Village, Chamber may partner through proposal

Both the Village of Salado board of aldermen and the Salado Chamber of Commerce board of directors have unanimously voted to go forward on a proposal that will bring the two entities closer in partnership through a contract in which the Village of Salado would provide management and operation services for the Chamber of Commerce through its Tourism Department.

The Chamber of Commerce board of directors voted unanimously at its July 21 meeting to go into deliberations of the proposal with the Village. The board of aldermen voted 3-0 to deliberate the proposal with the Chamber. Aldermen Frank Coachman (whose wife Kay serves on the Chamber board) and Hans Fields (whose wife Judy serves on the Tourism Council) abstaining from the vote and withdrawing from the discussion.

The idea was first discussed in a closed session of the Chamber executive committee in early July and during an executive session of the Village of Salado aldermen on July

City administrator Jim Reed explained that the closed sessions were necessary for both bodies. "It concerned information of a confidential nature regarding our employees," he said. "Unless it goes forward, there was no reason to put our employees in the public eye.

He said that he wanted to see if there was "any support" from the two entities before "going any further" with the proposal. He added that he did not want to put any of the employees under the scrutiny of community gossip "if there is no real support for the idea."

"If we get to the end of a negotiation phase and the Chamber and Village cannot agree on a final contract," he said, "then we keep on doing what we are doing: no harm, no

The proposal calls for a contract between the Salado Chamber of Commerce and the Village of Salado for the Village to provide operational and management services for the Chamber, including events and promotions and other activities.

In many communities, the Chamber and tourism departments work in partnership, typically with the tourism department contracting with the Chamber for services and employ-

In this case, however, Reed recommended a contract in which the Chamber would pay for the services

of the tourism department. "We (the Village) are able to offer a higher salary and benefit package -- including retirement benefits and insurance -- than the Chamber could offer," he explained.

During citizen comment, former alderman Bryan Fritch said that "It would seem that this initiative has sprung to life fully formed." He said that he was concerned about the private discussions between the village administrator, and chamber directors and the board of aldermen. Another concern, he said, was hiring personnel to conduct "Chamber of Commerce business at taxpayer expense."

He encouraged the board to postpone any vote on the issues "until the full membership of the Chamber and the public at-large express their opinions on

Reed said he pursued the discussion because, "partnerships and more efficient uses of resources could be realized if they had a shared governance structure. Pots of money will be kept very separate and very distinct from each other. There could be one consolidated structure that can decide what is allowable out of each pot of money and make a unified

The proposal would be for the Village to have three employees: an executive director and two administrative employees, one of which would oversee events and another which would oversee public relations efforts.

Those employees, according to the initial drafts of the contract and proposed scope of work, would be under the management of a three-person committee comprised of the Village city administrator, a representative selected by the Board of Aldermen and the sitting Chairman of the Board of Chamber of Commerce.

The initial executive director woul be Debbie Charbonneau, who has served as the Village Tourism Director for 10 years.

If approved by both entities, the Chamber of Commerce would eliminate its own paid position of President.

"You are not being asked to adopt a contract or a final scope of work," Reed said, but to authorize going forward in negotia-

/illage proposes tax hike to 18.1¢

Salado aldermen propose a general fund budget that will require more than \$100,000 in deficit spending despite a tax increase of 50 percent of the current tax rate of 12¢ per \$100 evaluation. Aldermen voted unanimously Aug. 21 to propose the budget and 18.1¢ tax rate.

The board will conduct the first public hearing on the \$1.07 million general fund budget at its 6:30 p.m. Sept. 4 meeting. After a second public hearing on Sept. 18, the board will adopt the budget and the tax rate.

The proposed budget increases property taxes from the current 12¢ per \$100 evaluation to 18.1¢ per \$100 evaluation. This is anticipated to generate more than \$100,000 in added revenues to the city, bringing the total revenues from taxes to \$698,00. Of that, \$375,00 will be

from sales tax, \$315,000 from property tax and \$8,000 from mixed beverage tax. The budget calls for \$197,790 in franchise fee income, \$11,500 in development fee income and \$44,100 in municipal court fine income. Total income is anticipated at \$963,860.

With more than \$1 million in expenditures, the Village will have to dip into its reserves next year.

The budget sets aside \$301,898 for administrative expenses, including \$182,000 in administrative personnel costs. It calls for \$17,900 in building maintenance, \$37,125 for the fire department and \$39,596 for the municipal court (including code en-

forcement). Other major expensinclude \$325,446 the police department, \$264,200 for street maintenance (including \$50,000 for Main Street \$52,901 beautification), for the maintenance department and \$6,900 for Pace Park operations and \$20,000 for advertising.

Expenses will total \$1,075,775, resulting in a deficit budget of \$111,915.

A detailed budget is ailable at the municipal building.

If the board of aldermen adopt the 18.1¢ tax rate, it will exceed the limit that will allow local voters to petition for a rollback election.

