# **Over 500 sign petition** for sale of beer, wine

Salado voters may have two local elections in November, including a local option election for the legal sale of beer and wine.

Graydon and KD Hill are hoping to open a microbrewery in Salado, but must first get over some legal hurdles, chief among them being the onerous regulations of the sale of beer and wine in the Village of Salado.

By local elections, the Village of Salado allows the legal sale of alcohol under certain circumstances, a microbrewery wanting to sell beer and/ or wine for on-site and offsite consumption not being one of them.

For example, you can drink wine in a winery and take wine home from that winery thanks to a 2003 amendment to the State Constitution. That amendment has helped the wine industry in Texas to blossom in recent years as wine tourism grows in popularity. There are strict regulations on wineries about where their grapes are harvested. The majority of grapes vinted must be from Texas in order to meet the standard of being a Texas winery.

After the Village of Salado incorporated, local restaurants banded together to get the requisite signatures for an election to allow for the sale of mixed tures on it at the end of business on Aug. 5, the deadline given to them by the city in order for the signatures to be verified in time to be put on the 6:30 p.m. Aug. 12 Board of Aldermen agenda.

The Aug. 12 meeting is the last opportunity for the issue to be called by aldermen in order to be put on the November ballot.

The petition calls for the legal sale of beer and wine, which allows the sale of beer and wine for both on-site and off-site consumption.

Currently, the sale of beer and wine is allowed for off-site consumption. Restaurants can sell beer and wine for on-site premises under their mixed drink licenses. But the onsite sale of beer and wine in an establishment that does not meet the minimum standard of 51 percent of all sales being food is not allowed in Salado. Hence, there are no beer halls or wine bars.

The measure being proposed could change that, but it comes short of a measure that would allow for "The legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages.

There are 10 local option elections allowed in the state:

•"The legal sale of beer for off-premise consumption only." Beer in a grocery or convenience store.

• "The legal sale of beer." Beer in a grocery

• "The legal sale of wine on the premises of a holder of a winery permit." The sale of wine at a winery.

Currently, the Village of Salado has approved the sale of beer and wine for off-premise consumption, the sale of mixed beverages by food and beverage certificate holders only and the legal sale of wine on the premises of a winery permit and the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only.

According to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, "Following the demise of Prohibition, local communities maintained

# **Hidden Glenn awarded 9% housing tax credit**

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs awarded the proposed JES Development Company Inc. with 2014 Competitive the Housing Tax Credit for Hidden Glen, a 50-unit senior affordable living project in the Village of Salado extra-territorial jurisdiction (ETJ).

As a result, JES Development Company will receive \$580,000 (9 percent of the overall value of the \$6.5 million project) in tax credits per year for the next 10 years.

The tax credits can be sold to businesses, such as banks and other entities

the tax abatement, the development would generate approximately \$7,500 in new property taxes to the Village annually.

They grilled Feaster, aldermen and city administrator Jim Reed about the project, peppering them with questions about possible drainage issues, the quality of the facility itself, adequate market research of the area and the future infrastructure and public service needs of the proposed gated community of 50 units.

The village would have to provide police services to the development when it is brought into the Village limits. Fire service will be provided by the Salado Volunteer Fire Depart- ing and a cart trail that ment (SVFD), water would come from Salado Water Supply Corporation and the project would have its own on-site sewage treatment system. Addressing a concern that the project is Section 8 housing, alderman Fred Brown said, "the federal government does not pay to subsidize the rents on these properties. The renters pay the rent. They pay their own water and their own electricity." When the project is near completion, it will begin the process of accepting residents who must meet certain standards in terms of income. Feaster said that annual income level must be at or below \$32,000 per year, which is

60 percent of the median income for Bell County. Everyone in the unit must also be 62 years old. He added that the projects are not assisted living, but "independent living."

The proposed Hidden Glen project fell just short of the tax credit award last year and was slightly changed for this year to make it more competitive against other projects.

But the major aspects of the project remain the same, including its location northeast of the intersection of Mary Lane and Vanessa St. and the design standard which will feature Texas limestone, a clubhouse for residents, green space, covered park-

drinks in restaurants.

Shortly after that, Brookshire Brothers was able to expand into a new location after voters approved a measure allowing for the off-premise sale of beer and wine, which opened the door to convenience and grocery stores to get into the alcohol-selling game.

In May, voters overwhelmingly approved a measure spearheaded by Robert Dudezcka for the the legal sale of alcohol for off-site consumption, In that May election, 441 voted in favor and 225 voted against.

The newest proposed measure could be called for the November election provided that Graydon and KD Hill have collected enough signatures (354) to put the issue on the ballot.

the right to choose whether to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages. Many communities decided to remain "dry" or "partly dry," which meant that alcohol sales were banned or restricted. Many communities conducted elections and voted to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages. Those communities who were 'wet' prior to Prohibition automatically reverted back to their original status."

