KSB, PALS rededicate Sculpture Garden as a new Village Park

Saladoans gathered for the Rededication of the Sculpture Garden as a Village Park Nov. 17, following actions by the Board of Aldermen that has brought what started as a private effort of Keep Salado Beautiful and Public Arts League of Salado under the umbrella of Village government.

Following the rededication and ribbon cutting by the Salado Chamber of Commerce and Tourism Bureau, supporters gathered for a reception in the warmth of Salado Wine Seller, where they enjoyed Texas wines and cheeses.

The action taken by aldermen is similar to that taken when the Village took over operations of Pace Park on behalf of the Pace Park Foundation. Yet, it is quite different in that the Village will contract with the KSB and PALS to continue their work in the Sculpture Garden, located on Salado Plaza Dr. on property owned by Salado Storage, LLC and the Presbyterian Church of Salado.

The Village will lease the property from the land owners for \$1 per year. In a sublease, the Village will then lease out the property to KSB and PALS for the same amount.

Under the primary

lease, the Village will maintain liability insurance under its umbrella policy, which was the motivating factor in KSB and PALS approaching the Village in July about the proposal. Another factor was the loss of income to KSB when the local Saturday recycling program came to an end.

Finally, a license for the use of the property allows KSB and PALS to place art on the property. KSB and PALS will maintain the property.

In an earlier vote on Nov. 6, aldermen approved an agreement with KSB to provide programs and services to the Village for \$5,00 per year.

Village aldermen approve financial agreements for sewer bond, road engineering contracts

Salado aldermen at their Nov. 13 meeting approved agreements with SAMCO Capital Markets, Inc. for financial advisory services for the issuance and sales of bonds and with Andrews Kurth LLP to act as Bond Counsel on behalf of the Village and the Central Texas Council of Governments to act as grant administrator for \$1.5 million grant from Economic Development

Administration. This was the board's first official action after members officially canvassed the results of the Nov. 4 election in which voters approved the proposition to allow the Village to issue \$10.55 million in bonds for the construction of a sewer system.

The board adopted the resolutions that approved the agreements for the financial advisory services and for Bond Counsel as part of its Consent Agen-

da. In the agreement with SAMCO Capital Markets, Inc. for financial advisory services, SAMCO will be paid an hourly rate of \$250 for services that include preparing information for an open market bond sale, funding through the Texas Water Development Board or any other funding source; surveying the financial resources of the Village to determine the extent of its borrowing capacity preparing recommendations and advice on current bond market conditions, forthcoming bond issues that will influence interest rates; coordinating the notice of sale and offering statement; making recommendations on the bond ratings; disseminating information to prospective bidders; delivering definitive debt records and coordinating the entire program of financing.

All financial advisory fees will be negotiated for each individual project by a committee of the Village that includes the Mayor and at least one aldermen.

Aldermen also approved a resolution to approve an agreement with Andrews Kurth LLP to serve as Bond Counsel for

the Village. Andrews Kurth will prepare legal proceedings and legal work for the authorization, issuance and sale of each series of obligation, evaluate legal matter, prepare ordinances, attend meeting to discuss the sizing, timing or sale of each series, supervise printing of each series, review certified proceeding, attend bond sale, closing and other meetings. Andrews Kurth will be paid fees for each series of obligations based upon \$1 per \$1,000 of proceed with a minimum fee of \$25,000 for each series of obligations. For revenue or refunding bonds, the fee is \$1.35 for each \$1,000 pro-

Aldermen approved an interlocal agreement with CTCOG naming the CTCOG-Development

District of Central Texas as the Grant Administrator of the Economic Development Administration Public Works Grant for the Village of Salado should that grant be awarded.

In October, aldermen approved a resolution submitting an application with the Economic Development Administration for a cooperative agreement grant for \$1.5 million and authorized matching local funds. This grant was prepared by CTCOG for the Village.

In other business, aldermen approved a professional services agreement with Kasberg, Patrick and Associates, LP for \$61,500 for engineering services for the reconstruction of Salado Plaza Drive, Mill Creek Drive and Thomas Arnold Rd.