If the Village exceeds the effective tax rate by more than 8 percent, voters will have 90 days to acquire the number of signatures to force a rollback election. Because the amount of maintenance and operations taxes is below \$5 million, it will require a petition with signatures exceeding 10 percent of the total number of registered voters living within the Village of Salado in order for a rollback election to be called. If a petition is submitted, the Village has 20 days in which to verify

the signatures and then to call for the special rollback election.

In other business, aldermen unanimously approved authorizing city administrator Jim Reed to bring a scope of work back to them from Keep Salado Beautiful that the organization would accomplish in the 2014-15 fiscal year utilizing the Village's \$5,000 payment from waste disposal franchise fees.

The board also transferred the responsibilities of the Zoning Board of Adjustment to the Village Board of Aldermen until such time that a functioning ZBA could be appointed and manned. Currently, in order to conduct any business, the ZBA must have four of the five appointees attend a meeting. This has resulted in delays on decisions of variance requests by property owners. Now those requests may be brought directly to the Board of Aldermen.



An Open Exchange of Ideas



Free Rick Perry

It tells you much about the laughable indictment of Texas Gov. Rick Perry that it has made him a figure of bipartisan sympa-


Perry was indicted for the offense of vetoing an appropriations bill. Not vetoing an appropriations bill in exchange for a bribe. Not vetoing an appropriations bill as a favor to a donor. Not vetoing an appropriations bill in excess of his lawful authority. But simply vetoing an appropriations bill.

That Perry could, in theory, face more than 100 years in prison stemming from this veto is so mind-bogglingly stupid that even Democrats and mainstream journalists have been taken aback.

The whole matter has its roots in the drunkendriving arrest last year of Travis County District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg, a Democrat. Police pulled her over for driving erratically. Video of the stop shows Lehmberg failing all manner of roadside tests. By the time she's at the jail, she's a parody of an entitled public figure. Her behavior is so outrageous that she has to be restrained like Hannibal Lecter in "The Silence of the Lambs."

Her blood alcohol level

Lowry



was about three times the legal limit, and she ended up pleading guilty and serving jail time. Gov. Perry thought, not unreasonably, that because her office houses the state's Public Integrity Unit, she should resign.

Lehmberg disagreed. She exercised her power to stay in her position, and Perry exercised his power to veto funding for her Public Integrity Office as long as she did. You can disagree with one or both of them, but no one was committing a crime.

It was left to a special prosecutor of the very same Travis County District Attorney's Office to concoct one, and manage to get a grand jury to fall for it. The indictment -running barely two pages long -- is as substantive as a fifth-grader's book report, and about as legally sophisticated.

The two counts against Perry are that he "misused property" government and engaged in the "coercion" of a public servant. This makes it sound like he used the \$7.5 million of vetoed funds to buy a vacation house, and blackmailed Lehmberg into indicting people on his whim.

He, of course, did nothing of the kind. The indictment collapses under the slightest scrutiny. As legal blogger Eugene Volokh points out of the first count, Texas laws requires that the official be in possession of the misused funds. Perry never controlled the funds he vetoed. As for the second count, Volokh points to an appeals-court decision that held that "coercion of a lawful act by a threat of lawful action is protected free expression."

It's hard to believe that anyone thinks that these charges will stand up in court. But that's not the point. The indictment is an undisguised attempt to wound Perry, to create bad headlines, to distract him. On cue, Texas Democrats absurdly called on Perry to resign. The indictment itself is, in short, a naked abuse of power. The Travis County District Attorney's Office is infamous for this kind of thing.

Forget vetoing funding for this office. If there were any justice, it would be shuttered and razed to the ground.

Outrage No. 2 is that Ferguson's police, practically all of whom are white in a town that's twothirds black, responded to the public outcry like an

occupying army.

Instead of the calm, professional, and empathetic approach required, the police confronted Ferguson with full military force, rolling out in armored "Bearcat" vehicles, hovering helicopters, riot gear, camouflage outfits, and body armor.

They approached the unarmed citizens with assault rifles, grenades, tear gas, night sticks, and a macho attitude. It was a tactical, commando assault on civilians, the vast majority of whom where doing what they should be doing: call-

ing autocrats to account. But wait: Where did this tiny town's police force - supposedly made up of peace officers — get such weaponry and a military attitude? From the Pentagon.

The Defense Department has quietly been militarizing America's police departments for the last two decades, sending billions of dollars worth of Bearcats, helicopters, machine guns, etc. to any Mayberry police chief with Rambo fantasies.

Your town and mine are being militarized too. We must halt this perversion of policing, or we'll be the next Ferguson. For starters, tell your governor: "Don't militarize my block." You can do it at change.org/petitions.

No appetite for fixing school lunch

Making healthy food taste good will require spending increase

You can lead a kid to vegetables, but you can't make her eat. Especially if the food doesn't taste good.

That's what the government found out in the wake of the Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010.

I was active in advocating for school lunch reform at the time. The bill became law shortly after I published a book on U.S. food policy. It seemed like such a perfect solution: Fix school lunch and you improve the diets of millions of kids instantly. You also help the next generation develop healthy habits for life.

