

Feinstein's Travesty

The Senate Intelligence Committee spent roughly \$50 million on its investigation into the CIA and apparently couldn't find Michael Hayden's phone number.

The committee portrays Gen. Hayden, the former CIA director, as a liar who deceived Congress about the agency's interrogation program, yet the committee couldn't be bothered to interview him.

That's because the committee, led by California Democrat Dianne Feinstein, didn't bother to interview anyone. The committee didn't want to include anything that might significantly complicate its cartoonish depiction of a CIA that misled everyone so it could maintain a secret prison system for the hell of it.

The Feinstein report scores some points. It makes plain that the CIA program wasn't adequately controlled, especially at the beginning, that it went too far, and that the agency became too invested in defending it.

But the thrust of the report is devoted to the proposition that torture, or harsh interrogation, never works. This is important to critics of the CIA program because they are almost never willing to say that torture is wrong and that we should never do it --

even if it sometimes works and potentially saves lives. They lack the moral conviction to make their case solely on principle.

Even though its executive summary runs more than 500 pages, the report lacks basic context, specifically an account of the post-Sept. 11 environment in which nearly everyone expected another attack and wanted to do everything possible to avoid it. This is why the likes of the impeccably liberal Jay Rockefeller, vice chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee, could say after we captured Khalid Sheikh Mohammed in 2003 that we should be "very, very tough with

The harsh methods that the CIA adopted don't, in isolation, shock the conscience. There's nothing, for instance, about throwing someone up against a flexible wall, grabbing and shaking him, keeping him in a tight space or slapping him that is clearly out of

It is cumulatively, over an extended period -- as with Abu Zubaydah -that the methods take on a different complexion. Reasonable people can disagree about whether we went over the line of what we should do to anyone in any circumstance. But in making a totalist case against the CIA program, the Feinstein report implausibly asserts that it had no benefits whatsoever.

It points out, as though it settles something, that terrorists lied when they were subjected to coercive interrogations. Of course, terrorists also lied when they weren't subjected to coercive interrogations. The standard shouldn't be if the CIA program produced 100 percent truthfulness, but whether it produced intelligence that otherwise wouldn't have been available as quickly or at all.

The overall contention of the report is that we would have achieved the same results in the war on terror with less information, rather than more. Not only does that defy common sense, it is a bet no one would have been willing to make in 2002.

Nor would anyone have guessed 10 years ago that it would be considered more in keeping with American values to assassinate people from drones rather than capture them and ask them questions under du-

Salado accepts about 200 transfer students per year

We currently have 1,563 students enrolled in our district. Almost 200 of those students do not live in our school district and have been accepted as transfers.

We have allowed transfers in Salado for at least 30 years, however, a few parents have expressed some concerns to me regarding transfer students.

The following are the five concerns that I have heard regarding transfer students and some facts in response to those concern.

Concern #1 – "The majority of our growth the past couple of years has been the result of additional transfer students."

Our enrollment has increased by 213 students the past two years. While approximately 50 of those students are transfers, the majority of those students are resident students (that live in our school district).

Concern #2 – "Families of transfer students do not pay their fair share because they don't pay property taxes to the school district and they no longer have to pay a transfer fee."

We discontinued charging transfer fees about a year and a half ago. We are a property wealthy school district and the state funding is reduced for property wealthy districts that charge a transfer fee.

There are approximately 350 property wealthy

school districts in Texas and only 11 of them charge a transfer fee.

Our funding is determined by our enrollment and attendance and we receive the same amount of funding per student, regardless of whether or not they live in the district.

The State of Texas funds the difference between that amount we qualify for based on our enrollment and attendance and the amount of revenue we receive in local property taxes. While families of transfer students do not pay taxes to our school district, they do pay property taxes to the district where they live.

Transferring their student from another district to Salado will reduce the amount of state funding that district receives and will increase the amount of state funding that our district receives.

Thus, families of transfer students do indirectly pay school property taxes to our

district.

