The Sins of Sor Juana wins District One-Act

Salado High School won the District Academic Meet, thanks in part to a strong performance of the One Act Play, which was named District Champions last week. Salado won the overall Academic Meet with 421 points. Lampasas was a distant second with 312.50 points.

The One Act Play will perform at the area contest in San Antonio on April 14. Public performances are scheduled for April 16, and 23 at 7:30 p.m. at Salado High School. Due to mature subject matter, this play may not be suitable for children under the age of 13.

At the district One Act Play contest, several performers and crew members received individual recognition: Best Actress – Haley Williams, All Star Cast – Peyton Best, Hon-

orable Mention All Star Cast – Reece Nicholson and Tori Sellers, All Star Technician – Sebastian Rocha.

The Sins of Sor Juana by Karen Zacarias is set in 17th Century New Spain (Mexico) and is centered around the renowned poet-nun, Juana Inez de la Cruz, whose face still appears on coinage and paper money in Mexico.

"We started working on this play last summer and

discovered that it was not just a play about an important historical figure, but that it related to important contemporary issues such as human equality and censorship, as well as universal themes of faith, love, and relationships," director J. J. Jonas said. "If you've ever had something or someone taken from you that you loved passionately or have been told that 'you are not good enough,' you will be able to relate to this story."

Sor Juana Inéz de la Cruz, one of the first published poets of the Americas, was born in Mexico in 1648, a poor and illegitimate child. She became renowned for her intelligence and ambition when, at the age of 12, she tried sneaking in to the University of Mexico by dressing SEE ONE-ACT. PAGE 4A

A century later, Titanic still stirs memories

Local dentist attending commemoration

For 100 years, the *Titanic* has been a story of fate, romance, mystery and loss. The unsinkable ship embarked on her maiden voyage on April 10, 1912. It sank in the icy waters of the North Atlantic on April 15, 1912.

Salado dentist Douglas Willingham has immersed himself in the fact, fiction, artifacts and lore surrounding the story of the *Titanic* for almost half a century, since first discovering the story in a tome of World Book Encyclopedia.


The half century of fascination with the *Titanic* comes to full steam this week when he travels to Pigeon Forge, TN to take part in the 100th Anniversary Commemoration of the sinking of the *Titanic* at the Titanic Museum there. Dr. Willingham was invited to a gathering of *Titanic* historians and scholars during the 100th Anniversary commemoration events.

The commemoration is led by Phil Gowan, who is one of the leading lights in *Titanic* research. It will include a musical tribute, a memorial service and a reenactment of the firing of

the distress rockets from the "bow" of the museum.

The Titanic Historic Society has invited relatives of passengers and crewmen to be their VIP guest for a Memorial Tribute to the *Titanic* on April 14. "They've really rolled out the red carpet for us, Dr. Willingham said. "I'm glad to be included as even a distant kinsman to Archie, but my primary reason for going is to observe this anniversary among like-minded people who have studied all facets of the story for years."

Much of Dr. Willingham's interest in the *Titanic* has been stoked by

his filial connection to Archibald Willingham Butt, who was military aide to Presidents Theodore Roosevelt and William Howard Taft.

Archibald Willingham Butt's maternal grandmother was sister to Dr. Willingham's great, great, great grandfather Archibald Willingham, who was the first white settler in Salado in 1850.

In March 1912, President Taft sent Butt to Europe to deliver a personal message to the Pope. This

was to be a much-needed vacation for Butt, who wrote to his sister-in-law Clara, "He (Frank Millet) is sailing on March second on the Berlin and has got me in the mood to go with him, although I hate to See Titanic. Page 2A

Titanic story is filled with romance, fate

STORY CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1A leave the Big White Chief just at this time. But I will be back before the middle of April. I have come to the conclusion that if I am to go through this frightful summer, I must have a rest now."

According to Dr. Willingham, Butt was torn between his loyalty to his close friend President Taft and his other close friend former President Roosevelt. Taft and Roosevelt had fallen out of good graves with each other and Taft had recently decided to seek re-election. Roosevelt had written Butt earlier, telling him to resign his position with Taft and join him in seeking election to the office of President.

Of the conflict between his two friends, Butt wrote to Clara, "If it's to be a fight to the finish between them, nothing I can do or say now will be of any good. I have done my best. They see things differently, that is all.:

With this conflict weighing heavily on his mind and heart, Butt traveled to Europe with his friend Millet, scheduled to return to the States aboard the *Titanic*.

