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Miss Flame Residents voice concerns,

support of sewer bond By TIM FLEISCHER EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

"You're talking about a 300 percent increase in my taxes for a sewer system that you have said will never serve me," Kimberly Stockton said during an October 6 town hall meeting at the Salado Intermediate School. "This increase is not justified."

Stockton was one of a handful of speakers at the meeting to rise in opposition to the proposal.

"I believe in economic development and I am pro business," she said, "Does downtown need a sewer system? Absolutely. But not at the expense of the families of Mill Creek. There has to be other ways of funding this without putting the burden on the other 67 percent of homeowners."

The idea that businesses will come to Salado just because there is a sewer system is a false one, according to Stockton, who added, "Businesses are going to come here based upon the number of rooftops you have, whether there is a sewer system or

She contrasted Salado with Jarrell, where Sonterra Municipal Utility District was established to develop a sewer system, saying that "Everyone in the proposed area who was going to pay the higher property tax was also going to be served by the proposed sewer system."

Larry Sands said that the decision to support the bond issue is not just about future business in Salado. Sands says that he manages several properties in the Village and that septic systems and requirements are always an issue. "I believe that Salado Mansion would still be open if we have a sewer line. We are behind the eight ball on restaurants in town. The ones we have are on systems in the ground that are getting older," he said, adding that without a central sewer system Salado is looking at lowers sales tax revenues and lower property values in the future.

Village investment officer Stephen Peters stated that the outlined service area for the sewer systems represented only about \$50 million in property values. If those properties increased in value by 20 percent because of a sewer

system serving them, that would be a \$10 million increase in property values. "That is about the cost of the sewer system you are proposing," he said. The burden of paying for that system, he said, is on the remaining \$150 million in property values, which are

Peters said that for the 25 year life of the bond, at the proposed 47-cent tax rate, a homeowner can expect to pay about \$20,000 in property taxes "for a sewer that will never serve

mostly homeowners.

During his half-hour presentation prior to the open discussion portion of the meeting, Jim Reed told the audience that the price tag and tax burden for the propose sewer system is likely to be much lower than what the Village had to legally advertise. Truthin-taxation laws required the village to advertise the 47-cent tax rate because it could not consider several factors that will come into

First off, is that about \$1 million of the price tag will be paid for by the commercial end users of two proposed lines in the service area: one to serve the Mill Creek Dr. area to Brookshire Brothers and another that will serve the hotels in the northern most service area as well as the Salado High School in the northwest area.

"If those entities don't participate, those lines will not be built," Reed iterated. However, that fundamental change cannot be reflected in the cost predictions legally required by truth-in-taxation

Nor can any increase in overall property values be considered in the impact on the tax rate, according to Reed. Nor can any increase in sales tax revenues be considered in the funding formula for the

Furthermore, the Village has a Letter of Intent from the development corporation that is pursuing construction of a mixed use development on property that is in the southeastern portion of the service area. "Their participation, and the potential impact on the tax rate," Reed said, could be reflected in the published

Reed told the audience that he has been in contact with U.S. Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration about a potential \$1.5 million grant for the sewer system. "Federal and state entities are interested in helping us fund this project," Reed said, "but we can't even pursue these without a successful bond election" to put the local

funding source in place. The Village is also looking at formation of a Tax Increment Refinance Zone that would accelerate the payout of the bond. Reed explained that the incremental increase in property values for those properties that receive the sewer services could be applied toward accelerated payout of the bond issue. He estimated that the additional annual payment toward the principal amount due to the future formation of a TIRZ could total as much as \$200,000 per year, which could result in a much faster payoff of the bond.

Reed also told the audience that the interest rate in figuring the potential property tax rate for the bond was 5.5 percent. He told the audience that the current average rate for bonds sits at about 2.85 percent. "That is 49 percent less than the amount we used to determine the tax rate," he said.

Salado aldermen, voted at a special called meeting earlier in the evening Oct. 6, to adopt ordinances that will require all properties in the service areas to tiein to the system and that will require tie-in fees for those properties. The or-

The insipid war on women

The "war on women" is back, and more tendentious than ever.