Aldermen approved an annual street maintenance program for 2014-15 at their Nov. 6 meeting that directed staff to secure the engineering contract proposal to design, prepare bids, perform bid analysis and perform reconstruction of Salado Plaza Drive, Mill Creek Drive and Thomas Arnold Drive; prepare an interlocal agreement with Bell County to perform seal coating on Royal Street, Baines Street and Chisholm Trail and to initiate and conduct a crack sealing program to prepare other roads for future seal coating.

The reconstruction of Salado Plaza Dr. Mill Creek Drive and Thomas Arnold Road is estimated at \$300,000. An alternate bid will be sought for the construction of ribbon curbs on approximately 30 feet of Mill Creek Drive for heavy truck turning ar-

The cost estimate for the seal coating program on Royal and Baines Streets and Chisholm Trail is \$60,000.

The road committee, chaired by Alderman Michael McDougal, determined that there are ap-

proximately 60 lane miles that should be crack sealed as a maintenance. The committee recommended that the Village undertake this over a three-year period, crack sealing 220 lane miles per year. The cost estimate for crack sealing is estimated at \$10,000 per

In 2014-15, \$200,000 was budgeted for street improvements, the same amount that was budgeted in 2013-14, but was not spent. The carry-over street funds will bring the total streets budget for 2014-15 to \$400,000.

Aldermen also appointed Ron Coleman to serve an unexpired term on the Village Planning and Zoning Commission.

Aldermen will meet only one time next month. The board will meet at 6:30 p.m. Dec. 11 so that aldermen can participate in the Dec. 4 Salado Christmas Stroll Parade. Meetings are usually on the first and third Thursday at 6:30 p.m.

lexas key in effort to reduce premature

HOUSTON - The latest figures show the pre-term birth rate in Texas continues to fall, but the progress is slow and that could hamper goals nationwide for healthier babies. As of last year, the U.S. premature birth rate had fallen to

11.4 percent. In Texas the rate was nearly a percent higher, says Dr. Charleta Guillory, neonatologist at Texas Children's Hospital.

"We have a very high rate of premature births," says Guillory. "Because you have about four-million deliveries in the country, 400,000 here in Texas, we knew we really had to make a dent in that number in order to decrease prematurity nationwide."

The March of Dimes is leading the campaign to reduce the nation's preterm birth rate, with a goal of 9.6 percent or less by

Often, the specific cause of premature birth isn't clear, but factors that

may increase the risk include smoking, some infections and some chronic conditions such as high blood pressure and diabetes. Guillory says further understanding of the risk factors and reducing the number of babies being born too soon can save billions of dollars in health and society costs.

"If you have a 24-weekold infant, that baby may stay in the hospital anywhere from three to six months - and if you have complications, even longer than that," says Guillory. "That means the parents are dealing with life and death almost every day in the neonatal intensive care unit."

Premature birth is the leading cause of newborn death, and babies who survive often face the risk of serious and sometimes lifelong health issues. They include breathing problems, developmental delays, vision loss and cerebral palsy.

Extortion as Conciliation

In a fit of postelection modesty, President Barack Obama is offering not to take executive action to amnesty millions of illegal immigrants -- provided Republicans do his bidding on immigration.


It is extortion as conciliation. New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie often invites comparisons to "The Sopranos," but it is President Obama who is making a tactic out of the HBO mob drama his major postelection initiative. His bipartisan outreach now ends with a pointed "Or else ..."

This offer Republicans can't refuse includes the stipulation that the president will revoke his executive action in the event they pass legislation to his liking. How generous of

Obama's tack on immigration speaks to a president who is out of sorts and out of step, and recognizes his own political impotence. Unable to build a political case for one of his chief second-term priorities, he has to fall back on executive usurpation.

Prior to the election, the president delayed his threatened amnesty -- perhaps legalizing millions of immigrants -- because





winning resoundingly. This electoral rebuke might give a less highhanded president pause.

Not President Obama. The president says that he'd still "prefer" that Congress itself change the immigration laws. For him, this is a positively Madisonian expression of respect for the American constitutional scheme.

