# **Eagles lose in OT** to #14 Cougars

A missed three-point shot with 7.31 seconds left in overtime and a foul underneath the basket gave Jarrell's Houston Stewart the opportunity to put the Cougars out of reach Jan. 29 in a hard-fought district loss for Salado 55-57.

The loss puts the #13 Salado Eagles into a tie with their nemesis the #14 Jarrell Cougars. Both teams have defeated the other at home. Both are headed for the playoffs and will likely share the District Championship.

The squads fought each other from the tipoff to the final second of regulation, when Andrew Warren's 15-foot jumper bounced off the back of the rim, denying the Eagles a storybook win.

The squads squared off in overtime, where shots at the charity stripe were the difference in the game. Jarrell's James Klepac buried both of his free throws, but it took two trips to the free throw line for Salado to reknot the game at 49-49 with 1:49 left in overtime.

Stewart gave Jarrell a 52-49 lead but Kyle Heiner's steady shots at the line narrowed the lead to one with 39.31 seconds left to

Quick fouls by both squads brought the score to 53-52 with 22.05 seconds left. Klepac hit a crucial jumper to extend the Jarrell lead to 55-52 with 17.81 left in OT.

Salado got the ball across midcourt, but the Jarrell defenders did not let any man open and with defenders in his face, Dane Hankamer missed a threepointer that would have tied the game with 7.31 seconds left.

Jarrell's Stewart rebounded the ball and was immediately fouled, converting both shots for a 57-52 lead.

Warren hit a threepointer just as time ran out on the clock, as the Eagles fell just short in the closely-fought game.

Jarrell extended their first-quarter lead of 15-12 to 19-12 with 6:20 left in the half before the Salado Eagles went on an 11-point run over the next four minutes, led by Tyler Ramthun and Hankamer combinging for 8 of those points.

Jarrell closed to within one point at the half, 23-

In the third, Salado led by as much as 6 points, 32-

26 with 5:28 left in the period before Jarrell closed the gap to 34-35 going into the fourth quarter.

Jarrell fought to stay points within three throughout the fourth quarter, tying the score at 45-45 with 2:11 and taking a narrow lead of 47-45 with 1:44 left to play. Brandon Womac hit both of his free throws to tie the game at 47-47 with 1:31 left to play.

Neither team scored in the final 91 seconds and Kyle Heiner grabbed a rebound for Salado and time out was called with 4.76 left on the clock. The time out was evidently called before a foul that would have put Heiner in a position to give the Eagles a lead. The Eagles inbounded the ball and Andrew Warren took a 15foot shot in traffic with the ball banging off the rim as time ran out in regulation.

Hankamer led Salado with 18 points, followed by Womac, who had 15 points. Also scoring for Salado were Austin Adams, 8 points, Ramthun, 6 points, Kase Spears, 4 points, Heiner and Warren, 2 points each.

Klepac and Tony Brown both scored 17 points to lead Jarrell. Also scoring for the Cougars were Wesley Alvarez, 9 points, Landon Ledbetter, 8 points, and Stewart, 6

## Salado salamander economic impact will be minimal

The economic impact of the proposed listing of the Salado salamander will be minimal -- just \$30,000. Williamson County and Travis County did not get off so easy for the proposed listing of three other salamanders. The cost of protecting those species is \$29 million over a 23 year period.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) released its draft economic analysis on Jan. 25 and reopened the public comment period until March 11 on the proposed listing of four central Texas salamanders as endangered.

Most of the economic impact will be felt by federal agency's, according to the draft report.

"Our coalition of stakeholders -- Bell County, Clearwater Underground Water Control District (CUWCD), Village of Salado and Salado Water Supply Corporation -- has been busy working to develop studies that assess whether there are any realistic impacts to the salamander cused by current activities in Bell County," CUWCD general manager Dirk Aaron stated last

The FWS estimates the cost of protecting the Salado salamander -- if it is listed later this year -at only \$30,000. Of that, \$18,000 relates to I-35 construction in the Salado

The Salado salamander, according to the proposed listing by FWS, is located in a handful of springs in Bell County. I-35 runs between two of those habitat areas in the Robertson Springs and the Big Bubbly Springs (also referred to Sirena Springs). When the FWS proposed the Salado salamander for listing as endangered, it also proposed 372 acres of critical habitat. Four sites compose the 372 acres. The IH-35 site is 168 acres and connects Robertson Springs to Big Bubbly Springs in downtown Salado. Three other sites are southwest of the village on the Solana Ranch with each site being 68 acres.