In the past century and a half, Salado has come long way from this а description from a U.S. soldier in July 1869 referring to Salado as being "impressed upon my mind as being the first teetotal, 'sure enough,' 'total abstinence' village that I ever visited."

One has to wonder if that soldier would recognize Salado today.

# P&Z says no to private stable

Salado Planning and Zoning Commision voted against a request at their Aug. 5 meeting for a Conditional Use Permit for a private stable on property that is zoned SF-7 single family residential.

The zoning ordinance allows private stables in SF-7 zoned areas under CUPs only which restrictions and requirements can be put in place to allow the

listed usage.

Instead, P&Z will recommend against approval of the CUP at all. The request by the property owners at 493 Salado Creek Rd. is scheduled to be brought before the Board of Aldermen at their Aug. 21 meeting.

Before voting unanimously against the private stable, P&Z members listened to an adjacent property owner requesting a denial of the CUP. Joe and Carlinda Rex asked

P&Z to deny the CUP for several reasons, including safety and health as well as affecting property values and access to adjoining properties.

The Rexes own property on both sides of the property in question with an easement between the two, which they say has been adversely affected by the current situation in which horses, hay bales and panels have prevented

for as much as 80-90 cents on the dollar, according to Mark Feaster of JES.

JES is pursuing the project because it sees the demand in the community for 300 units for senior affordable living, Feaster said.

The project will have one- and two-bedroom apartments available to those seniors aged 62 and above (a concession made to aldermen at a workshop). In January, aldermen endorsed the project and voted to give it a tax abatement of \$930 per year after the project annexes itself into the Village limits, something the developers have said they would do when construction is complete. Even with

During the 10 years that the tax credits are issued, Feaster said, the developers will have to continue to meet the requirements attached to the credits, including the income requirements for residents.

"We can't just go and change," he said, "otherwise we will have to pony up all the credits."

The units are one bedroom apartments of about 700 sq. ft. that will rent for \$530 per month and two bedroom apartments of about 850 sq. ft. that will rent for \$695 per month.

JES has more than 15,000 affordable housing units, Feaster said.

# An Open Exchange of Ideas **'A Hell of a Foray'**

If an Israeli high-level official were caught on a hot mic candidly commenting on Secretary of State John Kerry's illfated act of Israel-Hamas peacemaking, he might call it "a hell of a diplomatic foray."

Kerry was caught sarcastically describing the Israeli offensive into Gaza as "a hell of a pinpoint operation" during his round of Sunday-show interviews two weeks ago, before telling his aide over the phone, "We've got to get over there," and "It's crazy to be sitting around." Kerry's belief in himself as the Indispensable Man is touchingly quaint. His conception of the U.S. secretary of state is apparently frozen in a time when it was a position of unparalleled power and respect. Those days are gone.

Or as President Barack Obama might quip, to paraphrase his put-down of Mitt Romney's foreignpolicy views during one of the 2012 presidential debates, "John, the 1980s want their secretary of state back."

After six years of resetting, leading from behind, ending wars, nation building at home and pivoting to Asia, the U.S. has reduced itself to a husk of its former influence. When Kerry showed up in Cairo to meet with the president of Egypt, he was wanded by the guards, as if he had just wandered in from the airport security line.

Kerry underlined his dubious relevance by his inability to secure a ceasefire, and his dubious wisdom by making it his over-



arching goal. At this point, after Israel has committed itself on the ground, the U.S. should be seeking to give it the time it needs to do as much damage as possible to Hamas' military infrastructure, instead of effectively bailing out the terror group.

By the time Kerry returned home, he had been showered with so much criticism by the Israelis that the U.S. government was saying it could endanger our relationship. The question raised by Obama administration foreign policy again and again is, How can self-styled Smart Power be so dumb and toothless?

For all of Kerry's failings, he is a relative giant among a foreign-policy team composed largely of political hacks and post-American declinists. At least Kerry retains some of the old Democratic Party belief in America's importance in the world. His condemnation of Syria's use of chemical weapons last year was a stirring moral indictment of the Assad regime -- although President Obama immediately undercut him when he abandoned his own "red lines."

So far, Kerry's tenure as secretary of state is making Hillary Clinton's undistinguished stint look impressive by comparison. But that's mostly a matter of timing. It is his misfortune to be present at the unraveling, as crisis after crisis unfolds, with the administration lacking the interest or the toughmindedness to effectively respond.

