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Village set to call for bond

Salado aldermen directed city manager Jim Reed to prepare for them to call for a November 4 bond election totaling \$10,549,825 for the construction of a wastewater treatment plant and delivery system for a service area that would include the downtown business district, the west side of I-35, Salado schools and properties off of Mill Creek Dr. at Salado Plaza.

The board must vote in favor of calling an election no later than Aug. 18 to go on the ballot in November. Because of difficulty in having a quorum at the next regular meeting, aldermen will hold that meeting at 6:30 p.m. Aug. 12 at the Municipal Building, during which they will vote on calling for the November election.

The proposal that aldermen favored in a workshop discussion on July 24 would service Main Street, the west side of I-35, Salado schools and properties off Mill Creek Dr. at Salado Plaza for a cost of \$10,549,825. Part of this cost could be shouldered by entities benefiting from the extended sewer lines (commercial property at Salado Plaza and the Salado school district), Reed said, lowering that cost to a potential \$9,614,825.

Regardless of whether those other entities invest in the cost of the sewer sys-

tem, the ballot will carry the sticker price of \$10.5 million. "Nothing in the results of the election say that we have to issue and retire all of the bonds," Reed told aldermen in the workshop session. You can choose to only fund the lines of A & H on the map if those entities choose to participate."

Reed was directed to bring additional information to the board to make a decision, including an estimate of the customers to be served and possible operating costs estimates.

At a town hall meeting July 21, Reed presented the maps and alternatives that aldermen would take into consideration in their decision to call for a November bond election.

The \$10.5 million bond could require a tax increase of as much as 34.5 cents on the property tax rate if approved by voters.

"That is the worst-case scenario," Reed said when he first unveiled the possible impacts on the tax rate.

The tax impact on those residents in Salado over age 65 who have filed for the homestead exemption and tax freeze? Zero.

Reed affirmed this fact with the audience at the regular board meeting July 24 this after "doing some research on the matter and speaking to authorities at the tax appraisal district and in the Texas Municipal League. If you are over 65 and have filed for the homestead exemptions,

the property tax on your homestead is frozen at the level in which you initially filed for the exemption."

Regardless of the fluctuation in tax rates or taxable values in a municipality for the over 65 homestead and disabled homestead tax freezes, the property taxes will remain the same "unless you sell your homestead and move into another homestead in Salado."

Even if you sell and move somewhere else in the state, the tax freeze ratio will follow you, Reed explained.

If you have filed for the over 65 homestead exemption and freeze and sell vour home, the new owner will pay the property tax rate at the current rate, regardless of their age.

The homestead exemption does not apply to second homes, undeveloped residential property or commercial property. For example, if a homeowner over age 65 owns the lot next to their home, then that taxpayer would pay the current tax rate on the second lot.

The tax impact to other property owners could be lowered by requiring tap fees for the property owners that will be served by the sewer system. Reed presented the numbers based on the assumption that there would not be tap or hook-up fees to the properties served. "But

Backroads will begin playing at the Outback at 8:30 p.m. and continue until 11 p.m. at which time the awards ceremony will take place. Admission to the concert is included in the race fee, but others can enjoy the concert for just \$5 per person. The after-run party will end at midnight.

Both the Salado ISD Board of Trustees and the Village of Salado Board of Aldermen unanimously voted in favor of writing letters of support of the top goals developed by the Salado Vision Committee.

The Vision Committee sent representatives back to their respective boards (Salado ISD, Village of Salado, Salado Chamber of Commerce, Salado Historical Society, Mill Creek Community Association and Salado Tourism Council) seeking their support in pursuing goals in terms of infrastructure, business climate and quality of life.

The top goals of the Vision Committee have three action items to achieve the top-line goals.

Following are the goals associated action and items:

Infrastructure. Take proactive actions to create a first class infrastructure system.

1. Sewer system: The Vision Committee supports the phased construction of a wastewater treatment system which will initially focus on the business district and I-35 but will be scalable to add existing and proposed residential areas. The first phase will support the expansion and revitalization of the business sector to increase sales tax revenues and reduce dependence upon property taxes.

2. Roads: The committee supports the development of a comprehensive road maintenance program to focus on a fiveyear rotation to resurface city-maintained streets, accomplishing this in the current tax structure.

3. Sidewalks and Paths: The committee supports the development of a sidewalk and pathway program that includes requirements for sidewalks in new developments; pursuing grants to retrofit school zones and pedestrian areas with pleasant walk and path facilities; development of a downtown sidewalk plan and enhancement of bicycle lanes.

Top Business Goal: To provide a most laudable Business Environment:

1. Communication, promotion and education: the Committee supports the development of a streamlined communication strategy integrating city, Chamber, community and school efforts.