The FWS determined that there are six key threats to the salamander

# waive transfer fees next year

In hopes of boosting revenues, Salado ISD Trustees have changed the district's Transfer Policy to waive transfer fees for incoming students in the 2013-14 school year.

While the new policy may waive transfer fees, it will not open the floodgates to just any student to transfer into Salado ISD, according to Superintendent Michael Novotny.

Of those transfer students, 34 are the children of district employees and do not pay transfer fees. Ninety-one students pay transfer fees totaling ap-\$50,000. proximately

# One day bridge will be here, next day it will be gone

"One day it will be there, and the next morning it will be gone. But we will give you plenty of warning ahead of time."

Jodi Wheatley was speaking of the Thomas Arnold Rd. overpass over I-35, which will be demolished in the late summer as part of the I-35 expansion project through Salado.

Wheatley is the public information director on the I-35 expansion projects through the Waco district. Her job includes informing the public through a variety of media about the nightly lane closures, high impact closures, traffic slow-downs due to wrecks and other unforeseen circumstances for a 90-mile stretch of road that currently has construction ongoing on 60 miles of it.

She's a busy lady, to say the least, updating daily lane closures and sevenday forecasts for an extensive list of e-mail subscribers. If you would like to have your email address added to the TXDOT email

Information about projects on I-35 is also posted regularly to the website my35.org and other media, including www.saladovillagevoice.com.

The 3.4 mile project through Salado will cost \$70.4 million and is expected to take three years to complete. Work began in June 2012.

Wheatley introduced the Salado Lions Club to several key personnel in the expansion project through Salado, including Glenn Dunlap and Cody Williams with James Construction and James Klotz with the transportation consulting firm of HNTB.

HNTB is working with TxDOT and James Construction on the project through Salado.

The expansion project will drastically change the way I-35 looks as it runs through Salado: entrance and exit ramps for the interstate will be completely changed, the mainlanes will be expanded to three lanes in each direction and the access roads will become one-way with two travel lanes and additional turn lanes at crossovers

and crossunders.

The I-35 mainlane and access road bridges over Salado Creek will all be rebuilt for the expanded access. The access road bridges will be raised to be almost level with the mainlane bridges as they cross the creek, Klotz told the Salado Lions Club members at their Jan. 23 meeting.

The intersection at FM 2268 (Holland Rd.) will be completely redesigned. For one thing, the northbound mainlanes will have an exit with one-way access to South Main Street. Main Street (FM 2268) will become a one-way road just south of Stagecoach Inn.

An additional connector will link Main Street to the northbound access road for two-way access.

The intersection on the north end of Main Street (FM 2268) will also be dramatically changed with the project. The underpass will be moved south of its current location so that Salado Plaza Drive will pass directly under the interstate and connect to an extension of Williams



Rd. south of the Sonic property. West Village Rd. will also connect to the access road at its current location. Mill Creek Dr. will continue to have access to two-way traffic on Main Street, according to the latest schematic of the project.

The overpass at Thomas Arnold Rd. will remain in its current location, which is the reason that the bridge will be demolished and the new bridge built in that location. The overpass will not be demolished until the access roads from Thomas Arnold to North

Main Street are completed in order to handle the traffic flow.





# The Sap

President Barack Obama's most telling act on the international stage may have come in a meeting in early 2012 in Seoul, South Korea, with Russia's seat-warming president, Dmitry Medvedev.

Before the two got up to leave, President Obama asked -- in an exchange caught on an open mic -- that Moscow cut him some slack. "This is my last election," Obama explained. "After my election I have more flexibility." Medvedev promised to "transmit this information to Vladimir," referring, of course, to the power behind the throne, Vladimir Putin.

When he received the message, Putin must have chortled at the heartbreaking naivete of it. Here was the leader of the free world pleading for more time to get along with his Russian friends on the basis of an utterly risible assumption of good will. Here was a believer in the policy of "reset" who still didn't get that the reset was going nowhere. Here was weakness compounded by delu-

Putin didn't care about Obama's flexibility so much as any opportunity to thwart the United States. Obama said that Syria President Bashar al-Assad had to go; Putin worked to make sure he stayed. Obama said that National





Security Agency leaker Edward Snowden had to return to the United States; Putin granted him asylum. When Putin related to a group of Russian students that he had told Snowden to stop doing damage to the United States, the students did the only thing appropriate upon hearing such a patently insincere claim -- they laughed out loud

Vladimir Putin surely isn't the only one in the world who regards the president of the United States with barely disguised contempt. As the Syria crisis burns hotter, President Obama has never looked so feckless. He has perfected the art of speaking reproachfully and carrying little or no stick. The grand theory of his foreign policy coming into office, that more national selfabasement would win us greater international good will and respect, has done the opposite. Adversaries don't fear us, and allies don't trust us.