Concern #3 – "We are going to have "difficult" students transfer into our school district that will create problems for our resident students."

We review a student's attendance, academics, and behavior prior to determining whether or not to approve their transfer application. Students are required to reapply every school year so they need to maintain good attendance, academics, and behavior to be admitted again the following year.

Concern #4 – "We are going to have too many "top" students transfer into our school district that will bump our resident students out of the top ten percent of graduating classes (which is important because graduates in the top ten percent of their class are guaranteed college admission in public colleges and universities in Texas)."

We have reviewed the last several graduating


Salado is balanced with good people, ideas, and self-confidence.

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Chris Christie's Pork Barrel Politics The New Jersey governor just vetoed a ban on a form of animal torture.

As the weather turns colder in this month of Christmas, Hanukkah, Kwanzaa, and the Winter Solstice, our hearts grow warmer and our thoughts turn to kindness and goodwill toward all.

Unless, of course, you're Chris Christie.

The governor of New Jersey is a mighty big man, both politically and physically. But Christie — who hopes to win the Republican presidential nomination in 2016 — recently used his gubernatorial power in a way that shows just how small a man he really is.

These things are metal cages used to imprison

pregnant pigs, and they're so small that the mothers can't even turn around.

Amounting to animal torture, the cages are among the cruelest devices of the generally cruel factory farm system — so cruel that McDonald's, Burger King, Wendy's, Costco, Kroger, Sysco, Hormel, and scores of other food giants have pledged to stop buying from pork producers that

use them.

The New Jersey senate voted 32-1 to abolish the cages, and its assembly voted 53-13 for the same

 percent of New Jerseyans want the crates banned.

Christie, however, contemptuously rejected the people's will with a dash of his infamous snarkiness, calling the ban "a solution in search of a problem."

Actually, he's the one on a search. Only a year from now, voting for the GOP presidential nomination begins in Iowa — a state with more pigs than people, where the corporatized hog industry commonly uses gestation crates.

So, mama pigs must be sacrificed in order for Christie to win the Iowa pork vote.

Maybe if we loaded this cynical man into one of those pig cages — for say, five minutes — he'd begin to understand the problem.



availability of instructional classes and we did not staff and space when we review transfer applications. As of today, we are no longer accepting transfers into about half of the grade levels. As our community continues to grow and our facilities reach capacity, we might need to eventually discontinue accepting

transfer students.

Until that time, we are actually able to maintain lower class sizes by accepting transfer students as a result of the additional revenue we receive. We receive over \$1 million in additional state funding every year because of the

and Management

transfer students enrolled in our district. The largest expenditure in our school district is teacher salaries. so if we had to cut over \$1 million from our budget we would inevitably have to eliminate some teaching positions. Thus, this would not reduce class

In fact, our district actually benefits financially from the enrollment of transfer students because many expenses are already fixed, including utility usage and transportation. This is particularly important because as a result of the school

funding changes the Texas Legislature approved in 2011, our district's state funding has been reduced \$2,891,575 over the past four years. Thus, the additional revenue from transfer students allowed us maintain lower class sizes and increase teacher salaries while still maintaining a balanced budget and a property tax rate that is lower than most school districts in Bell County.




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Churches plan special services

Department of Defense officials announced the death of a Soldier who was supporting Operation Enduring Freedom December 14, 2014.

Spc. Wyatt Joseph Martin, 22, whose home of record is listed as Mesa, Arizona, died Dec. 12 in Parwan Province, Afghanistan, of wounds suffered when the enemy attacked his vehicle with an improvised explosive device.

He arrived at Fort Hood in January 2012 and was assigned to 3rd Squadron, 3rd Cavalry Regiment, Fort Hood, since December 2014.Tucker deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom from October 2005 to September 2006 and from October 2007 to October 2008. 70 years there'll be not a single veteran of World War II sitting in the House of Representatives or in the Senate when 114th Congress convenes on January 3, 2015, the Association of Mature American Citizens notes.

Michigan's Dingell, who is 88 years old, and 91-year-old Ralph Hall of Texas are the last of the Greatest Generation to serve.