2. Streamline/reduce regulations: The commit-

tee supports the overhaul of the current set of regulations which guide development in the Village. The Committee supports consideration of surveying regional entities to determine if a shift away from both the 2009 International Building Code and the agreement with Bureau Veritas is appropriate.

3. Economic Development: The Committee supports the establishment of a joint Village/Community Economic Development entity to develop and provide guidance to entities wishing to do business in the Village.

Quality-of-Life Тор Goal: Build up our community to work in unity.

1. Events, entertainment and activities: The Community supports this effort in conjunction with

the top business goal.

2. Parks and recreation. The committee supports the development of a formal parks plan for the village that includes a complete inventory of existing parks, plans for connectivity to infrastructure, plans for maintenance and integration of entities such as Keep Salado Beautiful, Public Arts League of Salado and other entities.

3. Beautification: The Committee understands the importance of supporting beautification efforts. The Committee supports the development of a community beautification plan that integrates the efforts of volunteer and community groups to assure a comprehensive pocket park, planting and guide way plan.

The late entry fee for the Midnight Madness 5K is \$40 per person, \$30 for students and military and late registrants may not receive an event t-shirt.

Union Drama at the Met

The fat lady will sing -but only in strict keeping with the work rules set out by the American Guild of Musical Artists.

The Metropolitan Opera has a labor problem. Personnel expenses account for \$200 million of the financially struggling Met's \$327 million budget.

In the interest of survival in an era more at-

tuned to "Keeping Up With the Kardashians" than "Le Nozze di Figaro," the Met wants to reduce its labor costs by 16 percent by getting the unions to accept common-sensical work rules and less-generous pension and health benefits. The unions say no and accuse the Met of waging war on their families.

The storied but precarious institution could see its next season disrupted in the labor discord. The Met's general manager, Peter Gelb, warns that without union flexibility, the very existence of the world-famous, 130-yearold opera is at risk.

Well, if worst came to worst, at least the Met's singers and musicians could make a go of it at the New York City Opera. No, wait, it shut its doors last year.

It doesn't take an opera



aficionado to realize that the 21st century isn't the 19th, and opera is an embattled art form. Unfortunately, the Met is locking horns with a force, the unions, that has proven adept at helping to drive struggling industries into the ground.

A New York Times editorial recently noted that orchestra members, who on average make \$200,000 a year, get 16 weeks off with pay. The American Federation of Musicians Local 802 shot back that it is really only 10 weeks of guaranteed time off with pay. Touche'.

Under the current rules, the base pay for chorus members, who also make

on average \$200,000 a year, covers four performances a week. The members get paid extra for rehearsals -- even if they haven't sung in four performances that week.

They also earn overtime for singing in any opera over four hours, which makes Richard Wagner the best thing that ever happened to a Met singer's paycheck. His "Parsifal" clocks in at five hours, and wasn't performed last season, in part because of labor costs.

The union case against its nemesis Gelb is that he's a spendthrift, and there's something to it. Gelb dropped almost \$20 million a few years ago on a production of Wagner's "Ring" cycle that included a 45-ton set. If the production underperformed at the box office, it was on

a scale worthy of the Met and was funded by a gift. Only unions would complain that an opera manager is spending too much on opera and not enough on overtime pay and pension benefits.

Given the head winds in the culture, what the Met accomplishes is extraordinary -- more than 200 performances a season, in front of 800,000 people in the house and another couple of million in broadcasts in movie theaters. It is working to preserve a demanding art form that represents one of the high points of Western civilization. It would be a shame for the ages if it were brought low, not just by indifference without, but by shortsighted union grubbiness within.


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

Cedar Valley Baptist Church invites you to an old fashioned revival with Dennis Erwin preaching Aug. 1-3.



Sales tax holiday Aug. 8-10

This year's Sales Tax Holiday in Texas is Aug. 8-10.

As in previous years, the law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend.

Subject to certain criteria, all sales of qualifying items made during the holiday period qualify for the exemption, including items sold online, or by telephone or mail. Layaway plans can be used again this year to take advantage of the sales tax holiday.

The dates for the sales tax holiday are set by the Legislature.

Families can save money by not paying sales tax on most clothing, footwear and school supplies priced under \$100. Lists of taxfree items can be found at www.TexasTaxHoliday. org.

The sales tax holiday weekend in Texas has been an annual event since 1999.

Shoppers are expected to save an estimated \$78.9 million in state and local sales taxes during the sales tax holiday.

