The performance of the Austin-based sitespecific aerial dance company is the gift of the Public Arts League of Salado to the village. PALS is bringing the one-of-a-kind performance to Salado through a matching grant from the Texas Commission of the Arts.

"We are so excited to have Blue Lapis Light coming to Salado," said Jill Shipman.

Blue Lapis Light's breakthrough production was in June 2006 when "Requiem" was held at the unfinished Intel Building in downtown Austin and was seen by more than 14,000 people in 33 performances.

The Baines House was the first Salado Digs Flowers garden of the month, having been selsected by a committee of three Master Gardeners. Others will be announced each month through the growing season of the summer and early fall.

"We do not use fertilizer or chemicals and only kill fire ants and wasps that are close to people places," said Sheryl Russell of the Baines House property that stretches across Center Circle at Royal Street.

"I try to plant enough for the deer and birds and people who stop to look and enjoy," she added. "The serpentine hedge at the west end of Royal was planted by me - one tiny sprig at a time surrounded by stones. People who walked by teased me about my miniature rock garden that could corral drunk snails."

"Gardens bring people pleasure and connect us in ways that are amazing. I've read that smell/scents linger longer in our memories than sights," Russel said. "Gardens capture all our senses."

The Salado Digs Flowers beautification through streetscaping competition is an effort to promote and beautify the village during the growing season with colorful flowers and

Lobby doesn't have the power to deny its employees the drugs it finds objectionable, nor does it claim such a power. Women who work for the company can buy them on their own. For that matter, Hobby Lobby doesn't claim the right to stop them from having abortions. The women who work for Hobby Lobby have exactly as much "choice" now as they did prior to the decision.

The Religious Freedom Restoration Act, passed by Congress in the 1990s with large bipartisan majorities, created a broad protection for religious liberty. It says that government can't create a substantial burden on someone's exercise of religion unless it is using the least restrictive means of furthering a compelling government interest. The court held that there are less restrictive means for the government to get women the drugs in ques-

The left can't get its

head around the idea that the law or the Constitution sometimes limits the means whereby it seeks to achieve its ends. The left doesn't really do law. It often doesn't even do reasoning. It does bullying and demagoguery. In the argument over Hobby Lobby, it has brought the logic of the "war on women" -- its shameless smear job -- to the Supreme Court.

There are numerous lawful ways around the Hobby Lobby decision. If it wants to get at the root of the matter, Congress can carve out an exception from the Religious Freedom Restoration Act for the contraception mandate, or repeal the act in its entirety. Surely, if liberal lions like Ted Kennedy and Bill Clinton had foreseen how the act would eventually get in the way of the left's coercive cultural agenda, they never would have supported it.

But finding a way to eviscerate or kill the act is for another day. For now, inveighing against the sexist Supreme Court is the priority.

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
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

Cosper died Sunday, July 6, 2014 at his home in Belton.


Cosper was born No-



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

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Humane Heroes rescue 44 dogs from local breeding facility

Due to an increase in awareness of the number of homeless animals falling victim to space-related killing in local municipal shelters, the public is responding with pointed leads and assistance in ending the over-breeding of dogs throughout our community. Yet another Bell County dog breeder has agreed to close her business and asked Texas Humane Heroes (TXHH), a private, non-profit, No Kill animal adoption organization to find forever homes for the remaining 44 animals. The dogs are currently being assessed for medical needs and will be available for adoption at the TXHH Killeen Adoption Center beginning July 9 at 11 a.m.

Texas Humane Heroes coordinated efforts to safely take in over 40 dogs from the breeding facility this past Monday. The breeds include Chihuahuas, Poodles, Shih Tzus, Cocker Spaniels, and Schnauzers. The cost of spay/neutering, microchipping, vaccinating, and caring for each of these dogs is approximately \$200. Community members are encouraged to donate to TXHH's Emory Bellard Memorial Fund at www.TexasHumaneHeroes.org/donate to assist TXHH in continuing rescue efforts of this kind.

"To know that our community is actively supporting animal welfare through the adoption of homeless animals as a family companion is heart-warming to say the least. Hearing that the breeding facilities are closing and breeders are willingly turning over the animals to organizations like ours is certainly a step in the right direction. In order to end mass euthanasia in municipal shelters nationwide, we must join together in the movement to continue to spay/neuter our animals

and choose adoption," said Eran Fehily, Director of Development with Texas Humane Heroes.