The night of April 14, 1912, Major Butt joined a dinner party in the First Class Restaurant given by George D. Widener, his wife and son Harry. Joining the party were Commodore Smith, Mr. and Mrs. John B. Thayer and Mrs. and Mrs. William E. Carter. After the ladies returned to their cabins, Major Butt joined Widener, Col. Archibald Grace and others in the First Class Smoking Room, near the stern of A Deck. There they would enjoy a final cigar and bridge game, according to an article in the Augusta Spectator.

According to the Spectator, when the Titanic struck the iceberg, "most passengers were asleep and even those awake showed little concern for the slight jolt they experienced. The bridge players in the Smoking Room continued their game while steerage passengers playfully threw chunks of the iceberg that littered the deck. No one seemed concerned. Not even an iceberg could harm the mighty Titanic."

By midnight, however, water crashed over the first five watertight compartments and any hope for the *Titanic* was lost. The *Titanic* was built in such a way that if any four of her first five watertight compartments were flooded, she could stay afloat. But not with five.

Shortly after midnight, Commodore Smith ordered the lifeboats to be readied and the passengers alerted. According to the Spectator report, "The boats were lowered to the A Deck railing where the women and children were placed aboard. Among the First Class passengers, there was a note of formality, as when Major Butt escorted Miss Marie Young to her boat. The former music governess to the Roosevelt children was lifted into the boat and then '...he wrapped blankets about me and tucked me in as carefully as if we were starting on a motor ride,' He said, 'Goodbye, Miss Young, luck is with you. Will you kindly remember me to all the folks back home. Then he stepped back and raised his hat."


"When the last of the survivors were clear. the men returned to the Smoking Room. Oblivious to the drama unfolding on the deck and the occasional passerby, who peered in the A Deck in awe, they continued their game and awaited their fate," the Spectator reads.

After reading his last letter to Clara, one might think that Archie Butt predicted his demise: "Don't forget that all my papers are in the storage warehouse, and if the old ship goes down you will find my affairs in shipshape condition."

A memorial fountain on the Ellipse, outside the White House, was dedicated to Butt and Millet. President Taft was also present at the dedication of a bridge in Butt's hometown of Augusta on the second anniversary of his death, April 15, 1914. At the dedication, President Taft gave a bronze tablet signed by him and placed at the center of the bridge.

With the ancestral connection to Archie Butt, Dr. Willingham has spent many years seeking out histories, letters and memorabilia from the *Titanic* and from Butt in particular. Dr. Willingham is a member of the Titanic Historical Society. While attending a THS convention, Dr. William acquired the April 28, 1912 New York Sunday American covering the wreck of the Titanic.

Five survivors from the Titanic signed the newspaper. Today, it is Dr. Willingham's prize Titanic possession. Eva Hart, one of the survivors, was nine years old when the Titanic sank, "and she has real memories of it as opposed to younger children who recall what their parents

Just the facts

Here are some of the basic facts about the Titanic.

The *Titanic* set sail on her maiden voyage on April 10, 1912 from Southampton, England to Cherbourg, France and Queenstown, Ireland, where it picked up immigrants heading for Ellis Island, New York.

Owned by White Star Line, the Titanic was a Four Funnel Ship, measuring 882 ft., 9 inches in length, 92 ft., 6 inches in breadth with a gross tonnage of 46,380 tons. The largest ship of her kind in the world, she was slightly larger than the Olympic.

Her builder was Thomas Andrews. Her captain was Commodore E.J. Smith. Both men went down with the ship. The voyage was meant to be the last voyage for Commodore Smith before his retirement.

The Titanic struck an iceberg 600 miles Northeast of New York, near Newfoundland at 11:40 p.m. April 14, 1912. She sank at 1:20 a.m. April 15. She was traveling at 22.5 knots when she hit the iceberg.

The Carparthia was the closest ship to respond to the Titanic's distress radio signal. She was 58 miles from the Titanic and reached the wreck in four-and-a-half

Of the 2,358 passengers and crew aboard, only 705 survived. There were lifeboats for fewer than half of the passengers on board.

There were a number of iceberg warnings the day the Titanic sunk.

The Titanic sank within 20 miles of the Californian, which had turned off its wireless radio system less than one hour before the *Titanic* hit the iceberg.

Spencer was a buyer for Nugent Brothers Dry Goods and was in the Smoking Room reading The Virginian. Because he was dressed and awake at the time the Titanic hit the iceberg, Silverthorne was one of the first to get on a lifeboat.