President Obama is distressed that the Senate passed an immigration bill by a wide, bipartisan margin and the House refused to take it up. Fine. That is his right. He has legitimate means to respond.

For one, he could have barnstormed the country for amnesty during the election campaign, seeking to defeat officeholders and candidates who don't share his view on immigration. This is how legislative majorities are built. With the election past, he can still build the political case for an amnesty and pressure House Republicans to act. If he could turn up the political heat enough, he might make House Speaker John Boehner buckle.

When it comes down to it, fiat is the only means for President Obama to reliably get his way. His promised executive action is a substitute for democratic politics, not an exercise in it.

No matter how frustrated the president is, there is no Chagrined and Impatient Clause in the Constitution that allows him to effectively make his own laws when he is irked at Congress. If so, Congress would have been neutered at the beginning. American presidents have been irked at Congress for as long as there have been presidents and a Congress. What President Obama is threatening is not only politically graceless -- a rude gesture at the public, as Ron Fournier of the National Journal puts it -- it is a profound distortion of the mechanisms of American government.

Bigger threat than Ebola

Factory farms are breeding antibiotic-resistant bacteria

Despite all the panic, Americans don't face any great risk from Ebola right now. But we do need to worry about a homegrown medical catastrophe of our own that we're failing to address: the erosion of antibiotic effective-

Doctors prescribe antibiotics to treat a broad array of infections that can otherwise prove fatal. While the drugs are being grossly overused, diminishing their power to heal, hospitals aren't to blame factory farms are.

Most U.S. livestock are being raised today in concentrated animal feeding operations (CAFO). At these factory farms, antibiotics get routinely doled out to stave off the diseases that might otherwise quickly spread due to overcrowded, unnatural, and unsanitary living con-

This overuse is rendering these lifesaving drugs less effective by accelerating the evolution of bacteria that are resistant to antibiotics.

Now that they've infiltrated our food system, those bacteria are endangering human health and are taking a bite out of the national economy. Antibiotic-resistant bacteria cause prolonged infections in thousands of Americans each year, resulting in \$20 billion in annual health care costs and over \$35 billion in lost economic productivity, according to the Centers for Disease

Nearly a quarter of these infections originate from food-borne

It's not like no one warned us this might happen. In 1945, Alexander Fleming — the biologist who won a Nobel Prize for discovering penicillin cautioned that misusing antibiotics would spur the development of superbugs.

As U.S. agriculture became increasingly industrialized, its leaders ignored Fleming's warning.

Agribusiness now uses antibiotics with abandon. Livestock and poultry consume an astounding 80 percent of the 29 million pounds of antibiotics used each year in the United States. Entire herds receive daily doses to stave off disease and promote growth — two things that would happen naturally if animals had better liv-SEE FACTORY FARM, PAGE 3A

ing conditions and weren't crammed into factory farms.

Antibiotics abuse reflects the truly awful conditions farm animals endure today.

The extreme crowding of livestock increases animal stress, produces vast concentrations of manure, and makes good hygiene virtually impossible — all of which invite pathogens to multiply.

Throw in vast quantities of antibiotics, and it's no surprise that factory farms are hotspots for antibiotic-resistant bacteria. Moreover, since manure from factory farms is often used to fertilize fruits and vegetables, these bacteria can be delivered straight to

the mouths of consumers.

Antibiotic-resistant bacteria have become so prevalent that even animals raised without antibiotics may still be carriers. That's why the Centers for Disease Control, along with many medical organizations, are calling for an end to the "non-therapeutic" use of antibiotics.

Many European nations

have seen antibiotic-resistant bacteria decline since implementing such bans. The United States should follow their lead before we wind up facing an epidem-

As a consumer, you can do your part by choosing to buy certified organic dairy products and meats, as the farmers who sell them don't use non-therapeutic antibiotics. Everyone has the power to put stores, brands, and lawmakers on notice that we need to save antibiotics for treating illnesses.

DPS Urges Texans toPrepare for Winter Weather

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is urging Texans to begin preparing for possible winter weather, which can impact the state during the coming days and months.

"Winter weather can disrupt and endanger the lives of Texans in all parts of the state, and residents should prepare their cars and homes now for possible storms and freezing temperatures this season," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "The best defense against a potential dangerous situation is early preparation."

