# Salado wins **UIL Lone Star** Cup -- again

Salado High School has won the Unievrsity Interscholastic League (UIL) Lone Star Cup for the second year in a row. UIL announced the winners June 12 and Salado has repeated as Lone Star Champions.

The Lone Star Cup ranks schools on how they fare in all UIL competitions, awarding points for playoff appearances and state championships in athletic, music and academic competitions.

Salado schools will receive the Lone Star Cup trophy along with a \$1,000 check during a special presentation in August for the annual Meet the Eagles.

"Congratulations to the students, employees, parents, and community members of the Salado Independent School District for this amazing accomplishment!" Superintendent Michael Novotny said.

The Texas Lone Star Cup is awarded to the high school with the best overall academic, athletic, and fine arts programs in each of the five divisions (1A-5A). Winners for 2013-14 school year are Salado in 2A, Weimar (1A), Argyle (3A), Friendswood (4A) and Southlake Carroll (5A).

Salado High won the 2A Lone Star Cup by scoring a total of 82 points in the following activities

Girls' Soccer = 2 (qualifying for playoffs)

Boys' Soccer = 6 (qualifying for playoffs, district champions, winning one round of playoffs)

Boys' Basketball = 8 (qualifying for playoffs, district champions, winning two rounds of playoffs)

Girls' Golf = 8 (state runner up)

One Act Play = 8 (state runner up)

Boys' Golf = 10 (state champions)

Softball = 10 (qualifying for playoffs, winning four rounds of playoffs)

Baseball = 10 (qualifying for playoffs, winnning four rounds of playoffs)

Academic UIL = 18 (district champions, regional champions, state champions)

Salado High School tied the all-time UIL Lone Star Cup record for the point total (82) for 2A high schools. Salado also tied this all-time point total record when the Eagles won the UIL Lone Star Cup last year.

With this third Lone Star Cup, Salado is in elite company. Of more than 1,000 high schools in the state, less than 10 can boast three Lone Star Cups. Only Salado and Holliday in 2A can boast three or more Lone Star Cups.

# Sales taxes drop

Sales tax rebates to Salado were down again while the county and state saw increases for the June rebates.

The Village of Salado payment was down by 18.5 percent compared to last June's payment. The Village received \$25,882.11 from the State Comptroller's office, compared to \$31,758.88 last June. For the year, rebates are down slightly, two percent. Thus far the Village has received \$188,143.39 through June compared to \$192,050.17 paid through June 2013.

Salado Public Library District is also down for the month and remarkably down for the year. The Library District received \$22,512.44, which is two percent less than last June's payment of \$22,981.80. For the year, however, the District is down 21 percent. So far the Library District has received \$143,597.75 in 2014. It received \$181,108.02 through June 2013.

Bell County is up considerably in June, receiving \$1.36 million compared to \$1.20 million last year, an increase of 13 percent. For the year, the County is up three percent, receiving \$8.17 million compared to \$8 million paid through June 2013.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said that state sales tax revenue in May was \$2.45 billion, up 8.5

percent compared to May 2013.

"Sales tax growth was evident across all major economic sectors," Combs said. "The growth was led by the retail and wholesale trade sectors, the oil and natural gas mining sector, and the services sector. This marks the 50th consecutive month of increased state sales tax revenues, and brings the fiscal year-to-date growth to 5.4 percent."

Combs sent cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their June local sales tax allocations totaling \$621.5 million, up 11.6 percent compared to June 2013.

Guinn, who is in his 49th year of teaching at Baylor University was selected as the 2013 Baylor Lawyer of the Year. A


committee of the Baylor Law Alumni Association selected Guinn for the honor.

1798, to be specific. The Alien and Sedition Acts were signed by President John Adams, no less. If you can't trust an actual Founding Father to oppose such an unconstitutional law, who can you trust?

Jump to 2014, and you'll find the same impulse to quash speech we disagree with is alive and well. All that's changed are the tactics. Frontal assaults are out. Today's politicians are savvier about how they propose to limit speech.

Hence Sen. Tom Udall (D-N.M.) has introduced a constitutional amendment that would allow Congress to limit fundraising and

so what are you complaining about?

But this is semantics. Free speech doesn't just refer to when you literally use your voice. Good thing, too, because how can you make your views known if you don't spend money? Most Americans support the candidate they favor with a financial contribution, of course, but almost every other activity involved in campaigns calls for money, from printing brochures and signs, to buying airtime for political ads.