"Many of the first lifeboats to go off were lightly loaded," Silverthorne said in a 1998 interview with Salado Village Voice. "Not everyone took the threat seriously although Spencer had enough sense to get off the ship."




Spencer V. Silverthorne, a survivor of the sinking of the Titanic.


I love the people of Salado and this just makes my fondness of Salado, that much stronger.

as a man. The viceregal court of New Spain heard about this phenomenal girl and invited her to join the court, where she developed an extremely close relationship with the vicereine. By all records Juana was a very attractive, complex, witty and difficult young woman. She wrote and read voraciously. Her circumstances and intelligence provoked ad-

miration and envy. However, when she was 17, she suddenly and inexplicably left the viceregal court to join a convent. There are theories about failed love, fear of marriage and her sexual identity. In the convent her focus was not God, but writingand her work and poetry expressed feminism centuries ahead of her time. For years while the church struggled to silence her, she resisted and continued writing until, one day, she wrote a declaration in her own blood, vowing never to write again. She remained true to her word and died soon after. This play is a researched fantasy that explores the two turning points in this woman's life.

The play was the winner of the Helen Hayes Award—The Charles MacArthur Prize for Outstanding New Play, Kennedy Center, Washington,

The performance will open with Percy Grainger's rollicking march, The Gum-Sucker's March. Written as a tribute to his home state of Victoria, Australia, this is one of a few works by Grainger that is comprised of original material. A pioneer of folk music, Grainger is most

revered for his settings of folk-songs for wind band and orchestra.

Carter Pann's Hold This Boy and Listen is a tribute to the composer's third nephew. Unusually soft and subdued, this song moves between moments of haunting and of wistful innocence.

Prior to intermission, the Wind Ensemble will be joined by Dr. Stephen Crawford, timpani, for the Texas premier of Czech composer Georg Druschetzky's Partita for Six Timpani and Wind Ensemble. This four movement work for orchestral winds and timpani is a fine example of the contribution made to the classical repertoire by Czech composers. This will be Dr. Crawford's first time performing this relatively unknown work, a piece that he conducted while studying at the University of Northern Iowa.

The performance will conclude with Gustav Holst's First Suite in Eflat. This three movement work, composed in 1909, is considered to be the cornerstone of the modern wind band repertoire.




Plot, Characters, Cast

All important championships, whether local, regional, national or international, are played in a duplicate format in order to reduce the element of luck that might otherwise determine their outcome. Nevertheless, the luck factor cannot be entirely eliminated.

For instance, the succession of opponents you meet might or might not play well against you, which certainly will have an important bearing on how you fare. Also, you (or your opponents) might get to excellent contracts that go down because of horrendous distribution, or get to poor contracts that make because of highly favorable distribution.

Consider this deal played in the Blue Ribbon Pairs many years ago by Dorothy Hayden Truscott and B. Jay Becker. They reached three notrump on the bidding shown. Mrs. Truscott's three-notrump bid with the singleton king of clubs was certainly imaginative and was amply rewarded when she made the contract after West led a low club.

She won East's queen with the king and ran six diamonds, subjecting West to severe pressure. He followed twice and was able to discard a heart and a spade comfortably, but then, in order to protect his king of spades, he was forced to discard two

Mrs. Truscott next led a heart. West took the ace and cashed three clubs, but that was the end of the line as West was forced to lead from the K-8 of spades at the end.

You could call the hand a brilliant success -- if you were so minded -- but, all the same, there was a lot of luck attached to it. At another table, against similar bidding, West made the inspired lead of the ace of clubs against three notrump, and East-West collected the first seven tricks to put the contract down three!

Fortunately for Mrs. Truscott and Becker, they were sitting at the right table. (c) 2012 King Features Synd., Inc.



Genetic genealogy focus of workshop at museum

Pin Clover: early blooming wildflower

The Geranium family (Geranianceae) includes two wildflowers that are early, colorful, spring bloomers. The word, "Geranium" is derived from geranos. meaning "crane".

Members of this family have a bird bill-like, longbeaked pistil that is separated into segments containing the fruit (seed) of the plant. The two members that are common in our area, Pin Clover and Stork's bill, are easily identified by the pin-like or beak-like see pod and the pink or rose flowers.