It is impossible to find anywhere in the world where our position or alliances are stronger than they were six years ago. One hopeful theory about Obama foreign policy was that, after serial humiliations and failures, it would recalibrate toward more assertiveness, like Jimmy Carter did after the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan. But he seems content with America's new status in the world. John Kerry will just have to get used to it.

## **Perry Imperils His Own Roadshow** The Texas governor and GOP presidential hopeful is on the brink of getting indicted for corruption.

Gosh, the 2016 primaries are a long way off, but look out: Here comes Texas Governor Rick Perry riding his state's taxpayer dollars into another GOP presidential bid.

Technically, he's not campaigning. Yet he's popping up from New York to California, hold-



into one of his pet slush funds that funneled taxpayer money to his corporate campaign donors. Last year, using a personal lapse by the director of the ethics office as an excuse, Perry simply vetoed the office's entire funding.

No office, no investiga-






ing press conferences, running TV ads, meeting with money people, and telling everyone how terrific he is. In other words: campaigning.

Officially, his crosscountry ramble is meant to promote Texas as a corporate utopia that offers state subsidies, zero income taxes, low wages, hands-off regulation, and other cushy deals for corporations that relocate to the Lone Star State. This hustle glorifies Perry, even though he's using Texas tax dollars to take goodpaying jobs from the places he visits and turn them into poor-paying jobs in his state.

But the governor is used to tapping the public treasury to feather his own nest — and he has recently tapped it again to the tune of \$450 an hour. That's for a high-dollar lawyer he's hired at taxpayer expense to try to save his bacon and salvage his presiden-

tial fantasies.

He doesn't mention it on his out-of-state "praise Perry" tour, but the governor's on the brink of being indicted for corruption back home.

This mess involves the governor's clumsy attempt to stop an investigation by the state's ethics office tion, no problem!

Clever, huh? Except that other funding was made available, so that investigation continues. And then a special prosecutor was appointed to investigate Perry's ham-handed veto, so now his indictment looms. This could take the wheels off his road show.





Tap fees should be part of sewer

Salado aldermen should vote to call for a bond election for the construction of a sewer system to begin service for the downtown business district, parts of Royal Street, the Salado Plaza area and properties west of I-35.

An investment like this will reap long-term benefits for all of the residents of Salado in tangible ways such as higher property values and in intangible ways such as a better quality of life. It is not without cost, however.

The brunt of the cost should be burdened by those who stand to benefit most directly and most substantially: the properties in the area proposed for service. Of course, the majority of those properties are commercial so by nature of their use those properties will be paying more in property taxes than homeowners because there is no benefit of exemptions or senior tax freezes.

At the current tax rate of 12 cents per \$100 valuation, a commercial property with an appraised value of \$200,000 pays about \$240 in property taxes each year to the Village of Salado. A property that is a homestead (not over 65) has the benefit of a 20 percent reduction in the taxable value of the property. So a homestead appraised at \$200,000 is taxed at \$160,000 in tax**Our Voice**

able value for a local city tax of \$192 per year. Further, a person over 65 who files for the local exemption and statewide freeze gets even more benefits: A \$200,000 appraised home gets the local homestead exemption of 20 percent (lowering it to \$160,000 taxable value) and then a local over-65 exemption deducts another \$50,000 from the taxable value, lowering it to \$110,000 in taxable value. This means that an over 65 homeowner filing for the exemption pays about \$132 per year in property taxes to the city at the current tax rate of 12 cents.

Furthermore, if a homeowner filed for the over 65 tax exemption when the tax rate was 4.8 cents per \$100, their taxes would be frozen at \$52.80 per year for city taxes.

If called for by the aldermen and approved by voters, the sewer system will cost the non-homestead property owners far more than the over-65 homestead property owners: a \$200,000 appraised commercial property could see their property taxes increase by as much as \$690 per year, while a homestead property could

see their city property taxes increase by as much \$552 per year.

And the increase for those over 65 homestead exemptions? Not a penny.

Even at that, the property owners who will be tying into the system should pay an even higher price. City manager Jim Reed told aldermen that in his calculations of costs for the sewer system that there was an assumption that there would be no sewer tap fees.

This is a very bad assumption and aldermen must enact some sort of sewer tap fees that will be in place for users that tap in when the system is built and users that tap in when the system is already in place. A tap fee schedule should be part of the initial pay down on the bond issue, even if it is not reflected in the verbiage of the call for an election. The tap fee schedule should be in keeping with what other municipalities charge to differing commercial and residential users. Different cities use different approaches but they almost all have a tap fee schedule to keep up with the material costs of a sewer delivery system.

This would put even more of the burden on those who benefit the most from having a sewer system. Without this important piece, a bond issue will be an even tougher, if not impossible, sale to make in November.