The following school supplies will be tax-free during the holiday as long as the item is under \$100: Binders, Book bags, Calculators, Cellophane tape, Blackboard chalk, Compasses, Composition books, Crayons, Erasers, Folders; expandable, pocket, plastic, and manila; Glue, paste and paste sticks, Highlighters, Index cards, Index card boxes, Legal pads, Lunch boxes, Markers (including dry erase markers); Notebooks, Paper; loose leaf ruled notebook paper, copy paper, graph paper, tracing paper, manila paper, colored paper, poster board, and construction paper; Pencil boxes and other school supply boxes, Pencil sharpeners, Pencils, Pens, Protractors, Rulers, Scissors, Writing tablets.

In addition, the following clothing and accessories will be tax-free, with some limitations:

Adult diapers, Aprons (household), Athletic socks, Baby bibs, Baby clothes, Baby diapers (cloth or disposable), Backpacks (for use by elementary/secondary students); Belts with attached buckles, Blouses, Boots (general purpose), Bow ties, Bowling shirts, Bras.

Camp clothes, Caps (baseball, fishing, golf), Chef uniforms, Children's novelty costumes, Clerical vestments, Coats and wraps, Coveralls, Diapers (cloth and disposable), Dresses, Employee uniforms (unless rented), Fishing caps, Fishing vests (non-flotation), Football accessories.

Gloves (generally), Golf accessories; caps, dresses, jackets and windbreakers, shirts, skirts, Graduation caps and gowns, Gym suits and uniforms, Hats, Hooded shirts and hooded sweatshirts, Hosiery, including support hosiery, Hunting vests.

Jackets, Jeans, Jogging apparel, Knitted caps or hats, Leg warmers, Leotards and tights, Mask, costume, Neckwear and ties, Nightgowns and nightshirts, Painter pants, Pajamas, Pants, Panty hose, Raincoats and ponchos, Rain hats, Religious clothing, Robes.

Scarves, Scout uniforms, Shawls and wraps, Shirts, Shirts (hooded), Shoes (generally), Shorts, Skirts, Sleepwear, nightgowns, pajamas, Slippers, Slips, Soccer socks, Socks, Suits, slacks, and jackets, Support hosiery, Suspenders, Sweatshirts, Sweat suits, Sweaters.

The potential tax rate is also based upon zero growth in the property values in the city. However, Reed said that it is very likely that a sewer system would increase the values of properties in the business district and especially in the undeveloped areas along the west side of the interstate and northwest of the Village proper.

A sewer system would also help bring in sales tax revenues by contributing to the revitalization of the businesses in Salado. "The

more restaurants and businesses, the more sales tax we can generate," Reed said, which would offset general fund costs that are currently paid for by sales tax, franchise fees, court fees and property taxes.


Providing sewer would allow the Village to annex property owners that are in the extra-territorial jurisdiction (ETJ) and contiguous to the existing city limits. Since it was incorporated in 2000, the Village of Salado has not been able to annex property except through the request of property owners. Even at the highest possible increase in property taxes, Reed explained to residents at a town hall meeting last week that the total tax rate for the Village of Salado would still be lower than any Bell County city except two: Troy and Little River Academy.

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


A fine declarer plans his line of play at the start of a hand, but remains ready to revise that plan at any time if there is an unexpected development. As a case in point, consider this deal where West leads a spade against six hearts.

When dummy appears, South should expect to make the slam. He plans to win the spade, draw two rounds of trumps (assuming a normal 2-1 division), cash the A-K of diamonds, discarding a club from dummy, and sooner or later concede a club trick. The three remaining trumps in dummy will then be sufficient to ruff his club and diamond losers.

But when he wins the first spade and leads a heart to the ace, he discovers that East has all three missing trumps. This means he cannot afford to draw the outstanding trumps (even with the aid of a finesse), since he would then have only two trumps left in dummy to ruff his three minor-suit losers. South must therefore revise his original plan of play.

He should cash the A-K diamonds, discarding a of club, and ruff a diamond, then play a club to the ace and lead the nine of diamonds. When West covers with the ten, South does not ruff, but discards dummy's last club instead. In so doing, he al-

lows for the possibility that East started with three diamonds rather than four.

As it happens, this one cautious play averts defeat South is eventually able to ruff two clubs in dummy and take the marked trump finesse to round out his 12 tricks. In effect, South winds up ruffing two clubs and a diamond in dummy instead of two diamonds and a club as originally planned.

Observe that if declarer tries to ruff his fourth diamond in dummy, East overruffs to defeat the slam.

*Executes deeds and contracts on behalf of the Village when authorized by ordinance, resolution, or motion of the Village Board of Aldermen.

Other Job Functions:

*Writes correspondence and memorandums:

*May represent the Village in professional and civic organizations;