Democrats are replaying one of their greatest hits of 2012 in their furious battle to minimize their mid-term losses in a political environment defined by an unpopular president and general unease.

And why not? The war on women has a proven record of success -- in mobilizing Democratic women and trumping what would otherwise seem much more important issues -and it is so simple that any idiot can run on it.

The recipe is one part taking offense where clearly none was intended, and one part discerning new nefarious schemes to deny women access to birth control. If War on Women 1.0 was strained and unconvincing, the new version lacks all self-respect. To paraphrase Karl Marx, it is history repeating itself, first as farce, then as self-parody.

During their first debate in North Carolina, Republican candidate Thom Tillis referred to Sen. Kay Hagan by her first name, offending her supporters with his undue familiarity. He compounded the sin by saying Hagan's "math just doesn't add up," a hoary cliche in politics for de-

Hagan pronounced her-

self (what else?) "insulted," while a spokeswoman for the Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee, Regan Page, fired off double-barreled plaints. She accused Tillis of "ugly condescension," "outrageous mansplaining" and "condescending patronization," which is always to be distinguished from "patronizing condescension." This is all so silly that it is especially off-key in current circumstances. The implied Democrat message is that, yes, the president is broadly unpopular, the economy is middling and the world is falling apart -- but someone called me "ma'am"!

To the extent that the war on women has any substance, it centers on minor but flawed pieces of federal legislation like the Violence Against Women Act and the Equal Pay Act. And contraception. Always contraception.

The Democrats deserve credit for managing to portray a position supported by no one serious in public life -- that women should be denied birth control -as the default position of the Republican Party.

The Colorado Senate race has been so focused on abortion and contraception, it could be mistaken for a leadership election of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists. Playing defense, Republican Cory Gardner is one of a handful of GOP candidates who have come out in favor of over-thecounter birth control. Yet this innocuous proposal to provide more ready access to birth control is itself taken as a dastardly plot

against women. The wonder of the war of women is that it works, or at least it has. Republicans have a better chance of deflecting it this year. They have more deft candidates, and while the over-the-counter contraception proposal is small beer, it is a compelling way to demonstrate comfort with the very access to contraception that Democrats allege Republicans want to take away.

More importantly, the Republican Party should realize that its fate with all voters depends on having a concrete agenda to address the nation's challenges here and abroad. That is the ultimate insulation from the insipid politics of the ever-more-tenuous war on women.

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The Nouveau Sodbusters Wall Street's fake farmers are harvesting sweet profits.

We know from the childhood song that Old MacDonald had a farm. But e-i-e-i-o — look who's got his farm now. It's outfits like American Farmland, Farmland Partners, and BlackRock.

These aren't dirt farmers wearing overalls and muddy boots. They're Wall Street hucksters in Armani suits and Gucci loafers.

The latest fast-buck fad for high-roller investment trusts, hedge funds, and venture capital speculators is "farming." Not that these dude ranch dandies are actually plowing and planting.

No, no - these are soft-hands people, buying up farmland with billions of rich investors' dollars, then tilling the tax laws and threshing the farmers who do the real cultivation.

For example, American Farmland Company — which owns 16 farms - is a combine of the largest real estate empire in New York City, two Florida sugar barons, a wealth management outfit, and the real estate brokerage arm of insurance giant Prudential.

None of these nouveau sodbusters has a speck of dirt under their fingernails, but they've figured out how to work the land without touching it and still harvest a sweet profit. The founder of this scheme says "It's like gold,

but better, because there is this cash flow."

Cash flow? Yes, farmers are charged rent to till the Wall Streeters' land. Then the financiers get a prime cut of any profits from the crops that the farmers produce. Also, the combine is set up as a Real Estate Investment Trust, providing an enormous tax break for the Wall Street plowboys.

And, of course, there's the mega-pay the moneyed elites will reap when they convert their scheme into securities for sale on the stock exchange.

A few rich speculators get richer, farmers are turned into sharecrop laborers, and farms are switched to high-profit crops that require heavy pesticide dosages and soak up scarce water resources. Other than that, this is one hell of a deal.