Asking homeowners to increase their taxes at all will be a difficult sale. No one likes taxes. But there is an argument to be made and won that the increase in taxes will be offset by increased property values, by increased sales taxes and franchise taxes from new businesses, by a positive trend of growth in attractive businesses that improves the lives of residents as well as making Salado a gem to visit and by protecting the watershed of Salado Creek from further degradation.

We think the board of aldermen could win the war for a sewer that will benefit us all. We would hate to think they could lose the war over a minor battle of tap fees.

We encourage aldermen to go forward with their plans for a bond with the assurance that a substantial part of the costs will be funded with tap fees to the users who benefit most.

# AUGUST 8-10 Sales Tax Holiday just in time for **Back to School clothes, supplies**

This year's Sales Tax Holiday in Texas is Aug. 8-10.

As in previous years, the law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales and use taxes, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend.

Subject to certain criteria, all sales of qualifying items made during the holiday period qualify for the exemption, including items sold online, or by telephone or mail. Layaway plans can be used again this year to take advantage of the sales tax holiday.

The dates for the sales tax holiday are set by the Legislature.

Families can save money by not paying sales tax on most clothing, footwear and school supplies priced under \$100. List of tax-free items can be found at www. TexasTaxHoliday.org. The sales tax holiday weekend in Texas has

been an annual event since 1999.

Shoppers are expected to save an estimated \$78.9 million in state and local sales taxes during the sales tax holiday.

The following school supplies will be tax-free during the holiday as long as the item is under \$100: Binders, Book bags, Calculators, Cellophane tape, Blackboard chalk, Compasses, Composition books, Crayons, Erasers, Folders; expandable, pocket, plastic, and manila; Glue, paste and paste sticks, Highlighters, Index cards, Index card boxes, Legal pads, Lunch boxes, Markers (including dry erase markers); Notebooks, Paper; loose leaf ruled notebook paper, copy paper, graph paper, tracing paper, manila paper, colored paper, poster board, and construction paper; Pencil boxes and other school supply boxes, Pencil sharpeners, Pencils, Pens, Protractors, Rulers, Scissors, Writing tablets.

In addition, the following clothing and accessories will be tax-free, with some limitations:

Adult diapers, Aprons (household), Athletic socks, Baby bibs, Baby clothes, Baby diapers (cloth or disposable), Backpacks (for use by elementary/secondary students); Belts with attached buckles, Blouses, Boots (general purpose), Bow ties, Bowling shirts, Bras.

Camp clothes, Caps (baseball, fishing, golf), Chef uniforms, Children's novelty costumes, Clerical vestments, Coats and wraps, Coveralls, Diapers (cloth and disposable), Dresses, Employee uniforms (unless rented), Fishing caps, Fishing vests (non-flotation), Football accessories.

Gloves (generally), Golf accessories; caps, dresses, jackets and windbreakers, shirts, skirts, Graduation caps and gowns, Gym suits and uniforms, Hats, Hooded shirts and hooded sweatshirts, Hosiery, including support hosiery, Hunting vests.

Jackets, Jeans, Jogging apparel, Knitted caps or hats, Leg warmers, Leotards and tights, Mask, costume, Neckwear and ties, Nightgowns and nightshirts, Painter pants, Pajamas, Pants, Panty hose, Raincoats and ponchos, Rain hats, Religious clothing, Robes.

Scarves, Scout uniforms, Shawls and wraps, Shirts, Shirts (hooded), Shoes (generally), Shorts, Skirts, Sleepwear, nightgowns, pajamas, Slippers, Slips, Soccer socks, Socks, Suits, slacks, and jackets, Support hosiery, Suspenders, Sweatshirts, Sweat suits, Sweaters.

Tennis clothing and shoes, Ties (neckties all), Tights, Trousers, Underclothes. Underpants, Undershirts, Uniforms (school, work, nurse, waitress, military, postal, police, fire), Veils, Vests (generally), Work clothes, Work uniforms and Workout clothes.






# JB and the Moonshine Band at Johnny's Outback Aug. 9



## Bridge

By Steve Becker

A fine declarer plans his line of play at the start of a hand, but remains ready to revise that plan at any time if there is an unexpected development. As a case in point, consider this deal where West leads a spade against six hearts.

When dummy appears, South should expect to make the slam. He plans to win the spade, draw two rounds of trumps (assuming a normal 2-1 division), cash the A-K of diamonds, discarding a club from dummy, and sooner or later concede a club trick. The three remaining trumps in dummy will then be sufficient to ruff his club and diamond losers.

But when he wins the first spade and leads a heart to the ace, he discovers that East has all three missing trumps. This means he cannot afford to draw the outstanding trumps (even with the aid of a finesse), since he would then have only two trumps left in dummy to ruff his three minor-suit losers. South must therefore revise his original plan of play.