DPS offers the following tips for staying safe during possible winter weather:

Monitor local weather broadcasts and follow up-to-the-minute weather conditions, at http://www.weather.gov/.

On icy roads, drive slowly and increase distance required for stopping, and avoid using cruise control.

Watch for downed trees and power lines across roads. If power is out, treat all intersections as fourway stops.

Make sure your vehicle is properly maintained before any trip.

Keep your gas tank full.

Avoid traveling when sleet, freezing rain or snow is predicted.

Winterize your vehicle by checking the battery, windshield wipers (including appropriate freeze resistant-fluid), tire pressure, tire tread, fluid levels, and lubricate door and trunk locks to prevent freezing. In addition, here is a list of emergency supplies drivers can keep in their vehicle:

Blankets/sleeping bags and extra clothing, mittens and hat.

Cell phone, radio, flashlight, extra batteries.

First-aid kit and pocket knife.

High calorie, non-perishable food, bottled water. Sack of sand or cat litter to provide traction for

Windshield scraper, tool kit, booster cables,

tow rope and shovel.

Here are some additional steps to prepare for winter weather:

Insulate outside faucets and pipes near outer walls.

Make sure that furnaces, heaters, fireplaces and wood stoves are clean, well-ventilated and in good working condition.

Make arrangements for proper shelter and an emergency supply of food and water for your pets and livestock.

Stock up on firewood and supplies, including canned goods and bottled water.

If you will be away from home for a long period of time, set your thermostat to 55 degrees or higher and open cabinets under sinks.

Check on friends and family members whose health or age may put them at greater risk from cold weather.

Dermatophytosis

Dermatophytosis, otherwise known as "ringworm," is a fairly common fungal infection that can affect dogs, cats, and other animals.

"The term 'ringworm' actually comes from the circular, ring-like lesion formed on the skin of infected people; however, the disease itself is not caused by a worm at all," said Dr. Alison Diesel, clinical assistant professor at the Texas A&M College of Veterinary Medicine & Biomedical Sciences.

Dermatophytosis is a zoonotic disease, meaning it not only can be transmitted to other animals, but to people as well. An animal or person can become infected with dermato-

phytes from contact with another infected animal, transfer from infected materials such as bedding and grooming equipment, or from the soil.

"Very young animals and older animals with other underlying illness are at higher risk for dermatophytes," said Dr. Diesel. "Additionally, certain breeds of animals, such as Persian and Himalayan cats, and Jack Russell and Yorkshire terriers, have a higher tendency towards disease development."

Dermatophytosis is the most common cause of alopecia, or hairloss, in cats. In addition to poor hair coat, it can also cause reddened skin, hyperpigmentation, and lesions.

"Lesions will often involve little red bumps called papules, scabs, and circular areas of hair loss. Anywhere on the body may be affected by hair loss, but face and paws will often have lesions." said Dr. Diesel.

Because of this infection's ability to spread all over the animal's body and infect others, you should be sure to see your veterinarian for a proper diagnosis. A common way for veterinarians to diagnosis dermatophytosis is with a Wood's lamp exam. This involves passing a fluorescent light source, or Wood's lamp, over the animal and looking for glowing hair shafts. How-

ever, only a few strains of dermatophytes may glow, so this is not always considered to be the best approach.

"A better option for diagnosis is to perform a culture for the organism," said Dr. Diesel. "Infected hairs or material may be collected by plucking hairs or brushing the animal with a new toothbrush and then submitting these hairs to a laboratory for fungal culture/isolation."

Although your pet may be able to self-cure the disease on their own, therapy is typically recommended to minimize the amount of infective material present and thereby minimize spread of disease to others.

"Treatment may involve strictly topical therapy with antifungal agents (such as lime sulfur) or may also involve oral antifungal medication as well," said Dr. Diesel.

Treatment of exposed animals and other animals in the household should be

considered in order to prevent the spread of infection. If you are concerned that your pet may have dermatophytosis, particularly if skin disease is noted in people in the household, you should contact your veterinarian immediately.

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
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