Dingell, a Democrat, enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1944 when he turned 18 and rose to the rank of Second Lieutenant. He was first elected to the House of Representatives in 1955 and holds the distinction of being the longest serving member of Congress.

Navy Lieutenant Hall,

For the first time in a Republican, joined up in 1942 and was an aircraft carrier pilot. He was elected to the House in 1980 and has held his seat for 17 terms.

> Veterans' advocate Seth Lynn, director of the independent Veterans Campaign, said "World War II, as awful as it was, broke down tons of barriers." Those who served, he said, developed a "camaraderie that lasted for the rest of their lives."

> Representative said the bond held firm among members of Congress who served in the Great War. "When we differed on the issues, we respected each other and chose to respectfully disagree. That was part of our military training and experience."

Also scoring for Salado were Tatum, 8 points and Kelly, 4 points.






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

Santa Claus has a colorful history

Christmas is here. Well-remembered Yuletide tunes have rattled out of the of the radio speakers since Thanksgiving. Dusty lights and stockings fetched from the attic or garage in their once yearly exodus from seclusion.

Furniture shuffled to fix space for the tree. Ornaments crafted in grade school by tiny, articulate hands dangling from the limb, light curving off their surfaces in a fractional sweep of color. A cause to celebrate nostalgia.

And of course, with Christmas there's Santa Claus, the most recognizable of all of America's holiday accoutrement. Old Saint Nick, the lover of mirth and goodwill, the master of reindeer and magical sleds; an utterly jovial dough boy who seems unwilling to strike even the most recalcitrant of youngsters from his gift list. We can all conjure him to mind without effort. Red suit, black boots and all.

So whom do we owe this department store image? Has he always been this way: plump, bearded and be-capped, from time immemorial? Certainly not.

He is like all things American. An amalgam of no certain antecedent, stretched across centuries like a cultural chain, linking past and present, old and new. A true work in progress.

In some respects, the real life St. Nicholas was a far cry from our modern Santa Claus. He was a godly man, born around 270 AD to wealthy parents in the town of Patras, in what is now Turkey. Later in life, the devout Nicholas ascended to the bishopric of Myra, where he devoted himself to prayer, good acts and the needs of those less fortunate, often distributing presents to the poor. As an early man of the cloth in that part of the world, he would have worn robes of either red or burgundy, likely embellished with white trim.

After his passing in 343 he was canonized by the church, and great miracles were credited to St. Nicholas by those who subscribed to the cult that grew in his name. Reportedly, invoking the saint's name would aid in fertility, drive out evil spirits and mend incurable ailments.

The historical Nicholas has had quite a decorated career as a saint. He has been, at various times, the patron of Russia, Greece, Paris, pilgrims, preachers, prisoners, spinsters, orphans, thieves, bakers, brewers, butchers, apothecaries, haberdashers, tanners, fishermen and sailors, just to name a few. Vessels of the European Renaissance were often fitted with a visage of St. Nicholas affixed to the bow to honor their spiritual benefactor. And of course, Nicholas is the progenitor of our secular Santa modern Claus.

By 450, churches in Asia Minor were already being named for him. The day of his death, December 6, is still celebrated as a feast day for both Orthodox and Roman Catholics.

As early as the 12th century, nuns in France and Belgium were distributing gifts to the poor on Nicholas' feast

day, marking the infancy of the tradition that, in one form another, is still carried on today throughout the world, even Japan, where less than one percent of the population is Christian.

Until the advent of Protestantism in 1517, Nicholas held fast in his place as one of the most popular of all Catholic saints. But along with the Reformation came an accompanying decline in the veneration of saints, and the traditions of St. Nicholas' feast day, long cemented in the beliefs of the commoners, were compelled to take on different forms.

In England, where the observance of Christmas actually banned in 1645 by the dour Cromwellians, Father Christmas, a carry-over from the days of paganism, who adorned himself in a crown of mistletoe, holly or ivy and draped his robust frame with a robe of scarlet, became the new vehicle to celebrate the custom of gift giving and good cheer established so many years before.