When Assad prepared to use chemical weapons last year, President Obama warned of a fearsome "red line," with no intention of following up on it. When Assad called his bluff, the president announced he would provide small arms to the rebels in retaliation, but he hasn't actually done it yet. Is it any wonder that Bashar al-Assad would, like Vladimir Putin, think he had taken the measure of the man? Last month, he killed hundreds in another chemical-weapons attack.

The sharply worded warning ignored by everyone has become the Obama administration's characteristic rhetorical trope. It warned the military junta in Egypt not to crack down on the Muslim Brotherhood, which was taken with all the seriousness of its admonitions to Assad to step aside.

Meanwhile, Iran progresses toward a nuclear weapon, Iraq reverts to civil war, and al-Qaida gains in Yemen and Somalia. In an essay in Commentary magazine, analyst Elliott Abrams argues that the guiding principle of Obama foreign policy is, as he once put it, to end the old "habits" of American international activism and leadership. The new habit, evidently, will be tolerating irrelevance and humiliation.

# **Our Bullish Sock Market**

THE DRIVE TO PAY WORKERS LESS AND LESS IS LEAVING AMERICANS UNABLE TO BUY MUCH BESIDES ESSENTIALS.

America's economic recovery can be measured not only in the performance of stocks — but also of socks.

Most economists, pundits, and politicos see this year's boom in the stock market and say: "See, the recovery is going splendidly!"

What if they went to such stores as Kohl's, Target, and Walmart to find out what's selling? The answer would be: Socks.

During this back-toschool season, usually the year's second-biggest buying spree, sales are sluggish at best. Customers are foregoing any spending on their kids except for socks, underwear, and other essentials.

The sock market isn't just a key economic indicator. It's a way to gauge the widening inequality in

America.

The highly-ballyhooed "recovery" has been restricted to the few at the top who own stocks, get paychecks that top \$100,000 a year, and drive BMWs. Meanwhile, the rest of us don't have any cash to spare beyond necessities.

Charles M. Holley Jr., Walmart's chief financial officer, seems puzzled by this. As he puts it, there's "a general reluctance of customers to spend on discretionary items."

Golly, sir, could it be because job growth in our supremely-wealthy country has been both lackluster and miserly?

Yes, for jobs today are typically very low-pay-

ing, part-time, and temporary, with no benefits. Mr. Walmart-man should know this, since his retail behemoth is the leading culprit in downsizing American jobs.

In recent months, headquarters has directed Walmart managers not to hire at all or to concentrate on hiring temporary and part-time workers, while cutting the hours of many full-time employees and making it harder for all workers to get the corporation's meager health care

Walmart's sales and profits are stagnant today because — hello — even its own workers can't afford to buy anything besides socks.

#### Constitutional Amendments Special Election November 5, 2013

#### **Proposition Number 1** (HJR 62)

HJR 62 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide by statute for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed in action, as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried. An eligible spouse who later qualifies a different property as the surviving spouse's residence homestead could be authorized by statute to receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation in the same amount received for the first qualifying homestead during the last year in which the surviving spouse received the exemption.

proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed in action?

#### **Proposition Number 2** (HJR 79)

HJR 79 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the constitutional provision requiring the creation of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is in operation. No new loans have been made from the fund by the board in more than 25 years, and the board currently has no appointees and receives no program funding.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment eliminating an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is operation-

#### **Proposition Number 3** (HJR 133)

HJR 133 would authorize local political subdivisions to extend

parts could remain temporarily in this state before being subject to ad valorem taxation. Under current law, merchandise, wares, and goods (including aircraft parts) may remain in this state temporarily for up to 175 days before being subject to ad valorem taxation; the proposed amendment would permit taxing entities to extend the exemption up to 730 days after the date that a person acquired or imported aircraft parts in the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize a political subdivision of this state to extend the number of days that aircraft parts that are exempt from ad valorem taxation due to their location in this state for a temporary period may be located in this state for purposes of qualifying for the tax exemption.'

#### **Proposition Number 4** (HJR 24)

HJR 24 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran at no cost to the veteran by a charitable organi-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization."

