Clawson brings curbside recycling to Village

Al Clawson Disposal, Inc. (ACDI) customers in the Village of Salado will receive on June 30 a new, white 95 gallon container to be used for curbside recycling beginning in July.

Tanya Clawson informed Salado aldermen and the board voted 5-1 in support of the new program that will bring curbside recycling to Village of Salado customers of ACDI after Keep Salado Beautiful announced that it was closing its Saturday recy-

cling operations. ACDI will charge its customers \$18.75 for weekly container garbage service that will include recycling pickup every other week. This is an increase of \$1.50, an increase that Clawson said was planned for the Salado

"We haven't had an increase in price for Salado customers for more than four years," Clawson said, "and were planning for an increase this summer. When we learned that the recycling program in Salado was going to stop, we wanted to incorporate an added value to our Salado customers with the price increase."

The first collection date for the recycling is July 7 with pickups scheduled for every other Monday after that. Clawson said that customers will receive a calendar showing which dates the company will pick up the recycling containers.

Unlike many recycling programs that re-

quire users to sort their recyclables, the Clawson recycling will not require sorting. "Everything can go in the container," Clawson told Salado Village Voice. "We want to make it easy for our customers to recycle. The more that is recycled, the less goes into the landfill. This will reduce our landfill costs as well."

ACDI is partnering with Balcones Resources for sorting and separating the recyclables.

Within the Village of Salado limits, Clawson will also offer recycling pickup for non-garbage customers for a fee. Clawson said that she estimates the cost at \$12 per month for non-garbage custom-

For those Clawson customers who do not want to recycle, they can call the company to have the container picked up.: However, the rate of \$18.50 per month remains the same.

Here is a list of what you can recycle and can't recycle through the curbside service for the Village of Salado customers:

Paper products, including newspaper, office paper, junk mail, phone books, brown paper bags, magazines, paperboard like cereal boxes and flattened cardboard. Please keep paper products dry.

Metal, including tin cans, aluminum cans, steel cans and aluminum foil. Please rinse cans and especially foil so there is no food contamination.

Plastic jars, bottles, etc.: #1PET, which is soft drink, water and beverage bottle, detergent and cleaning containers, peanut butter and other food containers and bottles; #2 HGPE includes milk and water jugs, laundry detergents and shampoo bottles; #3 PVC which is clear food packaging, cling wrap, detergents and window cleaner bottles, some plastic squeeze bottles, cooking oil and peanut butter jars;

Other plastics: LDPE which includes bread, frozen food and most plastic wraps and some bottle: #5 PP which include deli soups, syrup, yogurt and margarine containers, clouded plastic containers, baby bottles and straws; #6 PS which includes CD cases, disposable cutlery, Styrofoam, food containers, packaging and egg cartons and #7 Mixed, which includes plastic baby bottle, 5 gallon water bottles, "sport" water bottles, clear plastic supply cups. Please rinse and remove lids.


Glass items: clear glass, green glass, brown glass and blue glass. This includes bottles and jars. Rinse and remove lids.

There are some things that cannot be recycled. These include plastic bags (these can be dropped off at the bin outside of Brookshire Brothers), light bulbs, mirrors, ceramics, motor oil, batteries and electronics.

Centex Scrap Metal in Killeen will buy batteries, as well as many other metals: copper metal, aluminum, brass, stainless steel, aluminum rims, Christmas lights/extension cords, appliances, car bodies and batteries.

Frazier, Haag get All State **nods from Texas Coaches**

Salado graduates Casey Frazier and Cole Haag were both named to the Texas High School Baseball Coaches Association (THSBCA) All State Third Team last week at their positions. Frazier also announced that he has chosen to attend the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor next year where he will pitch for the Crusad-

Frazier played June 14 in the THSBCA All Star Game at Dell Diamond. Frazier was also selected, along with Haag and Britton Hawes, to play in two Area All Star games: the Area Baseball Coaches Association All Star Game June 9 at the Dell Diamond and the Central Texas All Star Game at Baylor June 10.

Frazier ended his season 11-2 on the mound and was named to the District 22AA All District Team as the Defensive Most Valuable Player for his mound performances during the Eagles' 28-9-1 run that ended at the Region III fi-

Frazier pitched almost 90 innings with an ERA of .703. He struck out 116 batters, walked nine and hit nine with pitches. He allowed 55 hits, 21 runs (9 earned). Frazier also

swung a heavy bat for the Eagles, with a hitting percentage of .271 and an onbase percentage of .367. Frazier had 29 hits on 107 at-bats, knocking in 35 RBIs and scoring 13 runs himself.

In addition to the All State nod, Haag was named District 22AA All District First Team Catcher. He led the Eagle starters with a batting average of 3.643 and on-base percentage of .493 in his 146 plate appearance. He had 41 hits and 26 RBIs, scoring seven runs. He had a fielding percentage of

-35 meeting tonight

Texas Department of Transportation officials will give a look at what Saladoans should expect over the next 18 months with the expansion project of I-35 during a 6:30 p.m. June 26 town hall meeting at the Salado Intermediate School cafeteria.