Pin Clover has covered

our back yard in a carpet of pink beginning in late January and will continue to bloom through April or perhaps even May. This native of the Mediterranean area is one of our earliest bloomers. It is now widely naturalized in North America and is welcome on ranges as a forage plant. Pin Clover has horizontally spreading stems, up to 20 inches long, slightly soft and hairy. Compound leaves are up to 4 inches long and are divided into segments. The tiny rose-pink flowers are very fragile and fall off after a day's bloom. New flowers open the next morning adding a haze of pink to cover the fields, roadsides, and yards of those who welcome the lovely sight. The seedpods form while the plant is still blooming. The pods look like long pins and give the plant its name. After it dries, the

twisting seedpod is spi-

raled into the ground. Another member of separate and disperse. the Geranium family, Stork's bill, appears in our backyard in late February through April. The horizontal gray, hairy stems of this low-growing plants are 15 inches long or more. Leaves are opposite, ½-2 inches long, with 3-5 lobes, rounded and fine-toothed. The purple flowers bloom in clusters of 2 and 3 and have 5 petals nearly 1 inch long. Unlike the Pin Clover, the Stork's Bill flowers are sensitive to light. They open late in the day and close in the morning. The long-beaked seedpods that appear after the flower fades and falls resemble a stork's bill. Each style is attached to a seed. The

styles twist like a cork-

screw to help the seeds

Author's Note: Our yard area covers several acres. We choose to mow "weeds: rather than invest in planting turf grass and providing the necessary water to keep it healthy. Therefore our yard is filled with wildflowers during the late winter, spring and fall. We do mow between the peak bloom periods, after the flowers have thrown their seeds, always being careful to mow around members of the Milkweed Family so necessary for the Monarch butterflies.







Fuel efficient car choices for 2012; How do dams hurt rivers?

Dear EarthTalk: Which are the most fuel-efficient hybrid and/or all-electric cars available to consumers today (just the affordable ones, please!)? -- Jack Madison, Chicago, IL

Given increased environmental awareness, high gas prices and a continually slumping economy, it's no wonder that more fuel efficient cars are all the rage these days. The best deal going may be Honda's hybrid, the 42 miles-per-gallon (MPG) Insight (\$18,350). Meanwhile, the newest version of Toyota's flagship hybrid, the Prius (\$23,015), garners an impressive 50 MPG. Other solid choices include Toyota's 41-MPG Camry hybrid (\$25,900), Ford's 39-MPG Fusion hybrid (\$28,700), Lexus' 42-MPG CT 200h (\$29,120) and Lincoln's 39-MPG MKZ Hybrid (\$34,755).

For even greater efficiency and lower sticker prices, consider going electric, whereby you can charge your vehicle at ordinary electric outlets at home or work. Mitsubishi's new MiEV (\$29,125) electric is the most fuel efficient car available to U.S. consumers in the 2012 model year, achieving 112 "MPGequivalent" (the U.S. **Environment** Protection Agency's rating for electric vehicles that swaps in electricity for gas in its calculations) and a 62 mile range per full charge not bad considering four adults can fit fairly comfortably inside. Another option is Smart's FourTwo Electric (\$28,752), a twoseater with an 87 MPGequivalent. And Nissan's all-electric Leaf (\$35,200) achieves 99 MPG efficiency for a range up to 100 miles.

So-called "plug-in" hybrids also allow drivers to charge their vehicles' electric batteries via common power outlets,



but also can use gasoline as needed for a longer range. Though pricey at \$39,145, the Chevy Volt may save you money in the long run because it gets a whopping 94 MPGequivalent in its preferred all-electric mode. An onboard gas generator produces more electricity as the vehicle is driven, extending the car's range with a full tank of gas to some 375 miles. Toyota released a plug-in version of its Prius (\$32,760) this year, as well. It gets 87 MPG in electric mode (but this will only get you 15 miles without gas assistance) and a respectable 49 MPG in regular hybrid

Another factor to consider when deciding which of these new uber-efficient vehicles may be right for you is the availability of additional incentives. Buyers of a new Volt, MiEV, FourTwo Electric or Leaf, for example, can cash in on a federal tax credit of \$7,500—and some states may offer additional incentives bringing the overall cost of these cars down to within the range of similarly sized traditional car models. The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) posts all of the relevant federal tax incentives online at its Fuel Efficient Vehicle Tax Information Center website. For stateby-state incentives, check out the Database of State Incentives for Renewable Energy (DSIRE), a free online resources maintained by the North Carolina Solar Center and the Interstate Renewable Energy Council (IREC).