Aldermen approve new subdivision

By TIM FLEISCHER EDITOR-IN-CHIEF

Salado aldermen approve the Final Plat for Creekside Meadows Subdivision at their Oct. 2 meeting after discussion of the number of lots in the subdivision on Van Bibber Lane that are in the flood plain.

City Manager Kim Foutz told aldermen that the only changes in the Final Plat were name changes: the subdivision will be known as Creekside Meadow rather than Tuscany on the Creek; the name of the street leading into the subdivision will change from Easy Street to Creekside Dr. and finally the name of the ownership group will be Watkins Creek, LLC even though the principals remain the same.

Despite these nominal changes, aldermen discussed the numbers of lots that are in the flood plain, the proposed drainage plan, the 3 acres that may

be dedicated in the future as park land and what would happen if aldermen took no action on the Final Plat

Foutz told aldermen that the design plans were signed off by the Village Engineer months ago, including the drainage plans, and that the Village Subdivision Ordinance contains a stipulation that if the Board of Aldermen do not act on the recommendation of the Planning and Zoning Commission within 30 days that it is by default considered approved. The P&Z voted 4-0 to approve the Final Plat.

Aldermen voted 5-0 on a motion by Michael Mc-Dougal to approve the Final Plat as recommended by the P&Z and village staff. Fred Brown gave a second to the motion.

In other business, aldermen approved a contract with Stewart Construction to maintain the septic system for the Municipal Building for two years for

the rates of those fees. Aldermen also approved the requirement that services fees for the sewer system end users "cover the cost of the system operation," Reed said. Aldermen also authorized a rate study, if voters approve the bond election on Nov. 4.

Reed told the audience that the impact of tie-in fees could not be considered in the potential tax rate that was published because those fees had not been set at the time of publication

"Could we have paid for a comprehensive study so that we would have answers to all of these questions? Yes," he said, adding that "it was the opinion of the aldermen that this issue has been studied and studied and studied so more and that it was time for the voters to decide."

If voters approve a \$10.55 million bond for the construction of a central sewer system that will principally serve the downtown business district, it will be at least three years before the system is on-line.

Reed outlined a possible time-line for the project: Year one would be design and engineering, a rate study, permitting and licensing and retaining bond counsel; year two would be issuing construction contracts, right-of-way condemnation proceedings and property acquisition; year three would have construction begin at the end of which

the first limited service would begin; year four would be the completion of construction with full service underway.


He told the audience that, if approved by voters, money would not be borrowed until it was needed and that the taxes to retire the debt would be "ramped up over the next few years as we borrow the money to build the project." He likened it to a construction loan for building a house.

If voters turn down the proposed bond, the Village of Salado will have to regroup and make plans for how it will continue to serve the 16 users of the Stagecoach Inn sewer system that the Village accepted earlier this year.



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
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Llano beats Salado 34-13

Llano Yellowjackets scored on their first two possessions combining a pounding ground game with well-timed passes to beat Salado 34-13 at Eagle stadium Oct. 3 for their second win of the year.

The Eagles could not score until the second half, when Llano had the game well in hand, leading 20-0 at the end of the first half.

The Yellowjackets drove from their own 25 yard line to score in 12 plays on an 11 yard pass from Holden Simpson to Tommy Yelvington with 7:08 left in the first. David Forrister kicked the extra point for a 7-0 lead.







So much country music today chases inexact images of imaginary roads

and a lean-to or detached kitchen when he sold it to John A. Clark on October 15, 1877. The Clarks then added the second and third rooms to the west side and the back porch was extended along that wing. On June 2, 1879 the house was sold to Dr. Rezin S. Farr.