While the south entrance to Salado is nearing completion, as well as the overpass on the south side and much of the work is completed on the north side of the project, the next 18 months will be crucial to the reconstruction of the ramps and underpasses at

Salado Plaza Dr.

That portion of the overall project may be some of the trickiest part of the expansion of I-35 through Salado. Officials will have more information on what to expect in terms of begin and completion dates as well as impacts on traffic flows.

Officials will also point people to the TXDOT website for I-35 through Central Texas, my35.org and following TXDOT on Twitter for late-breaking news about closings and traffic changes.

TXDOT and construc-

tion officials will give an informal brief of plans beginning at 6:30 p.m, followed by an open session of questions and answers.

Officials will stay afterward for specific questions from residents, businesses and other interested parties.

Mayor Skip Blancett is working with TXDOT to organize the meeting.

Several, if not all, aldermen are likely to attend the meeting, but no action or discussion by the board of aldermen will occur. They are there for informational purposes only.

Sirena may have a new home if aldermen vote in July to allow her to be placed on Village property just upstream from her current home in the springs of Salado Creek.

Artist Troy Kelley shared the history of the statue, which is one of the more photographed objects in Salado since she was placed in the Salado Creek at 12:01 a.m. Jan. 1 1986 as the first dedication of public art during the Texas Sesquicentennial.

Since then, she has been battered and beaten by rocks, trees and debris during the seasonal flooding of the creek. She is pockmarked by the gravel leaving its permanent trace. More than once she has been moved off of her foundation.

Now Kelley is seeking higher ground for her.

Of the Spring location where she now sits, Kelley says that "now there are large rocks surrounding her and I am afraid if they should ever give out during a flood that Sirena would be destroyed."

Kelley recently recast a new Sirena, using the molds he used in 1985 to cast her. Kelley original worked with local artist Lonnie Joe Edwards to melt down old brass water meters salvaged from

Waco to cast the original life-size mermaid sculpture.

At that time, she was the first life-size mermaid sculpture in Texas. Now, there are three. Sirena has been featured in a calendar of mermaid sculptures: "She was Miss December," Kelley told aldermen.

In 1991, local author Jackie Mills was given permission by Kelley to retell the original legend of Sirena, which Kelley

said his grandmother told him as a child.

"She has been the site of thousands of romantic proposals," Kelley said, "at least 50 of them for marriage."

In her 28 years in Salado Creek, Sirena has been removed for repairs four different times. Each time Kelley takes her out of the creek, there are always a ton of questions. "Where's Sirena?"

Kelley asked the board

to consider allowing her to be placed on the Village property which was recently acquired through a gift from Morris Foster.

Because the agenda item on the topic did not state that the board would possibly take action on the item, City Administrator Jim Reed asked aldermen to postpone any action until the topic can be property posted on the July 10 agenda.

Frederick Douglass, Self-Made Man

Frederick Douglass gave one of the great July Fourth orations in American history. Speaking in Rochester, N.Y., in 1852, he hailed the accomplishments and ideals of the Founders, before denouncing the nation's departures from the faith of the Dec-

laration of Independence with the righteousness and fury of an Old Testament prophet.

Douglass is one of the nation's greatest champions of freedom. The former slave fought for it for himself and for others, and in his speeches and writings left a record of devotion to liberty that will echo through all time.

In his youth as a slave on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, Douglass looked at the sailboats on the Chesapeake with envy, as he wrote later in his first memoir: "You are freedom's swift-winged angels that fly round the world. I am confined in bands of iron! O that I were free! O, that I were on one of your gallant decks, and under your protecting wing!"

Douglass forged his own freedom through shrewdness and will. When the wife of a household he was serving began innocently to teach him to read, her husband rebuked her: "A n----- should know nothing but to obey his master -- to do as he is told to do. Learning would spoil the best n----- in the world. Now, if you teach

that n---- how to read, there would be no keeping him. It would forever unfit him to be a slave."

That was all Douglass needed to know. "From that moment, I understood the pathway from slavery to freedom," he said. "I set out with high hope, and a fixed purpose, at whatever cost of trouble, to learn how to read." He traded his bread to white boys in exchange for their reading lessons, and devoured the collection of classic speeches, The Columbian Orator. Its writings in opposition to all oppression "gave tongue to interesting thoughts of my own soul."

In a turning point, he fought back against a slave breaker who sought to beat him. "You have seen how a man was made a slave," he writes of this act of self-assertion, "you shall see how a slave was made a man." All that was left was to make his escape.

In the North, he be-

came a fierce abolitionist and an evangelist for work and self-improvement. In his most popular lecture, titled "Self-Made Men," he declared, "We may explain success mainly by one word and that word is WORK! WORK!! WORK!!! Not transient and fitful effort, but patient, enduring, honest, unremitting, and indefatigable work, into which the whole heart is put."

In his legendary July Fourth oration, he said this holiday "is yours, not mine," and lashed the country for the national sin of slavery. But he honored the country's founding, in words that will always be true. "The 4th of July is the first great fact in your nation's history -- the very ringbolt in the chain of your yet undeveloped destiny," he declared. "Cling to this day -- cling to it, and to its principles, with the grasp of a stormtossed mariner to a spar at midnight."