#### **Proposition Number 5** (SJR 18)

SJR 18 would amend the definition of "reverse mortgage" to authorize the making of reverse mortgage loans for the purchase of homestead propthe length of time that aircraft erty in addition to the current

legal uses of those loans, and would give lenders recourse against borrowers who fail to timely occupy the homestead properties purchased with such loans. SJR 18 would also add to the definition of "reverse mortgage" an extension of credit that is not closed before the 12th day after the lender provides to the prospective borrower a written notice summarizing risks and conditions of a reverse mortgage. The language of the required notice is prescribed in the resolution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment to authorize the making of a reverse mortgage loan for the purchase of homestead property and to amend lender disclosures and other requirements in connection with a reverse mortgage loan."

#### **Proposition Number 6** (SJR 1)

SJR 1 would create the State Water Implementation Fund as a special fund inside the state treasury and outside the General Revenue Fund. Money in the fund would be administered by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) and would be used to implement the state water plan, as adopted by general law, by TWDB.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources.

#### **Proposition Number 7**

(HJR 87) HJR 87 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow home-rule municipalities to adopt charter provisions authorizing the filling of vacancies in the governing body by appointment, but only when the remainder of the vacant term is less than 12 months. Under current law, municipal voters may adopt terms of office for municipal officers longer than two years, but upon approving longer terms of office, any resulting vacancies in office must be filled by special election. The proposed amendment would provide an option for home-rule municipalities to fill short-term vacancies through appointment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment authorizing a home-rule municipality to provide in its charter the procedure to fill a vacancy on its governing body for which the unexpired term is 12 months or less.

#### **Proposition Number 8** (HJR 147 and SJR 54)

HJR 147 would repeal the Texas Constitution's maximum tax rate for a Hidalgo County hospital district; the maximum rate is currently set at 10 cents per \$100 valuation. This rate is lower than the maximum tax rate allowable for hospital districts in all other counties in the State (75 cents per \$100 valuation). The repeal of the constitutional cap would authorize hospital district tax rates in Hidalgo County equal to the hospital district tax rate laws applicable to all other Texas

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment repealing Section 7, Article IX, Texas Constitution, which relates to the creation of a hospital district in Hidalgo County.

#### **Proposition Number 9** (SJR 42)

SJR 42 would expand the potential sanctions that the State Commission on Judicial Conduct can issue following a formal proceeding. This constitutional amendment would allow the Commission to issue an order of public admonition, warning, reprimand, or a requirement to obtain additional training or education in addition to the Commission's current authority to issue a public censure or recommend removal or retirement of a judge.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment relating to expanding the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge or justice following a formal proceeding instituted by the State Commission on Judicial Con-







#### Faith & Freedom in the Lone Star **State: Baylor Hosts Lecture Series**

Religion played a key role in the revolution that brought an independent Texas republic into existence, and today, religion thrives in the State of Texas, with perhaps a greater diversity of faiths than in any other state.

Scholars of religion will offer a look at Texas' religious history through a three-part lecture series in Waco called "Faith and Freedom in the Lone Star State: Exploring the Religious History of Texas." The Thursday lectures, which are free, will be hosted by Baylor University's Institute for Studies of Religion on Sept. 19, Oct. 10 and Nov. 14.

When Texas became a republic, a variety of churches - among them Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterian – appeared, and the Roman Catholic Church found a new start, he said. Through the decades, new denominations found homes in the state, among them Episcopalians, Lutherans and Eastern Orthodox. African-Americans, meanwhile, organized African Methodist and National Baptist churches. Adding to the diversity were Jewish families, Christian Scientists, Spiritualists and Swedenborgians.

Scholars of religion estimate more than 2,300 denominations exist in the United States, with Texas having representatives of at least 500 of those, said Melton, founder and director of the Institute for the Study of American Religion, which publishes Melton's Encyclopedia of American Religions.

The series will be held Thursday, Sept. 19, at Lee Lockwood Library and Museum, 2801 W. Waco Drive; , Thursday, Oct. 10, at Congregation Agudath Jacob, 4925 Hillcrest Drive; and Thursday, Nov. 14, at The Palladium, 729 Austin Ave.

# McLane throws for most yards by 2A quarterback in 75-67 loss loss

You know how when you get up in the middle of an action movie to get a Coke or popcorn and come back to your seat and the whole storyline has changed?

Well, Salado's contest -- let's face facts, it was a gunfight from the start -with the Lorena Leopards Sept. 6 was just like that.

If you left your seat at Lorena stadium to go to the concession stand or restroom you probably missed a 70 yard touchdown, two lead changes, an 80 yard drive, maybe an onsides kick or an interception thrown in for good measure.