Dr. Farr and his family lived in the house until his two surviving daughters were forced to leave the home in Belton due to declining health in 1968. As the house stood unoccupied, vandalism, time, weather and emptiness ultimately took their toll, culminating with the Farr home being condemned by the Belton Fire Marshall in 1982. Thankfully, George Kolb purchased the house in 1991 and moved it to its permanent site in Salado Texas. From 1991 to 2005, the Farr house has gone through many renovations; each renovation was meticulously performed in keeping with the original style: Greek Revival with touches of early Victorian design in both the exterior and interior of the home. The Kocians have gone to great efforts to keep the

Farr Legacy going. Entering through original iron fence, guests are welcomed to a spacious front porch that features beautifully restored and converted electric kerosene lamps, original cedar shutters and windows. Once inside the home, guests can view framed pictures of Dr. Farr and his family along with Dr. Farr's medical license dated 1867. A narrative by Dr. Farr dated 1879 and a certificate granted to "Miss Mary Horn", (later Mrs. Rezin Farr) from "Andrew Female College," dated 1867, also adorn the entry

foyer hall.

George and Laura Kocian have enjoyed learning about the home's history.

The couple did extensive research to make sure period-appropriate pieces were purchased when furnishing the house. For

instance, to the left of the foyer is the first of 3 bedrooms. The bedroom features a high back oak panel bed with matching dresser. The drawer assembly is called "peg and scallop" which dates both pieces to circa 1860 to 1880. Also in the bedroom is one of the 3 original fireplaces, framed period pieces of the "Cries of London" and a restored Seth Thomas mantle clock circa 1880.

A bath adjoining the bedroom features the home's original pedestal sink and claw foot tub. The bathroom walls are covered in a vintage wall paper in colors to compliment the bedroom. The bathroom linens and toiletries are cleverly stored in an 1800's pie safe that was purchased in 1985. It seems that even in 1985 the Kocian's knew they were destined to own a historical home.

Across the hallway to the right is the parlor room. The room features the second original fire place and mantel. The mantel features a Seth Thomas clock with the original dial face. The Kocian's discovered that the 15 foot ceilings in this room were dictated by the building conventions of the 1880's: the length of the available lumber determined the height of each room. Also, the wall color of the living room and front bed room are the original colors. Laura Kocian explains, in the 1880's, colored paint was considered a sign of wealth. The more color displayed outside and inside the home showcased a person's wealth. The current owners are convinced that Dr. Farr orchestrated the vibrate colors he chose for his home.

The dining room behind the front parlor was, and is, a favorite of the Kocian's when decorating. It features a Duncan Phyfe table, an exquisite Victorian étagère, and an antique curved glass curio cabinet that houses the Kocian Baccart cham-

pagne glasses and wedding china. This room also features the original mid-19th century exposed structural bars that were common to houses of that period and the third original fire place.

The doors from the dining room lead back into the hallway. Just to the end of the hallway is the breakfast nook. The nook features a Hoosier cabinet that still has the original flour bin and spice rack. Also located in the nook is a kitchen cabinet that houses the owners' collection of "Memory Lane" dinner ware. The kitchen itself features a Elmira stove that is a replica of a wood-burning stove and oven. The recessed kitchen shelves hold crocks, an antique crate from Walter Baker & Co and an old trunk. Also on the walls of the kitchen are George's copper cooking ware finds.

The most recent home additions are the two master suites located in the back of the house. The first master features an on-suite with period appropriate wall-paper and two Currier & Ives prints "Season of Bloom" and 'Skating Scene -Moonlight." The bedroom features an Edwardian high back bed covered with quilts made by Mrs. Nidya Balleza (Laura's mother) a set of true left and right antique French side tables with marble tops and a set of Victorian parlor chairs.


Further down the hallway is the second master bedroom. The room is painted in a soft green and features a stunning antique half-tester bed flanked by a pair of true left and right French side tables. The headboard of the tester bed was carved out of a single piece of wood. Also in the bedroom is a Marstall Furniture American Oak wardrobe circa 1900. The wardrobe features the original key and mirrors.









Contract Bridge

Whenever declarer is missing the Q-x-x-x of a suit, he faces the question of whether to cash the A-K, hoping to drop the queen, or first cash the ace or king and then finesse the jack.

This situation arises with disturbing frequency, and the standard practice is to cash the A-K rather than rely on the finesse. This is because the odds very slightly favor the drop of the queen under the A-K. But this is a mathematical concept only, and declarer should not allow it to override any tactical considerations that might arise during the play of a particular hand.