Kids who eat breakfast and lunch at school eat nearly half their week's meals in the cafeteria. Kids who just eat school lunch consume nearly one quarter of their meals at school. Swapping out French fries for sautéed kale and sugary foods for fresh fruit would go a long way to improve our nation's diets and health.

If only the kids would eat them, that is.

Here's the thing. Back when the law was debated, school lunch and nutrition experts agreed on a number of things that schools needed, like tougher nutrition standards - but nothing will improve if Congress doesn't give schools more money. As best as I could tell, it would take about an extra 50 cents to a dollar per meal to really get school lunch where it ought to be. Instead, Congress gave schools a mere six cents more.

Cooking real food — the healthy kind — takes more than just fresh ingredients, which already often costs more than frozen or canned junk. It requires a knowledgeable

school lunch staff that can prepare the food. It requires refrigerators, cutting boards, and knives.

Junk food, on the other hand, requires freezers, microwaves, and very few skills to heat and serve.

Another sticky point: Making healthy food taste good for cheap is not easy. As Michael Moss pointed out in his book Salt Sugar Fat, Campbell's soup could drastically reduce the sodium in its soups if it replaced it with fresh herbs like rosemary. But rosemary is expensive, salt is cheap, and if you simply cut the salt without adding herbs to the soup, it tastes terrible.

Switching up kids' food also requires outreach. Kids can resist trying new foods, but — with some effort by caring grownups — they can even enjoy healthy foods.

Take the time I had fifth-grade Girl Scouts over to learn about children's lives in Kenya. The girls took a pretend trip to Kenya in which they planted seeds, harvested kale,

and cooked the Kenyan corn dish, ugali, which is similar to polenta.

I expected full-scale rebellion when the girls ate their meal of beans, kale, and corn. Instead, they fought over the kale and begged for more. They didn't just earn a badge for their vests, they discovered that beans and green veggies can taste good.

Without increasing the \$11 billion federal budget for school lunches, you get in the pickle we're in now. Schools can't afford to meet tighter nutrition standards, and kids are throwing out the increased fruits, veggies, and whole grains schools now serve instead of eating them. This shouldn't be a surprise

And yet, the political debate doesn't revolve around giving schools the increased funding they need to make healthier lunches work. Instead, Rep. Robert Aderholt (R-AL) proposed giving struggling schools a break from the tighter nutrition standards for the next

school year.

Washington treats school lunch spending as an expenditure. It's actually an investment.

Increased spending on better lunches could create new jobs for lunch staff while improving the health of America's youth — and that would continue to pay us back for decades to come as today's kids grow up with healthier habits.

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


assigned to the 1st Battalion, 3rd Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, since July 2013.

Circumstances rounding this incident are under investigation.





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

The merrimac coup

The Merrimac Coup is featured in many books on the play of the cards, but it seldom occurs in real life. However, the opportunity to use it arose on this deal from the 1979 world championship. The hand was played at six tables, and at four of them East proved equal to the task.

South was declarer in three notrump at all six tables. In the Brazil-United States match, the opening lead at the first table was a heart. After taking the ace, East returned the king of spades! This was the Merrimac Coup, a defensive play aimed at killing a vital entry to dummy. In the actual case, South went down one after the king-of-spades

At the other table, West's lead was the queen of diamonds. Here, too, East won with the ace and returned the king of spades, and declarer also finished down

In the match between the

Far East and Australia, the opening lead at both tables was a heart. At one table, the Far East declarer made four notrump after the Australian East won the lead with the ace and mechanically returned the nine of hearts. At the other table, East took the heart lead with the ace and returned the king of spades to sink the contract.

In the match between Italy and a Caribbean team, both Souths made the contract. At the first table, West led the diamond queen, and instead of playing the ace, East signaled with the nine. This allowed the Italian declarer to score 10 tricks.

At the second table, West led a heart to his partner's ace, and East found the killing king-of-spades lead. However, West, for reasons unknown, later discarded two hearts when the A-K-J of clubs were played, and declarer wound up with nine




Central Texas Railroad

The Central Texas Chapter of the National Railroad Historical Society invites you to join us for a discussion of modern day railroading Sept. 6 at 2 p.m. on the 3rd Floor of the Temple Public Library, 100 West Adams Avenue. The program will discuss a popular Texas railroad landmark-Tower 55- known to railroad enthusiasts from throughout the world.

Towers across Texas such as Tower 55 were constructed by the railroads shortly after the Texas Railroad Commission required the installation of towers with operators to control intersecting railroad mainlines to prevent collisions of trains. The railroad commission approved tower construction by number, for example, Tower 55 was the 55th tower constructed since the 1901 law was passed. Tower 55 operations began on September 26, 1904 under the ownership of the Texas and Pacific Railroad and ceased operations in 1996 under ownership of the Union Pacific Railroad. The structure still remains in Ft. Worth but all train operations are remotely dispatched from a distant



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
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