Of course, consumers don't have to go hybrid or electric to enjoy improved fuel efficiency these days. Scion's iQ (\$15,265) and Honda's CR-Z (\$19,545) each get 37 MPG out of sporty little gas-powered internal combustion engines. Kia, Toyota, Chevrolet, Hyundia and Nissan also make smaller traditional cars that get a respectable 33-34 MPG for sticker prices under \$15,000.

Dear EarthTalk: How is it that dams actually hurt rivers? -- Missy Davenport, Boulder, CO

Dams are a symbol of human ingenuity and engineering prowesscontrolling the flow of a wild rushing river is no small feat. But in this day and age of environmental awareness, more and more people are questioning whether generating a little hydroelectric power is worth destroying riparian ecosystems from their headwaters in the mountains to their mouths at the ocean and beyond.

According to the nonprofit American Rivers, over 1,000 dams across the U.S. have been removed to date. And the biggest dam removal project in history in now well underway in Olympic National Park in Washington State where two century-old dams along the Elwha River are coming out. But why go to all the trouble and expense of removing dams, especially if they contribute much-needed renewable, pollution-free electricity to our power grids?


comes down to a cost/ benefit analysis taking into account how much power a given dam generates and how much harm its existence is doing to its host river's environment. Removing the dams on the Elwha River was a no-brainer, given that they produced very little usable electricity and blocked fish passage on one of the region's premiere salmon rivers. Other cases aren't so clear cut.

According to the Hydropower Reform Coalition (HRC), a consortium of 150 groups concerned about the impact of dams, degraded water quality is one of the chief concerns. Organic materials from within and outside the river that would normally wash downstream get built up behind dams and start to consume a large amount of oxygen as they decompose. In some cases this triggers algae blooms which, in turn, create oxygen-starved "dead zones" incapable of supporting river life of any kind.

Also, water temperatures in dam reservoirs can differ greatly between the surface and depths, further complicating survival for marine life evolved to handle natural temperature cycling. And when dam operators release oxygen-deprived water with unnatural temperatures into the river below, they harm downstream environments as well.

Dammed rivers also lack the natural transport of sediment crucial to maintaining healthy organic riparian channels. Rocks, wood, sand and other natural materials build up at the mouth of the reservoir instead of dispersing through the river's meandering channel. "Downstream of a dam, the river is starved of its structural materials and cannot provide habitat," reports HRC.

Fish passage is also a concern. "Most dams don't simply draw a line in the water: they eliminate habitat in their reservoirs and in the river below," says HRC. Migratory fish like salmon, which are

born upstream and may or may not survive their downstream trip around, over or through a dam, stand an even poorer chance of completing the round trip to spawn. Indeed, wild salmon numbers in the Pacific Northwest's Columbia River basin are down some 85 percent since the big dams went in there a half century ago.

While the U.S. government has resisted taking

down any major hydroelectric dam along the Columbia system, politi-



Clearing Away Wasps

Q: Checking out the eaves last week, I saw several small wasp nests tucked into the more sheltered corners. What's the best way to get rid of these nests? -- Charlie L. in South Carolina

A: There are a few ways to remove those small wasp nests from the exterior of your house, and the quicker, the better. Wasps could possibly begin extending the nests inside the walls if they're not dealt with. In fact, you'll

pants, work gloves and sturdy shoes to protect yourself. And of course, if you have an allergy to bee stings, don't clear the nests yourself; call in a pest-control ser-

The most effective way to get rid of the nests and reduce the chances of the wasps coming back is to use a chemical

spray. Wait until dusk, when the wasps have returned to the nests, then spray according to the directions on the product. You may have to wait up to a week for all activity in the nests to subside; then you can climb up to the eaves and carefully pull off the nests.

An all-natural method for wasp removal is to gear up (cover all your skin, put protective netting over your face, and have an escape route) and spray each nest with a jet of water from your garden hose. This doesn't kill the wasps, again in fall or spring.

and you'll probably see them building nests What if you found that the wasps have gotten inside your home's siding during your initial survey? You'll probably want to stick with the chemical spray of the outside nests (not your interior walls) in order to kill them. One of my readers recommended using a wet/ dry vacuum with a hose attachment to suck up as many wasps from their entry/exit point as possible. If neither of these methods eradicate the wasps, contact a pestcontrol service.

HOME TIP: Found a wasp's nest in a tree at the far end of the yard? Consult a pest-control service before removing it, as the displaced wasps could simply move over to your house.


