids, the bosses yell: "Thief!"

But what do you call it when the bosses steal from those same workers? How about outrageous, disgusting - or simply unbelievable? Well, believe it or not, it's happening every day in multiple ways, and not by a few bad apples, but in what has become routine corporate practice by McDonald's, Burger King, Domino's, and other hugely profitable giants.



Fast food giants are

stealing worker's wages. Technically this shortchanging is called "wage theft." It involves such slick-fingered moves as erasing hours from employee time cards, requiring off-the-clock work, not paying for overtime hours, refusing to reimburse workers for gas they burned while making deliveries, or inventing uniform fees and other deductions that illegally drop pay below the minimum wage.

Come on - isn't it shameful enough that these global behemoths pay rock-bottom wages without them circling back like low-life pickpockets to steal from their own employees? This isn't just corporate thievery, it's thuggery.

How low can fast-food greed go? So low that the top bosses at headquarters play a sleazy game of hide and seek, pretending that they have nothing to do with this ripoff. Personnel practices, they air-

ily claim, are left to local franchisees, who are "independent business owners." Bovine excrement! Corporate central dictates how much mustard each franchise can put on a bun, so to think that it doesn't monitor every dime in payroll is a ludicrous lie.

In a recent survey of fast-food workers, 9 out of 10 said they've had wages stolen by their bosses. This thievery has become business as usual, and it's worse than shameful – it's slimy. For more information, go to the National Employment Law Project: www.nelp.org.

When a defender is reasonably sure he can set an opposing contract, he naturally considers doubling. Before he actually utters the word, however, the defender should consider whether he might be giving away information that will help declarer make a contract that might otherwise fail

Take this case where West doubled four hearts and led the three of clubs. South had no trouble diagnosing the three as a singleton, since the deuce was in dummy and the bidding marked West with length in spades and hearts.

Declarer won the club with the queen and, utilizing his knowledge of West's hand to the fullest, cashed the ace of hearts, disdaining a finesse. When East showed out as expected. South led another heart toward the J-8.

West put up the king since declarer would finesse the eight if the heart was ducked. Furthermore, West wanted to lock declarer in dummy and force him to lead a diamond or a club.

Accordingly, after taking the heart king, West played the ace and another spade to dummy's king. Declarer cashed the jack of hearts and then made the key play, leading the diamond king from dummy. This rendered the defense helpless. (If declarer had led a low diamond instead, East could have won the trick and given West a club ruff to defeat the con-

West took the king of diamonds with the ace, but when he tried to cash the queen, declarer ruffed and drew West's ten of trumps with the queen. South then claimed, discarding his fourth spade on one of dummy's good clubs.

It's true that South might have made four hearts without the double by West, but the double left declarer with no doubt about how to proceed.







BBB Alert: False utility bill collectors con consumers into payment

BBB warns of utility scams targeting local consumers

BBB serving Central, Coastal, Southwest Texas and the Permian Basin has received reports from CPS Energy in San Antonio that customers are claiming they are being contacted by someone representing the utility company. These scammers request payment or threaten the customers with disconnection of service. Last week, CPS Energy received over 100 reports of these types of encounters. Unfortunately, nearly a dozen individuals complied with the scammer's request.

Residential and commercial customers are receiving phone calls or visits from individuals claiming to be with CPS Energy. They use electric utility terminology to gain customers' trust. In some cases, scammers make their phone numbers show up on caller ID as originating from the customer's utility company. These cons may also create a sense of urgency, especially for businesses, by threatening to shut off power immediately if a payment is not made. Customers who have been contacted in this way should call the police and CPS Energy directly.

Customers should know that CPS Energy employees will:

NEVER threaten to disconnect service by phone or in-person.

NEVER ask for Green Dot or prepaid cards. NEVER call to request

credit card or banking information.

NOT ask to enter a home without a request for service or prior notification. ALWAYS wear a badge

with a photo and employee number. BBB wants consum-

ers to be on alert and has this advice to avoid being scammed:

Hang up the phone. Utility representatives should never ask customers to wire money for payment or ask asks customers to pay with a prepaid debit card. Beware if you are asked to provide credit card numbers or banking information over the

phone. Hang up and call the utility company directly to verify whether you owe money.

Never give out personal information. Never give out your bank account numbers, date of birth, credit card number or Social Security number to unidentified individuals.

Get informed. Find out what forms of payment your utility company accepts. If the caller is requesting a wire transfer or prepaid debit card payment, that's a red flag. If you are visited by someone claiming to be a CPS Energy representative, you can call the company's Security Hotline at (210) 353-4000 to confirm that the individual is an actual

CPS Energy employee. Keep numbers updated. If you are contacted by a utility company employee and asked for personal information, it's best to hang up and dial the number on your phone bill to be sure you are speaking with a legitimate representative.

Get help. If you receive phone call to make a wire transfer to pay a util-