"This breeding facility, along with many others nationwide, may not necessarily be considered a 'puppy mill'; nonetheless, the animal conditions were heart-breaking. Many of the dogs have come to TXHH in poor physical condition, needing dental care, vaccinations, and grooming. Dogs were seen with skin sores, missing and rotting teeth, and in great need of individual attention and affection. Several of the adult female dogs are pregnant and will be placed into foster care immediately to care for the mothers and the eventual birth of the puppies, who will be ready for adoption at eight weeks of age. Our hopes are that each of these dogs will find a loving forever family to spend their life with," continued Fehily.

Many of the dogs from this breeder rescue effort are available for adoption at the Texas Humane Heroes - Killeen Adoption Center, located at 5501 Clear Creek Rd begin-

To the Editor:

The police report last week concerning the two huge broken limbs caused by the large moving van does not state all the facts. I was present both days and these are the facts.

The afternoon of June 25, a moving van was proceeding west on Indian Trail to move a family from Salado. The van grazed a large tree that forms a canopy over the street, scattered leave and small branches. The homeowner followed the van and addressed the driver in a very civil manner and asked him to please go around the other way on Indian Trail. He stated that because of all the recent moisture, the large limbs with lots of foliage were slightly sagging after he had hired a professional tree-trimmer to cut the limbs, raising them to 14'4", four inches above the required Salado ordinance. The driver did state that his customer, the homeowner who was moving, had directed him to a better route. Then, for apparently no reason, the van driver's attitude and tone changed and he became belligerent with the homeowner (of the tree). We left the area with nothing else said.

The next afternoon the homeowner, his son and myself returned from town after admiring the areas we had mowed and cleaned up to fin two large limbs, still attached to the tree but lying flat on the road (Indian Trail). The van driver and two helpers -- driving a U-Haul truck -- were attempting to pull the limbs out of the street. The homeowner was as-

sessing the damage when he was told by the driver to "get out of my way or I'm going to pull these limbs down on top of you." The homeowner, who was driving his golf cart with his son as his passenger, did move away to avoid further ramifications. The homeowner's son was talking to the driver in a non-threatening manner when the driver wrapped a chain around his hand, stating, "Don't come near me or I'll use this chain on you."

Soon the police arrived. From the outset, it was evident that our Salado police officer was sympathetic to the moving van driver. He was not interested in any facts except that the truck was 13'6" in height (actually 13'7") and the tree was lower. Nothing about the discussion the day be-

fore or the driver's threat with the chain was written into the officer's report. The officer's parting remark alluded to it being the homeowner's responsibility to "clean up this mess." With that, the moving van driver was not held accountable for his wrongdoing nor his threats and was escorted out of town.

The police reports stated that the homeowner was upset and causing a disturbance. He was very upset, but not the one who caused the disturbance. The morning of June 27, Skip Blancett, Fred Brown and Will Dankert removed the large amount of broken limbs and cleaned up the debris caused by the moving van. This was very much appreciated by the homeowner and the neighborhood.

Where's the missing damsel?

Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

Assume you're South and get to four spades as shown. West starts by cashing the K-A-Q of diamonds, East producing the doubleton 10-9, and shifts to the ten of clubs.

You win with the ace, play the A-K of trumps. catching West's Q-x, and there you are with the contract securely in tow -provided you guess which way to take the two-way heart finesse.

Undoubtedly, you've faced this situation many times before, and how well you've done at guessing the location of the missing damsel in the past is a good indication of how good a card player you are. How do you solve such problems? Granted, every case is different, but the underlying principle is pretty much the same. You look for clues of any kind whatsoever, and hope they'll point you in the right direction.

Sometimes the winning play is very easy to find, as in the present deal. You've learned quite a lot about West's hand from the bidding and play thus far, and it's not difficult to apply this knowledge to the task at hand.

From the bidding, you know that West passed originally and that he subsequently overcalled your opening spade bid with two diamonds. From the play you learned West started with five diamonds headed by the A-K-Q and that he also had the Q-x of spades.

Putting all this together, West can't realistically be credited with the queen of hearts because he surely would have opened the bidding had he held that card. So at trick seven, you lead a heart to the king and return the jack of hearts, planning to finesse with utmost confidence in the outcome.

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
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

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


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Shopping Map of Salado

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