This transformation eventually found its way into France, as well, taking the name of Pere Noel.

Under the influence of Martin Luther, the Germans developed their own model to replace St. Nicholas, the "Christ Kindlein," or Christ Child, who then became the symbolic gift giver. The Christkindlein would eventually, through triumph another American bastardization, be corrupted to its present form, the recognizable Kris Kringle. In some German variations, the Christ Child assisted St. Nicholas, or vice versa, in the rewarding of presents to well behaved children. In other traditions, Nicholas' servant, Peter, black faced from climbing through chimneys, kept the tally of naughty and nice children and was also responsible for the punishment of misbehaving children, often placing, under cover of darkness, a lump of coal in the child's shoe or stocking.

America's first contact with Jolly St. Nick came through its early Dutch settlers, who brought with them their European Christmas traditions. It is these early Dutchmen that gave us their Sint Nikolaas, or, in its shortened form, Sinter Klaas. It doesn't take much imagination to deduce that Sinter Klaas is the root of our Santa Claus.

For their part, in 1804 a group of New Yorkers, among them novelist Washington Irving, formed the New York Historical Society, adopting St. Nicholas as their patron. They included among their practices the Dutch tradition of gift giving at Christmas time.

Irving to a large degree popularized the Santa mystique through his 1809 work "A History of New York," where he penned the look and habits of Santa Claus. An 1821 poem written by a William Gilley refers to Santa dressed in fur and riding a sled pulled by a single reindeer.

A year later, in 1822, Clement Clarke Moore, drawing extensively from European tradition, composed one of the most famous poems of all time, the sentimental "An Account of a Visit from Saint Nicholas," best known by its opening line, "Twas the night before

In his poem, Moore presents Santa as an elf and introduces, for the first time, Santa's eight reindeer, each named accordingly. Incidentally, the ninth and most famous reindeer, Rudolph, didn't come along until 1939. The red-nosed reindeer was purely an advertising creation of Robert L. May, who worked for Montgomery Ward.

If there is one man, though, that deserves credit for formulating our perception of Santa Claus, it is 19th century political cartoonist Thomas Nast, who, for four decades, nearly contributed images of a plump and laughing, North-Pole-dwelling Santa to Harper's Weekly, one of the most widely circulated publications of its time, In his own right, Norman Rockwell created eight Santa Claus covers spanning 30 years for Saturday Evening Post, adorning many of them with halos.

Following Nast's lead, artist Haddon Sundblom, working for Coca-Cola in the 1930s, standardized the look of Salado Claus, completing visual a evolution some 1,500 years in the making. Sundblom, through his ads, lent a uniformity to all things Santa Claus, from his beard and his eyes, his clothes to his cap. Perhaps an explanation for this image uniformity lies in the fact that Sundblom often used himself as a model

That famous rosycheeked countenance did not exist prior to Thomas Nast, but it was perfected by Sunblom. By adding a human dimension to the myth, the explosion in popularity and recognizability of Santa Claus are testament to the talent of Sundblom and the reach of Coca Cola's advertising arm, not mention our own ravenous consumerism.

This is no new development, however. Stores were already advertising Christmas shopping in the 1820s, and the first department store Santa appeared in was in the 1840s.

For better, or, as most would argue, worse, Christmas has morphed into a secular celebration, absent in large part of its spiritual underpinnings. Funny then how Santa Claus, the oft-changed exponent of one of the most celebrated and pious saints in Christian history, has become its prevailing image.