Here is a typical case. West leads the K-A and another heart against four spades. Let's say declarer ruffs, plays the ace of trumps, crosses to dummy with a diamond and leads the jack of trumps, on which East follows low.

South's correct play is to finesse the jack. If he does, he makes the contract; if he doesn't, he goes down one. Declarer should reason that if he plays the king and the queen does not fall, he is likely to fail in his mission unless the opposing diamonds are divided 3-3.

But if he chooses to finesse, he makes the contract not only when East has the queen of trumps, but also when West has the queen and the diamonds are divided 3-3 or 4-2. In the latter case, declarer can establish an extra diamond trick by ruffing one of dummy's low diamonds, eventually using dummy's nine of trumps as an entry to collect the fifth diamond.

TO ALL THE DULY QUALIFIED, RESIDENT ELECTORS OF THE VILLAGE OF SALADO:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held within and throughout the VILLAGE OF SALADO (the "City") on November 4, 2014 ("Election Day"), pursuant to and in accordance with the following excerpts from an ordinance (the "Ordinance") calling a bond election to be held in the City; passed and approved by the Board of Aldermen (the "Board") of the Village of Salado on August 12, 2014;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE VILLAGE OF SALADO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: An election (the "Election") shall be held on the 4th day of November, 2014, in the City, which date is not less than seventy-eight (78) nor more than ninety (90) days from the date of the adoption hereof and is a uniform election date pursuant to Section 41.001, Texas Election Code, for the purpose of submitting the following measure:

PROPOSITION

"Shall the Board of Aldermen of the Village of Salado be authorized to issue one or more series of bonds of the Village of Salado in the amount of not to exceed \$10,550,000 for the purpose of making permanent public improvements as follows: purchasing, acquiring, enlarging, extending, equipping and constructing sewer system facilities and improvements, including acquiring lands and rights-of-way for any of such purposes, and all matters incident or necessary thereto, such bonds to mature serially or otherwise and bearing interest at such rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise), not to exceed the respective limits prescribed by law at the time of issuance, as shall be determined within the discretion of the Board of Aldermen at the time of issuance, and to levy a tax upon all taxable property in the Village of Salado sufficient to pay the interest on the bonds, and to provide a sinking fund for the payment of bonds as they mature?"

SECTION 2: Ballots shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code and permit electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid measure which shall appear on the ballot substantially as follows:

PROPOSITION

[]FOR

"THE ISSUANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED \$10,550,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS FOR SEWER FACILITIES, PROPERTY AND IMPROVEMENTS, AND THE LEVY OF A TAX SUFFICIENT TO PAY FOR THE BONDS"

[]AGAINST

SECTION 3: Electronic voting machines may be used to hold and conduct the Election on Election Day; provided, however, in the event that the use of such electronic voting machines is not practicable, the Election may be conducted on Election Day by the use of paper ballots (except as otherwise provided herein). Electronic voting machines or paper ballots may be used for early voting by personal appearance (except as otherwise provided herein). Pursuant to Section 61.012, Texas Election Code, the City shall provide at least one accessible voting system in each polling place used in the Election. Such voting system shall comply with state and federal laws establishing requirements for the accessibility of voting systems.

SECTION 4: The election precincts hereby established and the polling places hereby designated for the purpose of holding the Election are identified in Exhibit A hereto. The election officers for each polling place shall be appointed in accordance with the Texas Election Code and the provisions of an election agreement with the County Election Officer for the conducting of the Election; and, the Mayor, or his designee, is hereby authorized and directed to (i) negotiate and enter into one or more election agreements with the County (and such other political subdivisions as the Mayor, or his designee, and the County Election Officer determine to be necessary or appropriate) for conducting the Election for and on behalf of the City and (ii) make any technical modifications to this Ordinance as are necessary to comply with applicable state or federal laws or to carry out the intent of the Board, as evidenced herein.

On election day, the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

SECTION 5: The Board hereby appoints Shawn Snyder as the early voting clerk to conduct early voting in the Election.

Early voting by personal appearance shall be conducted in accordance with applicable provisions of the Texas Election Code. The locations, dates and hours of operation of the main early voting polling place and the permanent branch polling places are set forth in **Exhibit B** hereto. Registered voters of the City may vote early at any designated County early voting location.