What you didn't miss was much defense as the Eagles and Leopards combined for the third most points scored by two teams in a single Texas high school football game. Unfortunately, the Leopards edged Salado, thanks in part to two plays that went against the Eagles, handing Salado their second loss under coach Brent Graham. Lorena escaped their own field with a 75-67 hard-fought win over Salado, knocking Salado to 0-2 and improving to 2-0 on the season.

In doing so, the Leopards chewed up more than six lengths of the football field, with overpowering quarterback Harris Coleman rushing for 286 yards on 26 carries and three TDs. The Leopards had 611 rushing vards.

Meanwhile, Salado's junior left-handed quarterback McLane Carter had a game for the record books as well, throwing 25 completions for 613 yards, the fourth most passing yards in a single Texas high school game. For the

records buffs, one-time Salado quarterback Michael Richardson set the top passing yardage mark last year throwing for 725 yards for the Marble Falls Mustangs in their game with Boerne.

McLane's 613 yards is the most thrown in any 2A Texas high school football game. For that, he has been nominated for the Gridiron Legends Player of the Week award, presented by Dave Campbell's Texas Football on behalf of Cavender's and Wrangler.

McLane is one of ten nominees (along with Lorena's Coleman) for the weekly statewide award, which is 100 percent decided by fan voting. The poll, located at www.texasfootball.com, closes at noon on Sept. 13.

#### is held in May. Eagles face 2-0 China Spring in home opener

"It all starts with the snap," Salado Head Coach Brent Graham said.

"Jacob Popple was perfect for us and it gave us the opportunity to do great things," he added about the 617 yards passing by junior quarterback McLane Carter. "He (Carter) was never pressured by the defense and we hope to continue that this week."

The Salado Eagles play their first home game 7:30 p.m. Sept. 13 against the China Spring Cougars, who bring their 2-0 record into town.

The Cougars outscored Glen Rose 40-21 last week and opened with a 49-28 win over Mexia.

"They can definitely score," Graham said of China Spring. But so can Salado, as the Eagles scored 67 points in a 67-75 losing effort on the road against Lorena, the thirdhighest scoring game in Texas high school football history.

While Graham wants his offensive line centered around Popple to continue to do the stellar job of protecting Carter, he says that his defense has to improve. "We have to stop the run," he said, something the Eagles were unable to do in their past two outings.

Defensively, the Eagles seem to have adopted a "maybe next time" attitude, according to Graham. "They know that our offense can score, so when they don't make a stop, they think they can stop them next time. We've got to stop them now."

Graham said that is something that has been inculcated and worked on repeatedly in training.

"We've been doing a good job of it in practice, but it has not translated into game day yet," he said.

If and when it does, the Eagles will be a formidable opponent, as they move from non-district play on Sept. 13 to their first district football game at home against defending state champions Cameron Yoe on Sept. 27.

The Eagles face an offense that returns five starters from last year's 6-5 bi-district finalists.

Tucker Johnson moves from defense to take over the helm of the offense as quarterback. He will be bolstered in the Cougars' spread offense by sophomore running back David Feliciano and tight end Tyler Smith.

"They can score points against anybody," Graham

just over a minute left and kneeling out the remaining seconds, the outcome hinged on two plays, which both went against Salado. Lorena took a one-



#### Contract Bridge

By Steve Becker

Bridge is much too difficult a game for anyone to always play perfectly. Mistakes are fairly frequent, even at the highest level. The most that anyone can realistically hope to do is to hold their mistakes to a minimum.

Consider this deal from the 1977 world championship match between the United States and Sweden. When the U.S. held the North-South cards, the bidding went as shown. North's two-club bid over one notrump was "Landy," showing length in both major suits.

West led a diamond against four hearts doubled, and the American declarer took East's king with the ace. A trump to dummy's queen, West following low, revealed the 3-0 trump division. South then returned to his hand with a diamond and this time led a spade.

West followed low, as most defenders would, and declarer went up with the king, since West was marked by the bidding with the ace of spades. Next came a low spade to West's ace, after which it didn't matter what West played next. With proper play, South was bound to make the contract.

However, West could have defeated four hearts by going up with the ace of spades at trick four and exiting with a spade. South would then have found it impossible to stop West from scoring two trump tricks with the A-J no matter how he continued.

It is not difficult to prove that the correct play at trick four was for West to go up with the ace of spades and return the suit. But in the heat of battle -when a defender does not have the time to analyze a situation completely and instead reacts instinctively -- it is easy to make a mistake. West was only doing