But such is life. Be

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New Year bowl game entertaining brings big flavor to the table

Mini Cajun Shrimp Frittatas

Canola spray oil 2 green and/or yellow bell peppers, finely chopped 1 tablespoon salt-free Cajun seasoning

3/4 teaspoon fine sea salt, divided

2 (6-ounce) cans 365
Everyday Value® Wild
Caught Tiny Shrimp
Packed in Water, rinsed
and drained
8 eggs

Preheat the oven to 350°F. Spray 2 12-minimuffin tins with oil. Heat a large skillet over medium heat. Spray generously with oil, add peppers and cook, stirring often, until golden brown and tender. 10 to 12 minutes. Remove from the heat and toss with seasoning, 1/2 teaspoon of the salt and shrimp; set aside to let cool until warm. In a large bowl, whisk together eggs and remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt. Spoon shrimp mixture into muffin tins, and then pour eggs evenly over the top. Bake until puffed and cooked through, 20 to 25 minutes. Transfer to a platter and serve. Makes 2 dozen.



These little frittatas, filled with mini shrimp, sautéed bell peppers and spicy Cajun seasoning, are terrific for a game day brunch.

White Bean and Gorgonzola Topping

Spread on toasted bread rounds, use as a dip for pita chips, or thin with vegetable or chicken stock and gently heat for a pasta sauce over frozen mushroom ravioli.

1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil

1 clove garlic, sliced 1 (15-ounce) can white

beans, drained 1/2 teaspoon chopped

fresh rosemary 1/4 teaspoon crushed red chile flakes

1/2 teaspoon sea salt 1/2 teaspoon ground black

1/4 cup gorgonzola crumbles

Heat oil over medium heat in a sauté pan. Add garlic and cook until golden brown, about 4 minutes. Toss in beans, rosemary, chile flakes, salt and pepper and coarsely mash. 
Tunnels provide protection to tender plants in cold weather

A technique used by commercial growers to protect tender crops from harmful cold temperatures may be an affordable option for home growers as well, according to Dr. Joe Masabni, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service vegetable specialist.

"I've been working with strawberry producers, and we've found that using plastic covers to form small tunnels over the row is definitely a great tool to protect the plant during those occasional days or weeks when we have a severe freeze," Masabni said. "Why not show that it can be done for the homeowner, using the same material that the commercial growers have?"

Masabni used a clear, 6 millimeter plastic that is 6 feet wide and has perforations about 4 inches apart in a grid pattern. He said that easily covers the typical 4-foot wide raised bed most people use for home gardens. For a 15-foot long bed, he used about \$2 worth of a 500-foot roll of plastic.

He bent four PVC pipes – at a cost of \$10 – from side to side across the bed. He used eight snap clamps, which cost about \$10 dollars, to secure the plastic to the PVC pipes. Some U-shaped garden staples may be needed to keep the plastic from blowing too much and to further secure the warm air inside.

"So, for about \$22, I can protect my raised bed from those nights that become severely cold," Masabni said. "For strawberries, for example, the idea is to protect the flowers. The leaves can tolerate a lot of cold nights, even 32 or 30 degree temperatures.

In Texas, we planted in September, and we already have fruits and flowers on them in mid-December. If we can protect them on those occasional very cold nights, we can be harvesting throughout the winterand get an earlier harvest in the spring."

He said the plastic, pipes and snaps should last for several years of repeated winter use if taken care of, making such a system even more affordable over time

"And the beauty of the perforated plastic is that you don't have to worry about opening up on a warm sunny day because the pre-punched holes would let the extra heat vent out, while during the night it traps air inside to 15 in Brazos (example."The sn on the plastic are easily remove harvesting, Mas "You can open a three on one side harvest and ter orop as needed."

keep the plants warm," Masabni added. "Set it and forget."

Previous tests Masabni has done on the plasticcovered crops as far north as Kentucky showed that the temperature inside the plastic-covered row is always 10-20 percent higher than outside. He suggested that rows may be covered until around March 1, depending on the weather forecast in a given year, or until the last chance of severe frost passes. Another benefit is that other less cold-tolerant crops, such as tomatoes, can be planted earlier under such a system, he said.

"I have planted tomatoes mid-February whereas usually they are planted around March 15 in Brazos County, for example." The snap clamps on the plastic sheeting are easily removable for harvesting, Masabni said. "You can open a couple or three on one side and then harvest and tend to the


