# Village unveils first glance of sewer costs during town hall

City administrator Jim Reed at a July 22 town hall meeting outlined proposals for a sewer system ranging in cost from \$4.9 million to \$11.8 million for parts of the Village of Salado but leaving out the majority of homes in the Village's largest housing area Mill Creek.

The proposal of \$4,872,450 would service only the Main Street area with a treatment capacity of 64,000 gallons per day (graphic of the service areas can be found on www. saladovillagevoice.com).

A second proposal of \$9,408,575 would service Main Street and the west side of I-35 with a treatment capacity of 315,000 gallons per day.

A third proposal would service Main Street, the west side of I-35, Salado schools and properties off Mill Creek Dr. at Salado Plaza for a cost of \$10.549.825. Part of this cost could be shouldered by entities benefiting from the extended sewer lines (commercial property at Salado Plaza and the Salado school district), Reed said, lowering that cost to a potential \$9,614,825.

A final proposal would include commercial properties at the northern limits of Salado and extension of service south and east on Royal for a cost of \$11,787.325.

"These are the absolute worst-case scenarios," Reed said. "They do not take into any consideration an increase in property values."

Reed said that property values would very likely increase as a result of a central sewer system being available for business expansion and investment.

Each of the proposals includes 10 percent contingency costs and an additional 25 percent engineering fees. The proposals include at least \$150,000 for the purchase of property for the sewer treatment plant, which will likely be built about a mile east of Salado proper.

Aldermen will need to call for the bond election by Aug. 15 in order for it to be put on the ballot in November, he added.

Before then, numbers and other particulars will be narrowed down further and explained to the voting public.

Even at a tax increase of 34 cents, Salado will be lower than seven of the eight neighboring cities, most of which provide sewer.

# Aldermen meet July 24

At their 6:30 p.m. July 24 meeting, Salado aldermen will discuss a request to fund Keep Salado Beautiful at \$5,000 per year from the waste disposal franchise fees, adding College Hill as an organization under the Village of Salado and a letter of affirmation for the Chamber Vision committee. The

board will also consider a donation from Victor Marek during the meeting. In a workshop session following the regular meeting, aldermen have a plateful of discussion items, including these: discuss maintenance to the pond dam at the low water bridge; discuss Salado salamander and potential

conservation actions for the Village; staffing update; village administrator recruitment; wastewater system update; bond election update; code enforcement update; building update; budget update and the Planning and Zoning Board/Zoning Board of Adjustments.



# **Property** values increase in Salado

As Salado ISD trustees and Village of Salado aldermen cobble their respective budgets for 2014-15 fiscal years, both got good news this week when they learned that taxable property values have increased from last year.

Taxable values for the Village of Salado are up more than 1 percent while the taxable values for the Salado Independent School District are up almost 4 percent for 2014.

Bell County Tax Appraisal District certified the total freeze-adjusted taxable values for the Village of Salado at \$174,040,106 for 2014, up just over \$2 million from last year's freezeadjusted taxable value of \$171,691,402.

The approximate levy at the current rate of 12 cents per \$100 evaluation will be \$236,263.37 for 2014. Last year, the tax appraisal district estimated the tax levy for the Village at \$230,286.55.

The total market value of land, improvements and non-real estate property is \$283,741,642 for the Village. Of that, \$192,470,324 are home-sites. The Village adopted as local tax exemptions a \$5,000 deduction plus 20 percent value deduction for all homesteads. In addition, the Village has a \$50,000 deduction for homesteads values for those over 65 or disabled in addition to the tax freeze adopted by the state. Local property exemptions result in a loss of \$49 million in taxable values for the Village of Salado. Salado ISD freeze adjusted taxable values increased to \$560,760,271 last from year's \$540,172,170 to generate at total tax levy of \$8,762,501.97 based upon the tax rate of \$1.30 per \$100 valuation (\$1.04 maintenance and operation and \$0.26 for debt service).

Reed explained to the audience the tax ramifications for a property with a taxable value of \$200,00. For proposal one, the annual increase in property tax would be 18 cents, or \$360 per year (\$30 per month). For the second proposal, the tax would be 34 cent increase in taxes for \$680 per year or \$56 per month. The third proposal would be a 34.5 cent increase for \$690 per year or \$57.50 per month. The fourth, all-encompassing proposal would be 44 cents, \$880 per year or \$73.33 per month.

tions about tap fees to businesses, the over-65 tax freeze, operating costs for businesses that tap into the sewer, costs of tying into the main line.

"I would not want to do this without doing the west side in order to leverage the great growth potential there while protecting the nature of the downtown historic area," Reed said. "The west side has the potential to grow so much faster and can take some of the burden of sales tax and increase property tax off of Main Street."

The group includes Joe Oliver, Mel Williams, Bill Pinkston, Alderman Hans Fields, Alderman Fred Brown, Merle Stalcup, Roy Harden and Lawson Grant. Most of the expenses for gasoline, mower repairs and supplies have been paid for out of members' pockets before receiving the \$500 from the Village of Salado. ### Troy Kelley breaks ground on Ft. Hood memorial

Artist Troy Kelley and the city of Killeen broke ground on the November 5, 2009 Fort Hood Memorial July 22 at the memorial site 3601 South W.S. Young Drive. The groundbreaking ceremony is something that the Salado artist has been working toward for the past four years as he has created personal memorial bronzes for each of the 13 shooting victims.