Early voting by mail shall be conducted in accordance with applicable provisions of the Texas Election Code. The early voting clerk shall receive applications for ballots to be voted by mail. The mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail may be sent is set forth in **Exhibit B** hereto.

An early voting ballot board is hereby established tor the purposes of processing ballots cast in early voting. The presiding judge of the early voting ballot board is designated in **Exhibit B** hereto. The presiding judge of the early voting ballot board shall appoint not less than two (2) resident qualified voters to serve as members of the early voting ballot board.

SECTION 6: All resident qualified electors of the City shall be permitted to vote at said Election, and on the day of the Election, such electors shall vote at the polling place designated for the election precinct in which they reside. This Election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Texas Election Code and the Texas Government Code, Chapter 1251; and, as may be required by law, all election materials and proceedings shall be printed in both English and Spanish.

SECTION 7:

(a) Pursuant to Section 3.009, Texas Election Code: (i) the proposition language that will appear on the ballot is set forth in Section 2 of this Election Order, (ii) the purposes for which the bonds are to be authorized are set forth in Section 1 of this Election Order, (iii) the principal amount of bonds to be authorized is set forth in Section 1 of this Election Order, (iv) if the issuance of bonds is authorized by voters, taxes sufficient, within the limits prescribed by law, to pay the annual principal of and interest on the bonds and to provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds may be imposed, as set forth in Section I of this Election Order, (v) bonds authorized pursuant to this Election Order may be issued to mature over not to exceed 40 years from their date of issuance and bearing interest at the rate or rates (not to exceed 15%), as authorized by law and determined by the Board, and (vi) as of the beginning of the City's current fiscal year, the aggregate amount of outstanding principal of the City's debt obligations was \$0.00 and the aggregate amount of outstanding interest on the City's debt obligations was \$0.00, and (vii) the City's advance debt service tax rate as of the date of adoption of this ordinance is \$0.00 per \$100 of taxable property.

(b) Based upon market conditions as of the date of this Election Order, if the bonds are authorized, the estimated total tax rate of the City is expected to be approximately \$0.6538 per \$100 of taxable assessed value, based on current State law, which is equal to the estimated tax rate for voted debt obligations of the City and is subject to change.

If approved by voters, the bonds will be secured by an ad valorem tax that is sufficient, within the limits prescribed by law, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds and the costs of any credit agreements. Actual tax rates, interest rates, maturity dates, aggregate outstanding indebtedness and interest on such debt, will only be established and known at the time that bonds are issued. In addition, actual tax rates will depend upon, among other factors, the assessed valuation of taxable property, prevailing interest rates, the market for the City's bonds and general market conditions at the time that bonds are issued.

The estimated tax rates and other statements contained in this subsection (b) are (i) based on certain assumptions (including assumptions concerning prevailing market and economic

conditions at the time(s) of issuance of the bonds) and derived from projections obtained from the City's financial advisor, (ii) subject to change to the extent that actual facts, circumstances and conditions prevailing at the time that the bonds are issued differ from such assumptions and projections, (iii) provided solely in satisfaction of the requirements of Section 3.009, Texas Election Code, and for no other purpose, without any assurance that such projections will be realized, and (iv) not intended to give rise to a contract with voters or limit the authority of the Board to issue bonds in accordance with the Proposition submitted by this Election Order.

SECTION 8:

- (a) A substantial copy of this Ordinance, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be posted at three (3) public places within the City and at the City Hall not less than twenty-one (21) full days prior to the date on which the Election is to be held. Notice of the Election as required by the Texas Election Code and Chapter 1251, Texas Government Code, shall also be published on the same day in each of two (2) successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City, the first of said publications to appear in said newspaper not more than thirty (30) days and not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the day of the Election.
- (b) A substantial copy of this Ordinance, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be posted, on Election Day and during early voting by personal appearance, in a prominent location at each polling place.
- (c) A substantial copy of this Ordinance, together with the notice of election and the contents of the Proposition, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be posted on the City's website during the twenty-one (21) days before the Election.