Whoa, that was close. The National Rifle Association nearly shot itself in the foot recently with a common-sense editorial it posted online.

The group rootin'tootin', bullet-spittin', doctrinaire, gunseverywhere extremists finally saw something involving firearms that even it considered too extreme. In Texas (naturally), worshippers of the glorious gun god have taken to shouting out their ideological absolutism in coffee shops, museums, chain restaurants, and other public places by having a dozen or more of their ilk walk in together with shotguns, assault rifles and other weaponry strapped onto them.

"Any gun, anywhere," is their message, expressed in an unsubtle, don't-mess-with-us swagger.

"Scary," exclaimed the NRA editorial, calling the macho show counterproductive to the cause of gun rights, adding that such peacocking is down-

So the big, bad, neversurrender rifle organization quickly threw in the towel. It recanted its momentary lapse into sanity, and cravenly blamed some unnamed lowly staffer for the ideological impurity.

The upshot is you can expect to see newly sanctioned NRA gun strutters parading into cafes near you. But let me ask this: How would those strutters react if a band of African-Americans or Latinos were to stride into one of their cafes, armed to the teeth?

I'm with the president on this one: "There's no reason," he said, "why on the street today a citizen should be carrying loaded weapons."

Oh, that wasn't Barack Obama. It was Ronald Reagan, in 1967 — back when he served as the governor of California.



Willingham Spring Baptist Church building to be restored

A renewed effort to preserve the Willingham Spring Baptist Church and School is underway and interested community members are invited to tour the site and discuss the future of the 100 year old building. A meeting of descendants and preservationists will be held 2 p.m. on June 28 at the Willingham Spring Baptist Church on FM 2843.

The small wooden Baptist Church was built between 1911 and 1914 on land donated by Wilson Willingham. His grandfather Archibald Willingham was the first Anglo settler in Salado. What began as a church at the center of the Central Texas Community of Willingham Spring doubled as a one room school house in 1914. The Willingham Spring School was consolidated in July of 1929 along with Amity, Bell Plains, Elm Spring (Gooseneck) and Prairie Dell to form the Salado Rural School District. Later Cedar Knob, Cedar Valley and Union Grove




School were added and the district would become the Salado Independent School District in 1934. The building of the red brick schoolhouse on Main Street caused the closure of the one room schools and many of the school buildings were moved.

Willingham Spring remained with its community and church services continued until the impact of World War II in 1941

caused the building to be shuttered for a time. The surrounding community came together in 1950 to revitalize the church and a tabernacle was added for open air meetings. Over the years Willingham Spring Church experienced declining membership and services haven't been held in the historic building for several years. Today the building lies ready and waiting for future generations to make

use of it. Preservation of the building has been an ongoing project for many generations. In 1999 a Texas state Historical Marker was placed at the building. Honored on the inscription are farmers Bennie Brooks, John and Zola Kidd Lankford, Mart and Minnie Brinegar Van Dyke, H. L. and Clemmie Kidd Thomas and Arthur and Eula Housewright who helped build the structure. Hanna Elizabeth Kidd Myers is said to have driven the first nail for the church building.

Current restoration efforts will insure that the Willingham Baptist Church remains as an example of what the book Pioneer Buildings of Texas calls "the simplicity of the western pioneers' Protestant churches. Like this one, the early western Protestant churches generally had no steeple and little or no ornamentation. Church was not a fancy affair in this place and that time."

The disappearing trick

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

Assume you're in four hearts and West leads the club jack. East takes dummy's queen with the ace and returns the queen of diamonds.

Making the contract appears routine, but when you win the diamond with the ace and play the king of trumps, West shows out, and all of a sudden your "sure thing" becomes not so certain.

It seems you'll have to find West with the ace of spades in order to eventually dispose of your diamond loser on one of dummy's high spades. But when you lead a spade to the queen, East shows up with the ace, and your chances sink even further. East returns the diamond jack, and there you are, faced with a loser in each suit and a totally unexpected defeat.

But bridge is a game of twists and turns, and you naturally start looking for a way to extricate yourself from the rapidly deteriorating situation. And, if you work at it, you ultimately find the answer.

You win the diamond return with the king, cash the king of clubs and ruff a club. Then you lead a spade to dummy's king and ruff a spade. At this point, your remaining four cards are the Q-8-7 of trumps and nine of diamonds, while East holds the J-10-9 of trumps and ten of diamonds. So far, you've lost only two tricks -- a club and a spade.

You next lead the seven of trumps to dummy's ace and play the six of clubs, placing East in a hopeless position. If he discards, you ruff with the eight and lose only a diamond. If East instead ruffs the six of clubs with the ten or jack of trumps, you discard your diamond loser and win the last two tricks with the Q-8 of trumps. Either way, East is a dead







The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

You may be more vulnerable than the general population to certain microbial contaminants, such as Cryptosporidium, in drinking water. If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. 