The memorial honors the victims of the tragedy that occurred at Fort Hood November 5, 2009. Thirteen people lost their lives, 32 were injured and countless family members were affected. The memorial will be a permanent structure in Killeen so that our community will forever remember and pay tribute to the victims.

Killed in the shooting were the following: Michael Grant Cahill, a civilian physician assistant from Spokane, Washington; Major Libardo Eduardo Caraveo of Woodbridge, Virginia; Staff Sergeant Justin Michael DeCrow of Plymouth, Indiana; Captain John P. Gaffaney of Serra Mesa, California; Specialist Frederick Greene of Mountain City, Tennessee; Specialist Jason Dean Hunt of Tipton, Oklahoma; Staff Sergeant Amy Sue Krueger of Kiel, Wisconsin; Private First Class Aaron Thomas Nemelka of West Jordan, Utah; Private First Class Michael S. Pearson of Bolingbrook, Illinois; Captain Russell Gilbert Seager of Racine, Wisconsin; Private First Class Francheska Velez of Chicago, Illinois was pregnant when killed, and the baby also died; Lieutenant Colonel Juanita L. Warman of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and Private First Class Kham See Xiong of Saint Paul, Minnesota.

The Memorial Pavilion will include a pillar dedicated to the memory of each of the 13 victims of the November 5, 2009 shooting.

Each pillar will include an engraved portrait of the victim, as well as a poem, a message, a verse or a scripture chosen by the family to best represent the victim's life. Kelley has also cast a memento

from the person's life to capture the victim's essence. The victims, Kelley said, "had a life, a family, a hometown. They should be honored not just by Americans but by all the world."

The total cost of the project is \$402,530 including the \$269,030 for the memorial pavilion.

Donations may be made through Killeen Volunteers, Inc., taxpayer ID #1-74-600-1504-7, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization.

Once donations are received, letters will be mailed to the donors to allow them to claim the tax deductions.

Donations may also be made in memory of a familv member as allowed by law, and all donations sup-

### **President Obama's Man-Caused Disaster**

As a defender of the nation's borders, President Barack Obama is a hell of a pool player. Obama's recent game in a Denver bar with Colorado Gov. John Hickenlooper was bright and cheery, as one would expect of a president who didn't have any depressing visits to frightened ranchers, overwhelmed border agents or desperate migrants on his future itiner-

The first rule in a crisis for any executive is put on his windbreaker and boots and get out on the ground. President George W. Bush didn't do it soon enough after Hurricane Katrina and, politically, could never make up for it, no matter how many times he visited New Orleans. Obama's bizarre resistance to visiting the border on his fundraising swing out West fueled talk of the influx as Obama's "Katrina moment."

The Katrina analogy is over the top because the border influx isn't a deadly catastrophe swallowing an American city. It also is too generous because Bush didn't do anything to bring on Hurricane Katrina, whereas Obama's policies are responsible for the influx of immigrants. It is, in the argot of his administration, a "man-caused disaster."

According to the Los Angeles Times, the number of immigrants younger than 18 who were deported or turned away from ports of entry declined from 8,143 in 2008 to 1,669 last year. There were 95 minors deported from the entire interior of the country last year. At the same



time, the number of unaccompanied alien children arriving from El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras exploded from less than 4,000 several years ago to 40,000 since last October.

The White House brushes off criticism that Obama is avoiding the border as mere "optics," in contrast to its highly substantive focus. But it is still not taking the crisis seriously. The nearly \$4 billion the president is requesting is not fundamentally about enforcement that will reverse and end the tide, but about managing the influx.

A devastating critique by the Center for Immigration Studies notes that about half of the money goes to the Department of Health and Human Services "for acquisition, construction, improvement, repair, operation and maintenance of real property and facilities." The enforcement portion of the request, according to CIS, "is not truly geared toward removal," but instead to

"recouping costs for temporary detention and subsequent transporting of aliens."

The administration's reaction to the crisis is just another in a long series of acts of bad faith on immigration. It is asking Congress for more money for its priorities at the same time the president is promising, in effect, to suspend yet more immigration laws in response to the failure of "comprehensive immigration reform."

Republicans in Congress should crumple up the president's border request in a ball and start over, with an emphasis on holding migrants near the border and working through their cases quickly to address the shortterm crisis, and provisions for interior enforcement to address illegal immigration more broadly.

Of course, even if such a bill were to pass and to be signed into law, that'd be no guarantee that the president of the United States would enforce it. That speaks to an entirely different man-caused disaster.

Excuse me, but corporations don't have hearts. They have bottom lines, period. And the bottom line is that Cargill's terminally hypocritical honchos see dollars lying on the ground that they're not getting.

"Despite the many merits of biotechnology, consumer interest in food and beverage products made from non-GM ingredients is growing," explains Ethan Theis, a Cargill man with the cumbersome title of food ingredients commercial manager. These consumers are "creating opportunities and challenges for food manufacturers and food service operators," he added.

That's the clearest expression you'll ever get of corporate integrity.

Heather met her husband Josh Harris when they were both in Tablerock's production of