In short, an essential part of your free speech is the ability to spend your money as you see fit to express your views. As Hans von Spakovsky, a former member of the Federal Election Commission, has written, "Bans on spending are bans on speech."

That's why the Supreme Court, in a landmark 1976 decision known as Buckley v. Valeo, struck down federal limits on campaign expenditures. Such limits, the Court said, restrain "the quantity and diversity of political speech." We need the broadest possible protection of speech to guarantee an "unfettered interchange of ideas for the bringing about of political and social changes desired by the people."

More recently, the Court struck down a federal ban on independent political speech by corporations, unions and associations. In 2010's Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission, the justices called free speech "an essential mechanism of democracy" that is "the means to hold officials accountable to the people."

But some incumbents don't like challengers. And they don't like the fact that voters can freely use their money to make their voic-

## Even for President Obama, math is math

For people who use the word "science" as a bludgeon and trumpet their strict commitment to fact and reason, the Obama administration and its supporters are strangely incapable of rational analysis of new climate-change regulations.

President Barack Obama's Environmental Protection Agency released draft rules earlier this month to create a vast new regulatory apparatus with no input from Congress -- in other words, to govern in its accustomed highhanded, undemocratic manner. The goal is to reduce carbon emissions from existing power plants, in particular coalfired plants, to 30 percent below 2005 levels by 2030.

The rhetoric has involved self-congratulation



about how they are the inexorable result of taking climate science and the reality of dangerous global warming seriously. "Science is science," President Obama said in an openand-shut tautology about global warming during an interview with New York Times columnist Tom Friedman. By the same token, math is math, and the new regulations make no sense.

While the regulations are stringent enough to impose real economic costs -- especially in states that produce coal or heavily use coal power, or whose economies have

grown relatively robustly since 2005 -- they have almost no upside in fighting global warming. That's because the U.S. is only part of the global carbonemissions picture, and a diminishing one at that.

We account for roughly a sixth of global emissions, and our emissions have fallen the past few years more than those of any other major country. In fact, we've already achieved about half of the administration's 30 percent goal, in part through the boom in natural gas.

The regulations aim to cut carbon emissions by 700 million tons by 2030. That sounds like a formidable number only if it is abstracted from the context of the rest of the world. As Robert Bryce of the Manhattan Institute

notes, carbon emissions increased worldwide by about 700 million tons in 2011 alone. China increased its emissions by 3 billion tons from 2006 to 2012. Even accepting the assumptions of the so-called global-warming consensus, the regulations will have an imperceptible effect on global temperature by 2100.

The regulatory fight against global warming runs up against this reality: Anything we do on our own short of returning to a subsistence economy is largely meaningless, while we can't force other countries to kneecap their economies based on a fashionable cause with no immediate bearing on the well-being of their often desperately impoverished SEE MATH, PAGE 7A

He was born to old money, but most of it was lost by the time he came of age. So Odey set out with old-fashioned drive (and the help of some very wealthy, old-school back-





Of course, Odey now resides in a proper British mansion. But he isn't satisfied to wallow selfishly in the wealth he raked in from his bets on the misfortunes of the masses. Rather, he is boosting the local economy by hiring architects, artisans, construction crews, and designers to build a snazzy \$250,000 house on his estate.

West's overcall posed quite a problem for Hazen. He certainly had reason to believe there might be a small slam, and he also could not dismiss the possibility of a grand slam.

At the same time, though, Hazen couldn't even be certain that there was more than a game in the combined hands. It all depended on the nature of Fry's opening bid.

Hazen finally chose the bid that was most likely to cover all contingencies: four notrump. Fry read this as Blackwood -- even though there had been no agreement on which suit was trump -- and he bid five diamonds, showing one ace.

Hazen now had a new problem. He realized that the opponents had an ace, probably in spades, but he

had no way of knowing whether they also could cash a second spade trick. He decided -- all factors considered -- that there was a good chance Fry had either the king of spades or a singleton spade. He therefore bid six diamonds, despite the risk attached to that bid.

Fry did not let him down. First of all, he had the good sense to pass, though he could hardly have felt comfortable winding up as declarer with only the 10-2 of trumps. But even more importantly, Fry had the decency to have the king of spades, and so made the slam.

Had Hazen played the slam from his seat, the contract would have gone down quickly with a spade lead.


